Three Candidates for School Board

Three candidates will vie for two vacancies on Tawas Area Board of Education at the annual election to be held Monday, June 14.

Latest candidate to file is Mrs. Charles Schreck of East Tawas, who presented the required number of signatures on petitions prior to the filing deadline Friday and has been qualified to have her name placed on the ballot.

The other two candidates are incumbents, Leonard Sarki of East Tawas and Clare Herriman of Tawas Township.

TC Council Adopts \$176,910 Budget

After weeks of study, Tawas City Council finally adopted a 1971-72 operational budget following a public hearing Monday night.

The new budget has total expenditures of \$176,910, reflecting the general upward trend caused by inflation. Last year, a budget of \$168,180 was adopted and total actual expenditures reached \$170,759.

Added to the problem confronting city budget makers was the fact that revenue from state tax returns has been reduced by approximately \$5,000, due to the per capita loss during the 1970 census.

As a result, the council adopted an appropriation budget calling for 1 1/2 mills to be spread in the city tax rolls. This is 1/2 mill higher than last year and would raise \$78,500.

A breakdown of millage shows 10 1/2 mills for the general fund, as compared to nine last year; 1 1/2 mills for streets, as compared to 1 1/4 last year; 1/4 mill for debt retirement, as compared to 1/2 last year. Each additional mill raises \$6,800 in taxes.

Additions to the budget includes \$7,000 for purchase of a new truck, replacing one unit which is 11 years old; roof and furnace repair, \$1,000; new police car, \$2,200; new police radio, \$1,000; the city's share of a new fire truck, \$2,900; shelter at the park, \$1,000; charter commission expense, \$1,000.

Of the total budget, approximately \$83,000 is for salaries.

Budgets of the various departments is as follows:

City council and mayor, \$2,400; city clerk and treasurer, \$1,700; city manager, supervisors, board of review, \$4,900; elections, \$850; city hall, garage and equipment, \$26,525; police department, \$17,950; fire department, \$9,825; street lights, \$10,500; parks and recreation, \$5,350.

Refuse collection and grounds, \$12,300; employee benefits, \$10,800; insurance, \$5,600; miscellaneous, \$5,680; cemetery, \$5,380; general ledger, \$11,000; legal and audit, \$1,800; library, \$3,300; new street construction, \$11,350; state trunklines, \$7,000; local street maintenance, \$21,200; storm sewer maintenance, \$1,700.

Seek Millage Renewal at Hale Area

Voters of the Hale Area School District will be asked to give approval to the renewal of nine mills for school operation for one year at the regular school election June 14.

District residents will be asked to approve a nine-mill package similar to the one approved one year ago. At that time, school officials requested millage approval for the initial year of a three-year program to meet the demands created by a rapid increase in students plus the rising costs of materials, services and salaries needed for daily school operation and to make needed improvements in curriculum and instructional programs throughout the school system.

Sound approval of the proposal, for which Hale voters have an enviable record, enabled the school to provide necessary portable classrooms and additional teachers as well as adjust the salaries of all school employees. It also allowed for a separation of the school into elementary and secondary units (in separate buildings) and enabled the school to provide its students with a special education program, a guidance counselor, home economics, better reading and science programs in all grades, improved English and foreign language offerings in the high school and several other improvements in courses, learning approaches and materials.

On June 14, Hale voters will have the opportunity to give the green light to continuing these improvements and programs into the second year by approving this same nine-mill proposal. A "yes" vote will give school officials the funds to again face an anticipated eight to 10 percent increase in enrollment, continued rising costs and salary increases and the need for continued change and improvement in the over-all educational program.

The three-year program has taken on additional meaning with the district's approval of bonds to build a new junior-senior high school last December, scheduled for completion in 1973, at the end of the three-year program. Approval of the program through the next two years would see the system through a "transition" period until the new building can be occupied.

State financial aid to the district for 1971-72 is another factor for voters to consider before going to the polls June 14. Supt. Paul Southerland noted, "There is no way possible at present to tell what state aid will be next year. The best guess would be this year's formula with the 'grandfather clause' dropped."

