# Two Arraigned on Conspiracy Charge

Two Tawas City men, Sidney Teague, 54, and James Clark, 38, demanded preliminary examination Monday when arraigned in district court on charges involving the sale of stolen snowmachines.

Arraigned before Dist. Court Magistrate Stanley Snable, examination was set for Wednesday afternoon. Bond of \$1,000 was set for Teague and a \$2,500 bond was continued for Clark.

Clark, already facing charges of possession of stolen snowmobiles and to be arraigned Wednesday before District Judge J. Richard Ernst, was charged Friday on three counts of receiving and concealing stolen property as well as conspiracy in obtaining money under false pretenses.

Teague, a snowmachine dealer, is charged as a coconspirator with Clark in obtaining money under false pretenses.

Stolen property in the case so far involves three stolen snowmachines

and a stolen garden tractor. Arrests were made after investigation by the sheriff's department and prosecuting attorney's office.

Officers said that serial numbers of the machines were filed off before any sale was made. However, a second number on one machine was found intact, said officers.

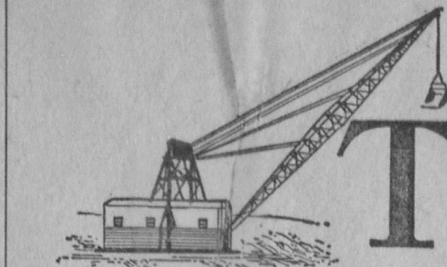

## Immediate and Future Need for Classrooms to be Studied

A discussion on classroom needs and plans for meeting those needs will be held at the February 14 meeting of Tawas Area Board of Education.

At the present time, the high school has an enrollment of 1,104 students in a building which has a maximum capacity of 925 students. A report last year from the University of Michigan's Bureau of Ac-

creditation recommended only 640 students for the building.

A proposal last year to construct an addition to the Tawas City Elementary Unit as a middle school was defeated by voters. The board of education has been studying the possibility of extending the school term as a method of relieving overcrowded conditions.

The gross needs for next year are

to be presented at the meeting and discussion is to be held on immediate and future needs of the school district.

A discussion on the size of study halls and the possibility of reducing or eliminating study halls is to be held.

In other business, John Alexander, high school principal, reported that five teachers did not report to work Monday because of illness. He said that absence of students due to illness was higher than normal.

A report on freshmen students at Central Michigan University indicates that 12 graduates of Tawas Area High School have an average grade of 3.18. The lowest grade point average was 2.47 and one student had a perfect record.

The school has accepted the gift of a hospital bed from Tawas Hospital.

Alexander reported that student records now held by the school were being microfilmed as a means of protection.

Dr. James Jacques, Mrs. Helen Payea and Mrs. Joan Schreck were named as a committee to work with school administrators on the school calendar for next year.

## Hearing Screening Nearly Completed for Area Children

This season's hearing screening program, conducted by the local health department, is nearly completed for the eligible school youngsters in Alcona, Iosco, Ogemaw and Oscoda Counties.

The program provides a preliminary identification of possible hearing loss for all children in kindergarten, second, fourth and sixth grades. James Klaus, administrator, reports that this involves a total of 4,422 children in the area served by District Health Department No. 2.

This year, 400 of these children failed the preliminary test and were retested by a highly-trained and specially-equipped technician. One-fourth of these children were identified as having significant hearing loss, which was previously unknown and untreated.

Children absent on the days their class was tested are usually checked during a "make up" visit by the hearing screening technician. If a child happens to miss the opportunity for testing at school, his parents may contact the health department for information about a later screening date.

Under Michigan law covering health needs of children entering school for the first time, preschoolers are now supposed to have hearing tests along with vision testing, TB skin testing and their regular immunizations. These may be taken care of by regular appointment with local private physicians or during health department hearing screening clinics for preschoolers, usually held in the spring and summer.

The hearing screening program, a combined state and local health effort, is regarded as a major local health service, despite its relatively spectacular nature. It is given a high priority because many hearing problems are easily missed among young children, even though adequate hearing is vital to learning, especially during the early years. The screening timetables are designed so that every youngster is tested at least twice, sometimes as often as every two years, while he is in elementary school.

During the last school year, in the 29 counties served by Michigan's eight lower Northern Michigan health departments, 38 special otology clinics were conducted to examine children identified as having apparent hearing deficiencies. More than 1,300 youngsters from preschool through sixth grade were given the benefit of examination and testing by ear and hearing specialists, at a cost of slightly over \$5,000. In the District Health Department No. 2 area, the three clinics held served 78 children. The program costs the taxpayer about 32 cents per child

screened or, looking at cost from another viewpoint, each new hearing loss costs \$14 to discover.

For families needing financial help to pay for medical care or hearing aids to relieve problems diagnosed as a result of these services, the local health department can help.

The local health department follows up on the results of the clinics to help assure that children actually get the medical care or hearing aids they need. For families who may lack money to pay these extra costs, the local health department helps them apply for financial assistance from Michigan's Services to Crippled Children, a division of the state health department.

## Semester Tests Start Today at Tawas A. School

End of semester examinations are being held this week at Tawas Area Schools. The semester ended one week earlier than usual because of the earlier starting date last fall.

Examinations are to start Wednesday afternoon from 9:00 and 10:00 a. m. classes.

On Thursday morning, examinations will be given for 11:00 a. m. and 12:30 p. m. classes. There will be no hot lunches served and students return home at noon.

Examinations are to be concluded Friday morning with 1:30 and 2:30 p. m. classes. There will be no lunches served and students return home at noon. In addition, all elementary students return home at noon on the regular bus runs.

