

All three or four-year-old preschool children, kindergarteners, second, fifth and eighth grade students are eligible for the program, providing they have registered prior to the deadline. Registration cards will be given to each child by the teacher Friday, February 18. Parents are asked to watch for these

To enroll preschool children who have not received registration cards, parents may call 362-4244 for further information. A nominal fee will cover costs of operating the clinic and must be submitted along with the registration card.

Each child's teeth are cleaned on the first visit and a fluoride solution is applied directly to the surface of the teeth. The fluoride application only is then repeated during the three succeeding visits. This technique has been shown to reduce tooth decay by approximately 40 percent, as compared with a 60-65 percent reduction obtained with

Oscoda Township's total population jumped from a little more than 4,000 persons to about 11,700. The present plan being considered would split the populated area of Oscoda Township into two districts, each district to include military and civilian areas, inasmuch as federal regulations apparently prohibit base personnel from running for public office.

Other areas of the county would be lumped into three different districts according to the five-district plan being discussed. Baldwin Township and a portion of AuSable Township would be split, but township and city lines would be followed, otherwise, in the redistricting in order to develop units which would each contain from 4,500 to 5,000 persons.

The present nine-district commission was mapped in 1967 by the old board of supervisors. That plan divided the populated portion of Oscoda Township into two districts and lumped the township's remaining area with Plainfield Township to form another district.



LETTER to the EDITOR:

On December 27, 1971, I had to have the service of an ambulance for a party who had a severe asthma attack. It took over an hour for the ambulance to arrive because they could not find the location.

My first and foremost complaint is that there are four streets that I know of with the same name within the area of Tawas City, East Tawas, Tawas Point and our location, seven miles north of East Tawas.

Innumerable delivery men have erroneously picked this street to make a delivery when the party they sought lived on one of the other three streets. I believe our officials are very lax in that they do not have this situation corrected. How many other streets have synonymous names, I do not know, but even if this is the only one, a correction

should be made. The second complaint is that our road has no sign designating its loca-

After the asthma incident, I contacted our township supervisor and explained the situation. He assured me that a sign would be put up. To date, it has not been done. I am not a complainer, but I do believe this situation is serious enough to be cor-

If a fatality should occur because of this negligence of our supervisor, I think the city fathers could find themselves in a very embarrassing

A saving of a human life should be the first concern of any person in any position at any time.

Letter to the Editor:

After yesterday's shore erosion clusions can safely be drawn. First, Maple Acres Subdivision. the political punch of this area is even sent a representative! Persons R5E. from nine counties were invited by a letter intimating that they would be present. These people drove hundreds of miles at their own expense. Secondly, present cost-sharing policies have nothing to offer unless shore owners are willing to dedicate the shore to the public and the counties or townships will accept the dedication. If this is done, then the federal government will pick up 50 percent and the local units of government will have to pay the other 50 percent. Restoration of the beaches will cost approximately \$200,000 per mile! This will mean a system of groins and nourishing practices. Thirdly, meaningful cost-sharing must come from a broader interpretation of the phrase "public benefit" or "public interest" or additional legislation must be enacted expanding the cost-sharing criteria to include private property. Congressman Ruppe has introduced such legislation. He should be encouraged by letters and other congressmen should likewise be encouraged to support the cause.

Since the Corps of Engineers bears the entire cost of flood damage protection devices along the Mississippi and the United States government cost-shares city sewage projects, cost-shares erosion projects on private farm lands, it is difficult to the field of education. justify the present policies which discriminate against shore owners.

In closing, my lawsuit is still very much alive. True, the federal government has now filed a responsive pleading, but no decisions have been made by Judge Roth. Since the gov ernment took from April 1971 until February 1972 to even respond, we can expect a long hard battle. It would have been naive, of course, to expect a check by return mail. It is objective to demonstrate a 'public interest' in every inch of shore line! After all, the shore line is really the largest economic asset







On the inside of the card was printed, "Try bran flakes and prune juice." Silly? Certainly, but the point is that now, during the month of February, lots of other folks are urging you to try some prune juice, as well as other prune products.


