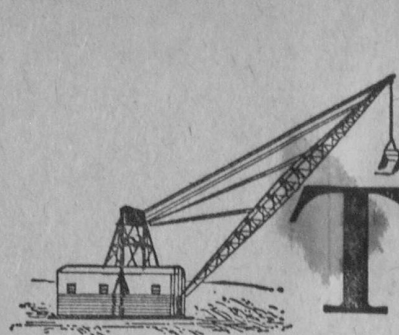

DNR Fish Management Specialist Says:

Trout Given Priority for Lake Huron

The days of Lake Huron "getting the short end of the stick" are over, insofar as Department of Natural Resources fishery programs are concerned. This was the word Tuesday noon when Jack Bails, anadromous fisheries management specialist with the DNR, addressed the Tawas Kiwanis Club and area residents interested in the sports fishery program of Saginaw Bay and Lake Huron. More than 50 persons attended the luncheon meeting, which was co-sponsored by the Tawas City Businessmen's Association. Remarkering that the DNR had been receiving on the average of 20 to 30 letters per month from residents of the Tawas area concerning state fish programs, Bails assured those attending that the DNR would be guided by what the people of the Tawas and surrounding area want in fish management programs. As a starter, Bails said the department had reconsidered its previously announced fish planting program for this year and included 5,000 rainbow trout to be planted in Tawas Bay. A planting here had not been scheduled, although 100,000 steelhead are to be planted in the AuSable River, along with plants in the AuGres and Rifle Rivers. Bails said that Lake Huron was receiving the majority of steelhead, rainbow and brown trout hatched by the state this year and these three species have been given top priority in the state's fishery program for Lake Huron.

The fish management specialist said that upwards of 20 percent of the 10,000 rainbow trout planted in Lake Huron east of Tawas Point last year could be expected to return to Tawas Bay this year. Good steelhead fishing success on the Tawas River last year could be attributed to previous plants in Tawas Bay by the DNR, but Bails emphasized that many of those returning fish may have been planted in other areas and migrated to this stream. Reviewing the entire fishery program of the DNR since the 1940s, Bails said that the lamprey and heavy commercial fishing pressure wiped out the lake trout in Lake Huron. Because Lakes Superior and Michigan offered the most potential for re-establishing the lake trout due to deeper water, those two lakes received the first attention. In 1968, the sea lamprey control program for Lake Huron was cut by congressional action and the DNR, in cooperation with private groups and local governmental agencies, raised \$170,000 in funds to carry out its own stream treatment program for controlling lamprey in 1968-1969. Bails said that it is expected that lake trout will again be established in Lake Huron by 1980 and may again become abundant even in Saginaw Bay. In addition, 300,000 splake (a hybrid cross between the lake trout and brook trout) are to be planted in Northern Lake Huron in cooperation with Canada. The fish management specialist said that it is anticipated that yellow perch would be making a comeback in Saginaw Bay. He said that over exploitation of perch by gill netters had resulted in banning this gear. Impoundment gear is being allowed for perch this year. Bails said that from the once abundant seven and eight-year classes of perch in Saginaw Bay, perch populations dwindled to only a one-year class. The Lake Michigan perch fishery has already shown great improvement through banning of gill nets and Bails said the same is expected for Tawas and Saginaw Bays. "Perch will respond rapidly if given a chance," he stated. During the past year, Michigan has traded some of its excess coho salmon eggs with the State of New York and is to receive 50,000 walleye eggs in return. It is hoped that these eggs will form a basis for a new walleye fishery. From 1920 to 1941, Michigan planted walleyes in Saginaw Bay, but the program was designed to support the commercial fishing industry. It was stopped because of being too costly. Bails said that the coho program had not been particularly successful in Lake Huron, due mainly to the shallow water near shore and the fact that Saginaw Bay raises the water temperature. Another problem was that Canadian commercial fishermen took large quantities of coho in their walleye nets. The Tawas River had a good return of coho in 1970, but there were many complaints of fishermen trespassing on private property.

Planting of coho was reduced to such a low point that few fish returned to the Tawas River. In an effort to re-establish the fishery, 150,000 coho were planted two weeks ago. continue to receive the bulk of the coho plantings while the major lake trout program would be centered in Lake Superior. In addition, 10,000 Atlantic salmon are to be planted in the AuSable River on an experimental basis. Following Tuesday's meeting, Bails and city officials of Tawas City visited several public fishing sites being proposed along the Tawas and brook trout. Lake Michigan will state in purchasing fishing sites in an effort to reduce the problem of trespassing. Also discussed was possible repair of the Ninth Avenue river bank which has crumbled under pressure from fishermen and from erosion. Information on the public fishing sites is to be sent to Lansing and is to be presented at a future meeting of the Michigan United Conservation Clubs.

