Prospects Promising For Tawas River Fishing Sites

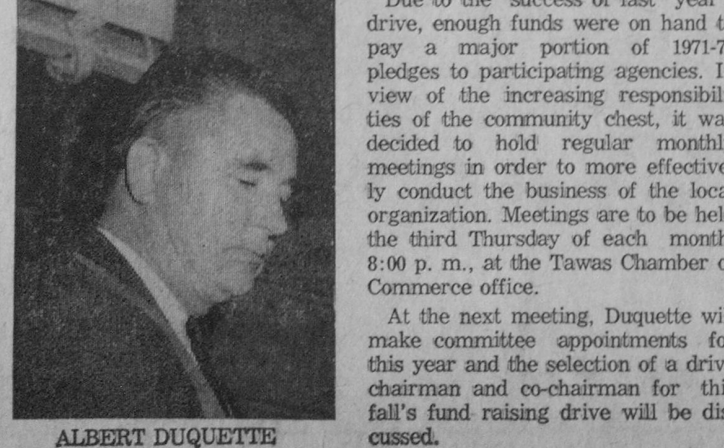
Michigan Department of Natural Resources has indicated interest in obtaining and developing fishing sites along the Tawas River, according to a report at Monday night's meeting of the city council.

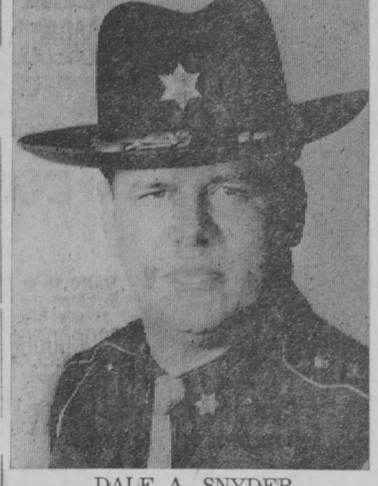

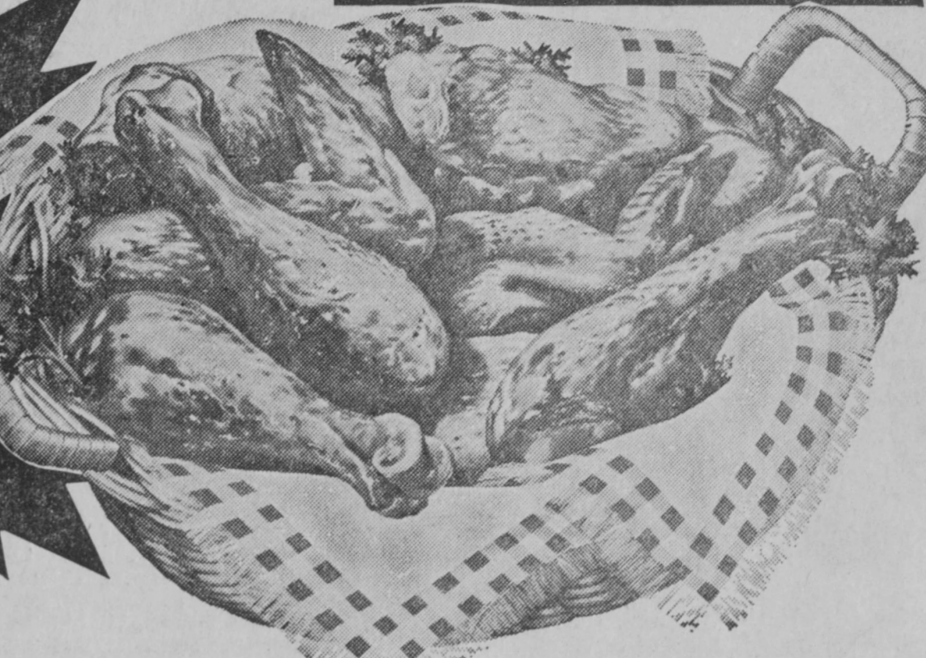

Start Drug Education Program

A drug education program for adults is now being conducted in Iosco County by a group of teachers and interested citizens who recently participated in an off campus drug education workshop conducted by Central Michigan University.

