

Visit Iosco Schools to Study Vocational Education Program

Possible vocational education facilities in Iosco County were visited Thursday, November 18, by two administrators of Tawas Area School. Supt. Reynold Mick told the board of education Monday night that two aims of the visitation were to de-

termine what facilities were available for a cooperative vocational training in this county and to determine if a cooperative use of the facilities would lead to a better educational program than that offered at the present time.

Mick and John Alexander, high school principal, felt that the trips showed there were possibilities and further study was warranted.

"In the ideal situation, the intermediate vocational coordinator would carry out this program but, as no person has been chosen, we are going on with the study," said Mick.

Representatives of Iosco's four high schools are to meet November 29. At this meeting, schools are to furnish the number of students interested in the areas of metal mechanics, auto mechanics, office practice, cooperative training and electronics.

In other business, it was reported that central cooking of food at the high school kitchen is to start November 22. Food is to be prepared there and then distributed to the elementary schools as a possible means of lowering costs.

A report from the athletic department stated that gate receipts at football games this fall amounted to \$5,637.84.

The superintendent reported that, while there is still some question as to retroactive pay, the new contract rate with teachers started November 13. Teachers had been paid under terms of the old contract following the federal price and wage freeze.

Another question not clarified, said Mick, is whether the price freeze is to be effective for one-quarter of the year as on a 12-month salary or for 54 days of the 185 days of the school year. This is to be figured at a later date when answers are available.

Charles Kaufman, district extension leader, will speak on "Zoning Pros and Cons" at 3:30 p. m. A portion of Kaufman's time will be devoted to a question and answer period.

Election returns are to be announced at 3:30 p. m.

Besides district board members and their wives, invitations have been extended to district aides, state soil conservation committee and staff, Soil Conservation Service, conservationists, president of the Michigan Association of Soil Conservation Districts, ASCS district director and executive directors in Region Six, Cooperative Extension directors, district extension leader in resource development.

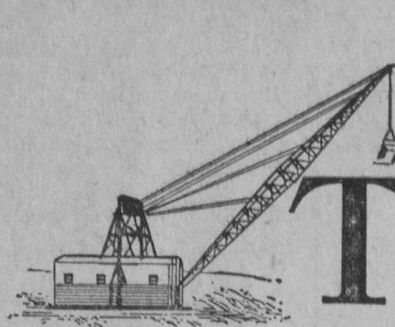
Hunter Shoots Self in Foot With Rifle Slug

Construction Brisk

More Dwelling Permits Add to Record Year

Tawas City's amazing home construction year of 1971 continues during the fall season, according to a report last week by Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works.

Building applications for nine new homes were included among 16 permits approved during the past two weeks.

In reviewing building applications last July, Bublitz reported that new home construction — including fin-

ishes on homes started last year—had a total valuation of \$474,500. At the time, a total of 23 new homes had either been finished, started or permits issued for construction during the first six months of the year.

Since then, applications have been issued for another 13 new homes, including those approved last week.

Among the nine approved last week were five approved for Roderick Builders in North Park Acres.

All of the dwellings are to be built on site at a cost of \$24,000 each. Three are to measure 26 by 36 feet and two measure 24 by 42 feet, all of frame and brick construction. Addresses listed are 116, 135 and 125 Manor Drive; 506 and 514 First Avenue.

Other applications approved included Robert Rollin, 118 Fifth Avenue, 24 by 44-foot home, \$17,000; Lyle LaBerge, 601 North Street, 24

by 52-foot home, \$16,000; Peter Pelletier, Sunset Drive, 32 by 75-foot home, \$25,000; Dorothy D. Baker, 825 German Street, 24 by 49-foot home, \$12,000.

Among other permits issued last week were Tawas Hospital, 26 by 40-foot ambulance garage, \$4,500; Louis Pfeiffer, 227 Seventh Avenue, re-roof and reside house, 10 by 30-foot sun porch, \$3,800; Charles Martin, 202 First Street, new roof on house,

\$425; Robert Rollin, 1129 South U.S. 23, 30 by 20-foot commercial building, \$4,000; Arnold Hoshbach, 200 Sixth Avenue, six by eight-foot tool shed, \$85; William Cholger, 549 Lake Street, new roof on cottage, \$100; Edward Brenner, 112 First Avenue, re-roof and reside house, \$2,300.

