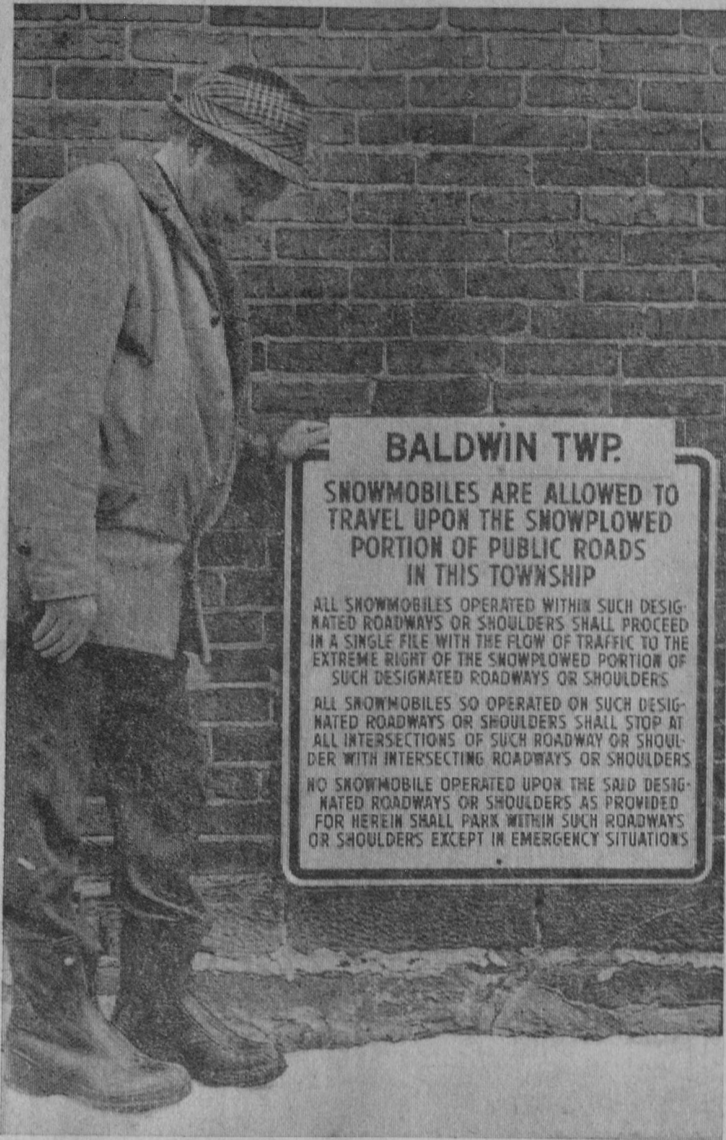

## Baldwin Roads Now Signed for Snowmobiles

Signs designating all roads in Baldwin Township, with the exception of state highways, as snowmobile routes are being installed this week by the Iosco County Road Commission.

This action is being taken following passage by the township board of a new snowmobile ordinance in

compliance with the state's revised snowmobile act of 1971.

Section 14 of the act allows any city, village or township to pass an ordinance regulating the operation of snowmobiles if the ordinance meets substantially the minimum requirements of the act.

A paragraph in Section 12 of the act states that snowmobiles may be operated on a highway in a county road system which is designated and marked for snowmobile use by the county road commission having jurisdiction.

Baldwin Township is the first unit in the county to take advantage of the provision in the state act. Otis Love, county road engineer, said Monday that Oscoda, Reno and Wilber Townships are currently in the process of approving similar ordinances to come under special provisions of the state act to allow operation of snowmobiles on roads.

Both Tawas City and East Tawas adopted snowmobile ordinances last year designating streets on which snowmobiles could operate. However, such streets have not been signed for snowmobile use.

In Tawas City's case, no snowmobiles are allowed to operate on US-23 or on M-55 from US-23 to Fifth Avenue. Snowmobiles are not allowed to operate in the cemetery, public parks, on private property without the consent of the property owner or on public sidewalks.

The snowmobile operator must come to a complete stop at all intersections, travel as close to the right edge of the plowed area of the street as practical, obey all traffic signs, yield the right-of-way to all vehicular traffic and pedestrians and travel in single file.

At East Tawas, snowmobiles are permitted to operate on all streets except an area one block on either side of Newman Street from Bay to Lincoln Streets.

## Teachers to Get Retroactive Pay

Between \$9,000 and \$10,000 in retroactive pay, withheld from paychecks of teachers since the federal wage freeze, is to be paid by Tawas Area Schools very shortly.

The pay board established under the Economic Stabilization Act of 1970 authorizes and permits payment of any wage or salary increase which was agreed to in an employment contract executed prior to August 15, 1971.

Supt. Reynold E. Mick told members of the board of education Monday night that paychecks to teachers for retroactive pay would range from a high of \$300 to a low of about \$10.

## Elementary Open Houses Set Tonight

Open houses are to be held tonight (Wednesday) in Tawas Area Elementary Schools, 7 to 9 o'clock, weather permitting.

