

The body of Walter F. Stevens, 33, Linden, who drowned Sunday, August 22, in Tawas Bay, was recovered Saturday afternoon by coast guardsmen from Tawas Point Coast Guard Station.

Occupants of a pleasure cruiser spotted Stevens' body floating in the water about 1,700 yards off Tawas Point and 200 yards west of the No. 2 buoy. The coast guard station was notified of the position and a patrol boat was dispatched to the scene.

Stevens, accompanied by two Flint men, William Phillips and Gregory Clink, had been fishing near the No. 2 buoy on August 22. The victim decided to go swimming, took off his trousers and dove into the water. The victim's two companions told investigating sheriff's department officers that Stevens was having trouble swimming and a life jacket was tossed to him. Phillips then dove into the water to help, but Stevens struggled in the water and went under the surface.

An immediate search of the area was begun by coast guard and sheriff's department patrol boats, but a severe storm hampered the opera-

The search was continued during the week, including use of skin divers, but the victim's body was not located until it surfaced.



### Georgina Bergeron Died in Arizona


