Tax Statement Delay A Christmas 'Gift' for Some--Not for Oates

## Mechanical Breakdown Poses Problem

Iosco County's tax computing equipment, which finally sputtered to a stop November 13 after four breakdowns during a two-week period, has caused one gigantic problem for Henry Oates' tax equalization department, as well as township and city treasurers.

As a result of the breakdown, taxpayers in only four units of Iosco—Alabaster, AuSable, Baldwin and Tawas Townships—received annual tax statements during the usual December 1 mailing. Normally, the county's 25,000 tax statements are prepared by Thanksgiving.

Tax statements for Burleigh and Wilber Townships, along with Tawas City, are expected to be completed this week at Cadillac. Arrangements were made with Wex-

ford County officials to have equipment, in that county prepare tabulations on printed tax statements.

Oates said Tuesday morning that his office was now attempting to make arrangements with Roscommon County to print tabulations on tax statements for Oscoda and Plainfield Townships, along with the City of East Tawas. Complicating this work, however, is the large number of special assessments in Oscoda and Plainfield Townships. In addition, those two townships represent more than one-half of this county's property tax descriptions.

Oates said it would be impossible to estimate when statements for the above three units would be completed. Roscommon's machine has to be reprogrammed in order to fit the

lengthy tax forms of Plainfield and Oscoda.

Tax statements for Whittemore, Reno and Sherman Townships, hopefully, are to be completed this week at Cadillac.

Members of the county commission have been traveling between Iosco, Wexford and Roscommon Counties in private automobiles in order to deliver printed tax forms to these counties to be tabulated on their equipment.

"If taxpayers do not receive their statements by January 1, then township and city treasurers cannot charge the three percent penalty fee which is normally charged after February 15," said Oates.

Only last month, the county board of commissioners decided to move its tax state preparation operation to

a computer setup for next year and hired Wesley Data Processing of Midland to do the work.

Oates had recommended in July that the county purchase a new machine which Burrows Corporation had demonstrated at the county building and was available in his department. He said the county could have purchased the machine for \$14,000, or it could have rented it for one year at a cost of \$6,500.

"One-half of Tawas City's tax statements were prepared on this machine and it was exactly what we needed—then the commission got the data processing bug. Although data processing has some advantages, the tax department has been left in the lurch by the breakdown of our present equipment, which is nine years old," said Oates.

In addition to mechanical problems, Oates was hospitalized in early November, but is back to work full time. On election night, Deloise (Dewey) Durant, Oates' right hand assistant, was hospitalized for a serious illness.

B. William Olsen of Wilber Township, who has been certified by the state tax commission, has taken over Durant's job in the tax department and is working in the field.

"We have a considerable amount of work to accomplish at this time of the year and this delay in preparing tax statements is disrupting our normal operation. In addition, we must soon start work on rolls for submitting to the data processing firm—if the commissioners had listened to us last July, we would not have been in this mess," said Oates.

## OK Professional Planner for City

On recommendation of the planning commission, Tawas City Council authorized hiring of Vilcan, Le-man and Associates, Southfield, to act in an advisory capacity to assist the city in resolving planning questions.

Cost of this service will be \$1,900 annually. The planning commission is to utilize its budget of \$1,000 to help finance the cost and the remainder is to be paid from the general fund.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said that the city's zoning ordinance, now seven years old, needs updating in its plans for the future. He said that a number of problems had cropped up over the years and that the assistance of professional planning was needed.

In other business, the council authorized signing a resolution for an engineering study to be made in conjunction with the state waterways commission for possible development of a public launching facility at the mouth of the Tawas River. Tentative approval had been given several weeks ago.

The state and the city are to finance the engineering study, totaling

\$2,250, on a 50-50 matching basis. It was stated that the state had agreed to conduct the engineering study November 3 in order to determine feasibility of developing a launching site here.

A report from the state health department indicated that Tawas River Trailer Park had been approved for 64 occupied mobile homes under its new license terminating in September 1973.

