

Price 'Freeze' Rules Modified by COL Council

June Scott from the Iosco County ASCS Office reports that the Cost-of-Living Council announced on October 28 that the wage-price-rent freeze regulations which made the 90-day program a "freeze" will be modified to make the system more effective.

Donald Rumsfeld, director of the council, stated there was no automatic ending on November 13 of present freeze rules on wages, prices and rents. They will be changed only by the introduction of new regulations, thus preventing a gap that would occur if present rules were allowed to end before new ones had been instituted.

Rumsfeld noted that as stated in the president's executive order of October 15, the provisions of the economic stabilization program which have been in force since Au-

gust 15 will continue until they are specifically modified by the Pay Board, Price Commission or the Cost-of-Living Council. However, changes will occur only through explicit action taken by competent authority.

The October 15 executive order states, in part:

"Pending action under this order, and except as otherwise provided in section 202 of the Economic Stabilization Act of 1970, as amended, prices, rents, wages and salaries are stabilized effective as of August 16, 1971, at levels not greater than the highest of those pertaining to a substantial volume of actual transactions by each individual, business, firm or other entity of any kind during the 90-day period ending August 14, 1971, for like or similar commodities or services. If no transactions occurred in that period, the ceiling will be the highest price, rent, salary or wage in the nearest preceding 30-day period in which transactions did occur. No person shall charge, access or receive, directly or indirectly, in any transaction, prices or rents in any form higher than those permitted hereunder, and no person shall, directly or indirectly, pay or agree to pay, in any transaction, wages or salaries in any form, higher than those permitted hereunder, whether by retroactive increase or otherwise."

Three Men Sentenced For Armed Holdup

Three men convicted of the August 18 armed robbery of a South Branch groceryman received prison sentences last week when appearing before Iosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

Barton Kimball, 19, Bellaire, received a term of three to 15 years; Alex S. McDowell, 19, Mio, received a term of 3½ to 15 years; Virgil W. Pohley, 17, Luzerne, was sentenced to a two to 15-year prison term.

The trio was charged with armed robbery and badly beating Richard Brooks, store proprietor, when they entered his store with handkerchiefs over their faces.

Brooks was treated for his injuries at Tawas Hospital. The three men were apprehended later that night at a sheriff's department road block in Oscoda County.

Other sentencing last week by Judge Miller saw Theodore D. McCormick receive a one-year probationary term for use of marijuana and Keith B. Smith was placed on six months probation for entering the Sand Lake General Store without permission.

State Athletic Take Over Halted Friday

State Rep. George A. Prescott, Tawas City, was among those voting Friday to derail a planned take over of high school athletic affairs by the State Board of Education.

The Michigan House of Representatives has taken positive action to preserve the role of the Michigan High School Athletic Association in interscholastic sports.

Prescott supported a house amendment allowing schools to affiliate with an organization which seeks "promotion of sport or the adoption of rules" governing conduct of those participating in competition between schools.

"I see no reason to junk a system of athletic control which has worked extremely well for some 47 years," Prescott said. "There has never been any hint of scandal, favoritism or any other irregularity in the operation of the MHSAA, which is essential to prevent politics from creeping into high school sports regulation."

A move has been afoot by inter city schools to dump the MHSAA in order to reduce present scholastic and other eligibility requirements for sports by students.

Council Enjoys Deer Hunting

Regularly scheduled meeting of the Tawas City Council Monday night was postponed until Tuesday night to allow councilmen, city officers and employees to enjoy the opening day of deer season. A report on council action is to be made next week by this newspaper.

Tawas Lake Residents Want Hunting Banned

City officials assured residents of the Tawas Lake area Monday night that full consideration was being given to banning all hunting within the city limits of East Tawas, but possible adoption of an ordinance to control hunting requires time.

Appearing before the East Tawas Council was a group of residents from the Tawas Lake area. A complaint had been lodged with Mayor James Campbell that the council was "kicking around" a no hunting ordinance which had been proposed on September 27.

