welfare budget was \$519,000,000 last year. A projected \$75,000,000 increase proposed by Governor Milliken's budget makes the projections for next year about \$594,500,000 which would be the largest percentage in-

crease for next year's budget. By the time the federal government throws in its matching funds, the Michigan welfare program has blossomed into a one-billion-dollarplus allowance to the state's welfare

Prescott said "sources indicate that for every 60 welfare recipients there is a social worker. This is uncalled for when we are so hard pressed for workers in other areas and when money is so tight. Some of the welfare reform proposals that have been introduced into the Michigan legislature should be studied, not just left to die in Democratically controlled committees.'

The Tawas City Republican questions whether "this great upsurge in welfare over the past few years is going to continue."



### Monthly SS Benefits Not An Annuity

Question: My mother is 67 and gets monthly social security retirement checks. She is healthy and wants to work. Why will she not get all of her benefits if she earns over a certain amount?

Answer: Monthly benefits are not intended as an annuity to be paid to a person regardless of the amount of earned income he or she may have. They are intended to partially replace the income your mother or any other worker loses when he or she tires. According to the law, a person under 72 receives monthly pay-

For your convenience, a social on every Thursday of each month she earns more than \$1,680 per year). However, many people work part time and still receive all or most of their social security retirement benefits. The people at the Bay City social security office will be glad to explain how earnings from a part-time job might affect your mother's cash benefits. Of course, your mother is eligible for medicare protection no matter how much she earns.

Question: I get monthly social security retirement benefits on my husband's record, even though we are not living together anymore. If we get divorced, will I still get my checks?

Answer: If you and he were married 20 years or longer, you will continue to get monthly benefits on his work record after the divorce. You should report the divorce to any social security office when it be-

comes final. Question: I was reviewing my insurance coverage recently. In considering disability protection under social security. I know there is a sixmonth waiting period, but can you tell me how long it would take after a disabled worker files an application to get his monthly cash pay-

ment? Answer: It normally takes from 75 to 80 days to get all the medical reports together and for a decision to be made on an application for social security disability benefits.

However, many things are involved in making a disability determination and a delay in any one step could mean a delay of a number of weeks in getting the first monthly benefit check.

That is why it is most important for a worker to apply as soon as he knows that his disability is severe and he might be disabled for a year

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

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

The procedure

consists of four visits to the fluoride clinic at approximately two-day in tervals. The child's teeth are tervals. The child's teeth are cleansed on the first visit and a fluoride solution is applied directly to the surface of the teeth. The fluoride application only is repeated during the three succeeding visits This technique has been shown to reduce tooth decay by about 40 percent compared with the 60-65 percent reduction obtained with fluoridated water, she said.

In addition to providing protection against cavities, the program offers children a valuable dental experience with no discomfort. Dental health education by the clinic personnel, including instruction in the proper method of brushing teeth, also is an important part of the pro-gram. Area dentists supporting the program are Dr. Roger Hill and Dr. Carl Weber.

Parents of eligible children will be

notified at a later date and be given an opportunity to enroll their chil-dren in the program. A small fee is charged to cover the cost of operat-
