

Revenue Sharing Benefits Tawas City

The City of Tawas City is to receive an additional \$4,000 during the coming fiscal year from the city and village revenue sharing act approved two weeks ago by the Michigan Legislature.

According to Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works, this city is to receive an additional \$2.40 per capita through a complicated formula based on the local tax effort.

Local governments float an average of 15.179 mills and Tawas City has a levy of 13 1/2 mills. Any unit

levying over five mills will get a bonus payment.

The effort factor included in the bill is a start toward assisting local governments which are doing the most to assist themselves. The formula is expected to change slightly when all issues are evaluated by the state treasurer.

Bublitz said that additional money received under this new legislation would help to offset state revenues which were lost by Tawas City following the 1970 census.

In other business, Jack Lardie was appointed to fill a vacancy on the Tawas City Cemetery Board. He is to succeed Charles Eich, who submitted his resignation at the last meeting. The term is to expire in 1975.

Operation of the city's boat ramp on Ninth Avenue with an attendant is to start Saturday morning. Councilmen noted that a number of fishermen used the facility last week-end and supervision of parking and launching to assure a smooth operation would be needed this week-end.

Legal advice on naming a successor to fill out the three-month balance of the term of Cecil Cabbie as Third Ward alderman is to be sought by the council. Cabbie, who was appointed September 7 as mayor pro tem to fill the vacancy of the late Howard Hatton, became mayor upon the death of John St. James.

According to the city superintendent, there is a time factor involved in filling the council vacancy.

Council Endorses New City Charter

Following review of Tawas City's proposed new home rule charter, the city council Monday night went on record as endorsing the year-long work of the city charter commission and urged adoption of this new form of government by voters at the November 2 general election.

Attending the council's regular meeting were members of the charter commission and Jerry Cotter, chairman, who answered a number of questions concerning the 28-page document.

It was pointed out by charter commission members that 90 percent of the new home rule charter was based on existing state law. The three basic changes being proposed would be elimination of the ward system and election of city officers on a nonpartisan basis, that the new government would be "strong" council rather than "strong" mayor and that administration of the city would be handled by a city manager.

Cotter said that placing governmental strength in the hands of a council rather than a mayor would provide means for a good working council, guided by a city manager, to promote better government.

The new charter would place the responsibility for city government where it can be spelled out, thus relieving elected officials of added administrative duties. However, it was pointed out that the manager could not do anything without the consent and approval of the council.

Work of the city manager would not be a great departure from today's superintendent of public works, although responsibilities and duties are contained in the new charter for the benefit of the council and city manager.

Features of the charter discussed Monday night included elimination of standing council committees. It was the belief of the commission that all councilmen should be aware

of city affairs and that discussion on important matters should be held at regular meetings rather than at committee meetings. Special committees may be appointed for specific purposes.

Another feature discussed was the clause which provides that no person who holds or has held the office of mayor or councilman is eligible to hold any appointive office in the city until one year has elapsed following expiration of the term of office for which he was elected. This provision would not apply to such appointments as the board of review, plan-

AuGres Men Bound Over in Hatton Murder

Two AuGres men waived examination Monday in Arenac County District Court, Standish, and were bound over to circuit court in the August 16 murder of Howard Hatton, Tawas City barber and city councilman.

Held on \$25,000 bond at the Arenac County Jail, Standish, are Charles Wood and Frank Spencer.

The two men were arrested September 8 and 9 following three weeks of intensive investigation by Michigan State Police and Arenac County Sheriff's Department.

Detectives had been working on the case since the night Hatton was found on Hammell Beach Road, Whitney Township, alongside his car. He had been severely beaten and died Sunday, August 22, at Saginaw General Hospital of head injuries.

Cities Disappointed With Method of Fund Distribution

Disappointment over being "left out of the picture" in sharing federal emergency employment funds granted to Iosco County was expressed Monday night at city council meetings of Tawas City and East Tawas.

Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works in Tawas City, reported to the city council that he had attended a meeting at Bay City called by the governor concerning allocation of emergency employment funds.

Michigan received \$44,000,000 and Iosco County received \$38,300 as its share of the fund. The amount received was based on the unemployment ratio of the county and its total population.

Bublitz said that the county's share was relatively meager with the county, schools, cities and townships all seeking a share of the fund.

He said that Michigan was only one of two states which gives jurisdiction for allocating the money to county government.

He said that as a result, the county board of commissioners had established a priority system for allocating the money and it appears as though the fund would finance hiring of three additional deputies for the sheriff's department, a custodian for the county building and clerical help for the prosecuting attorney's office. Also mentioned was hiring a man for the proposed county sanitary landfill facility.

Paul Ropert, superintendent of public works at East Tawas, told members of the East Tawas Council that he was very disappointed over the allocation of the money as he believed cities were not being given any consideration.

Various units of government eligible to receive funds attended a meeting September 13 at the East Tawas City Hall to make individual presentations on needs.

In addition, the district health department appeared before last week's meeting of the county board of commissioners and asked consideration in order to hire two additional employees for the county health department office.