Consider Bridge Finances Monday

A special meeting to consider Tawas City's proposed bridge replacement program is to be held Monday night, April 10, by the Tawas City Council. Under consideration will be a plan to replace the city's ancient and deteriorated concrete and steel structures with modern wooden bridges. Discussion at Monday night's regular meeting of the council indicated that, if a bridge replacement program is adopted, bridges at Mathews Street and First Street would be given top priority for replacement. Both streets are primary routes connecting with state highways. Reviewing bids from Graham Brimhall Company, one of the leading suppliers of wooden bridges, along with installation costs, the council found that these two bridges could be replaced at a cost slightly in excess of \$60,000. Graham Brimhall Company entered a bid of \$19,947.40 for construction of a double 26-foot span, with 32-foot roadway and a four-foot sidewalk on one side, to replace the Mathews Street bridge. Cost of installation by a contractor was estimated at \$10,500. Cost of replacing the First Street bridge is \$18,632.44, with installation by a contractor estimated at \$9,000. In addition to the installation cost, the city would have an additional expense in repairing or constructing new approaches and providing fill at each bridge. Other bids submitted by the bridge supplier included a triple 26-foot span for replacing the Whittemore Street bridge. Cost of this structure, with a four-foot sidewalk, would be \$27,826.80, plus an installation charge of \$13,000. Replacement of the Sixth Avenue bridge would cost \$19,160. Three different proposals for Seventh Avenue construction ranged from \$19,660 to \$24,549. Suggested as a possible means of financing construction of the Mathews and First Street bridges was a three-mill tax levy for three years. It was stated that four bridges could be constructed with a bond issue for 10 years, but it was felt that added interest, plus the cost of attorney and bonding company fees would greatly increase the end cost. No decision was made on financing and this will be one of the principal matters to be discussed next Monday night. It was pointed out at this week's meeting that the city is facing a real emergency in its bridge replacement program. A three-foot section of roadway popped out of the First Street bridge Monday and other bridges will begin to show additional deterioration as the spring breakup progresses. Members of the council, as well as members of the Tawas City Businessmen's Association, have shown great enthusiasm over the proposed wooden bridges. In use on many county roads around the state, wooden bridges are less expensive than concrete and steel structures and have a comparable life span. The proposed bridges meet or exceed specifications of the state highway department.

Hurt Sunday in East Tawas Motorbike Crash

Bernard J. Tarnosky, 17, 710 West Westover, East Tawas, was treated at Tawas Hospital Sunday afternoon for a fractured hip sustained in a crash at the intersection of Newman Street and State Street at East Tawas. Investigating city police department officers said that Tarnosky, operating a motor bike, was headed north on Newman Street. A car driven by Pamela S. Coleman, 17, 105 Henry Road, was headed east on State Street. Tarnosky was thrown over the hood of the Coleman car as the result of the collision.

Man Hurt in Arenac Crash

A 49-year-old Saginaw man, Cecil Ballar, was treated at Tawas Hospital Thursday following a one-car crash on US-23 at Bessinger Road, Whitney Township, Arenac County. Investigating state police officers said the car was driven by Beatrice O. Howe, 46. The car ran off the road, then slid sideways into a tree.

