NOTICE To losco County PROPERTY

State law requires the county tax equalization department to publish information relative to 1972 assessment levels and anticipated factors.

As of February 18, the losco County Tax Equalization Department expects that the ratio of assessment to true cash value will be at 50% in all taxing units of the county.

Dates and hours of these meetings will be advertised by individual cities and townships. Failure to make complaint at board of review results in loss of right of appeal to state tax commission.



Problems with these substances result from increased exposure over a period of time. The presence of lead in a glaze is not necessarily dangerous. The important factor is how resistant the glaze or decal is to attack by food acids.

Some, not all, glazes and decals contain acid-soluble toxic metal compounds which can be released by acid-containing foods. These metal compounds are released by foods, such as fruit juice, soft drinks, wines, cider, vinegar, saurkraut and tomatoes. The metals are leached out at a greater rate if the food or beverage is hot rather than cold. The longer the food or beverage is allowed to stand in the container, Mothers Can the more metal is leached out.