A project of this 20-member workshop group has resulted in the establishment of racks for the distribution of free literature concerning drug abuse. Sixteen literature racks are located in the Tawas area.

Participants in the drug workshop project contacted various local, state and federal sources for free literature concerning drug abuse. Some 20 to 25 different items are available, including eight different pamphlets furnished by Cong. E. Ford A. Cederberg.

Involved in the drug workshop sessions were public school teachers, homemakers, nurses and undergraduate students. Those persons successfully completing the course received one hour of college credit.

Raymond Johnson, CMU instructor in charge of the workshop, emphasized that drug education of youngsters should start as early as the fourth grade.

Mrs. Doris Beck, Tawas City, a homemaker involved in the program, said that some of the literature was purchased through local contributions for free distribution to interested persons.

"We sincerely hope that parents and other individuals will take advantage of this free information," said Mrs. Beck. "Drug education of adults, as well as young people, is most important because of the serious problem of drug abuse facing this nation."

Service organizations contributing to the program included Tawas Chamber of Commerce, Iosco Quota Club, Twentieth Century Club, East Tawas Lions Club, Tawas Area Chapter for Retarded Children, East Tawas Ladies Literary Club, American Legion Auxiliary, Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary, Tawas Kiwanis Club, Iosco Chapter of the American Cancer Society, Community Action Program, Schreck Lumber Company, Iosco Extension Service, Det. George Westcott of the Iosco Sheriff's Department.

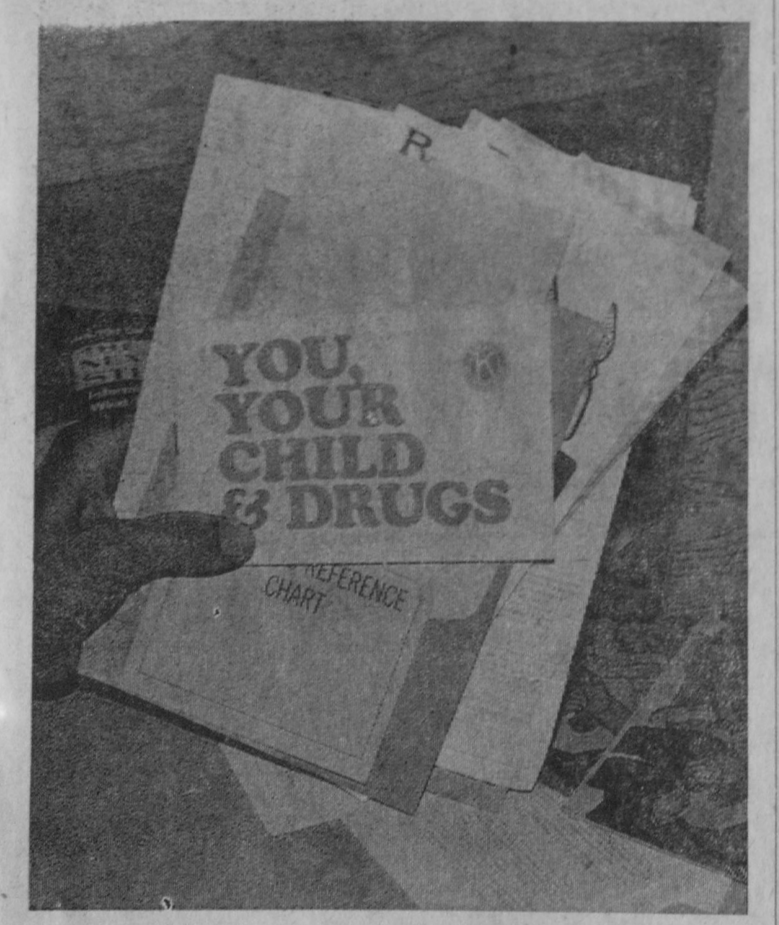

Request More Information on AuGres R. Drainage District

A request for information as to possible benefits Iosco landowners would receive from the proposed AuGres River Drainage District is to be requested from a steering committee now studying formation of the district comprising Counties of Arenac, Iosco and Ogemaw.