Teachers are to utilize Thursday and Friday afternoons for checking test papers and to post grades.

## Welsh Reports on Elementary School Activities

In a report on elementary grades Monday night, Edward J. Welsh, elementary supervisor, said that children in grades kindergarten, two, four and six were given hearing tests on Monday by District Health Department No. 2.

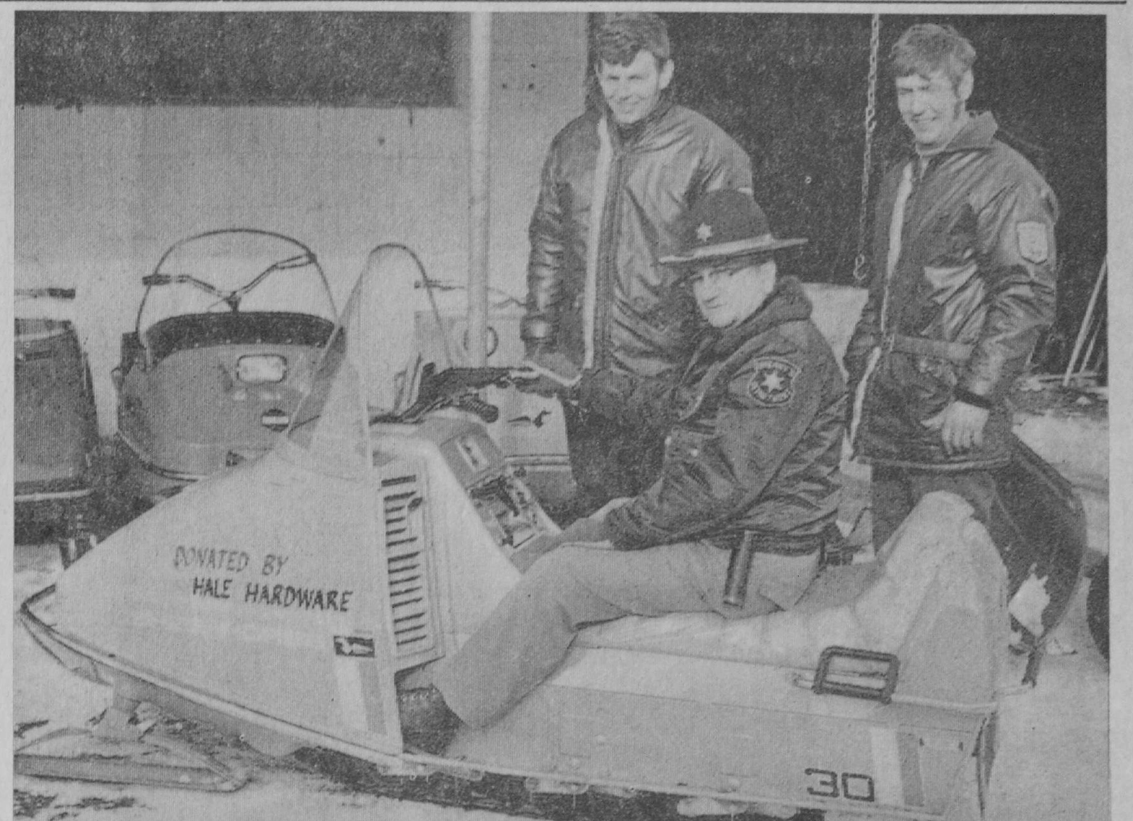
A letter of resignation was received from Miss Dawn Byrum, fourth grade teacher, with an effective date of June 3. The resignation was accepted by the board of education.

Elementary schools are planning open houses for parents on the evening of Wednesday, January 26. The Michigan assessment of basic skills was given to fourth grade children on Monday and Tuesday of this week.

## Board OKs Library Annex Use for Learning-Reading Center

Authorization to develop a learning-reading skills center for high school students in the library annex, to be financed through federal Title I funds, was given Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education.

Appearing before Monday night's regular meeting was Robert H. Crawford, federal programs director for the school.

Crawford told members there was a definite need for such a center and believed that the school would qualify for funding.

A diagram showing how the learning-reading skills center with 40 study positions could fit into the present library annex was presented by Crawford. Because of maximum use of available rooms, this is the only room available in the building for the program.

While testing has not been completed this year, Crawford said that tests last year indicated that from 10 to 20 percent of the student body was reading below the grade level for each grade. He termed the problem as serious.

Crawford presented his recommendations for next year's Title I program. The board of education is to study the proposal for action at a later time.

A final report on the 1971 program was given by Crawford. The school district received Title I funds in the

amount of \$36,239 and expended \$35,181.

The program included a self-contained classroom for slow learners in grades four through six, serving about 15 students. Although these students achieved at a level above that which was expected, Crawford felt that it was too expensive for the number of students involved.

The summer component of the federal project consisted of a six-week summer school with a concentrated effort to increase reading and mathematics skills. Also offered was health, physical education, art enrichment, library reading and science reading.

An additional service was added with seven student teachers from Central Michigan University. This enabled the program to give much more individual attention to students and to enroll more students than in previous years.

Crawford said he felt this was the most effective summer program ever conducted in this school district with approximately 110 children involved.

While the federal government has discontinued funding for such summer programs, Crawford said he was convinced that students had a good learning experience. Teachers involved received good inservice training, tried new approaches and found that they worked. Many of the students are carrying these new found skills over into the regular classroom this year.