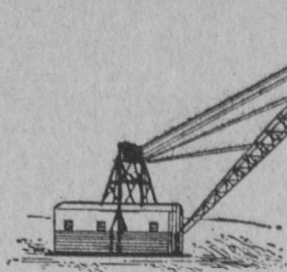

A FAULTY ELECTRICAL CIRCUIT was blamed for Thursday night's fire which caused extensive damage to the sawdust drying building of Tawas Industries, Incorporated, Tawas City. Work on repairing the building was commenced the next day and the drying operation is expected to resume production by Wednesday (today). Sawdust is used by the firm in the manufacture of auto-



motive oil filters and enough stock was on hand to keep the assembly line running until about the middle of this week. All electrical wiring and several motors were destroyed in the blaze. The fire was discovered about 7:00 p. m. and Tawas City Volunteer Fire Department, assisted by the East Tawas Volunteer Fire Department, had the blaze under control in about 30 minutes. The south wall of the building and roof were damaged extensively and are being replaced. Firemen were at the scene for nearly three hours while a large bin of burning sawdust was removed. The building, which is separated from the main assembly line building and warehouse, was constructed about three years ago following a fire which destroyed an old frame structure used for a drying room.—Tawas Herald Photos.

District Health Dept. Requests Money for Added Employees

Expansion of district health department personnel in each of the four counties involved, which would require additional funding, met with a cold reception Wednesday when presented to the Iosco Board of Commissioners.

James Klaus, executive director for the district health department, told commissioners that it was planned to hire seven new department members. Included would be an assistant sanitarian and health nurse for Iosco County.

It was stated that Ogemaw County is giving consideration to financing additional staff members for the district health department through funds received under the federal emergency employment act.

Iosco Commissioners pointed out, however, that Iosco County is receiving less money from this source than Ogemaw County and the Iosco Board of Commissioners is presently determining priorities for such employment.

At present, it appears that highest

priority will be given to hiring an operator for a proposed new solid waste disposal facility for this county, as well as adding personnel to the sheriff's department and the addition of one county building custodian.

No decision has been made by commissioners as to allocation of these federal funds and the district health department program is to be considered before a final decision is reached.

In other business during the board's September session, George Landis, engineer, presented plans for an expansion to Old Orchard Park. Included were drawings for a 100-site project costing \$142,900, which includes all utilities.

Robert Foster, Oscoda commissioner and a member of the county park board, reported that bids received for completing work on the AuSable Park project had exceeded original estimates. Foster said the park board has \$144,000 in federal funds to complete the project and

the low bid received was \$175,000.

As a result of a study by the board, several deletions were made in the original plans and a contract was awarded to Elzinga and Voelker Construction Company for \$139,890 to complete work on a boat launching ramp, a retaining wall along the AuSable River and a parking lot.

On recommendation of William Wercely, commissioner of Hale, Richard Pfahl of Hale has been named to succeed the late John St. James on the Iosco Social Services Board. Pfahl is to finish out the balance of the term, which expires October 31, 1972.

Willard Musolf of Oscoda appeared before the board and asked support from the county in opposing the sale of state land in Oscoda Township to private interests. William Colbath, also of Oscoda, and Musolf presented petitions opposing the sale of land near Cedar Lake.

Musolf, president of the Michigan Deer Hunters Association based at Oscoda, reported on the status of the upcoming antlerless deer hunting season. He said the state's formula for issuing permits in this county was based on 443 square miles of land, which included both public and private property. He believed that permits should be based on 177 square miles of public land open to hunting.

The board accepted the low bid of \$2,163 from Inglis Ford Sales, Tawas City, for a new patrol car for the sheriff's department.

Save Nine From Disabled Cruiser

Prompt action by coast guardsmen from Tawas Point and exceptional seamanship by a Trenton boat owner was credited Sunday with possibly saving the lives of nine persons, who were rescued from a cruiser which sunk in Saginaw Bay.

Ward Skiver; his wife, Doris; their four children, along with another Trenton couple and their son, spent Saturday and Sunday morning coho fishing on Tawas Bay.

The party left shortly before noon on their return to Port Austin and then home to Trenton aboard their cabin cruiser, Seven Skies II. About

12 miles west of Tawas Point, the cruiser began taking on water from an unknown source.

Skiver radioed a distress call to the Tawas Point Coast Guard Station, then turned the cruiser around and headed for Tawas Bay. The rescue craft dispatched by the coast guard reached the cruiser when the latter was only 1 1/2 feet from being awash.

The nine persons were taken aboard the coast guard boat and attempts were made to bring the sinking vessel to port, but it finally submerged about two miles off Tawas Point.

High sea and rain hampered salvaging the vessel, which went down in about 40 feet of water.

Members of the coast guard vessel taking part in the rescue were PO Michael A. Fischer, boat operator; PO2C Michael Hellmann, engineer; Seaman Dennis Michalak, and Seaman Richard Marling. PO2C George Lee coordinated the rescue by radio from the Tawas Coast Guard Station.

Passenger Pigeon Story Told by Oscoda Writer

A booklet, "Death of a Wild Pigeon," written and published by Jerry Wagner of Oscoda, tells the story of the passenger pigeon which once inhabited practically the whole forested area of Eastern North America.

The last passenger pigeon died in captivity on September 1, 1914, at the Cincinnati Zoological Gardens and the bird is one of a number of different species which have vanished.

Although passenger pigeons once blackened the sky over Michigan, research on this bird has been difficult. "Few reliable records were kept and those that were are incomplete," states Wagner.

Wagner's booklet traces the passenger pigeon from its first sighting by early settlers in Virginia through the slaughter of these birds by market hunters at Potoskey in May 1878. A flock of about 200 birds was seen in Michigan in 1898 and, in 1900, 50 birds were reported on the Mamistee River—then no more.

Wagner has dedicated his booklet to "those species of mammal and bird life no longer with us. And in those species rapidly disappearing which we could best help by just leaving alone."