Fighter Squadron to Leave WAFB

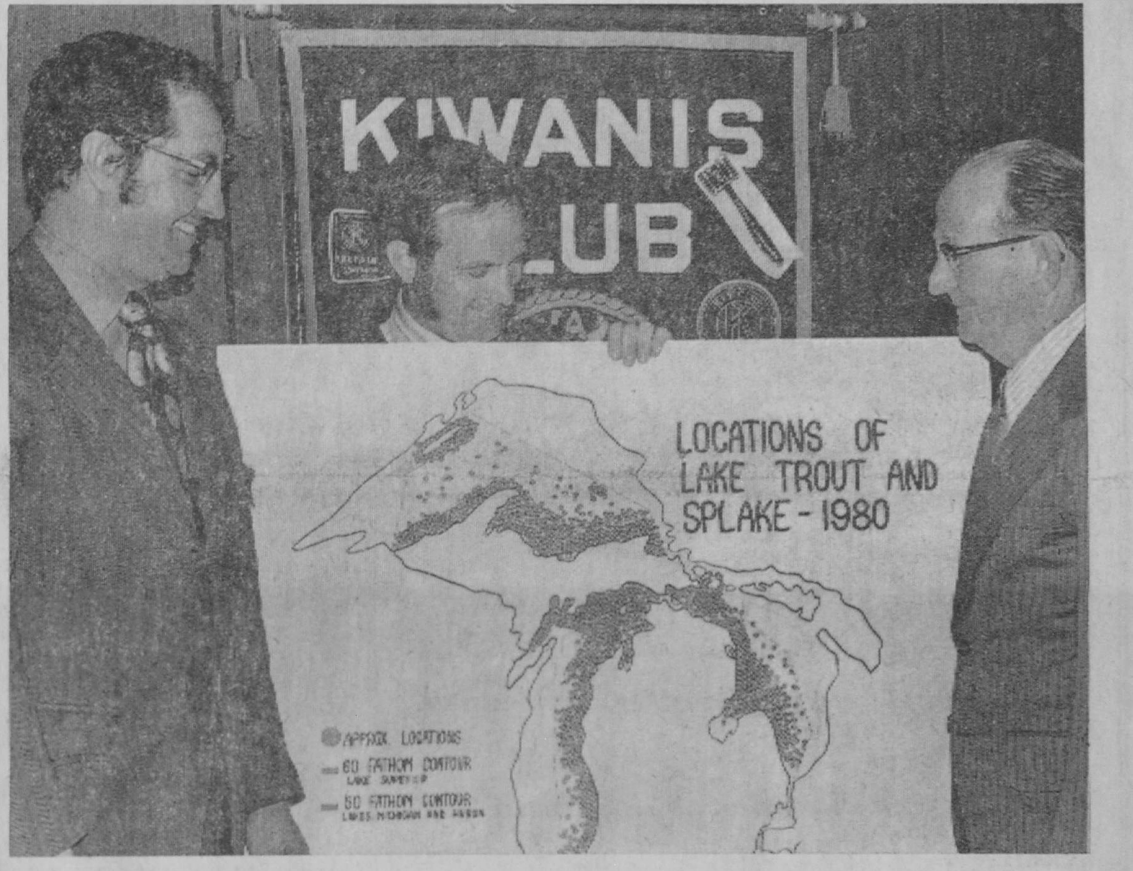
Wurtsmith Air Force Base's Second Fighter-Interceptor Squadron will be deactivated next winter and its planes will be moved to Selfridge Air National Guard Base in Macomb County. When the 193 squadron families leave, it is expected that Wurtsmith's critical base housing situation will be eased. The squadron arrived at Wurtsmith in December 1969, when it was called the 94th Fighter-Interceptor Squadron. The name was changed to Second FIS in July 1971, when the 94th designation was moved to MacDill Air Base, Florida. There is no indication at the present time as to whether the squadron will be replaced by another unit at Wurtsmith.

