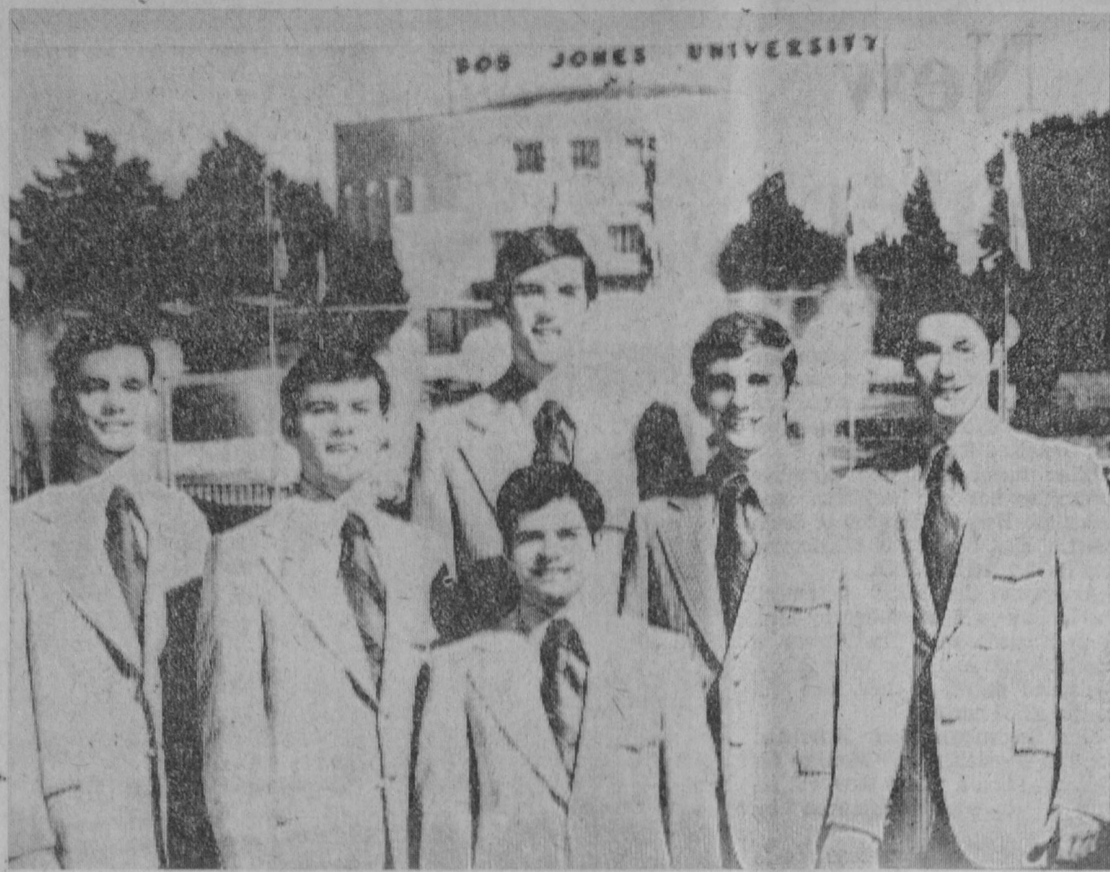

# Ladies Pushing Tree Planting on Michigan State Highways

Trees have found an effective new lobby in Michigan—some 5,000 members of the 96 Michigan branches of the Woman's National Farm and Garden Association headed by Mrs. Jack Ehlinger of Port Huron.

"Each one, plant one"—the association's slogan for 1972—is encouraging local branches throughout Michigan to plant trees, primarily for the beautification of state highways, county roads and city streets.

One such success, triggering state-wide interest, was achieved by the Wing Lake Shores branch of the association. The branch's former civic improvement chairman, Mrs. Wilbur D. Sexauer, targeted the intersection of US-24 (Telegraph Road) and Maple Road in Oakland County's

Bloomfield Township for a beautification project involving the planting of a variety of trees in the Telegraph Road median.

When her preliminary plan sketches were modified and approved by the Department of State Highways, Mrs. Sexauer raised more than \$2,000 for purchase of trees by contacting area businessmen and other branches of the Farm and Garden Association.

Trees were planted in the Telegraph Road median more than a year ago, helping to create one of the most picturesque urban freeway intersections in Michigan.

Mrs. Sexauer's success—with a lot of help from local businessmen and cooperation from the State Highway Department and township officials—is pointed to as "the model" for other branches of the Farm and Garden Association as well as other organizations.

Mrs. Sexauer is now the association's Michigan Division chairman of ecology and "Keep America Beautiful" with state-wide interest in helping to initiate local projects.

Another tree-planting project occurred this spring in the median of US-12 (Michigan Avenue) just west of M-39 (Southfield Freeway) in Dearborn.

The Dearborn Zonta Club and the Dearborn Outer Drive Kiwanis Club helped finance the project at the urging of Mrs. Helen Ross, Dearborn City Beautiful commissioner. State Highway Director Henrik E. Stafseth said there is a "sudden but welcome" interest among local groups to beautify state highway medians in their areas. "We welcome such interest and will work with local groups to beautify medians and boulevards wherever possible," Stafseth said. Stafseth said the highway department does most of its own landscaping, either by contract or with department personnel, but funds are insufficient to do all that can and

