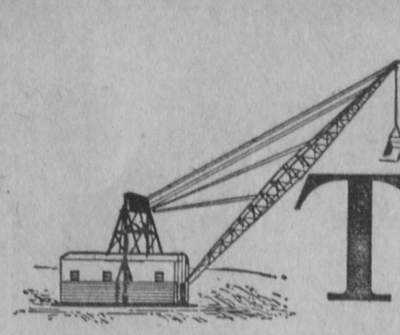

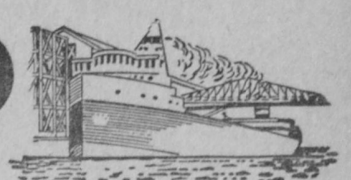

## First Phase of Hospital Expansion

# New Wing Nears Completion

Patient bed capacity of Tawas Hospital will be expanded from 44 to 60 with completion sometime this month of one segment of a 1.5-million-dollar expansion program. M. Jerry Norwood, hospital administrator, reports that work on the new patient wing is expected to be completed about November 15. Work on the remainder of the project is to be completed in May 1972. This major expansion of medical facilities, to keep abreast of the Iosco area's rapid growth in recent years, began two years ago when plans were developed, followed by groundbreaking in September 1970. The new medical-surgical wing, with exterior construction of a dark brick to make a striking contrast with the original hospital completed in 1953, is the first step toward expansion of facilities to provide better health care for all citizens of East Central Michigan. The new wing includes 23 medical-surgical beds, six obstetrics beds, a six-bassinet nursery, along with examination room, labor isolation room, a waiting room for fathers, a locker room for nurses and delivery room. The wing also contains a solarium for patients, utility room, nourishment station for patients, showers and main nurses' station. Norwood said that provisions were made in planning and construction to allow addition of a second floor for future expansion. The original north wing has been remodeled to include two private rooms, an office for the director of nursing, an inservice training office, new pharmacy, an equipment room, coronary care unit, laboratory, X-ray and emergency room. The wing will be served by oxygen and vacuum systems. All ceilings in the original structure are being replaced. New sprinkler and fire alarm systems have been installed. The hospital's south wing, to be completed next May, includes a new housekeeping office, staff dining room, kitchen, cafeteria, maintenance shop, incinerator, general storage room, food storage room, employee locker room, loading dock and boiler room. The heating plant has been converted to natural gas with a fuel oil standby system. Located on M-55, one block northwest of the US-23 intersection, the nonprofit hospital has been fully accredited by the state during each year of its existence, with the latest survey in 1970 for a full two years, the longest term currently given by the State of Michigan. During its nearly 20 years of operation, the hospital has proven its worth to the community and is unquestionably the area's most valued possession, employing 130 persons. During 1970, more than \$318,000 in supplies were purchased. The hospital expansion is a community-backed project, along with federal assistance. The local share of the expenditure has been raised by local and out-of-town residents, local businessmen and children's groups. The hospital auxiliary, volunteers and hospital employees have

conducted bake sales and rummage sales to raise money. "As an example of the enthusiasm for the project, one patient charged \$1 to each of his visitors and this money was turned over to the hospital building fund," states Norwood. The hospital operates an ambulance service which serves most of Iosco County, with two ambulances based at the hospital and one unit stationed at Hale and manned by 18 volunteers. All attendants and drivers are licensed by the state and attend regular meetings to be briefed on new and better techniques of emergency patient care. Ambulances are equipped with two-way radios which are on the sheriff's department frequency. The hospital's coronary care unit is equipped with electronic monitoring designed for patients in need of intensive care. The monitor gives a continuous reading of the heartbeat in order that any abnormality may be detected immediately by the trained person in attendance. Since opening of this unit in 1968, 290 grateful patients have been cared for who would not have survived without it. The hospital's medical staff consists of 10 active members and a consulting staff of 26 medical and four dental members, a registered pathologist and radiologist. Staff physicians are not employees of the hospital but maintain private practices and voluntarily cover the hospital emergency room on a 24-hour, on-call basis. The hospital's emergency room handled 268 patients over the July 4 holiday week-end this summer and averages about 110 emergencies on a regular week-end. There were 245 babies born at the hospital during the past fiscal year and the hospital's 7,000th baby was born early last fall.

