

PREAMBLE

We, the people of the City of Tawas City, grateful to Almighty God for the blessings of freedom, and pursuant to authority granted by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Michigan, in order to secure the benefits of self-government, and to provide for the public peace and health and for safety of persons and property, do hereby ordain and establish this Charter for the City of Tawas City.

CHAPTER I NAME AND BOUNDARIES

NAME AND BOUNDARIES: Section 1.1 (a) The municipal corporation now existing and known as the City of Tawas City shall continue as a body corporate and shall include the territory constituting the City of Tawas City on the effective date of this Charter, together with all territories that may be annexed thereto and less any detachments therefrom that may be made in a manner prescribed by law.

(b) The Clerk shall maintain and keep available in his office for public inspection the official description and map of the current boundaries of the City.

CHAPTER 2 MUNICIPAL POWERS

GENERAL POWERS: Section 2.1 The City and its officers shall have the power to manage and control its finances, rights, interests, buildings, and property, to enter into contracts, to do any act to advance the interest, good government, and prosperity of the City and its inhabitants, to protect the public peace, health, safety, and general welfare, and to prevent and restrain crime and vice. In the exercise of such powers, the City may enact ortake such other action as may be required, not inconsistent with law The power of the City shall include but shall not be limited to the fol-

(a) To declare as a hazard or nuisance any act or condition upon public or private property, or both including, but not limited to the accumulation of rubbish and the growing of noxious weeds, which is, or may be dangerous to the health, safety, or welfare of the inhabitants of the City: to provide for the abatement thereof, and to provide that cost of such abatement shall be charged as a special assessment against the real property on which the hazard or nuisance is located. (b) To provide for the public

welfare by: (1) Regulating trades, occu-

pations, and amusements within the City, and prohibiting trades, occupations, and amusements which are detrimental to the safety, health or welfare of its

(2) Regulating the preparation, storage, transportation, and sale of foods, drugs, and beverages for human consumption;

(3) Collecting and disposing of garbage and rubbish and liquid waste disposal; (4) Licensing and regulating


