

Critical Millage Vote Aug. 29 at Hale Area School

Tuesday, August 29, is the day when voters of Hale Area School District will decide if district schools are to operate for more than 47 days during the 1972-73 term.

Coming right down to the wire as preparations are being made to open doors for the fall term is a most critical millage vote.

Time for another vote will run out after this election and, according to Supt. Paul Keene, "we have just enough money to operate until November 1—it is now up to the people to make the decision."

The proposal being submitted to voters for the second time in the past three months is a renewal of nine mills and an additional 3/4 mills, making a total voted operational tax package of 12 1/4 mills.

The nine mills expiring had been approved for one year in August 1971 by an eight-vote margin. The 3/4 mills are needed to cover additional operational expenses when the new school, now under construction, is completed.

Recently, Keene stated: "I can't help it if this district is growing—

can't help it if the tax structure is the way it is. Because of our high valuation, we just do not get as much state aid as other districts, but I don't make the laws. This area is still in a better position to finance its schools than most other sections of the state."

Identical millage proposals were approved in June by voters at Au Gres-Sims and Mio, plus a 14-mill operational tax approved at Atlanta. All of the above schools are members of the same conference with which Hale Area School is affiliated.

Keene is now in his second term as superintendent at Hale Area School. But the die had been cast 15 years ago for the community to retain its high school, when it was decided that the district would not reorganize with other area districts. Then, in

December 1970, voters approved a bond issue to construct a 1.6 million dollar junior and senior high school by a narrow margin.

"I can't imagine Hale without a high school—take away the school and the community would lose its identity and a lot of pride. The people take pride in their educational program, as well as the many extra curricular activities, including band, football, basketball and class plays. Booster clubs have been organized to finance band uniforms, football field lights and equipment which was just not obtainable through taxes."

Keene said that only a minimal educational program is actually being offered to students of the school, but a few new offerings, including expanded vocational training, will be provided in the new school facilities.

The superintendent felt that the millage proposal would be approved by voters at the annual election.

"We had a good year and we are trying to do something, but the millage defeat caused considerable delay in making plans for the fall term. I have had to work on four different millage elections since taking over as superintendent and it is taking time that I should be spending on our educational program."

The superintendent said he really did not know what would happen if the millage proposal is defeated for a second time. "If we are forced to close our doors November 1, I am sure the state would step in, but I am sure the people would not like the consequences," said Keene.

Possible state action could include dividing the present school district

between other school districts of the area, but this would offer no real solution as facilities would have to be constructed by those other districts to handle the new students.

"Or the state could come in and assess the necessary money to operate the school—I really don't know. In any event, the people would still have to pay taxes to retire bonds for construction of the new school building."

In addition to the financial problem, the school will have to find room for another 60 new students this fall. The school was overcrowded last year with 330 students in junior and senior high school and 410 in the elementary grades.

Because of delays in receiving materials, the new school is not expected to be ready for occupancy until

December 1—or later. The school's new shop facilities are being completed this week and the old shop building is to be converted for use as elementary classrooms, which should relieve part of the new student load.

Another problem caused by enrollment of the new students is that there will be an additional cost for transportation. Another bid is to be purchased along with hiring an additional driver.

Any way that one looks at the Hale Area School picture, August 29 is a critical day for education in that community. There are no frills in Northern Michigan school facilities—only a basic education is offered.

It has been recommended that, when a voter goes to the polls on August 29, he views the progress which has taken place in the community

during the past few years. Facing east from M-65, on the left will be found the expanded fairgrounds and the township fire hall; in the center is the new Hale Area School under construction; at right is the township hall. Turning around and looking south, the viewer can catch a glimpse of the new Huron Forest Medical Center. Directly to the west is the new football field and present school facilities.

All of this construction has given the Western Isoco County community one of the best civic centers in Northern Michigan and at a time when this area is expanding rapidly because of faster freeway travel. The community is in an excellent position to take advantage of growth when a new freeway is constructed in the future.

Two Proposals for W-P Voters

Whittemore-Prescott Area School District will vote in a special election on Thursday, August 31, at the Whittemore - Prescott High School. Polls will be open from 10:00 a. m. until 8:00 p. m. Any resident 18 years of age, a resident of the school district for 30 days and the State of Michigan for six months is eligible to vote. A voter does not need to be registered.

The first proposition will be a renewal of the present five mills which expired this year. It will be for a one-year period. This is a renewal and will not increase taxes in any way.

