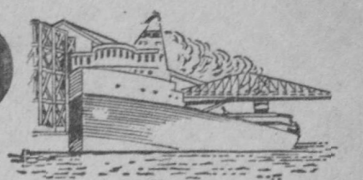

Legislature Tacks on Contingency Fund

Aid Bill May Prove Costly to Schools

Michigan's Legislature finally passed a school aid bill last Thursday after months of deliberation. News releases to the contrary, the new bill means little additional money to Tawas Area School District.

After analyzing the state aid formula Monday night, members of the board of education and administrators figured that this school district would receive \$1.18 more per child than it did last year—\$219.53 per child total as compared to \$218.35 last year.

In line with its commitment to voters prior to the successful August 19 millage election, the board's finance committee is to meet this week to determine the exact saving to be passed along to taxpayers through reduced local millage.

A preliminary analysis Monday night indicated that the saving to taxpayers would amount to about one twenty-third of one mill.

According to a news letter distributed Saturday by State Rep. George A. Prescott, some significant language was placed into the new school aid bill. In the event state revenue does not meet expectations, the budget director is directed to reduce or adjust allotments equal to 75 cents per pupil per \$1,000 state equalized valuation of each school district for the purpose of creating a general contingency account. This money would be used to meet deficiencies in estimated revenues of the state, including any prior year deficit.

Through establishment of such a state contingency fund, schools may not fare as well as would appear on a first reading of the new state aid bill.

According to the latest word from Lansing, state revenues are not expected to keep pace with expenditures of the state. School money held in the contingency fund under the new school aid bill could then be used to meet general state operating expenses.

In other business, the board directed that investigation continue into salary payments to teachers in line with the president's recent wage freeze.

After several reversals on the part of the Federal Cost of Living Council, the school district issued checks to teachers in an amount equal to one twenty-sixth of the total negotiated contract, with the idea that salaries could be corrected in a later payment when clear lines are established.

Board Pres. Robert Elliott was of the opinion that payments should be based on last year's contract and not under the contract negotiated this year and that further clarification should be received before checks are issued next week.

Enrollment figures at the start of the second week of school make it appear that the administration's estimate in April would be very close to the actual enrollment this fall. The school had anticipated 2,620 students last spring and actual enrollment is 2,629.

The above total includes 929 pupils in elementary grades and 1,100 in grades seven through 12. Supt. Reynold Mick said that the actual elementary total was slightly higher than anticipated, while the high school total was slightly below the number anticipated.

Latest information received from the state is that the October 1 enrollment will be used this year to determine state aid payments. In the past, the fourth Friday enrollment count was used for this purpose.

David Finley was high bidder on the purchase of the old school buses. He entered a bid of \$170 for bus No. 3 and \$190 for bus No. 11. Other bids received included Robert Rislove, \$161 for bus No. 11; Herbert Krumbach, \$216 for both buses; Donald Leitz, \$120 for each bus.

John Alexander, high school principal, announced that the high school faculty was short one member. David Dunbar, who had been hired as an industrial art teacher, decided he would not teach school this year.

Edward J. Welsh, elementary supervisor, reported that 118 children had qualified to receive free lunches under federal and state programs. This total compared to 123 children last year.

The board of education directed that milk in the school lunch program be sold to students at last year's prices—14 cents per week for white milk and 17 cents per week for chocolate milk—for the duration of the price freeze.

The board directed that steps be taken to borrow \$150,000 on anticipated state aid to pay school operational costs until receipt of local tax money.

Two AuGres Men Charged With Murdering H. Hatton

Following three weeks of intensive investigation, two AuGres men have been arrested and charged with the August 16 murder of Howard Hatton, 64, Tawas City barber and city councilman.

Arenac County Pros. Atty. Carl Horn issued the warrants last Wednesday and Charles Wood was arrested the same day. The second man, Frank Spencer, was arrested the following day in the Detroit area. Both are being held at St. Stanislaus.

Arresting officers and Horn have declined to discuss details of the case pending appearance of the two alleged assailants in court.

State police detectives had been working on the case since the night Hatton was found on Hammell Beach Road, Whitney Township, alongside his car. Hatton died Sunday, August 22, at Saginaw General Hospital of head injuries.

Officers were unable to question the injured man while he was undergoing emergency treatment at Tawas Hospital and he did not regain consciousness at Saginaw. At the time, police said that a blunt instrument had been used to inflict the injuries.

Hatton, who had been a barber here for 45 years, had served as Third Ward alderman on the city council since 1957 and was mayor pro tem at the time of his death.

Spencer demanded examination when he appeared Monday before Dist. Judge J. Richard Ernst at St. Stanislaus.

Preliminary examination was set for Monday, September 20, before Judge Ernst. Attorney Raymond King was appointed to represent Spencer.

Wood, who demanded examination when he appeared last week, is to go before Judge Ernst Wednesday (today).

Work Starts on TC Street Construction

Work started Monday on construction of about two miles of sealcoat roads in Tawas City. Yockey Brothers Construction Company, Alpena, is contractor.

Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works, said the project included new construction on some streets along with repairs to streets which were improperly sealed last summer.

Construction includes Whittemore Street, Ninth Avenue, Townline Road, Second Avenue, North Street, Birch Street, Murphy Street, Court Street, Meadowview Drive (cementary road), along with spots on Sunset and First Avenue.

