Tawas City Council Discusses Priorities for Federal Money

A discussion on how best to utilize its first federal revenue sharing check of \$17,640 was held Monday night by Tawas City Council.

In addition, this special meeting was called to discuss hiring a new police chief and for discussing matters of solid waste disposal.

With another check to be received in January giving Tawas City a total of \$35,200 for 1972, Tawas City officials are engaged in a thorough evaluation of a variety of suggested projects under which this money might be expended.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said Tuesday morning that, barring any mistakes in calculations by the federal government, the city is receiving nearly \$10,000 more in federal funds than had been anticipated earlier this year.

Next year, payments are to be made quarterly under this program.

Under federal regulations, this money cannot be used to lower local operational taxes. Different projects under consideration here include approach work for new bridges, equip-

ment purchases, parks and recreation, streets and storm sewers and an addition to or improvements to the city hall.

Although the cost of all of the above programs has not been totaled, the federal revenue sharing money would not finance all of them. The council and city manager are now developing priorities for the expenditure of these funds.

Bublitz stated that the city definitely was going to give consideration to possibly utilizing the federal money, along with other local funds and special assessment districts, for street and storm sewer construction work.

He was authorized by the council to obtain estimates on the cost of blacktopping major streets under a long-range program. An asphalt plant is to be located in the area next summer which would provide an excellent opportunity for such work.

Resignation of Police Chief Dennis Frank was effective Tuesday and the city is advertising for a replacement. Salary of the police chief is to be based on experience and qualifications. In the meantime, night patrolmen are to serve the city.

Two voluntary bids were received for garbage removal. Bublitz stated that a bid was not received from James Quarters, who presently provides sanitary collection service. The council indicated Monday night it was pleased with past service provided by Quarters.

The city is to advertise for bids for sanitary collection under two different programs, one for residential and the second for residential and all commercial. Bids would be asked for the contractor to provide a sanitary landfill area or for utilization of the present landfill.

A letter from the Tawas City Garden Club, pointing out the need for a civic center and supporting the council in any plan to purchase the West Parish building of Tawas United Methodist Church as a meeting place for organizations, as well as a possible site for the city library and election polls, was read to the council.

School Board Opens Bus Bids

Inglis Ford Sales of Tawas City, with a bid of \$5,395 per unit, was low bidder on furnishing bus chassis to Tawas Area School. Other bids opened Monday night by the board of education included William Look and Sons, \$5,675.43 per unit; Ottawa Equipment Company, \$5,509.52 per unit or \$11,019.04 for two units; McKay Sales Company, \$5,632 per unit.

Great Lakes Coach Sales Company was low bidder on furnishing bus bodies at \$5,100 per unit. Other bids received on furnishing 66-passenger bodies included McFadden Corporation, \$5,151; Ward, \$5,150; Classroom, Incorporated, \$5,155.

Bids were accepted and are to be studied to determine if all specifications have been met. Contracts are to be awarded January 8.

Urges School Board Cooperation in MSU Management Plan

Dr. Carl Brandigan, a Michigan State University extension specialist and one of six placement directors with MSU, Monday night strongly urged Tawas Area Board of Education to "sit down with administrators" to develop school objectives and to participate in a cooperative evaluation of criteria to meet those objectives in order to better the process by which to educate children.

Tawas Area School is one of eight Michigan schools in which administrators are participating in a management by objectives program sponsored by MSU. The superintendent, principals, assistant principal and other members of the administrative team are attending week-end meetings at various locations in the state to discuss school problems and goals with other school administrators.

Input to this program by MSU has included experts in the field of sociology, psychology and labor relations. Two of the week-end sessions have been held on the MSU campus, while other meetings have been held at participating schools. Tawas Area School was the site of last week-end meeting.

Brandigan said that school operation had shown a major change in the past four years—"so different that it is almost like being in two different worlds. The change during the next five years will be as great or greater," he stated.

The MSU specialist stressed the fact that the board of education must take an active part in the school's evaluation program, which would annually evaluate effectiveness of the district's administrators and teaching staff to better the process of education. He said that, by law, it was the board's responsibility to evaluate the superintendent, which has been stressed since the inception of the program by Supt. Edward J. Barry.