"In utilizing student teachers, we were able to give these children much needed individual attention and, consequently, enhanced their self image, changed their attitude toward school and reinforced the instruction they received during the regular school year," said Crawford.

## Three Bridge Projects Set For Bidding

Three area bridge projects are among 13 projects totaling an estimated \$26,400,000 on which bids are to be taken January 19, the Michigan State Highway Commission announced last week.

Included is construction of a three-span rolled steel beam bridge and approach work to replace the present bridge carrying US-23 over the AuSable River near Oscoda. Estimated cost is \$470,000 and completion date is to be November 1972.

Other area projects include deck repairs on the bridges carrying US-23 over the north branch of the Pine River near Standish and over the AuGres River at AuGres. Total estimated cost of the bridges is \$60,000 and the project has an August 1972 completion date.

## Larson Reports on SRA Mathematics Program

Larry Larson, sixth grade mathematics teacher at the Tawas City Elementary Unit, said Monday night that he was very pleased and surprised with response of students to a new system of teaching mathematics in elementary grades.

Used for the first time this year by Tawas Area Schools is a system developed by Science Research Associates. In use for nearly two months, Larson has found that students have been most responsive to the program because they could chart their own progress.

Larson told the board of education that he had been unhappy with traditional teaching methods because he was unable to find time to work with students having individual problems. In addition, the traditional method of teaching was aimed primarily at the average student, which tended to hold back some students on the one hand and pushed other students too fast.

The SRA kit includes materials for surveying each student, diagnostic and progress testing, as well as study materials in all phases of

mathematics for higher elementary grades.

Larson said the SRA program is utilized two days each week. Tape recorded lessons are given on other days for homework assignments with a quiz each Friday on materials covered during the week. Practical mathematical problems in football and basketball statistics, as well as problems found in everyday life, are utilized to create interest in mathematics for students.

Classes have been divided into four groups, each with a leader, to work on problems. Larson said he found that students were becoming more self-reliant in this method of study. About 110 students are involved in the program.

Larson said he had noticed a marked change for the better in study habits and has found that "each student has something to do and they do it. Even the slow kids have some success."

He said that he now was in hopes of obtaining another SRA kit designed for remedial teaching in mathematics.

In the regular meeting of the Iosco County Road Commission Wednesday, December 29, A. J. Aulerich was elected to serve as chairman and Merton F. Killey was elected to serve as vice chairman of the road commission this year. Henry M. Conley is the third member on the commission.

## Tawas Coast Guard Chief is Transferred

Anthony J. Tombolillo, boatswain's mate chief, who has been officer in charge of the United States Coast Guard Station at East Tawas since March 1968, has been reassigned duties as officer in charge of the coast guard station at Galloo Island in Sackets Harbor, New York. Chief Tombolillo and his family will be leaving the Tawas area on January 24 and will make their home in Oswego, New York.

Relieving officer for Chief Tombolillo will be BMC Jerry P. Thomas.

## Whittemore RLDS Church Razed Saturday by Blaze

One of the oldest buildings at Whittemore, the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, was destroyed by fire late Saturday afternoon.

The fire was first noticed by a motorist entering Whittemore along National City Road. The alarm was

turned in to the Whittemore Fire Department but the blaze was out of control before equipment arrived.

The church had been completely remodeled during past years and a 100-year-old pipe organ was installed there five years ago. The building and contents were partially covered by insurance.

Plans are indefinite for rebuilding the church and members of the congregation are to attend the RLDS Church at Twining.

The building reportedly was constructed about 1890. It was located one block west of M-65 on Sherman Street.

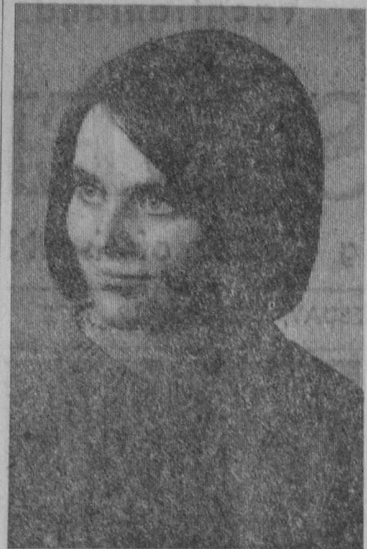

NEMCA Headstart Program 'Strong'

An 11-member team of specialists from the Federal Office of Economic Opportunity's state regional office recently completed its evaluation and report of the Headstart program for disadvantaged, four-year-old children, operated in Iosco and Ogemaw Counties and 10 other counties in Northern Michigan by Northeast Michigan Community Action (NEMCA). In Iosco and Ogemaw Counties, 30 children attend full-year, one-half day Headstart classes at the Sherman Elementary School near Whittemore.

The evaluation team reported the NEMCA Headstart program was "strong and good over-all," and, speaking of the health care programs, said "NEMCA is to be commended for the quality of the Headstart health services. This program could well serve as a model to other

community action agencies operating Headstart health programs in rural communities. One hundred percent of the children in the program have had physical, dental and vision examinations and immunizations, and have received the recommended care to improve and insure their general health. This is an outstanding accomplishment."

**Youths Tackle Health Needs Through March of Dimes Work**

By DONALD DAX

To the high school girl walking the midway of North Carolina's State Fair the voices of the carnival barkers blended into an indistinguishable drone. But then one Barker's voice caught her ear. His pitch was for a "freak show," an exhibition of children with "flippers" instead of arms.

Carol Ann Grant, now a college freshman in her home town of Raleigh, N.C., did not have to see the show to know what the Barker was talking about. A victim of birth defects, she—like the children in the show—was born with pocomelia (shortened arms) and wears leg braces as well.

