



Raymond Johnson, CMU instructor in charge of the workshop, emphasized that drug education of youngsters should start as early as the fourth grade.



An Iosco Circuit Court jury found Roger LaPoint, 31, Oscoda, guilty of negligent homicide in the Thanksgiving week-end auto death of an Oscoda woman.

Employers Are Responsible for Deductions

Question: We hired a college girl last summer to take eare of our children at our home. We did not realize at the time that her wages were covered by social security, so we did not withhold any money from her \$40-aweek pay. Are we responsible for paying both her share of the social security contributions and our own?

Answer: Yes. You, as an employer, are responsible for deducting 5.2 percent from your employee's pay. If you fail to do so, you must pay both her share and your own share yourself. This amounts to 10.4 percent of her wages. The report of wages paid last summer (July, August and September) was due by October 31, 1971. You may also be assessed interest and penalties for your late report.

Question: I will be 65 this summer and plan to file for monthly social security retirement benefits. My daughter is 19 and in college. Since I want to apply for student benefits for her, what information about her will I need?

Answer: You will need her birth certificate, social security number, school identification number (if any), the name and address of the college she attends, the date the school term will end, and the dates of the following school term.

Question: I recently had an operation and needed two pints of whole blood. I thought medicare took care of all my bills after the first \$68, but the hospital told me I have to pay for the blood. Is this right?

Answer: Yes, the cost of the first three pints of blood received in each benefit period in a hospital is not covered by medicare. Most blood programs, however, have provisions whereby they do not charge for blood if replaced by someone in the name of the recipient.