Mrs. J. H. Churchill, 107 West Tawas Lake Road, said that a complete ban on hunting was necessary in order to protect the lives and property of residents. She, along with other residents, complained that hunters had discharged firearms near dwellings on Monday, the opening day of deer season.

Mayor Campbell pointed out to those attending that adoption of any city ordinance requires a minimum of six weeks, but that the matter had been turned over to the council's ordinance committee for consideration. Earlier this year, the council adopted the policy of requiring three "readings" of any ordinance before adoption and publication in order to "insure that unenforceable laws would not be placed on the books."

Campbell and members of the council said that the committee had studied the matter and believed two weeks ago that a compromise ordinance should be adopted, permitting hunting in certain heavily wooded areas which had been utilized as hunting grounds for many years.

It was also pointed out that the city had adopted an ordinance a number of years ago which prohibited the discharge of any firearm

within 100 yards of a dwelling. The ordinance limits hunting to shotguns only.

Ald. Earl McElheron was of the opinion that the proposed new ordinance should again be reviewed because he felt that a hunter would not pace off 100 yards before shooting at a buck. He said he could appreciate the feeling of Tawas Lake residents for he would not want to live in fear during the deer hunting season.

Although it is too late for any action this year, the council is to continue its investigation. "The matter is not dead," assured Campbell, "but I don't like to be told we are kicking something around—we are trying to be deliberate in our actions in order to see both sides of the question."

Mrs. Churchill pointed out that school buses travel along routes in which hunting is presently allowed within the city. She said, too, that small children play in the woods near their homes and it was dangerous to allow hunting in such areas.

Remove Six Meters For Traffic Safety

On recommendation of the East Tawas Planning Commission, the city council Monday night authorized removal of six parking meters on Newman Street intersections as a safety precaution for motorists.

The planning commission stated that entry into a number of intersections was very dangerous, due to the fact that the view of motorists was blocked by cars parked along Newman Street.

At the recommendation of the planning commission, the police department is to investigate the cost of changing city parking lot meters from the present rate of 25 cents for two hours to the regular five and 10-cent meters. It was felt that the parking lots would receive more utilization through the lower cost.

A third recommendation concerning a burning ordinance is to be investigated by the council. In the meantime, the council is to promote the use of plastic bags for disposing of trash.

Ald. George Staudacher displayed a sample box of extra heavy plastic garbage bags which could be sold by the fire department as a project.

In other business, Paul Ropert, superintendent of public works, reported that East Tawas had received a high priority from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources for federal pollution funds to assist with construction of a secondary treatment addition to its disposal plant. A hearing is to be held November 18 at Lansing concerning priorities.

Ropert said that a new requirement for eligibility could increase the cost of any addition to existing plants. The federal government now requires that a treatment plant be serviced by two separate power sources.

Ropert learned that a second power source to serve Frankenmuth's disposal plant would cost an addi-

tional \$200,000. He said that the city engineer is studying the possible use of a gasoline operated generator as the second power supply, which would be considerably lower than having the power company provide a second transmission line.

Carl B. Babcock Heads Tawas City Planning Group

At a meeting Thursday of the Tawas City Planning Commission, Carl B. Babcock was elected chairman for the coming year.

Other officers named included David P. Wyatt, vice chairman, and Edward Savage, secretary.

Outgoing officers were Nelson E. Thornton, chairman, and Del Myles, secretary.

Ordinance changes and candidates to fill vacancies on the commission were among items discussed at the business meeting.

Long Lake Cabin Burglaries Are Investigated

Iosco Sheriff's Department is investigating a series of seven burglaries of cabins at the east end of Long Lake, all on Lakeside Boulevard, Plainfield Township. It was estimated that about \$1,000 worth of items was stolen from cabins owned by Chester Zabawa, Fred Wieker, Jerome Albosta, Henry Newpower, Mildred Siems, Joseph Conquest and Harold Almacher.