City Signs Agreement for Street-Sewer Study

An agreement with Edmonds Engineering Company of Bay City was accepted Monday night by the Tawas City Council calling for that firm to commence a street study program. Cost of the street study, plus making preliminary designs for possible future letting of bids, is \$5,000. This cost would be credited to the cost of any future planning should the city later decide to embark on a street construction program. The engineering study would include streets, storm sewers and bridges, although it was pointed out that there would be no actual engineering cost to the city from Edmonds should the city adopt a program of replacing bridges with wooden structures. Engineering for the proposed wooden structures is included in the bid from the bridge supplier. The city faces a major street repair program this year following a severe breakup of road surfaces. One of the major causes of the street deterioration has been the lack of adequate storm drains to remove water from roadways and shoulders. Such a rehabilitation and modernization of primary streets will be a major undertaking for the community. When discussed two weeks ago, it was the thinking of the council that the project could be financed through a cost sharing program between benefited property owners, through establishment of special assessment districts, along with city funds. The city's share would probably be financed through a bond issue. In other business Monday night, the council authorized closing of Pine Street between Beech and Oak following a public hearing at which no objections were heard. The closing was at the request of Roy Stewart and had been approved by adjacent property owners. On recommendation of the city planning commission, Robert Erickson and Robert Hemphill were appointed to fill vacancies in the membership of the commission. The planning commission recommended that the council give consideration to replacement of bridges of First Street, Mathews Street, Dead Creek and Whittemore Street, in that order. No recommendation was given for location of a bridge over Dead Creek. The council is to consider adoption of the planning commission's recommendation that the zoning ordinance be amended to allow residences in the B-2 business district, existing at the time of adoption of the ordinance, to be expanded by not more than 100 percent of the original square footage of dwellings. In the past, additions to residences have not been allowed in the business area. Adoption of the amendment is to be considered at a future council meeting. The city police chief is to investigate and make recommendations concerning enforcement of parking regulations during the coming busy traffic season on US-23. It was pointed out that some vehicles are being parked along US-23 throughout the day, some of them being owned by businessmen. Also to be studied is a time restriction for parking in the city hall parking lot. A report from the state highway department indicated that the state has no plans for replacing the US-23 bridge over the Tawas River at this time. The highway department pointed out that bridges being replaced over the AuSable River and Whitney Drain were low truss structures and were being replaced for safety reasons. It was stated that the bridge here was adequate to carry traffic for many years in the future. The council is to study a recommendation from Consumers Power Company for replacement of 80 street lights which are currently inadequate. These lights are located in residential areas and are 2,500 lumens each. The city manager is to bring in recommendations at a future council meeting. The council authorized expenditure of an additional \$320 to its insurance premium for fire trucks. Under a new plan, a fire truck would be replaced at the current cost rather than the depreciated cost in case of accident or damage. Approval was given to an expenditure of \$54 to the summer baseball program as this city's share of participation with the City of East Tawas, Tawas Area School and several townships. Harold Knight was appointed as the city auditor for the year 1971-72. Building applications approved during the past two weeks included: Lyle Healey, 506 Fifth Avenue, remodel, \$3,000; Jack Johnson, 959 Nanette, addition, \$1,500; Richard Maher, Edms Gardens Subdivision, Lot 33, construct 32 by 73-foot residence, \$29,000.

Defeats Incumbent Robert Bolen Wins ET Mayor Position

Robert Bolen, veteran East Tawas councilman, was elected mayor in Monday's annual spring election, which saw more than 500 voters going to the polls. Bolen, who was top vote getter in the February 21 primary election, rang up 322 votes as compared to 193 votes for James Campbell, incumbent mayor, who had served since 1966 following several terms as First Ward alderman. The new mayor has been a member of the city council since 1964. The other contest on Monday's ballot saw Robert Johnson defeating Edward Higgins for the Second Ward alderman's seat. Johnson received 132 votes while Higgins, who had served since 1964, received 53 votes. Uncontested candidates were Richard Moss, First Ward alderman, 144 votes; Ralph Western, Third Ward alderman, 148 votes; Clyde Soper, city clerk, 462 votes; Mrs. Grace Pelton, city treasurer, 478 votes. Following an official canvass of votes Wednesday night, the newly-elected city officers are to receive the official oath of office preceding Thursday night's regular council meeting. Johnson and Western are both newcomers to the city council, while Moss had served previously as an alderman.