At the Tawas City Unit, parents will have the opportunity to visit home rooms of their children, then follow the child's schedule during the day.

Edward Welsh, elementary supervisor, said that the tour of the schedule would require about 45 minutes. After that, parents would be able to return to various rooms and view exhibits.

Of particular interest at the Tawas City Unit, both for itself and the teaching technique it represents, is a full scale reproduction of a room such as might be found in the home of a well to do citizen of ancient Rome. It is to be seen in William Lenz' sixth grade social studies room.

At East Tawas, parents will have the opportunity to see work and exhibits in various rooms. A social meeting is to be held there with coffee and cookies to be served.

Welsh said that while teachers are to be in attendance, the open house was not meant to be for parent-teacher conferences concerning individual children.

# Reapportionment Up for Discussion by Co. Commission

Iosco Board of Commissioners' January session has been continued to a one-day session on Friday, February 4, in order to give additional time to consider its reapportionment according to the 1970 federal census.

Discussion on the reapportionment was held at the regular January session last Wednesday, but no final decision could be reached. The board has until February 7 to complete this work, otherwise it would go to a five-man commission for the final reapportionment.

In the event that the board does not complete the work, the five-man commission would include the prosecuting attorney, county clerk, treasurer and chairmen of the county Republican and Democratic committees.

Since March 15, 1967, when the board was reapportioned under the one-man, one-vote concept, Iosco County has operated with a nine-district board of commissioners. Being discussed at the present time is a five-man commission, although some areas of the county are opposed to delegating county operational authority in the hands of five persons. Some have advocated retention of the nine-man board, while others have suggested expanding the board to an even larger membership.

In any event, population shifts as shown by the 1970 census will mean a drastic change in the area of representation.

Seven of Iosco's 11 townships showed increases in the 1970 federal census, while four townships showed losses as did Tawas City and East Tawas. Major changes came in Oscoda Township, where personnel were counted at Wurtsmith Air Force Base for the first time, as well as population increases in Plainfield Township and Baldwin Township.

In other business last week, Carlton Merschel was re-elected board chairman and Jack Allen was named vice chairman. Merschel suggested to the board that additional committee meetings be held in order to allow more time for board action and discussion at regular meetings.

The board signed a 90-day agreement with Robert Schmidt as a fixed base operator at the county airport, with stipulation on a liability insurance policy to relieve the county.

The board instructed one of the building custodians to spend two hours a day at the county jail to perform custodial duties.

The board is to study a proposed new code concerning regulation of septic tank fields before taking final action as requested by District Health Department No. 2.

Appropriations of \$1,000 were made to East Michigan Tourist Association and \$9,000 to District Health Department No. 2.

A resolution was read from the Tawas City Businessmen's Association which asked the county parks and recreation commission to mark all snowmobile trails and provide suitable signs at Hale, Whittemore, the Tawas and Oscoda to direct persons to those trails, as well as

for providing maps to aid snowmobile operators when they are on trails.

A meeting is to be scheduled with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and interested parties concerning the Michigan Deer Hunters Association's proposal to prohibit antlerless deer hunting in this county.

## Sand Lake Couple Face Fraud Charge

A Sand Lake couple has been arrested on a charge of making false statements to obtain public assistance or welfare.

Arraigned in district court Monday on the felony charge were Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Worthington.

They waived examination in district court and were bound over to circuit court with a hearing to be held Monday, January 31.

The Worthingtons were arrested at their home Thursday on complaint of Iosco Department of Social Welfare and a warrant issued by Pros. Atty. Kenneth Myles.

Basil Odell, a deputy sheriff assigned to the prosecutor's office as an investigator, said that Worthington is unemployed, but his wife is a registered nurse at Tawas Hospital. Records in the Iosco Department of Social Welfare office indicated that Mrs. Worthington's income of approximately \$4,330 earned between August 2 and January 13 had not been declared on a January 3 questionnaire submitted for aid to dependent children.

Odell said the Worthingtons had received \$1,100 in actual cash in ADC payments and surplus commodities during the six-month period. The Worthingtons have a four-year-old daughter.

Odell said that other statements made by the Worthingtons to Iosco Department of Social Services concerning ownership of personal property were false.

## Nolle Prosequi Order Signed

A nolle prosequi order submitted in Iosco District Court January 19 by Pros. Atty. Kenneth Myles has stopped criminal proceedings against Sidney Teague, 54, Tawas City snowmobile dealer, who had been charged with conspiracy involving the sale of stolen snowmobiles.

A second defendant, James Clark, 38, Tawas City, was bound over to circuit court on three counts of receiving and concealing stolen property. His arraignment has been set for January 31 before Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

# Two Coast Guard Chiefs Exchange Unit Commands

Friday's change of command ceremony at Tawas Coast Guard Station saw a rare occurrence in federal service—the two principals involved returned to their native states.

BMC Jerry Thomas, a native of Saginaw, came here from Galloo Island, Lake Ontario, New York, to take command of Tawas Coast Guard Station.

