It provided that the bank would allow Ballinger to continue to operate the Association in order for him to pay back money which he admitted defrauding from the bank as disclosed in March 1971.



If you are a homemaker, you have neard them all. But seriously, what can you do with all the "stuff" that just does not get eaten the first time it is on the table. As long as it is in the back of the refrigerator, it is just taking up space. So get your leftovers out of the refrigerator and onto the table. One of your problems, believe it or

not, may be that you do not have enough leftovers. If there is only a dab of this or that left, it hardly seems worthwhile to feature it as a rerun. Chances are, you will end up throwing it away. So, when you plan meals, plan to prepare enough food for both the first meal and en-