Asking cooperation of residents during this construction period, Bublitz said that drivers should avoid streets which are covered with black tar during the first 24 hours of construction. "This might be an inconvenience for a few days, but it will avoid having one's car covered with sticky tar," said Bublitz.

The superintendent said that work is expected to be completed this week.

Roof Repair Under Study by TA Board

Omer Roofing Company has submitted a bid of \$900 to repair the roof at Tawas Area High School. At Monday night's regular meeting, the board of education directed that a bid be received, also, for repair of the roof at the Tawas City Elementary Unit.

Attending Monday night's meeting was Floyd Janowiak, the school's maintenance director, who said that the elementary unit's roof was badly in need of repair.

In a report of vandalism, Janowiak said that custodians had replaced 32 lavatories in the girl's restroom at the high school in the past several years. Lavatories broken off the restroom wall are not being replaced and only one remains.

School administrators said that such vandalism was difficult to control and to correct the situation would require a full time guard. The board of education directed that the present policy of not replacing lavatories be continued.

In other matters concerning maintenance of school property, John Alexander, high school principal, reported that the contract for cleaning ditches at the high school was nearly completed.

The board of education suggested that shop and art classes be contacted to furnish signs directing cars to the newly opened parking lot at the east end of the football field. Trees were removed from a portion of the property in order to expand parking facilities, thus removing the need for parking of cars along M-55 during school events.

Iosco Council on Aging to Study Housing

Development of a feasibility study on housing for senior citizens is the first project adopted for investigation by the Iosco County Council on Aging.

At a meeting of the board of directors held Monday night at Lixey's Restaurant, East Tawas, it was decided to hold the next meeting of the group on Monday, October 4, 1:30 p. m., at the Federal Building, East Tawas. The public is welcome to attend.

Cable Takes Over Reins as T. City Mayor

Cecil Cabbie, Third Ward alderman, who had been named September 7 to succeed Howard Hatton as Tawas City's mayor pro tem, became mayor last week following the death September 8 of Mayor John St. James. (Turn to page 1, section 2, for Mayor St. James' obituary.)

A veteran of 14 years on the council, Cabbie is to serve until January 1, 1972, when new officers selected at the November 2 general election take office. Cabbie had served two terms previously as mayor pro tem. He was defeated by Robert Rollin in the August 3 primary election for renomination on the Republican Ticket for Third Ward alderman.

James Lansky, Tawas City, fire chief, was appointed September 7 to fill Hatton's unexpired term as Third Ward alderman. Lansky is to serve in this capacity until the general election of 1973.

Three persons received minor injuries Saturday in a three-car collision on M-55 at German Street, Tawas City.

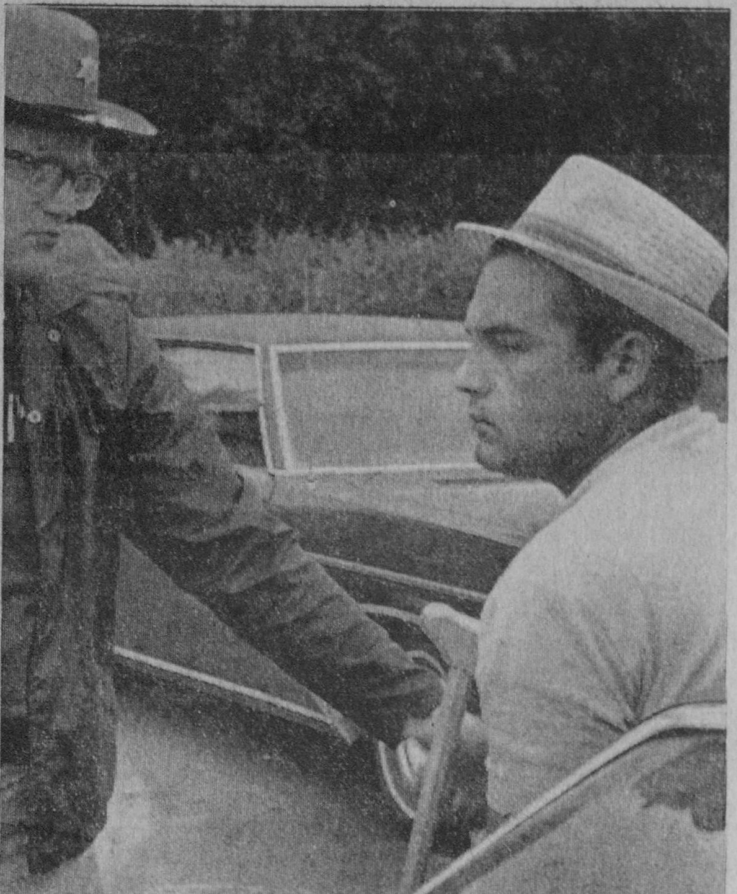

Woman Held Four Hours at Gunpoint

Daniel E. Switzer, 28, formerly of Prescott, is being held under \$5,000 bond at the Iosco County Jail following his arraignment Monday morning in Iosco District Court under charges of felonious assault and carrying a concealed weapon.

Switzer was arrested early Saturday morning after holding Mrs. Mavis Barber hostage at gunpoint at her Long Lake cabin for nearly four hours.

Two men were pistol whipped in the fracas by Switzer and were treated at Tawas Hospital for bruises to the head and shoulders.

Investigating officers said the fracas started after the four left a bar at Hale and went to Mrs. Barber's home. They got into an argument and Switzer, who lives in a trailer on the same lot as Mrs. Barber's home, went outside and returned with a .32 caliber revolver.