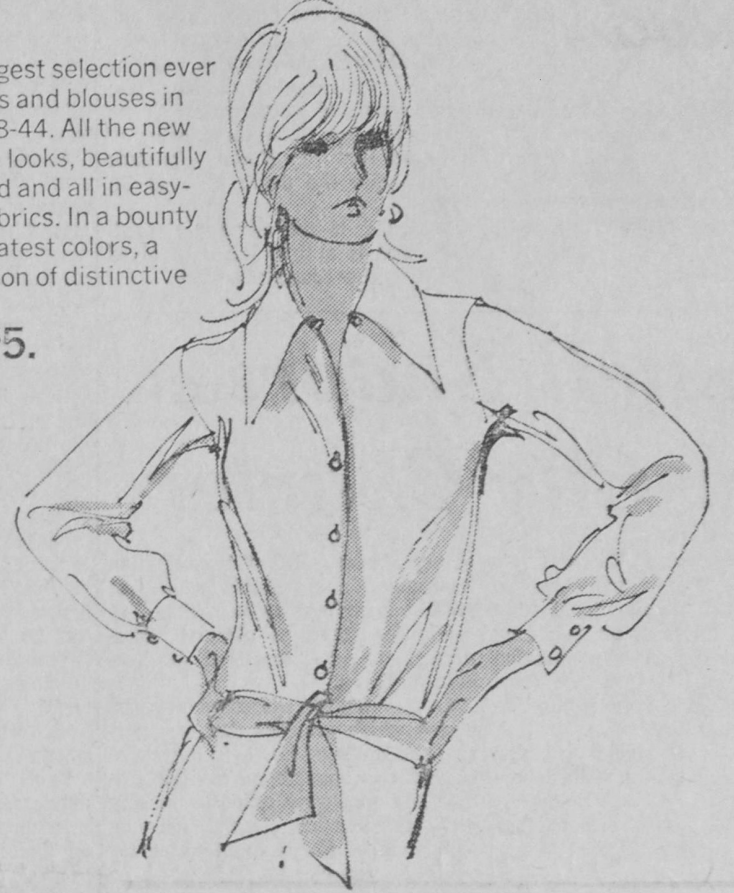

ning commission or zoning board of appeals where nominal compensation may be paid.

Another clause provides that the city council, upon recommendation of the manager, may appoint the same person to fill more than one office when it deems it necessary or advisable for the proper and efficient operation of the city. Under the new charter, the city treasurer and city clerk would be appointive offices and one person could be appointed to handle both jobs.

Arnold Hosbach, charter commission member, said that the proposed new charter was designed to

promote better government and not to hamstring the council. During its deliberation, the charter commission utilized charters from six different communities to develop a new home rule government which would fit the needs of this community.

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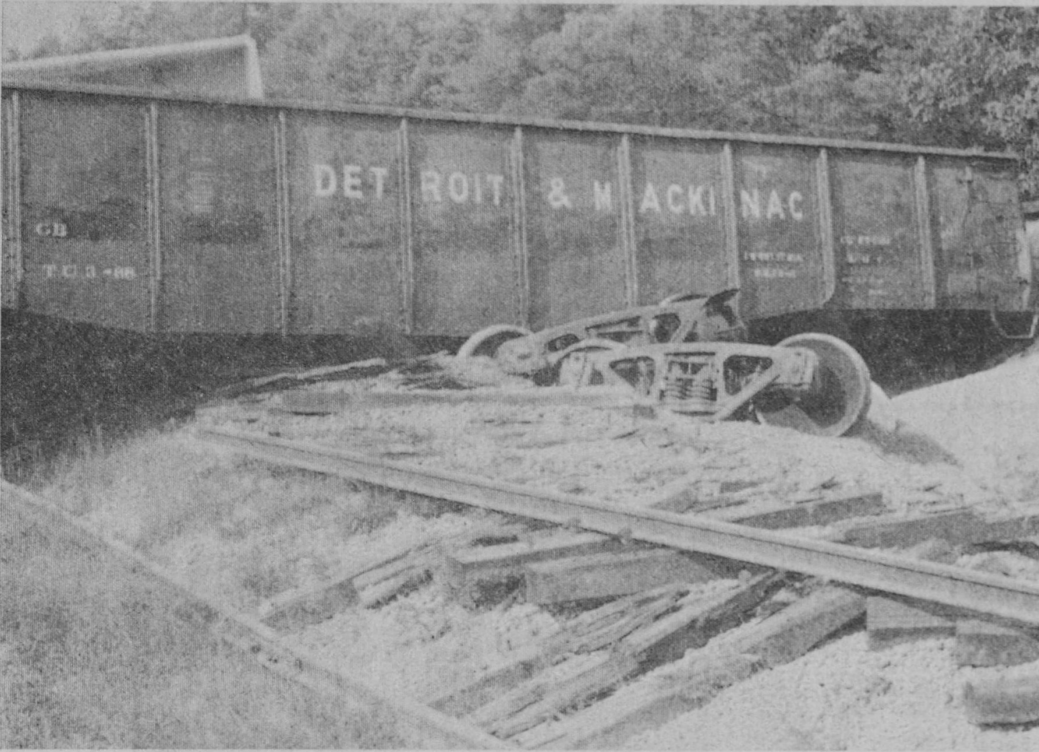