The city manager reported that a possibility still exists that Tawas City will receive some state assistance in repairing a retaining wall along Ninth Avenue. This project, along with catwalks on two new bridges, had been deleted from state participation last month and the city decided it would handle the financing.

Bublitz said he had contacted the DNR at Lansing and learned that the retaining wall along Ninth Avenue, to be used as a fishing site, is not a dead issue and expects further communications from the state.

Appointments by the mayor approved by the council included Carl Babcock and Neil Thornton to the zoning board of appeals and Hugo Keiser to the planning commission.

## Council Discusses Sanitary Sewers

On recommendation of the water board, Tawas City Council Monday night approved a resolution allowing Mrs. Ellen Bilow to waive the city's special assessment procedure in order for her to pay the cost of constructing sewer service to her property at 815 Lake Street.

In order to service this property with sanitary sewer, a boring must be made under US-23 near the Tawas River bridge for the eight-inch main. Cost of the project will be \$2,800 and is to be paid by the property owner over a period of 10 years, being included in property taxes.

Also approved by the council was a recommendation from the water board that a special assessment sewer petition be prepared and circulated for sanitary sewer from the Hobby Lot to the Lisie Pratt property.

A recommendation from the water board that engineering and costs be obtained for construction of a force main from the Second Avenue lift station to the disposal plant was tabled for further study.

Mayor John N. Brugger told members of the council that the proposed force main, long considered as a necessary improvement to the sewer system, may now be in conflict with needs of the community.

The mayor said that both Tawas City and East Tawas were faced with the problem of providing secondary sewage treatment and disposal plant. He said that a regional plant now under consideration for federal assistance included construction of a secondary disposal addition to the East Tawas sewage disposal plant.

Brugger said that he did not believe that the two communities could economically operate two separate secondary treatment plants, noting that operational costs for similar plants serving communities of 5,000 persons amounted to \$100,000 annually.

The mayor recommended that a meeting be called to have engineers for both Tawas City and East Tawas discuss the problems facing both communities and to determine if a joint effort in sewage disposal would be to the advantage of both communities.

Should a secondary treatment addition be constructed at East Tawas primary disposal plant through a joint effort, a force main would be required to move effluent from Tawas City's primary plant to the new secondary treatment plant.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz reported there currently was a stagnation in federal funding for sanitary sewers and the regional project between Baldwin Township, East Tawas and Tawas City had never received a preliminary hearing.

The mayor said that 90 percent of federal moneys expended in Michigan had been siphoned off by Wayne, Oakland and Macomb Counties and authorities apparently felt the sanitary sewage treatment problem had not reached a critical point as yet in this area. However, it is expected that the two communities will soon be required to comply with strict regulations covering sewage treatment.

It was the opinion of the city manager that engineers should consider a possible joint effort here on sewage treatment. Action by the water board has been tabled until the council is in agreement on an over-all plan for the community.

## Assessment Plat to Correct Property Lines

Action Monday night by the East Tawas Council saw adoption of an assessor's plat for an area of Tawas Lake where present property boundary lines are confusing.

The area included in the new plat is bounded on the south by Christian's Addition, along with Smith and Landback Subdivisions; on the west by Maple Drive; on the north by Klenow Street, and on the east by Geller Road.

The council directed the city surveyor to prepare the plat and the cost will be \$100 per parcel.

Members of the council expressed concern that delivery had not been made as yet by the county tax department on the city's tax statements.

The council authorized an immediate investigation into the poor cable television reception being experienced in the community and authorized the city clerk to contact officials of Tawas City and Oscoda to determine if joint action should be taken to improve television reception.

## Roads Open

All county roads will be open to snowmobiles this winter, under the same rules and regulations that applied to use of snowmobiles last year.

## Hale Area Seventh Graders Learn About World of Work

As a result of careful planning and close cooperation between area businessmen and school personnel, every seventh grader in Hale Area School was recently involved in an exciting and innovative learning experience using the entire community as a classroom.

