

MARTIN KASISCHKE, Tawas City postmaster since May 17, 1954, has "changed hats" with the United States Postal Service. Effective Saturday, February 5, Kasischke became carrier on Rural Route No. 2, succeeding Carl Libka, who retired last month. The new carrier is shown casing mail prior to delivering the route Tuesday morning. Named officer in charge of the post office was Leonard Hosbach, lower picture, who has been a member of the Tawas City post office staff since 1936. With 36 years of service in May, Hosbach became assistant postmaster in 1937, then spent four years in military service during World War II. When he returned from the army in 1946, the position of assistant postmaster had been eliminated and he served as clerk until 1956 when he was again appointed assistant postmaster. Under terms of postal service regulations, vacancies are to be filled from the ranks of employees according to years of service. It is expected that the official naming of a postmaster will not take place for about six months.—Tawas Herald Photos.



County Apportionment Now Being Considered

Iosco Apportionment Commission, which has responsibility for redistricting the county board of commissioners according to the 1970 census under the one-man, one-vote criteria, is to meet again today (Wednesday). This commission, composed of the county clerk, treasurer, prosecuting attorney, along with chairmen of county Republican and Democratic committees, have until March 4 to complete the work, according to state law.

The county board of supervisors mapped the district plan when county commission districts were first formed in 1967. A nine-man commission replaced the old board of supervisors. The attorney general ruled last year that county commissions had the same responsibility for reapportionment of districts according to the 1970 census, but the court of ap-

peals ruled that the act applied only to the 1967 situation.

Prior to receipt of the appeals court opinion, there had been considerable discussion concerning actual numbers of districts. Some commissioners desired a five-man body, while others favored retaining the present nine-man commission or even expanding the membership because of the amount of work required for operation of the county.

The 1970 census has indicated major population changes in the county, particularly at Oscoda, and apportionment of the commission is now in the hands of County Clerk Keith Papas, County Treas. Edward Nelkie, County Pros. Atty. Kenneth Myles, along with M. F. Killey, county Republican chairman, and Robert Pember, county Democratic chairman.

City Treas. Mary Byrd Named Clerk; Edward Savage Fills Council Vacancy

One appointment by the city manager, selection of a new councilman to fill an unexpired term and a list of seven appointees submitted by the mayor to fill vacancies were approved Monday night by the Tawas City Council in a rapidly changing local governmental scene.

Mrs. Mary Byrd, city treasurer, was named by City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz as the new city clerk and acting city assessor to serve on the tax board of review.

The other major change was selection by the council of Edward Savage to fill the unexpired term of Martin Wellna, who resigned his alderman's seat because of ill health.

The appointment of Mrs. Byrd to fill the vacancy of the late Walter C. Nelson as city clerk, which was approved by the council, came as no real surprise. Combining such administrative offices by the city manager is authorized by the city's new charter.

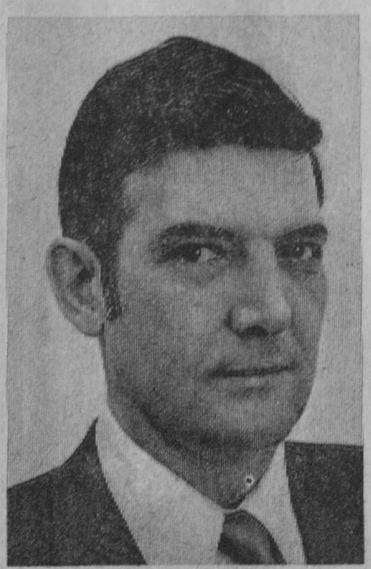
Bublitz told the council that Mrs. Byrd's work as treasurer had familiarized her with the job of city clerk. As treasurer, she has spent about five months of the year at the city hall collecting taxes and will now spend more time there as clerk. The council authorized a \$100 increase for the clerk's job, bringing that annual salary to \$750 per year. She will continue to receive her regular pay as the elected treasurer.

Appointment of Mrs. Byrd as city assessor is a temporary measure. No one in the city has expressed interest in becoming qualified under state law to become the tax assessor and the three supervisors handling this work have been given an extra year to qualify as an assessor. Mrs. Byrd would act as clerk of the board of review when it meets in the spring.

Savage's name as alderman was placed in nomination by Clark Tanner, while the name of Robert Erick-

sen was given by Robert Rollin. Ericksen, who was an unsuccessful candidate in last year's primary election for the council and a general election write-in candidate, appeared before the council and indicated he was interested in the position.

A secret ballot by the council gave four votes to Savage and two votes to Ericksen. The new councilman was notified by telephone of his selection and he appeared later at the

city hall to receive the oath of office from Mrs. Byrd.

Seven appointments of Mayor John Brugger were as follows:

Water board—Del Myles, 1975; Paul Sullivan, 1975; Carl Libka, 1974. Members whose terms had not expired are Carl Schaaf and Harold Bublitz.

This is a major change in makeup of the water board. Terms of the new city charter provide that elective officers may no longer serve on boards or commissions for which compensation is received. The city attorney has ruled that service on the fire department, for example, is included in the above provision and that councilmen and other elective officers would be required to resign from such offices.