Switzer then pistol whipped Frank Holmes, 20, and Roy Jones, 25, both of Rose City Road. Holmes got away and took Mrs. Barber's two young daughters with him. He then called police.

Officers said Switzer held Jones in the house with Mrs. Barber for an hour before letting him go.

Nearly 20 police officers from sheriff's departments in Iosco and Ogemaw Counties, Rose City Police and state police from East Tawas surrounded the building.

Switzer held Mrs. Barber hostage in the living room for nearly three more hours and, according to officers, threatened to shoot anyone who tried to enter the house.

Officers said the man wanted to talk to someone and Trooper Gary Shepley and Sgt. George Briggs of the Michigan State Police Post at East Tawas talked to him through a window for nearly three hours. Finally, both were allowed inside the house.

Switzer, who was holding the pistol in Mrs. Barber's back, gave up without any trouble. Mrs. Barber was bruised, but not otherwise injured.

Federal Funds May be Used to Hire Lawmen

Indications are that Iosco County will utilize \$38,300 in federal Emergency Employment Administration funds to provide additional police protection on the western side of the county.

At a meeting called Monday by the county board of commissioners, Pros. Atty. Kenneth Myles said that the county's tremendously increased crime rate warranted use of this money to hire three additional sheriff's department officers.

The board of commissioners is also considering the possibility of hiring one additional custodian for the county building.

Represented at the meeting, held at the East Tawas City Hall, were all schools of the county, along with cities.

Five Held on Marijuana Count

Five persons have been charged with possession of marijuana following their arrest early Sunday morning on a sand trail between old US-23 and River Road, Oscoda Township.

While on routine patrol, state police officers from East Tawas observed a light in a wooded area and investigated. They discovered a van truck with five occupants.

Examination Set on Assault Charge

Bond was continued at \$5,000 Monday and a district court examination was set for September 22, 2:00 p. m., for Eugene Gallagher, 48, Ecorse, who is charged with felonious assault and carrying a concealed weapon.

Gallagher is being held at the Iosco County Jail following his arrest by state police. He was charged with possession of a .45 caliber automatic pistol at the time of his arrest in Plainfield Township.

Hale School Big Loser on State Aid Bill

Taking a look at the effect of the state aid bill on other schools around the county, Supt. Paul Keene of Hale Area School pointed out that creation of the state's contingency fund, which actually reduces state aid by 75 cents per child per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation, would mean a loss of \$16,600 to that school district.

Add this to this district's loss under the new state aid formula and Hale Area School will have an actual loss of \$26,000 in operating funds.

"The legislature is telling the public that schools are to get more money, but the actual fact is that Hale Area School is losing money. Schools will never see that 75 cents per child being placed in the state contingency fund, because the state is bound to have a deficit next March," said Keene.

He said that as an example, Oscoda Area School is to get \$9 extra per child under the new state aid formula, but the actual fact is that the state is taking away \$12 per child and this would be \$3 less per child than received last year.

"By waiting until now to adopt a state aid bill, after schools are in session and teachers are hired, I think the legislature has been negligent in its job," said Keene. "They have made financing of schools a political football. About 80 percent of our budget is for salaries and I really don't know where we can cut transportation, fixed charges or maintenance to make up for this new deficit."

Charles Eich has resigned as a member of the Tawas City Cemetery Board, of which he had been a member for the past seven years. The Tawas City Council is to name a successor to Eich at its next meeting.