As part of their introduction to the world of work, 50 students spent one day working in and observing the operations of several businesses at Hale. With the cooperation of businessmen, students were able to explore their vocational interests and became more familiar with the daily routines of the working world.

The activity provided the opportunity for a "hands on," direct involvement learning situation, from making 150 hamburger patties in one case to pumping gasoline at a local station in another, according to Randy LaLonde, junior high educator, and Joseph VanderVeen, counselor.

Students were sent to almost every conceivable business in the community, ranging from beauty shops to bakeries; from gasoline stations to supermarkets. As a follow-up activity, each student gave an oral, in-class presentation on his or her morning "at the office."

The students are participating in a nine-week, introductory career education program, which involves: 1. Getting to know one's self in terms of the student's interests and abilities; 2. Knowledge about the world of work, the role of work in society and a basic understanding of the general occupational areas; 3. In school and out-of-school experiences with a variety of jobs, either through visitations or speakers in the classroom.

An additional learning experience in which seventh graders are currently involved is the formation of their own business—a miniature candle shop. Various students have assumed specific roles that hold their

chief interest, ranging from accountants to assembly line workers; from foremen to salesmen. By portraying these roles, students are becoming more aware of the many duties and responsibilities involved in an actual business.

To further emphasize the economic aims and investment attitudes of modern businesses, the students have invested money and purchased stocks for their business. And, as all good business people must do, they are working to make a profit by selling their actual products.

"The response from the youngsters toward these activities has been very enthusiastic," states LaLonde. "In the first instance, a few students even skipped the lunchtime to relate their experiences to the instructor. Needless to mention, we educators at Hale Area are extremely enthusiastic about our new program and the strong learning experiences that have been generated through it thus far."

## Walnut Jewel Fruitcake

**Walnut Jewel Fruitcake**  
 3/4 cup dried apricots  
 3/4 cup water  
 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar  
 1/2 cup sifted all-purpose flour  
 1/2 teaspoon baking powder  
 3/2 teaspoon salt  
 3/4 cup sifted pitted ready-to-eat prunes  
 3/4 cup pitted dates  
 3/4 cup candied cherries  
 3 cups Diamond Walnut halves and large pieces  
 3 eggs  
 1 teaspoon vanilla  
 Simmer apricots in water five minutes. Add 3/4 cup sugar and cook slowly 10 minutes longer, until apricots are transparent and glazed. Lift out of syrup with a fork; drain well on wire rack. Resift flour with remaining 3/4 cup sugar, baking powder and salt. Combine prunes, dates, cherries, walnuts and apricots. Add sifted dry mixture; mix gently. Beat eggs with vanilla. Add to fruit mixture and mix carefully to avoid breaking up fruit. Turn into greased 9-inch square pan. Bake at 300 degrees F. about 1 1/2 hours, or until cake is set in center. Cool in pan. Serve plain or glazed. Makes one 9-inch cake.  
 Tied cake: Double recipe. Bake in graduated pans about 4 1/2 inches, 6 and 9 inches square. Or bake half of batter for bottom of tiered cake in 9-inch square pan. Bake second half of batter in rectangular pan, 11 1/4 x 7 1/2 x 1 1/2 inches. When cool, cut one square as long as rectangular layer is wide to make middle tier of cake. Cut remaining piece of cake into top tier about 4 inches square. (Leftover may be sliced for extra servings). To glaze cake bring 3/4 cup white corn syrup to a boil. Spread over layers, let cool. Then stack layers to make fancy tiered cake. For serving, remove layers, as with groom's fruitcake, and slice each individually.