Vacancies on the water board included the mayor pro tem and mayor, who had served as a nonvoting chairman. Terms of Arthur Wuggazer and Daniel Ulrich expire this year. The fire chief has served in the past as a member of the water board. The water board is to select its chairman from its own ranks at the next meeting.

Because of the present inability to find a suitable replacement for chief of the volunteer fire department, particularly a person who resides or works near the city hall, Ald. James

Snowmobile Code Adopted by East Tawas

Objections to adoption of a new snowmobile ordinance to bring East Tawas within the minimum limits of the state snowmobile code were heard at Monday night's regular meeting.

By unanimous action of the council, however, the ordinance was adopted and a second motion waived second and third readings of the ordinance to provide speedier action.

James Daley and Otto Kobs, both of West Washington Street, voiced objection to what they termed a snowmobile nuisance. Daley reported that his shrubbery had been damaged by snowmobiles operating along the street, that one operator came within three inches of his house and snowmobiles caused interruption to his television service.

Ald. Earl McElhannon expressed the opinion that perhaps 50 percent or more of the residents were opposed to allowing snowmobiles to operate on streets.

City Clerk Clyde Soper said Tuesday that a proposition placed before

Fee Proposed For Garbage Collection

Possible adoption of a new ordinance to place garbage collection on a fee basis to users, rather than to pay for this service out of the city's general fund, is currently being considered by the Tawas City Council.

In reviewing the history of garbage collection in this city, Mayor John Brugger said the garbage service was first started more than 20 years ago when pickups were made by city trucks. The city then changed to a contractual basis for such collection.

Brugger said that the cost of this service had grown from about \$600 to today's price tag of about \$13,000 annually with about 600 customers. He pointed out that money spent for garbage collection represented about two mills of taxes and all borne by the general fund.

A number of inequities in the present system have been cited in the past. It was pointed out at a meeting of the council last year that some businesses, particularly resorts and restaurants, receive free pickups under the present setup, while other businesses pay for this service or handle transportation individual-

ly.

Mayor Brugger expressed the opinion that cost of providing such service should be borne by those utilizing it. A sample ordinance is being studied which would provide for licensing of a garbage collector, who would charge a specified fee for this service. Industrial and commercial users would contract with the licensee for the service.

A major cost of the garbage collection service is maintenance of the sanitary land fill facility, which Tawas City operates in conjunction with East Tawas. This monthly cost of about \$400 would continue to be borne by the general fund.

Other sample ordinances are to be studied and the matter is to be discussed further at the next meeting. The new system may go into effect by April 1.

In other business, the council authorized changing the intersection at Court and First Streets to a four-way stop. Court Street from First Street to M-55 is to be continued as a through street, but the posted speed limit is to be lowered to 15 miles per hour, rather than the current 25 miles per hour. All intersecting streets at the railroad tracks are to be stop streets, giving the right-of-way to traffic on Court Street. It is hoped that the above action will correct dangerous traffic problems at the First Street intersection, as well as at the other intersections.

On recommendation of Ald. Robert Rollin, the council is to study the possibility of changing the radio in the city patrol car from the state police frequency to the radio band utilized by the sheriff's department.

The council decided that the city would not participate in mayor's exchange day as part of this year's Michigan Week program. The city has not participated in this event for the past three years.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz reported he had received word from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources concerning possible participation in repairs to the city dock. Bublitz said that the communication was not encouraging because the dock probably would not qualify because of the lack of facilities for small boat mooring. He said the matter had not been dropped and further investigation is to be made concerning possible assistance.

The council is to meet February 29 as a committee of the whole to discuss a budget for operating the city between March 11 and June 30. This gap in financing was created with changing the city's fiscal year under terms of the new charter.

One building application approved during the past two weeks was for Edwin Habermehl, 608 Second Street, panel bedroom walls, \$150.

TC Council Hopes Meeting Agenda Will Speed Work

As a means of improving its administrative and legislative process, Tawas City Council used a printed agenda for the first time at its regular meeting Monday night.

With a new mayor, a newly-appointed clerk and four new members on the six-member council, it is believed that utilizing an agenda may help to organize meetings and better prepare city officers for topics to be acted on at regular meetings.

The city manager prepares the agenda on the Friday preceding the regular Monday night meeting and it is mailed to councilmen along with a copy of minutes from the previous meeting.

It was stressed that exceptions would be made to the agenda's outline of business in order to hear important matters to be brought to the council's attention.

Firemen Battled Blaze - Weather

Battling frigid weather as well as flames, East Tawas and Tawas City volunteer fire departments fought nearly three hours Friday before finally bringing under control a blaze at the Barbier Oil Company service station on US-23, East Tawas.

Only the walls of the front part of the building were left standing and it was a total loss. The rear part of the building, of concrete block construction, was not burned.

Fire Chief William Look Jr. said that the blaze started when an employee of the service station used gasoline to clean the furnace room floor. Fumes from the gasoline were apparently ignited by the furnace.