Miss Smalley Stated as Club Speaker

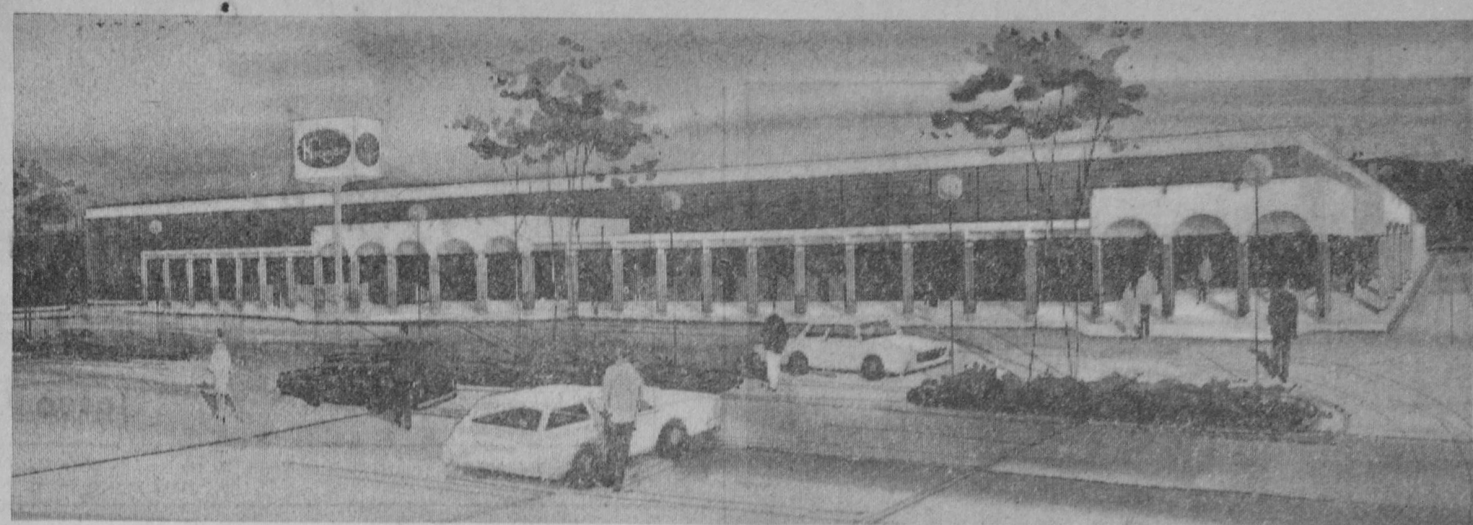

Prescott Led Fight On Changing Bond Rules

State Rep. George A. Prescott, Tawas City, has opened the door for smaller communities in Michigan to get started on water and sewage projects.

Prescott led the floor fight for passage of Senate Bill 960 which allows the sale of bonds to the federal government for acquiring, constructing, improving, enlarging, extending or repairing water supply systems at interest rates below the market rates.

"The bill allows that money paid to cities for water and sewer projects be paid in installments as the work is completed," said Prescott.

Prior to passage of this bill, Michigan law did not allow for multiple advances and did not allow a city to borrow in anticipation of a bonding issue.

"The result of this was that many projects desperately needed to improve our systems and abate pollu-

tion were delayed unnecessarily. Many projects in the 102nd District have been affected by the old law, including projects at Au Gres, Standish, Gladwin and Oscoda.

"With the passage of this bill these communities will be able to borrow money from the Farmers Home Administration, at a low interest rate, perhaps as low as five percent, and be able to receive the money for their projects in installments as the work is completed.

"I am pleased with the success of this measure and with the recognition by my colleagues in the legislature of the need to correct the present inequity."

All that is needed now is Governor Milliken's signature to become law and Prescott is hopeful that action will soon be forthcoming.

"This legislation strikes a blow at pollution and hastens environmental control, so desperately needed in our state," Prescott concluded.

In order to accomplish what you have suggested, you must realize that there must be a central point of control. You cannot possibly accomplish this unless you have complete cooperation from all areas of the county. My experience since I have been active in chamber affairs has proven that this is a very difficult task. Each area of the county—Hale, Oscoda, Whittemore, Sand Lake and Tawas—have their own idea of what they want to promote and when. We have constant conflict due to the fact that there is not, at the present time anyway, any coordinating body to offset this problem.

You, I am certain, know that there are many people who are willing to talk about what should be done, but few who are willing to do anything about it.

I note that in your article you do not advocate a county chamber of commerce, but frankly whatever name is given to a project that is controlled to advance the benefits of the citizens of Isco County is the only practical way to bring about this accomplishment.

Many citizens of our immediate area are not aware of the time, effort, etc., given unselfishly by directors of the chamber of commerce. Yes, they realize the importance of events to entertain people when they are in the area. This requires planning, not on the spur of the moment, but well in advance and it also requires MONEY.

Again we come back to the same factor. Who is going to give this time and money? We encounter this year after year. Many say you can depend on me to take care of this, but the truth of the matter is you have to find pinch hitters to take over and the results are not as planned, but only a smattering of what could have been done. We have witnessed successful events and, also, some very sad ones.

Let us expose the facts that exist at present. Many people expect the community to support their business, plans, events, etc., but on the other side of the coin, they do not support their community.

Until people of the areas, including those that are in business, organizations, local and county government, come to realize the need for total cooperation, this haphazard planning will continue.

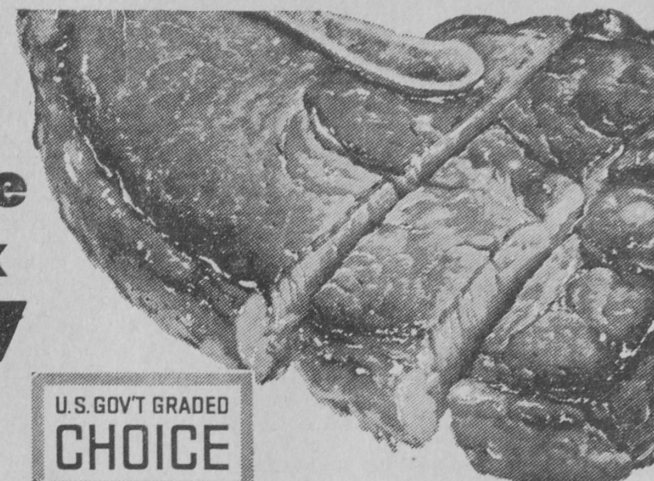

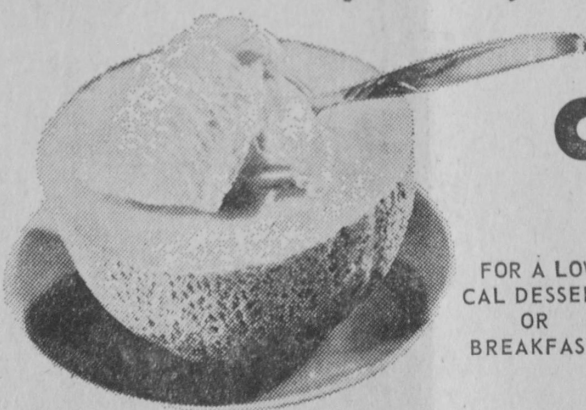

Brown Retires After Long Iosco Road Service

Allen Brown, 65, who has amassed over a million miles driving heavy equipment over Iosco's roads with only one minor accident, retired from the county road commission Thursday. His actual day of retirement is October 1, but his vacation started last week.