Southerland also pointed out that "A school must levy at least the amount of operational millage levied in 1970-71 to qualify for any increase in state aid in 1971-72."

Although Governor Milliken and other groups are proposing new methods of collecting and distributing tax money for education, the governor has made it clear that local districts must assume the main responsibility for financing education for one more year.

Voters will also fill two openings on the Hale Area Board of Education June 14. Ronald Dane will retire from the board, leaving open a four-year term. A board member will also be elected to serve out the remaining three years of the four-year term of Thomas Clark, who resigned from the board last March.

Polls will be located in the school gymnasium and will be open from 7:00 a. m. to 3:00 p. m. on June 14.

Federal Aid Sought for Sewer Project

Authorization to make application for a 1.2-million-dollar federal grant in aid for expansion and improvements to East Tawas' sewage disposal system was authorized Monday night by the city council.

The proposed grant would aid in financing construction of facilities for secondary treatment, phosphate removal and extension of sewer mains to serve the Tawas Lake area.

Paul Ropert, superintendent of public works, estimated that \$220,000 would be required for additional facilities at the sewage disposal plant for secondary treatment and phosphate removal. The additional \$900,000 would be utilized for extension of sewer mains.

Preliminary planning has been completed on this project by Spicer Engineering Company of Saginaw.

In other business, the council adopted a \$214,039 operational budget for 1971-72 operation following a public hearing. In his presentation, Ropert said that receipts reflected a 3.8 percent decline in population found in the 1970 census and the corresponding decrease in various state shared funds, together with continued inflationary trends.

Because of this, Ropert recommended and the council adopted a tax rate of 12 mills, one mill higher than the previous year. The new budget includes purchase of a new dump truck as a replacement for an older unit.

With a valuation of \$9,420,200, the 12 mills will raise \$113,042 in local taxes. Additional sources of other major revenue includes sales tax, \$28,600; intangibles tax, \$2,550; income tax, \$9,750; liquor tax, \$2,400; motor vehicle fund major, \$16,219; motor vehicle fund local, \$16,219; Baldwin fire agreement, \$7,000.

Request by a Saginaw man for permission to operate a concession stand in the city park to sell popcorn and cotton candy was referred to the committee.

Proposed amendments to the electrical ordinance allowing a rate change for inspection was read.

Charles Quarters was appointed to the Board of Public Works, replacing Dr. Harold Jones, who is moving from the community.

Millage Split Same in Past Three Years

Iosco Allocation Board Monday adopted a preliminary millage split identical to tax allocations over the past three years.

The proposed allocation, coming as the third vote of the board, would give the county 4.80 mills, the intermediate school district .20 of a mill, schools would receive 9.00 mills and townships showing need would receive one mill.

The above motion passed on a four to three roll call vote with Ernest Jordan, Ralph Western, Ronald Dane and Chairman Arden Charters favoring Jordan's motion and Edward Nelkie, William Weryley and John Weible opposing the measure.

Two other motions received at the meeting failed. The first, by Weryley, would have given the county 5.00 mills, intermediate school district .22 of a mill, 8.78 for school operating and one mill for townships. This failed on a five to two roll call with Nelkie and Weryley voting in favor of the measure.

The second motion, given by Western, had 4.80 mills for county, .22 for intermediate schools, 8.98 for school operating and one mill for township. The motion failed with lack of a second.

The allocation board spent most of the morning reviewing budgets of townships, the county and schools. It was estimated that a total of 23 mills would have been required to meet all budgets. The allocation board has responsibility of dividing 15 mills and facing the impossible task of meeting all budgets.

Budgets of Sherman and Burleigh Townships were accepted subject to correction.

Final order of the board is to be made next month.

Council Approves Application for Final Phase of Park Project

Approval of a new application for state recreational bond funds as the third phase to complete a \$25,000 park expansion and development program was authorized Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

Developed by the Tawas City Park Board, the final phase calls for purchase of two more concrete animals, plus grading and blacktopping of the parking lot.

Del Myles, park board chairman, told the council that the project cost would be \$7,300, of which the city's share would be \$1,500. The two additional animals would cost \$2,300 and work on the parking lot would cost an estimated \$5,000.

