Tawas City Tot Drowned in River

A three-year-old Tawas City boy drowned Thursday afternoon when he rode his sled into the Tawas River near the M-55 bridge.

Drowned was Sean Patrick Campbell, son of Army Sgt. and Mrs. James Campbell Jr. of First Avenue and grandson of Mayor and Mrs. James Campbell of East Tawas. Campbell is the army recruiter for this area.

Sean and his brother, Anthony, five years old, had been sledding down the east bank of the Tawas River near their home. The river was not frozen over and the boy was wearing heavy winter clothing.

Investigating state police said Anthony ran home for help. State police and the Tawas Hospital ambulance service were summoned. An immediate search for the boy was begun by area law enforcement agencies and volunteers.

The boy was floated downriver for about a quarter of a mile by a strong river current. The body was recovered at the First Street bridge.

The boy was pulled from the river by a hospital orderly accompanying the ambulance. Attempts to revive the child through mouth-to-mouth resuscitation were unsuccessful and Sean was pronounced dead at Tawas Hospital by Iosco Coroner John Moffatt.

The boy became Iosco County's first drowning victim of the year.

The victim was born October 28, 1968, at Ft. Hood, Texas. Besides his parents, brother and paternal grandparents, he is survived by another brother, Chris Edward, and his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Gowel of East Tawas.

Funeral services were conducted Saturday, February 25, at E. D. Jacques and Son Funeral Home, Tawas City, with the Rev. Fr. Raymond Pilarski officiating. Burial was in Immaculate Heart of Mary Cemetery.

Young Couple Arrested on Drug Charge

A young couple staying at a Baldwin Township resort was arrested Sunday night by Iosco County authorities and charged with selling LSD and possession of marijuana.

Appearing in district court on narcotics charges were Edward London and his wife, Shirley, both 22 years of age.

Investigating officers from the Iosco Sheriff's Department said Monday that the Londons had been under suspicion of selling narcotics for several months and under surveillance for the past three weeks.

Officers said that arrangements were made for a cooperating airman from Wurtsmith Air Force Base to make a "buy" of LSD Sunday night at the Londons' cottage. It was stated that marked money was used in the transaction.

Following a test made on the purchase to identify it as LSD, six officers from the sheriff's department, state police and Oscoda Township made the arrest.

Pros. Atty. Kenneth Myles arrived at the scene shortly after the arrest and assisted with the investigation.

Officers said that London, originally from Glennie, was unemployed. Mrs. London is the former Shirley Cecil of East Tawas. The Londons have a state police narcotics case against them in district court. They were held at the Iosco County Jail until district court arraignment Monday morning.

Robert Bolen Top Vote-Getter in Mayor Primary

Robert Bolen, veteran city councilman, was top vote-getter among three candidates for mayor in Monday's primary election at East Tawas.

Bolen received 212 of the 381 votes cast in the election and will be opposed in the April 3 general election by James Campbell, incumbent mayor, who received 128 votes. The third candidate, Robert Eppert, a student at Michigan State University, received 41 votes.

Only other race scheduled for the April 3 election is for Second Ward

alderman. Robert Johnson received 71 votes as compared to Edward Higgins' 64 ballots.

Richard Moss received 85 votes and is the unopposed candidate for First Ward alderman. Ralph Western is the unopposed candidate for Third Ward alderman and received 86 votes.

Mrs. Grace Pelton received 304 votes for nomination as city treasurer while Clyde Soper received 291 votes and was nominated as city clerk.

City Council Delays Bridge Decision

Following study of an engineering appraisal of its three local bridges, Tawas City Council Monday night decided to withhold any decision temporarily until it can learn of future state highway plans for the US-23 bridge over the Tawas River.

Need for replacing from one to four bridges in the immediate future was borne out by the engineering report, which was not unexpected because of age and deterioration of the structures, but the council accepted the "wait and see" recommendation of Mayor John N. Brugger.

Reason for the delay is the city desires to know if the state plans to replace the US-23 bridge in the immediate future. If so, a temporary bridge would have to be utilized to reroute traffic and it is the city's thinking that an arrangement could be made for local participation and make the bridge a permanent structure.