The second proposition will be one mill for one year and will be an increase of one mill over last year but the same rate that was levied the preceding year.

The first proposition is necessary if the school district is to receive its full state aid. The school has received a letter stating this from the Michigan Department of Education.

Last year, the board of education and superintendent felt that the millage could be dropped one mill and still operate the school. On September 2, electors approved a drop in the millage from six mills to five mills. After the budget was set and the decrease in millage by one mill was approved, the state proceeded to make three cuts in the district's state money. First, the money for community school programs, which was one million dollars, was cut from the state budget. This caused a loss in revenue to the Whittemore-Prescott Area Schools of about \$7,500. In February, the sum of \$7,363 was withheld from the state aid check

and again in April \$7,363 was taken out leaving the state aid short by \$14,726. All in total, the school district lost about \$22,226 in revenue it had planned on when the September 2 election was held. If the board of education and superintendent had known of these cuts, they would have never decreased the millage. With this action, it was as if the school had actually cut two mills.

Proposition two is on the ballot to recover one mill of this loss. It is being voted on separately so that it will not interfere with the five mills which is essential for collecting full state aid.

Candidates File Election Expenses

Campaign expenses of eight candidates for sheriff in the recent primary election totaled \$9,375.48, according to information filed Friday with County Clerk Keith Papas.

Under state law, each candidate is required to list expenses for campaign advertising, as well as to list names of contributors.

Expenses of the various candidates are as follows: John B. Koenig, \$1,662.53; Keith D. Dobson, \$1,932.84; Louis L. Sokola, \$355.29; James Finley, \$60.16; Francis J. Block, \$1,670.00; George Westcott, \$1,120.58; Donald J. Docking, \$889.42; Dale Snyder, \$1,689.66.

A report filed by State Rep. George A. Prescott indicated a total of \$4,013.45 was expended in his campaign.

Triple Homicide Suspect Captured

A 47-year-old Linden resident, who was apprehended here Sunday and held on a fugitive warrant for investigation of a double homicide at Ft. Myers, Florida, was turned over Monday to Genesee County authorities as the prime suspect in the 1971 murder of his mother at Flint.

Max D. McCabbin, described by a fugitive bulletin as being a "chronic polo victim," was arrested Sunday night at a dwelling on Townline Road.

Michigan State Police at East Tawas were notified by Florida authorities Sunday that McCabbin may be staying at the home of a relative on Townline Road. He was taken into custody in a bedroom of the dwelling by two state police troopers, backed up by sheriff's department and Tawas City Police Department officers.

According to the Florida bulletin, McCabbin was the prime suspect in a double homicide at Ft. Myers in which the skulls of two victims were crushed with a blunt instrument.

While being held at the Isoco County Jail on a detainer for Florida authorities, Flint police notified law agencies here that McCabbin was wanted in connection with the murder of his mother, who died as the result of a crushed skull in what was then considered to be a robbery.

He was arrested here and charged with murder. He was returned to Flint Monday night to be arraigned on the charge.

Permit Goes to TC Attorney for Ruling

Building applications approved during the past two weeks by Tawas City Department of Public Works are as follows:

H. R. Hilbert, remodel and enlarge lounge at Tawas Lanes and install two pool tables, \$1,200; Roy Stewart, Beech Street, construct 24 by 42-foot residence, \$15,000; Walter Moeller, 116 First Avenue, enclose front porch with glass windows, \$300; Alvin Kendall, 509 Tenth Avenue, eight by 10-foot wood tool shed, \$200.

A recommendation on disposition of a building application submitted July 21 by Dr. E. W. Phillips for construction of a 30 by 60-foot professional building on M-55 across from Tawas Hospital, was turned over to the city attorney.

Confusion exists as to zoning of the property following action by the council in November 1967. That year, the planning commission recommended rezoning of the Barkman Lumber Company property from industrial to commercial, but excluded the parcel in question. Following a public hearing, the council rezoned the lumber yard property and the property in question as commercial, but did not specifically determine the form of commercial zoning.

The property on which the proposed professional building is to be constructed is not presently served by city sewer, although engineering has been approved to serve that entire area. It has been reported to the council that Phillips has received permission from the health department to construct a septic tank system.

ET Re-Submits Application for Sewer Funds

An application for a federal grant to aid in construction of secondary sewage treatment facilities has been re-submitted to the state water resources commission by the City of East Tawas.

