The Upper Room

(Read I John 1:1-7) He that dwelleth in the secret place of the most High shall abide under the shadow of the Almighty.—Psalm 91:1

As I backed my car out of the driveway one snowy day, I noticed that the shadow of our garage made a steeple in the snow. The children going in and out of the house seemed to be parishioners going into a church and coming out refreshed.

I thought, "How appropriate for a parsonage!" Then driving down the street, I noticed that some other houses, too, cast steeples in the snow. Some others did not. What made the difference? Every house whose gable was at a particular angle toward the sun cast a steeple-like shadow.

Hale Eagles Win Eight Straight Games

Hale Area Eagles racked up their eighth consecutive win Saturday over Hillman, 59-0, to finish out the 1971 season with an undefeated record.

Don Brandt, star halfback of the Eagles and a contender for all state honors, scored three touchdowns and racked up 239 yards to give him 1,122 yards rushing for the season. His total offensive yardage for the eight games is 1,628.

Keyno Shellenbarger scored two touchdowns on runs of 40 and 22 yards, while Jeff Kocher scored two touchdowns on runs of 45 and three yards.

Single touchdowns were scored by Jim Stevenson, who also had two conversions to his credit, and Lynn Bernard.

Hale Area, champion of the North Star League, jumped off to a 26-0 lead in the first quarter, scored 20 points in the second quarter and 12 points in the third quarter.

Bernard, another contender for all state honors, turned in an outstanding game at his middle linebacker post. Kocher carried the ball nine times for 90 yards.

The Eagles have been rated fourth in the state class D listings by both the Associated Press and United Press International polls. It is expected that this big win may hike the school's position in the final poll.

Eastern Tops W-P Cardinals in 1971 Final

Whittemore - Prescott Cardinals held a two-point margin at halftime Friday night, but lost to the Arenac Eastern Eagles, 36-8, on the winners' home field.

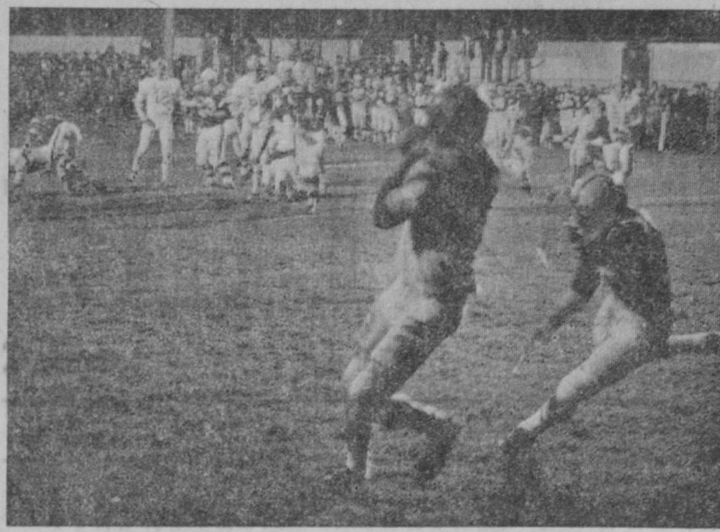
The Cards finished with a winless season in eight games, while Arenac Eastern had a record of five wins, two losses and a tie.

Tony Blanchard got Arenac started by running 37 yards to a first quarter touchdown. Whittemore-Prescott took an 8-6 lead at intermission on a recovered fumble in the endzone by Howard Barriger and a two-point conversion by Eugene Near.

Blanchard put the Eagles on top again by running nine yards and adding the PAT early in the third quarter. Pat Card's three-yard run six plays later, coupled with a two-point conversion by Card, made the score, 22-8, at the end of three quarters.

The winners added two more scores in the fourth period on Larry Carriston's 35-yard run and Rod Seder's 27-yard dash around left end, with Card and Blanchard each running a PAT.

Blanchard finished with 136 yards rushing in 20 carries and Card added 82 yards in 22 tries. The Eagles had total offensive yardage of 307.

TA Braves Turned Back by Gladwin

Tawas Area Braves had visions of racking up their third straight NBC victory Friday night, but the Gladwin Flying Gs pulled the game out of the fire with less than two minutes to go in the final quarter to win, 16-12.

The Braves turned in an inspired first half to have the hometown Gladwin 11 on the ropes at intermission, 12-0. Gladwin took advantage of a couple of breaks as well as unleashing a good aerial attack in the second half to score two touchdowns, a safety and a two-point conversion.

Halfback Dave Moe, returning to his hard running game after being injured for much of the season, got the Braves off on the right track with a 38-yard touchdown run with one minute, 24 seconds left in the first quarter. His touchdown run came off right tackle and climaxed a 68-yard drive by the Braves. The all important try for two-point conversion was stopped by Gladwin.

Tawas' second touchdown came with 33 seconds remaining before the half. Don Brown recovered a Gladwin fumble on the G-13 after a jarring tackle by Steve Anschuetz. On the first play from scrimmage, Quarterback Tom Kasischke hit End Steve Janego with a pass on the three-yard line. Janego spun around and dove into the endzone for another six-pointer.

Gladwin's offense started to move in the second half as Quarterback Dave Ward moved to an aerial attack. Gladwin received what was to be a big break in the game when a Tawas Area defender made a heads up play to deflect a pass. The ball was tipped into a Gladwin player's hands, however, and a pitch off was not stopped until Janego brought the runner down on the 12.

The next play saw Janego intercepting a pass on the one-yard line to save a touchdown. Things really went against Tawas Area on the first play from scrimmage, as a defender broke through Tawas' line to cut Moe down in the backfield for a two-point safety.