Appear Before Council Seventh Ave. Residents Object to Creek Bridge

A group of Seventh Avenue-Whittemore Street home owners Monday night voiced opposition to location of a new bridge over Dead Creek at Seventh Avenue, as discussed at a meeting of the Tawas City Council two weeks ago. A petition signed by more than 50 persons was presented at Monday night's council meeting. Property owners expressed the fear that a bridge at Seventh Avenue would encourage a heavy flow of truck traffic through a quiet residential area. In addition, the petition stated that a bridge at its present location on Sixth Avenue would connect more readily with Mathews Street. During its discussion two weeks ago on a proposed bridge replacement program, it was suggested that the council study the possibility of constructing a new bridge on Seventh Avenue. No action was taken at the time on the selection of bridge sites, but the program has been discussed at meetings of the planning commission. At Monday night's meeting, Mayor John Brugger pointed out that there were several different points of view on bridge locations and priorities for construction and the council had reached no decision as yet on a final plan. He said the council was composed of fair-minded men and all views would be given consideration. The mayor said that replacement of the Whittemore Street bridge seem to be the crux of the problem. During discussion two weeks ago, it was suggested that the Whittemore Street bridge be replaced and a new bridge be constructed on Seventh Avenue. It was believed that tying in Whittemore Street with Meadow Road and Ninth Avenue through the Seventh Avenue bridge would make Whittemore Street a primary thoroughfare and eligible for state gas and weight tax money. Mrs. Philip Ross, spokesman for property owners present, said she had talked with members of the planning commission and was of the opinion that Seventh Avenue would receive the bulk of pulpwood truck traffic and other truck traffic headed to the industrial park. She pointed out that Seventh Avenue was only one block from the elementary school and she did not believe this was a good route for trucks. She also stated that construction of necessary bridge approaches on Seventh Avenue could complicate flooding of Dead Creek on private property in that area. She believed, also, that a bridge on Seventh Avenue would increase the speed of traffic on Whittemore Street from US-23, which would endanger the 23 children living in her neighborhood. Council members and the mayor said that the point of view taken by the petitioners had been acknowledged and no decision would be made until the matter was investigated fully. As an outgrowth of the meeting, city officials are to study the possibility of controlling truck traffic in the community. City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said that the past winter had been the most severe in his recollection for street deterioration. He said that the problem had been brought about by the excessive amount of rain earlier in the winter, which removed frost from the streets. Ice and then snow piled up along the road shoulders and the water could not escape. Bublitz said that constant pounding of trucks on certain streets, Sixth Avenue for example, had completely ruined the hard surface. He said that much of the truck traffic had been diverted from Fifth Avenue due to the number of stop signs on that street. He believed that the council should study the possibility of requiring heavy trucks to use Fifth Avenue, which has a concrete base, or to utilize routes incorporating M-55 and US-23 as a means of protecting other streets. The city manager pointed out that truck routes must be provided by law. The entire matter is to be studied by city officials and the council.

Nelson Bean and Aussie Recall WWII Experiences

Recalling some of the experiences they shared 27 years ago aboard a Dutch troop ship in the South Pacific during World War II are Fielding Chippendale of Brisbane, Australia, and Nelson Bean of East Tawas.

Chippendale, now director of the agricultural chemical laboratory branch, state department of primary industries at Brisbane, is currently on a four-month business tour which will take him around the world visiting industries which provide agricultural chemicals.

Renewing the acquaintance with Bean, an employee of the Isosco Road Commission, is a sideline of his 14-day stay in the United States.

The two men first met in 1944 when Bean, then a gunnery sergeant in the United States Army aboard a Dutch ship commanded by the Australian government, gave Chippendale a "one-way ticket" to Ora Bay, New Guinea.

Before leaving for the South Pacific, Bean's uncle, Judge Herman Dehnke of Harrisville, suggested that if Nelson ever reached Australia, he should contact a friend of the judge's living in Brisbane. Bean later met the judge's friend and was told that Chippendale, his son-in-law of three weeks, was about to embark aboard one of the Dutch troop ships in the harbor.

As it turned out, Chippendale was aboard Bean's ship. Bean, who had charge of a 30-man United States Army contingent which operated anti-aircraft weapons for the Australians, entertained the Aussie soldier for three weeks. Being in charge of his unit, Bean had a stateroom aboard ship.

When the Australian soldiers reached a staging island for the invasion of Ora Bay, it was the last time the two men were together until last Friday afternoon, when Bean met Chippendale at Detroit Metropolitan Airport.

Since World War II, the friends have exchanged Christmas cards each year but, because of being a half a world apart, never thought they would see each other again. Arrangements for the side trip to East Tawas for the reunion were made during plans for Chippendale's round-the-world itinerary.

The stop here by Chippendale completes the first 15,000 miles of his trip, which has taken him to New Zealand, Hawaii, California, British Columbia and Itasca, New York.

"I'm spending a fortnight here in the United States," commented the Aussie, "and I will leave Wednesday morning to visit laboratories in Tennessee, North Carolina Univer-

sity and the Department of Agriculture at Washington, D. C." His next stops will be in England, Holland, Germany and Switzerland before attending the eighth annual international congress on irrigation and drainage in Bulgaria.

Chippendale said he did not expect to find snow here on Easter and one of his thrills was riding in a car on the ice of Tawas Bay. The two friends have been looking at pictures of Dutch troop ships on which Bean sailed, recalling and comparing notes on their war experiences. Before leaving, Chippendale gave Bean an authentic Australian army bush hat used during the war.

Courses at Oscoda

Four courses are being offered in Oscoda by Central Michigan University's off campus education office. Registration will be Tuesday and Thursday, April 11 and 13, according to the first class meeting. Enrollment and classes will be at 7:00 p. m. in the Oscoda High School.