A similar arrangement was made at Oscoda for rerouting traffic over the AuSable River. The US-23 bridge over the Tawas River is crowded by private property on either side, plus the wide intersection with Ninth Avenue.

Replacement of the US-23 bridge here has long been advocated by city officials because of the dangerous situation created by funneling more than two lanes of traffic over a two-lane bridge.

Replacement of the Mathews Street bridge apparently is the most critical, although the engineering report indicated the structure could be maintained in a safe condition by maintaining tonnage limits. The arch type bridge has three points of weakness on end bearings and floor beam hangers are badly rusted.

Periodic inspection was recommended by the engineer.

The second most critical bridge is on First Street, where concrete abutments are badly undercut. Engineers said that stringers are in fair to good shape and while the safe load limit was estimated at seven tons, the engineer recommended that the six-ton limit not be changed.

The Whittemore Street bridge was found to be in the most unsatisfactory condition of all structures and the engineers recommended that it not be replaced because of being located on a local street with no through traffic. Following recommendations of the report, all truck traffic is to be prohibited over this bridge as a means of lengthening life of the structure.

Inspection of the Sixth Avenue bridge over Dead Creek revealed that that concrete arch structure, built in 1912, is cracking on the upstream side. The load limit was set at seven tons.

City Mgr. Reginald Buhlitz, who attended a Michigan Municipal League workshop February 17 at Lansing, reported that a bill in the legislative hopper which would divert money from gas and weight taxes for bridge constructions in townships and cities, may again come before the legislature. He said that any help from this quarter was speculative, however, as major assistance from these funds probably would go toward development of mass transit systems in metropolitan areas.

Replacement of any bridges here will be a costly venture for the city. Edmonds Engineering Company of Bay City is to be asked to investigate the possibility of utilizing the large tube type structures as a means of reducing costs.

Discussion Continues on Garbage Collection Fee

Discussion was continued Monday night by the Tawas City Council on a proposal to place garbage collection on a fee basis to users, rather than to pay for this service out of the city's general fund, but no official action was taken.

Departure from the present system of providing this service financed by the general fund was proposed two weeks ago by Mayor John N. Brugger, who said that cost to the city had grown from about \$600 to \$13,000.

Several councilmen reported that a few citizens objected to this additional cost, which has been estimated at around \$18 a year for each household. Others have felt it was a step in the right direction.

One of the inequities in the present system again pointed out two weeks ago was that some businesses, particularly resorts and restaurants, receive free pickups, while other businesses pay for this service or handle transportation individually.

Under the proposed system, each business would make its own arrangements with the contractor or handle its own transportation.

Ald. Edward Savage said that the proposal should be studied thoroughly as there could be a reduction in the number of pickups, now totaling over 600. He pointed out that if the number was reduced drastically, it might not be a profitable business for a contractor.

"We are getting good service at present and we want to continue it," said Brugger. He believed that if service remained adequate, residents would participate.

Under the recommendation, billing for the service to homes provided by the contractor would be included in quarterly water and sewer statements. If paid quarterly, the bill would be approximately \$4.80 to handle bookkeeping expense.

Sample ordinances from other communities using this system have been requested from the Michigan Municipal League.

A special meeting of the council is to be held Tuesday, February 29, to prepare an interim budget for operation of the city between March 11 and June 30. This gap in financing was created through changing the city's fiscal year under terms of the new charter.

A letter is to be sent to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources asking for plans concerning planting of coho salmon or steelhead trout this year in the Tawas River. The city manager reported he had heard of no plants scheduled here during 1972.

Study is to be made on widening intersections at First Street and Mathews Street to allow two lanes of traffic to enter US-23 at one time. This would require removal of some parking and building new curbs.

Peoples State May Incur Heavy Loss; But Bank Declared 'Sound'

The Michigan State Banking Department has advised Peoples State Bank of Tawas that its current examination indicates the bank may incur a loss which may approach several hundred thousand dollars.

"We are working with state and federal examining officers and our bonding companies to determine the extent and nature of this possible loss," a bank spokesman said late Tuesday afternoon.

"Since this investigation is unfinished, it is impossible to issue a complete statement at this time."