## Two Receive Manslaughter Prison Terms

Two men received prison sentences Friday in Arenac County Circuit Court in the August 16 beating and death of Howard Hatton, Tawas City barber and mayor pro tem. Frank Spencer, 35, of Pontiac and AuGres received a term of 7 1/2 to 15 years and Charles Wood, 26, AuGres, was given a sentence of 8 1/2 to 15 years. The two men had originally pleaded innocent to charges of first degree murder and, when charges were later reduced to manslaughter, they both entered guilty pleas. Hatton died August 22 in a Saginaw hospital of injuries he suffered in a beating. He was found lying beside his car on Hammell Beach Road, about 15 miles south of Tawas City.

## TC Building Continues as Winter Nears

Included in building applications approved during the past two weeks by the Tawas City Department of Public Works was one for a new dwelling to be constructed in Huron Gardens Subdivision, located north of the athletic field. The subdivision was recently purchased by Chrisma Homes from Mr. and Mrs. Victor Zaharias, original developers of the property. A permit was granted for Chrisma's first new home, to be located on Lot 46. It is to measure 24 by 42 feet and estimated cost is \$15,000. Other permits were issued to Huron Building Supplies, 120 Oak Street, 30 by 60-foot office building and estimated cost \$20,000; Bernard Molski, 510 Lake Street, new roof on Tawas City Sports Center and Marina, \$380; Ray H. Abbott, 219 Seventh Avenue, 17 by 30-foot addition to house, \$2,500.

## Judge Rules Money Held as Evidence

A petition entered by Walter W. Graham seeking return of funds he held when arrested on a criminal charge here on December 24, 1970, was denied by Iosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller. Graham is currently serving a prison sentence for robbing a gun-point air force officer, his wife and six children on Christmas Eve. Graham claimed in his petition that \$237 was confiscated by state police at the time of his arrest and held as evidence. In his written opinion, Judge Miller said that it appeared to the court that Graham had stolen a man's wallet and lady's purse in the crime for which he was convicted and sentenced, that money seized from the wallet and purse by him was returned to the victims. Further, Judge Miller ruled that \$30.50 found in wrappers, along with \$32 in currency and \$20 in silver coins found in Graham's pockets, was being held by the sheriff's department in connection with a breaking and entering charge still pending in Oakland County. An answer filed by Pros. Atty. Kenneth J. Myles stated that Graham is now appealing his conviction and that money held as evidence would be necessary for prosecution. Myles also pointed out that the circuit court had appointed legal counsel for Graham's defense against the robbery charge here and believed that if the money was not held as evidence it should be paid for the expense incurred by this county in appointing an attorney for Graham.

## Would Locate Marine Radio Station Here

Location of Tawas City as a site for installation of a clear channel radio transmitter to serve Great Lakes shipping interests and pleasure boat operators, was revealed Monday night through an application with the city council. Representatives of Central Radio Telegraph Company, station WLC of Rogers City, appeared before the council and sought permission to use the city's water storage tank for installation of an FM-UHF radio antenna.

George Robbins, chief engineer for Michigan Limestone at Rogers City, and Frank Sager of Central Radio Telegraph, said they were interested in locating a transmitter here which would be remotely controlled from Rogers City. The radio station, an independent subsidiary of Great Lakes Steel, was established in 1922 at Rogers City and furnishes weather and hydrographic information to vessels on the Great Lakes. Sager said that expansion plans call for installation of transmitters at Tawas City and Charlevoix, which would greatly increase the range of service. The Tawas City transmitter would serve an area from Thunder Bay to Harbor Beach.

Sager said that new laws provide that radio installations made on Great Lakes carriers and pleasure boats after January 1, 1972, are to be FM-VHF units. This type of transmission provides static and noise free service and is a direct benefit to shipping. He said that the ultimate goal of the carrier association is to have 22 American stations on the Great Lakes.



## Rites Thursday For Former Legislator

Walter G. Nakkula of Gladwin passed away Monday, November 1, after a two-year illness. He was the district liaison man for Cong. Eilford A. Cederberg of Bay City. Funeral services are to be held Thursday, November 4, 11:00 a. m., from St. Joseph Church, West Branch. Burial is to be in the church cemetery. The body is at the Steunou Funeral Home, West Branch.

