



EDWARD BURGESON

Long Career as County Official Ending May 15

Edward Burgeson, 65, director of the Iosco Department of Social Services, is scheduled to retire May 15, ending 37 years of public service.

Born and raised on a farm in Baldwin Township, he was actively engaged in farming until 1959, when a problem with arthritis prevented his working.

Burgeson's first public office came in 1934, when he was appointed Baldwin Township supervisor to replace Frank Brown, who had been elected to the county road commission.

There have been many changes in this department during the past 10 years, the most notable being a merger of county welfare departments and the Michigan Bureau of Social Aid. The department is now under state direction and employees are members of the state civil service.

Burgeson said Friday that many other changes have taken place in work of the department and more changes are taking place at the present.

These changes have taken place in children's work, protection service, licensing of foster homes, adoptions, supervision of boys and girls released from training schools, work with parents whose children are in state training schools, the Medicaid program, supervision of the Iosco Medical Care Facility.

Burgeson said that all programs had been liberalized considerably since the state merger, allowing more people to receive welfare. The department maintains a referral system to handle patients who no longer need treatment at state institutions at Traverse City, Caro and Lapeer.

Included in the multitude of other jobs handled by his department is distribution of surplus food. The department applied for participation in the federal food stamp program last August, but Iosco County will not be included for another year because of a change at the federal level. The department has cooperated with the domestic action program at Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

After an active career, Burgeson said he had no real plans for retirement. Since receiving a new type of treatment for his arthritic problems a month ago and if his health continues to improve, he probably will put up some new fence on his property, buy some cattle and return to cattle raising.

"I may even do a little fishing," commented Burgeson.

Installation of two 10,000-lumen mercury vapor street lights in the city park was approved. Recommended by the city park board, the lights would be located at the east end of the park, near the tennis and basketball court.

ET Council has authorized its city engineer to estimate cost of a preliminary survey on construction of secondary sewage treatment, phosphate removal and expansion of sewer mains.

This action came Monday night following receipt of a letter addressed to city officials of both Tawas City and East Tawas from the Tawas City Businessmen's Association.

The letter encouraged both communities to start plans for secondary sewage treatment facilities at once, "to prevent further damage to our waters and to prevent further inflation of the costs of the projects."

City Clerk Fred Lomas said that

some preliminary planning on secondary treatment, phosphate removal and sewer main extensions was started several years ago during preparations for construction of a new primary sewage treatment plant. Discussion has been held on the matter since that time by the council and public works department.

In other business, the council authorized installation of the following street lights: Two 10,000-lumen mercury vapor lights on the South Newman Street parking lot, two 6,500-lumen lights at the intersection of Adams and Franklin Streets, one 6,500-lumen light at the intersection of Owosso Drive and Green Road.

Budget Hearing May 17

Governmental Cost Increases Confront City Budget Makers

Public hearing on the 1971-72 operational budget for the City of Tawas City will be held at the Monday, May 17, meeting of the city council.

The city council's finance committee and Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works, have been working on a proposed new budget for the past several months and a tentative proposal was presented two weeks ago.

Because of the current inflationary trend, coupled with the need for financing additions to the park, retirement of notes utilized for past improvements and expansion of service during the new year, it is anticipated that expenditures will reach \$176,910. Last year, a budget of \$168,180 was adopted and total actual expenditures reached \$170,759.40.

Discussion was held Monday night on the possibility of increasing millage for general fund operation from nine to 10½ mills. The 1½ mills allocated for debt retirement would be reduced by one-quarter mill and this would be added to the street fund, which received 1½ mills last year.