A call to the East Tawas department was placed about 3:00 p. m. by one of the employees, who ran to a nearby business place, for a fire extinguisher. Tawas City Fire Department responded soon after under the mutual protection agreement be-

tween the two cities.

Flames burned through the furnace room ceiling into living quarters occupied by Mr. and Mrs. John Whitman on the second floor.

Chief Look and Chief James Lasky of Tawas City described the blaze as a stubborn one. Firemen were at the scene for five hours and had US-23 blocked for two hours to lay a hose across the highway. The ruined building was a block of ice Friday morning.

The building was originally constructed in the late 1930s by Gerald Mallon as a boat manufacturing plant. It was later converted into a hotel and tavern and once owned by Joseph Fox. When purchased by Truman Barbier, the front section of the building was retained and the back portion was removed and replaced with a concrete block structure.

The rear portion was damaged by smoke, but a truck parked inside was not damaged.

Bank Denies Any Fraud Or Conspiracy

In its notice of appearance filed Monday, attorneys for Farmers and Merchants State Bank of Hale answered allegations contained in a recent \$18,400,000 damage suit brought in Iosco Circuit Court by Gene Ballinger of Oscoda.

Attorneys Michael Freel of East Tawas and Harvey D. Walker of Saginaw denied that control of the Amateur Treasure Hunters Association, Incorporated, formerly owned by Ballinger, was assumed by reason of fraud.

The bank's attorneys, also representing Richard Parkinson, F&M president, asked the court to dismiss the complaint and asked that court cost and attorney fees of the defendants be taxed to Ballinger.

On January 18, Ballinger charged the bank and four other defendants with negligence, false representations and conspiracy to bankrupt his metal detection equipment sales firm at Oscoda.

Still to file answers with the court are three other defendants, Fisher Research Laboratories, Incorporated, Palo Alto, California; David Hayslip, a former FRL employee, who had served as office manager for the Association for several months; Edward Lewis, president of the California firm.

Ballinger is currently free under \$25,000 bond while awaiting federal court trial on 26 counts of mail fraud in a check kiting scheme nearly a year ago against the Hale bank. In March of last year, the bank suffered a loss of approximately \$700,000 from a check kiting operation and later identified Ballinger as the customer involved.

In May of last year, Ballinger entered into an agreement with the bank whereby he was to be permitted to repay the debt under bank control. Ballinger's suit stated that he executed a promissory note of \$627,427.66, secured by an interest in all Association assets as well as encumbering his personal property.

In its appearance Monday, the bank declared Ballinger to be in default of the terms of a "work-out agreement" by reason of numerous breaches committed by himself.

Attorneys averred that the bank assumed complete ownership of the Amateur Treasure Hunters Association in early August, "pursuant to terms of the agreement and stock assignment to it," all completely within the law.

Federal Government Seeks Dismissal in Miller's Suit

A motion asking dismissal on grounds that the Bay City Federal District Court lacks jurisdiction has been filed in a \$10,500 suit brought against the government by Iosco Circuit Judge and Mrs. Allan C. Miller.

The Millers, who reside in Baldwin Township along the Lake Huron shore, claim that dumping of excess water from Lake Superior has caused undue flooding of Lakes Michigan and Huron. This, they say, caused loss of beach frontage and

destruction of a dock and breakwall on their property.

A motion by James Russell, assistant United States district attorney, points out the United States has not consented to be sued, that the constitution does not prohibit taking of property but insists only that compensation be given for what is taken and that the federal district court has no jurisdiction over the United States "to adjudicate water rights in the Great Lakes."

His motion concludes, "The complaint of plaintiffs fails to state a claim against the United States for which relief can be granted and this court lacks jurisdiction over the United States."

Judge Miller, contacted Friday at his office in the Iosco County Building, said that the assistant district attorney "had filed nothing which was too surprising." He said that he had been given until April 1 to file a responsive pleading.

The judge, who is handling his own case as a private citizen in federal court, said there was one big count in his petition and that was the United States Corps of Engineers was negligent in handling overflow water from Lake Superior.

As a means of maintaining the level of Lake Superior, water is diverted from the Hudson Bay area into Lake Superior. When Lake Superior reaches an established level, the overflow is sent into Lakes Michigan and Huron and it is claimed that this sudden flow is responsible for the shore damage in the lower lakes. The outlet to the Atlantic Ocean is controlled on Lake Ontario which it is said adds to the high water problem in the middle lakes.

Because of the scope of controlling water in the Great Lakes, a joint commission of the United States and Canada has jurisdiction.

The circuit judge's case in federal court holds great interest to other shore property owners of this county and along Lakes Huron and Michigan.

Probably as an outcome of Judge Miller's suit, along with organization of the Lake Huron Shore Owners Association, headed by Robert Marsh of East Tawas, a meeting was called Tuesday (yesterday) to hear complaints of shore property owners.

Held at the East Tawas Community Building, the meeting was sponsored by United States Sen. Philip Hart, Cong. Elford A. Cedberg and State Rep. George A. Prescott of Tawas City.

Shore property owners from a nine-county area between Cheboygan and Bay City testified at the hearing. Representatives were there from the corps of engineers and the Michigan Water Resources Commission.