The city superintendent said that a complete report on 1971 construction activity would be compiled at the end of the year.

State Senator Joins Opposition to Sale of State Forest Land

Opposition to a proposed sale of 900 acres of public land in Iosco County has been registered by State Sen. Robert Richardson.

The Saginaw legislator wrote the Department of Natural Resources, the state agency controlling the land and suggesting its sale, stating that the sale would destroy the habitats of wildlife and the scenic quality of the area.

Sale of the land has been opposed by the Michigan Deer Hunters Association at Oscoda, the Iosco Sportsmen's Club, the VanEtian Lake Sportsmen's Congress, the Iosco County Board of Commissioners and several hundred area residents, reported Richardson.

Although the sale covers only a portion of a 3,920-acre plot of state-owned land, Richardson said a sale of this portion might set a precedent for future sales in the area.

"It is inconceivable to sell this land for the purpose of buying land elsewhere in the state to equalize state ownership of property," Richardson said. "Arguments voiced by local people indicate there is a need formalized."

Last week, the Natural Resources Commission deferred final approval until its December 2-3 meeting.

Commercial fishermen, who have had the benefit of three public hearings up to this time, focused attention on a proposed measure to prohibit small mesh gill nets in Saginaw Bay next year.

The change would ban all commercial nets of less than eight-inch mesh and is aimed at drastically reducing the take of yellow perch.

DNR fisheries men say the commercial nettings have caused a sharp decline in perch numbers and are so low now that they cannot support an intensive gill net fishery.

Richardson did not indicate what land purchase had been planned to replace the Iosco wooded area or whether he knew what replacement purchase was planned.

Reportedly, the land in question was being sought for expansion of the Lakewood Shores development north of Oscoda.

Miller Appointed Grand Juror in Airport Case

Iosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller will serve as a one-man grand juror in a probe of alleged misuse of funds at Tri-City Airport, which serves Bay, Midland and Saginaw Counties.

Saginaw Pros. Atty. George E. Thick charges misuse of airport funds and obstruction of justice. Judge Miller has power to investigate, call witnesses, take testimony and return indictments.

Under investigation will be the use of public funds at the airport and the use of those funds by Robert R. Denison, airport manager.

Hunter Died of Heart Attack

A 53-year-old Detroit hunter, John Anthony Moskal, died Wednesday morning of a heart attack while deer hunting in Plainfield Township.

Investigating sheriff's department officers said the man's body was found by a hunting companion about 10:30 o'clock. Assisting in the investigation was Coroner E. D. Jacques.

A Flint youth became Iosco County's fifth traffic fatality of 1971 when the auto in which he was a passenger failed to negotiate a curve Monday night, November 15, in AuSable Township.

Dead on arrival at Tawas Hospital was Robert William Hughes III, 17. Driver of the car, Joseph Gilbert Hall, 16, Flint, suffered a broken leg, cuts and bruises and was hospitalized here.

Oscoda-AuSable Township Police Department officers said that Hall's car was headed in a northerly direction on Forest Street. The car failed to make a curve and rammed 180 feet into the woods.

The car plunged through brush and broke off a number of young trees before it stopped. Both occupants were thrown from the car.

Severely Burned in Van Explosion

A 17-year-old Bellville youth received preliminary treatment for severe burns Wednesday at Tawas Hospital and was then transferred to the burn unit at the University Hospital, Ann Arbor.

Kerry Orosz and two others, Michael Orosz, 15, and Jerry Dawson, 21, both of Bellville, were riding in a house-car when it exploded on M-65, three miles south of Glennie.

Michael suffered burns to both hands and was treated at Tawas Hospital. The driver escaped injury.

The three were returning from a deer hunting trip in Alpena County when the mishap occurred. The driver began to smell gas and he brought the van-type vehicle to a halt. The van exploded when the ignition was turned off.

Investigating officers believed that the explosion was caused by a leaking bottle gas tank. When the ignition was turned off, it apparently caused an electrical arc to trigger the explosion.