However, in reviewing the situation, the board of directors noted that, in its opinion, depositors are fully protected and the amount of the possible loss would not interfere with the bank's operation.

The bank is a member of the Federal Reserve System and Fed-

eral Deposit Insurance Corporation, which insures all deposits up to \$20,000.

The possible loss was discovered during a normal visit by bank examiners. "We do have a problem and we are working it out—we have a sound bank," assured L. G. McKay Jr., chairman of the bank's board of directors.

Peoples State Bank, which began business in 1927, has operated

and paid dividends continuously since that time and has assets in excess of 21 million dollars, as reflected by its most recent statement.

The bank serves the entire Tawas area, having offices in both East Tawas and Tawas City and has grown steadily over the past 10 years.

At his own request, Richard Harwood, bank president, was granted a leave of absence.

Five-Man Commission OK'd Late Tuesday for Iosco County

With opposition to a five-man county commission under consideration voiced verbally Friday by members of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners, Iosco County Apportionment Commission delayed action on redistricting the county until this week.

The apportionment commission took this action Friday following a three-hour meeting with county commissioners. At the close of that session, Jack Allen, Oscoda commissioner, requested the apportionment commission to delay action until he could submit an alternate proposal.

At a meeting late Tuesday, afternoon, a nine-man commission plan was submitted by Allen and other commissioners. The apportionment commission rejected the alternate proposal and adopted its original plan.

By law, the apportionment commission has until March 4 to submit an approved plan to the Michigan secretary of state. Any appeal filed on a redistricting group's plan would take the decision of the appeals court.

Allen indicated Friday that Oscoda Township would possibly appeal the present plan for a five-man commission, which was announced last week. Allen stated that Oscoda Township "was not happy" with the redistricting in that township and asked that he be allowed to meet with a group of Oscoda officials to develop a new plan. He was of the opinion that the township should have greater representation on the board because of its increase in population.

One of the major factors in redrawing lines in Iosco County is the addition of more than 7,000 persons stationed at Wurtsmith Air Force Base. Prior to the 1970 census, persons living on military reservations were not included in the census.

That change brings Oscoda Township's 1960 population of about 4,200 to 11,700 now. This was by far the biggest shift in the county.

Members of the apportionment commission are Keith Pappas, county clerk; Edward Nelkie, county treasurer; Kenneth Myles, county prosecutor; Merton Kiley, chairman of the county Republican committee; Robert Pember, chairman of the county Democratic committee.

Speaking on behalf of the county commission, Carlton Merschel, commission chairman, said that the present nine-man group had made great strides since reorganization from the old 19-member board of supervisors.

Merschel asked the apportionment

commission, "who in Iosco County can afford to serve on a five-man commission," pointing out that members do not receive full time pay, but, with fewer members, would have to devote much more time to county government under the proposed new setup.

"A retired person or a man willing to earn \$4,000 or \$5,000 a year might have time to serve," said Merschel, but he believed this would present several limitations for candidates.

Nelkie said the apportionment commission was not considering a five-man commission because of being dissatisfied with work of the present commission. He said that the present commission had performed an outstanding job, "which is reflected by the county's finances."

Apportionment commission members said, however, they believed a five-man county commission would improve operations, that necessary committee meetings could be coordinated on one day rather than to scatter them throughout the month.

In this way, the commission felt the entire commission would have a better opportunity to discuss and study matters brought before the commission.

The apportionment commissioners pointed out that they had studied many different variations on plans based on county population figures, using five, seven and nine districts,

but more than five districts posed the problem of splitting townships.

Nelkie expressed the opinion that a five-man county commission would give the fairest and best representation from all sections of Iosco.

Under the plan adopted Tuesday, by the apportionment commission, Iosco will be divided into five districts as follows: Eastern part of Oscoda Township with a population of 4,712; most of Wurtsmith Air Force Base and 2½ sections of the north tier of AuSable Township, population of 5,196; remainder of AuSable Township, Wilber Township, eastern half of Baldwin Township and all of East Tawas, population of 5,016; west part of Oscoda Township, all of Plainfield, Reno and Grant Townships, population of 4,972; Tawas, Burleigh, Sherman, Alabaster Townships, western half of Baldwin Township and Tawas City, population of 4,970.