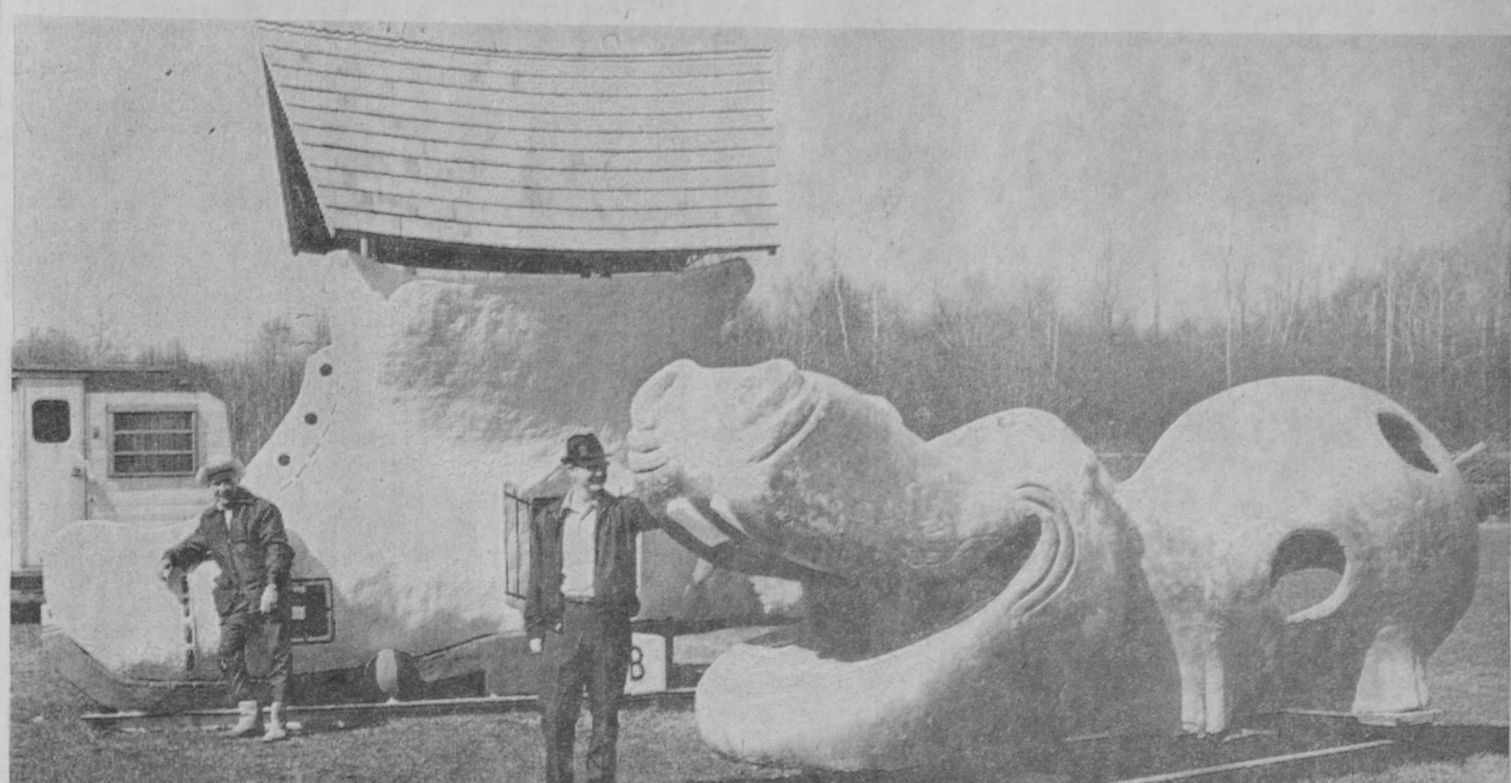
The 13½ mills, coupled with other city receipts, would raise \$174,325. One mill raises approximately \$6,000 on the city's 1971 valuation of \$6,819,870.

Due to the population drop during

last year's census, the city has lost approximately \$5,000 in revenue from state tax returns.

Tawas City Changes Consulting Engineers

Acting on a recommendation of Mayor John St. James, Tawas City Council Monday night approved the appointment of Edmands Engineering, Incorporated, Bay City, as the city's consulting engineer.

The Bay City firm replaces Spicer Engineering Company, Saginaw, which had served as the city's consultant for more than 20 years.

