Hardware Burglar Surrenders; Third Thief Still Sought

Donald Killingbeck, 27, Saginaw, waived examination when arraigned Thursday morning before Dist. Judge J. Richard Ernst on a charge of breaking and entering. He was bound over to Iosco Circuit Court. Killingbeck, one of three men charged with breaking and entering the Fuerst Hardware, Whittemore, on October 3, surrendered to Michigan State Police at Bay City on Tuesday, October 5. One man, Anthony J. Grillo, 30, Saginaw, who was captured by sheriff's department officers at the scene of the burglary, is being held at the Iosco County Jail following his plea of guilty to breaking and entering in Iosco Circuit Court. A third man, Daniel R. Welch, 25, Essexville, who was wounded in escaping from the store, is still being sought by Iosco authorities. Grillo, under questioning by officers, identified Killingbeck and Welch as his companions in the burglary and implicated them in earlier burglaries at Hale Hardware, Pearsall's Store and two break-ins at Whittemore Cut-Rate and K. and G. Variety Store. Welch was identified by Grillo as the burglar who had engaged in an exchange of gunfire with William Fuerst, hardware store owner, and Deputy Sheriff Robert Felske. Investigating officers traced Welch to Melita in Arenac County, where the wounded man was believed to have been picked up by his girl friend. The sheriff's department announced Thursday that a considerable amount of merchandise had been recovered from burglaries at Hale Hardware and Pearsall's. However, much of the merchandise had been damaged. A department spokesman said the burglars had used a garbage receptacle at a Saginaw motel to hide six or seven handguns, watches and two rifles stolen in the two burglaries Thursday, September 30, at Hale. The items were found in the Saginaw dump after containers were emptied into a compactor truck and hauled to the dump by the garbage collector. Sgt. Carl Lange and Det. George Westcott, who assisted Saginaw authorities, believed the burglars may have been prevented from recovering the cache because of being surprised in the attempted burglary at the Whittemore hardware. Undersheriff Leon Putnam said that the recovered items "were a stinking mess." The guns and watches were water soaked, filled with garbage and stained.

Draft Calls to be Resumed Next Month

Draft calls will be resumed in November and December for 1971 first priority registrants with random sequence numbers 125 and below, state selective service headquarters has announced. Draftees will also include volunteers and extended priority registrants with random sequence numbers 190 and below. The 1971 first priority groups includes registrants born in 1951 or earlier, who received lottery numbers of 125 or below in 1970 or 1969 and who are available for induction during 1971. Registrants selected for induction will receive at least 30 days notice instead of the 10 days required under present regulations. All inductions will be completed by December 31. Students and teachers who are reached for induction in November and December may have their inductions postponed to the end of the current semester, quarter or term. Local boards have been directed to suspend action on all classifications, personal appearances and appeals until new regulations are issued under the 1971 amendments to the selective service law. Local boards will continue all other normal registration, physical examination and induction procedures pending issuance of new regulations. Registrants should continue to submit information to draft boards which may affect their classification.

Study Counseling Needs at TAHS

Hiring of a part time secretary to relieve counselors from an extreme amount of paperwork presently connected with the job, in order to more fully concentrate on guidance and counseling needs of students, is to be studied by Tawas Area School's curriculum committee and administrators. At Monday night's regular meeting of the board of education, members were of the opinion that the school was not getting the best services from its two counselors because of the amount of time spent on transcribing records. Appearing before the board were Thomas Pinkowski and Mrs. Harold Knight, the high school's two full time counselors. Pinkowski said that about 90 percent of Mrs. Knight's time was spent in handling records. This included preparation of college transcripts for students and transcribing grades on permanent school records. John Alexander, high school principal, said that some help had been received from student office workers, but the state requires that information contained in student files remain confidential and "you must be careful of whom you have work with these files and what you allow them to do." Robert Elliott, board president, said that counselors are presently unable to sit down with students and chart a course for the future of the students because of the vast amount of paperwork handled by the two counselors. He felt it was a responsibility of the school to provide counseling "because some youngsters just cannot take their problems to parents or other administrators." At the present time, counselors meet with freshmen to outline careers available and possible courses of study, but Pinkowski believed this work should actually start in the junior high. The present room utilized by the two counselors is to be divided into one main office and two private offices, on recommendation of the University of Michigan's accreditation study. The two private offices would lend privacy to conferences with students. The school's curriculum committee is to take a long term look at guidance and counseling and make recommendations for implementing improvements. Possibility of hiring a counselor for junior high school is to be studied. The state recommends that there be one counselor for 350 students and the rate at this school is much higher.

Work Starts on Myles' New Office Bldg.

