

Blood Testing

Program Set

tect diabetes will be available at Tawas Hospital again this year, Monday, November 15, through Friday, November 19, from 8:00 a. m. to 3:30 p. m. each day, as a part of the search for the more than 100,000 'hidden'' diabetics in Michigan. The results of the testing last year showed 25 out of 277 persons tested were potential diabetics. As stated last year, if you may suspect - or not have any reason to suspect there might be a chance of your being a diabetic - you never really know, so why not take advantage of this free testing.

A hidden diabetic is a person who has the condition but is unaware of it. The presence of diabetes may be indicated by excessive thirst, excessive urination, loss of weight, itching, constant hunger, easy tiring, slow healing of cuts and scratches and, changes in vision. In Michigan, diabetes is ranked as the fourth leading cause of death by disease, the second leading cause of blindness and a contributing factor in half of all heart attacks. This is why you are urged to take advantage of this diabetes test, the entire expense of which is born by the hospital.

Generally, testing is limited to persons 21 years of age and older, and to those who are not known diabetics, but, should you have a child who has a family history of diabetes, the child may receive the free testing if you receive a written request from your doctor.

The Michigan Diabetes Association will provide the follow-up for confirmed "positives" and will notify you as well as your physician. Under no circumstances call your doctor. He will contact you if he hears from the association. If you do not hear from the Michigan Diabetes Association within four weeks, you may assume your test was negative and showed no signs of diabetes.

Diabetes is best detected by testing the patient after he has eaten a meal. Therefore, the following diets for breakfast or lunch are included in