Gene Curry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Curry of Tawas City, has accepted an appointment as the international marketing consultant for Rose Laboratories, division of Abbott Laboratories, based in Chicago, Illinois.

Mr. Curry is a 1961 graduate of Tawas Area High School and a 1965 graduate of Michigan State University, East Lansing. He is married to the former Virginia Clute, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Clute, also of Tawas City. They have two children.

Iosco Co. Not Eligible For Snow Funds

Iosco County does not qualify to receive snow removal funds during 1971-72, according to a report from the Michigan Department of State Highways.

Distribution amounts are determined by annual snowfall from the previous year as compiled by the United States Weather Bureau. In order for a county to qualify, it must have had at least 70 inches of snowfall in the preceding year.

Alcona County, which received \$8,008 in 1970-71, will receive a total of \$20,266 in the upcoming winter. Oscoda County will get \$18,334 as compared to only \$1,642 in the preceding year and Ogemaw County, which did not qualify for funding in 1970-71, will receive \$2,647 this year.

Would Promote Bike Safety With Special Week in Area

A community wide program to promote bicycle safety was proposed Monday night by the East Tawas Council by John Austin of East Tawas.

Austin said he was concerned over the fact that 90 percent of the bicycles operated by children after dark are not equipped with a proper headlight, reflector and horn.

He said that parents should realize this danger and believed that it could be brought to their attention by a campaign conducted by city councils and police departments of both East Tawas and Tawas City.

The East Tawas Council and mayor proclaimed the week of December 6-11 as bicycle safety week. Austin was to have appeared before the Tawas City Council Tuesday night seeking adoption of the same resolution.

At the suggestion of Mayor James Campbell, the East Tawas Police Department is to investigate the cost of including a bicycle safety program in the regular safety program presented to elementary school children by police departments of both cities. This material would not be available until after the bicycle safety week promotion, however.

A resolution is to be adopted by the East Tawas Council and mayor proclaiming the week of December 6-11 as bicycle safety week. Austin was to have appeared before the Tawas City Council Tuesday night seeking adoption of the same resolution.

Police Chief Donald Docking said he was considering the same traffic program presently being studied in Tawas City for licensing of bicycles. At the present time, it is very difficult to trace stolen bicycles because of the lack of registration numbers.

He pointed out, too, that bicycle riders must observe the same traffic regulations as motorists. As a further safety precaution, it was pointed out that children should wear light colored clothing while operating bicycles in the late evening hours in order to be more noticeable by motorists.

Seek Greater Participation

Planners Identify Some of Iosco's Problems

"Today's meeting should have been held 20 years ago," but "follow up this meeting with some action" were two comments heard at a meeting November 6 called to develop a county comprehensive plan.

Sixteen Iosco residents representing county, township and city interests, along with three members of the East Central Michigan Development District, attended this all-day session.

Objective of the meeting was threefold:

1. To identify problems which will arise within the county over the next decade; 2. propose action steps which may be taken to meet these problems; 3. recognize that manpower and financial resources are

not unlimited, to rank the action steps in order of priority.

The morning session was devoted to meeting the first part of the objective. Problem areas which were identified as being most significant over the coming decade were:

Solid waste disposal, zoning and its enforcement building codes and enforcement, adequate law enforcement, adequate employment opportunities, sewage treatment and disposal, adequate water supply.

Other discussion areas included developing among citizens an understanding and concern for the problems facing the county, proper utilization of the human and natural resources available within the county, shortage of adequate housing and

need for improved highway transportation systems.

H. W. Burdett, secretary of the group, said that the above list does not include all of the problem areas which were identified, although it included those which were mentioned most frequently.

The afternoon session focused on the second and third parts of the objective. As in the morning session, sub-group discussion was used to define general action steps which could be taken by local government to meet the anticipated problems. When these were defined, each individual then voted for those actions he, as a representative of a specific segment of the county, felt were of highest priority.

Heading the list of priorities was centralization of county solid waste disposal with 20 votes, followed closely by establishment of a county zoning ordinance, building codes and enforcement thereof.