This action was taken Monday night following notification that the city's previous application had not been approved under current federal funding. The application was re-submitted under a new funding program.

Under the program, the city seeks assistance in financing a proposed \$1,056,000 secondary sewage treatment plant. Funding would include 55 percent from the federal government, 25 percent from the state and 20 percent from local sources.

Preliminary Talks on Water - Sewer

Preliminary direction for future water and sewer main extensions, along with sewer disposal plant additions, were approved Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

Developed by a committee consisting of City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz, Mayor John Brugger and Carl Libka, water board chairman, the study report was submitted last week to the water board. Following Monday night's action, the report is to be returned to the water board for further study.

Emphasizing that the report consisted of basic preliminary planning to give the water board direction on future expansion of the water and sewer system, Brugger said that the ultimate goal was to develop a program which could be handled by this community.

Estimated costs on the various projects were listed in the report, but no breakdown was given on the local portion to be financed by general obligation bonds, revenue bonds and special assessment districts.

While a portion of the plan is presently included in an application for federal funds to help finance a \$2,097,000 water and sewer project to serve Baldwin Township, East Tawas and Tawas City, plans have not been developed as yet for an additional distribution-collection system and sewage treatment plant for Tawas City.

It has been reported that an application filed separately by East Tawas for federal assistance in construction of a secondary disposal plant addition has not qualified under a federal point system. Bublitz said he planned to ask for a special meeting with East Tawas in order to discuss the possibility of a secondary treatment plant addition there to serve the entire area. It was felt that construction of two secondary treatment plants would be duplicating efforts, although it was not known if one plant would be feasible.

At this point, it is not known if Ta-

was City's proposed collection and distribution system will be eligible for a federal grant. If not, the plan could be financed through general obligation bonds to finance the city's share, along with either revenue bonds or special assessment districts to finance the share of property owners.

Sanitary sewer districts being proposed include the River Street area with 4,800 feet of mains and an estimated cost of \$122,250.

Other projects would include the Second Avenue lift station force main, the major sewer pumping station in the city which would connect directly with the sewage disposal plant. Some main for this project has been purchased and is on hand. Estimated cost of 2,700 feet of force main is \$32,400.

Other sewer construction would include Margo Street District, 2,900 feet, \$54,000; US-23, Elms Avenue to Woodward, 1,750 feet, \$43,750; US-23, Hobby Lot to Ninth Avenue, 1,100 feet, \$16,500; Victoria Lane to M-55, 700 feet, \$10,500.

Proposed sewer main construction would total 13,950 feet or 2.64 miles. It would service an estimated 186 parcels of property and would cost about \$279,400.

Estimated cost of disposal plant additions for secondary treatment and phosphate removal are \$550,000 for a mechanical plant and \$740,000 for a lagoon type plant. According to Bublitz, communities which have had plans approved by the federal government for treatment plants are now eligible for 80 percent participation under a new program. The city plans to contact Alabaster and Tawas Townships to determine if areas of those townships would be interested in participating in a federal grant for sewer facilities.

Under the plan being developed by Edmands Engineering for Baldwin Township, East Tawas and Tawas City, this city's portion would include a new 12-inch water transmis-

sion main from East Tawas, a 10-inch distribution main through the city, a 500,000-gallon elevated water storage tank. Estimated cost of this improvement would be \$408,000 and the estimated cost of the city's share would be \$81,600. The project consists of about 11,660 feet of water main.

Other improvements included in the discussion Monday night were a water loop for the southeast area of the city, costing \$31,000; a water loop for Harris Avenue, \$12,600; other extensions on Victoria Lane, \$5,600, and on Riverview Court, \$2,600.

The Edmands plan and the above mentioned additions would provide a greatly needed larger water main from East Tawas and would also give storage needed for peak demand days for industry, both now and in the future. It would give residents a greater volume of water, which would mean fewer times of decreased pressure. The looping plans would provide for a better quality of water.

Total of the above water improvements would require some 15,585 feet of water main and the total cost, including transmission, distribution and storage, amounts to \$459,800, with the city share to be about \$133,400.

Both Mayor Brugger and the city manager said the plans were "most ambitious" and Bublitz commented that it was almost "too much to hope for" to have the entire project approved for federal participation. The water plan probably would be given the first priority.

Ald. Edward Savage said that the River Street area sewer district, along with other sewer district plans, were necessary for development in the immediate future. He believed that the program, even if approved by the federal government, was several years in the future and felt that some investigation should be made as to possible local financing of some of the work.