The action ended several weeks of speculation as to the outcome of this appointment. The mayor's recommendation was approved by a five to one roll call vote, with Alderman Cecil Cabbie, Howard Hatton, Frank Ahonen, Clark Tanner and Martin Wellna voting in favor of the change and Jack Lardie casting the lone dissenting vote.

Dissatisfaction over a recent water storage and transmission project by the former engineer, which had been tabled by the council after approval of the water board, resulted in St. James withholding the annual appointment of an engineer at the council's last meeting.

A council committee composed of Hatton, Wellna and Cabbie was appointed to investigate the possibility of securing a new engineer. Wellna and Cabbie visited officials at West Branch and Standish, where Edmands Engineering was given high recommendations. The council's committee recommended that St. James' appointment of the Bay City firm be adopted.

Lardie was of the opinion that the entire council should have the opportunity for discussion on the proposed change before a vote was taken.

Aldermen Hatton, Cabbie and Wellna, along with a letter from Mayor St. James, expressed the opinion that because of the fact that Tawas City purchased its water supply from East Tawas, it was not in the best interest of Tawas City for both communities to have the same engineering consultant. Spicer has

served as consulting engineer for both communities.

Two representatives of the Bay City firm were in this city Monday night and, following adjournment to locate them, Harry L. Bacon and Dan Alstott appeared before the council and gave a general resume of the firm's history.

Established in 1957, the firm of consulting civil engineers and land surveyors has a staff of 30 persons.

Major work of the firm has been in water treatment and transmission, waste water treatment, highways, subdivision development and solid waste disposal.

Alstott recommended that work start immediately on adoption of a pollution control plan to meet a September 15 deadline. Communities have until 1977 to have secondary waste treatment and phosphate removal facilities in operation, but a real deadline exists on September 1 of this year for adoption of an overall pollution control plan.

Alstott said that previous engineering recommendations on proposed secondary treatment of waste and phosphate removal would be studied for utilization and that his firm would work closely with city officials in applying for state and federal grants to aid in the construction.

Hatton, who presided over the meeting in the absence of Mayor St. James, said that thinking of the city has shifted from expansion of the water system to proceeding with plans for secondary treatment of sewage. He said this was brought about through realization by city officials that existing deep wells could be utilized during periods of peak demand during summer months, thus eliminating the immediate need for water storage. He pointed out that the real need was in pollution control and phosphate removal in sewage treatment.

Alstott said that prospects look

good for state and federal assistance in such pollution control projects, citing the fact that Standish and West Branch had received federal and state funds to assist those communities to meet water quality standards.

"We think we can do a good job for you, we have demonstrated our ability and have a desire to work here," stated Alstott.