In other business, discussion was held on the Michigan education assessment program, the results of which were announced last week. Considerable emotionalism concerning these tests of fourth and seventh grade students has been shown around the state. Principals stated Monday night that one of the problems concerning this test is that a variety of meanings of results can be gained by different interpretations.

Some people believe that the tests have been used for political purposes, in that National Defense Education funds and other funds have been allocated to those districts which have scored low on the tests.

Results of the tests indicated that fourth and seventh grade students of this district were fairly well clustered in the middle of achievement scores. This included testing in word relationships, reading, mechanics of written English and mathematics.

The assessment program indicated that 95 percent of the schools in Tawas Area's category had more staff members per child; this school's teachers had average experience of 13 years; 20 percent had a master degree and the average contracted salary was \$10,429. These figures were based on the 1971-1972 year, however, and do not represent the

gradual shift to younger starting teachers at the bottom of the salary scale, replacing teachers retiring at the top of the pay scale.

With state equalized valuation of \$822,045 per pupil, this district was among the top 16 percent in the state; local revenue per pupil amounted to \$356, about average in the state; \$253 in state aid per pupil, which puts this district in the low category because of the district's high valuation.

The report indicated that per pupil instructional expense amounted to \$448, which indicates that 94 percent of the schools spend more money per pupil than this district. Ninety-two percent of the schools had a higher current operating expense than Tawas Area's \$622 per pupil.

As a result of a study by the superintendent, the board of education authorized the expenditure of \$1,000 to purchase tables and chairs for the school's special education program, as well as to provide a storage area for that department.

The superintendent said it was the desire of special education to incorporate those students in regular programs whenever possible. An enrollment of 15 special education students has been reduced to 10 through this means.

Authorization was given by the board to furnish transportation to fifth grade students attending the Saginaw Shrine Circus on January 13.

Isosco Receives Half of Its Tax Statements

Delivery was received Monday on tax statements for all governmental units of Isosco County with the exception of the City of East Tawas, Plainfield and Oscoda Townships. These three units represent about one-half of the county's 25,000 property descriptions.

Mailing of tax statements to this county's property owners, normally prepared by Thanksgiving for a December 1 mailing, has been delayed through a breakdown of nine-year-old equipment in the county tax department.

As a result, Henry Oates, county tax equalization director, has had to "farm out" the tabulation of taxes on printed forms with two other Northern Michigan counties, Wexford and Roscommon.

"It looks like Roscommon will be set to go on preparation of the remaining tax statements and we hope to have them completed by the end of the month," stated Oates Tuesday morning.

In the meantime, personnel of his office have started work on preparing tax rolls and other information to be fed into computer equipment at Midland under a new system of data processing and tax bill preparation to serve this county in 1973.

Forest Money Being Distributed

Huron National Forest receipts, based on 102,628 acres of federal forest land in this county, were distributed as follows this week by County Treas. Edward Nelkie: Isosco County Road Commission, \$3,000; Tawas Area School District, \$1,878.25; Hale Area School District, \$2,504.65; Oscoda Area School District, \$5,008.37.

Jury Awards Damages For Attack by Dog

A six-man Isosco County Circuit Court jury awarded damages of \$1,650 Friday to a Bay City woman, who was bitten by a German shepherd dog owned by F. William Kerr, owner of the AuSable Inn, Oscoda.

Thelma Keyser, plaintiff, claimed that she had gone to the Oscoda establishment on July 2 for dinner and that she was attacked by the defendant's dog, "Thor." She asked damages of \$10,000.

Japanese National Dies With Foster Mother in Collision

A young Japanese man and his American foster mother of Harrisville were killed Thursday in a head-on crash on US-23, two tenths of a mile south of Martin Road, Alabaster.

Dead are Tadao Ito, 19, of Chegasadoi Chiba, Japan, and Mrs. Alice Ann Sanders, 73, Lake Street, Harrisville.

Seriously injured and rushed to Tawas Hospital were William F. Hartz, 83, and his wife, Charlotte, 81, both of Hubbard Lake. Following emergency treatment, the elderly couple was transferred to Saginaw General Hospital.