Appearing before Wednesday's meeting of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners was Marvin Davenport, county extension agent, who recommended that commissioners request such information.

Davenport told commissioners he had been in favor of conducting the study, but believed that all findings had not been made public.

"Iosco County property owners were told, at the beginning, that they would receive \$4.30 in value for every \$1 expended if the drainage district is approved. Many landowners have been asking me what benefits would be derived through the district and I cannot give them the answers," said Davenport.

The county agent said he had attended a meeting April 6 at Whittemore-Prescott Area School and was told by representatives of the steering committee that no one had requested information concerning the possible construction of a water retention area or lake on Porterfield Creek near Whittemore. In the original discussion during formation of the steering committee, possibility of including a public recreational area on the Porterfield Creek was discussed, but no mention has been made of the project since then.

Davenport told commissioners it was important, too, to determine the method used to fix proposed costs to the three counties for financing the local share of this two-million-dollar project.

"It has been suggested that participation be shared on a basis of 75 percent to Arenac County, 15 percent to Iosco County and 10 percent to Ogemaw County. I think it would be well to give information on just how this breakdown was reached—perhaps Iosco's share is too high for the benefits derived," said Davenport.

At its March session, little enthusiasm was generated among Iosco commissioners concerning commission sponsorship of the three-county flood control project.

While sympathy toward flood problems of some Arenac County farm-

ers has been expressed, along with a "moral obligation" of Iosco and Ogemaw Counties concerning runoff of surface water into the AuGres River which adds to the flooding problems on the river's lower end. Commissioners were of the opinion that many questions needed answering before any endorsement from this county could be given.

Of particular concern to some Iosco farmers is that they would be paying toward financing the venture and receiving little benefit, while farmers in Arenac County would be benefited greatly by a substantial increase in land valuation.

Estimated cost of local sharing to the three counties would be approximately \$536,607. The federal government would add \$1,469,000 to the project.

"I supported the study as I believe we have a moral obligation, but I feel we are entitled to some answers," said the county agent.

Representatives from this county are to attend the steering committee's next meeting to be held Thursday, April 27, at Whittemore-Prescott Area School, to see if they can get some answers.

Fined-Jailed for Possession of Stolen Items

James E. Clark, 38, former Tawas City pharmacist, now of Frederic, was sentenced to 30 days in jail and ordered to pay \$2,000 fine and cost for possession of stolen property by Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

Clark was arrested January 7 by Iosco County Sheriff's officers and charged with the theft of snowmobiles, a garden tractor and a motorcycle.

If the \$2,000 fine and costs are not paid, the judge ordered Clark to spend a year in jail.

In another case, Judge Miller denied an appeal for a new trial requested by Donald Killingbeck, 38, of Bay City. The case is being appealed to the district court of appeals.

Free on \$10,000 bond, Killingbeck was sentenced to Southern Michigan Prison, Jackson, for his participation in a breaking and entering of Fuert Hardware at Whittemore.

