Falcon Defense Stops Braves; TA Lost, 16-0

Ogemaw Heights Falcons and its halfback speedster, Steve Kimball, gained a bit of revenge Friday night by shutting out the Tawas Area Braves, 16-0, on the losers' home field.

Kimball, who demonstrated his great running power all night, showed no trace of the hip dislocation which he sustained last year when the Braves defeated the Falcons, 14-8.

But, even in defeat, fans attending this NBC clash had to admit that the lighter and undermanned Braves gave a good account of themselves. The Braves went into the game with only limited service from their hard-running halfback, Dave Moe, who saw only limited action because of a leg infection.

As a result, the ball carrying chores fell heavily on the shoulders of the Braves' junior halfback, Steve Svontko, who turned in an outstanding performance. Fullback Greg Brown also gave his all to help the Tawas cause, as did Halfback Mike Russell.

The big difference came in the offensive line play, where the Braves were outweighed by the visiting Falcons. Gains by the Tawas offense had to come from running ability and not from up front blocking as 275-pound John Wiegierink of the Falcons was not about to be moved by the lighter blockers in the Tawas tribe's line.

It was a different story in the defense department as, after adjusting to the Falcon's triple option offense in the first half, Tawas' defensive unit was successful in containing a trio of brilliant Falcon backs, not to mention the running ability of Falcon quarterback, Bill Denemy.

Tawas Area found itself in trouble right from the opening whistle. The Braves took the opening kickoff and could get nowhere against the Falcon line. Ogemaw Heights took Capt. Mark Schirmer's punt and, in 11 plays and 80 yards, marched to its first touchdown. Halfback Pat Thompson scored the first touchdown on a one-yard slant with two minutes, two seconds remaining in

the quarter. Fullback Virgil Neubecker then bulled his way through the Tawas line for a two-point conversion and the Falcons held an 8-0 lead.

The Braves took the next kickoff and then fumbled on their own 41-yard line with 23 seconds remaining in the first quarter. In two carries, Neubecker moved the ball to the Tawas 26. The Braves stopped the next running play and Svontko knocked down a fourth down pass to stop this threat.

Tawas took over the ball and the running of Svontko and Russell picked up a first down to the T-35. The Tawas running game was stopped as Moe came in for one play and was racked up for no gain. Two passes by Quarterback Tom Kasischke were broken up and Tawas punted to the Ogemaw Heights 33.

From that point, Neubecker and Thompson combined running chores to move the ball to the 44. Kimball then sprinted 30 yards to Tawas' 20-yard line. The Falcons moved the ball in three plays to the Tawas nine-yard line and Neubecker went the final distance to cap a 67-yard scoring drive. Neubecker's two-point run after touchdown came with three minutes, seven seconds remaining in the half.

The Braves had the ball for nine plays before the first half ended and, with the aid of a face mask tackle penalty against the Falcons and a nice pass reception by Steve Janego, moved the ball to the Ogemaw 33. Thompson turned in a good defensive play for Ogemaw to break up one pass, but Kasischke then hit Russell to move the ball to the 20. Kasischke picked up five yards on a quarterback sneak to the 15-yard line. Three successive passes by Kasischke were broken up and Thompson intercepted a fourth down pass on the three-yard line to end the Tawas threat.

Tawas Area's defensive unit went to work in the second half and stopped the Falcon offense in eight plays after the opening kickoff. The Braves still could not get a running game going and could offer no pass

protection to Kasischke. Schirmer punted to the Ogemaw 36. The Falcon offense spurred to the Tawas 30 in six plays, but then sputtered as Neubecker was stopped on fourth down with three yards to go.

Tawas Area took over and runs by Svontko, Moe and Brown picked up seven yards, but Schirmer again punted out of trouble to the Ogemaw 10-yard line.