Registering Tuesday, April 11, will be general zoology 218 and sociology 414, the family. Zoology earns three hours credit and has the prerequisite of biology 101. Dr. Arthur L. Knott is the instructor. Three hours graduate or undergraduate credit is earned in the sociology course which is being taught by Tim Schaffer. The prerequisite for this course is sociology 151.

Political science 324, black politics, and history 102, development of western civilization, will register Thursday, April 13. The political science course earns three hours undergraduate credit and deals with an analysis of the strategies of accommodation, separatism and radicalism employed by black leadership from the nineteenth century to the present. It is being taught by Thad Zolly. The history course deals with western civilization's development from about the 1700s and earns three hours credit. The instructor is Benjamin Taggie.

State Police

Give Report

Michigan State Police officers made 23,063 arrests in February, 19-97 for traffic and motor vehicle offenses and 3,106 on criminal complaints, monthly activity records show.

In addition, 530 juvenile traffic offenders were arrested and 835 delinquent minors apprehended.

Troopers assisted 4,707 motorists, investigated 9,611 cars, issued 28,529 verbal warnings to drivers and made 26,092 property and 2,975 liquor inspections.

Department vehicles traveled 2,065,831 miles, of which 1,033,906 were on traffic patrol, the other half in investigating criminal and other complaints.

Breath tests for suspected drunk drivers were given by Michigan police agencies to 2,025 drivers. There were 1,607 ratings of intoxication, 310 of impairment and 108 others indicating little or no intoxicant effect. Test refusals numbered 462.

May Honor Mayors-Pioneers With New TC Street Names

Planners Give Thoughts On New Bridges

Tawas City Planning Commission is considering recommendations for changing the names of several streets as a means of reducing confusion for motorists. Possible new designations being studied include substitution of the names of former mayors or pioneer families.

At its last meeting, the city council turned the problem of present confusing street signs over to the planning commission. A number of streets have numerical designations, which leads to confusion with a First Street and a First Avenue, a Second Street and a Second Avenue, for example.

Present streets named after pioneer families would remain unchanged. A few examples include Whittemore, named after the original founder of the city and county; Mathews, Whittemore's brother-in-law, who financed the original settlement here; Murphy, honoring the first mayor; Hamilton, an early mayor; Harris Avenue, honoring a pioneer family.

The matter is to receive more study before the planning commission makes its recommendations to the city council.

At its meeting Thursday night, the planning commission recommended that Mathews Street and First Street bridges be given first consideration in a bridge replacement program, followed by Sixth Avenue over Dead Creek and then Whittemore Street bridge.

At its meeting two weeks ago, the city council decided it would utilize modern wood construction in its proposed bridge replacement program. All city-owned bridges over the Tawas River and one over Dead Creek have deteriorated to a point where repair is impractical.

Through its investigation, the council discovered that cost of wooden bridges would be much less than concrete and steel structures, that modern wooden bridges meet or exceed state load restrictions. In addition, wooden bridges have a life span comparable to other types of construction and it was felt that wooden bridges would add to the aesthetic beauty of the river.

At recent meetings of the Tawas City Businessmen's Association, it has been recommended that the city consider replacing the Whittemore Street bridge with a covered wooden bridge.

It was pointed out that there are only four covered bridges in the state and one here would be a great tourist attraction. One of the state's original covered bridges was constructed in 1832.

Former Police Chief Throws Hat in Ring for Sheriff Post

George Westcott, 46, a veteran police officer and lifetime resident of Iosco County, Thursday announced his candidacy for Iosco County Sheriff on the Republican ticket.

Westcott's career as a police officer started in 1955 when he worked as a part time patrolman under George Ruth, Tawas City police chief, and later under Chief Frank Roti.

He was commissioned as a deputy sheriff of the county in the original organization of Iosco's civil defense program.

He was appointed acting chief of police of Tawas City in 1965 to fill the vacancy created by the retirement of Chief Roti. He was appointed chief of police later that year and held the position until June of 1971, when he accepted the position of detective sergeant with the county sheriff's department, a position which he now holds.

Westcott received police training at Alpena Community College and has attended seminars on drugs, bombings, youth problems, homicides and numerous other police schools.

Attending schools in Tawas City, he served in the United States Navy during World War II, with two years overseas duty in the European Theatre.