Although well-adjusted to her own handicaps, Carol was enraged at seeing the children exploited. Children under 18 cannot be exhibited as freaks in North Carolina any more as a result of legislation, and many credit Carol's activism as being the impetus for the 1969 law. After she spoke publicly on the subject in Tennessee, that state passed a similar law—even before North Carolina's legislature could act.

**Wheel Chairs to Buses**

Carol applies that same energy to her volunteer work in birth defect projects of the March of Dimes Teen Action Program (TAP). A growing number of TAPs continue their efforts in College Action Programs (CAP). Few TAPs share Carol's experience of living with birth defects, but they share her deep interest and concern.

Like Carol, many express their interest by working with children born with defects.

For Carol, this meant spending a summer with crippled children at the Alfred I. DuPont Institute in Wilmington, Del., where she spent 8-12 hours a day in the ward. Simply by being a worker instead of a patient, the hospital staff says, she was able to inspire the children.

For Jane Jenkins, a TAP vol-

unteer at North Carolina Orthopedic Hospital in Gastonia, expressing her concern means feeding, bathing, changing a lot of diapers, or helping transfer 40-50 children from wheel chairs into buses for rare outings to movies or football games.

It means something to her, Jane says, that the children always ask when she is coming back.

**The Quality of Life**

Some TAP groups see their role as one of educating the public, especially other young people, about the health hazard posed by birth defects. A Louisiana high school principal credited one such group with bringing together his racially tense students.

TAPs in Bakersfield, Calif., baby sitters for the children of migrant worker mothers at health clinics, have learned Spanish so they can tell the children's mothers about the importance of prenatal care in preventing birth defects.

All over the country, TAPs and CAPs give fund-raising a high priority and will do just about anything to raise money

for March of Dimes Medical Service Programs and birth defects research. Car washes, bread sales and fashion shows are common.

A highly successful new technique is the Walk-a-thon, in which volunteers walk up to 25 miles in organized hikes to collect from sponsors who pay on a miles-walked basis.

March of Dimes officials estimate that 80 per cent of the volunteers for Walk-a-thons are under 21, and they credit TAP workers with organizing these youths. When you consider that several of these walks have raised close to \$100,000 each, the importance of the TAPs becomes clearer.

Diverse as their activities are, TAPs seem to have a common commitment to helping solve society's problems. They put the emphasis on birth defects prevention, stressing the importance of educating their peers, the soon-to-be parents, as to what they can do to protect future generations.

"We are here," said the keynote speaker at a March of Dimes youth conference, "because we all want to improve the quality of life."