Work began Monday on the new Myles office building at the corner of Lake and Whittemore Streets, Tawas City, by O. S. Rose Construction Company. Del Myles, owner, said that the building, designed by Schmidt-Thiel and Company, Saginaw, will be 50 feet wide facing Lake Street and 30 feet long on Whittemore Street. The building is designed in an "L" shape. The new building, located east of the city hall, will contain three office suites with room for expansion. A 16-car parking lot is to be located at the rear of the building. Myles said the building is expected to be completed by January 1, 1972.

Floyd Upton Dead; Former ET Alderman

Floyd A. Upton, 78, former member of the East Tawas Council and Iosco Board of Supervisors, died Monday, October 11, at Tawas Hospital. Friends may call at the E. D. Jacques and Son Funeral Home, Tawas City, Wednesday (today), October 11, after 10:00 a. m., where funeral services are to be held Thursday, October 14, 10:00 a. m., with the Rev. Kenneth Tousey officiating. The Rev. Joseph Dibley will officiate at graveside services to be held at Grand Lawn Cemetery, Detroit, 3:00 p. m. Mr. Upton was born January 7, 1893, at Colon. He was married June 18, 1921, to Zella I. Huff at Detroit. He retired in 1956 from the Dodge Division of Chrysler Corporation, where he was supervisor of materials for 45 years. The Uptons moved to the Tawas area in 1956 from Detroit. He was a member of the Tawas United Methodist Church, East Parish; a 50-year member of the Moslem Shrine, and a life member of University Lodge, Detroit. He had been an active member of Tawas Area Senior Citizens. Besides his wife, he is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Doris Taylor and Mrs. Joanne Mack, both of Detroit; seven grandchildren, and five great grandchildren.

TA Board Endorses Iosco Skill Center

Tawas Area Board of Education went on record Monday night supporting a vocational technical skill center in Iosco Intermediate School District. At the same time, the board recommended that a feasibility study of a cooperative vocational technical education program in the four districts of this county be studied while the skill center is being developed. Named to represent Tawas Area Board of Education at the meeting called for Monday, October 18, by the intermediate district were Earl Davis and Dr. James Jacques. In other business Monday night, the board of education indicated it was in favor of granting a full credit to students participating in band. It was pointed out that band students have more preparation time involved than in any other subject or extra curricular activity. The school's curriculum committee is to study the possibility of giving a full credit for band as well as credit hours spent under supervision of a teacher in debate, forensics, track, basketball, baseball, football, golf and cross-country.

TA Enrollment Up 46 Students

Enrollment tabulations last week at Tawas Area School reveals the area has a remarkably mobile population. According to Supt. Reynold Mick, total school enrollment on the fourth Friday count was 1,107 students, or 46 more students than last year. There was an actual decrease of 28 students in elementary grades, but this was offset by an increase in grades seven through 12. John A. Alexander, high school principal, told members of the board of education Monday night that there were 63 new students this year in the high school building. Twenty-two students are from outside the State of Michigan, 11 are from Saginaw, 10 from Detroit, nine from Flint and six from Oscoda. Thirty-one students entered from Tawas parochial schools. The senior class count showed a reduction, from 162 last year to 154 this year. The junior class numbers 174, 11 more than last year; the sophomore class totals 189, 14 more than last year; the freshman class now numbers 202, 26 more than last year. In junior high school, the seventh grade numbers 191, nine more than last year, and the eighth grade numbers 186, four less than last year.

Seek Damages of \$78,000 in Circuit Court

A \$78,000 damage suit was filed in Iosco Circuit Court October 8 by Carol LaBerge and Lyle LaBerge vs. John and Anne Brugger, doing business as Brugger's Foodland, Tawas City. The plaintiffs claim that on October 16, 1969, Mrs. LaBerge slipped on a bottle of syrup which was broken on the floor of the market. The petition claims that Mrs. LaBerge injured her back, neck and head in the fall. A jury trial was demanded.

NBC Harriers Meet Saturday at Golf Course

Tawas Area School will host the annual Northern B Conference cross-country meet Saturday, 10:30 a. m., at Tawas Golf and Country Club. Eight schools and 56 runners will be participating. Coach Jim Papenfus of the host school said that Pinconning School's team, defending champion, was favored to win the meet with Carrollton and Tawas Area having an "outside chance" to act as spoilers. Tawas Area harriers have a record of six wins and two losses in league competition and won a triangular meet last Wednesday at Carrollton. Tawas Area had 35 points, followed by Essexville with 38 and Carrollton had 56. The host school, however, was without the services of its star runner. The Braves are to play host Wednesday (today) to Standish and Gladwin. Saturday's league meet ends the regular season.