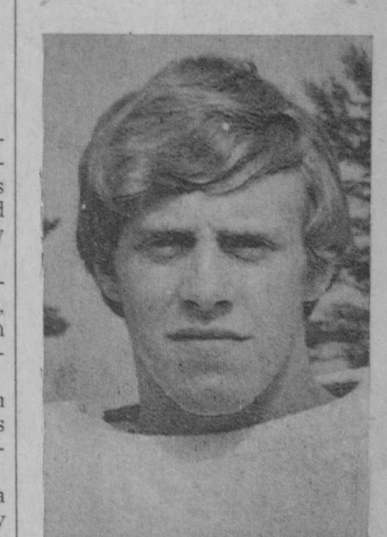
The van, hunting clothing and gear were all lost in the fire. Glennie Fire Department was dispatched to the scene.

The association meets every Thursday noon at the Village Inn.



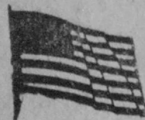
Dave Moe Won Golden Helmet Award

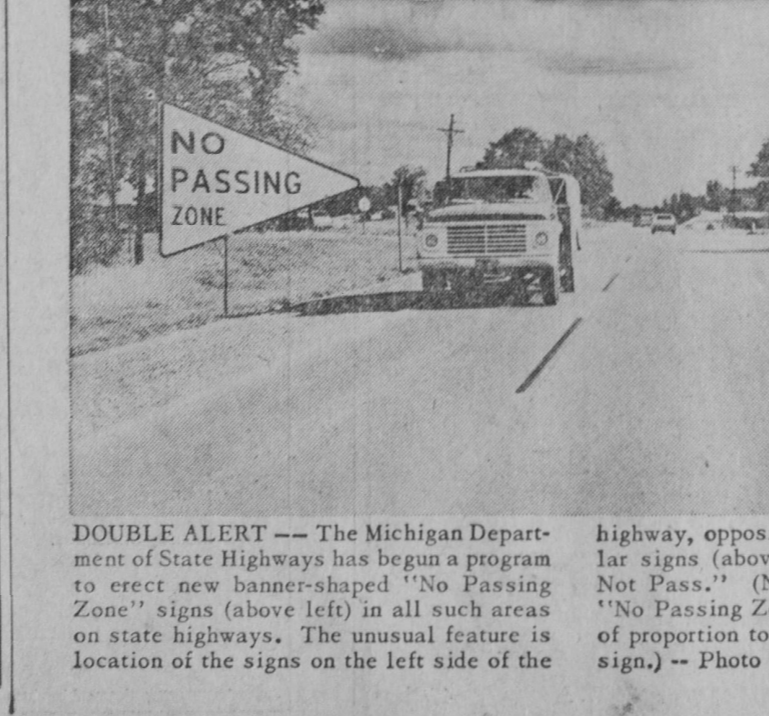

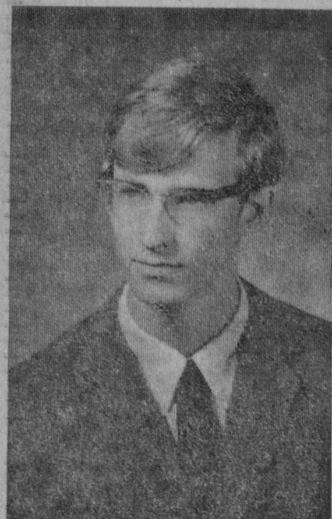

'New Life Campaign' at Baptist Church

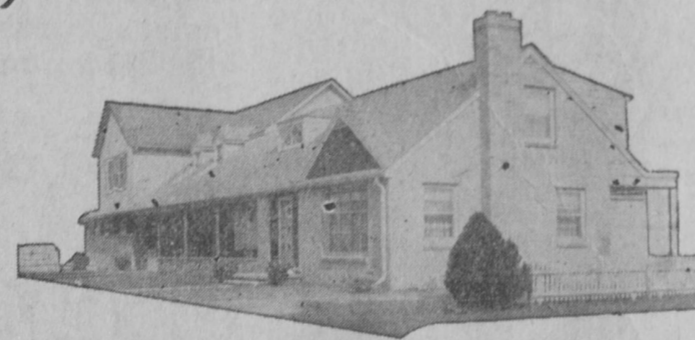

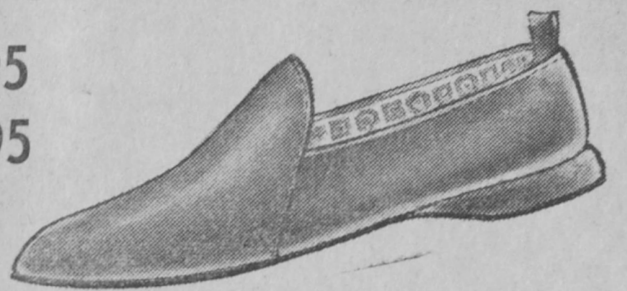

SWEATER KNIT KNACKS
Holiday time means sewing time for many women. There are gifts to make and usually that special outfit for each member of the family.

This year's sewing may be a little different. So many new fabrics have come into the market that you will probably have some new techniques to learn. One fabric that is especially appropriate for this time of year is the sweater knit. And here are some suggestions you may want to clip and save for sewing on this type of fabric.

Sweater knits recently became available to the home sewer. This type of knit is most often sold in the tubular form with a flat, ribbed or textured surface.

In selecting a pattern, choose one with a minimum amount of seams and no darts. Avoid buttonholes and circular skirts. Fitted waistbands may prove unsatisfactory, so choose a pattern that features elastic in a waistband casing. Since sweater knits generally stretch, you will need less ease in the side seams. Adjust the waist and hips rather than buy a smaller pattern size.

When cutting out a sweater knit, trim off the excess tissue from your pattern. Carefully staystitch each piece on the seamline immediately after cutting to prevent stretching.

When stitching, use synthetic thread, loose tension, 15 stitches per inch. Do not stretch the seams as you stitch and overcast the seams or zig-zag the edges. Always keep the garment flat and pat the seams in place to minimize stretching.

When pressing do not pick up the garment until it cools. The garment will stretch if handled when moist. For a raised design, place it on a terrycloth towel and use another as a press cloth.