Receiving 15 votes was establishment of county-wide law enforcement, work toward increasing employment opportunities (12 votes), establish county sewer and water systems (11 votes), work toward increased citizen involvement in local government (10 votes).

Other action steps included improvement of communications between local governmental units (seven votes), work toward improved facilities for tourism (six votes), plan for population changes (three

votes), establishment of a local community college (three votes), establish government day (two votes), establish county shoreline erosion control system (one vote).

W. C. Roach, planning commission chairman, said that two things must be remembered when considering the above list. "First, the action steps were purposely worded in a very general way, since it was felt that it is the responsibility of local governmental units to develop a specific program for any action.

The second thing to keep in mind is that this session was intended only to indicate the order or priority to be given to these actions. An action step receiving few votes was not unimportant—each of these steps

was important enough to be discussed during the day, but it was felt by this group that those actions with few votes can wait until detailed programs are developed for those with more votes."

It was believed that the program generally met objectives set out at the beginning of the session, although it was generally agreed that the session would have only moderate value in planning the county's future.

All attending believed that future meetings should be held covering different subjects with greater representation from governmental units, members of boards of education as well as private citizens.

Traffic Slowed While Bridges Are Constructed

Replacement of bridges carrying US-23 over the Rifle River near Omer and over the Whitney Drain south of Alabaster will reduce normal speed limits in these areas, the Michigan Department of State Highways said Thursday.

Adjacent temporary bridges have been constructed to carry all US-23 traffic over both rivers without a detour. However, the speed limit on the temporary bridge over the Whitney Drain has been reduced to 25 miles an hour and the limit on the bridge over the Rifle River to 15 miles an hour.

Construction is scheduled to continue through the winter. Reduced speed limits will continue until next fall when both bridges are scheduled for completion.

One Million Deer by 1980?



That's what the Department of Natural Resources' Wildlife Division is shooting for to reverse the downward trend in Michigan's deer herd. It means the herd, now estimated at 400,000, has got to be more than doubled in the next 10 years. And that, frankly, is a mighty big order to fill. However, the DNR now has the financial thrust to go with its know-how to mount an accelerated program of tree cuttings and other deer habitat improvements. As a starter, \$616,000 has been funded for work on northern Michigan's deer range this year. Earmarkings from the state's recently raised deer license fees should enable the DNR to plow about \$1 million into this program after July 1, 1972. That figure is nearly 10 times greater than the amount allotted for the program last

year, and DNR wildlife officials want to continue at that level or even higher into the 1980's. Besides undertaking selective cuttings on a large scale to produce more deer food, the DNR's enormous new program of "deerland farming" will be geared to stepping up controlled burns, commercial timber harvests, and other efforts to provide whitetails with a "full cupboard." Much of this habitat work will be carried out on a year-round basis, instead of mainly during the winter as it was in the past. If the program brings the state's deer herd up to the million mark by 1980, hunter take should also jump dramatically to 150,000 to 200,000 animals annually as against the present five-year average of 97,000. --Michigan Dept. of Natural Resources.

Pay Increase OK'd for Army Personnel

Announcement was made Monday, November 15, of a pay raise for

United States Army personnel. SSG James Campbell, army recruiter in East Tawas, said the raise will solve the dilemma of young men wishing a pay scale comparable to that of civilian industry. The pay raise is part of the new military pay act, passed September 28. It had not been effective until now due to President Nixon's freeze on wages and prices.

Under the new pay scales, newly-

enlisted soldiers will receive \$268.50 per month, which is double that they have been paid under the former pay bill. "When you add the pay offered a young man or woman with the traditional benefits we have always been able to promise them, the United States Army becomes a very attractive career choice," the sergeant said. "For example," he noted, "we have always led the way in retirement benefits and free medical and dental care. We also offer the chance to select a wide variety of technical schools to those who qualify or to enlist to serve in Europe, the Far East, Panama, Alaska or Hawaii. For those who are seeking opportunity, adventure and challenge, the army should be investigated."