The alternate proposal rejected Tuesday called for four districts in Oscoda Township. Other combinations proposed included: East Tawas and the west half of Baldwin Township; Wilber, AuSable and the east half of Baldwin Township; Tawas Township and Tawas City; Alabaster, Sherman, Burleigh, Reno Townships and Whittemore; Plainfield and Grant Townships.

Middle School Plans Studied by TA Board

Possible construction of a middle school on the south side of the present high school building is being studied by Tawas Area Board of Education.

At Monday night's board meeting, Irvin Hacker, Bay City architect, presented work drawings for a 12-classroom unit with 35,000 square feet of floor space. The proposal included science, arts and crafts rooms, along with a general purpose room.

Construction of a middle school has been under consideration here for about two years and a proposal last year to convert the Tawas City Elementary Unit into a middle school was defeated by a small margin at the polls.

Need for construction of additional classrooms has been brought about through increased enrollment. Classrooms in the high school are overcrowded and moving the junior high school, combining it with the

County Commission Orders New AuSable Park Contract

Iosco County Board of Commissioners Wednesday directed that a new contract be negotiated with the state waterways commission before this county would authorize completion of work on the AuSable River Park.

Before adjourning its February session to meet next month with state water resources commission representatives, the Iosco Commission was told by Pros. Atty. Kenneth Myles that he had learned through a telephone conversation with Lansing officials that the agreement could be altered to fit this county's desires.

Much of the February session was taken up with the discussion on this important matter. In reviewing a recent contract drawn up for his

signature, Carlton Merschel, commission chairman, pointed out that the county could be held liable for anything spent over and above presently allocated county, state and federal funds.

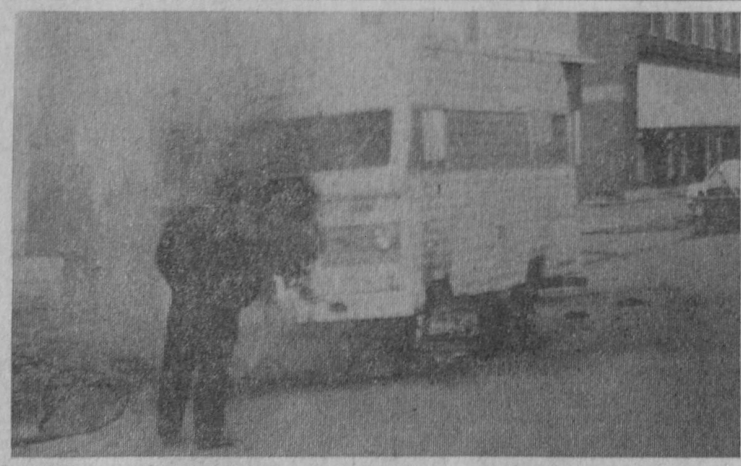
Problems entailed in development of this park have been knotty ones. The county entered into agreement with the state two years ago to develop a public boat launching site and parking ramp near the AuSable River mouth. The county allocated \$16,000 for this project and the grant was matched by a \$144,000 grant from the state.

The parks and recreation commission and its architect, William Krause, recommended that the county apply for federal matching funds of \$160,000 for further develop-

ment of the park. This was done and about \$5,600 of Iosco's share under the original plan was spent in engineering for the second phase of the development.

After receipt of engineering for the second phase, along with construction bids, county commissioners were of the opinion that Iosco could not afford to operate and maintain such an expensive facility. Bids submitted for construction were \$60,000 higher than the total money available.

In addition, the development included construction of a bathroom, but engineering indicated that this was to be served by wells and a septic tank system, which the county commission termed as inadequate. (See COMMISSION, page 3.)

As a result of discussions and many meetings, the commission became disenchanted with its architectural advisor because of what Merschel termed Wednesday as a "credibility gap" and the county did not rehire him when his contract expired.

Through efforts of Robert Foster, Oscoda commissioner, contact was again made with the water resources commission to determine if the state would take over operation and maintenance of the park. Representatives of the water resources commission said the state would assume operation, if it was so desired, if the second phase of the project was completed.