Investigating Michigan State Police from East Tawas said that Ito, driving the Sanders car, was headed north and ran off the highway on the right side. He apparently lost control of the vehicle on the icy shoulder, brought the car back on the highway for 144 feet and then skidded 69 feet sideways before colliding with the southbound Hartz vehicle.

Ito and Mrs. Sanders, both dead at the scene, were pinned in the smashed vehicle.

Mrs. Sanders was the widow of the Rev. Leonard Sanders, retired Methodist minister, who had served his congregation on the west side of Bay City before the couple moved to Harrisville. While residing in Alcona County, he had been a supply minister at Harrisville, Hubbard Lake and the Mikado Indian Mission.

Ito, who had lived in a Japanese orphanage, came to Harrisville on November 19 to reside with Mrs. Sanders. He had been enrolled in Alcona Community School.

A Harrisville resident described Ito as a well-mannered and well liked young man. Ito had been returning from Detroit with his foster mother after spending two days at the Japanese consul's office working out visa arrangements in order to continue his residency in this country.

Mr. and Mrs. Hartz were listed in fair condition at Saginaw General Hospital.

Miss Otis Honored for Long Service to Quota Club and to Community

Miss Edna Otis of East Tawas, retired editor-publisher of the old Isosco County Gazette and active in civic affairs of this county for 70 or more years, was honored Monday night for her dedicated service to Isosco Quota Club.

A surprise "night of recognition" was featured at the club's regular meeting held at the Wabun, Oscoda. Mrs. Elwood Bronson and Mrs. E. John Moffatt had charge of the program.

Mrs. Bronson and Mrs. Moffatt opened the program by reading advertisements and news articles out of two old copies of the Gazette for 1907 and 1927, comparing prices and services of yesterday and today.

Born in Baldwin Township, Miss Otis' parents came to Isosco County from New York State shortly after the Civil War. She was valedictorian of her graduating class at East Tawas High School, taught rural schools of this county for several years and was then employed by C. R. Jackson, owner of the Gazette. She became editor of that newspaper in 1916 and continued its operation for 30 years.

Presently operating an antique shop on West State Street, once jokingly claiming she keeps working to "keep out of jail and off welfare," she has authored numerous booklets and articles concerning early Isosco County history. Her latest book concerning "sawdust days" of the Tawas, along with a history of Isosco, is being prepared by John Cumming, director of Clarke Historical Library at Central Michigan University and president of the Michigan Historical Society. Delivery is expected early next year.

During her long career, she has served on the board of education; played an active role in local Republican politics, serving both county and state GOP committees; worked with the USO program during World War II at the then Oscoda Air Base; was chairman of centennial celebrations for Isosco County in 1957 and at

East Tawas in 1962; has delivered numerous addresses before schools of the county and has lent a helping hand to local college students in preparation of papers concerning county history.

She has been active in many social civic organizations, as well as being active in the Methodist church. She