Hurt Saturday on Motorcycle

Community Chest Has 1971 Goal of \$16,117

Goal of the Tawas-Whittemore-Hale Area Community Chest is \$16,117. The 1971 campaign opened with a kick-off breakfast Monday morning at Coyle's Restaurant, Tawas City, and is to continue through October 25. Contributions during this two-week campaign will make it possible with one donation at one time in a year to support the many local, state and national agencies. By giving once to the community chest, the donor is giving to all. Money collected will be administered by the board of directors of Tawas-Whittemore-Hale Community Chest, a group of volunteers interested in supporting charities in the most economical and efficient way possible. Assisting directors are the many volunteers who unselfishly spend their time and effort enlisting the support of residents. Funds raised during the crusade are to be distributed as follows: Michigan United Fund, \$2,617. This is a state-wide organization which services 36 agencies at the state and national levels. It contributes to health agencies in conducting research projects in treatment and prevention of heart disease, arthritis, mental illness, kidney disease, diabetes, epilepsy, loss of hearing, multiple sclerosis and others. Youth activities, \$2,000. Approximately 450 boys and girls were involved in youth activities this year, receiving financial support from the community chest. Some 400 boys took part in baseball programs and were taught sportsmanship on rainy days. Soccer, baseball and indoor games provided activity for 50 girls. The 1971 drive will also give financial support to the youth activities at Hale. Girl scouts, \$500. Mitten Bay Council, Girl Scouts of America, now has seven girl scout troops (121 girls) in the Tawas area, three troops in the Hale area (43 girls) and two troops in the Whittemore area (49 girls). Boy Scouts of America, \$2,900. Eight units of scouting have 22 boys enrolled this year. There are two boy scout troops and one cub scout pack in the Tawas area and one boy scout troop and one cub pack at Whittemore. At Hale, one boy scout troop, one cub scout pack and one explorer group are active. The explorer group, open to boys 14 to 18, has openings for more members. Salvation Army, \$1,000. At least 20 percent of the Salvation Army share is returned to the county each year for local use—more if necessary. Lutheran Social Services, \$600. Lutheran operates in all counties of the Lower Peninsula providing services to unwed mothers, adoption, marriage and family counseling. It serves all without regard to race, color or creed. Each year, it spends about \$2,000 for services in the Tawas-Whittemore-Hale area. It also has a program providing care for older people and its newest home for the aged has opened at Saginaw, to which older people from this area are eligible for admission. American Red Cross, \$2,300. Iosco County Chapter of the American Red Cross provides the following services to the local community: Regional blood bank, emergency service to families of Iosco County military personnel, first aid training, water safety programs and local disaster relief. Funds are provided for furtherance of such programs as disaster relief and American armed forces personnel in the United States and overseas. Michigan Children's Aid Society, \$1,300. Activities of Michigan Children's Aid in the Tawas-Whittemore-Hale area this year include children placed in foster homes, children placed for adoption and unwed mothers placed in maternity homes. Catholic Family Services, \$1,600. Catholic Family Services serve all races, creeds and colors. During the year, services provided have included family counseling, interviews, unmarried parent cases, adoption cases, foster children, institutional children and protective services for families given day care, plus other community services provided. Operating fund, \$500. This fund will provide the necessary expense for postage, office supplies and materials for the yearly campaign, the operation of the central office during the campaign and for an accurate tabulation of funds. No funds are being raised for community assistance this year, inasmuch as there presently is a balance on hand.

Two Whittemore men were treated at Tawas Hospital for injuries received in a three-car collision early Sunday morning on Whittemore Road at the Kitchen Road intersection. Investigating sheriff's department officers said that a car driven by Robert F. Nickell, 34, Turner, was preparing to stop for the intersection when a car driven by David Mills, 47, Whittemore, struck the Nickell car in the rear. A third car, driven by Ray S. Nickell, 23, Whittemore, then struck the Robert F. Nickell vehicle in the rear. Mills and Ray S. Nickell were taken by ambulance to Tawas Hospital for treatment.

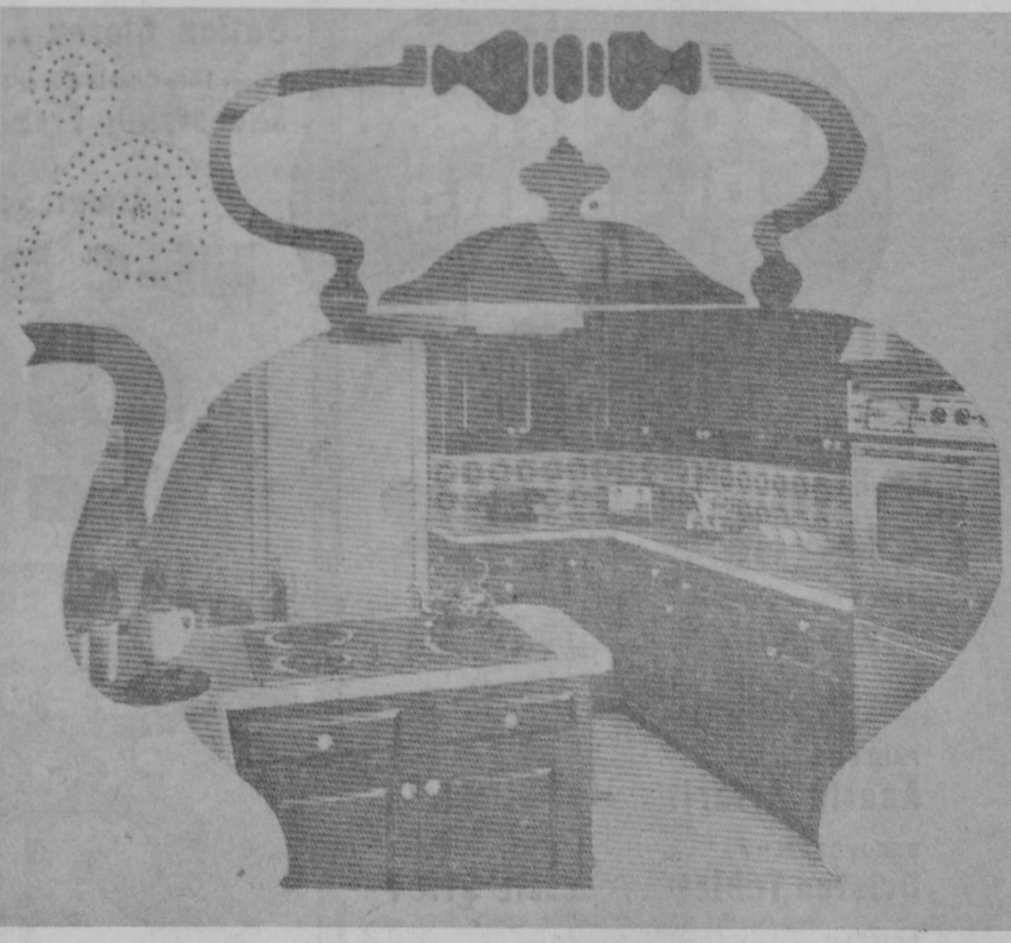

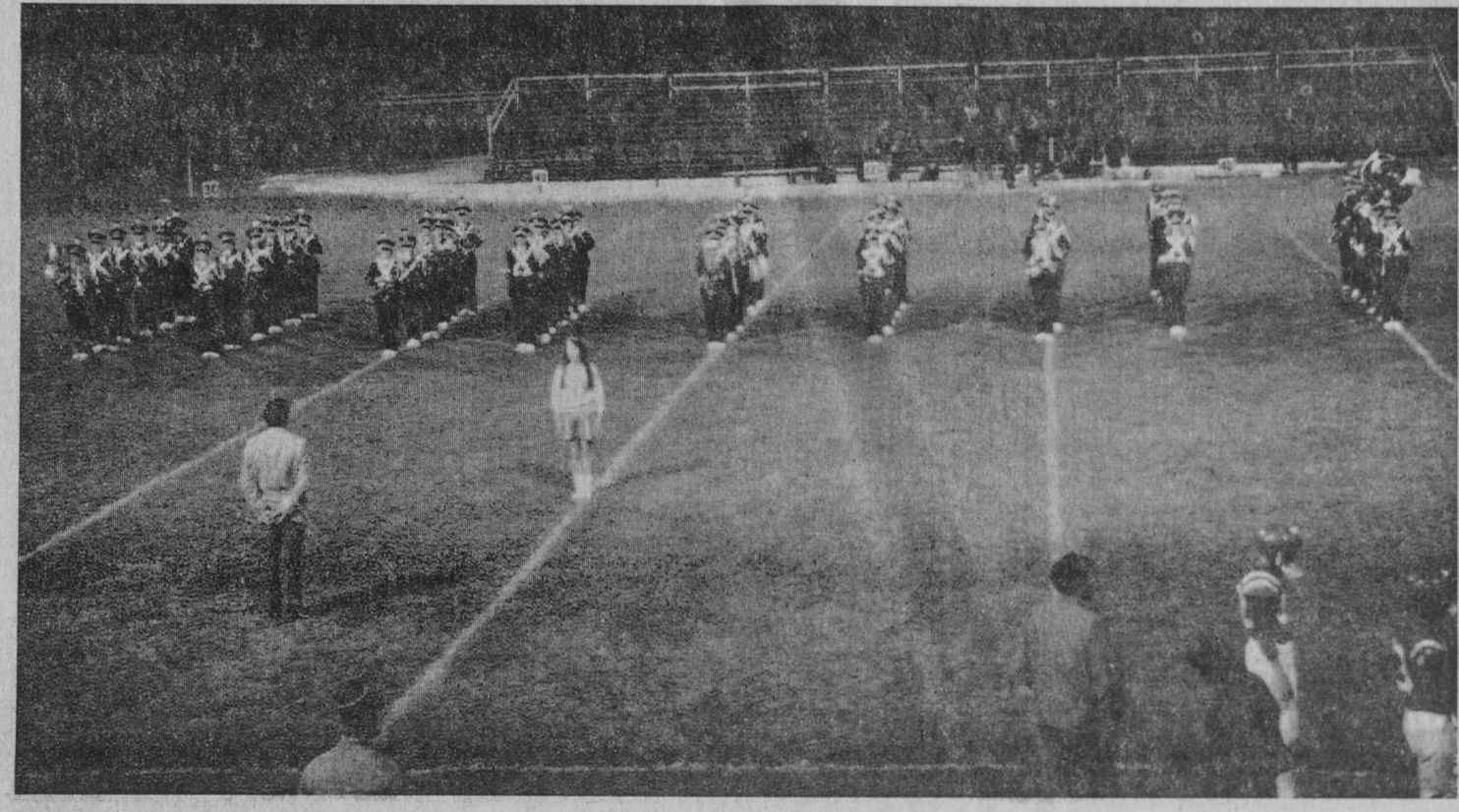
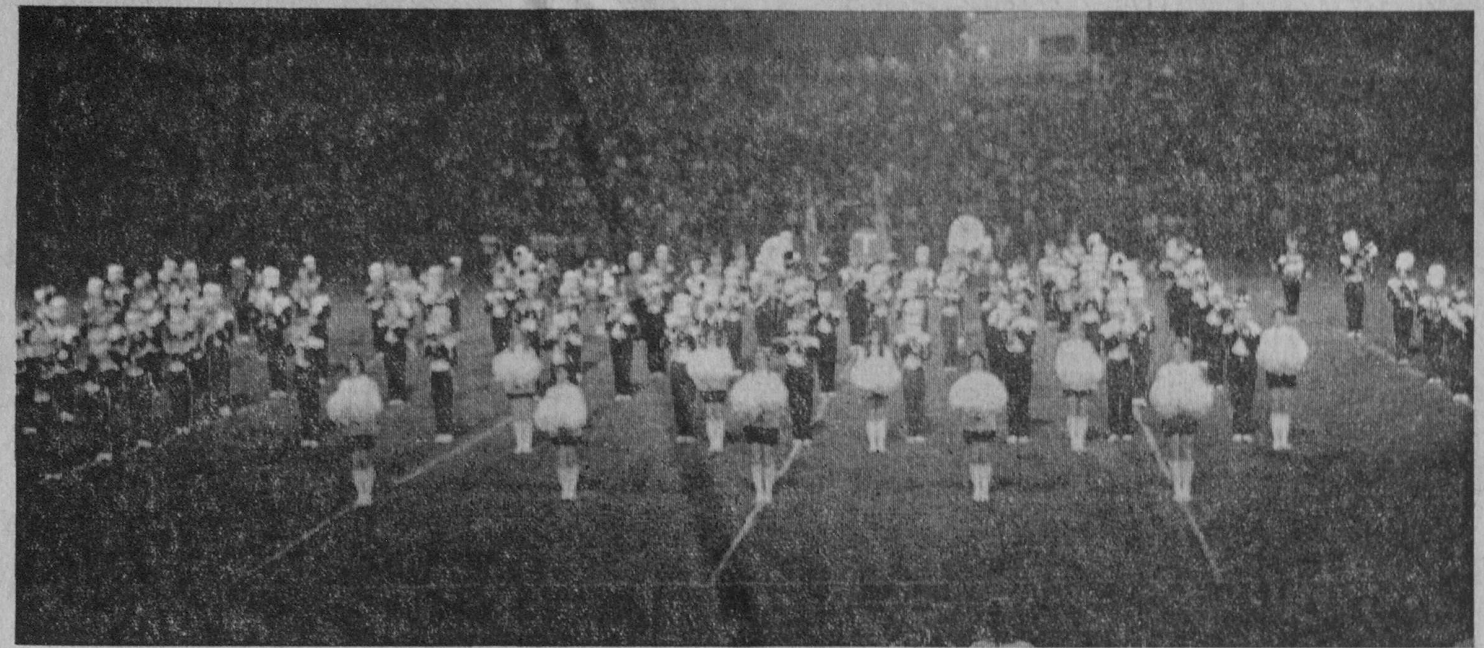

'Strep' Throat Season in Fall

The beginning of fall heralds the "strep" throat season, according to Dr. William F. Jackson of the District No. 2 Health Department. He reminded area residents that from now through next spring is the period when most so-called "strep" infections occur. He pointed out that they strike anyone regardless of age or living standard and can be far more dangerous than many people might suspect.

A "strep" infection, Doctor Jackson said, gets its name from a scientific term for the group of bacteria which produces the infection, streptococcus. He stated that only certain types of these bacteria are harmful and that sore throat is the most common indication of infection by them. Usually entering the body through the mouth, these microscopic organisms can grow rapidly, causing the familiar raw, sore feeling of "strep" throat. Fever generally accompanies it, said the doctor.

Mild-to-severe sore throat, however, is not the only possible result of this infection, Doctor Jackson emphasized. Streptococcal infections, especially in children, can affect other parts of the body. Scarlet fever, a serious disease in childhood, is such an infection. Rheumatic fever, in which there may be damage to the heart, and a mild-to-severe type of kidney disorder are two complications which can arise from "strep" infections.

Because the course of streptococcal infections cannot be predicted, it is usually best to see a doctor whenever sore throat appears. The physician may take a "swab" or culture of the throat, a painless procedure that is done in order to identify the infecting organism. For streptococcal infections, specific medicine which is effective against this group of bacteria can be prescribed. Through this early detection and eradication of "strep" bacteria, later damage to vital body organs may be prevented.

Doctor Jackson cautioned that "strep" infections are contagious, the bacteria being spread mainly by direct, close contact among people. Ideal conditions for epidemic spread of bacteria are therefore found in crowded, confined areas.

Doctor Jackson stressed that early detection and treatment by a physician of such infections offers

the best preventive measure. He also said, "Even though streptococcal infection may only produce minor sore throat pain, people should not overlook the fact that a major medical problem of serious consequence can spring from it." He then issued this plea. "During this 'strep' season, your health department urges you to seek qualified medical attention whenever members of your family, particularly children, complain of sore throats."

The new county stenographer would not be assigned to any particular office but would assist in any place where needed. Merschel said the stenographer could be used by the county commission, the board of public works, planning commission, committees and various other county agencies.

The board deemed that a second custodian was needed at the county building and that the sixth new employee should be hired for the county land fill operation.

Attorney General's Investigator Reports

'Eye Witness' Was on Couch at Time of Fatal Auto Accident

Statements by an "eye witness" to a December 11 traffic accident which claimed the life of an Oscoda girl, sensationalized July 19 by a Detroit News reporter, have been discounted by the state attorney general's office and a special investigator appointed by Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

After reviewing a report from the state attorney general's office and his own investigation, Carl Horn, Arenac County prosecuting attorney, appointed as a special investigator by Judge Miller, reported there was no basis for authorizing a warrant in the death of Janell Renee Golding.

Horn's statement to Judge Miller indicated he found no abusive discretion by the Iosco County prosecuting attorney.

An investigation conducted at the time of the accident by the Iosco Sheriff's Department found no evidence of negligence on the part of the driver, Daniel Myles, 18, Oscoda. However, a story in the July 19 issue of The Detroit News implied that Iosco County Pros. Atty. Kenneth J. Myles had used discretion in not authorizing a warrant charging his nephew with negligence.

In July, attorneys for the Golding family asked the attorney general's office to reopen the investigation, charging that an Oscoda man, claiming to have witnessed the accident, was not questioned by sheriff's deputies.

In a statement given in February to the Goldings' attorney, Gerald M. Gibbs, 32, who lives across the road from the school, was quoted by The

Detroit News as claiming to have witnessed the accident from his front room window.

Gibbs was quoted as claiming to have seen the Myles car pull from the high school driveway, accelerate in order to pass a line of cars in the opposite lane and then strike the girl as she walked on the shoulder.

Asst. Atty. Gen. Robert C. Goussy, in charge of the criminal division, reports that an investigator from his office was sent to Oscoda to review the sheriff's department investigation and interviewed key witnesses. Goussy said that the attorney general's investigator obtained a statement from a witness that Gibbs' wife had stated one week after the accident that Gibbs was "lying on the couch" when Mrs. Gibbs heard a loud thud and ran to

the window.

The assistant attorney general said that physical evidence and statements of witnesses indicated that Miss Golding was walking on the pavement of West River Road and not on the shoulder when she was hit by the car.

Another witness repeated his earlier statement that the girl was half-way between the centerline and the edge of the road when she was struck. Deputies found no tire tracks on the snow-covered road, he added. Photographs taken at the scene the following morning indicated that the girl was struck while walking on the pavement.

Goussy said statements of other motorists indicated the driver was passing only one car at a speed under the posted 55-mile-an-hour limit and was returning to his proper lane when he hit Miss Golding.

A member of the law firm retained by the girl's parents, who obtained the statement from Gibbs, said he took issue with the facts in the attorney general's ruling.

Prosecuting Attorney Myles said last week he felt the publicity given the case by The Detroit News "dragged me through the mud without foundation." Myles said he is considering filing a complaint with the State Bar Grievance Board charging the Goldings' attorneys with "impugning my integrity by statements to the press."

County Receives First Check in Emergency Employment

Iosco County has received an installment of \$3,482 representing the first month's payment on its federal appropriation of \$38,300 this year in emergency employment funds.

At a meeting October 5, Iosco Board of Commissioners authorized the hiring of three additional sheriff's department deputies, a county stenographer, a custodian for the county building and a man for the proposed new county-wide sanitary landfill.

Carlton Merschel, chairman of the county commission, said that the federal money allocated by the state represents 90 percent of the salaries for the added employees.

While the county commission is hopeful that the federal money will again be available next year, Merschel said that the six additional employees were needed and financing would have to be arranged in the event the federal program is not extended another year.

One of the three deputies to be hired would be a plain clothes investigator assigned directly to the prosecuting attorney's office. Iosco's crime rate has doubled during the past two years placing a heavy load on the prosecuting attorney's office. Merschel said the county commission hopes to relieve some of the pressure in the prosecution of felonies through this additional manpower.

Operation of the proposed new dump, utilizing the present facility established by East Tawas and Tawas City, is being studied by the county road commission. A report is expected from the road commission during this week's session of the board of commissioners.

Merschel said that while three township dumps in this county had not been closed as yet by the state health department, as was stated last week, the state is requiring compliance with laws regulating such facilities and other dumps had been closed throughout Michigan. He said, too, that the federal government was anxious to see sanitary land fills comply with state laws.

Merschel said that the county

commission had received excellent cooperation from the road commission, cities and several townships in establishing a pilot program for a county sanitary land fill.

"An engineering firm hired by the department of public works has furnished information concerning the amount of trash a county facility could expect to handle," said Merschel. "Hopefully, a collection system in the townships can be worked out by the road commission."

The commission chairman said that the county had been studying the problem of solid waste disposal for many months and is in hopes that the proposed facility could be the answer faced by local governmental units in meeting state regulations.

A source quoted in last week's story appearing in the Herald concerning the proposed county land fill incorrectly stated that Plainfield and Baldwin Township dumps had been closed by the state health department and that Grant Township's dump had another week to operate. No township dumps have been closed by the state health department in this county.

Raymond Jurczyk, district health sanitarian, said Friday that the Seven Mile Hill dump in Oscoda Township had been phased out earlier this year. The Long Lake dump and Grant Township dump are to be phased out by the end of November.

Jurczyk commented that Baldwin Township "had one of the better operated modified land fills" in Iosco County. A modified facility, operating under a previous law, means that the land fill trench is covered about 12 times a year.

The district sanitarian commented that there were 13 dumps presently in operation in the county and it was becoming a problem to find properly drained sites. He said that meeting new state requirements for compacting and daily coverage of land fills was becoming an expensive proposition and believed there would be some dump consolidations to save on expenses.