Lansky is to continue to hold this position until a successor can be named. Lansky has been a member of the department since 1949 and was named last year to succeed the late Howard Hatton as a member of the council.

Mayor Brugger reappointed James Dillon to the joint water board and Hatton's vacancy on that board is to be filled by the city manager. The third member is Schaaf, whose term expires in 1973.

Appointed to the city planning commission were Russell Carney and John Forsten.

The mayor indicated that there are still vacancies to be filled on the cemetery board, board of appeals and park board.

Iosco Commission Action Centers Around Parks

A special session Friday continued from the January meeting to consider its own apportionment, which has since been ruled out by the state court of appeals, saw Iosco Board of Commissioners handling only routine matters.

The board authorized completion of two phases of state-federal boat launching ramp and recreational

area projects at AuSable Park, pending an agreement with the waterways commission concerning the state's acceptance of administration and operation of the completed project.

Com. Robert Foster reported that the waterways commission had suggested that the county complete the two uncompleted phases under a modified plan to lower the cost. He said that the waterways commission was willing to accept responsibility for administering and operating the park, or it could be operated by the county if desired.

Other park matters saw the conservation committee recommend that the parks and recreation commission turn operation of Osceola Beach Park over to the Osceola Township Park Commission. Details of this are to be approved at the February 16 meeting.

It was reported that application for aid in renovating Old Orchard Park was now nearing completion. It was stated that plans for develop-

ment of the Long Lake Park had been delayed because the park commission was not satisfied with the location there of a boat ramp proposed by the department of natural resources and a new site is to be selected.

The commission tabled a bill for membership dues to the Michigan Association of Counties. The commission had approved dues of \$950 in December, but a new bill was received for \$2,250, which is based on the county's new valuation.

It was reported that the county had hired only five persons under the federal government's emergency employment act and that it must comply with hiring a sixth person in order to remain in the program. The commission is considering hiring another custodian for the county building-jail complex.

Discussion was held on the proposed move of District Health Department No. 2 offices from West Branch to Tawas City. It was reported that the department is considering a move to the Powers building in Tawas City, presently occupied by the Alpena Mental Health office. It was stated that the mental health office is to move to the new Myles building in Tawas City when that building is completed.

On recommendation of representatives of Michigan Youth Services, the county commission is to act as fiscal agent for that program which serves boys between the ages of 15 and 18 years in 28 area counties. Facilities at Wurtsmith Air Force Base are utilized and there would be no cost to the county.

Grant-Tawas Townships Pass Snowmobile Codes

Townships of Grant and Tawas this week adopted snowmobile ordinances in compliance with the state's revised snowmobile act of 1971. Five townships of the county have taken similar action during recent weeks and others are contemplating passing ordinances.

This action by township boards allows snowmobilers to travel upon snowplowed portions of public roads. The City of East Tawas took similar action Monday night.

Hearing Held on Shoreline Erosion

Nearly 100 persons attended a hearing Tuesday noon at the East Tawas Community Building concerning shoreline erosion on the Great Lakes.

Among conference participants were Maj. Thomas J. Woodall, deputy district engineer for the United States Corps of Engineers, Detroit; William Marx, Michigan Water Resources Commission, who was chairman of the hearing; Philip McCallister, chief of the engineering division, United States Corps of Engineers; State Rep. George A. Prescott of Tawas City, who was a sponsor of the hearing along with members of Michigan's congressional delegation and State Sen. Robert Richardson.

Similar meetings have been held in five different locations in the state concerning shoreline erosion. Discussion centered on the causes of erosion, the likelihood of anything to alleviate the problem and general views and comments from the audience, many of whom were shoreline property owners.

With 55 miles of Lake Huron shoreline in a critically eroded condition, including several miles of beach in Iosco County north of East Tawas, Marx stressed that erosion was basically a problem at a given time "and then we forget about it when the water goes down." He said the erosion problem was too serious to be so treated.

He said the history of geology indicates that in the future, the Great Lakes will gradually be filled in with eroded materials. He said that the current high water period shows no signs of being alleviated at this time and Lake Huron will be several inches higher this summer.

Marx said there was an abnormal

ly high amount of precipitation during December and, unless there is a dry spring, the Great Lakes will be even higher than anticipated.

The water resources commission spokesman explained workings of gates at Sault Ste. Marie which regulate the level of Lake Superior and said that the lake was higher than normal.

He said there were state programs aimed at preventing the spread of damage but there was no assistance for those suffering erosion damage.

Marx said that a new state law gives control to local units of government to zone unplotted shoreline property in order to prevent building too close to the water's edge.

It was stressed that no federal funds were available for erosion control on private property. The same is true for state funds.

TOWNSHIP OF TAWAS ORDINANCE NO. 1 SNOWMOBILE ORDINANCE

The people of the Township of Tawas enact Ordinance No. 1, an ordinance to regulate snowmobiles in the Township of Tawas, County of Iosco, and State of Michigan, as to certain designated roadways:

SECTION 1: Definitions. (a) "Operator" means any person who operates or who is in actual physical control of a snowmobile. (b) "Operate" means to control the operation of a snowmobile. (c) "Snowmobile" means any motorized vehicle designated for travel primarily on snow or ice, steered by wheels, skis or runners.