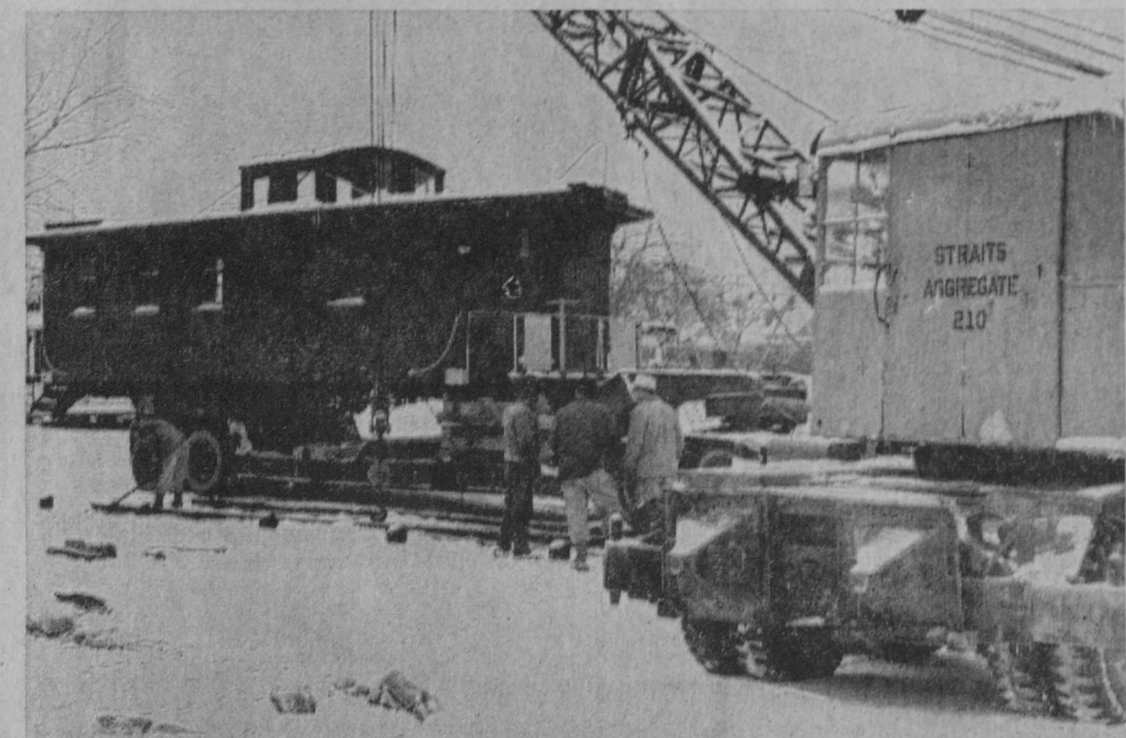
was a charter member of Isosco Quota Club in 1954. She has held several offices in that organization and was its president in 1959.