Myles presented letters of waiver from Alabaster and Tawas Townships, which relinquished the rights of those two townships to the \$3.83 per capita allocation under the recreational bond issue.

Neither township had made application for these funds prior to the deadline. Tawas Township's allocation amounted to \$4,228 and Alabaster Township's totaled \$1,494. Letters of appreciation are to be sent to officials of both townships.

With Monday night's action, a total of six concrete animals to be used as playground equipment will eventually be located in the park. The first three animals, built by Gordon Clute of Tawas City, are to be moved into location some time this week. When all six animals are in place it will give the city one of the most unique playground arrangements in the state.

The over-all program, which was started several years ago through assistance from state funds, included acquisition of land at the west end of the park.

Recommendation of the park board was to place the animals in the original section of the park. During discussion Monday night, some councilmen believed that six concrete figures would be too many for that area and could curtail use of the picnic area. A new weather shelter has been purchased and is to be located at the east end of the park.

A four to two roll call vote directed that the first three animals be located in the new west section of the park. Although the concrete figures are heavy, each is equipped with skids and could be moved if that location is not desirable.

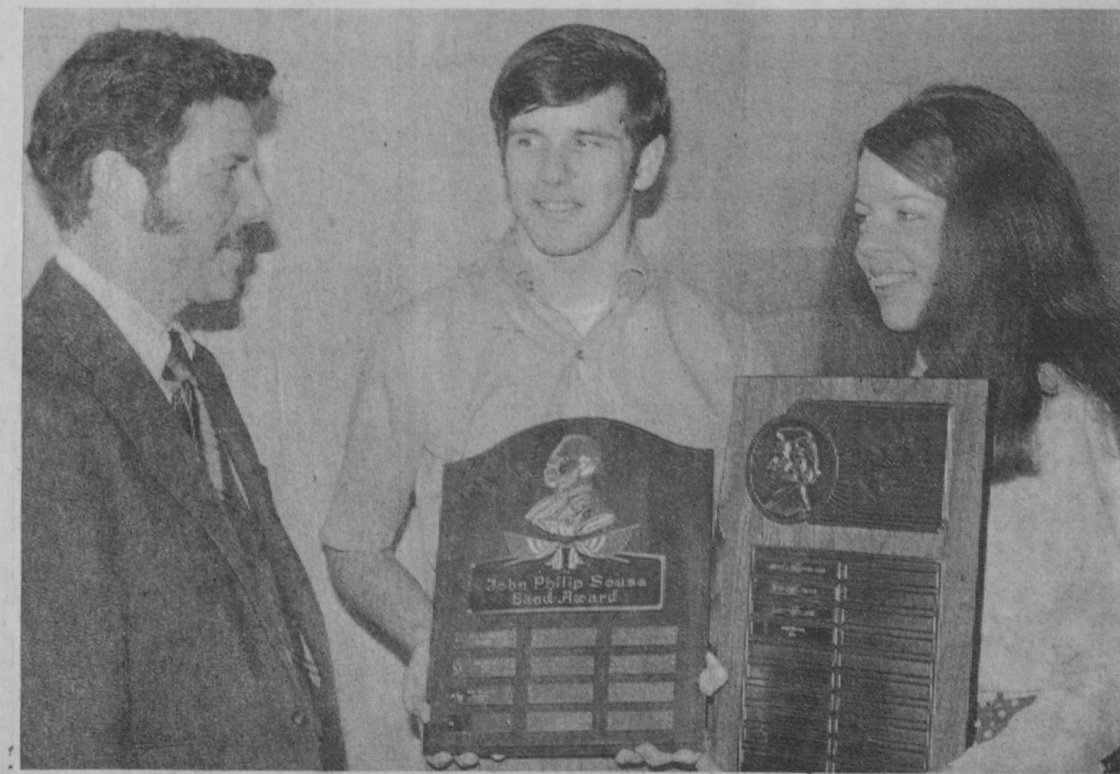

Check Possible State Grant for City Park Dock

Investigation into the possibility of obtaining state assistance in remodeling, repairing and expanding the Tawas City Park dock was discussed at Monday night's meeting of the city council.