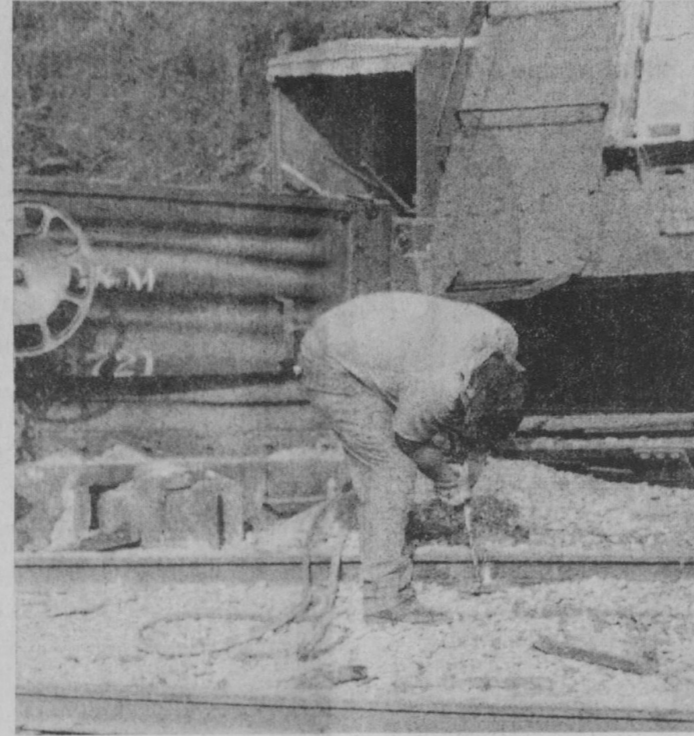


Arrest Two in 1970 Fatal Beating at BC

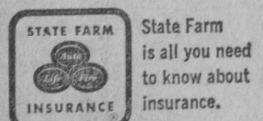

Braves Beat Hornets, 13-0, to Open 1971 Grid Campaign

Tawas Area Braves opened the 1971 football season Friday night with a nonconference win over the Harrison Hornets, 13-0.

Both teams had opening game "fumbleitis" and the Braves will

have to sharpen their reflexes in order to match Ogemaw Heights Falcons in the NBC opener here this Friday night.

Neither team could get a drive going in the first quarter, which ended at 0-0. Shortly after the start of the second quarter, Halfback Dave Moe returned a punt 21 yards and then moved the ball to Harrison's two-yard line, where Moe cracked over for Tawas' first touchdown.

Steve Cross booted the PAT from placement and the Braves had a 7-0 lead.

The Braves had several good scoring opportunities in the second quarter but could not punch through Harrison's big line with its back to the wall. The Braves recovered a Harrison fumble on the losers' 31, then marched toward the goal line. The Harrison line held and Tawas lost the ball on the 21.

With five minutes to go before the half, Tawas started a drive on the 47 and then fumbled on the Harrison 22. Another drive in that quarter saw Tawas marching to the four-yard line of Harrison and then losing the ball on downs as the Hornet defense pushed the Braves back to the 14.

Harrison's offense came to life in the third quarter, but penalties hurt the visitors' cause. Mike Russell intercepted a Harrison pass on Tawas' 41-yard line and returned the ball to the Hornet 32. Moe then cracked through the Harrison line to the 16, but fumbled and Tawas lost the ball.

With five minutes, 27 seconds to go in the third quarter, Steve Janego intercepted a Harrison pass on Tawas' 48-yard line and the Braves had another crack at scoring. Russell made a spectacular catch of a pass to move the ball to the seven-yard line just before the end of the third quarter, but Tawas again lost the ball on downs.

Moe later came up with another great punt runback of 47 yards to give Tawas a first down on the 14-yard line with seven minutes, 46 seconds to go in the fourth quarter. The Braves fumbled on the first play from scrimmage, then Halfback Steve Sventko recovered a Hornet fumble on Harrison's first play from scrimmage and Tawas had possession on the 12-yard line.

With five minutes, 52 seconds to go in the game, Quarterback Tom Kasischeke found Mark Schirmer alone in the endzone and hit him with a pretty pass to make the score 13-0. The kick from placement by Cross was blocked by Harrison to end the scoring.

Statistics for the game had Tawas Area with eight first downs and five for Harrison. Kasischeke completed five out of 16 passes for 74 yards. The Braves had 45 rushing plays for 137 yards, while Harrison had 34 rushing plays for 136 yards. Tawas Area had six fumbles and lost three while Harrison had four fumbles and lost two.

Moe carried the ball 12 times and picked up 50 yards to lead Tawas' offense. Sventko led in defense with four tackles and three assists.