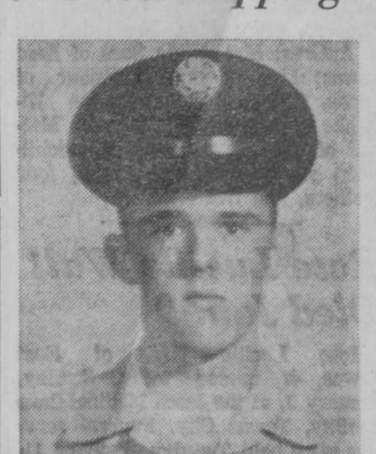

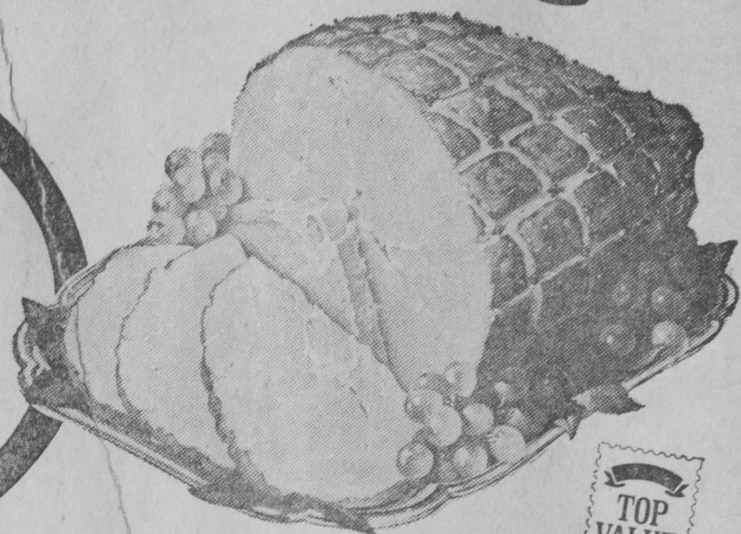

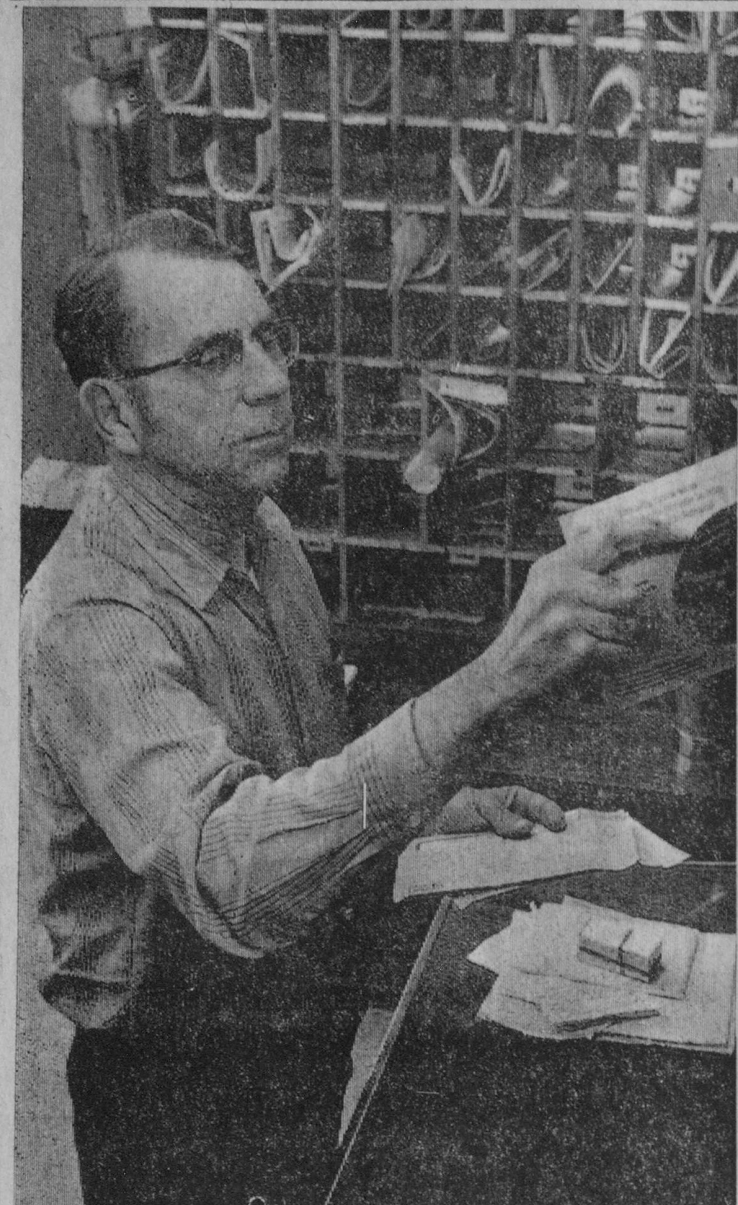

## Carl Libka Retires as Rural Rt. Carrier

Carl Libka, 63, ended nearly 18 years of federal service effective Friday, January 7, which includes 14 years, 10 months service as carrier for Rural Route No. 2, Tawas City.

Appointed as a rural carrier effective March 9, 1957, succeeding the late Joseph St. Aubin, Libka's total federal service includes three years in the United States Army during World War II, serving in Africa, Sicily and Italy.

Libka has traveled about 14,000 miles each year as a rural postman. When he took over Route 2 in 1957, he served 350 patrons and traveled 41 miles daily. The daily route now has only lengthened to 10 more miles of travel but he now serves 600 boxes.

Much of the above expansion of Route No. 2 has been along the section of US-23 south of Tawas City and extending three miles into Arenac County. He also picked up about 20 new patrons when regulations were changed to allow expanded postal delivery within the city limits.

A native of Tawas City, Libka attended school here before attending the Ford apprenticeship school at Dearborn. He returned here in the early 1930s to serve with the CCCs at Camp Silver Creek. This was followed by two years of employment as a timber cruiser and map maker for the forest service at East Tawas. He served as an electrician's helper at the National City plant of National Gypsum Company before entering military service.

Returning home in March 1945, he was employed as a truck driver for Bublitz Oil Company for 12 years before his appointment as a rural mail carrier.

Libka was a playing member of two Tawas City baseball teams which won championships in the Northeastern Michigan Baseball League and managed the 1946 team which won the NEM championship.

He has taken an active part in the affairs of Jesse C. Hodder Post No. 189, American Legion, and served as an elder of Zion Lutheran Church for about 10 years. He was a member of the Tawas City Board of Education during reorganization of area school districts.

Libka and his wife, Dorothy, who is first grade teacher at Tawas City Elementary Unit, are parents of four children. Their two daughters are Mrs. John Davis of Saginaw and

Carol Libka, a graduate of Western Michigan University, now of Chicago, Illinois. One son, Gary, is a freshman at Central Michigan University, and their youngest son, Dennis, is a fifth-grade student at Tawas City Elementary Unit.

Libka said his plans for the future call for "keeping active" and he has several things in mind, although no definite commitments have been made as yet. He is in hopes of being able to travel a little and particularly wants to visit his sister, Mrs. Julia Finch, in Florida.

Postmaster Martin Kasischke said that present employees at the post office have the first opportunity to apply for the vacancy and a notice has been posted. Mrs. Robert Grabow, substitute carrier, is to handle the route until a regular carrier is appointed by the United States Postal Service.

### Education Courses Offered at W-P Area School

Two education courses are being offered this winter at the Whittemore-Prescott High School. The courses are scheduled by Central Michigan University's Off-Campus Education office with registration Thursday, January 20, 7:00 p. m., at the high school.

Open to qualified undergraduate and graduate students is Elementary Education 442, Reading in the Content Areas. Dr. Edward Marquardt will be teaching the course, which earns three hours of credit and emphasizes teaching of reading skills with particular focus on the middle and upper grades. The prerequisite is Elementary Education 430 or its equivalent.

Dr. Roger Goenner will teach Educational Administration 564, Public School Finance. Open to graduate students only, the course earns three hours credit and takes into consideration problems relating to taxation, budget, local millage, school building bond issues and state aid.

A representative from CMU's Off-Campus Education office will be at the school the night of registration to assist with the enrollment and to answer questions regarding the university's degree program.