A letter from the city's new engineering consultant, Edmonds Engineering, Incorporated, Bay City, pointed out that the first step would be to contact the Michigan State Waterways Commission, asking the possibilities for such assistance and requesting a feasibility study.

It was pointed out by the engineering firm that any construction work on the dock would require a special use permit and restriction deed from the submerged lands division of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

Improvement of the dock has been recommended by the Tawas City Businessmen's Association.

In other business Monday night, it was reported that a shoreline erosion hearing has been scheduled for May 26 and 29 at Traverse City. The council is to send a letter to state officials asking that a similar hearing be held on the Lake Huron side of the state.

The council adopted a resolution recommending the reappointment of Wallace D. (Mike) Nunn of East Tawas to the state highway commission.

During a recent visit of Cong. Elford A. Cederberg, city officials expressed the view that, while the city was interested in additional housing for the community, it was believed that low income federal 235 housing should not be concentrated in one area.

Cederberg received a letter from the Office of Housing and Urban Renewal stating that an inspection of present and proposed projects for Tawas City would be made.

The council authorized a letter to be sent to the federal department asking that the city planning commission be contacted in regard to future housing projects of this type.

Edmonds Engineering, Incorporated, is to appear before the water board at its May 24 meeting to discuss plans for expanding and modernizing the sewer system for phosphate removal and secondary treatment.

The council approved installation of two 6,500-lumen mercury vapor lights at the intersection of Court and Maple Streets and Spruce and Maple Streets near Tawas Hospital. The intersections presently have two 2,500-lumen lights.

Holiday Traffic Patrols Scheduled

Michigan State Police will operate special traffic patrols for the four-day Memorial Day week-end beginning Friday, May 28. Col. John R. Plants, department director, reported.