BMC Anthony J. Tombillo, who had commanded the station here for four years, takes over Thomas' former post. Tombillo is a native of Ogdensburg, New York, about the same distance from Galloo Island as Saginaw is from Tawas.

A 15-year veteran of the coast guard, Thomas had served as commander at Galloo Island for two years and eight months. Prior to that, he had been assigned to various duty stations in the State of Maine for nine years. He had served earlier at Rochester, New York, lifeboat station.

Thomas and his wife, Kay, are the parents of three children, two girls and a boy.

The two men said that the two stations are quite similar, although Galloo Island is a seasonal station because the northeastern end of

Lake Ontario is now frozen over. Each station has a complement of 14 men and utilizes similar watercraft in search and rescue operations as well as law enforcement.

Tombillo and his family will make their new home at Oswego, New York. Men of the station here presented Tombillo with a radio and a plaque.

"I have made many friends during my assignment here, but both Chief Thomas and myself are enthusiastic about being a little closer to home in this switch of commands," said Tombillo.

# Iosco Co. Ended 1971 'In Black,' Says Nelkie

In a report Wednesday to the Iosco County Board of Commissioners, County Treas. Edward Nelkie reported that the county's general fund ended 1971 "in the black."

Total expenditures of \$743,948.21 were offset by revenues of \$725,023.92, coupled with a fund balance of \$15,533.96 from the preceding year and reserve of \$3,390.33.

In addition, a little more than \$20,000 due to the general fund from state income tax returns is deposited in another fund until such time as authorization is given to transfer the money to the general fund.

Reason for this delay in transferring the money to the general fund is due to the confusing situation which has resulted from a new revenue sharing program adopted by the state legislature. In addition, Nelkie said his office has had four different "official" federal census figures upon which to base returns to local units of government during the past year.

Early in the year, the treasurer deposited state income tax, sales tax and intangibles tax money in a special account until such time as an official figure was received on the new population. When figures were received, adjustments had to be made because some payments to townships and cities had been made on the 1960 census count. Payments to units which showed a drop in population were adjusted in order to pay a higher ratio to units which had an increase in population.

Since then, three more official census reports were received. In one case, 180 persons were transferred from Tawas Township to Baldwin Township because of an er-

ror in location by the census taker. Tawas Township was again the loser when 23 persons were deducted from that township's total. The census taker had counted 43 persons at the medical care facility and, according to federal regulations, only half that number could be counted.

Total general fund revenue collected by the county amounted to \$725,023.92 which included \$50,567.12 from the county clerk's office, \$2,755.53 from the probate judge, \$37,807.45 from the register of deeds, \$8,579.33 from the sheriff's department and \$627,314.47 from the treasurer's office.

Included in money collected by the treasurer was the real estate tax levy of \$499,270.05 and state income tax return of \$89,919.28.

Total revenue collected reflected an increase of \$49,651.55 over the previous year. A comparison of revenues during the three preceding years shows \$453,891.07 in 1968, \$330,050.14 in 1969 and \$675,382.37 in 1970.

District court revenue included in the clerk's receipts amounted to \$1,690 in bond forfeiture, \$5,591.07 in ordinance fines and costs, \$25,585.20 in court costs, \$124 in bond costs and \$1,427.75 in civil fees.

# Hale Bank's Statement on Damage Suit

In its first public statement to the press since a damage suit was filed last week, a spokesman for Farmers and Merchants State Bank of Hale yesterday declared that Gene Ballinger had "knowingly breached terms of an agreement" which had allowed him to operate his Oscoda business until last August.

A week ago, Ballinger filed an \$18,400,000 damage suit charging the bank and four other defendants with negligence, false representations and conspiracy to bankrupt his Amateur Treasure Hunters Association, a metal detection sales firm.

Ballinger, 37, currently awaits federal court trial on 26 counts of mail fraud in a check kiting operation nearly a year ago against the bank.

Richard Parkinson, bank president, who was one of the defendants named in the suit, told the Herald Tuesday afternoon that the following statement was being given prior to filing a formal answer to Ballinger's petition in Iosco Circuit Court:

"In May of 1971, the bank entered into an agreement with Gene and Phyllis Ballinger which assigned the Ballingers' interest in the Association to the bank. It provided that the bank would allow Ballinger to continue to operate the Association in order for him to pay back money which he admitted defrauding from the bank as disclosed in March 1971.

"This was an honest effort to help the Ballingers re-establish themselves. However, it became apparent in early August 1971 that the Ballingers had knowingly breached the terms of the agreement in numerous ways to the detriment of the interest of the bank.

"It therefore became necessary for the bank to exercise its right under the agreement and to remove Ballinger as general manager and to hire a new general manager to continue operation of the business on a businesslike basis."

Parkinson said the attorneys for the bank were to file their answer to Ballinger's court petition in about a week and no further statements would be made until that time.

# Special Ed. Students May Be Graduated

On recommendation of a special committee of administrators and teachers, Tawas Area Board of Education is to consider a new policy whereby special education students would participate in high school graduation exercises.