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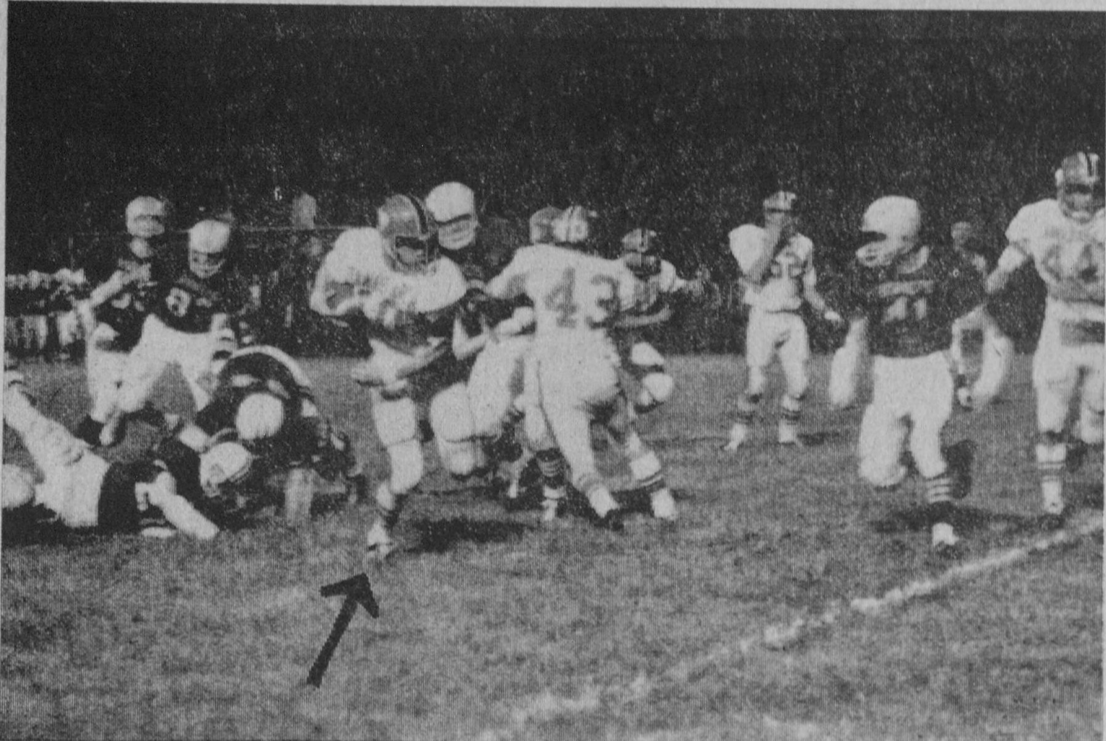
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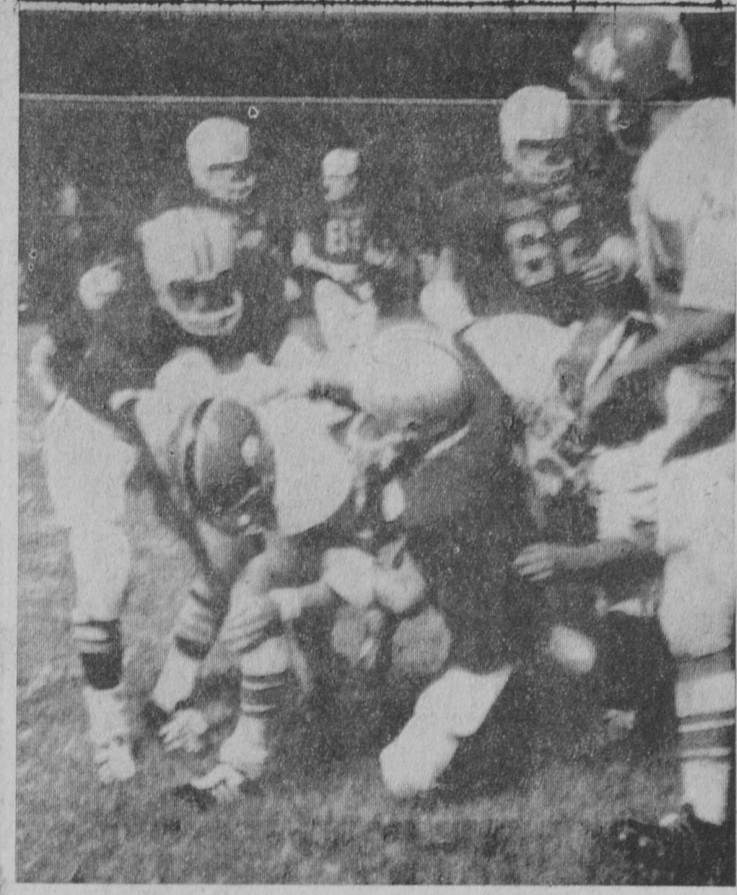
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STEVE SVENTKO (10) threads his way through the Harrison defense on this second half play Friday night. In addition to his offensive work,

Selective Service Clarifies Policy

The Selective Service System today clarified expected policy changes on undergraduate student deferments.

College students who were enrolled full-time in the 1970-71 academic year will be eligible for student deferments in the 1971-72 school year if they continue to make satisfactory progress in their programs of study, selective service officials said. However, young men who entered school for the first time this summer and those who enrolled as freshmen this fall will not qualify for student deferments if the pending changes to the Selective Service Act are passed by congress. The house has completed action on the bill and final senate action is expected in September.

Dr. Curtis W. Tarr, selective service director, said, "Few incoming freshmen students are likely to be inducted in the near future because of the student deferment phaseout. Of the 1,034,000 incoming freshmen males estimated by the office of education approximately 80 percent are 18 years old and only 20 percent are 19 years of age or older. The 18-year-olds will receive their lottery numbers in 1972 and they will not be subject to induction until 1973, when draft calls should be low. The 19-year-old freshmen received their lottery numbers August 5 of this year and will be subject to induction next year; at least one-half should have high enough lottery numbers to preclude their induction. Of those remaining, approximately 50 percent will be disqualified on mental, moral or physical grounds. This means a maximum of 50,000 men will be directly affected in 1972 by the student deferment phaseout and one-half of these, or 25,000, will probably not be inducted because of enlistments in regular, reserve or national guard units, participating in commissioning programs or because of procedural delays.

Doctor Tarr said that college students will not be drafted in the middle of a semester or term. "If called while enrolled, they will be allowed to postpone their induction until the end of the semester or term. If in their last academic year, they will be able to postpone their induction until after graduation."

Doctor Tarr advised incoming freshmen and students who started their program of study in the summer of 1971 or later not to file applications for student deferments even though the current law authorizes granting deferments to students in full-time programs of study.