(d) "Highway or street" means the entire width between the boundary lines of every way publicly maintained when any part thereof is open to the use of the public for the purpose of vehicular traffic. (e) "Roadway" means that portion of a highway improved, designated or ordinarily used for vehicular travel.

(f) "Shoulder" means that portion of a highway or either side of the roadway which is normally snow plowed for the safety and convenience of vehicular traffic. (g) "Right of way" means that portion of a highway less the roadway and any shoulder.

SECTION 2: No snowmobile shall be operated upon the snow plowed portion of the roadway or shoulder within any highway under the jurisdiction of the Iosco County Road Commission unless same shall be designated by the Iosco County Road Commission for snowmobile operation in accordance with Section 12 (f) of Act No. 178 of the Michigan Public Acts of 1971.

SECTION 3: All snowmobiles operated within such designated roadways or shoulders shall proceed in a single file with the flow of traffic to the extreme right of the plowed portion of such designated roadways or shoulders. SECTION 4: All snowmobiles shall be operated upon the said designated roadways or shoulders as provided for herein shall park within such roadways or shoulders except in emergency situations.

SECTION 5: No snowmobile operated upon the said designated roadways or shoulders as provided for herein shall park within such roadways or shoulders except in emergency situations. SECTION 6: Any person who violates the provisions of this ordinance is guilty of a misdemeanor.

SECTION 7: This ordinance shall take effect March 7, 1972. I certify that the foregoing ordinance was adopted by the Township Board for the Township of Tawas, Iosco County, Michigan, at a Regular meeting held on February 7, 1972.