Mr. Nakkula was born in the Upper Peninsula and moved to Detroit in 1923 at the age of 16. While at Detroit, he held a position in the engineering department of the Hudson Motor Car Company. In 1942, he moved to Gladwin where he resided until his death. Prior to his election to the Michigan House of Representatives in 1952, he worked as a home builder. His years in the state legislature were characterized by a dedication to provide equality and justice for all citizens of the state. Following redistricting in 1964, he joined the staff of Congressman Cederberg, traveling the 19 counties of the 10th District and conveying to the congressman the problems of the people with whom he met.

The theme of the meeting will be "Iosco County in 1980." Format for the meeting will involve sub-group discussions aimed at defining actions and setting priorities for Iosco County governmental units during the coming decade. It is anticipated that the results of this meeting will define a starting point and establish a framework for the recently initiated county comprehensive planning effort. Saturday's discussion will be led by Howard W. Burdett, commission member, who is also a professional planner employed by The Dow Chemical Company, Midland.

A request for transferring the Iosco Hotel's liquor license, as submitted through the Michigan Liquor Control Commission, was approved Monday night by the Tawas City Council. The request asked transfer of the class B hotel license, SDD and SDM licenses with dance permit from Mrs. Francis R. Jones to John H. Richard E. and Robert Noble.

Use of the city's boat launching ramps on Ninth Avenue has dropped off considerably during the past two week-ends. Only 14 boats used facilities October 23-24 and 13 boats were launched October 30-31. Low bid of Merrit Mathews of Mayville was accepted for furnishing a 250-gallon tank and water pump for installation of a new four-wheel drive pickup purchased by the city. This unit is to be used by the fire department in fighting grass fires. The successful bid was \$2,300, compared to the other bid of \$3,695 received from W. S. Darley Company. Authorization was given to purchase a new salt spreader for use on city streets during winter months. The state has ordered discontinuance of the use of bagged salt for ice removal and salt is to be purchased in bulk quantities. The present spreader is designed to use salt in bags. Cost of the new unit would be \$1,140. A letter is to be sent to General Television of Michigan, Oscoda, asking that firm to upgrade its television cable service in this community. Councilmen said that numerous complaints were heard over the past week-end concerning television reception.

Possible licensing of bicycles as a deterrent to theft and to aid in recovery of those that are stolen, a method used by many communities, is being studied by the Tawas City Police Department. Police Chief Elmer Quandt told members of the city council Monday night that he had received several complaints of bicycle larcenies. He said that many manufacturers do not use a serial number system on bicycles and it is difficult to trace those that are stolen. The police chief said that it would cost around \$113 for the city to obtain materials for such licensing. He said he was going to check with other communities in the area to determine interest in such a program. In other business, it was reported that water from the city's ice skating rink on First Avenue is to be pumped into the North Street storm sewer each spring to alleviate any possible flooding problem along First Avenue. Because the next regular meeting of the council falls on the opening of deer season, Monday, November 15, the next regular meeting is to be held Tuesday, November 16. The council adopted a resolution authorizing the city superintendent to apply for permission to install Christmas street decorations on US-