A number of changes were made in plans which would lower construction costs, but it was pointed out Wednesday by Merschel that these changes had not been reflected in wording of the latest contract, which still had Isoco being responsible for completing the original project.

The commission chairman was of the opinion that such an "open end contract" should not be signed. The county prosecutor reviewed the contract and reported that Isoco could be held liable for completing the entire park, which could have cost an additional \$80,000 or more in county funds.

Myles said he would contact Lansing in regard to a new contract and one which would not obligate anyone for more than the original \$320,000 in state, federal and local funds. In addition, the new contract would recognize Isoco's \$16,000 allocation as the total to be spent by this county, regardless of the fact that part of its money had already been spent on engineering.

Leon Putnam, 51, who has served 24 years as undersheriff of Iosco County, announced Monday that he would be a Republican candidate in the August primary election for the office of Iosco County Registrar of Deeds.

A native of Plainfield Township and the Hale area, Putnam has served as the sheriff department's chief administrative officer for the past six years. Prior to that, duties of the undersheriff included investigative work and patrol.

Putnam recalled Monday that the sheriff's department was a two-man force—Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell and himself—when he first came to Tawas City in 1949 to take over the undersheriff position. The department has now grown to a staff of 17 persons.

The veteran law enforcement officer attended school at Hale and operated a farm before being named to the undersheriff post. He had also served as a deputy sheriff.

CMU Student Training May be Offered

Again this year, there is the possibility that there will be offered in this area of the state, opportunities for interested individuals to obtain student teaching credits through Central Michigan University, Mt. Pleasant.

Whether or not such a program offering becomes a reality will depend on the number of persons in this area who are interested in, and eligible, for participation in such a program, and the availability of summer educational programs in local area schools that can accommodate student teachers.

The following are instances where a student may be approved for participation in summer directed teaching:

Any person who needs five or less semester hours of elementary student teaching, a student whose certificate is being granted by the State Department of Education, secondary students who have just eight hours or less of student teaching remaining to complete a degree and anyone who is changing certificates can receive up to five hours of credit.

Anyone who does not meet the above criteria and feels there may be an unusual reason for applying should send an application with a letter stating the reason they feel they should be granted student teaching to Off Campus Education Office, Central Michigan University, Mt. Pleasant, Michigan 48858. All applications for summer directed teaching are due in the Off Campus Education Office by March 15. It is important for persons desiring summer placement to get these in early to determine if enough people are qualified to justify a summer program.

Hints for Better Coffee Making

Good coffee brewers are not born with a brown thumb. They just learn a few easy secrets.

Here are some hints for better coffee-making from Ada Shinabarger, Michigan State University consumer information specialist.

Keep your coffeemaker immaculate. Coffee oils cling and affect the flavor.

Use fresh coffee and start with cold water. Do not use hot water or water that has been standing in a tea kettle or pan.

Keep a special measuring device for your coffee. Vary proportions until you have made coffee you like, then use those proportions every time. A popular ratio is two level tablespoons to three-fourths cup water.

Brew at least three-fourths of a coffee pot's capacity.

Keep coffee over low heat and do not boil it.

Store ground coffee tightly covered in a cool, dry place.

