

No Danger to Lakes From Nuclear Plant

Radioactivity in the water and | leased in liquids by nuclear power invertebrates of Lake Michigan will plants. not build up to hazardous levels as a result of nuclear power plants now operating or under construction, according to an environmental study just completed under sponsorship, in part, by Consumers Power Company.

Environmental Research Group, Incorporated, (ERG), Ann Arbor, has conducted the study on samples phytoplankton, zooplankton, benthos, water and sediment collected from Lake Michigan in 1969-1970 by the Great Lakes Research Division of the University of Michigan. (Examples of phytoplankton include small algae such as diatoms; zcoplankton, water fleas; benthos, insect larvae and worms.)

Dr. Richard A. Copeland, ERG president, was the study director. He said, "Since the utilities are required as a condition of their license to operate within present or proposed Atomic Energy Commission standards, their radioactive discharges pose no threat to Lake Michigan." The organisms studied are at the lower end of the food chain and constitute a major source of nutrition for fish.

The study covered more than 35 different elements which may be discharged in radioactive form by a nuclear power plant. The most significant, from the standpoint of possible exposure to man, were iodine and

The study found, for example, that phytoplankton, the smallest living creatures in the lake, concentrate the element iodine to a level about 800 times greater than its concentration in water. But the concentration becomes no greater as one moves up the biological scale to the zooplankton and benthos which feed on the

NARCOTICS AND DRUG ABUSE

Admittedly our laws governing the use of marijuana have been too severe, however, I do not believe that marijuana should be legalized.

There is a wave of drug addiction sweeping over America. Our youth is the prime target of the dope pusher due to their natural curiosity and tendency toward experimentation.

Recent surveys show that 25 to 40 percent of all students have experimented, mostly with marijuana but also with pills. One quarter of these say that they take drugs on a regular basis. IN SHORT THE SCHOOL DRUG PROBLEM IS BECOMING EPIDEMIC.

Dr. Dana L. Farnsworth, chairman of the American Medical Association's Council on Mental Health, says, "Our experience has been that the use of marijuana DOES entail considerable risk, DOES cause harm, and has few counter balancing benefits. We have seen too many students who insist that it helps them even as their grades go down and their ability to cope with society decreases."

Many persons will argue that marijuana is no worse than alcohol. Why legalize one and at the same time condemn the other? The truth is that alcohol DOES cause untold misery; and, just because society is carrying the burden of one problem-eight million alcoholics-is no

Marijuana does not necessarily lead to the use of stronger drugs, but it can and does. More than 75% of the known narcotics addicts admit their introduction to drugs was through the use of marijuana.

In the United States today there are an estimated two hundred thousand heroin addicts, most are classed as criminal addicts, who steal to support their expensive habit. It costs from \$30.00 to \$100.00 per day, and to get the money an addict must steal objects worth five times that amount. This can mean at least ten million dollars a year in thefts.

However the marijauna laws are modified, the fact remains that if we don't solve this drug problem, by helping the young improve their relations with their parents and society, we are going to have a lot more trouble than we are having now. We must fight this battle, we all must get involved, the future of this country may well be in the balance. Education is our greatest weapon. If enough of our youth decide that the "in" thing is to leave drugs alone the epidemic will die of its own accord.

Question: My husband died three years ago. I will be 60 in a few months and I want to apply for monthly social security widow's payments. Must I wait until I am 60 to

Answer: No. You should apply two or three months before you reach 60. You will need proof of your age, proof of your marriage and your husband's social security number when you apply. If you have a social security number of your own, you will need that number as well. But you should not delay filing your application because you do not have all of the items listed above. The people at the social security office may be able to obtain them.

Question: I am 68 and I get monthly retirement payments, but I just started working again. Since I expect to earn over \$1,680 this year, when should I notify social security of my earnings?

Answer: Report your estimated earnings as early in the year as possible. Based on your estimate, an Question: I am a homemaker. 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