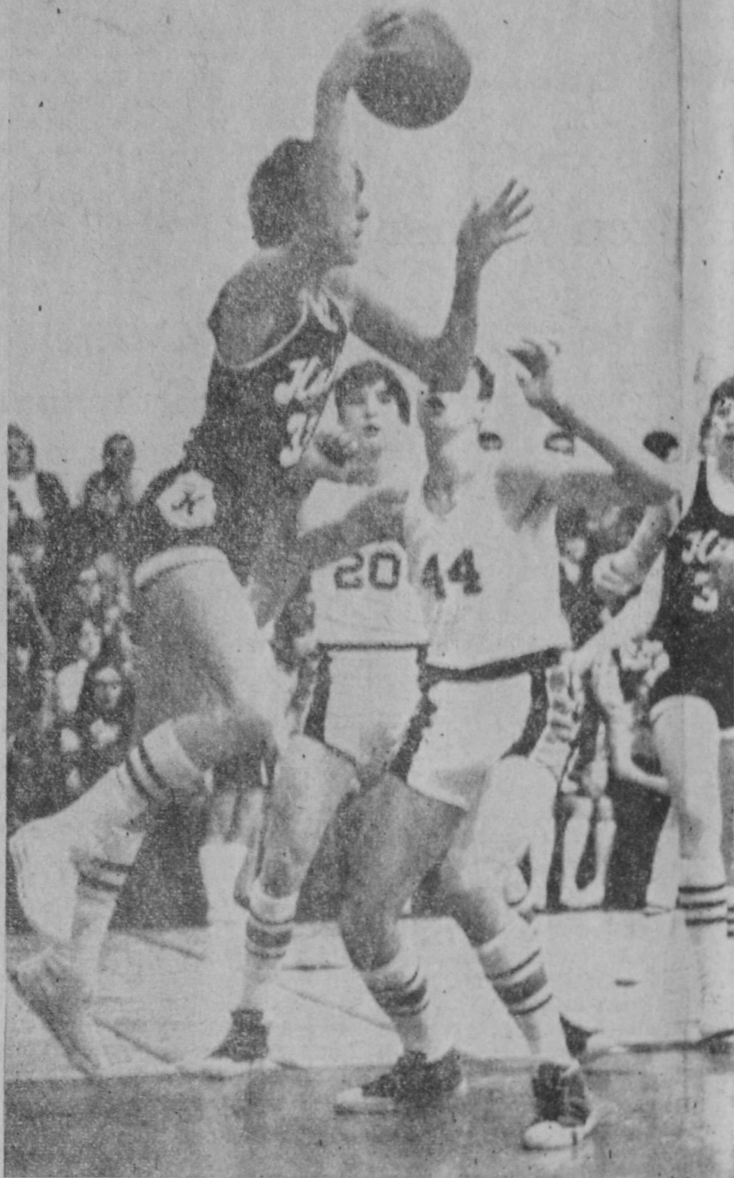

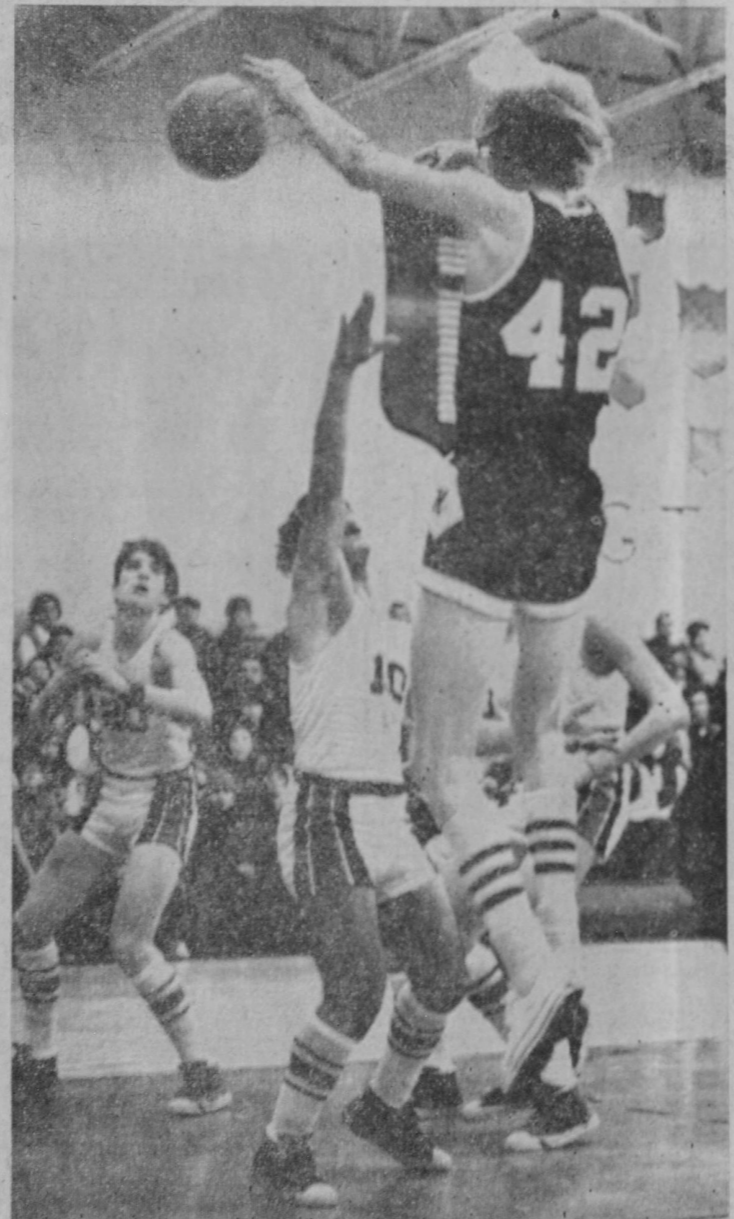

LETTER to the EDITOR

Letter to the Editor:

Tawas City needs a community center as a meeting place for various clubs and local activities. It is for this reason that this organization urges the city council to consider purchase of the Tawas United Methodist Church, West Parish building, and convert it into a public meeting place.

Besides being presently utilized as a meeting place for girl scouts, the Twentieth Century Club, the Tawas City Garden Club, for mental health meetings and other activities, it has

been suggested as an ideal location for the city library and for the election polls.

The building would provide quarters for an excellent civic center, with the present fellowship hall available for meetings and dinners, while the church proper could be used for larger meetings. Each "side" of the building is equipped with a furnace and, during the winter months, the church portion could be heated only when desired.

In addition, this property is centrally located and has excellent parking facilities with room for expansion of parking on the property. In 1940-41, Tawas City voters overwhelmingly supported construction of an auditorium at the school. Although intended originally for civic as well as school use, the building presently is being utilized to near full capacity by school activities, as it should be. This use by the school will not diminish in the future; it will be utilized even more fully, judging from enrollment growth in the school district.