# Law Prohibits Snowmobile Operation on Roads-Shoulders

Several features in the state's revised snowmobile act of 1971 are not being complied with by local operators, as evidenced by district court summonses issued by area law enforcement agencies.

One section, in particular, is being violated by snowmobile operators and Stanley Snable, district court magistrate, said Thursday that officers had issued court summonses to six or more persons in violation of the act.

It is emphasized that travel by snowmobile on any street or highway property in conservation zone three, which is the lower part of the Lower Peninsula, is generally prohibited. The only exception is in gaining access to a private snowmobile area, crossing a highway at right angles and on county roads which are not maintained during the winter for motor vehicle traffic or which have been specifically designated and signed by the county road commission for snowmobile usage.

As of last week, the Iosco County Road Commission had taken no action specifically designating or signing any roadways in this county to allow snowmobile operation.

Under the 1971 amendment to the state law, snowmobiles are no longer allowed to travel the shoulder or right-of-way of streets and highways in this area. All state police officers have been directed to take enforcement action when such a violation is noted and other law enforcement agencies have followed suit.

Another provision of the state law to be noted and is being enforced is that snowmobile operation upon farmlands, farm woodlots or platted property is prohibited without permission of the owner. It is no longer required that the property be fenced or posted. The snowmobiler must obtain the expressed permission of the owner before he can use the property. If he does not do so, he is guilty of a misdemeanor.

Definitions included in the new act are most important to snowmobilers. A highway or street means the entire width between the boundary lines of every way publicly maintained when any part thereof is open to the use of the public for purposes of vehicular travel; a roadway means that portion of a highway improved, designated or ordinarily used for vehicular travel. If a highway includes two or more separate roadways, the term roadway refers to any such roadway separately, but not to all such roadways collectively; right-of-way means that portion of a highway less the roadway and any shoulder.

According to Section 12 of the act, "A person shall not operate a snowmobile upon a public highway, land used as an airport street or on a public or private parking lot not specifically designated for the use of snowmobiles."

A snowmobile may be operated on the right-of-way of a public highway, except a limited access highway, if it is operated at the extreme right of the open portion of the right-of-way

and with the flow of traffic on the highway.

A snowmobile may be operated on the roadway or shoulder when necessary to cross a bridge or culvert if the snowmobile is brought to a complete stop before entering onto the roadway or shoulder and the driver yields the right-of-way to any approaching vehicle on the highway.

When it is impracticable to gain immediate access to an area adjacent to a public highway, the snowmobile may be operated on the right-of-way adjacent and parallel to the roadway for the sole purpose of gaining access to and from the area of operation by the most direct route. Loading or unloading of the snowmobile shall be accomplished with due regard to safety at the nearest possible point to the area of operation.

A snowmobile may be operated across a public highway, other than a limited access highway, at right angles to the highway for the purpose of getting from one area to another when the operation can be done in safety and another vehicle is not crossing the highway at the same time in the same general area.

An operator shall bring his snowmobile to a complete stop before proceeding across any public highway and shall yield the right-of-way to all oncoming traffic.

Snowmobiles may be operated on a highway in a county road system, which is not normally snowplowed for vehicular traffic and on any snowplowed highway in the county road system, outside the corporate limits of a city or village, which is designated and marked for snowmobile use by the county road commission having jurisdiction.

While there is still some question locally on the next point, the new state law specifically states that any city, village or township may pass an ordinance regulating the operation of snowmobiles if the ordinance meets substantially the minimum requirements of the state act.

City Atty. Kenneth Myles said Thursday that he had not received copies of the annotated as yet and was unable to determine if Tawas City's 1970 act governing snowmobile operation was in conflict with the state law. The city ordinance allows operation of snowmobiles on all streets except US-23 and M-55.

The city ordinance requires a snowmobile operator to possess a motor vehicle driver's license, which is in conflict with the state law. The 1971 state act states that a parent or legal guardian shall not permit his child who is under the age of 12 to operate a snowmobile without the direct supervision of an adult except on land owned or under the control of the parent or legal guardian.

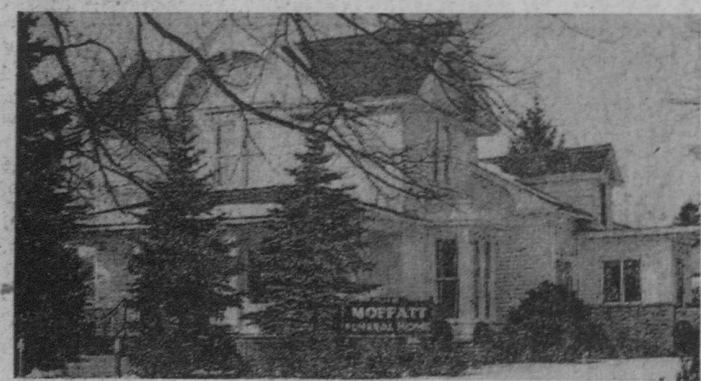
## Charles A. Preston New AD at Whittemore-Prescott HS

**Iosco County Should Revise Trusty Policy**

The need for reappraising the policy of using certain prisoners incarcerated at the county jail (termed trusties) as "handymen-custodians" should be undertaken immediately by Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell, the county board of commissioners, the district and circuit courts.

There has been a crying need for such a reappraisal for a long time—particularly for the benefit of the general public, as well as for direction of the sheriff's department. At various times in past years, so-called trusties have abused the privileges granted to them and the general public has or could have suffered.

According to the log at the county jail, a prisoner incarcerated for 60 days was given permission to leave the jail at 9:45 p. m. Friday to be with his wife, who was staying at the motel behind the Village Inn. In this newspaper's opinion, the prisoner was jailed for a reason and granting such a privilege is absolutely uncalled for.