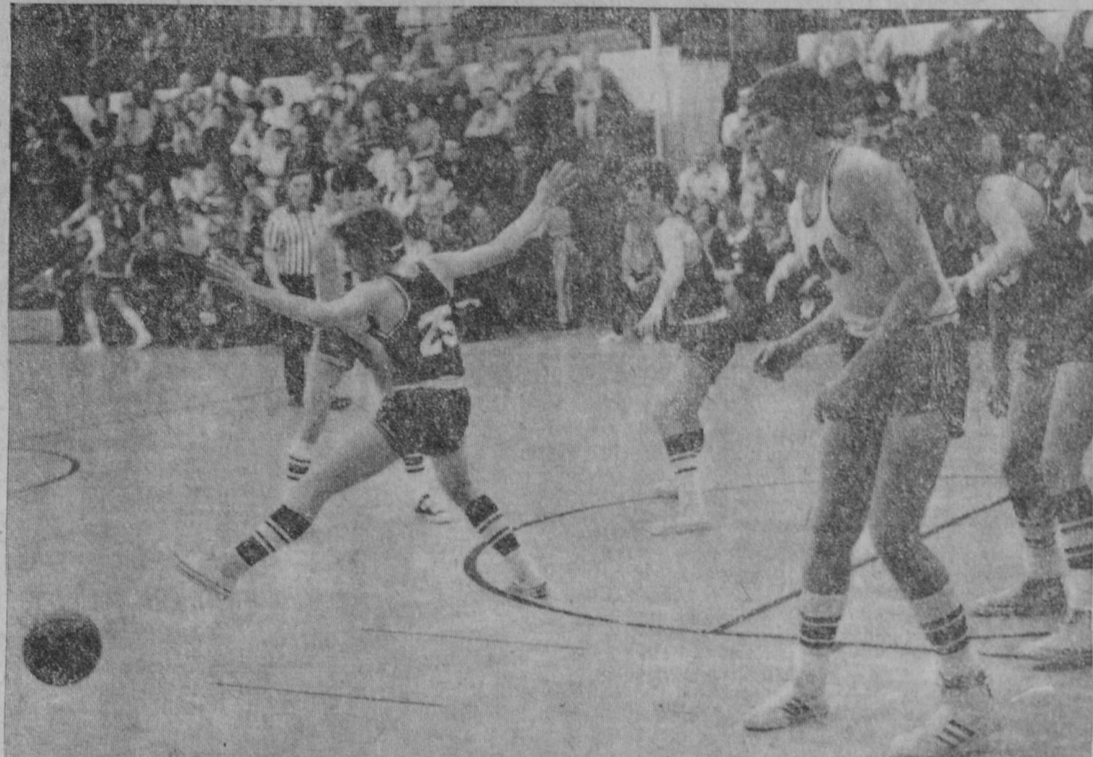

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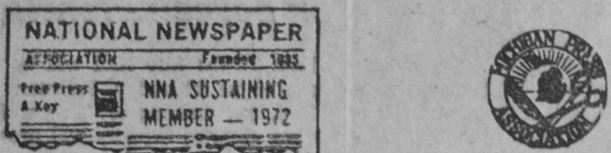

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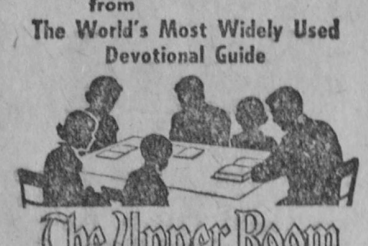
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TODAY'S Meditation



(Read Nehemiah 5:1-13; John 13:31-35)

"We, as far as we are able, have bought back our Jewish brethren who have been sold to the nations; but you even sold your brethren that they may be sold to us!" Nehemiah 5:8 (RSV).

Oregon Firm Sues Hale Bank

An Oregon firm has brought suit in Bay City federal court against Farmers and Merchants State Bank of Hale, charging that the bank guaranteed payment of goods delivered to the Amateur Treasure Hunters Association, Incorporated, of Oscoda and has failed to pay.

White Electronics, Incorporated, asks a judgment of \$47,567.75 for merchandise which it says it delivered to the Treasurer Hunters Association last April after the bank guaranteed "orally and by written instrument" payment of the purchase price.

The bank became involved in the operation of the Oscoda firm last April following its disclosure that a customer, Gene C. Ballinger, owner of the treasure hunting firm, was involved in a check kiting scheme of more than \$600,000. Ballinger is free on bond while awaiting federal court trial on mail fraud charges.

Ballinger operated the business under an agreement with the bank until August, when the bank took control of the firm. Since then, Ballinger commenced suit in Iosco County Circuit Court asking damages of \$18,400 against the bank. The suit charges the bank and four other defendants with negligence, false representations and conspiracy to bankrupt the Oscoda metal detection equipment sales firm.

The bank has denied these allegations in its answer to the court and maintains that Ballinger defaulted on the "workout" agreement he signed with the bank in April to continue operation of the firm.

