



Answer: There is a time limit for submitting bills for payment under the medical insurance program. January 2 is the deadline for submitting bills for services received from October 1, 1970, to September 30, 19-71. December 31, 1973, is the last day to submit bills for services received from October 1, 1971, to September 30, 1972. Medicare canno help pay the bills unless they are







## Letter to the Editor

Editor: In the past few months, there has been discussion as to a halfway house needed in the Tawas area. Perhaps if the community would be more responsive to the needs of the younger members of our community, it would not be necessary to have a. discussion on this subject. What I am referring to is a youth center where junior high and high school students may go to spend an eve-ning without interference from an owner of the establishment.

If a student wants to sit in a restaurant or hamburger joint and have a soda, they are allowed to remain just a short time and then they must move on or purchase something else. This is fine for the business owner but many of these students just do not have the money to spend like this.

Our community does just fine when it comes to adults. There are at least 10 bars within our community but not one place which caters to the younger people of our community.

My proposal is as follows: Within the Tawas area, there are several vacant buildings. Any place which would have adequate facilities for a public meeting place would be ideal. This center could be opened in the evening for four or five hours beginning at 6:00 p. m. with perhaps some vending machines, a juke box and a dance floor. There should be a special room where people could play cards, checkers, chess and a variety of other games which would require quiet. Adults would not be allowed except for the adult supervisors, who would be volunteers.

Many other ideas could be implemented once the center is open but I urge that we start on this project now. Come on Tawas, wake up. There are citizens in our community who need a place for recreation. Perhaps we could take some of the Federal Revenue Sharing check and invest it in the future of our com-munity, our young people. After all, they are your children.

Though I am stationed in Nebraska in the United States Air Force, I still feel a part of the Tawas com-munity. I would like to return to Tawas following my current tour of duty and bring my family to grow up in a community which is vital and alive with progress but free from the problems which plague the larger cities. This youth center is one step in that direction

Individuals may be eligible for unemployment assistance payments if they lived or worked in the disaster areas, regardless of whether they worked for an employer or were selfemployed, if their employment was interrupted or reduced because of the flood and storm damage. This would apply if they could not get to their place of employment, even if they worked outside of the disaster area, or if they were prevented from going to work because of an illness or injury resulting from the disaster. Results from this area will be compiled and published with thousands of others on the state and national level.