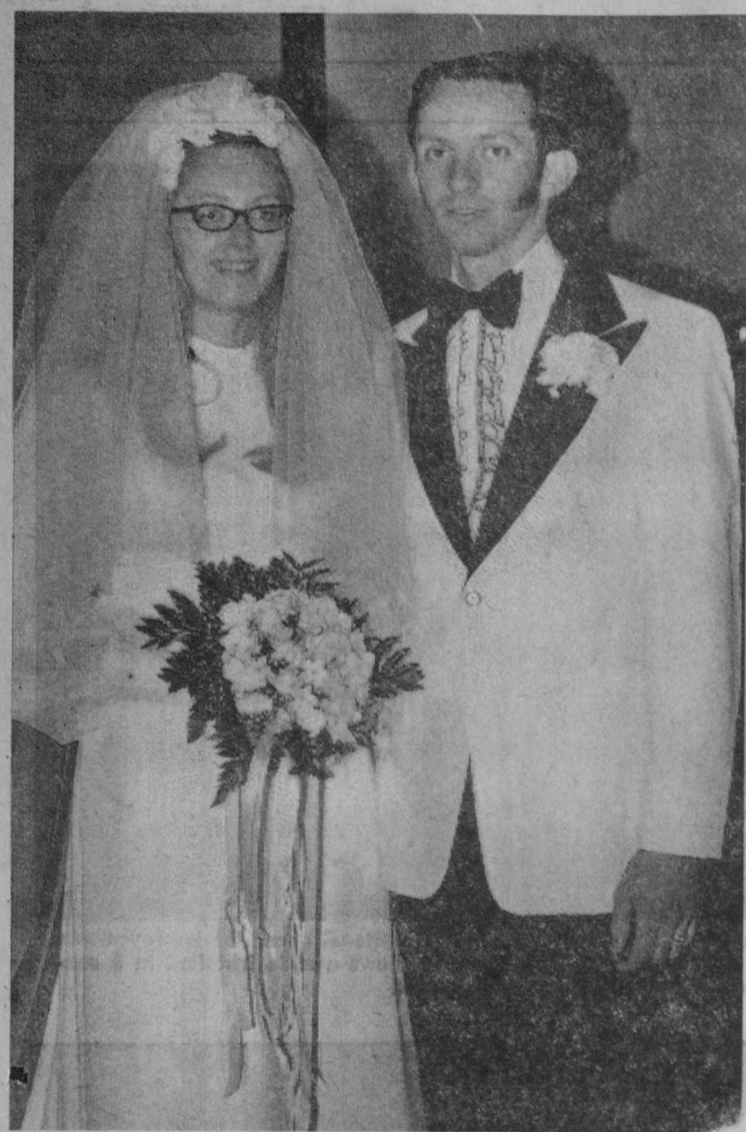


Dinner - Dance to Open Hospital Week Activities

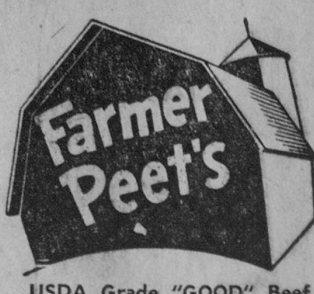

This notice is made in reply to letters that were published in The Tawas Herald, April 28, 1971, in the section, "Letters To The Editor."

4. An electric Time-Recorder proves that there were two bartenders and seven waitresses on duty at 6:30 p. m.

5. Alcoholic beverage sales are regulated by the State Liquor Control Commission and we strictly adhere to commission regulations. One-half is the daily cocktail hour price as well as banquet cocktail hour price. There were no diluted drinks.

6. The Holland House is consulting a law firm for advice regarding a "Libel Action" against the persons responsible for the "false" statements and alleged "Violation of the law of the State of Michigan."

Nash's Voiceprint Testimony Gets First Court Conviction

The first conviction on evidence provided by the Michigan State Police's voiceprint machine and its operator, Sgt. Ernest Nash, formerly of Whitney Township and a graduate of Tawas City High School, was recorded recently in United States District Court at Indianapolis, Indiana.

Using the voiceprint spectrograph comparison process, Nash identified the voice of a woman who called the Marion County Sheriff's Department with a false bomb threat.

She was convicted by a jury in Indianapolis under the 1970 federal bomb control act, the first conviction under that law in the United States.

The new act carries a penalty of five years in jail and/or a \$2,000 fine.

The Indianapolis trial marked the first time a policeman was allowed to testify in court with voiceprints. In previous trials, the only man accepted as an expert on the voiceprint process has been Dr. Lawrence Kersta, a New Jersey audiology expert, considered the leading voiceprint innovator in the country.

Over the past five years, Nash has used the voiceprint in investigations but has never testified in court. Currently he is under subpoena to appear in several states in connection with other cases.

Following his court appearance, Nash flew to Washington, D. C., to give a report on the trial to the Acoustical Society of America. He was cited by the United States Justice Department for his work with voiceprint.

Dr. Oscar Tosi, a Michigan State University audiology professor and close associate of Nash with the

voiceprint, said the Indianapolis conviction could lead to the allocation of more federal money to further experiments with the voiceprint.