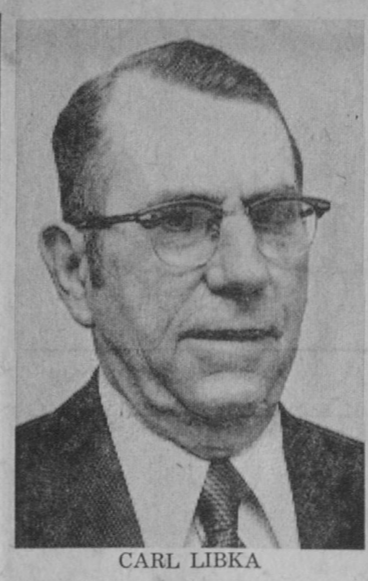

Question: We hired a college girl last summer to take care of our children at our home. We did not realize at the time that her wages were covered by social security, so we did not withhold any money from her \$40-a-week pay. Are we responsible for paying both her share of the social security contributions and our own?

Answer: Yes, you, as an employer, are responsible for deducting 5.2 percent from your employee's pay. If you fail to do so, you must pay both her share and your own share yourself. This amounts to 10.4 percent of her wages. The report of wages paid last summer (July, August and September) was due by October 31, 1971. You may also be assessed interest and penalties for your late report.

Question: I will be 65 this summer and plan to file for monthly social security retirement benefits. My daughter is 19 and in college. Since I want to apply for student benefits for her, what information about her will I need?

Answer: You will need her birth certificate, social security number, school identification number (if any), the name and address of the college she attends, the date the school term will end, and the dates of the following school term.

Question: I recently had an operation and needed two pints of whole blood. I thought medicare took care of all my bills after the first \$68, but the hospital told me I have to pay for the blood. Is this right?

Answer: Yes, the cost of the first three pints of blood received in each benefit period in a hospital is not covered by medicare. Most blood programs, however, have provisions whereby they do not charge for blood if replaced by someone in the name of the recipient.

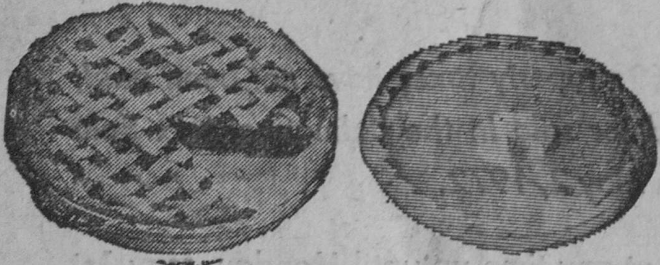

Isosco Road Commission Lists Construction Projects for Year

According to a report Wednesday by the Isosco County Road Commission, the commission's primary road and street construction program for 1972-73 will total 12.66 miles. In addition, there will be 8.22 miles of local roads constructed with township participation in financing.

Construction of the five primary roads involved in the program will cost \$630,850. This work is financed through the county road commission's share of state gas and weight taxes.

Primary roads with construction projects during the next 12 months

include: Old State Road, Reno Township, 3.95 miles from the east county line to M-65, grading and drainage structures, 24 feet wide with six-inch aggregate base, sand cushion, prime and double seal. Cost of construction is estimated at \$160,000.

Wells Road, Wilber and Oscoda Townships, from the north corner of Section 16, T23N, R8E, to River Road, 2.77 miles, grading and ditching structures, 24 feet wide with six-inch limestone aggregate base, prime and double seal. Estimated cost of construction is \$121,000.

Alabaster Road, Alabaster Township, from Lorenz Road 2.10 miles to US-23, grading and ditching structures, sand lift, 24 feet wide with six-inch aggregate base course, prime and double seal. Estimated cost of this work is \$94,000.

Monument Road, Baldwin Township, Wilber Township, Oscoda Township, 11.71 miles from old US-23 to River Road. The present oil aggregate surface is in poor condition and 18 feet in width. Work will consist of widening the base course to 24 feet with a 4.09-inch bituminous surface. Estimated cost of construction is \$175,650.

Camel Road, Wilber Township, 2.13 miles from Monument Road to Indian Lake Road, grading and ditch-

ing structures, with base course 24 feet in width with six-inch limestone aggregate, prime and double seal. Estimated cost of construction is \$85,200.