Edward Welsh, elementary supervisor and a member of the committee, told members of the board of education Monday night that participation in graduation exercises and receipt of a regular diploma would give special education students something to look forward to, as well as to retain their interest while in school.

Welsh said that the recommendation was to allow such a student to apply for graduation when the spring graduation exercise falls nearest his 18th birthday. While 18 credits are required for a regular student to graduate, special consideration would be given to special education students having individual programs.

Under the recommendation, a special education student who has left school could apply for graduation after he has passed age 17½ if he has been gainfully employed for six months prior to graduation. Upon application for graduation, the applicant would be enrolled as a special education student who has left tons of the school.

The above program would apply only to special education students and the school would still require a minimum of 18 credits for graduation under the regular program of instruction.

The board of education's curriculum committee is to study the proposal. No students are ready for graduation this year and any program adopted would be inaugurated next term.

# School May Require One Semester of Typing-Speech

Possible curriculum changes next year at Tawas Area High School may include the requirement that every student to be graduated would have at least one semester of typing and one semester of speech.

John Alexander, high school principal, said that a basic typing instructional program would be invaluable to all students because of its use in business and every day life. He said the speech program would not be the "performing type," but would be devoted to group participation in classrooms.

Authorization to study implementation of such a program was given by the board of education. Alexander

said that adoption of such a requirement would depend greatly on available space and instructors.

In other curriculum matters, Mrs. Helen Payea, a member of the curriculum committee, stated that mathematics students desired a study room with a mathematics teacher in attendance rather than being in a regular study hall. Possible purchase of additional blackboards for installation in one room is to be studied for next term.

Resource personnel from Michigan State University are to hold a critique for the school's instrumental music program next Tuesday. Band Director Gene Salamony is to appear before the board of education on February 28 to make a report.

Courses in freshman English and general psychology are to be offered at the school by Alpena Community College starting next week. Alexander announced that Mrs. Ellen Evans was to teach the English class.

Several members of the board of education are to attend the national convention at Atlantic City, New Jersey, because of the conflict in schedule, the Monday, February 14, meeting is to be held Monday, February 21. The second meeting of the month is to be held Monday, February 28.

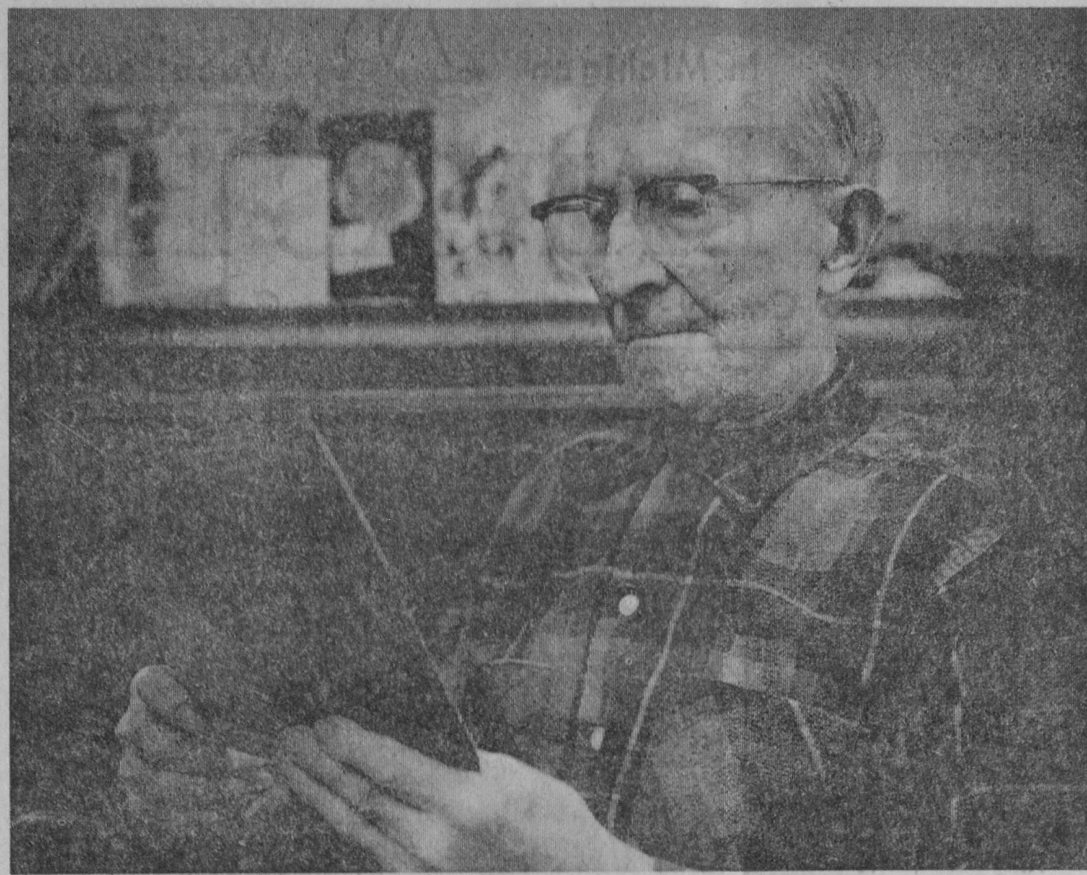
The schedule of Lenten pot-luck dinners and services was discussed and a day of prayer and self-denial was planned.

