

City Election Slated Next Tuesday

Next Tuesday is election day in Tawas City. It marks the first time in history that a general election will be held under terms of the state's new "off year" election law.

A race for mayor and a decision by voters on revision of the city charter will feature the balloting. Death of two city officials, along with an upset for councilman nomination in the August primary and resignation of another councilman, will see nearly a whole new slate of city officers taking over on January 1.

A race between John N. Brugger and Gene S. Salamony for the office

of mayor will spice the regular general election ballot. Salamony was defeated for the Republican nomination in the primary election, 188-112, by the late John St. James. A third candidate in the primary, Mildred DeBeauvoir, received 102 votes.

Following St. James' death in September, the Tawas City Republican Committee named Brugger to replace the late mayor on the ballot.

Brugger is a former member of the council, served at one time on the park board and was a member of the city charter commission. Salamony, a member of Tawas Area School faculty, is a volunteer fire-

man. He is a sticker candidate for the office of mayor.

There are no other races listed on the ballot. Robert Rollin, nominated in the August primary over Cecil Cabbie, is Third Ward candidate for alderman. Chester Smyczynski won the nomination for Second Ward alderman in the primary and is to replace Jack Lardie, whose resignation is effective January 1. Clark Tanner, incumbent First Ward alderman, was successful in the primary election.

Aldermen with time remaining on their terms are Frank Ahonen, Second Ward, and Martin Wellna, First

Ward. James Lansky was appointed to fill out the unexpired term of the late Howard Hutton.

Donald Watson is Third Ward candidate for supervisor on the Republican ticket. Roy Bergeron is the Democratic candidate for Second Ward supervisor. No candidate is listed for First Ward supervisor since Ben Brewer retired from office.

A second ballot seeks voter approval of the proposed new home rule charter, which was developed by the city charter commission following a year of work.

Revision of the city charter and

adoption of a new charter has been under discussion here for a number of years. Tawas City is one of less than 10 Michigan communities still operating under the Fourth Class City Act.

Adoption of the new charter, which would streamline local government, has been endorsed by the city council and the Tawas City Businessmen's Association. Complete text of the proposed charter appeared in last week's issue of this newspaper.

Polls located at the Tawas City Hall are to be open on election day from 7:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m.

Community Chest Campaign Lagging

Continuance of the Tawas-Whitmore-Hale Area Community Chest is in jeopardy, according to a report this week.

As of Monday, deadline for closing the 1971 campaign, only 55 percent of the community chest's \$16,117 goal had been reached. As a consequence, the drive has been extended another 10 days.

Gordon Huck, co-chairman of the campaign, said Tuesday morning that it is getting more difficult each year to obtain volunteers to collect money for the campaign, due to the fact that drive dates must be extended each year in order to meet the goal.

"We have been disappointed with the response to the campaign, along

with the size of some individual contributions," said Huck. "This is a fair share program designed to collect enough funds at one time of the year to eliminate the need for eight or 10 different campaigns."

Huck said that money was probably "tight" for some families, but he noted several instances where these individuals were making large contributions than those who could afford to pay more.

"We need the cooperation of all citizens of the communities involved to make this campaign a success. It is an important program and anyone who has not been contacted for his fair share pledge may call the Tawas Chamber of Commerce office," said Huck.

Ask Clarification of State Law on 12-Month School

Clarification of state law concerning the possibility of operating school the year around to make maximum use of expensive facilities is being sought by Tawas Area Board of Education.

During discussion at Monday night's regular meeting, it was pointed out that there had been no legislation to allow operation of a 12-month school, although it was stated, too, that the only requirement is that school must be in session 136 days and students receive a minimum of 900 hours of instruction.

Carl Helmer, board trustee, felt it would be a wise move to check with the department of education and attempt to obtain a written commitment concerning such an operation. "There is no point in wasting our time on a study if a year around school is not permissible," he stated.

Enrollment of the school district is exactly as predicted by administrators last year—only there has been a further shift of students to junior high school and high school grades, with elementary enrollment down slightly.

This enrollment shift has compounded the problem of overcrowded conditions in the high school building, where there are 1,108 students in a building designed for a maximum of 925 students and the University of Michigan recommends 640 as the optimum number.

Plans for a new middle school to handle upper elementary grades and the junior high school were rejected last June by district voters and the board of education began study of the year around school concept as one means of relieving overcrowded

conditions in the high school building.