Recently, Doctor Tosi completed a two-year, \$2,000,000 experiment at MSU, East Lansing, to demonstrate the reliability of the process.

Flooded Wells May be Unsafe for Drinking

Dr. William F. Jackson, director of District Health Department No. 2, issued a warning today that water from flooded wells may be unsafe and dangerous to drink.

Because of the unusually high water problem this spring, many private wells and septic systems, particularly in some of the resort and water front properties, have been flooded. This results in malfunctioning of the septic system, with overflow into the ground water which then seeps into wells and contaminates the drinking water.

In some cases, owners have been suspected of pumping the contents of flooded septic tanks into an adjacent lake or river. This is illegal by both state and county law and should be discontinued immediately.

Doctor Jackson advises that if individuals suspect that well water may be unsafe, they may pick up water sampling bottles at the health department office in the county and send in a sample to Michigan Department of Public Health Laboratories at Lansing for testing. In the meantime, the drinking water supply can be rendered safe by boiling it for five minutes before use.

Student Teachers to Share Classroom Responsibility Here

In cooperation with Central Michigan University, Tawas Area School will add a new dimension to its regular summer educational program this year.

Joining the regular teaching faculty for the summer program will be a contingent of student teachers from CMU, who will share in the teaching responsibilities of the children enrolled in the program.

The student teachers will work under the direct supervision of the regular program teachers; the program director, Harry Crawford, and a member of the university faculty, Dr. John Meyer.

While working in this experience, the student teachers will be earning university credits towards the completion of their teacher education programs and eventual certification.

Many of the persons enrolled for this summer student teaching opportunity are residents of the local city and county area. This program is, therefore, particularly beneficial to them because it allows them to complete this requirement without returning to campus during the regular school year.

Other cooperating schools in the area for the summer program will include AuGres-Sims School District and Whittemore-Preccott Schools.

Tawas Area Schools will also begin participating in the fall in a regular year program of student teaching, in cooperation with Central Michigan University.

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Topical Fluoride Program Slated

The summer topical fluoride program will be held in the Tawas area at Immaculate Heart of Mary School in Tawas City from July 22 to August 5, according to Nellie Hancock, chairman of the Tawas Area Newcomers Club's topical fluoride committee, which sponsors the program in cooperation with the Michigan Department of Public Health.

According to Mrs. Hancock, 200 children have enrolled in the program. The procedure consists of four visits to the clinic. The child's teeth are cleaned on the first visit and a fluoride solution is applied directly to the surfaces of the teeth. The fluoride application is then repeated during the three succeeding visits. This technique has been shown to reduce tooth decay by about 40 percent compared to the 60 to 65 percent reduction obtained with fluoridated water, she said.

In addition to providing protection against cavities, the program offers a valuable dental experience for children with no discomfort. Dental health education by the clinic personnel is an important part of the program.

Parents of children enrolled in the program will be receiving appointment cards about two weeks prior to their children's first appointments.

In addition to the clinic in the Tawas area, about 40,000 children will be receiving fluoride applications this summer in 200 similar clinics throughout the state, Michigan, which leads the nation in the number of community fluoride programs, has been providing this service since 1949. This is the first year that a program has been conducted in this area.