SS Answers Questions on Benefits

Question: I get monthly social security retirement checks. Because I earn a little over \$1,600 each year, I have to file an annual report of my earnings with social security. Since I will become 72 in July, will I have to file an annual report for 1972?

Answer: Yes. It is true that there is no limit on how much people 72 and over can earn without any reduction in their social security. But since you will not be 72 during some months of 1972, January through June, you must file an annual report of your earnings for the entire year. No annual report will be required for 1973 and later years.

Question: I get social security because my father is retired. I will become 22 about three months before I graduate from college. Will I continue to receive student benefits until I graduate?

Answer: No. Monthly social security benefits to student beneficiaries are only payable up to age 22.

Question: When I became 65 recently, I signed up for medicare's

hospital and medical insurance. Can I use this coverage for all doctors and hospitals?

Answer: You can, of course, go to any physician of your choice. Most hospitals participate in medicare, but not all. Any social security office can tell you whether a hospital participates in medicare.

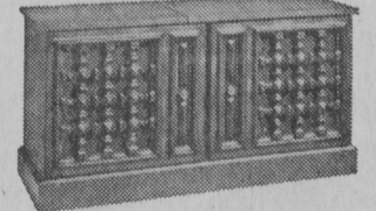

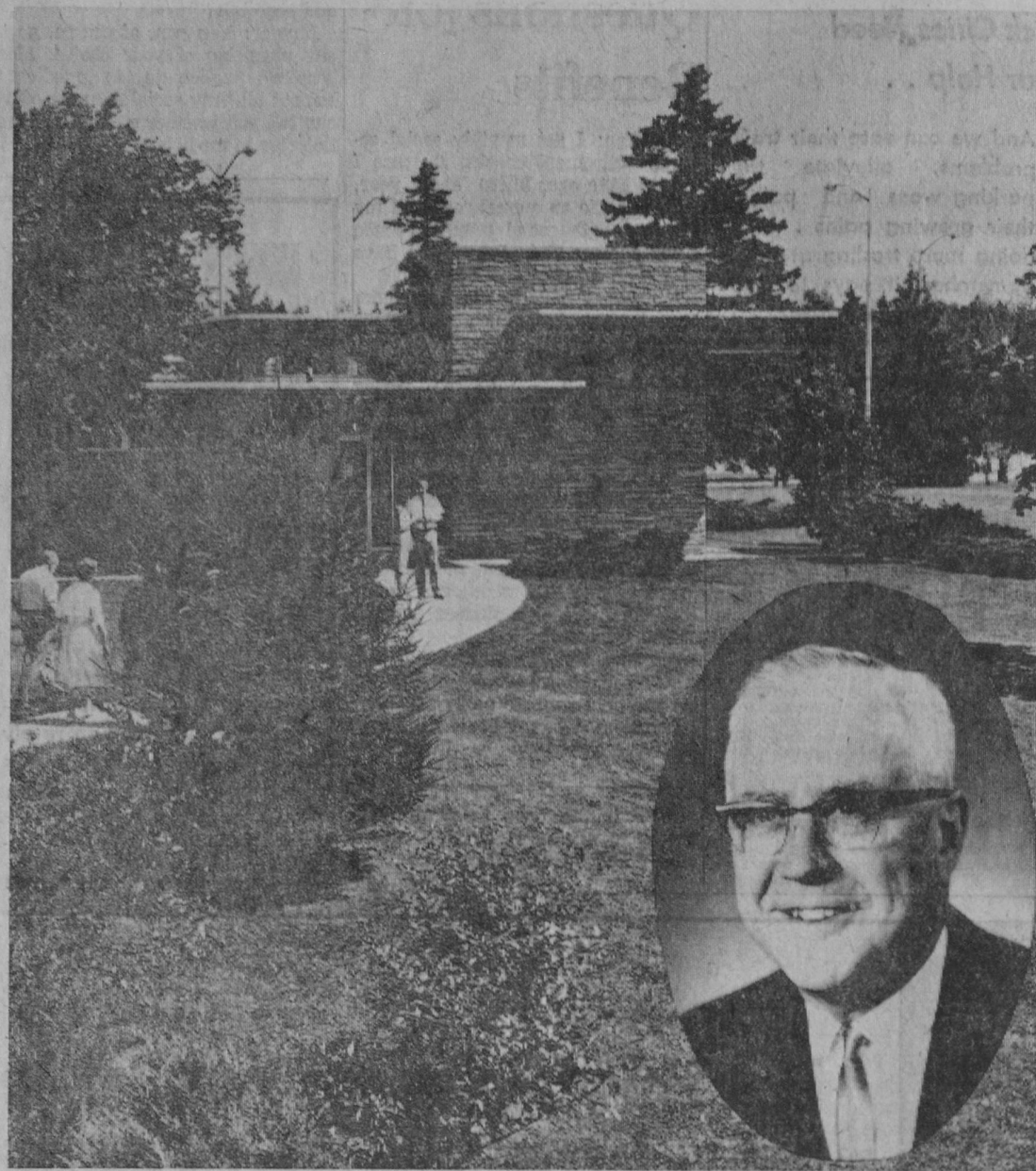

TOWNSHIP OF SHERMAN ORDINANCE NO. 6 SNOWMOBILE ORDINANCE

The people of the Township of Sherman enact Ordinance No. 6, an ordinance to regulate snowmobiles in the Township of Sherman, County of Iosco, and State of Michigan, as to certain designated roadways:

SECTION 1: Definitions.
(a) "Operator" means any person who operates or who is in actual physical control of a snowmobile.
(b) "Operate" means to control the operation of a snowmobile.
(c) "Snowmobile" means any motorized vehicle designated for travel primarily on snow or ice, steered by wheels, skis or runners.

(d) "Highway or street" means the entire width between the boundary lines of every way publicly maintained when any part thereof is open to the use of the public for the purpose of vehicular traffic.