Brown, senior employee of the county road commission, completed 43 years of service, having started as a Model T Ford truck driver on March 1, 1928.

He recalled that he and Joseph Watts were the only employees under Jess Sloan, engineer, back in 1928. The county road system totaled 125 miles in those days but, from 1932 to 1937, the county assumed control of 109 miles of township roads each year.

"When I started, we had a couple

of old graders converted from Fordson tractors; then, in 1929, the county purchased its first big truck. A lot of work was done by hand in those days and teams of horses were used in grading," recalled Brown. "The road commission's budget in 1929 was only \$17,000."

Since then, Brown has operated many different pieces of equipment and, in later years, has operated the tank truck which services equipment with gasoline, has worked on sign and bridge maintenance and in blacktop patching.

Brown actually started in road work in 1924 when he was employed by Bert Fowler in building roads in Alabaster Township. He worked for the state highway department from 1926 to 1927 on old M-10, which later became US-23.

Winter months are always hectic for road workers and Brown recalls that the snow was so deep in 1929 that he had to live in the county garage for several days. The winter of 1935-36 was another bad one and crews worked around the clock for 23 days to keep the roads open.

"We really put in some bad times during blizzards," he commented.

After a vacation trip to Pocono Mountain, Pennsylvania, this fall, Brown and his wife will miss the Michigan blizzards for they are heading to Tucson, Arizona, to visit their two sons, Allen and Stanley, and their families.

A resident of Wilber Township for the past 24 years, Brown said he plans to do a little hunting and fishing during retirement.

Question: I am 74 years old and have just gotten a part-time job. I am receiving benefits but my employer still takes out social security tax. I am over 72, so should he not stop?

Answer: No. FICA (social security tax) must be withheld no matter how old you are. The only difference for people 72 or older is that they may earn as much as they want and still collect all their monthly social security checks.

Explain Payment of Medicare Bills

Question: I have sent in unpaid doctor bills to medicare and have been paid for them. But when I tried to file unpaid bills for my husband right after his death, they said I had to pay them first. Why?

Answer: Medicare can pay on unpaid bills to a person as long as he is alive. After his death, either the doctor must request payment for himself by accepting assignment or the bills must be paid. Payment would be made to whoever paid the bill. If the patient had paid the bill before his death, medicare will make reimbursement to the survivors or to the estate depending on the case. There is a special form needed when a claim is being sent in after a death. You should contact the nearest social security office for that.

Question: I have a part-time job and I am getting social security checks. I heard that I can make up to \$2,000 in take-home pay this year. My boss says I am wrong. What is the most I can earn without giving up some benefits?

Answer: The limit on earnings is still \$1,680 for the year. That is \$1,680 gross pay, not what you take home. If the yearly limit is raised