The present church building can be purchased under a long-term contract without interfering with street construction and other improvements needed by the community. In the meantime, it could serve an important function to city government as well as to various organizations.

This is the second time in recent months that the Tawas City Garden Club has taken a stand on public affairs, instead of just sitting back and "wishing for answers" to community needs or grumbling about proposals beneficial to the entire community. Let's show others that this is a progressive community with an eye toward the present as well as to the future.

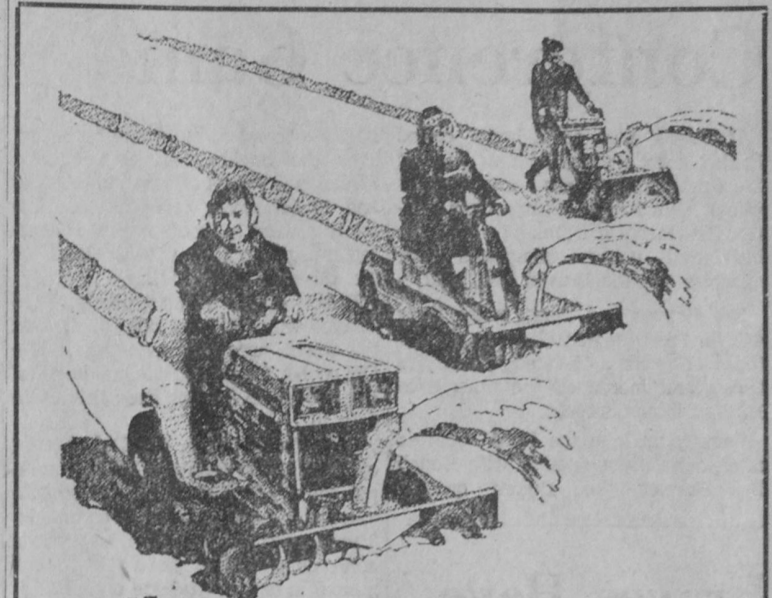
The Gordon Creek snowmobile parking area will be plowed and the snowmobile trail with the associated

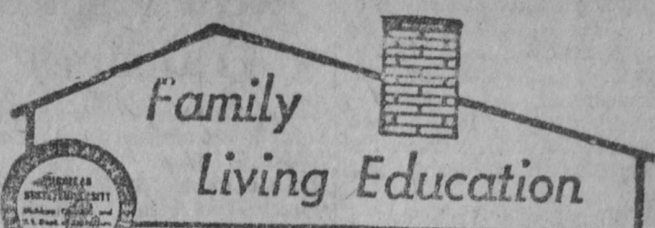

Chamber Lists Its Activities During Year

Accomplishments during 1972 were reviewed by the Tawas Chamber of Commerce's board of directors at the year-end meeting held recently.

Some of the accomplishments by the organization during the past year were as follows:

A first with any chamber of commerce in Michigan was achieved when a student of Tawas Area High School was named to the chamber's board of directors. This idea has now been carried out with other communities and has been expanded to include college students.

Successful promotional events included Perchville, which had the best attendance in any year this event has been in operation, and the annual arts and crafts exhibit and sale, held in conjunction with the Michigan Tourist Festival. Exhibitors had to be turned away because facilities in the Tawas City Park and county building were filled to capacity and the show attracted a large attendance.

The second student symposium sponsored by the chamber of commerce was well attended and accepted. More than 250 students of the county have now been exposed to knowledge that had never before been available to them.

Other important activities of the chamber of commerce during the year included cooperation with the City of Tawas City in initiating an improvement program at the mouth of the Tawas River and acceptance of a plan by the Iosco County Parks and Recreation Commission to develop over-all recreational facilities and needs for the entire county. This program is now in the stage of development and the first printing of literature will be completed by the first of the year.

Membership with the Michigan State Chamber of Commerce has imparted valuable assistance and information to the local organization.

According to officers of the chamber of commerce, many new plans are in the development stage for 1973 and are to be acted upon after the season starts in January.

Iosco Sportsmen Push Legislation

Two resolutions originating with the Iosco Sportsmen's Club have been included in the Michigan United Conservation Clubs' 1973 legislative program.