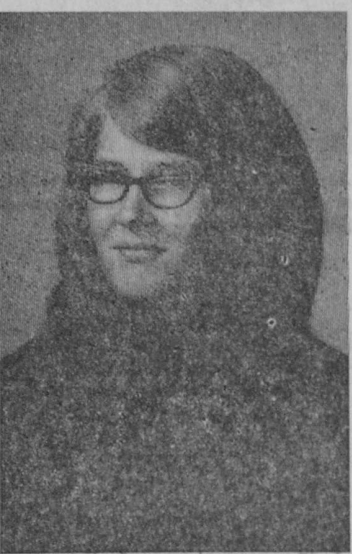

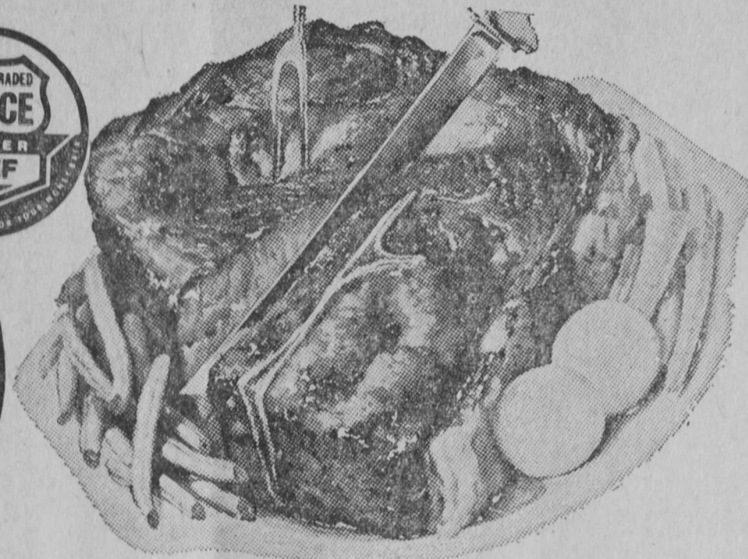

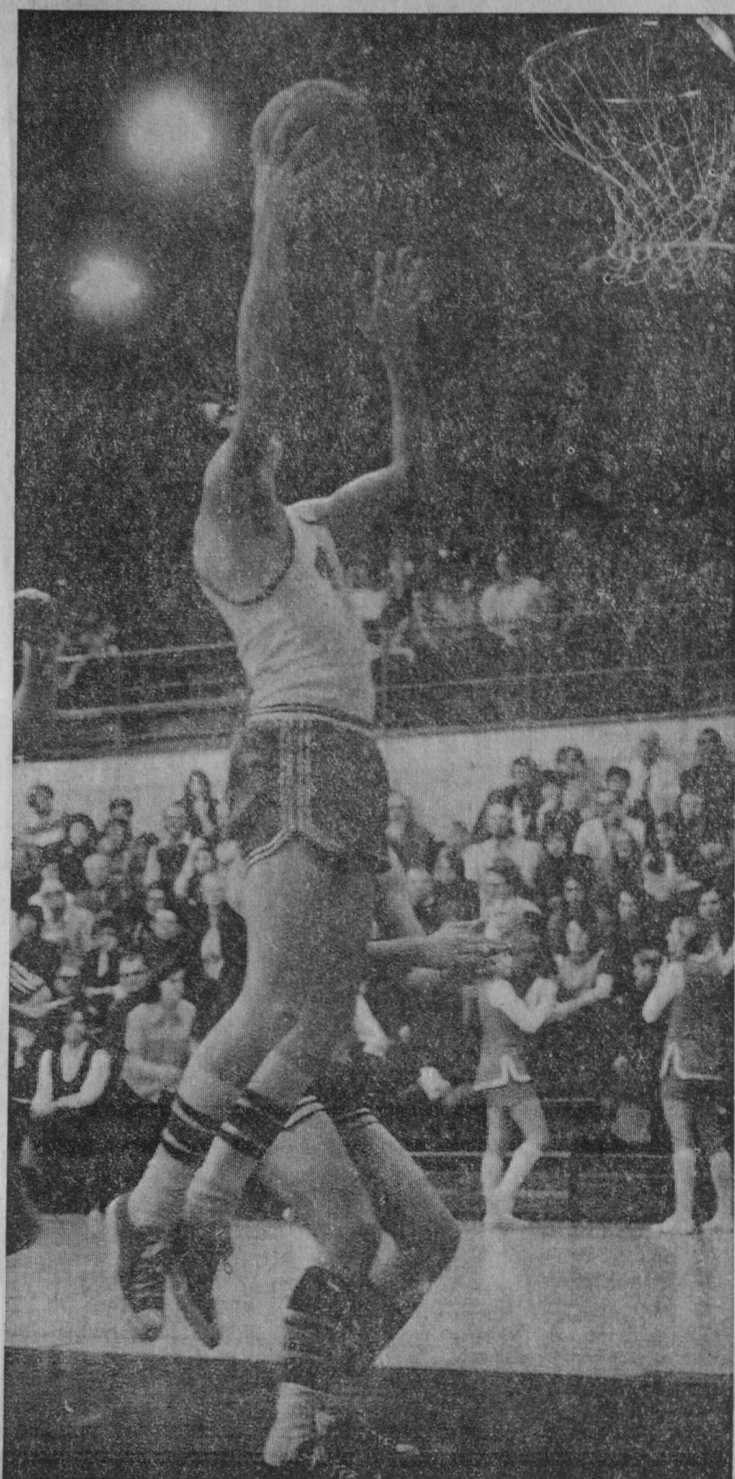

# Pearsall Reports to F&M Bank Stockholders on 1971 Business

"The year 1971 will certainly be remembered by all those persons who have an interest in the Farmers and Merchants State Bank of Hale as a very bad year, due to the checking loss suffered by the bank during the month of March," stated D. D. Pearsall, bank president, in his annual message to stockholders on January 18.

Pearsall said the actual amount of loss suffered by the bank in March 1971, was \$637,427.66 and \$48,938.94 had been recovered to date, leaving a balance due of \$588,488.72.

"Although the board of directors has spent many hours on this recovery effort and, at times our hopes were quite high, we now know it will not be possible to recover the entire loss," said Pearsall.

"The bank has both the common stock of the corporation assigned to it and a security agreement recorded on all assets, as well as a security agreement signed and recorded on all known personal assets of the individuals involved. We have received and are considering an offer to purchase part of the assets and will have to liquidate the balance of them," stated the bank president.

Pearsall indicated that much work remains to be done, "but it is our project that the figure that was given at the special stockholders meeting held April 12, 1971, of a total recovery of \$200,000 will be accomplished." He said, however, this was a projection at this point, not a fact.

"Although this loss will be the dominant factor remembered in 1971, there still have been many favorable accomplishments," stated Pearsall. He said that deposits of the bank grew \$1,815,798, representing a 17.3 percent increase in the bank's deposits for 1971, "which has to be

considered an excellent growth." Total footings grew by \$1,973,136, making the December 31, 1971, footings stand at \$13,492,303.