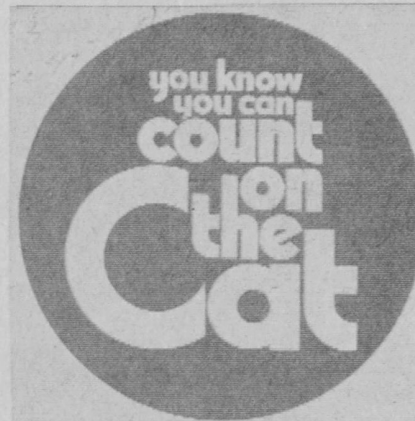

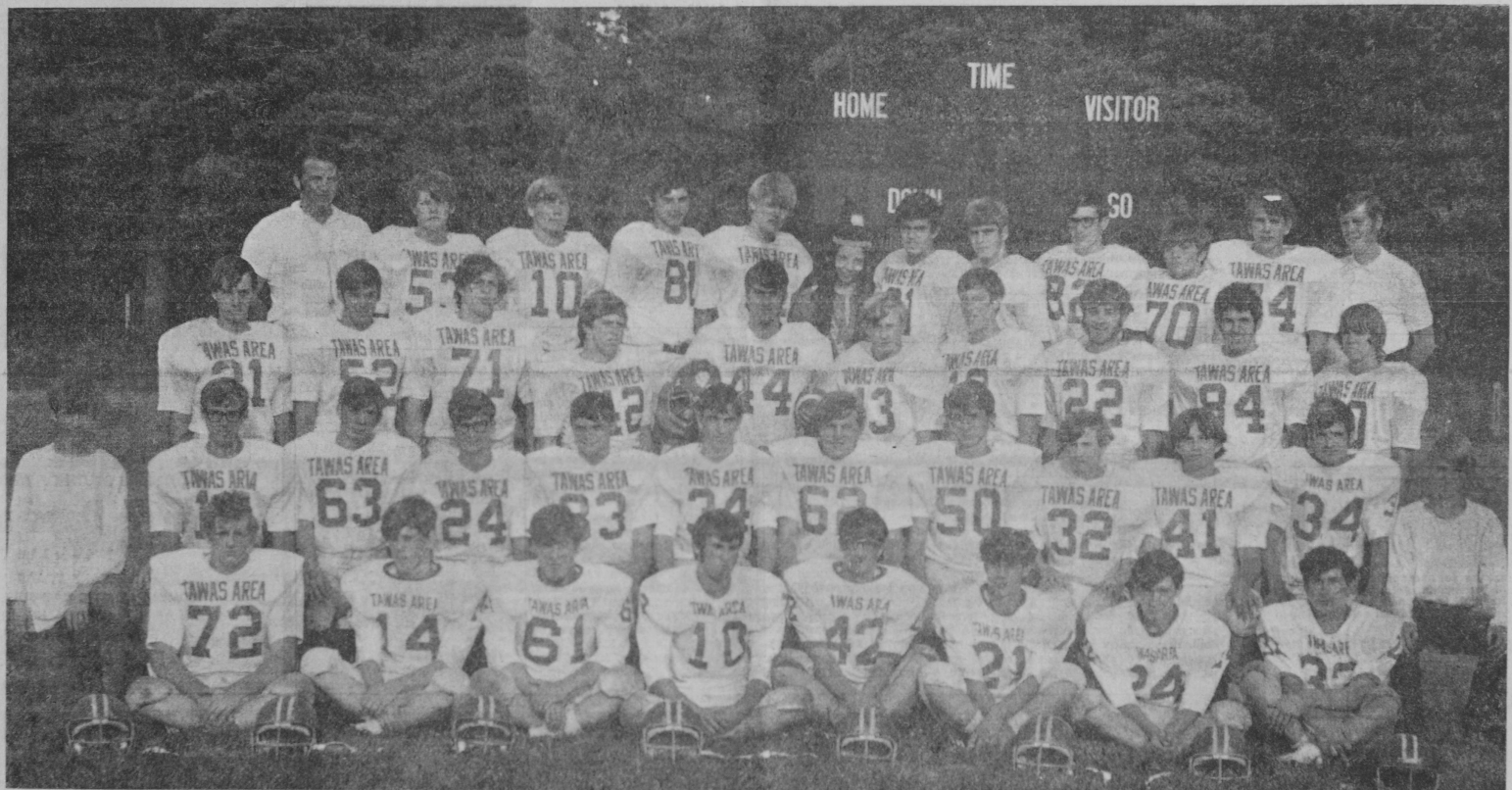

Many Services Offered by Iosco Intermediate School District

Iosco Intermediate School District, which started its school year last week, is financed through two sources, local property taxes and state aid. The district is allocated 20 one-hundredths of a mill to operate its general fund programs. In addition to this local property tax levy, the district collects state aid, giving the general fund about \$60,000 per year for its operation.

The special education fund is financed through local property taxes and state aid. The intermediate school district levies 75 one-hundredths of a mill in addition to the state aid. The special education fund collects about \$180,000 per year for its operation.

The intermediate school district is responsible for distribution of Federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act money. Since the inception of ESEA, Title II programs, it has ordered \$42,653.69 in library materials for the public and parochial schools in this district, according to Supt. Ernest Jordan.

All special education programs,

for which any local or intermediate school district anticipates financial assistance from the state, must be approved by the superintendent of public instruction.

Services provided by personnel of the intermediate staff are as follows:

Mrs. Margie Degenhardt, reading consultant, acts as a resource person for the various schools, helping to select and evaluate materials, including reading tests. She works with staff members in matters relating to reading. In addition, she assists teachers in exchange of successful reading practices, assists in the prevention of reading difficulties in primary grades by helping kindergarten teachers provide reading readiness. She assists in planning reading programs for underdeveloped, average and gifted readers.

The reading consultant confers with individual parents, upon request of the school district, to discuss individual problems or to interpret reading programs. She keeps the school staff up to date on new developments in reading as reflected in articles, research, experimentation and reports from professional meetings. She also serves as an inservice leader for schools and serves as a diagnostician of reading

problems, who directs diagnoses of individual students appearing to be severely retarded in reading.

Mrs. Betty Welsh is a professional social worker, whose skills are of particular value in working with schools in the prevention and remediation of social and emotional problems which prevent children from making the best use of their school experience.

The social worker possesses knowledge in the areas of human growth and development, behavior patterns, group dynamics, mental health concepts, as well as an understanding of the inter-relatedness of home-community experience and behavior. She works as a member of a school team, contributing skills to maximize the realization of the edu-

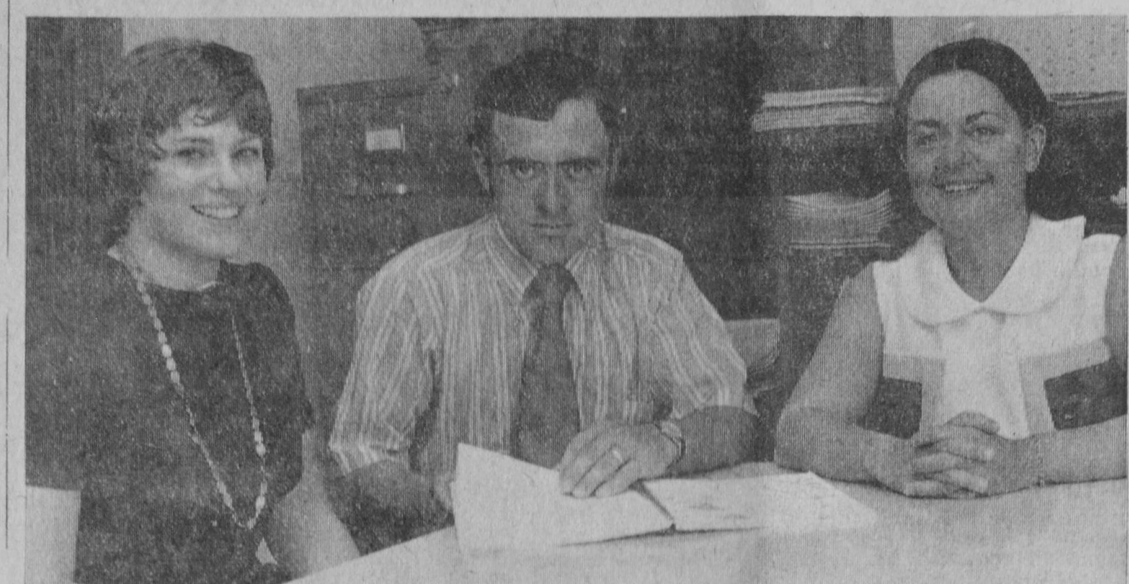
cators' goal of educating the whole child.