Several schools around the country are utilizing the year around operational concept, whereby the school year is divided into three different segments.

Members of the board of education are to visit the school at Freeland, which has received state planning money to study such a year around operation. A report on this visit is to be made at the November 8 meeting of the board of education.

It was stated that the middle school proposal rejected by voters could be resubmitted to the electorate in December or later. If approved, it could provide facilities by the middle of the 1972-73 year.

A meeting of community leaders would be held following the visitation at Freeland to begin a determination as to which way the community desires to go in regard to school facilities.

Halloween Parade Scheduled Friday

Students of the East Tawas Elementary Unit are to stage a Halloween costume parade on Newman Street shortly after 1:00 p. m., Friday, October 29. Arrangements are being made with the East Tawas Police Department to assist with supervision.

The parade is to start at the Federal Building and will end at the Standard Station at the corner of Bay Street and Newman Street.

New Village Inn Schedules Two-Week Grand Opening

Dates of an event awaited by Tawas residents for the past four months were announced Monday by Jerry and Beverly Brezina, owners of the new Village Inn, Tawas City.

A two week-end grand opening is to be held for the business on Friday and Saturday, October 29-30, and Friday and Saturday, November 5-6.

Featured attraction during the grand opening will be the Bohaty Sisters, a dance and vocalist team which has appeared on the Bob Hope show and for General Motors.

Mr. and Mrs. Brezina, formerly residents of Owosso, purchased the former Barnes Hotel from the estate of the late Mr. and Mrs. Anthony DeFilippi last summer. Since July 5, the building has undergone complete remodeling and redecoration.

Closed for nearly two years, the hotel's 30 rooms and 10-unit motel have been completely remodeled, along with the cocktail lounge, lobby, dining room and kitchen.

In addition to a complete remodeling, a unique decorating idea—stalactite plaster ceilings—features the lobby and the cocktail lounge, to be known as Raymond's Cavern Room. New furniture and decorations feature the dining room, to be known as the Colonial Room. A colonial theme has been carried out in the lobby with decorations, furniture, curving staircase and a Franklin stove corner.

Another addition is the Daisy Room—coffee shop, where breakfasts and short orders are to be served from 6:30 a. m. to 11:00 p. m. daily.

Brezina, owner of the Owosso Auto Auction for the past 23 years and a Tawas Point summer resident since 1960, said that plans next year call for construction of a swimming pool between the motel and hotel.

He said that the new Village Inn plans to feature the finest in music entertainment throughout the year, with dancing to "live music" over the three-day week-ends. During the coming deer season, there will be entertainment six nights a week.

Brezina said that the dining area is equipped to handle banquets up to 300 persons. The banquet season was kicked off Saturday night with more than 300 persons attending Tawas Hospital Auxiliary's annual dinner dance. The Village Inn was host Monday night to the annual fall fashion show of Iosco Quota Club.

Other new facilities are being planned by Mr. and Mrs. Brezina. A new businessman's "VIP room," capable of handling groups up to 12, is now in operation and the Village Inn will serve local service clubs of the area as well as the Tawas City Businessmen's Association in the luncheon meeting room.

Donald Leggett, who was associated for five years with the Owosso Country Club, is the new manager. Ruth Preston, formerly associated with Owosso Country Club, is head hostess. The new chef is Herbert Englehart of Saginaw, who had been associated with the Hotel Bancroft for 17 years, three years with Country Squire Inn of Midland, was associated with Holiday Inns, Chisley Fine Foods of Saginaw and operated his own catering business and restaurant at Saginaw for 15 years.

Mrs. Viola Stark, formerly associated with the Barnes Hotel for 17 years, will continue as cook. Brezina said that many other new features are planned for the Village Inn.

Seek Ways to Eliminate TA School Lunch Deficit

Reorganization of the school lunch program, coupled with a possible study the possibility of locating this program in the home economics room.

The school is to contact federal authorities to determine if there could be a price increase during the current price freeze. It was reported that costs are averaging 37 to 38 cents per lunch and the school is charging 30 cents per lunch. The board's committee has recommended a charge of 40 cents per lunch in the high school and 35 cents per lunch for elementary grades.