Local roads with township participation are as follows:

Colbath Road, .85 of a mile from M-171 east and north, aggregate base, \$22,000; Mielock Road, new construction of 2.75 miles from Gypsum Road southwesterly to Turtle Road, southwesterly to Martin Road. Relocation of grade and ditching structures, aggregate surface, \$164,551; Muncy Road, from Johnson Road south .74 of a mile to railroad tracks, grading and drainage structures, 24 feet in width, with six-inch aggregate base, prime and double seal, \$35,000;

Saginaw Street, from Fletcher Street to YMCA Camp, .50 of a mile, aggregate base 20 feet in width, prime and double seal, \$19,000; Meadow Road, from Dead Creek bridge 1.75 miles west to Oates Road, grading and drainage structures, sand cushion in clay areas, 24 feet in width, with six-inch aggregate base, aggregate shoulders, prime and double seal, \$80,000;

Indian Lake Road, from Camel Road .50 of a mile north to existing seal coat, 24 feet in width with six-inch limestone aggregate base

course, prime and double seal, \$20,000; Indian Lake Road, Camel Road, .75 of a mile south to Essex Road, 24 feet in width, six-inch limestone aggregate base course, prime and double seal, \$30,000.

The above information was included in the commission's annual report to the Isosco County Board of Commissioners which met last week. The road commission has responsibility of maintaining a county road system which is 861 miles in length as well as maintaining 77 miles of state trunklines under direct contract with the Michigan Department of State Highways.

Members of the commission include A. J. Aulerich, chairman; Meriton F. Killey, vice chairman; Henry M. Conley, member. Otis D. Love is engineer-manager and Nelson Bean is secretary.

According to the report, new equipment purchased by the commission during the past year had a valuation of \$105,646. Motor vehicle highway funds received by the commission amounted to \$791,311. Other revenues received included \$2,626 in federal funds and \$69,397 from township participation.

Among expenditures during the past year was \$266,838 for construction, \$363,708 for maintenance and \$49,458 for administration.

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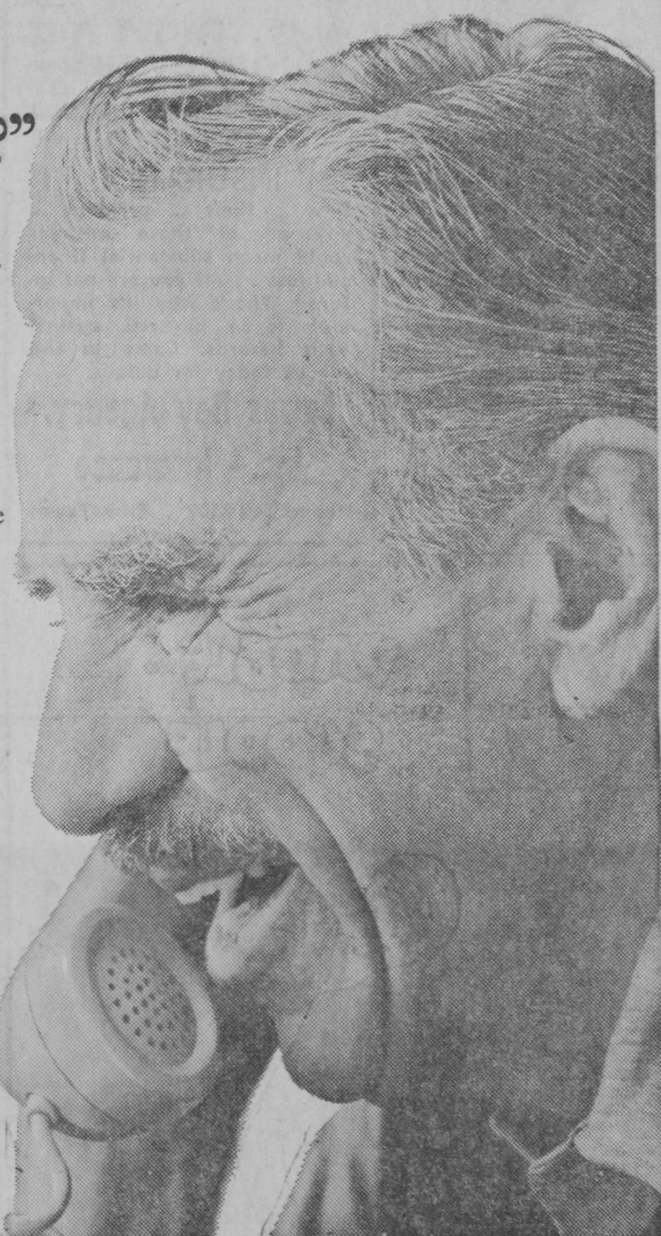