Three speech therapists, Patti Burk, Mrs. Mary Godlewski and Robert Kennedy, offer speech training and remediation to children with a speech disorder and delayed language development. Many programs offer consultative aid to speech improvement and language development programs in the regular classroom.

Robert Mattson, the diagnostician, in cooperation with appropriate school personnel, organizes, develops and administers diagnostic services for the mentally handicapped in the schools. The diagnostician is responsible for providing a psychological testing program including evaluation of intelligence, achievement, personality and aptitude on a basis for certification of children for placement in programs for the mentally handicapped. The diagnostician also serves as a consultant to other special education personnel, to school administrators, teachers and parents in matters relating to children who are mentally handicapped.

The type B program for trainable mentally-handicapped children operated by the district requires a special curriculum designed to further the adjustment of the child to his home and neighborhood. Teachers are Mrs. Christine Madison and Miss Diana Gelesko, with Mrs. Ellen Smith and Mrs. Dollie Reynolds, aides.

The program for such a child is not expected to habilitate these children nor to make them independent members of society. It is designed so that the child may learn to better care for his personal needs at home, to get along with others in the home, the school and the neighborhood; to respect property rights, and in general, to manage his own affairs in a social group, in a restricted environment and to learn to do things, not only for himself, but for others.

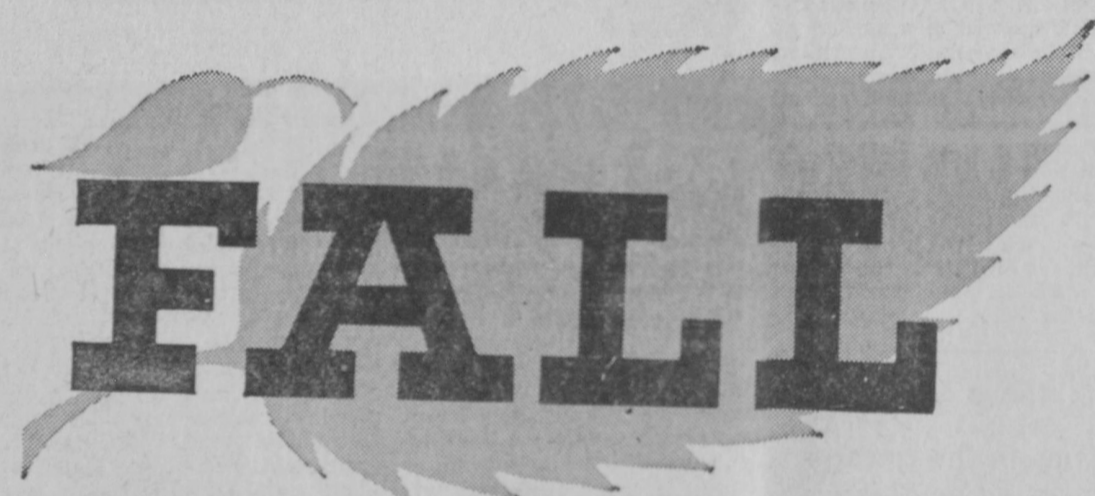

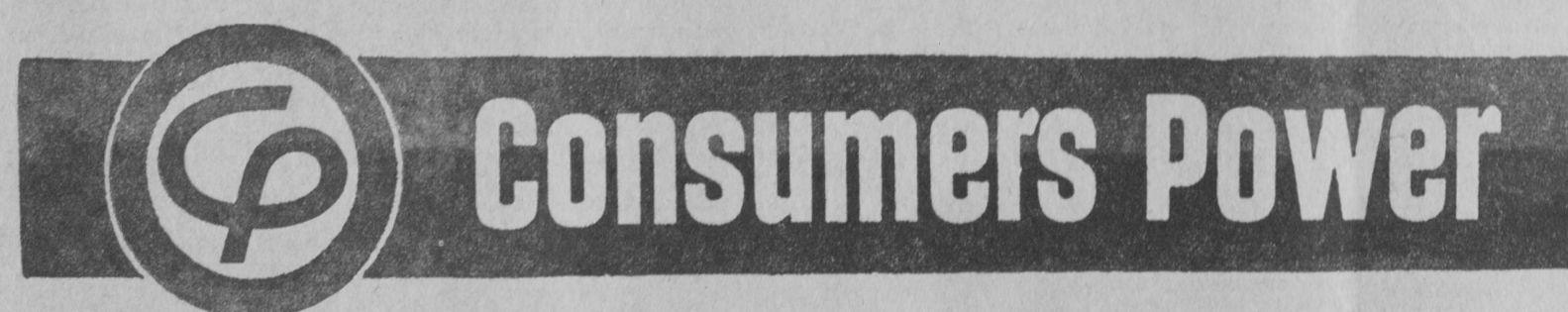

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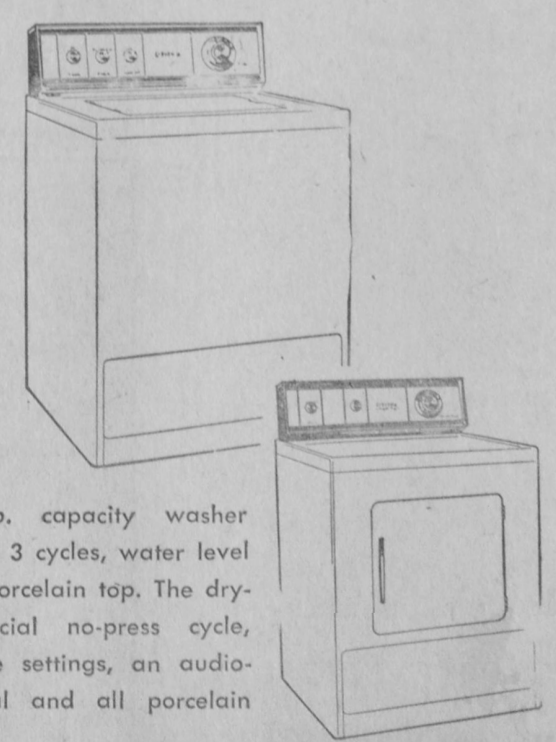

15 Years Ago—
September 13, 1956—Twenty-six lots in the new Werth Addition to East Tawas will go on the block, announces the East Tawas Council. Family Living Education

As some of you already know, our extension office now has a very delightful guest. She is Miss Alganesh Tedla, who comes to us on a professional exchange program from Ethiopia's Agricultural Extension Service.

In her country, Alganesh is a "double agent." She works both as a home agent and as a 4-T agent. Of course, 4-T is the Ethiopian equivalent of our 4-H.