Bublitz said that preliminary planning would be available in late September in order that the council make a decision if the city will proceed with the above projects.

Police Seek Youth Who Threatened ET Housewife

East Tawas Police Department is continuing its search for a young man seen in the area of 16 and 19 years, who posed as a newspaper subscription salesman, then broke into a home Monday morning and threatened a housewife with a knife.

Police Chief Donald Docking said the man, dressed in an army-type jacket and wearing tennis shoes, had been told by Mrs. Diana Oberlies of 312 Bridge Street, that she was not interested in subscribing to the newspaper. Mrs. Oberlies' husband, John, was at work at the time.

Mrs. Oberlies locked the front door

and the youth left the front porch. About 20 minutes later, Mrs. Oberlies looked out a window and saw the youth standing beside her side door. The youth then disappeared and she went next door to ask neighbors if they had seen him. The police chief said that a neighbor had talked to the youth earlier and apparently "thought he was OK."

Mrs. Oberlies returned home and, feeling uneasy, began checking all the rooms in the home. Finally, when she checked a closet in her bedroom, she was confronted by the youth, who brandished a nine-inch hunting knife in his hand.

Mrs. Oberlies told police that she led the youth toward the front of the house, saying "let's talk this over." As she neared the front door, she grabbed her infant child from its crib and ran outside screaming for help and from neighbors.

Several neighbors spotted the youth as he ran out the front door. He ran around to the side of the house, was later seen on West Bay Street and last seen near the city park.

He was described as being five feet, seven inches, in height; weighed about 140 pounds, with blond hair and blue eyes.

Hodge sustained a fractured right leg and Cooper had possible internal injuries. They were transferred to McLaren Hospital, Flint, after treatment at Tawas Hospital.

Officers identified the driver of the car as Michael Brown, 17, Flint. The car spun around and stopped in the middle of the road after striking the bridge.

Gerald McMahan, Bay City, was treated at Tawas Hospital for shock Wednesday afternoon. He was a passenger in a car driven by Tracy E. Schrage, Hale, which was involved in an accident on M-55 at Rempert Road.

Three Flint youths were apprehended in connection with the theft





Young Fish Being Exploited

Endanger Saginaw Bay Perch Stock; DNR Program Ignored

Is there an abundance of yellow perch in Saginaw Bay? Not so, reports a biologist for the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, who told the Herald last week that the continued pressure by commercial netters would cause a severe setback to gains in perch stocks which have been enjoyed this season by sports fishermen in the Tawas area.

Answering a statement made by a commercial fisherman in an area daily newspaper last week that "there are more fish today in Saginaw Bay than the commercial fishermen and sports anglers can take out," Randy Eshenroder, DNR fisheries biologist, warned that the fish

being taken are almost entirely from one year class that just matured and made their first spawning this spring.

"This year class, the result of the 1969 spawning, is a larger than normal year class, that is being intensively fished at a very young age. In fact, 90 percent of the perch landed last fall by commercial fishermen were from this 1969 year class and these fish were taken before they matured. Although the 1969 year class is of good size it will be rapidly depleted by gill net fishing and we know that the younger year classes of perch in Saginaw Bay are not large enough to replace it," stated Eshenroder, who is assigned

to the Great Lakes Fishery Station at Alpena.

While gill netting has been banned in Saginaw Bay under the DNR's zone management rule of 1969, two gill netters have chosen to ignore the plan adopted by the natural resources commission. As an administrative rule of a state department, rather than a legislative act, there apparently is no means to prosecute violators—other than to suspend licenses. Such suspension is a lengthy process.

Fishing in the vicinity of Charity Islands, these gill netters set their nets and then stay to watch over them, rather than leaving the nets in the water overnight and lifting the next day. In this manner, fishermen are able to elude DNR patrol boats by removing their nets from the water on the approach of any suspicious looking craft, thereby avoiding confiscation of nets.

According to a quote in the Bay City Times, one of the fishermen boasted that he had lifted as high as 1,500 pounds of fish in two hours and then returned to port. The fisherman mentioned in the news story, however, was apprehended August 13 by DNR officers and entered a plea of "not guilty" to charges brought by Kenneth Myles, Isosco County prosecuting attorney, in district court. The prosecuting attorney is proceeding on a different section of the state statute.