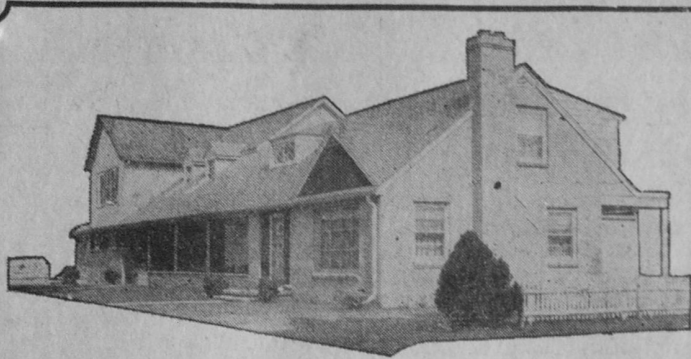

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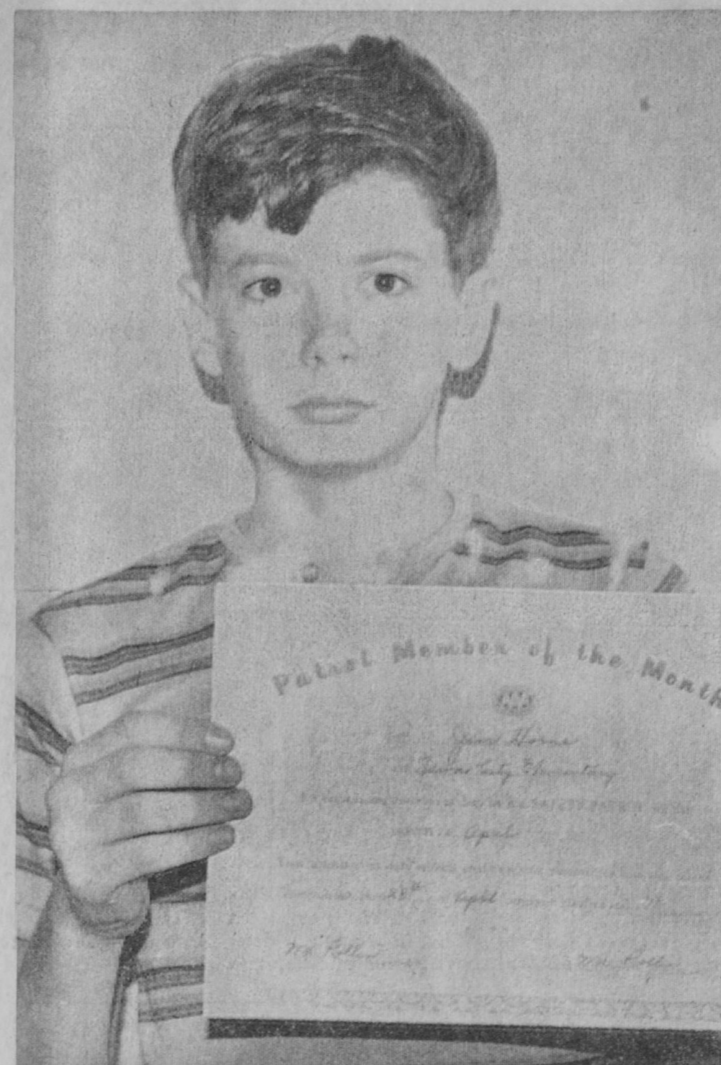

Shore Erosion Meeting Topic

"Shore Erosion" will be the topic of Dr. Ernest F. Brater, University of Michigan professor of hydraulic engineering, when he addresses the joint meeting of Tawas Kiwanis and Isosco U of M Club Tuesday, May 11, 12 o'clock noon, at the Holland House, East Tawas.  Doctor Brater was born in Saginaw and joined the faculty at U of M in 1940. He has been a full professor since 1952. Forest Chats

**Huron-Manistee National Forests
 Tawas Ranger District

It is finally springtime in Isosco County. One good outcome of the late spring is a late fire season. A lot of people are not aware that spring is the worst time of year for fires. Much is heard and read about large fires in the west during the late summer and in the east during the fall. Fire prevention week occurs in the fall. This gave rise to the feeling that those two seasons are the time to be careful in the woods.

It is different here in Isosco County. In the spring, before the earth delivers its new lush, green veil, it is covered with the dead remains of last year's clothing. This old clothing, with its moisture removed, becomes tinder dry under the cool, spring sun and the dry, gusty, south-west winds.

A spark from a trash burner, dry leaves rolling through a campfire can, with a push from the wind, start an onrushing fire against which man is helpless. These conditions will stay until the first part of June when the green mantle is complete.