Another recommendation of the lunch committee was to have one person supervise and coordinate a lunch program menus for the three

schools, with the help of cooks, along with ordering supplies, conducting an inventory and maintaining records.

It was recommended that prepared mixes and instant foods be utilized to reduce labor costs, along with utilization of paper products in some cases to reduce dish washing. Participation of students in an exchange of ideas on food served is to be sought through formation of an advisory council.

The board's committee said it visited Alpena recently to study its program and it is believed that a number of methods used by that school system could be incorporated here, including the above proposals.

Deer Hunting Format for '71



Of Michigan's 98 permanent deer management areas, the 64 shown here will be open to antlerless deer hunting during the state's Nov. 15-30 firearm season on whitetails. Hunters are reminded that Sept. 30 is the deadline to postmark applications for permits to hunt antlerless deer in these areas where the collective take of these animals is expected to total about 19,000. Sportmen may pick up permit application forms at local license dealers when they buy their 1971 firearm deer licenses. Instructions for filling out those forms are carried in copies of Michigan's rules for deer and bear hunting, also available at license dealers.

State-wide, 89,500 antlerless deer hunting permits are offered for this season. Of those, about 32,920 will go for Upper Peninsula hunters whose expected take of antlerless deer is scaled at 6,120 animals. For the northern Lower Peninsula, where this fall's antlerless kill quota has been chopped nearly in half from 1970, some 37,340 permits are open to applications. The harvest quota for that region is 8,760 antlerless animals. Some 19,240 permits will be issued to hunters in southern Lower Michigan where this season's antlerless deer take is programmed at 4,140 animals.

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


Board Outlines Responsibility for Editing School Newspaper

Responsibility for editing the school newspaper is in the hands of the administration and journalism advisor, was the consensus Monday night of Tawas Area Board of Education members.

Two members of the school's journalism class appeared before the board with a petition from members asking for more freedom in publication of the school newspaper. Student members asked for clarification of the school's editorial policy.

The journalism class advisor and administration used their discretion in not allowing publication of several editorials recently in the school newspaper. The administration later ruled that it would be permissible to print two editorials signed by the authors, with opposing views expressed by other students.

Robert Elliott, board president, said that the board was "not about to have anything printed in the school newspaper without adult supervision and editing."

He said that the board of education was concerned about everything which takes place in school, although he did not feel it was the board's responsibility to tell the journalism class what it could print in the paper.

Elliott believed there was a communication gap between students, the class advisor and administration and suggested that a meeting be held to discuss differences.

In other business, the board directed that a letter be sent to legislators and the department of education protesting loss of money for educationally deprived children.

Based on a state testing program, students of this school scored at a rate too high to become eligible for Title III money. This was the same case in most outstate schools and the majority of the money is going to Detroit and other metropolitan area schools.

According to the test, 56 students in Tawas Area School are educationally deprived. It was the belief of the board of education that location should have no bearing on allocation of funds and that the 56 eligible children in Tawas Area School are just as deserving as those receiving funds in Detroit and other cities.

As a means of getting school students more involved with elections, now that 18-year-olds have the right to vote, all future class and other elections held at the school are to be conducted by regular election boards and results are to be checked by a canvassing board.

Reporting on a recent meeting with administrators and guidance counselors, the board's curriculum committee said that it was in no position to make a recommendation as yet concerning credit for participation in band and other extra-curricular activities.

Because of the great amount of time expended in preparation by band students, it was felt by board members that credit for graduation requirements should be al-

lowed. Granting of partial credit has also been discussed.

The board of education is to await further clarification from the department of education concerning granting of academic credits for extra-curricular activities.

A public hearing on the 1972-1973 school operational budget is to be held Monday, November 8.

The board of education accepted the resignation of Mrs. Marion Kramer, second grade teacher, because of ill health.



Third Member of Hardware Burglary Trio Captured

District court examination for Daniel Roy Welch, 25, Essexville, was to have been held Tuesday in connection with a burglary and shootout October 3 at Whittemore.

Welch was captured shortly before midnight, Monday, October 18, by Bay City Police and returned Tuesday morning to Iosco County. He was treated at Tawas Hospital for a gunshot wound to the calf of his right leg, believed to have been sustained in the shootout two weeks previous at Whittemore.

Sought by Iosco authorities since the burglary at Fuerst Hardware, information had been relayed to Bay City that Welch was driving a 1972 model leased car. He surrendered without resistance when stopped by police.