(e) "Roadway" means that portion of a highway improved, designated or ordinarily used for vehicular travel.

(f) "Shoulder" means that portion of a highway or either side of the roadway which is normally snow plowed for the safety and convenience of vehicular traffic.

(g) "Right of way" means that portion of a highway less the roadway and any shoulder.

SECTION 2: No snowmobile shall be operated upon the snow plowed portion of the roadway or shoulder within any highway under the jurisdiction of the Iosco County Road Commission unless the same shall be designated by the Iosco County Road Commission for snowmobile operation in accordance with Section 12 (f) of Act No. 178 of the Michigan Public Acts of 1971.

SECTION 3: All snowmobiles operated within such designated roadways or shoulders shall proceed in a single file with the flow of traffic to the extreme right of the plowed portion of such designated roadways or shoulders.

SECTION 4: All snowmobiles so operated on such designated roadways or shoulders shall stop at all intersections of such roadway or shoulder with intersecting roadways or shoulders.

SECTION 5: No snowmobile operated upon the said designated roadways or shoulders as provided for herein shall park within such roadways or shoulders except in emergency situations.

SECTION 6: Any person who violates the provisions of this ordinance is guilty of a misdemeanor.

SECTION 7: This ordinance shall take effect March 19, 1972.

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SECTION 7: This ordinance shall take effect March 19, 1972.

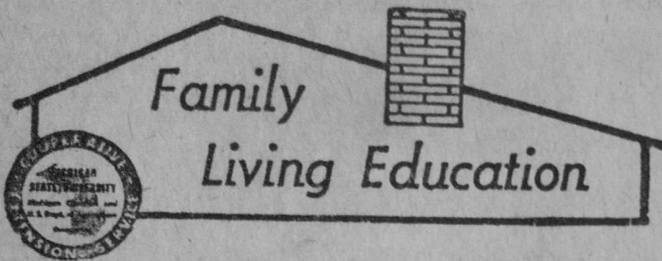

Your Dinnerware—Is It Safe?

Lead, cadmium and other toxic metals occur all around us. Our bodies take in a small amount of these substances from the air we breathe and the food we eat.

Some, not all, glazes and decals contain acid-soluble toxic metal compounds which can be released by acid-containing foods.

Problems with these substances result from increased exposure over a period of time. The presence of lead in a glaze is not necessarily dangerous.