While there is still snow on the ground, the volunteer fire departments in the county meet. At these meetings, acquaintances are renewed, last year's problems discussed, a training film is viewed and plans are made for the coming fire season. This coordination of efforts enables firemen to get to the fires and extinguish them while they are small.

The Tawas Ranger District administers 113,000 acres that stretches 24 miles across the northern part of Isosco County. It is impossible to cover this area without assistance from the fire departments. The fire departments do not have equipment to attack fires in the woods and this is where assistance can be given.

Individuals can assist everyone through their efforts to prevent the fires from starting.

Social Security Questions Are Answered

Question: I am nearly 65. The company for which I have worked as a secretary for over 40 years has a compulsory retirement at 65. Will my monthly social security retirement benefits start automatically when the company retires me?

Answer: No. You must apply for your social security benefits. Get in touch with any social security office about three months before you retire.

Question: I was in a bad automobile accident and was laid up for three months with serious bone fractures. Since I had no earnings during this period, could I collect social security disability benefits?

Answer: No. Monthly social security disability benefits can be paid only for a severe disability that is expected to last a year or longer. Monthly payments may start with the seventh month of disability. In addition, the disability must be so severe that it makes it impossible for the worker to engage in any substantial gainful activity.

Question: I am 64 and was totally dependent upon my wife until she died a few weeks ago. Can I receive monthly survivor's benefits from social security on her work record?

Answer: Yes. If she has enough social security credit. Call or visit any social security office as soon as possible for more details on how to apply.

Upon ratification of the proposed Constitutional Amendment by the 38th State, all residents of the school district who are registered with their respective city or township clerks and are 18 years of age or older shall be afforded the right to vote.

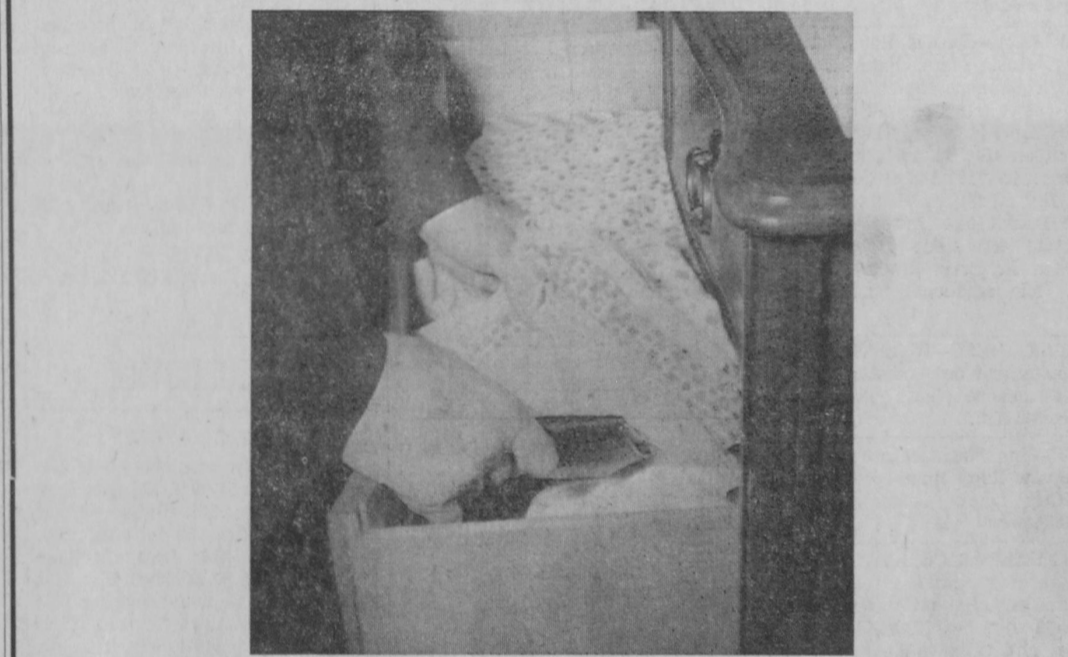
