





Nash's Voiceprint Testimony **Gets First Court Conviction**

of Tawas City High School, was recorded recently in United States District Court at Indianapolis, Indi-

Using the voiceprint spectograph comparison process, Nash identified the voice of a woman who called the Marion County Sheriff's Department with a false bomb threat.

She was convicted by a jury in Indianapolis under the 1970 federal bomb control act, the first conviction under that law in the United

The new act carries a penalty of five years in jail and-or a \$2,000

The Indianapolis trial marked the first time a policeman was allowed to testify in court with voiceprints. In previous trials, the only man accepted as an expert on the voiceprint process has been Dr. Lawrence Kersta, a New Jersey audiology expert, considered the leading voiceprint innovator in the country.

Over the past five years, Nash has used the voiceprint in investigations but has never testified in court. Currently he is under subpoena to appear in several states in connection with other cases.

Induction Delay Through Transfer Not Allowed

Selective Service registrants will no longer have the opportunity to transfer their induction to another local board as a means of delaying the induction process, it was announced today by Arthur A. Holmes, state director.

Effective for the first time in May, the new regulations will require that any registrant ordered for induction will report to his own local board on the date specified or report to any armed forces examining station at least three days before his scheduled nduction date.

The new policy closes two loopholes in draft regulations that had been used by draft resisters and at the same time makes it easier for young men to be inducted anywhere local boards:




