Filing a letter of intent with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources for recreational bond matching money for proposed improvements to the city park was authorized Monday night by the city council.

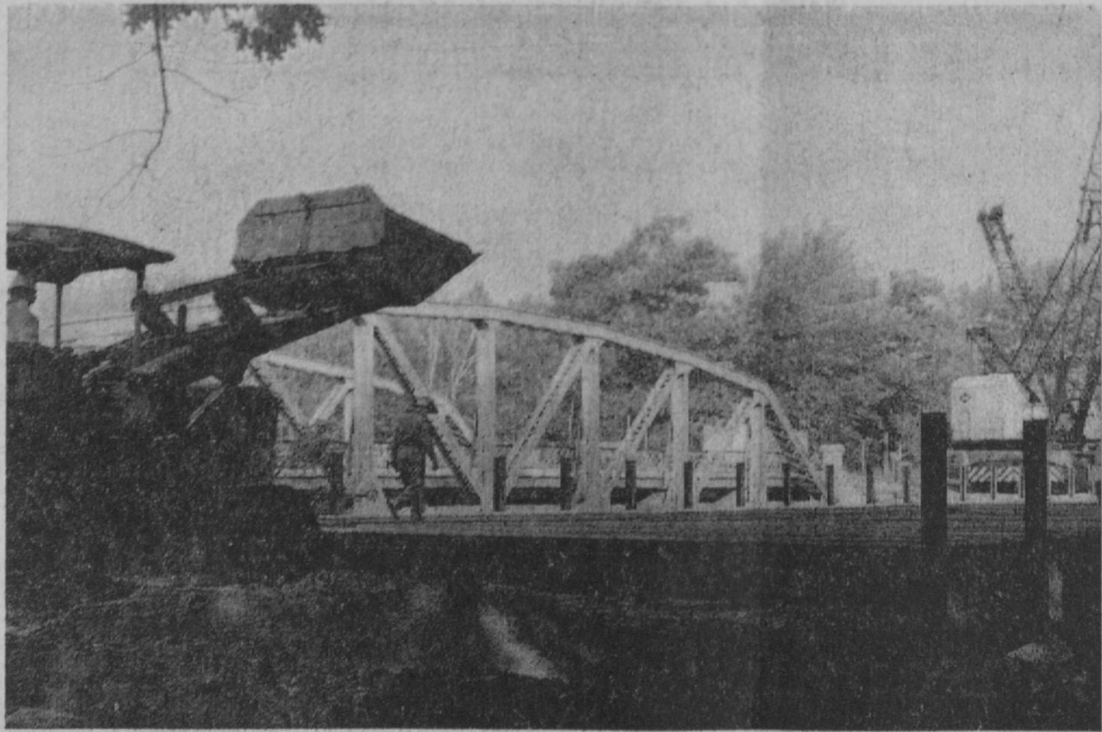

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Braves Lose, but Turn in Good 12-8 Defensive Battle With NBC Leaders

Bad breaks equalized some good breaks as the Tawas Area Braves lost to visiting Essexville Garber, 12-8, Friday night in the annual homecoming game.

Still looking for their first conference win, the Braves again played inspired defensive football but could not move the ball until it was too late to turn the tide.

Garber started the game off by scoring in the first quarter when Chip Hages ran 29 yards with eight minutes, 49 seconds left in the period. Tawas stopped the PAT attempt and Essexville Garber had a 6-0 lead.

Rick Learman made it 12-0 on a one-yard dive play with six minutes,

eight seconds remaining in the first half. What proved to be Garber's winning touchdown drive started late in the second quarter with the Dukes eating up six minutes on the clock before ending the 64-yard, 11-play drive.

The Braves came to life after this series and threatened to score before the half. A six-yard pass from Tom Kasischke to Steve Janego netted the Braves six yards and two runs by Steve Sventko put the ball on the visitors' 45-yard line.

Mark Schirmer punted to the Essexville five, but a roughing penalty against Essexville gave Tawas the ball on the 30-yard line. In four running plays, Schirmer put the ball

on the visitor's 12-yard line and Sventko, in two plays, reached the seven-yard line and a first down.

The clock ran out on the Braves in two plays to end the half.

Tawas Area School's instrumental music department staged an outstanding halftime program, with both the senior band and cadet band making an appearance. Decorated floats entered by the various high school classes added to the homecoming theme as James Lansky crowned his daughter, Linda, as 1971 homecoming queen.

Action on the gridiron was just as impressive as the halftime ceremony as Tawas made its best defensive stand to stop a third quarter Essex-

ville Garber drive.

Tawas had another good drive going after taking the opening kickoff from the Dukes. Kasischke picked up 11 yards for a first down on Tawas' 35 and a pass from the Tawas quarterback to Janego put Tawas in scoring territory on the 29. A clipping penalty two plays later moved the ball back to the Essexville 45 and the Braves lost their momentum.

The Dukes took Schirmer's punt and, in 13 plays, moved to the Tawas eight. Great defensive plays by Janego and Sventko gave Tawas the ball on Essexville's 12.

The Braves could not move out of their own territory and Schirmer punted to the Essexville 36. Tawas regained the ball when Essexville was forced to punt after Steve Anschuetz turned in a good play to break up a pass.

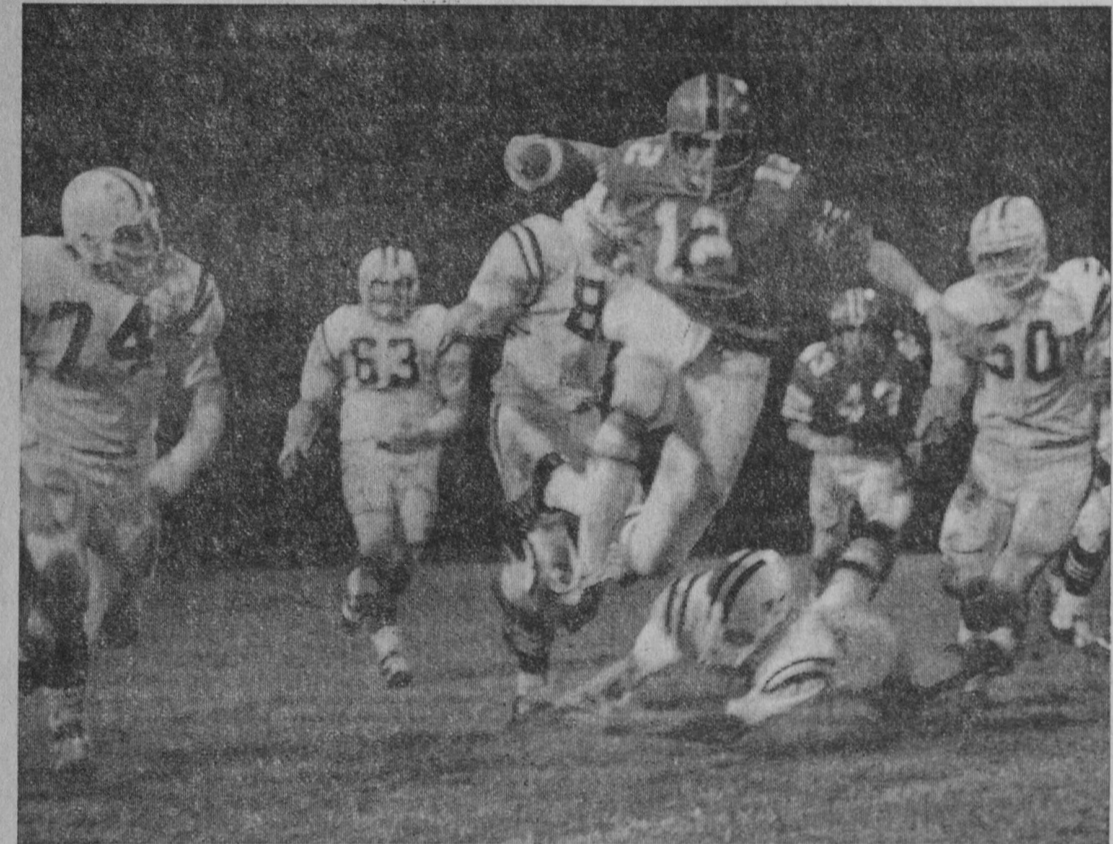
Tawas returned the punt to its own 32 to set the stage for its lone touchdown drive of the night. Runs by Schirmer, Sventko and Russell gave Tawas a first down on the visitors' 44. A 15-yard penalty against the Dukes moved the ball to the 26. Three plays later, Sventko raced 33 yards to a touchdown and a pass from Kasischke to Janego sliced Essexville's lead to 12-8.

A fired up Tawas defense, coupled with one 15-yard penalty against the Dukes, saw Essexville punting to Sventko on the 27. Again racing against the clock, Tawas moved the ball to the 50-yard line, but a clipping penalty called on a triple reverse slowed Tawas' drive. The Dukes diagnosed another Tawas triple reverse and the Braves lost 11 yards. A pass to Janego gave Tawas a first down on the 50-yard line with one minute, 35 seconds to go.

The Braves tried four more passes before giving up possession of the ball, but pass protection was wanting in this final series and Essexville defenders crashed through the line to hamper Kasischke.

The visitors had 14 first downs to nine for Tawas Area. Kasischke completed four out of 12 passes for 46 yards, while Essexville had 45 yards rushing and Tawas Area had 128. Neither team fumbled the ball and 50 yards in penalties were marched off against each squad.

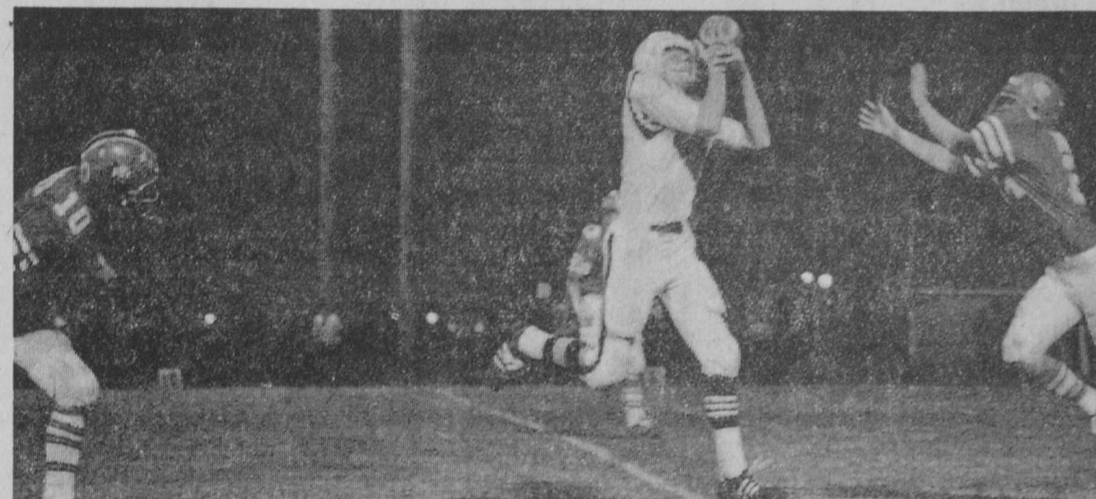

Hale Area Eagles had an easy time Friday night drubbing Atlanta, 30-6, for its fifth straight victory in North Star League competition.

The final touchdown came when Keyno Shellenbarger intercepted an Atlanta pass and raced 61 yards to a touchdown. This was Shellenbarger's third interception of the season on a pass interception. Stevenson ran the conversion to ring up the final score.

Pat Card was the big scoring threat for Arenac Eastern in its Friday night win. Card gained 127 yards in 17 carries and three touchdowns to pace the Eagles in their win over Hillman. Rod Seder ran 88 yards for the winners while Tony Blanchard picked up 33 yards.

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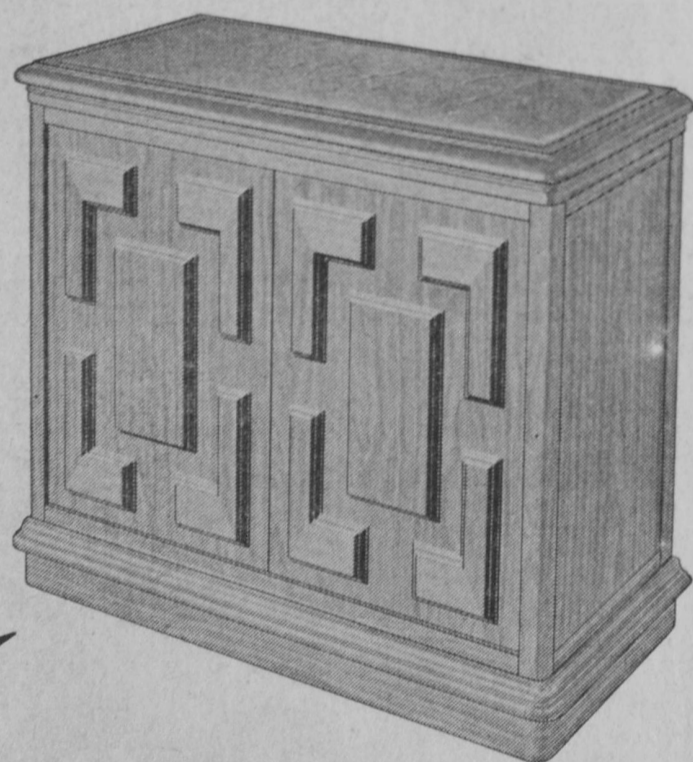
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Linda Young is Queen Candidate at Houghton