He was employed by Bublitz Oil Company for 14 years following his return from service.

Westcott has been active in community youth programs, having coached teams in both Knott and Pony Leagues for 10 years. He participated in the Michigan Youth Services program at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, as well as serving as a neighborhood commissioner and

committee member of the Tawas City Boy Scout Troop for six years. He is a member of the Tawas Braves Booster Club, the National Child's Safety Council for six years, Tawas City Volunteer Fire Department for 21 years, an honorary member of the Wurtsmith NCO Club, past commander of Jesse C. Hodder American Legion Post, the North-

eastern Law Enforcement Association, the National Sheriff's Association, the Charles C. Miller Lodge of Fraternal Order of Police and a former member of the Michigan Police Chiefs Association.

He and his wife, the former Wilma Jane Wideman, are parents of four children, three sons and one daughter. They have one grandchild.



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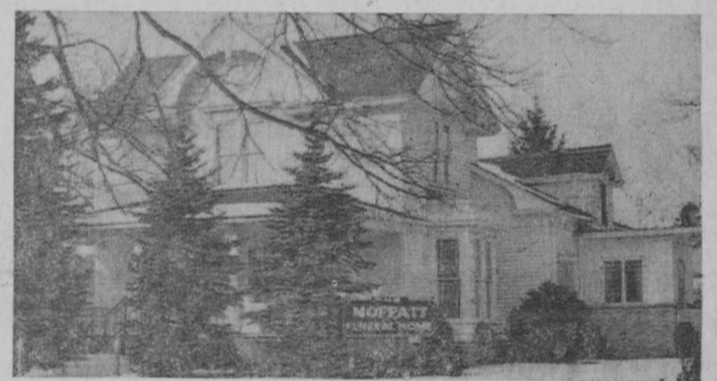

Save Money By Taking Telephone When You Move

Michigan Bell has introduced the latest in "do-it-yourself" plans which could save you \$5 if you are moving. By arranging with Bell in advance, you can now take the telephone along with your furniture and receive a credit for your efforts.

The plan is called "Snip and Take," according to Howard L. Haight, local Michigan Bell manager. It is designed, he said, not only to save the customer at moving time but to help the company reduce costs as well.

To take advantage of "Snip and Take," a customer merely has to advise the nearest Michigan Bell office in advance of the day of the move and the day new service should be installed, he said.

"Then on moving day, the customer simply cuts the cord next to the small connecting box on the wall with a knife or pair of scissors and takes the phone with him," explained Haight.

He stressed that there is absolutely no danger of any electrical shock when cutting the cord.

"The set is given to the installer

when he arrives to connect service at the customer's new residence. In return, the customer is given a receipt for the set and his account is credited for \$5."

Should the move be out of the customer's local area—such as a move from Detroit to Traverse City—or out of Michigan Bell territory, the credit is still available, he said. In those cases, the customer can take the snipped sets to the nearest Bell public office for credit.

Though more than one set may be returned, the maximum credit is \$5 per move, he noted.

There are some sets which are not included such as standard dial and Touch-Tone wall phones. However, Trimming wall set receivers can be snipped next to the wall mounting and portable phones can be unplugged and moved.

Prior to the plan's state-wide introduction, he said, it was tried successfully in several northeastern Detroit suburbs.

He emphasized that customers should call a Bell office if they have questions before any phones are snipped.

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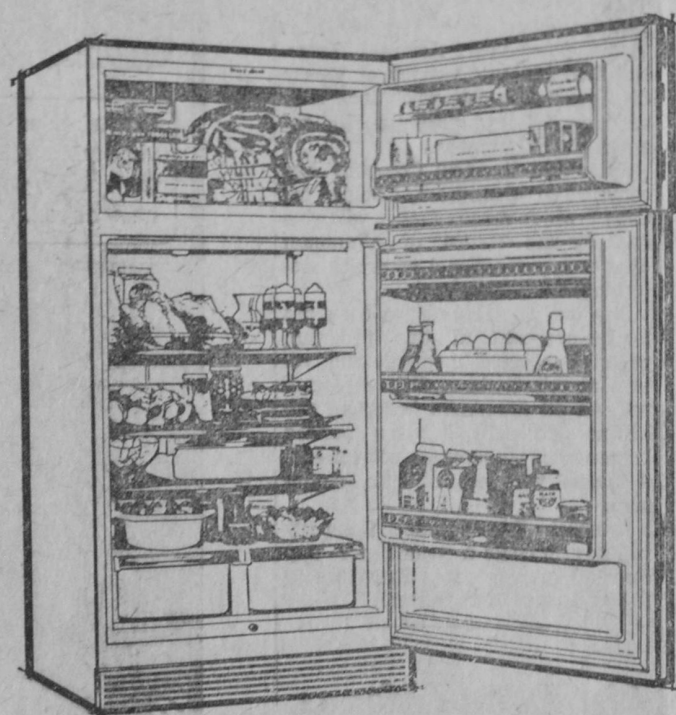