"If the pending selective service legislation does not pass," Tarr said, "it would not be in a registrant's best interest to obtain a student deferment which would extend his liability until age 35. Should congress change the legislation to provide for deferments for new incoming freshmen, which is most unlikely, applications for deferments will not be jeopardized by delaying their submission until after passage of the new law."

The president's authority for the induction of all men under 35, except for those who have or who have had deferments, expired June 30. If congress does not reinstate the general induction authority, the president could authorize the induction of

those registrants who hold or have held deferments. In this unlikely event, selective service officials believe that manpower requirements of the department of defense probably could be met by inducting those young men who have recently dropped deferments because they graduated, dropped out of school or changed their occupations. Recent college graduates or dropouts would make up the bulk of inductions, the officials said. The officials added that cancellations of deferments probably would not be necessary nor would it be necessary to call those who have passed into the second priority selection group.

Currently, there are approximately six million young men under age 35 with deferments. Approximately 500,000 of these normally lose their deferments during a 12-month period. The largest groups of deferred men are those who have received fatherhood, occupational or student deferments.

Forest Service 1971 Revenue Showed Dip

Revenues from the 17 national forests in the 20-state Eastern Region of the United States Forest Service dipped slightly during fiscal year 1971, showing a year-end total of 7.3 million dollars. This is about \$350,000 under revenues collected during the same period in 1970.

For those states where national forests are located, which annually receive 25 percent of these revenues for use in local road and school programs, this decrease will represent a loss of about \$86,000. Moneys returned to the states this year will total \$1,823,289.53, down from the 1970 figure of \$1,909,710.58.

Total payment to Michigan counties amounted to \$231,015.18. Of this amount, counties comprising the Huron-Manistee National Forests received \$92,196.13, counties making up the Ottawa National Forest in the Upper Peninsula received \$68,233.73 and counties of the Hiawatha Forest in the Upper Peninsula received \$70,585.32.

In announcing the year-end figures, Jay H. Cravens, regional forester, attributed the drop in revenue primarily to soft markets in the timber industry.

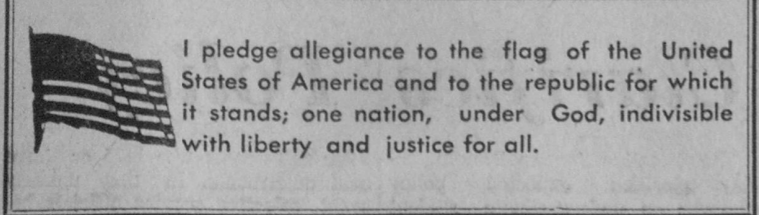

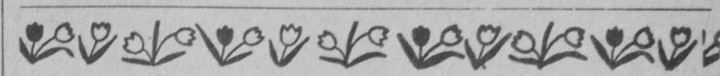

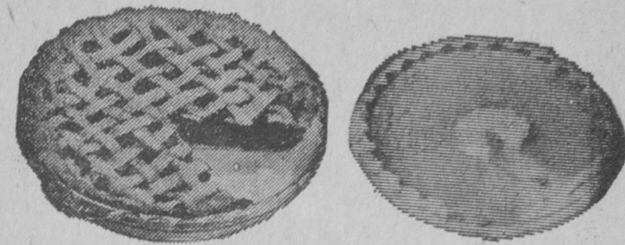
Hospital Board-Auxiliary Held Joint Meeting

Effective September 21, post offices of Tawas City and East Tawas will not open for window service after 12 o'clock noon on Saturdays.

In a 13-inning battle Sunday, Tawas City Independents defeated West Branch to win the Northern Division championship of the Northeastern Michigan League. The Indies won, 8-7, in a game which took 3½ hours of playing.

While Roosevelt felt sure the man was a crackpot, he listened to the visitor's system of nets and mines to make mine fields more effective in blockading submarines at German bases. The scheme was immediately added to the English Channel defenses and revolutionized submarine defenses. The eccentric visitor who crashed the assistant secretary's office was the Rev. John R. Stilwell, at that time a resident of Plainfield Township, who later received a citation from the British government and was personally thanked by King George V for being one of the saviors of the Allied cause.