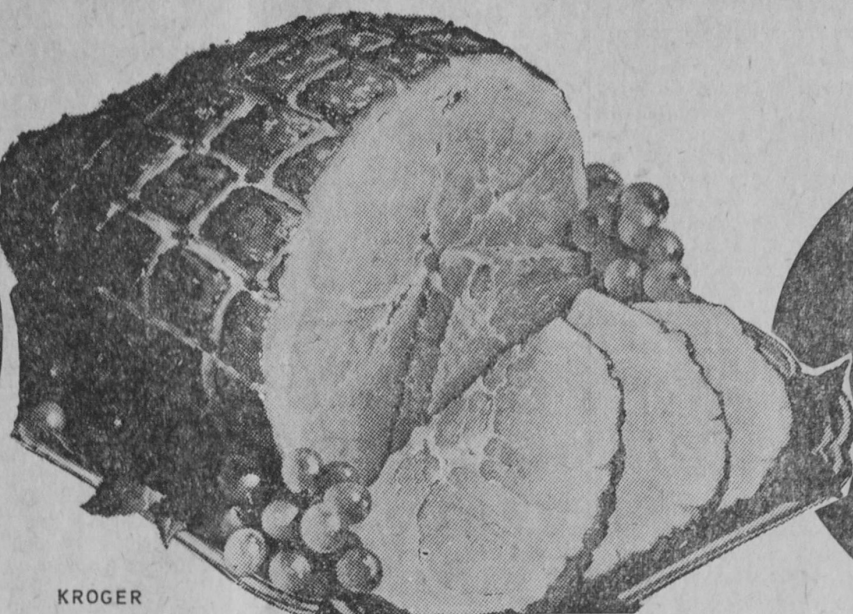

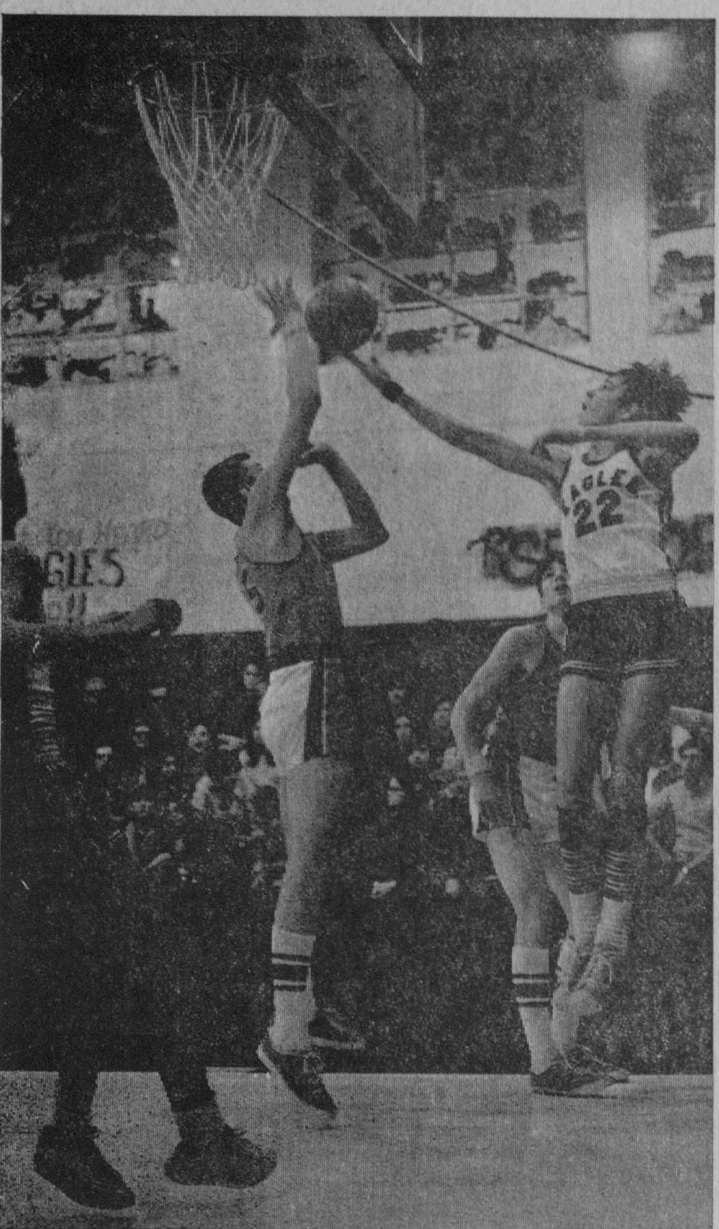

Hale Eagles Grab Share of First Place in North Star Race

Upsetting two of its conference's top teams last week, the Hale Area Eagles earned a slice of the first place pie in the North Star League by defeating Au Gres Tuesday night and then followed with a 53-46 come-from-behind victory over Arenac Eastern.

Friday night's game was a complete turnabout from the fracas Tuesday night game against Au Gres. In the latter, the Eagles had a 24-point lead in the first half and nearly lost the game, 75-73. In Friday night's tilt, the Hale squad was as cold as a snowman's moustache in the first quarter, then settled down to play good basketball.

Although there probably is no happier coach than Purkey in the North Star League, he would like to see charges put it all together for this big meeting and then retain this momentum for the remainder of the season.

The Eagles were scheduled to go against Whittemore - Prescott Cardinals in a nonleague game Tuesday night.

Hale Area won both ends of the double header Friday night when the Little Eagles won over the Arenac Eastern JV, 58-41. Eastern had too many turnovers in the game and just could not cope with the outstanding rebounding height of the Hale Area squad.

Ken Brown topped the winners with 17 points and was closely followed by Steve Humphrey, who meshed 16 biggies. Dennis Stutzman had 12 points and Rod Grusecki topped him with 14 points for the losers.