These figures were accomplished by a group of employees which has done an outstanding job to help stockholders recover their losses. Without their fine job, your board of directors would not have been able to accomplish what has been done," he stated.

The bank president said "the year 1972 is a new one. Much work is left to be done. Please be assured that your staff and directors will do their utmost to make it a very good year."

Of the bank's total deposits of \$12,325,821, the Rose City branch totaled \$5,156,578, a 19.2 percent increase over the preceding year; Whittemore branch had total deposits of \$2,453,455, showing a 21.9 percent increase over the previous year, and

the main office at Hale had total deposits of \$4,725,786, a 13 percent increase over 1970.

Through action at the stockholders' meeting, Pearsall was elevated to chairman of the board while Richard Parkinson, who had served as cashier, has been promoted to president and cashier.

Pearsall has been a businessman at Hale for 40 years and one of the originators of Farmers and Merchants State Bank, which first opened its doors in February 1932.

Born September 14, 1897, at Big Beaver, he moved to Hale with his family on March 8, 1908. After he completed his schooling at Hale, Pearsall began work as a clerk in the Danin Grocery Store at Hale, which he eventually purchased and expanded to include a hardware business.

He sold the business in 1965 to his son, Daniel, but has continued to

take an active part in the operation as well as devoting more time to operations of the bank. He was elected president of the Hale bank in 1953 and has held that position continuously since that time.

Other changes saw Arnold Beyerlein becoming first vice president and Rose City branch manager; Carl Adams, a director of the bank, becomes second vice president; Richard Pfahl, former assistant manager at the main office, becomes vice president and office manager at Hale.

There were 36 stockholders present at the annual meeting held at the main office at Hale.

Re-elected to the board of directors were Adams, Beyerlein, E. S. Herzog, Fred Holzweber, Parkinson, Pearsall and Lyle Wallace.