## Want Hunting Continued In East Tawas

Protest over possible closing of hunting within the city limits of East Tawas was heard at Monday night's council meeting. At its last session, a letter was read from one property owner urging the council to close all hunting within the city for reasons of safety. Those appearing Monday night believed that hunting should not be closed in the Tawas Lake area and other wooded areas of the city. The matter was turned over to the ordinance committee for study. In other business, a new contract negotiated with Edward Schanbeck for garbage removal was approved. The contract, calling for an annual cost of \$8,500, was made retroactive to August 1. A representative of General Television of Michigan appeared before the council, at the request of the city, and explained reasons for the recent poor reception of cable television. It was stated that equipment had been damaged by wind storms. The firm is making an expenditure of \$24,000 to upgrade service. Bids were opened for the purchase of a new pickup truck. The bids were turned over to the finance committee and city superintendent for study. The council authorized reinstatement of a one percent collection fee for winter taxes which had been removed last year. 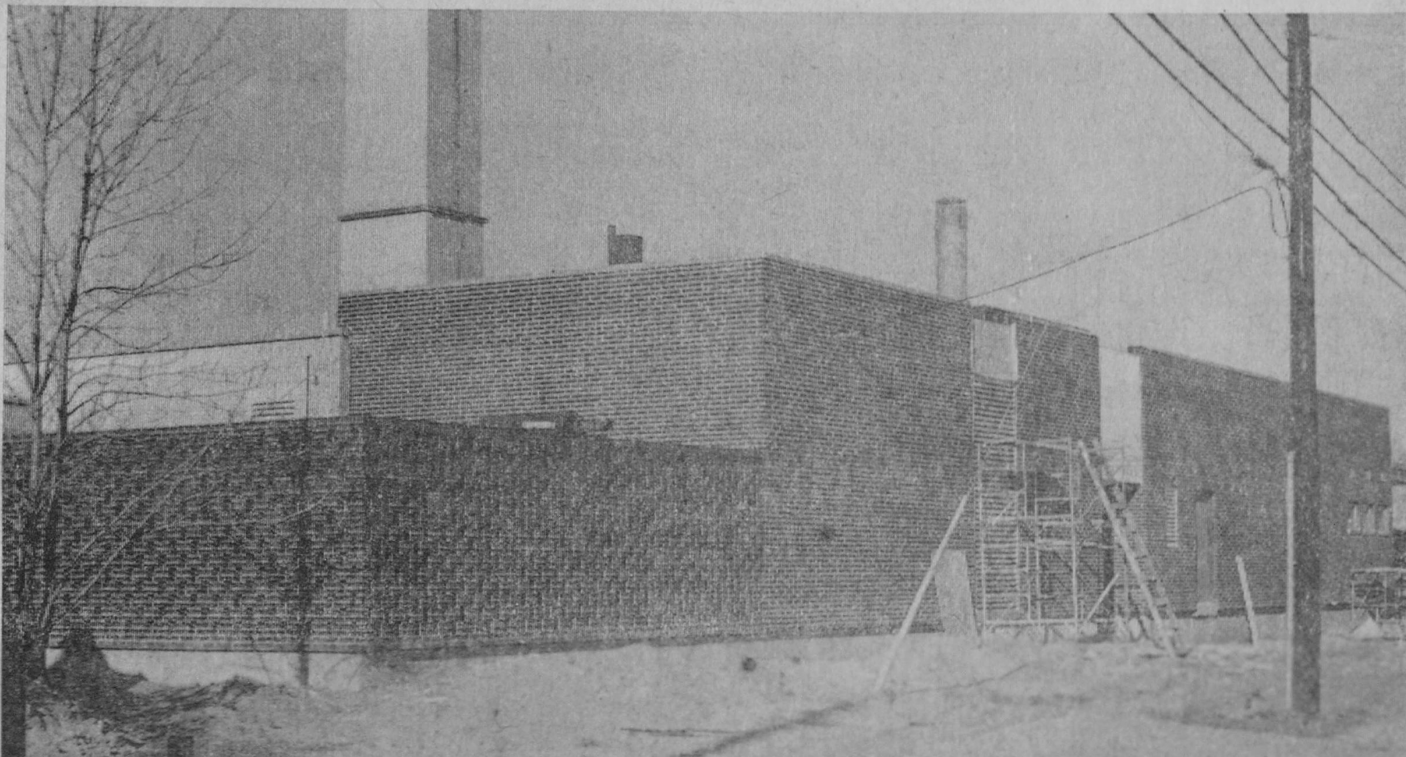


## \$1.5 Million Hospital Expansion

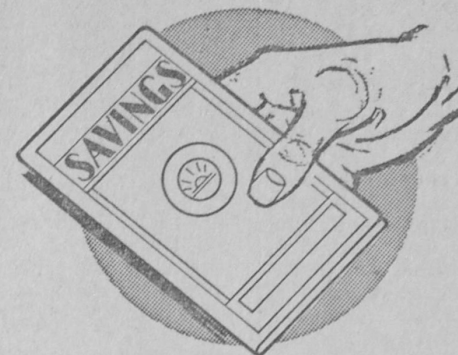

# 9,000 Sets of Ballots for Iosco Election

15 Years Ago—

November 1, 1956—Nearly 9,000 sets of ballots have been printed for the November 6 general election, nearly 3,000 more sets than were printed for the 1952 election. Newly-registered electors are expected to set a voting record for Iosco County.

Republican Alf Landon received 1,768 votes in Iosco County while Roosevelt received 1,547 votes, the largest number ever received by a Democratic presidential candidate in this county.

A total of 365 votes were cast in

the general election in Plainfield Township, highest on record.