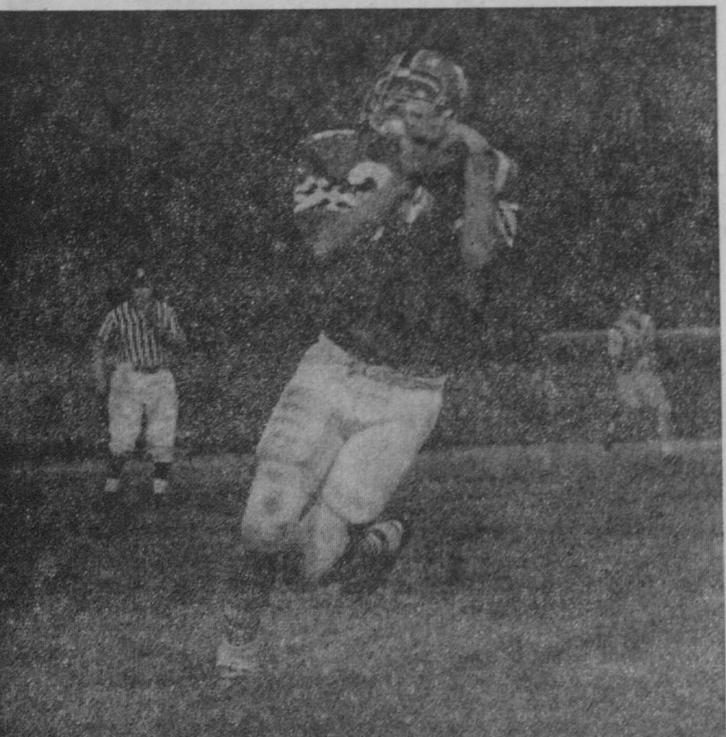
Al LaBlance recovered an Ogemaw fumble on the visitor's 40-yard line early in the fourth quarter and Tawas had its best scoring opportunity of the night. Two runs by Svontko put the ball on the Ogemaw six-yard line, but the Ogemaw defense stiffened and finally pushed the Braves back to the 20.

The Braves had one more opportunity before the end of the game after the Tawas defense held the Falcons to no gain and the punt was returned to the Ogemaw 16. Kasischke picked up nine yards on a keeper and then picked up the first down. One running play and three passes were knocked down by the Falcons and Ogemaw took over the pigskin for the remaining minute of the game.

The story of the game was Ogemaw's outstanding defense, which pinched off Tawas' running game. Led by senior tackle, Steve Nichols, who had eight unassisted tackles, the Tawas defense also turned in a good performance.

Other Tawas players turning in good defensive games were LaBlance, who had seven unassisted tackles and four assists, along with Schirmer, who had five unassisted tackles and eight assists. Guard Steve Anschuetz assisted on eight tackles and had one unassisted stop.

Jim Stevenson failed to get a touchdown but ran 12 times for 100 yards and scored on two PAT runs. He had 12 unassisted tackles as a linebacker.

The victory was the second straight for Hale. AuGres, which got a touchdown from Jeff Walker on a six-yard run, now has two losses in as many games.