The resolutions included tagging of fishing tips and a proposal to prohibit shooting of deer over baited areas, both deemed by the club as measures to foster good conservation.

The first would require an owner identification tag on tips in order to make it easier for law enforcement officers to determine if a person is violating the law by having an excessive number of tips.

"The Iosco Sportsmen's Club is certainly not against the feeding of deer," states the second resolution, "but considers it unsportsmanlike to shoot over piles of sugar beets or apples." Presently, only the shooting of deer over salt blocks is prohibited. Such planted foods as corn, rye or wheat would not be considered as bait in the club's proposal.

Other noteworthy goals being proposed by the state organization are prohibition of gill net use in commercial fishing, providing greenbelt zoning along lakes and streams, repeal of the coyote bounty, updating penalty assessments for conservation law violations and mandatory environmental education in schools.

Thirty different legislative items are being proposed by the MUCC. Sponsors in both houses of the state legislature are being sought to introduce the above bills.

Free, updated copies of the DNR's "Snowmobile Trails Directory," describing all 39 trails now ready for the 1972-1973 season, may be obtained by writing to the DNR's forestry division at Lansing.

Some one million Michigan anglers have received a sports fishing survey and any person from this area receiving a form is urged to complete and return it by the specified time. Michigan has an excellent recreational fishing program and this information will aid that program.

Lake Huron is to be planted with 350,000 lake trout in 1973 and, hopefully, one million in 1974. This, along with the increased plantings of rainbow and steelhead trout this year, will provide plenty of future action for fishermen.

The national survey of fishing and hunting reveals these two sports have 70 million participants and represents a business of more than seven billion dollars.

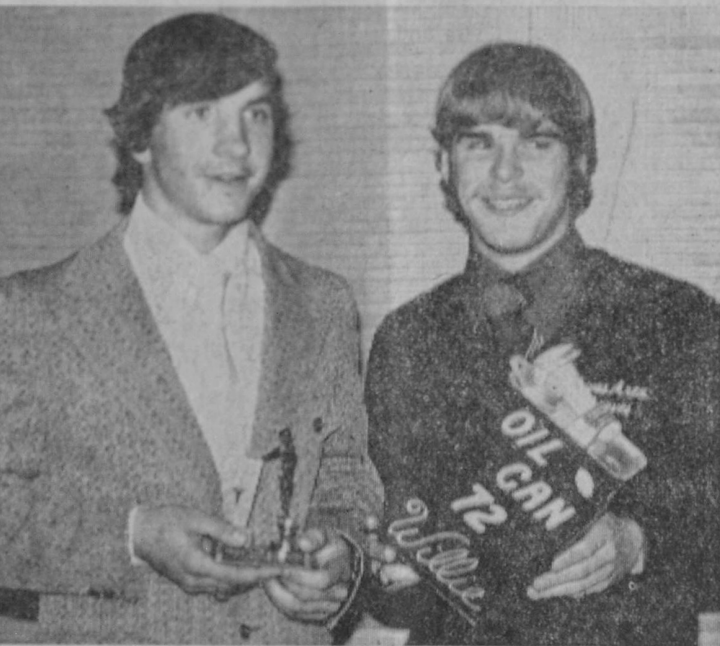

**Going to Work?
Need SS Number**

Question: I am a widow getting monthly social security payments. I have a chance now to do some part-time work. Since I have never had a social security number of my own, should I use the number on my check?

Answer: No. The number on your check is your late husband's social security number. You should apply for your own social security number. To get one, just call, write or visit any social security office.

Question: I have just started getting retirement checks from social security. I have also been getting VA compensation. Does my VA compensation count as earnings?

Answer: No. Only wages and self-employment income count as earnings. Non-work income, such as another pension, dividends, savings or interest, does not affect your social security payments.