For longer wear, an underlining should be used in the entire neck and shoulder area. If the knit is more stable, use tape in the seams only. These knits are not to be underlined so that the suppleness of the fabric may be retained. In a heavy knit, make facings from taffeta. Eliminate unnecessary front seams by placing them on a fold.

Bound buttonholes do not work on sweater knits, use machine made ones instead of hand crocheted loops. For ribbed type knits, the invisible zipper is ideal. For flat sweater knits, a conventional zipper in a lapped application is best.

Give Answers To Important SS Questions

Question: My first husband died and my children and I received social security benefits. My benefits stopped when I remarried. My present husband would like to adopt the children, but I am afraid their social security checks would stop. What happens if they are adopted?

Answer: If they are adopted by a step-parent, grandparent, aunt, uncle, brother or sister, the benefits continue. Just report the adoption to us so we can change the names in our records. This is the case only when the parent whose account they receive benefits on is deceased. For information about adoption when the parent is still alive, people should check with social security.

Question: My doctor does not send in to medicare for me. What do I need to do it myself?

Answer: The most important thing is to have your bills from the doctor itemized. Each bill should show your name, what you were treated for, what treatment you were given, when and where you were treated. Those bills (paid or unpaid) should be attached to a completed medicare claim form, SSA-1590, and mailed to the address shown in your medicare handbook. The social security district office has these forms and can help you complete them.

Owls and Dukes Dominate NBC All-Conference Balloting

Essexville-Garber Dukes and Oscoda Owls dominated balloting in the annual, all-conference football selections of the Northern B Conference. At a meeting of coaches last Wednesday night, the Owls placed five players on offensive and defensive first teams while the Dukes, 1971 league champions, had four players so honored.

Gladwin Flying Gs and the Ogemaw Heights Falcons each had three players winning first team selections, while Carrollton's Cavaliers, Pinconning Spartans and Tawas Area Braves each had two first place winners. Standish-Sterling Panthers placed one member on the all-conference team.