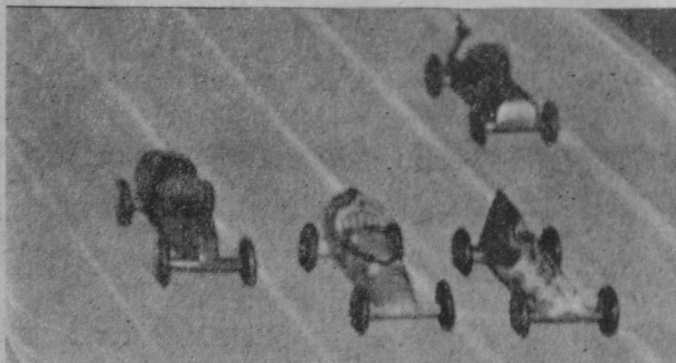

**No SS Benefits If Employed In Gainful Work**

Question: I lost an arm while serving in Vietnam, but it has not kept me from working full time. I receive disability payments from the Veterans Administration. Can I also collect social security disability benefits?

Answer: No. You cannot receive social security disability benefits unless your impairment makes it impossible for you to engage in any substantial gainful work.

Question: I was in a bad automobile accident and was laid up for three months with serious bone fractures. Since I had no earnings during this period, could I collect social security benefits?

Answer: No. Monthly social security disability benefits can be paid only for a severe disability that is expected to last a year or longer. Monthly payments may start with the sixth month of disability. In addition, the disability must be so severe that it makes it impossible for the worker to engage in any substantial employment.

Question: After I started to get disability benefits from social security, I became eligible for payments under a plan with my old employer. What will happen to my social security benefits?

Answer: Disability benefits from your employer will not affect your benefits from social security but benefits you may receive from workmen's compensation could affect your social security and should be reported.

Question: Does a disabled worker have to meet an age requirement to receive social security monthly disability benefits?

Answer: There is no minimum age, but a minimum work period under social security is required to be eligible for disability benefits. If a person became disabled before 24, he needs credit for 1½ years of work during the three years just before his disability began. If his disability starts between 24 and 31, he needs work credits for half the time under 21 and before he became disabled. If a worker becomes disabled after 31, he needs credit for at least five years of work in the 10 years before the start of the disability.

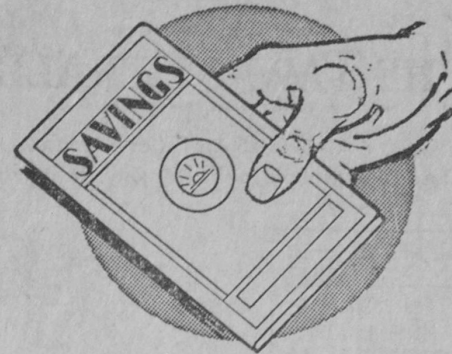

## Iosco's Christmas Seal Contributions Increased

Contributions to the traditional Christmas Seal campaign in Iosco County through the Thanksgiving week-end totaled \$3,213.89, which is slightly more than the amount contributed last year at this same time, according to an announcement by Dr. Walter Meier, president of the Michigan TB and Respiratory Disease Association. Doctor Meier indicated that state-wide contributions at this time are running about 3.3 percent ahead of last year's contributions.

He urged persons to use the colorful blue Christmas Seals on their holiday mail and to send their contributions in advance of the Christmas holidays.

Funds received support programs of research, medical education, community service and educational activities to reduce suffering and death from chronic respiratory diseases.

Doctor Meier pointed out that currently research activities are being conducted at Wayne State University to study the rejection problems in lung transplants. At the University

of Michigan, researchers are trying to identify some of the characteristics of muscle fibers of the diaphragm and the relationship these might have to chronic lung disease. At Michigan State University, research activities are being carried out to develop a better tuberculin skin test than the one currently in use. Such a test would make it easier to diagnose tuberculosis. Also at Michigan State University, work is under way to study pulmonary fibrosis, a common occurrence in lung diseases.

"At each of the medical schools in the state, fellowships are sponsored by Christmas Seal funds to assist in the development of physicians with special training in pulmonary diseases.

Community service programs, ranging from smoking withdrawal clinics to breathing exercise and recreational clinics for youngsters with asthma are supported by Christmas Seal contributions.