Tawas City Council adopted an ordinance authorizing the city to contract for a superintendent of public works. ## Social Security Lists Medicare Provisions

Question: I am really confused. My brother who still works says he had to go into the social security office last year when he turned 65 to get medicare. I have been receiving benefits since I was 62. I will be 65 in March and was told I did not need to go to the social security office for medicare. Does he get a different kind of medicare than me?

Answer: No, it is the exact same program. You can sign up by mail because you have already filed an application for social security benefits and have established your age and eligibility. A person still working who has not filed previously must do so before he can get medicare and he must also establish his date of birth.

Question: My 17-year-old daughter has been disabled since birth. She and I are collecting monthly social security benefits on my deceased husband's earnings record. Is there any way my daughter's social security benefits can continue after she reaches 18 even though she will not be attending school?

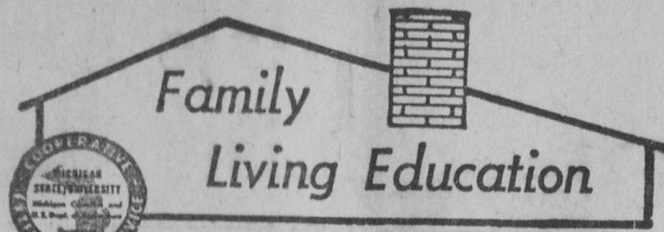
Answer: If her condition is severe and she remains in your care, you and your disabled daughter's social security benefits may continue after her 18th birthday. Call or visit the social security office about six months before your daughter's 18th birthday to apply for childhood disability benefits.

Question: I am not eligible for monthly social security checks yet, but I did sign up for medicare. I am being billed every three months for my medical insurance premiums. Since I receive a Veterans Administration pension, can I have my medicare premium deducted from it?

Answer: No. The premium may be deducted only from social security, railroad retirement and civil service annuity checks.

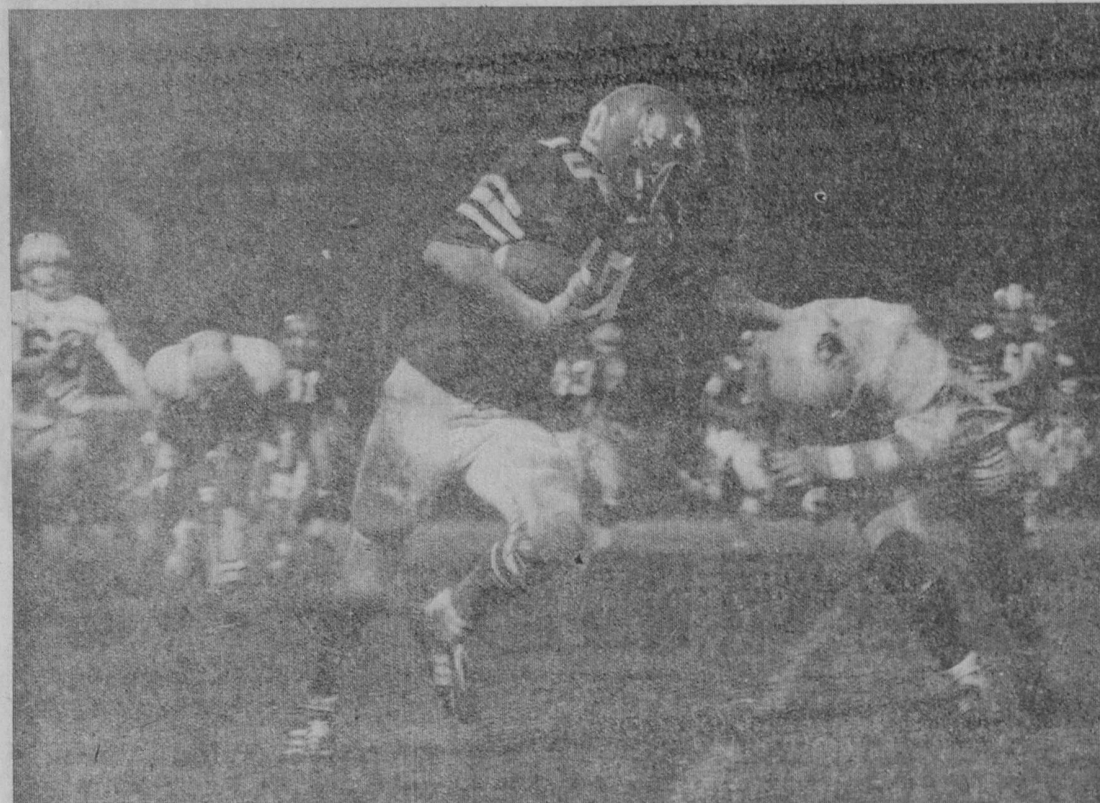

## Braves Defeat Standish-Sterling for Second Conference Victory

Tawas Area Braves slipped past visiting Standish-Sterling Central, 8-0, Friday night for their second straight win in NBC competition.