Welch is one of three men charged with burglarizing the hardware and other stores. The two other men, Anthony J. Grillo, 30, Saginaw, and Donald R. Killingbeck, 28, Bay City, pleaded guilty when arraigned in circuit court. Both are in jail awaiting sentences.

When surprised in the hardware, one man, alleged to have been

Welch, exchanged gunfire with store owner, William Fuerst, and deputies. Grillo was captured and Killingbeck turned himself in to state police two days later.

The sheriff's department said last week that Welch was treated at Tawas Hospital for a backshot pellet wound to the right leg after being returned to Iosco County.



Operation Natural Disaster

IOSCO COUNTY officials last Thursday held an exercise in civil defense at the East Tawas Community Building. Aim of the program was to provide an emergency operation simulation to show the concept of operating an entire county from one facility to insure maximum effective use of manpower, equipment and other resources to cope with a natural disaster. More than 50 persons from federal, state and local agencies participated. The exercise gave a realistic approach in the problem of coping with a tornado and two downed aircraft, utilizing telephones and radio to dispatch police, ambulances, fire equipment, road and utility crews to points where needed. County officials said that those participating learned a great deal about methods to be used in meeting such emergencies and believe the training session will provide valuable experience if the need ever arises. The program was conducted by the division of public service of Michigan Technological University.

With their star halfback, Don Brandt, scoring a 26-yard touchdown with only two minutes remaining in the game, Hale Area Eagles upended Arenac Eastern Friday night, 6-0, in a clash which should go a long way to decide the North Star League title.

Billed as the "game of the year" in Western Iosco and Eastern Arenac, fans were treated to some hard-hitting football between two state ranked teams in class D. The Hale Area Eagles were ranked third and fourth, respectively, by UP and AP polls, while the Arenac Eastern Eagles were ranked ninth and sixth by the same polls.

Going into the game, Hale Area had a record of five straight wins, but two of those were against non-

conference foes. Arenac Eastern, on the other hand, had a record of four wins and one tie in league competition and a loss by the Hale Area Eagles could have eliminated them from the running.

But that was not to be the case as the Hale Area defense, led by Chris Keene, turned in another magnificent performance to stop Arenac Eastern's hard-running trio of Pat Card, Tony Blanchard and Rod Seeder.

The Eastern Eagles were laying everything on the line in this showdown battle before a homecoming crowd, hopeful that Eastern could repeat its effort of last year by downing Hale in the final conference game.

Both teams had scoring opportunities in the first half, but a slippery ball and wet field took its toll in fumbles by both sides.

Eastern took the opening kickoff and had the ball for seven plays before punting. Hale Area moved right down field to the Eastern 23 in 10 plays and four first downs, but a holding penalty stopped the drive.

Led by Blanchard, Eastern again began to move but Hale Area recovered a fumble at the midfield stripe. The Eagles had the ball for one play and then fumbled to Arenac Eastern. From there, the Eastern Eagles rolled up four first downs and had the ball on Hale Area's 15-yard line when the clock ended action at the half.

A fired up Hale Area team came back after intermission to penetrate to Arenac Eastern's 20-yard line on the first series. The series featured a first down pass from Quarterback Jeff Koehler to End Keyno Shellenbarger. Koehler was trapped in the backfield, but scrambled long enough for Shellenbarger to find daylight in the Eastern defense. The drive was stopped, however, by a Hale Area fumble.

Taking advantage of this break, Eastern roared right back to the Hale Area 30-yard line in 18 plays as the third quarter ended. Hard hitting and a slippery ball saw another fumble and Hale Area took over on the 30, a break which was to be the turning point of the game.

Brandt went 20 yards on the first play, but the run was nullified by an offside penalty. Brandt picked up 15 yards in two carries and a 15-yard face mask penalty gave Hale Area the ball on Eastern's 45. Shellenbarger picked up 10 yards on a reverse and Koehler moved the ball to the 21 and a first down.

An offside penalty looked like another Hale Area drive would be stopped, but Brandt took the handoff and raced 26 yards to the only touchdown of the game. Arenac Eastern's stiff defense stopped the run for point after touchdown.