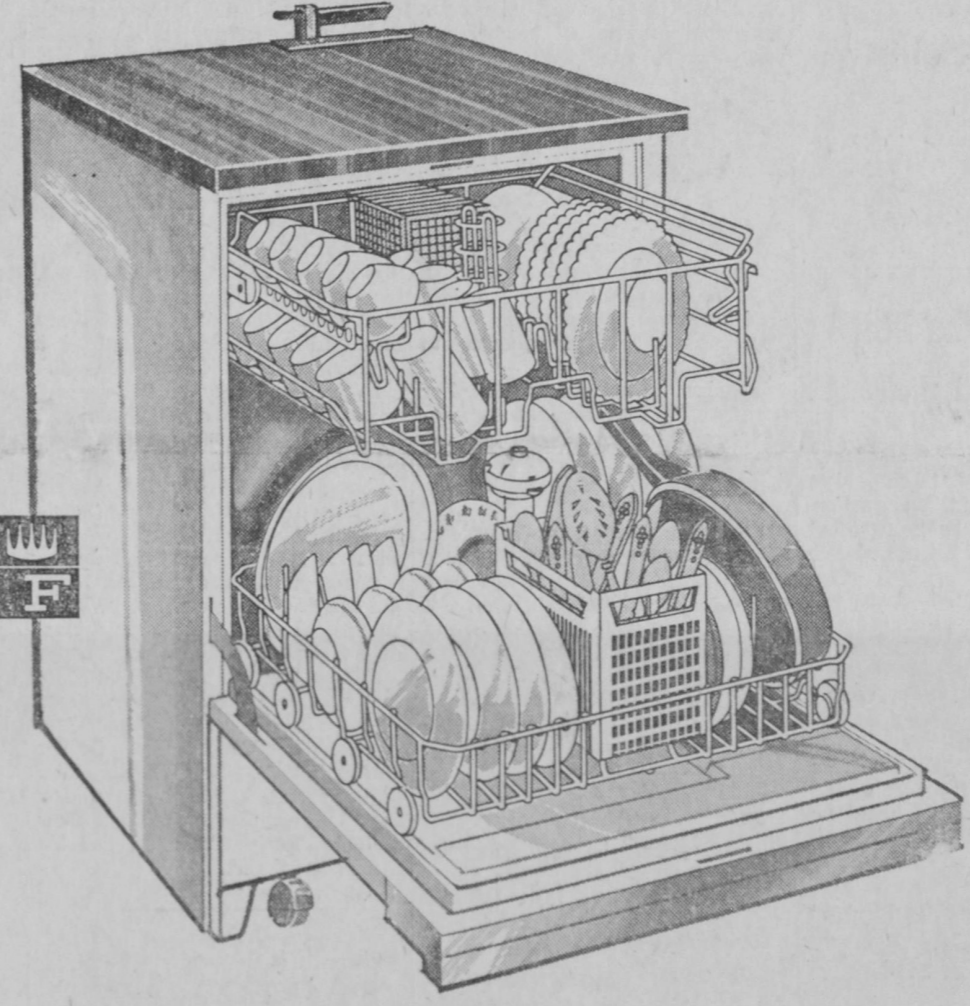

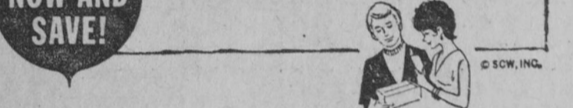

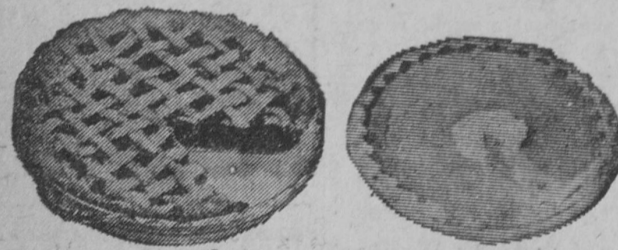

Answer Questions on Social Security

Question: I am 65 and about to retire. Since I will receive a company pension and some income from investments, can I wait four years and get the whole four years of social security benefits at one time?

Answer: No. When you apply for social security retirement benefits, payments can be retroactive for only one year.

Question: Our young daughter would like to get a social security card. Does she have to be any certain age? Is a birth certificate required to get a card?

Answer: There is no minimum age for getting a social security card. About 200,000 children a year now get social security cards before they are six years old. The numbers are often used on bank accounts and stock certificates in a child's name.

At present you do not need a birth certificate to get a social security card; however, this may be a requirement in the future.

Question: Do I have to retire to get medicare?

Answer: No, you do not have to retire to get medicare protection. But, to have full medicare protection when you are 65, you do need to sign up for the medical insurance part two or three months before you reach 65.

If you have questions about medicare, call your social security office. The people there will be glad to help you.