It is not the responsibility of those in charge of county jails to act as

rehabilitators of short-term prisoners. A jail sentence could be termed as "shock treatment" utilized by courts to punish offenders of misdemeanor crimes (less than a felony), but serious enough to warrant incarceration in the county jail as a possible deterrent to future commission of crimes.

In other words, it would appear that the court hopes that the person incarcerated would be "learned his lesson" through being deprived of some of the rights normally taken for granted.

In our opinion, prisoners should not have the "run" of the jail. So-called trusties should keep the cell blocks clean, but the county should utilize its present custodial help at the county building to clean the public areas of the county jail. These prisoners have been jailed for a reason and they should not be allowed to leave the building.

If this is not done, the sheriff's department and the general public could be in trouble. It would also save some embarrassment for the county and the sheriff.

# Tawas A. Braves in Overtime Victory Over Carrollton, 64-63

Zooming into first place in NBC standings Friday night with a 64-63 overtime victory over the Carrollton Cavaliers, Tawas Area Braves were to go against the Pinconning Spartans last night (Tuesday) and are to close out the first half of play Friday night by playing host to Standish-Sterling Central.

Going into Friday night's showdown at Carrollton, both the Braves and Cavaliers were tied for the conference's top rung with identical records of five wins and no losses. The Braves had to pull out all stops to come home with a victory.

The stage was set for an exciting night right from the opening seconds when big Tim Fox tipped off the first tossup to Steve Janego. Tawas held a 15-8 margin at the end of the first quarter and Carrollton closed the gap to 22-22 at half-time with a 14-13 scoring effort. 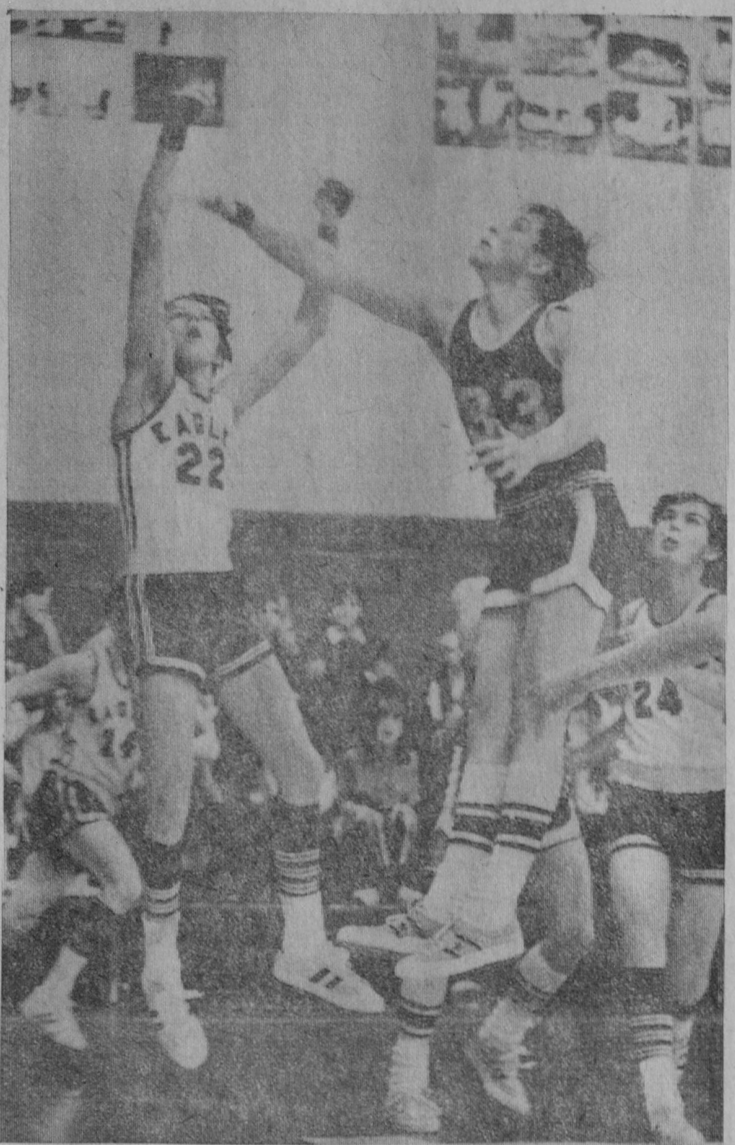

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### Social Security Answers Questions on Benefits

**Question:** I am planning to retire from my job in the middle of next year when I become 65. Since my earnings from the six months before I retire will add up to nearly \$5,000, can I receive any monthly cash payments for the rest of the year?

**Answer:** Yes. No matter how

much you earn before you retire, you can still receive social security benefits for any month you neither earn wages of \$140 or less nor perform substantial work as a self-employed person.

**Question:** My neighbor, who lost both legs last year, gets monthly social security disability benefits. He cannot wear artificial legs, but he would like to learn a trade where he can work sitting down. His friends tell him, though, that he will lose his social security benefits if he gets a job. Is this correct?

**Answer:** Not exactly. The social security law provides a trial work period without loss of benefits for disabled persons like your neighbor. This is an incentive to help them return to work. If your neighbor does start to work and continues to work, his benefits may be continued for up to one year. The state vocational rehabilitation agency may help your neighbor learn a new trade if this is possible with his disability.

**Question:** My cleaning lady will not get a social security number so I can report her wages. What can I do about this?