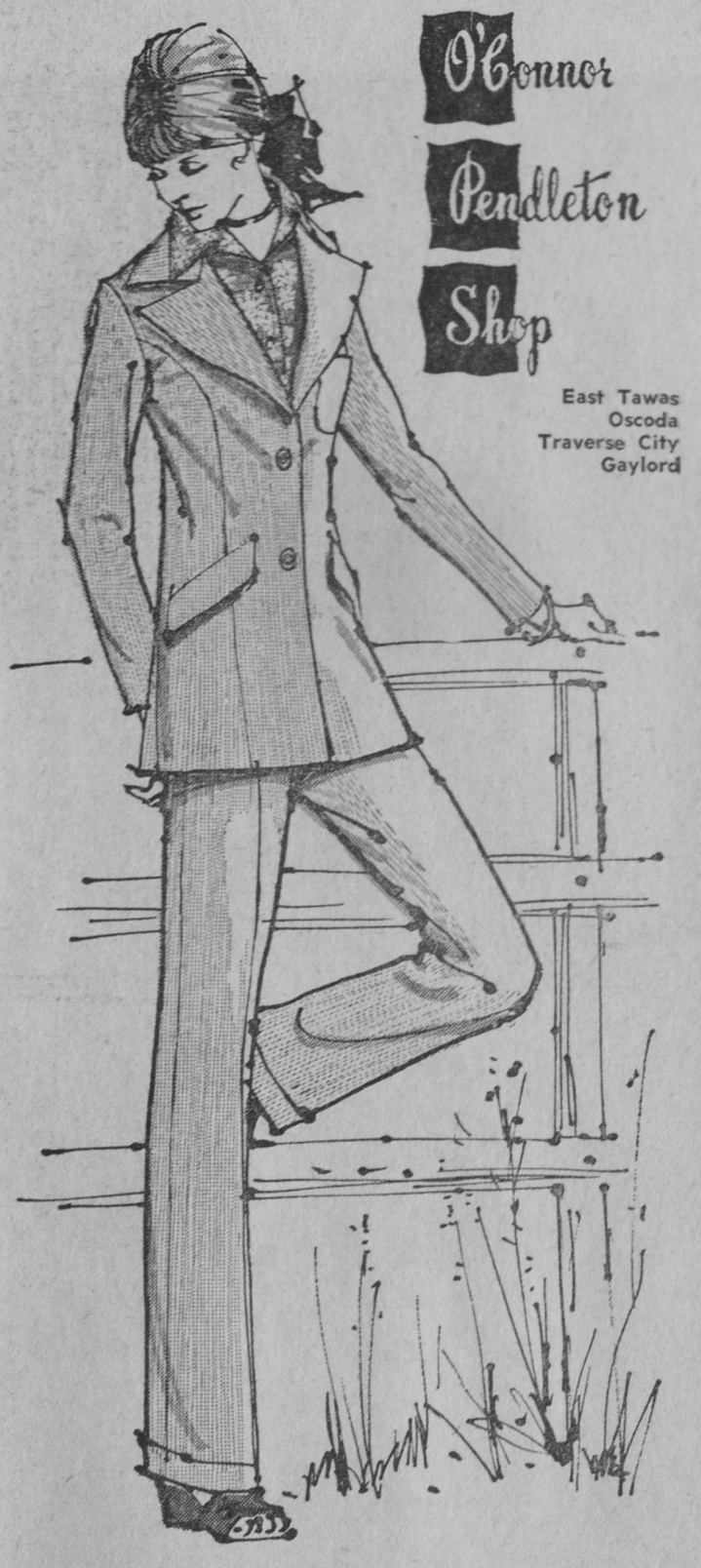

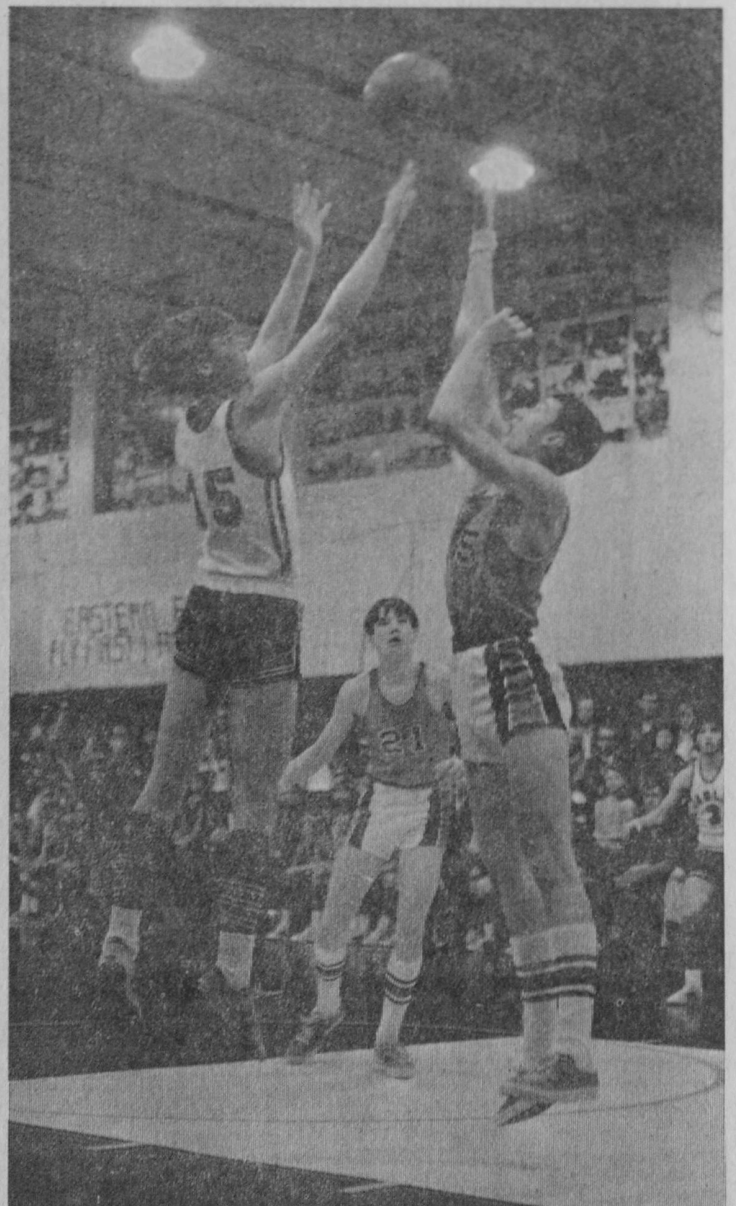

SS Answers Questions on Benefits

Question: I never worked under social security but I get monthly social security checks as a widow. Will I be entitled to medicare when I am 65?

Answer: Yes. You are eligible for medicare at 65. Anyone who is entitled to social security retirement checks at 65 is also entitled to medicare.

Question: I am getting monthly social security retirement checks and working part-time. Last month, I told the social security office that I expected to earn \$1,700 this year. But now I have gotten a raise and find that I will make \$2,100 this year. When should I tell social security about my higher income?

Answer: Immediately. Call or visit any social security office. The dollar amount of your social security checks this year depends on the total amount you earn. By immediately notifying social security of your raise, you can avoid the financial burden of having to refund any over-payment later.

Question: I am getting monthly social security retirement checks. Recently, I moved to a new address in the same city. Since I have already notified the post office of my new address, must I also notify social security?

Answer: Yes, you should immediately notify the Social Security Administration of your new address.