Part of "Algi's" job is to work with farm women. She, too, uses the newspaper to tell her readers about new ideas. I asked her to write a typical column for you:

Today, I present you homemade Vim and Clarax. I know that every woman likes to keep her household utensils clean and this is the easiest and the cheapest method to keep equipment clean and nice-looking.

The things which I am going to make now will cost you nothing; you can find the ingredients at home easily. I use the same kind of ingredients and methods to make Vim and Clarax. The Vim is the powder part which we can use to clean and wash the stained utensils like kettles, saucepans and spoons. Clarax is the liquid part used to wash stained clothes.

Ingredients: Coal ashes, water, pieces of soap, egg shells and lemon skin.
Method: Put two cups of water, ¾ or ½ cup of coal ashes, pieces of soap, one egg shell, broken into pieces, and piece of one lemon skin. Cook all these ingredients 15-20 minutes until the water changes to yellowish and make it settle for five minutes. Then strain the liquid from the solid part; make the powder dry.

Put the Clarax and the powder in a covered container and keep them in a cool place and use them whenever you want.

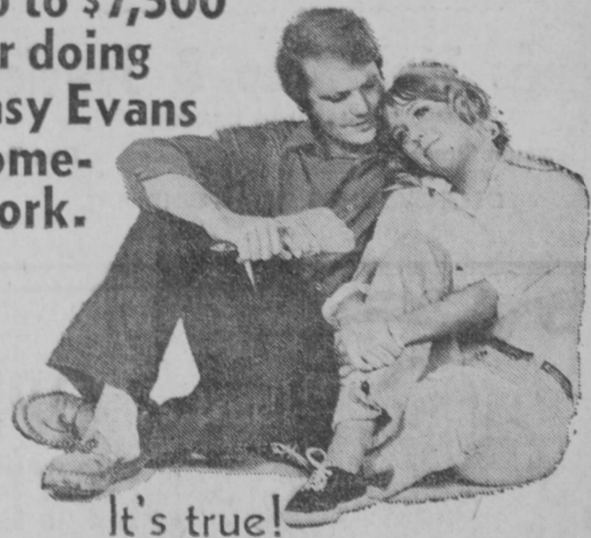

Auto Negligence Suits Are Filed A Lincoln Park man, acting on behalf of himself and his daughter, a minor, has instituted a \$475,000 auto negligence suit in Iosco County Circuit Court. Edward Smith, administrator of the estate of his wife, Patsy E., and son, Ronald E., both deceased, has commenced suit seeking the above damages against Frank J. Norlock of National City. The suit arises out of a two-car collision September 12, 1970, at the intersection of M-55 and M-65 in Reno Township in which three people were killed. The plaintiff's petition claims that Marjorie M. Norlock, wife of the defendant and fatally injured in the crash, was negligent in running through a traffic signal at the intersection. The Norlock vehicle was headed west on M-55 and the Smith vehicle was headed north on M-65. Besides fatal injuries to his wife and 16-year-old son, Smith was injured in the crash as was his daughter, Sandra. Smith seeks \$150,000 each for the estates of his wife and son, \$150,000 as an individual plaintiff and \$25,000 for his daughter.