The Braves close out the conference season this Friday night when they travel to Gladwin and end the season the following week by playing host to Alcona.

Friday night's action saw nearly as many yards in penalties marched off against the two teams as were gained by the two offensive units. Both teams made mistakes galore, along with pass interceptions and fumbles.

Although both teams had scoring threats demolished by mistakes, it was not until the fourth quarter that the Braves reached the scoreboard.

Tawas' scoring drive was set up in the third quarter which was staged mostly in Central's territory. Each team had the ball three times with the visitors punting three times and Tawas booting twice on fourth down. Two of Central's punts came from the 10-yard line and a 15-yard holding penalty against the visitors gave Tawas the ball on the S-S 20 late in the third quarter.

Following the opening kickoff in the first quarter, it looked as though the Braves were going to have their own way during the night. Tawas marched to four first downs but lost the ball on a pass interception to end the drive.

Central had possession of the ball for three plays and moved on fourth down. Tawas again pointed toward the goal, but Standish-Sterling recovered a fumble to end that drive. This set the stage for one of Central's best drives of the night when it had the ball for 14 plays before being stopped on the 15.

The Braves picked up four first downs on the next series but two major penalties killed that drive. This set the stage for Central's best scoring threat of the night. Each team had the ball for four plays, but Tawas had another major penalty and Standish-Sterling intercepted a pass on the 44. The visitors moved to the 35 in three plays, faked a punt and completed a pass to M. Franklin on Tawas' 15. LaLonde moved the ball to the one-half foot line but the drive ended there on a fumble.

Tawas had its own way during much of the second half, but major penalties soured any real offensive threat. Central recovered a Tawas fumble late in the game and returned the ball to Tawas' 40. Central tried four pass plays with one completion and the Braves took over the ball with only 15 seconds remaining.

Steve Anschuetz, Schirmer, Greg Hackborn and Steve Janego turned in key defensive plays during the game and Central's drive to the one-half foot line was stopped on a fumble recovered by Moe.

Parents of varsity players, managers and cheerleaders were honored during halftime ceremonies. Tawas Area High School Marching Band turned in another fine performance at intermission and honored senior members who were making their final appearance in a half-time show.

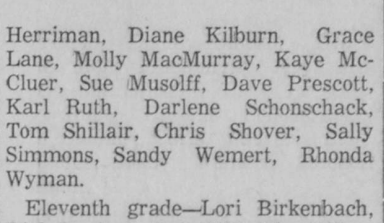

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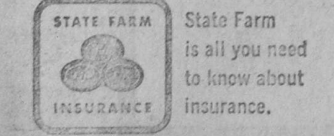

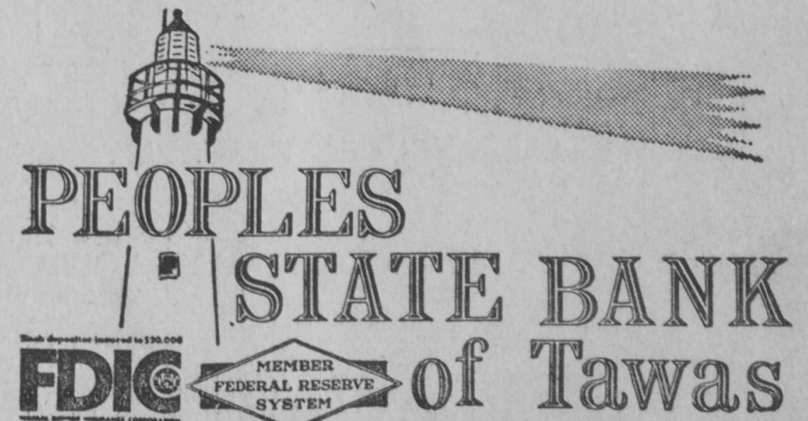