Tawas then punted from its own 20-yard line to start the fourth quarter. Ward hit John Biery with a hook and go pass and was stopped on the T-9, the play covering 40 yards. Gladwin moved to a touch-

down on a sweep by Biery and Bruce Ockerman scored a two-point conversion.

With a minute, 40 seconds remaining in the game, Ward dropped back to throw another pass, found every-one covered and elected to run. He carried the ball to the eight-yard line and Gladwin gradually inched its way to the winning touchdown, Ward going the final distance on a quarterback sneak. The two-point try for conversion was stopped.

The Braves were still not out of it as Kasischke attempted two short passes, then a double reverse pass. The third pass found its mark in the endzone, but was dropped. Kasischke's final pass of the night was intercepted by Gladwin.

This was only the second game this season that the Braves scored more than one touchdown. Tawas topped Gladwin in rushing, 153 yards to 134, but six out of 19 passes by Ward were good for 143 yards and that was the main difference in the game. Moe led Tawas' offense with 64 yards in 20 carries. Tawas Area will close out the season this Friday night by hosting the Alcona Tigers. A flag football game between fifth and sixth graders will feature the halftime.

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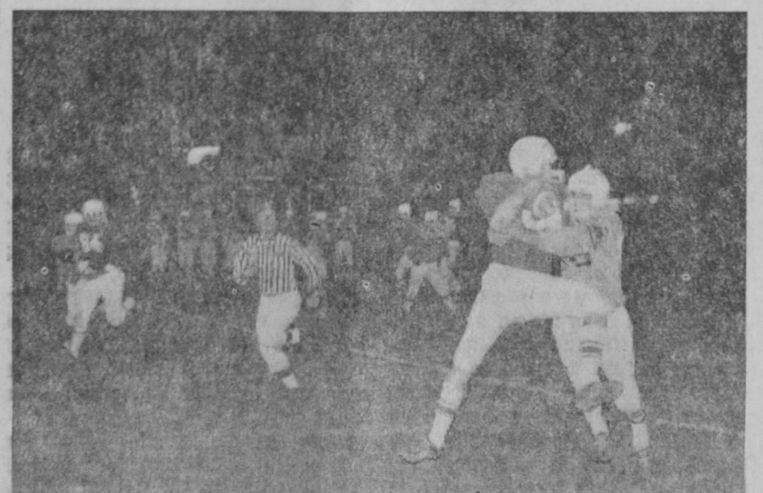

'Year of the Eagle' to be Celebrated Friday Night at Hale Area School

The "Year of the Eagle" will be celebrated for the second time in the past three years when residents of Hale Area School District turn out Friday night to honor the school's undefeated football team.

Highlight of the evening will be presentation of the North Star League's championship trophy to the varsity football team and its coaches, Dale Purkey and Tom Elliott.

Other program features include presentation of all conference and special awards. Also to be honored will be junior varsity players, cheerleaders and managers.

More than 300 persons are expected to attend the event. Ham, bread, coffee and milk are to be furnished. Those attending are to bring a dish to pass and individual table service.

The 1971 Eagle squad typifies the true spirit of high school football—teamwork. Coach Purkey has commented several times this season that there are several schools in the league which have individual players measuring up to his own squad, but none have surpassed the Hale Area squad in spirit or the will to work together.

"That's what makes a winning football team and it is a great experience," states Coach Purkey.

The Eagles looked like a real contender right from the opening day of practice back in August. With nine returning letter winners, the coaching staff had the opportunity to concentrate on conditioning—the area in which many games are won or lost. This early conditioning paid

off as experience was balanced by a hard-hitting team with staying power.

The Eagles jumped off to a 36-8 win over the Whittemore-Prescott Cardinals, then trounced Au Gres, 28-6. Hale Area made it three in a row by defeating Posen, 58-14, in the homecoming game. The next game on the schedule was a non-conference tilt with Bellaire and the Eagles took a 26-6 victory against one of the most rugged lines among state class D teams.

Hale Area made it five straight with an easy, 30-6, win over Atlanta to set the stage for a big showdown with Arenac Eastern. The Eagles won an outstanding defensive battle over Eastern, 6-0. Hale Area then won its seventh straight victory and league championship by defeating Mio, 44-9, and finished out the season Saturday at Hillman.

Habitat Management Program Slated November 18 at Community Building

Cooperative Extension Service of Michigan State University, East Lansing, will present a program entitled "Habitat Management" Thursday, November 18, 8:00 p. m., at the East Tawas Community Building. Purpose of this program will be to give individuals ideas and methods of management of Northern Michigan forest land.

David Olson, county extension director of Oscoda County, will be the speaker. Mr. Olson has many years of experience working in Northern Michigan and will present various ideas and suggestions.

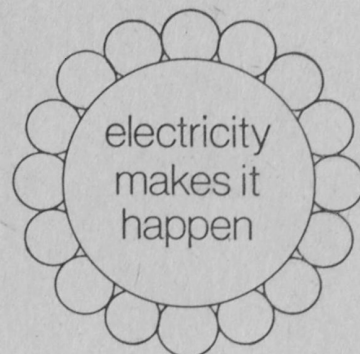
If wildlife numbers are to remain constant or possibly increase, the private Northern Michigan landowner must manage his land. The one-

third of forest land in public ownership cannot support all wildlife demands.

Habitat management is the management of forest land to improve wildlife conditions. The only practical method for private owners to manage is through planned harvesting of timber. Mr. Olson will discuss how to cut aspen stands to favor deer

and grouse. He will also explain how landowners can properly evaluate the oak on their property.

Other meeting places include the basement of the county courthouse in Grayling, Wednesday November 17; Mio-AuSable School, Mio, Friday, November 19, and the Curran Township Hall, Tuesday, November 23. All meetings will be held at 8:00 p. m.