Question: If my monthly social security retirement check does not arrive on the third of the month as it usually does, what should I do?

Answer: Wait a few more days. The mail could be late. If you have not received the check by then, call the nearest social security office.

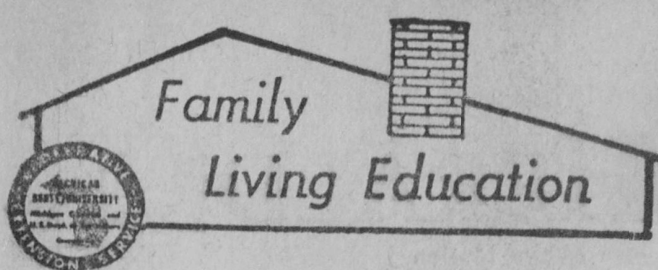

Marital Enrichment

From time to time, I have an experience or learn something new that I cannot wait to pass on to all of you with whom I live and work. One of those experiences happened to me in December when I attended a week-long training session in marital enrichment process. I would like to share with you some of what this is.

Four to six couples and a leader are involved in a group experience for six, two-hour sessions. During these sessions, couples share various aspects of their marriage and their feelings about these aspects. The groups are formed with the sole purpose of helping couples become more aware of all that is positive in their relationship, to be able to receive, as well as give, love and to be able to share with one another.

Marital enrichment is not group therapy, sensitivity training or a substitute for marriage counseling. It is not for people with "problems." Nobody is pressured by the group or forced to do something he does not want to do.

Marital enrichment is a way to enhance husband-wife communications. It can make both husband and wife more aware of what they value in their marriage partner instead of

the little things that are so easy to criticize. Potentially, it can help a good marriage get better.

That is a short description of marital enrichment for a good reason. Marital enrichment means something a little different for each person who participates. It helps each person get in touch with his own feelings, whatever they might be. And it helps him practice expressing those feelings.

I am convinced that this can be a valuable and enjoyable experience for most couples. Any doubts I originally had were put to rest during our training. If you are interested, but have questions or concerns, why not stop by our office or phone. I would be glad to explain the process further.

We do plan to start some groups in this area. The first will probably be in Standish on Sunday evenings. If you would like to become involved there, or are interested in beginning another group, please contact me at the Cooperative Extension office, Federal Building, East Tawas.

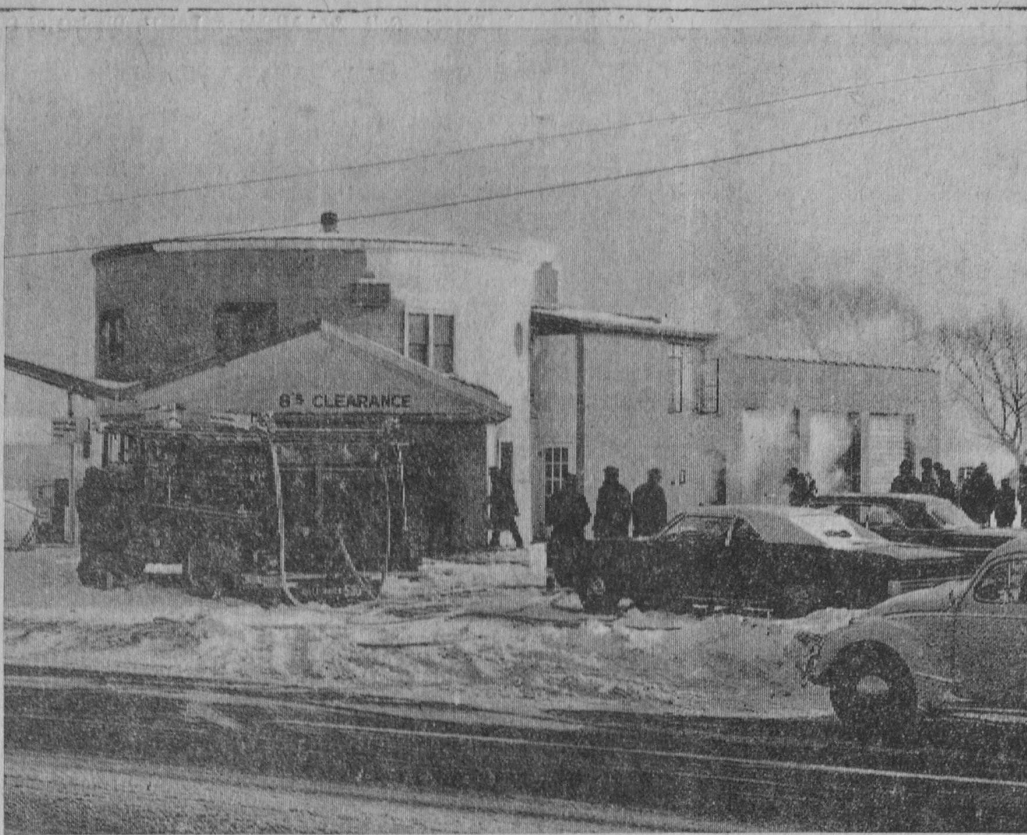