Arenac Eastern proved to fans that it was not a team of quitters as it started another drive and reached the midfield stripe before again being stopped by a fumble. With the clock running out, a Hale fumble again gave Eastern the ball and the Eagles tried four passes before losing the ball on downs. Hale Area had the ball for one play as the game ended.

Brandt was the big gun in the Hale offense, picking up 120 yards in 17 carries. Jim Stevenson had 38 yards in 10 carries and Shellenbarger picked up 24 yards in four trips.

"Arenac Eastern surprised us with their staying power," said Coach Dale Purkey of Hale Area.

"We have scored a lot of points this season, but our defense has really come through when we needed it."

The Eagles meet Mio this Friday night and parents are to be honored at the Hale Area School football field. The Eagles close the conference season in two weeks by traveling to Hillman. The Eagles need one win to wrap up the league title.


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Important SS Questions Are Answered

Question: I had doctors' bills while I was visiting a friend in another state last spring. I filed a claim with the medicare office in that state and they took out the \$50 deductible. I now have bills from my own doctor. How do I notify the medicare office in my home state so they will not take out another \$50 deductible?

Answer: You do not have to worry about paying the deductible twice. All medicare claims are coordinated through medicare's central office in Baltimore, Maryland.


Question: A woman who helps me with my cleaning every week all works in several other homes. She says that since one of her other employers is reporting her wages for social security, I do not need to report what I pay her. Is this true?

Answer: Not necessarily. If you pay her \$50 or more in a calendar quarter of the year, you are required by law to report her wages and to send in the social security contributions, no matter how many of her other employers may also be reporting her wages. Any social security benefits payable to her in the future will be based on a record of all her wages reported during her working years.

Question: I just started working and paying into social security. Can you tell me how long a person must work under social security to be eligible for benefits at retirement age?

Answer: Anyone starting his or her working career now will be fully insured for retirement benefits after 40 quarters (10 years) of work under social security. But do not forget that younger workers are also protected by social security disability and survivors insurance before they have worked that long.

October 30, 1936—A 20 percent increase in salaries to county officers granted last week had to be slashed in half by the board of supervisors in preparing a new budget. Appropriations to the Salvation Army, Starr Commonwealth and Michigan Children's Aid Society were also cut in half.

The outstanding indebtedness of the Michigan school system, although reduced approximately \$20,000,000 from 1930 to 1934, continued to top the national average. Bonds and other forms of obligations gave Michigan schools an aggregate debt of \$192,163,878, equivalent to \$227.42 per pupil as compared with a national average of only \$114.08 per pupil.

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time for ghosts and ghouls and things that go "bump" in the night. And what symbolizes Halloween better than a toothy, grinning jack-o'-lantern? Carved or uncarved, the pumpkin means Halloween, harvest and fun. It also means good eating for all of us.

When you buy a fresh pumpkin, look for one that is well-matured, not broken or cracked, free from soft spots and clean. It should have a rich orange color.

Although we think of fresh pumpkins as a fall vegetable, it is not hard to use them well through the winter. Stored in a cool, dry place (50-55 degrees), they may be kept for two to three months.

Now that you have your pumpkin, what do you do with it? Well, for starters, how about making pumpkin pie, bread, muffins, pudding or custard? And then there is pumpkin soup and mashed pumpkin. The kids may be more willing to try pumpkin if you explain that they are eating jack-o'-lantern.

One easy way to prepare fresh pumpkin is to treat it like any other winter squash. Quarter it, remove the seeds and stringy parts. Cut into smaller pieces and remove the rind. Cook, covered in a small amount of lightly salted boiling water, 25 to 30 minutes. Since pumpkins are a watery vegetable, use as little extra water as possible. To use in recipes that call for canned pumpkin, place mashed pumpkin in a strainer and let drain about one-half hour to remove excess liquid, or puree.

Here is a new pumpkin idea:

PUMPKIN CUSTARD

- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/4 teaspoon ginger
- 1 cup pureed pumpkin

1 cup heavy cream
2 tablespoons grated orange rind
1 tablespoon orange juice
Beat eggs together with sugar, salt, nutmeg and ginger. Stir in pumpkin, cream, orange rind and juice. Pour into six buttered custard cups. Set in a pan of hot water in a 325 degree oven. Bake for 40 minutes or until a knife inserted in center comes out clean. Remove cups from pan. Serve warm or cold with ginger-flavored whipped cream. Serves six.