**Answer:** If you pay your cleaning lady \$50 or more in cash wages in a calendar quarter of the year, you must report her wages even though she does not have a social security number. In making your quarterly earnings report for her, give her full name and address and the amount you paid her in cash wages. Also, you should note on the form that your employee refuses to furnish you her social security number.

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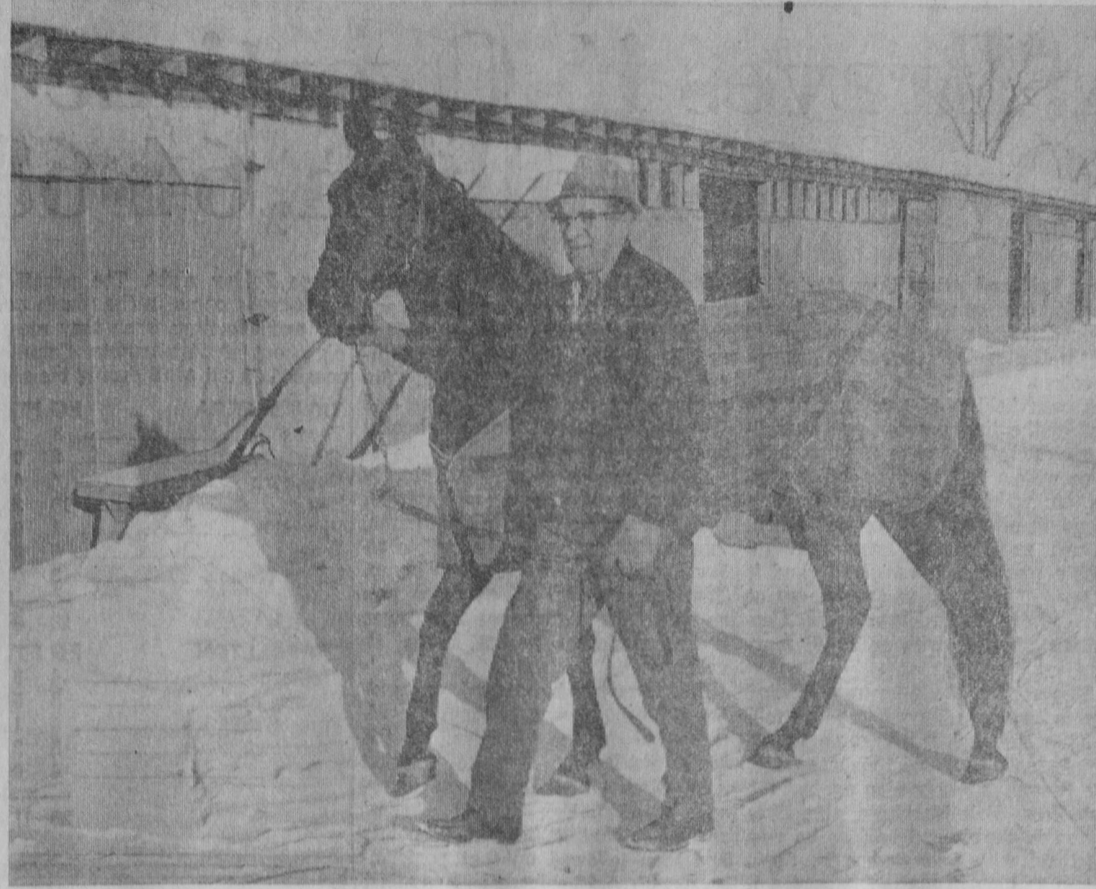

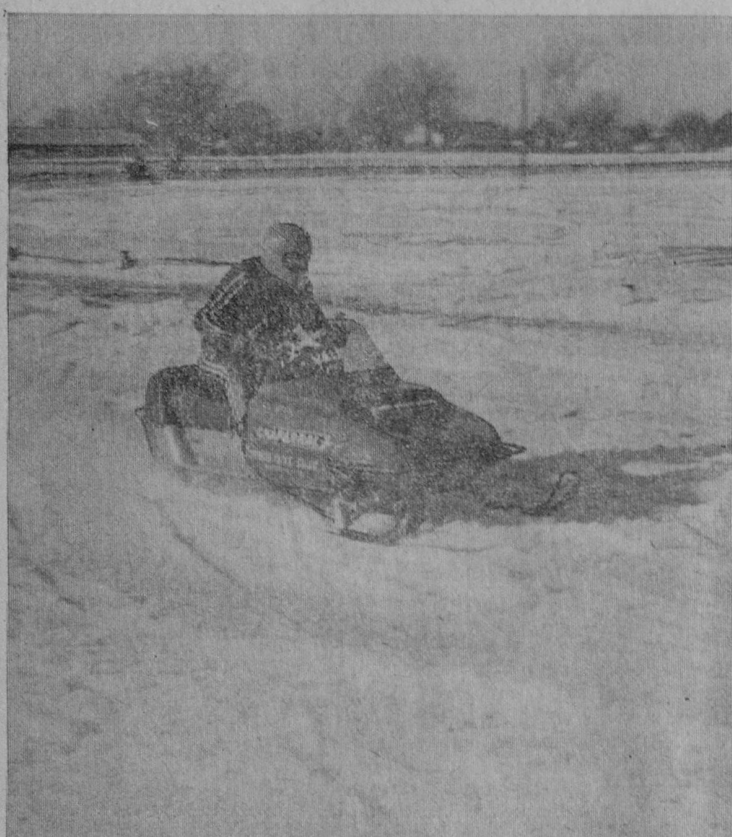