While the DNR's zone management plan has been working in other sections of Lake Huron, it is not working in Saginaw Bay, where some gill netters have chosen to ignore it. Despite the ban on gill nets in outer Saginaw Bay during 1970 and 1971, commercial catches of perch from Saginaw Bay in 1971 were practically the same as in 1969—when gill nets could be used throughout Lake Huron. Because of the excessively high perch catches in 1970 and 1971, gill nets were banned entirely from Saginaw Bay in 1972. In 1971, gill nets accounted for two-thirds of the entire commercial catch of perch in Saginaw Bay and were considered to be the root of the problem there.

One thing which has happened to Saginaw Bay's perch stock since 1965—when size restrictions were first removed—is that older year classes of fish have been practically eliminated through the extreme pressure on young stocks. For instance, prior to 1965 there were three or four year classes of mature perch at one time and this tended to stabilize the perch stock.

As a consequence of removing size limits, the entire fishery—both legal and illegal commercial operations, as well as sport fishing—depends heavily on the young stock of fish. On the other side of the coin, removal of older stocks has resulted in a faster growth rate for the young fish, but this advantage is far out-weighted by loss of stabilization.

"What some commercial fishermen and the general public do not realize is that you really cannot accurately judge which year class a fish belongs to by the size of the fish. Varying conditions contribute to the growth of perch and females are larger than the males. Just because fish vary in size does not mean they are necessarily from a different year class," said Eshenroder.


The biologist said, too, that the perch stock in inner Saginaw Bay has a direct bearing on perch abundance in the Tawas Point to Point Lookout area. Inner Saginaw Bay is the major spawning and nursery grounds for perch and perch migrate from here to outlying areas, such as Tawas Bay. By 1967, the perch stock in the Tawas area had been destroyed by excessive commercial fishing and did not recover in the ensuing years because of the continued presence of gill nets. With the implementation of zone management in 1970, which eliminated commercial fishing in the Tawas Point to Point Lookout area, perch have been making a comeback in this area. This comeback is now being jeopardized by illegal gill net fishing.

To insure a good stock of perch in the Tawas area, no commercial fishing can be allowed in outer Saginaw Bay and the take of perch in inner Saginaw Bay must be reduced and controlled. Under these conditions, the inner bay stock can be built up and increasing migration to the outer bay will occur.

Tawas Bay was once known for its fine fishing and perch provided a principal attraction for the multi-million-dollar tourist and resort business along Saginaw Bay and Lake Huron.

"If one wishes to make an assessment of the current situation, just compare the value of perch to the huge tourist resort industry of this region to the \$26,000 taken in annually through commercial fishing licenses in the entire State of Michigan," said Eshenroder.

If it is a matter of economics rather than protection of a natural resource to be enjoyed by all, there is no comparison between the two.

A Public Stand On Hale Area School Millage Election

Pearsall's wishes to take a public stand on the school millage election of August twenty-nine:

We sincerely urge you to vote "yes."

The millage asked for to operate our schools is the amount needed to get the job done. The amount is not excessive; this can be verified by the school administration for any of us who are worried or doubtful.

Hale is supposedly a sampling of American life. As Americans we share and participate in goals for ourselves as a society. As a people we have always encouraged growth, stability and opportunity in our communities, and the schools are prime means of achieving these.

This election is a classic problem in democracy. On the one hand, a great beauty of democracy is the ability for each of us to say "no"—but closely connected with this blessing is the great obstacle of democracy, which is the freedom to say "no" when an honest inspection of the whole situation really will show us that a "yes" is in the true public interest.

But, are we being hoodwinked, taken for a ride? The school nearing completion looks awesomely fine, and therefore some of us may interpret this to mean extravagance. The building is not fancy; it is functional—it looks good not because of wasteful spending but because the building materials and know how of 1972 are this much different and this much better than those used in the older building at the time it was built.

Agreed, the tax structure for financing local schools in Michigan is unfair and definitely needs to be changed. It is going to be changed; the wheels are turning now. But, we have to face facts: The failure of Hale to finance the education of its children will not panic Lansing into quickly re-vamping the tax laws—legislative change is never a rapid thing, and our children need schooling right now, as every year, even as we impatiently wait for tax-justice to catch up with our needs.