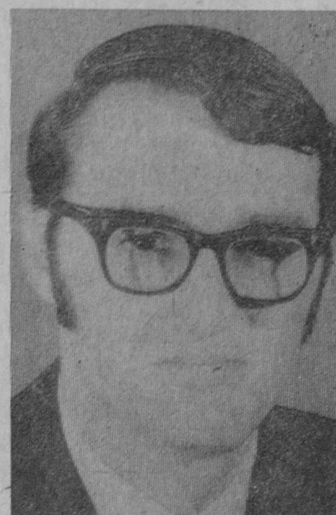

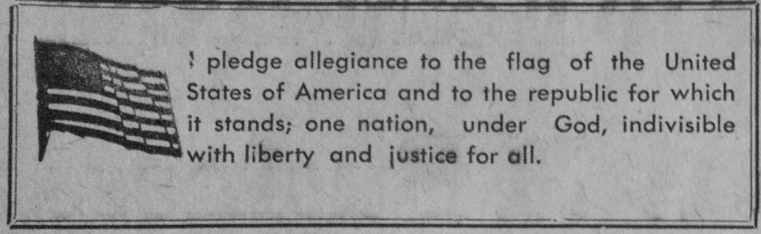

## Drain Commissioner Made Annual Report to Iosco Board

In his annual report to the county board of commissioners, John Mielock, drain commissioner, said that the Lakewood Shores drain north of Oscoda had created considerable problems during the past year.  
The report stated that, owing to the fact that the water system had been installed during the year, it was necessary for the water system to cross the drainage system. As a result, sand has filled manholes and an effort is being made to place the problems on the water system contractor.

The drain commissioner stated that an assessment district is to be established to provide for annual maintenance of the drainage district.  
Mielock reported that difficulties had been encountered in securing easements for a proposed Baldwin drain. "Some of the people think that the location of the proposed drain should be changed or completely re-evaluated. Others think no drainage is necessary," he stated.  
The drain commissioner said that rather than making a costly mistake, his office believes that careful consideration is necessary before constructing the drain.

During the past few years, complaints have been received that the Michigan Gypsum Company had been pumping water out of its quarry and allowing some silt to enter the intercounty drain in Burleigh and Sherman Townships.

Mielock said that after several meetings with the Arenac County Drain Commission, an agreement had been made with Michigan Gypsum Company to furnish a dragline and an operator to clean out the drain. The drainage district is to pay for brushing of the right of way.  
The drain commissioner said that considerable time had been spent on the AuGres watershed project. This is a project with the federal government paying for some of the cost.

The Iosco drain commissioner said that a report has been made by the engineers with all the construction improvements being made in Arenac County and no direct benefits, to speak of, in Iosco County.  
He said that efforts were now being made to determine the percentage of the cost that will be shared by Arenac, Iosco and Ogemaw in this project.

## Widows May Get Pension Before Age 60

Question: When my father died four years ago, a friend told my mother that she could collect monthly social security checks as a widow at 60. But, the other day I heard that widows can get social security when they are 50. Is this right?

Answer: Severely disabled widows may collect monthly benefits as early as 50. Others do have to wait until age 60 to qualify for widows' benefits.

Question: I was taken ill while I was on vacation in another state. After I got home, I sent my bills in to medicare like I always do, but they returned them to me and told me to make the claim where I was sick. Why can I not file my medicare claim here?

Answer: Generally, your medicare claim must be filed with the medicare office in the state where you receive the medical services. In this way, medicare can keep track of costs for a particular medical service within an area. "Your Medicare Handbook" gives a complete list of places where medicare claims are to be submitted.

Question: I recently got a job as a waitress. Even though my wages are not much, my tips usually average \$45 a week. My employer says I must tell him how much I get in tips so that he can report them for social security. Is this so?

Answer: Yes, because your tips are more than \$20 a month. The law requires you to give your employer a report in writing by the 10th of each month on the tips you receive the previous month. Your employer then reports these tips and sends your social security contributions to Internal Revenue Service. Your tips for this month must be reported by February 10.

If your tips were less than \$20 a month, you would not have to report them.

## Set Dates For 1972 AS Program

Producer sign-up for participation in the 1972 Wheat and Feed Grain Program was changed to the period, February 3 through March 10, Grant Bessey, chairman of the Iosco County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, announced today. Originally the enrollment period was scheduled to start on January 17 and end on February 25.

Mr. Bessey stated that the change in the sign-up is being made to permit the producers and United States Department of Agriculture officials time to evaluate information from a special January 27 Farmers Planting Intentions Report.

ASCS officers throughout the state have completed mailing notices and program information to all eligible farmers. These notices contain the preliminary payment rates for feed grain and other basic farm data. With the change in the sign-up period, farmers will now have more time to evaluate the changes in the 1972 program and determine the extent they wish to participate.

## List Requirements for Grain Base

Applications are now being taken for new feed grain bases. Producers interested in applying for a new corn or barley base must meet the following requirements:

(1) Not have an interest as an owner or operator in any other farm that has a feed grain base, (2) expect to obtain more than 50 percent of his current year income from farming, (3) applicant must have experience growing the crop in at least one of the last three years.

If you can meet all the above requirements, write, call or stop at your local Iosco County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office, Federal Building, East Tawas. All applications must be on file no later than Tuesday, February 29.

### Leftovers Go Creative

Using up leftovers has probably been the topic of more jokes than anything, except maybe women drivers. There is the one, "No dear, they are not leftovers; they are rearrangements." Or what about the husband, peering into a dish on the range, muttering, "Leftovers hot, leftovers cold, leftovers in the pot . . ."