List Answers to Important SS Questions

Question: My 18-year-old son has been getting monthly social security checks since his father died. He is going to get a job for the summer vacation this year. Will he stop getting his monthly benefit checks when he starts working?

Answer: It depends on his earnings for the whole year. A student can continue to get benefits for all months in a year in which he earns \$1,680 or less for the year in wages or self-employment. If he exceeds \$1,680, then \$1 in benefits is withheld for every \$2 of earnings up to \$2,880. Above \$2,880, an additional \$1 in benefits is withheld for every \$1 earned. Regardless of how much his yearly earnings are, however, he can still receive a benefit payment for any month in which he neither earns \$140 or more nor performs substantial services in self-employment.

If your son figures his summer earnings will exceed \$1,680, he should notify social security as soon as possible, even before he starts working. Then, we can take action to stop some or all of his monthly cash payments for the summer work months rather than have him get the

checks and have to pay the money back.

Question: When I got married recently I wrote my new name on my social security card. Should I do anything else?

Answer: Yes. You need to fill out a form to change your name on your social security record kept in Baltimore, Maryland. You can get that form from any social security office. After you send it to us, we will mail you a new social security card showing your new name and the same number you were originally issued.

Question: I am enrolled in both parts of medicare and I need new dentures. Will medicare pay for them?

Answer: No, medicare does not cover such items as dentures, hearing aids or eye glasses.

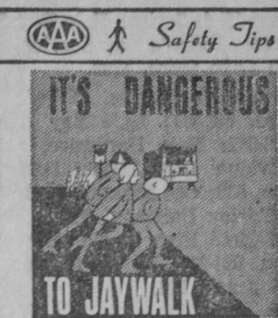

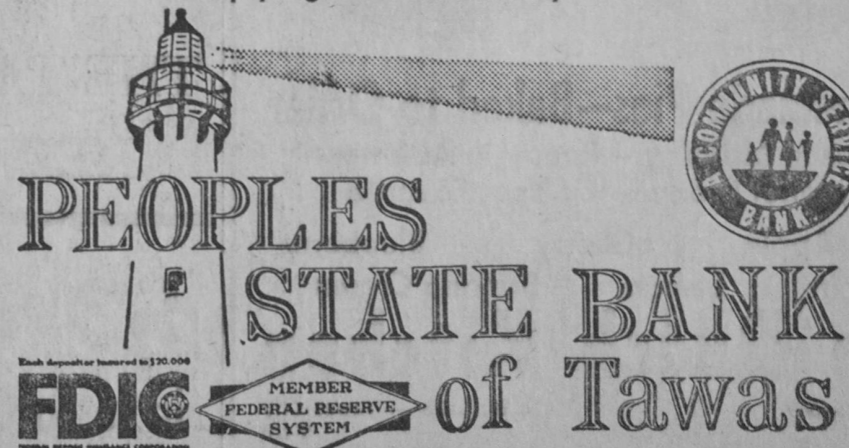

Prescott's Bill on Reclamation Gets Senate Approval

State Rep. George Prescott, Tawas City, has won his lengthy battle to strengthen land reclamation laws in the State of Michigan. The state senate gave final legislative approval March 29 to Prescott's bill amending legislation passed last year requiring the reclamation of lands used for mining metallic minerals. The bill now goes to Governor Milliken for his signature.

Prescott's bill removes the word "metallic" from the previous law, requiring the restoration of lands from which any mineral is mined.

The reclamation laws will now include minerals that were previously exempt from the law such as gypsum, limestone, dolomite and shale. "I am extremely pleased about the passage of this legislation. Those of us in the Tawas City, Alpena and Rogers City areas can best appreciate the significance of the enactment of this bill. From now on the literally thousands of acres of mining lands to be mined in the future can be restored to a useable condition. To do less would be a serious neglect of our precious land resources," Prescott said.