In one sense, a millage election is not simply a political decision—it is also a measure of our ethical strength as a community. We always have our own consciences to settle with, and if we wonder whether everything about the new school is necessary, we might also consider how necessary are some other things our money goes for. After all, when we think about it, it's the same money, isn't it? And if things like character and helpfulness are best tested when the going is tough, then how well can we argue that providing school-expenses must be rejected on grounds of "economic conditions" or "bad times?"





Canning season is in full swing for another year—and the phone is just as busy as ever with that eternal question, is it all right to use beet sugar for jam, jelly, pickles, etc.?

Some older recipes specify cane sugar, but you can use beet sugar with the same good results and it will probably cost a few cents less besides. That is good news anytime but especially so when you are buying in quantity for home canning.

When you buy sugar, choose the largest size package you can conveniently store and then be sure you store it properly. Air tight containers are best. They keep the moisture out of white sugar and keep it in the brown sugar. It is the truth that Americans each eat about 100 pounds of sugar each year. Less than 30 percent is just plain sugar bought and eaten. Most of it is purchased in processed foods, such as soft drinks, bakery and cereal prod-

ucts, candies, ice creams and other canned and frozen foods.

A few other pickling tips: Granulated salt (called "sack or bag salt" by some because of its packaging) is better than table salt for pickles. Table salt contains chemicals that prevent lumping and is often iodized, two conditions that may cause cloudiness and darkening of the brine.

While it is alright to use brown elder vinegar (and some prefer it because of its flavor and aroma), the white vinegar gives a clearer brine and better color to the pickles.

It is far too dangerous to process foods in the oven from several standpoints. First of all, it is dangerous because the jars may explode, especially the lighter weight jars being marketed today. And secondly, it is dangerous because the temperature of the food in the jars during oven processing does not get high enough to insure destruction of spoilage bacteria in vegetables. So, whatever you do, never process foods in the oven.

Estimated Social Security Benefits Are Available

Question: I am looking ahead and trying to figure my retirement income. Is it possible for me to find out how much my monthly social security payments will be?

Answer: Yes. Any social security office can give you an estimate of

your social security payments. It is a good idea to talk to a representative when you are beginning to think about retirement. In addition to giving you an estimate of what your payments will be when you retire, he can also tell you what papers and other information you will need when you apply.

Question: I will be 65 near the end of this year and I am planning to retire then. Since my earnings up to the time I retire will be well over \$1,680, should I delay applying for retirement payments until early next year?

Answer: Definitely not. You should apply for payments about three months before your 65th birthday. Regardless of your earnings for the year, you can still get a social security payment for any month in which you neither earn \$140 in wages nor perform substantial services in self-employment. You can also apply for medicare protection at that time.

\$74,485 Building**

Proposed plans for a \$74,485 building to house offices of the social welfare department were approved Wednesday by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners.

the EDITOR:**

Dear Editor:

This is a message to the voters of the Hale Area School District—to exemplify the imperative need of voting a resounding "YES" on the amount of millage recommended. our school. Fundamentally, we have a fine educational set-up. We have capable teachers, able coaches in sports and a fine band leader. I, for one, follow all the football and basketball games closely and I admire our band. I was very happy when they obtained new uniforms. I was privileged to see them march at the fair.

Have you ever thought of criticizing or even lambasting the government for spending two billion dollars on an experimental project and then throwing the whole program out as a failure. Would you not say this is wasting money? And, brothers and sisters, if the millage program fails to pass, the school will stand idle and you will still be taxed to pay for it.

Even if the government took over, which is very unlikely, it would be run in a haphazard manner. Secondly, when the government operates any kind of project, it costs twice as much money as if operated privately.

The Village of Hale has all the potential to operate its own school. This school is indispensable to the community. Now that we have the school, it is inconceivable that money to operate it should be denied by the taxpayers. If this happens, it will be synonymous to suicide in the educational system in Hale. It must not happen!

This message is not meant to provoke you. It is meant to help you abandon prejudice and use concrete thinking before you go to the polls. May you seek the help of almighty God in making your decision.

I humbly admit I appealed to my God to help me to make this plea

for the good of my beloved hometown.

Now, I appeal to you voters. First, I appeal to all the fathers, mothers, grandfathers and grandmothers who have children or grandchildren attending or who will attend school. Let us make it unanimous! Next, I appeal to all who are 18 or over to get out and vote for the millage. Lastly, I appeal to the folks who have retired around Hale. Let us be proud to see our little village go forward, to be a good example of what can be accomplished by pulling together. Otherwise, may God help us, for we will fail to face the real issue.