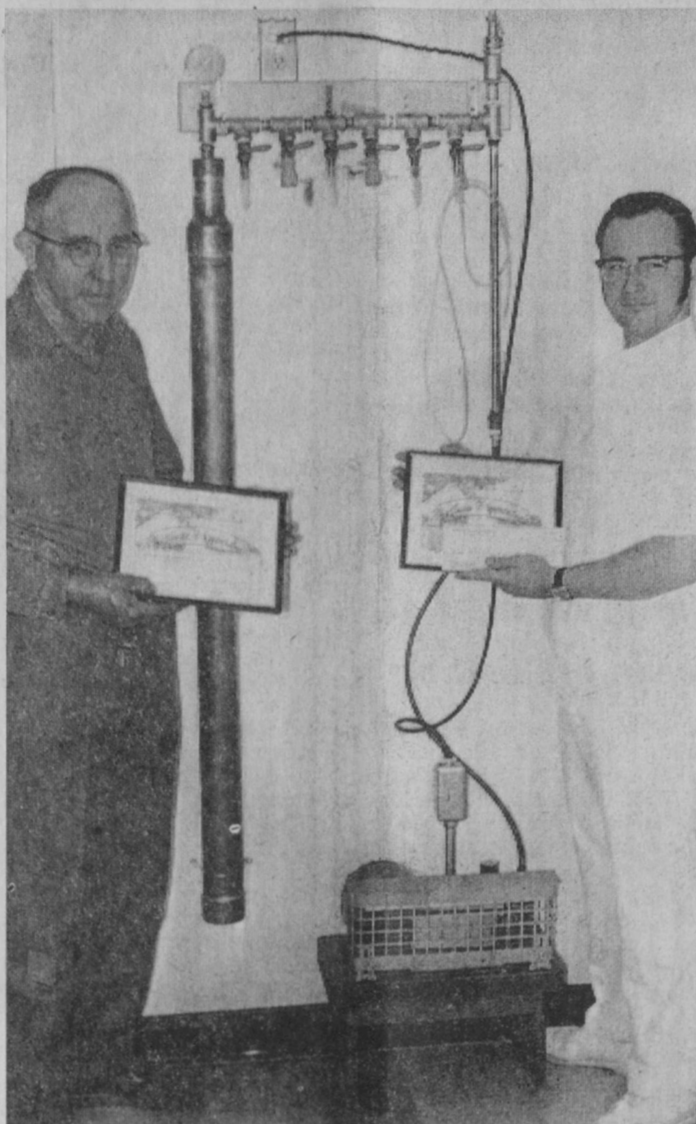

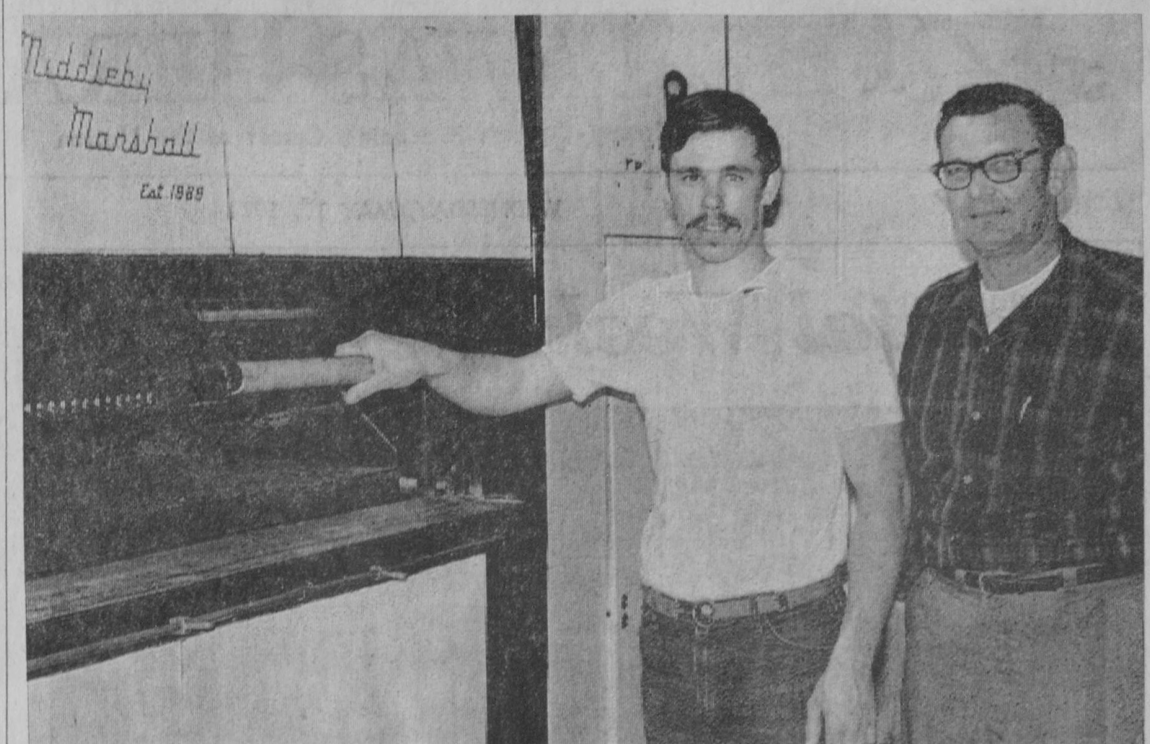

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Winter Tourist Season Topped Past Records

The winter tourist season in East Michigan set all-time records for three out of four businesses operating in the winter sports communities.

An 11 percent increase in sales over winter of 1970 was recorded in a survey of businesses and communities by the East Michigan Tourist Association.

But, while business was up, business operated only at 33 percent capacity at ski resorts and snowmobile centers. Measuring capacity based on the four-month winter season, December through March, the EMTA survey revealed capacity operations for 43.7 days.

"The fact that we can handle more winter tourists and recreationists is a significant factor in planning future promotion for this season," James H. Hall, EMTA executive vice president, stated.

"Too much snow in some areas hurt business as roads could not be cleared to allow through traffic. However, the above normal snowfall was a major reason for increased tourist patronage throughout the season. Response to advertising also helped to make it a record season. According to the survey, a marked increase of repeat business is indicative of a satisfactory winter tourist product.

According to the EMTA staff, snowmobiling made the difference

in profits this winter. In their judgment, the record season would not have been recorded without the expanded revenues from snowmobilers. Dozens of communities from Hillsdale to the Mackinac Straits and the Thumb area felt the positive economic impact of the snowmobiler.