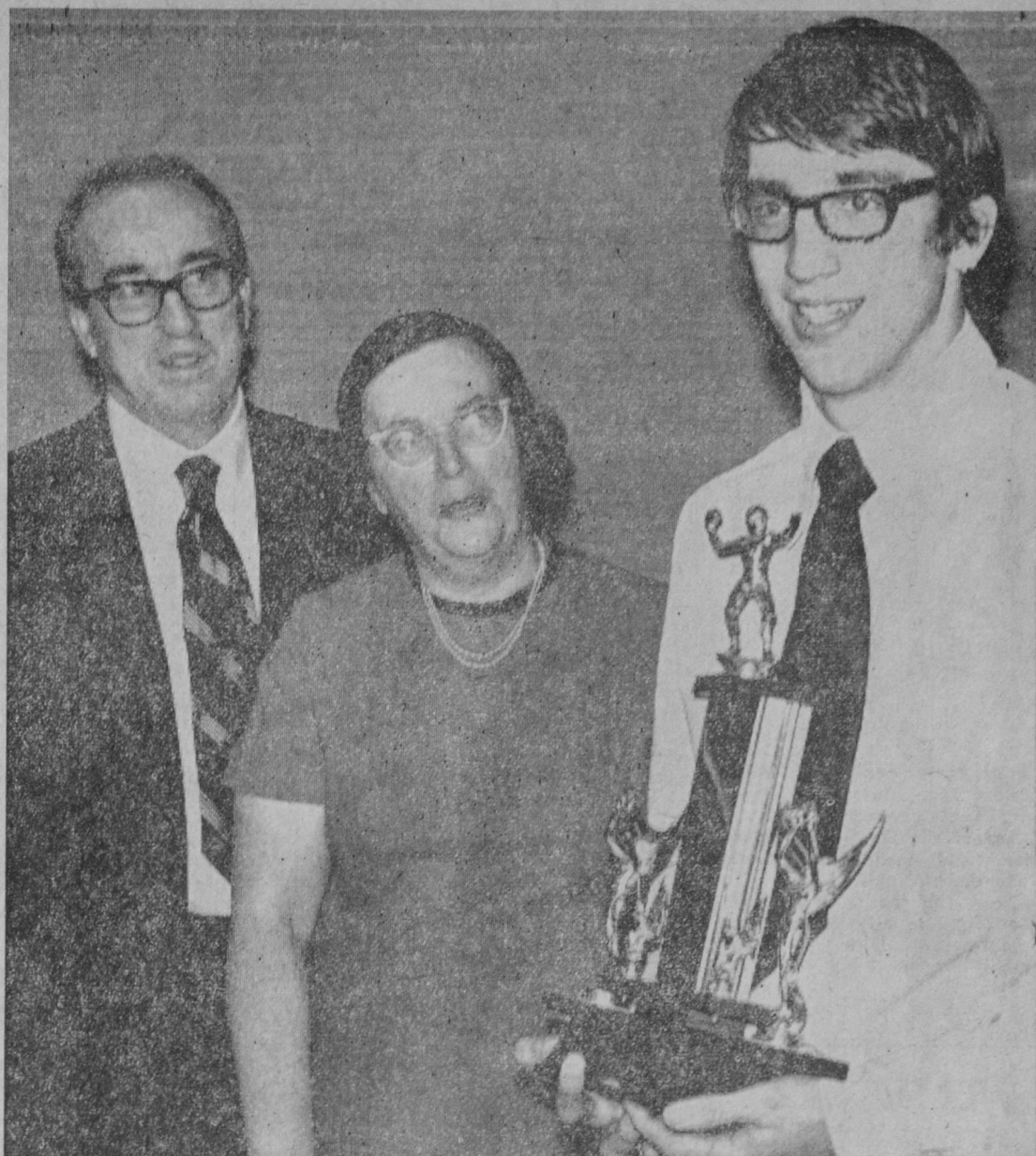
Question: My husband, who is 66 and enrolled in medicare, cannot

get monthly social security checks because he is still working full time and earning too much. I am 62 and not working. Can I get a wife's payment on his work record even though he is not getting payments?

Answer: No. Since your husband is still working and is not getting monthly checks, you cannot get monthly payments as a wife. However, you may be eligible for payments on your own social security record if you have had enough work over the years in jobs covered under social security.

Question: I am 19 and get monthly social security payments as a student. I have been forced to drop the number of courses I am taking to 11 credit hours. My college considers 12 hours as the minimum for a full-time student. Will this cause my monthly checks to be reduced?

Answer: Your monthly payments will stop. Students can get social security payments only if they are in full-time attendance.