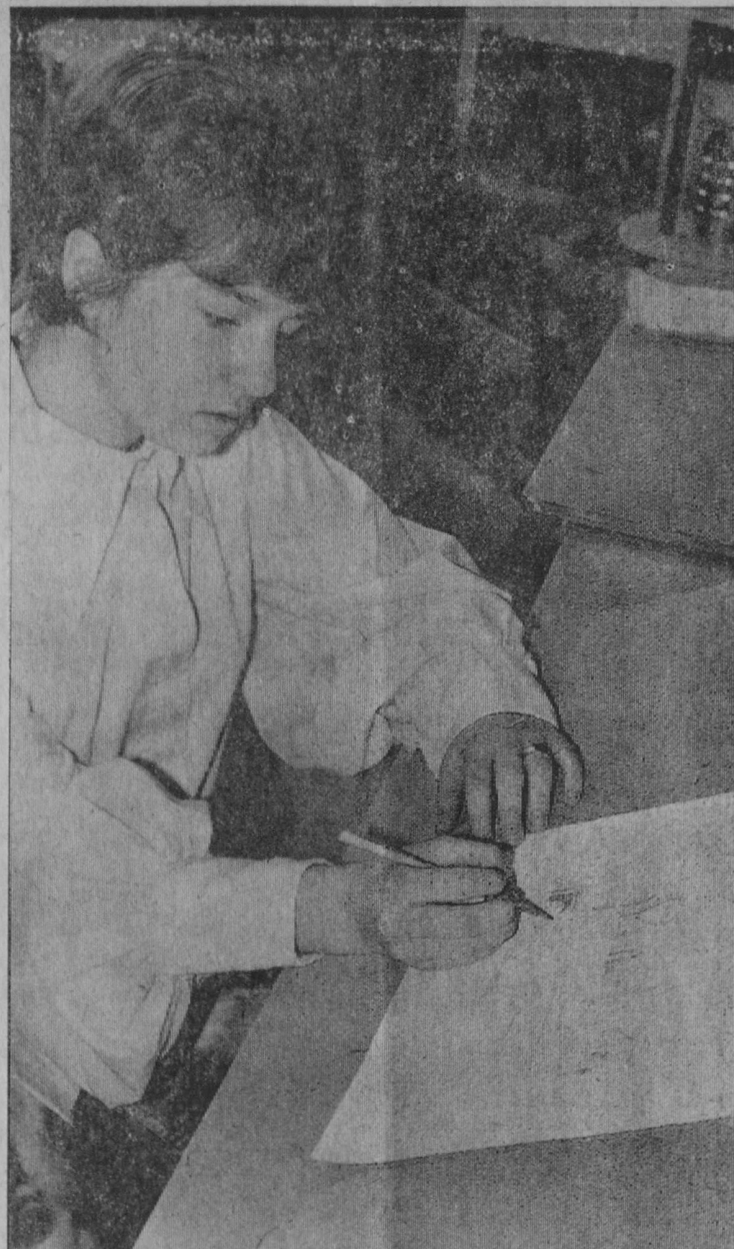