For those with business drop-offs this winter, too much snow and a poor Michigan economy were cited as major reasons.

The impact of snowmobiling was revealed by the survey in that two-thirds of those reporting counted snowmobiling as dominating their business volume versus skiing.

Eighty percent of the businesses reporting cited positive impact of the combined promotion programs of the Michigan Tourist Council and East Michigan Tourist Association. The campaign amounted to about \$100,000. The weekly ski and snow reports were also reported as vital to business volumes for seven out of 10 operators.

Rental equipment for winter sports did a thriving business at ski resorts with 90 percent reporting increases. Snowmobile rentals were not as good, the high insurance costs boosting rental prices being cited as the main reason.

District Health Director Warns of Rabies Infections

"The return of warm weather brings with it increased contact between humans and animals," says Dr. William F. Jackson of District No. 2 Health Department. "And this increased contact increases the chances for rabies infections."

Doctor Jackson explained that when wild animals begin to move about, their chances of coming into contact with humans, and their pets, increases. As warm weather brings more excursions into parks and wooded areas, and as more children play out of doors, even in suburban areas where pets may have come in contact with wild animals, the chances of humans being bitten by a diseased animal are magnified.

All warm-blooded animals can transmit rabies. Most often it is through biting, in which the virus present in the animal's saliva enters the body through broken skin. Rabies may also be transmitted in such seemingly innocent ways as by an infected animal licking the skin where there is already an abrasion or scratch.

Foxes, skunks, bats and sometimes squirrels are wild animals which commonly carry rabies. Cows, dogs and cats are common domestic animals which can carry the disease.

The diseased animal may show uncontrollable excitement in which even a pet will have no recognition of its master. Such an animal often bites or attacks with little or no provocation. Sometimes, an animal with the disease wants to be by itself and does not respond to humans or other animals. In either case, the behavior is not natural, and Doctor Jackson pointed out that animals behaving unnaturally are best left alone.

Humans affected with rabies start by feeling feverish or headachy and

have sore throats. Swallowing is very difficult and painful. As the disease progresses, an affected person becomes nervous and excitable with convulsions and unusual behavior possible. Sometimes, a patient will become paralyzed. Rabies is almost always fatal, the doctor said, but cited the recent case of a boy in Ohio who recovered from an apparent rabies infection.

A person bitten by an animal should be taken to a doctor immediately. Every effort should be made to capture the animal and notify the health department. Avoiding ani-

mals, especially those whose behavior seems odd or unusual, is the best way of avoiding the disease, Doctor Jackson explained. Furthermore, he strongly recommended that pet owners have their pets vaccinated against rabies by a qualified veterinarian, and that parents warn their children to stay away from stray animals, wild and domestic.

Sandra Smith Tapped For Tower Guard

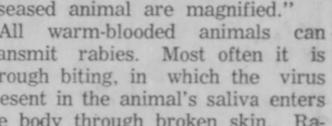

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Police Urge You to Review Water Safety

With May ushering in a five-month period of increased deaths and injuries in Michigan water accidents, Michigan State Police urge all participants in water activities to learn or review the present provisions for safety in the sport.

The department's water safety unit reminds pleasure boaters, fishermen, swimmers and waders, water skiers and divers that 246 of last year's water toll of 300 deaths occurred in the May-September period.

In addition, there were 255 persons injured in those five months of the year's total of 283.

In the first four months of this year, water accidents have claimed at least 15 lives and injured five persons.

Safety instruction or review for water sports participants should include the following:

Boating: Rules of the road for boat operators, safety equipment for craft and passengers, capacity and seaworthiness of boats, precautions to prevent engine fires.

Non-boating: Authorized areas for swimmers and waders and skiers, use of the "buddy system" for swimmers, dangers of overestimating swimming ability and of swimming exhaustion, physical condition of swimmers and skiers, supervision of youngsters in or near water by parents or other responsible person.

Life-saving: Knowledge and ability to apply some form of resuscitation to victims in event of an accident when minutes may be vital to saving a life.

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