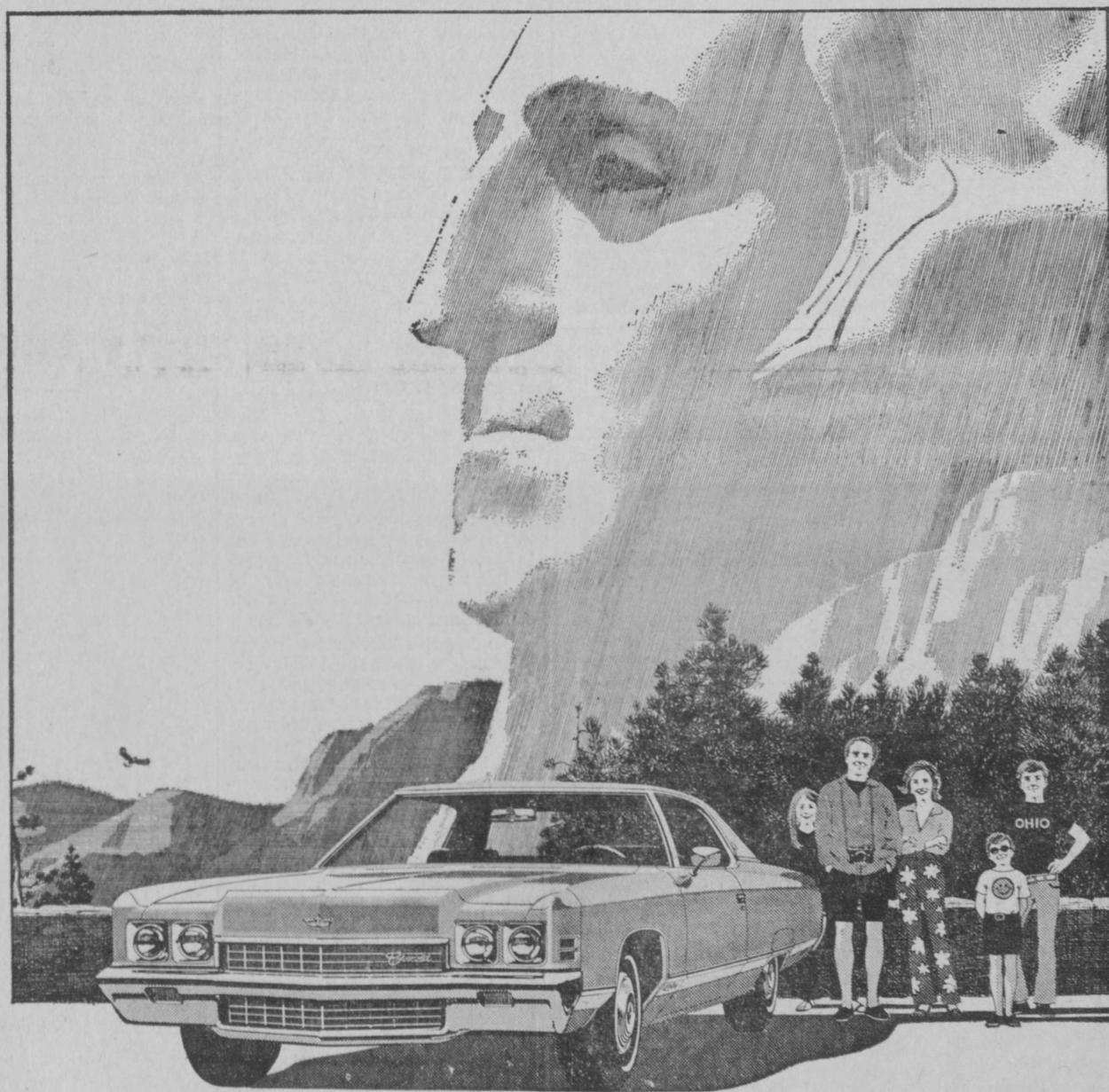

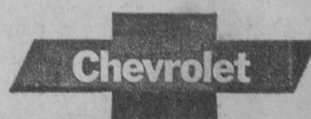

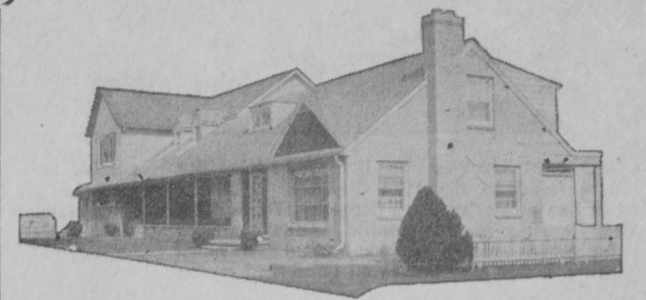

A registrant over 26 years of age who is or has been enlisted, either 1-C or 1-D classifications, for a period of six years or more may be considered by the local board for classification in class IV-A.

The Selective Service Act has not permanently expired and it is very likely draft calls will be issued in the near future should the authority to induct be reinstated. In the meantime, registrants are to keep their local boards informed of their current status. Registration of 10-year-old men continues, as does classification and preinduction physical examinations to determine whether the registrant will be qualified for military service.

Number 125 was the highest lottery number called to meet military manpower requirements through June 30. The department of defense asked selective service to induct 15,000 in July and August. This call is being held by selective service headquarters pending final congressional action. At this time a random sequence number ceiling for 1971 has not been set but possibly it will not exceed last year's ceiling of 195.

"Since June 30, this local board has not drafted anyone," informs Mrs. Betty L. Shedenhelm, executive secretary of Local Board No. 36, East Tawas. "If anyone has questions concerning their draft status, they may call, write or visit the office in this county located in the East Tawas Federal Building Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday of each week or Friday mornings, 9:00 a. m. to 1:00 p. m."

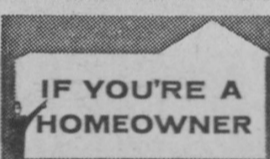

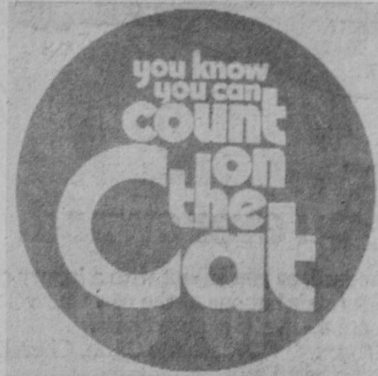

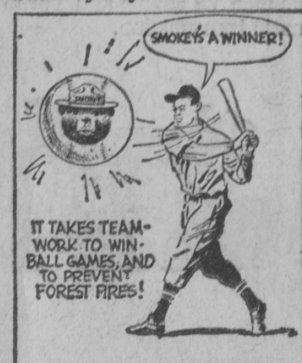

The Board of Baldwin Township of Isoco County, Michigan, ORDAINS: That Ordinance No. 103, being Baldwin Township Zoning Ordinance, be amended as follows:

Section 1.0
Baldwin Township Ordinance No. 103, designated "Baldwin Township Zoning Ordinance" adopted August 8, 1966, is hereby amended as follows:

Mobile homes, defined as single-family dwellings designed for transportation after fabrication on streets and highways on their own wheels or on flatbed or other trailers, and arriving at the site where they are to be occupied as dwellings complete and ready for occupancy, except for minor and incidental unpacking and assembly operations, location on permanent foundations, connection to utilities and the like, shall be permitted within the Agricultural District west of Tawas Lake, sections 5, 6, 7, 8, 18, 19 of Town 22 North, Range 8 East, and sections 1, 2, 3, NE 1/4 of 10, 11, 12, 13, NE 1/4 of 14 of Town 22 North, Range 7 East, subject to the following conditions:

1.1 The site shall be at least one (1) acre in area.
1.2 The minimum depth and width of the site shall be one hundred (100) feet.
1.3 Yard regulations shall be the same as the provisions set forth in Residence A District.

1.4 The mobile home shall contain not less than seven hundred twenty (720) square feet of floor area at the first floor level exclusive of any area in an attached garage, open porch, or other open attached structure.

1.5 The mobile home shall be erected on permanent foundations with axles removed.

1.6 A state septic tank permit shall be obtained for the mobile home site.

1.7 The mobile home shall not be placed within a platted subdivision, nor within nine hundred thirty-three (933) feet of either Monument Road or Wilber Road.

Section 2.0
The penalty for violation of this Ordinance shall be the same as those penalties set forth in Article 5, Section VII of the Baldwin Township Zoning Ordinance No. 103.

Section 3.0
This Ordinance shall be published in a newspaper circulated within the Township of Baldwin within 10 days following the adoption thereof.

This Ordinance shall become effective on the 13th day of September, 1971.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

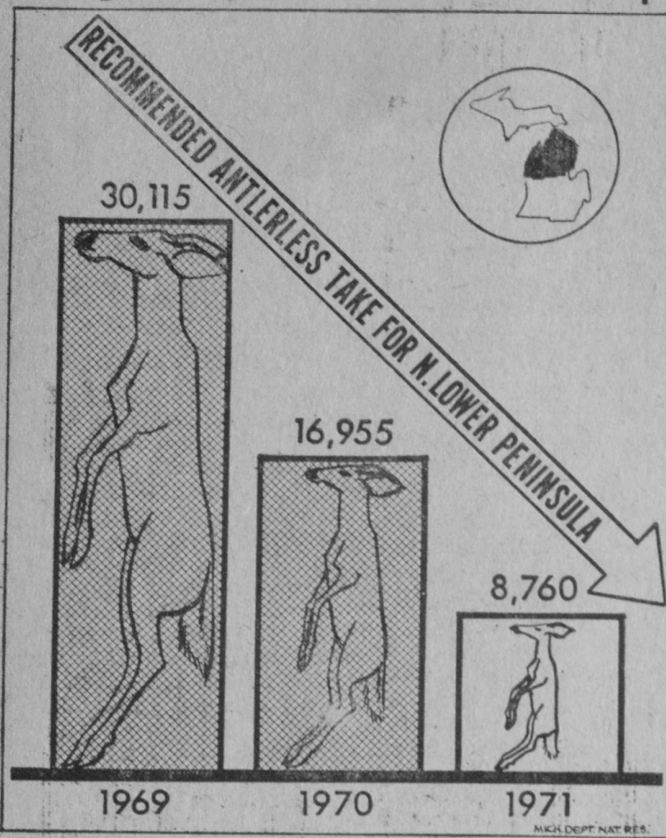

Target Region for Deer Build-Up



Over the last three years, the antlerless deer kill quota for the northern Lower Peninsula has been cut 71 percent under a two-pronged program to build up the region's deer herd in those areas where food supplies will allow more animals to be carried through the winter. As the second part of that plan, the Department of Natural Resources is moving to step up deer habitat improvements and strategic commercial timber cuttings to boost the carrying capacity of the region's winter range for whitetails. Through these combined efforts, the DNR hopes to raise the productivity of the region's deer herd to a point where it can support the take of more animals on a sustainable basis.

Give Facts Concerning Social Security

Question: I have been told that social security credits are called "quarters of coverage." What does this mean and how do you earn them?

Answer: The year is divided into four, equal, three-month parts called calendar quarters. Most people who work for someone else get one quarter of coverage for each calendar quarter in which they are paid total wages of \$50 or more. If you work for yourself, you get social security credit for four calendar quarters for each taxable year in which you have a net profit of \$400 or more from self-employment. Quarters of coverage for farm laborers depend on the following: (1) Earnings from each employer during the year, (2) length of time worked for each employer during the year, (3) whether he works on a time basis or piece rate basis. For more information on the coverage of farm laborers, contact your nearest social security office.

Question: I will soon be 65 and wonder if I should sign up for medicare. Is medicare really helping people?

Answer: In 1970, 14 million older Americans were helped by medicare. Over five billion dollars was paid for services covered by hospital insurance and two billion dollars for services covered by medical insurance. If you are nearing 65, do not take a chance on losing valuable medicare coverage. Contact your social security office two or three months before you reach 65 and sign up for medical insurance under medicare.

Question: I am 68 and collect social security retirement benefits. But I also work part-time during the year. How often should I ask the social security office to refigure my benefits, based on additional earnings, to see if I am due an increase in my checks?

Answer: You do not have to request the social security office to refigure your social security benefits. This is done automatically each year.