"An important service developed by the Christmas Seal association during the past year is an improved referral program for patients with

lung diseases. Many of these persons looking for help have found only dead-end streets," Doctor Meier said. "Our goal is to provide the kind of referral information that will help patients with pulmonary diseases get to the agencies that can provide them with medical, economic and other forms of assistance."

Christmas Seal contributions also support health education programs in schools and among adult groups with practically every youngster in elementary school in Michigan being reached by our educational activities, Doctor Meier said. These include a popular children's publication, "Children's Health," which is mailed to every classroom teacher monthly during the school year, and frequent visits from entertainer-educator, Rancher Glen, who mixes folk songs with valuable antismoking and other health information.

The 1972 goal of the Christmas Seal agency for Michigan counties, other than the Detroit metropolitan area, is \$925,000. The help of every citizen is needed to enable us to reach this goal, Doctor Meier said.

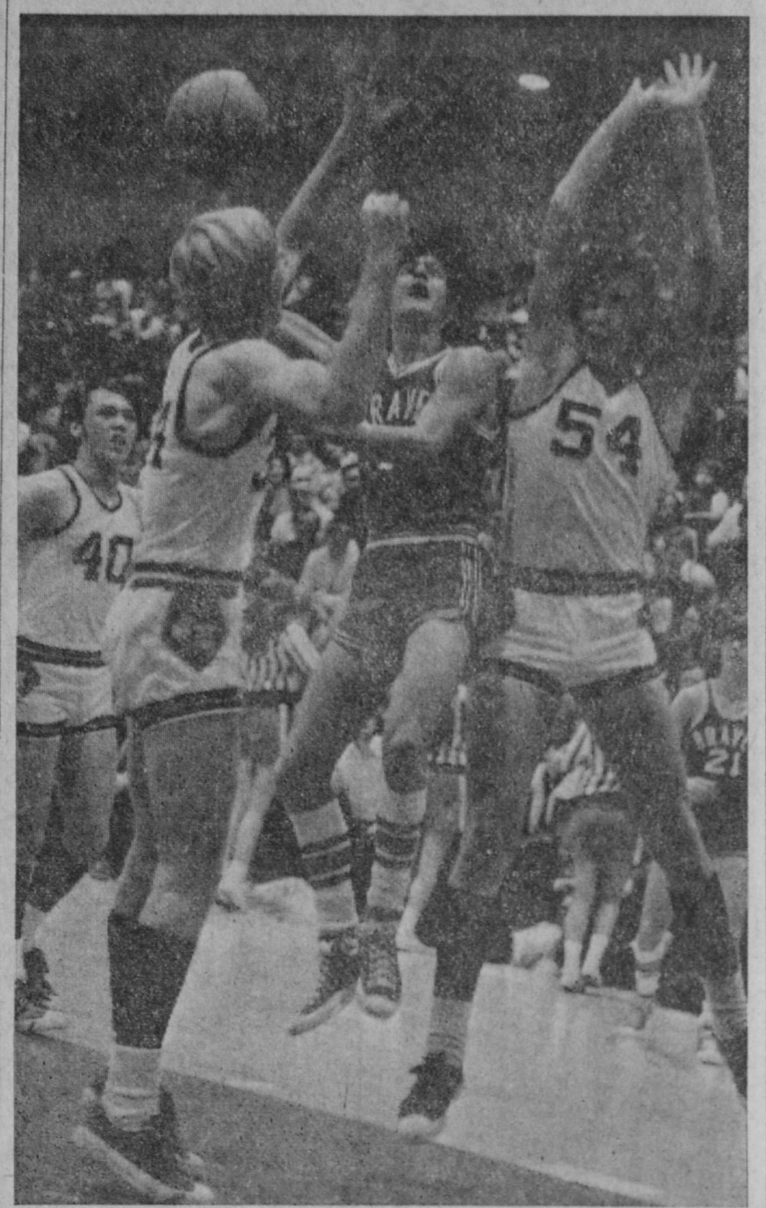