If you are a homemaker, you have heard them all. But seriously, what can you do with all the "stuff" that just does not get eaten the first time it is on the table. As long as it is in the back of the refrigerator, it is just taking up space. So get your leftovers out of the refrigerator and onto the table.

One of your problems, believe it or not, may be that you do not have enough leftovers. If there is only a dab of this or that left, it hardly seems worthwhile to feature it as a rerun. Chances are, you will end up throwing it away. So, when you plan meals, first to prepare enough food for both the first meal and encores.

Many times you can use leftovers to create your own convenience foods. Doing it yourself may save money as well as time. For example, freeze rice for future use in oriental favorites like sweet 'n' sour pork, chop suey and others. Leftover vanilla pudding alone or mixed with fruit makes an instant topping for cake or gingerbread. Leftover mashed potatoes are great to top a casserole, make potato patties or start potato soup.

Convenience foods from the grocery store can help you extend and perk up whatever you find in the refrigerator. Packaged macaroni, spaghetti or noodle dinners make great bases for left over meats and vegetables. Or turn a great cubed cooked beef into stroganoff with sour cream sauce and brown gravy. Cheese, especially the grated Parmesan variety, adds both color and flavor to almost anything. Another all-around helper is salad dressing. Use it to put together a hot chicken or turkey salad or a cold combination of cooked vegetables.

Here is one recipe that uses up three kinds of leftovers.

### HAM HASH AuGRATIN

- 2 cups diced cooked ham
- 2 cups diced cooked potatoes
- 1 cup cooked green beans
- 1/2 cup finely chopped onion
- 1/4 teaspoon marjoram
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1 1/2 cups (6 oz.) shredded cheddar cheese

Cook ham, potatoes, beans, onion and marjoram in margarine 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Stir in cheese. Yield: Four servings. Variations: Substitute sliced zucchini or peas for beans.

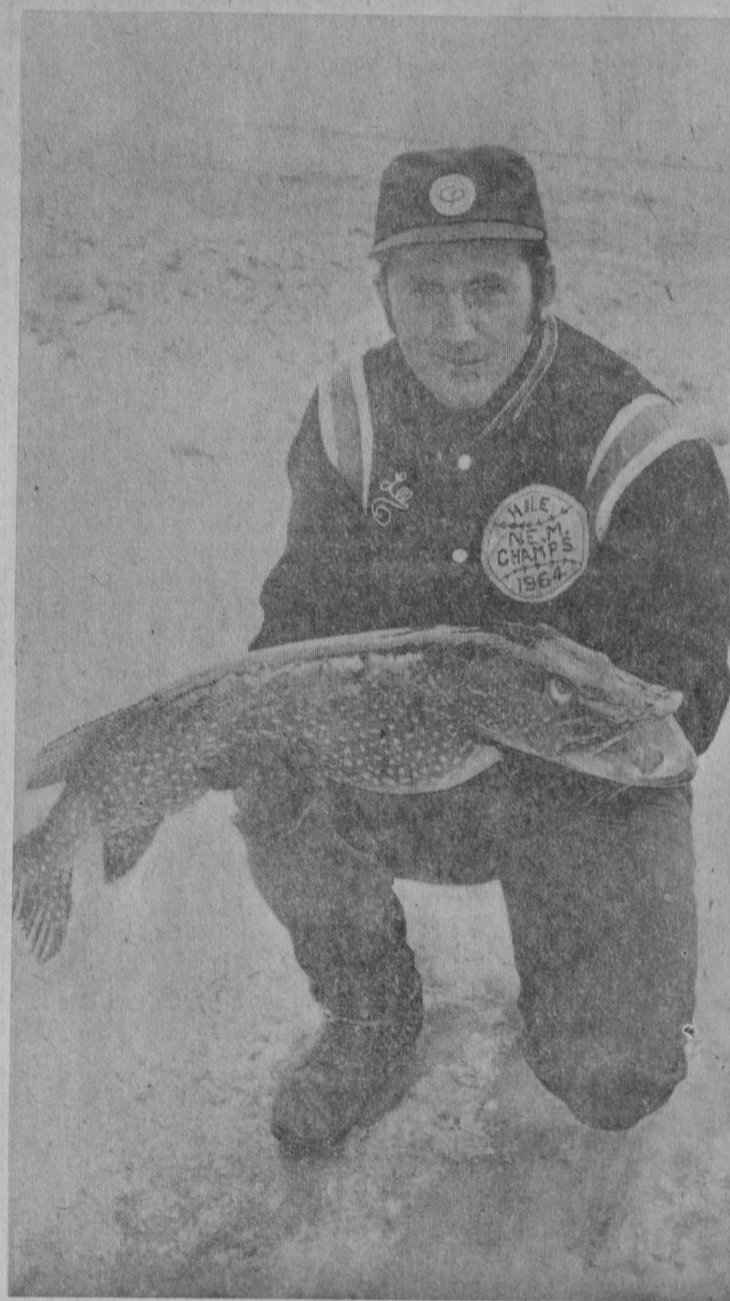