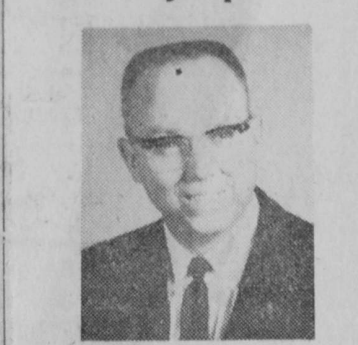

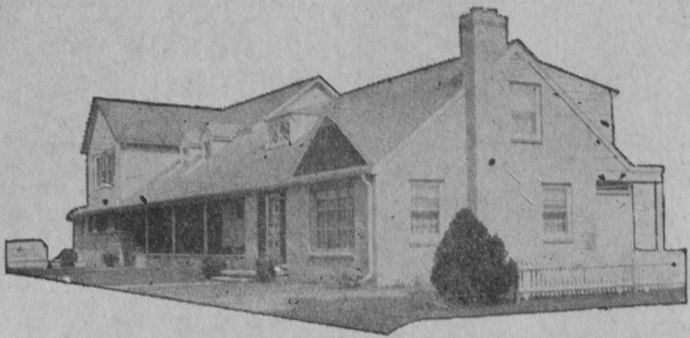

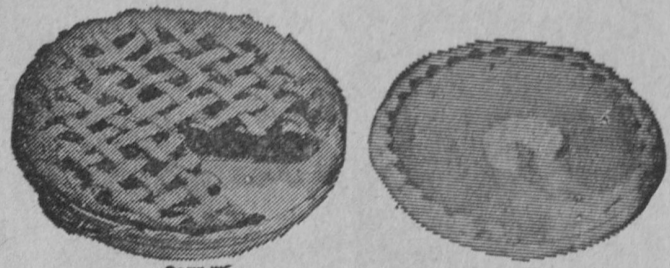

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Family Living Education

Four Walls, A Floor And A Roof
Maybe that is all a house is to you—four walls, a floor and a roof that does not leak. More likely, though, your home means a lot more. It is a place to live, work, sleep and have fun. The way it is put together influences how well you can carry out all these activities inside.

The obvious time to think about putting together a house is when you are about to build or buy a new house. That is when you should assess your family's needs and evaluate things like traffic patterns, activity areas, room relationships, storage and other details. Most of us try to consider these things, but it is hard to think of everything at once.

Another time for some thought about your house is when you decide to remodel. Analyzing the room and facilities you already have can help you decide whether to add on or to change existing space to use it better.

If all this analyzing and evaluating sounds rather complicated to you, do not despair. There is a new book written to guide you painless-

ly through the whole process. The "Family Housing Handbook" is published by the Midwest Plan Service, an agency involving 13 land grant universities and the United States Department of Agriculture.

This handbook does not give you all the answers, but it does remind you of all the questions to ask, so that you will not be saying "Why did we not think of that in time!" Contents include deciding where to live, evaluating floor plans and specific suggestions for planning every room in your house. There are also sections on storage, garages and carports, remodeling, site selection and exterior design. Some of the most valuable information for do-it-yourselfers may be the standard and minimum dimensions given for various parts of the house.

Copies of the handbook are available at a nominal charge at the Cooperative Extension Service Offices, located at the Arenac County Building, Standish; Federal Building, East Tawas, and 116 South Third Street, West Branch.

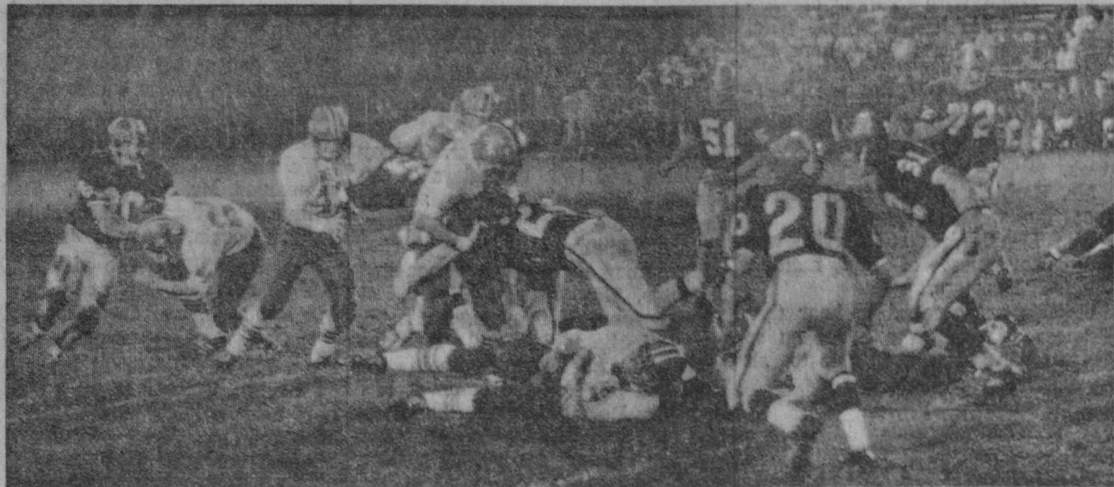

Unable to get an offense rolling, Tawas Area Braves had to settle for a 6-6 tie with the Pinconning Spartans in NBC action Friday night.

Tackle Rick Burris led the defensive unit with six unassisted tackles and eight assists, followed by Steve Nichols with four and six, while Anschuetz had four and three.

Penalties proved costly to Tawas during the game. On one series in the first half, the Braves seemed to be headed to a touchdown with the ball on the one-yard line. A five-yard in motion penalty at that point stopped the Tawas momentum.

Annual homecoming program will be held this week-end and Tawas is to meet Essexville Friday night. The visitors knocked the Oscoda Owls from the unbeaten ranks last Friday night, 12-6.