Three Oscoda players named to the offensive team included Quarterback Mike Quellman, five-foot, 11-inch, 165-pound senior, who passed for 1,134 yards and seven touchdowns during the season with only three interceptions, rushed 165 yards to score four touchdowns and kicked 18 extra points; Chris Langley, six-foot, three-inch, 190-pound senior end, who repeated as an all-conference selection with 13 pass catches for 300 yards and four touchdowns; Randy Hughes, five-foot, 11-inch, 190-pound end. Named to the defensive

team from Oscoda were Dennis Zaskie, five-foot, eight-inch, 185-pound guard, who was the leading Owl tackler in all but two games, and Bill Baker, six-foot, three-inch, 185-pound junior linebacker, who averaged six solo tackles per game and was a fine pass defender.

Scott Martin, six-foot, 185-pound senior tackle, was Garber's lone selection to the offensive squad, but he has been called the best pulling tackle ever to don a Garber uniform. The three defensive selections were Kim Davis, five-foot, 10-inch, 190-pound senior tackle, who had 31 tackles in seven league games, has great strength and is a quiet leader; Paul Revard, six-foot, 170-pound junior linebacker, who led the Dukes with 68 tackles and was very consistent in putting the pressure on the opponents' backfield; Chip Hages, five-foot, eight-inch, 155-pound senior halfback, who led the champions in scoring but also had 38 tackles in seven league games and was never beaten on an attempted pass for a touchdown all season.

Gladwin's three selections included two on offense, Dayle Polzien, five-foot, 11-inch, 215-pound senior tackle, a great two-way player, team co-captain with college potential;

Dave Ward, six-foot, three-inch, 180-pound junior quarterback, who had passing yardage of 747 and seven touchdowns; Gene Lamb, five-foot, 10-inch, 180-pound senior end, the best hitter on the ball club and defensive player of the week four times out of seven.

Ogemaw Heights' three players included two on offense, Jim Dantzer, five-foot, nine-inch, 170-pound senior center, who was instrumental in the Falcon's second half surge, and Virgil Neubecker, five-foot, nine-inch, 165-pound senior fullback, who amassed 527 yards in 104 carries and led the team with 106 defensive points; Pat Thompson, five-foot, nine-inch, 165-pound junior defensive halfback, had 105 defensive points and averaged one interception per game as well as knocking countless "would be" receptions loose with jarring tackles.

Tawas Area's two selections were both on the defensive team. Steve Nichols, five-foot, 11-inch, 180-pound senior end, a 48-minute man for two seasons, compiled 31 unassisted tackles and 47 assists and was the fastest lineman on the club. Steve Sventko, five-foot, nine-inch, 160-pound junior halfback, a tough and capable two-way performer, who had 34 unassisted tackles and 36 assists to his credit, returned 15 punts for 118 yards, scored two touchdowns and averaged four yards per carry. Pinconning's two selections included Keith Knochel, five-foot, 10-inch, 172-pound senior center, called the best center in the league by his coach; Ron Foore, six-foot, two-inch, 205-pound senior tackle, an outstanding blocker on offense and led his team with 44 tackles and 32 assists. Carrollton's selections included Dale Brown, six-foot, one-inch, 170-pound junior end, who had 14 catches for 344 yards, three for touchdowns, and a fine blocker; Bob Shemanski, six-foot, 185-pound tackle, most valuable player on his team with 46 unassisted tackles and 30 assists, called the finest line-backer in the school's history.

Rod LaLonde, five-foot, nine-inch, 160-pound senior defensive end, was Standish-Sterling Central's stalwart performer for the season and all-conference defensive selection. Receiving honorable mention on

offense were: Clark, Oscoda; Schirmer, Tawas; Watson, Gladwin; Boldt, Carrollton; Wiegierink, Ogemaw; Skinner, Gladwin; Short, Ogemaw; Clarkson, Carrollton; Ockerman, Gladwin.

Receiving honorable mention on the defensive unit were: Jacobs, Garber; Warren, Standish-Sterling; Plude, Gladwin; Walker, Standish-Sterling; Short, Ogemaw; Anschuetz, Tawas; LaPan, Pinconning; Kimball, Ogemaw; Simmons, Oscoda; Janego, Tawas.