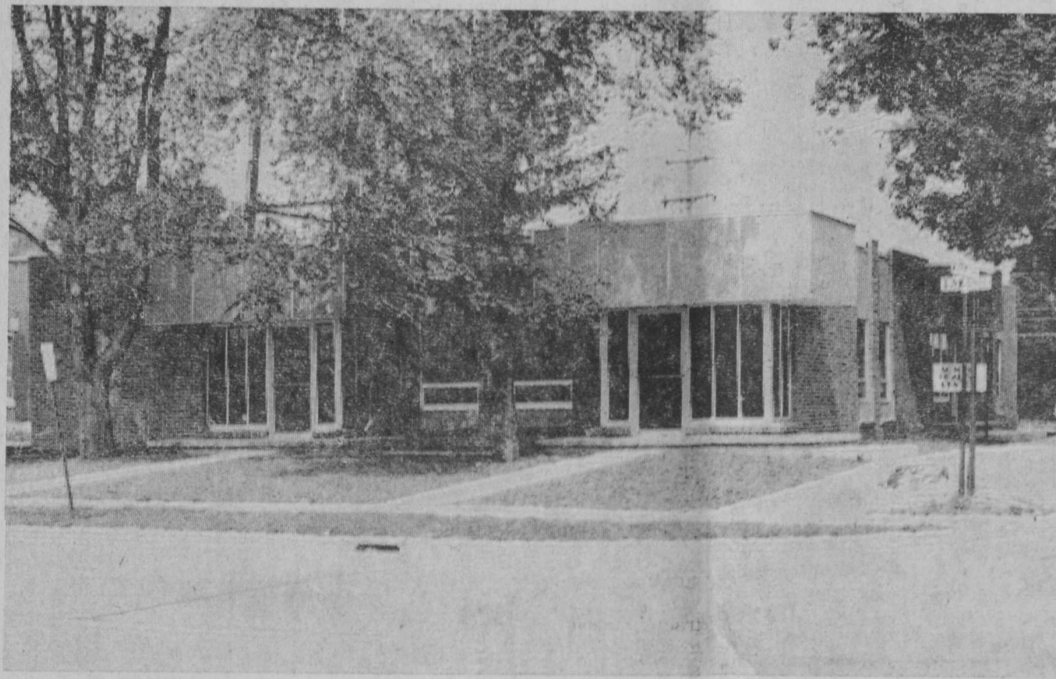

## Governor Names Energy Group

Gov. William G. Milliken has named a special commission on energy to report to him on energy resources and needs and to recommend state energy policies to the year 2000.

Paul W. McCracken, former chairman of the president's council of economic advisors and a professor of business administration at the University of Michigan, was named chairman of the commission which will submit its final report by January 1, 1974.

"We know we will require additional energy in the future for industrial expansion, increased housing opportunities, recreational pursuits and environmental quality needs," the governor said.

"The job of the commission will be to assess today's energy situation in Michigan, to project our energy needs for tomorrow and to recommend state policies which will guide energy production and distribution to the year 2000."

The governor said the commission members would have the "difficult task of examining ways to avoid in-

ordinate growth of energy demand and of minimizing adverse environmental and public safety effects from such facilities as nuclear power plants."

"Because of the massive scope of the commission's assignments, the composition is designed to bring together a wide variety of interests and backgrounds representing industry, labor, environmental and civic concerns, consumer interests and education," the governor said.

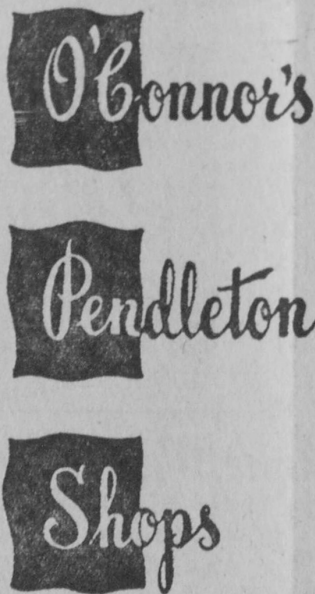

# No Danger to Lakes From Nuclear Plant

Radioactivity in the water and invertebrates of Lake Michigan will not build up to hazardous levels as a result of nuclear power plants now operating or under construction, according to an environmental study just completed under sponsorship, in part, by Consumers Power Company.

Environmental Research Group, Incorporated, (ERGI), Ann Arbor, has conducted the study on samples of phytoplankton, zooplankton, benthos, water and sediment collected from Lake Michigan in 1969-1970 by the Great Lakes Research Division of the University of Michigan. (Examples of phytoplankton include small algae such as diatoms; zooplankton, water fleas; benthos, insect larvae and worms.)

Dr. Richard A. Copeland, ERG president, was the study director. He said, "Since the utilities are required as a condition of their license to operate within present or proposed Atomic Energy Commission standards, their radioactive discharges pose no threat to Lake Michigan." The organisms studied are at the lower end of the food chain and constitute a major source of nutrition for fish.

The study covered more than 35 different elements which may be discharged in radioactive form by a nuclear power plant. The most significant, from the standpoint of possible exposure to man, were iodine and cesium.

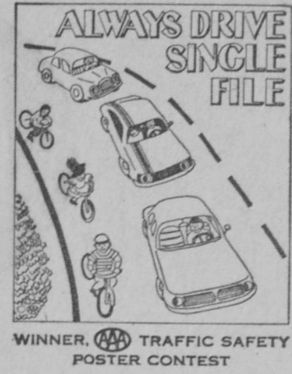
The study found, for example, that phytoplankton, the smallest living creatures in the lake, concentrate the element iodine to a level about 800 times greater than its concentration in water. But the concentration becomes no greater as one moves up the biological scale to the zooplankton and benthos which feed on the phytoplankton.

The study, using hundreds of samples collected by the Great Lakes Research team, was assisted by highly sophisticated computers in what is believed to be the most advanced neutron activation analysis system available in the United States.

Doctor Copeland said, "Within the existing conditions of Lake Michigan, the organisms studied will absorb only as much of an element, be it radioactive or stable, as their body chemistry requires and there is no indication of further concentration of the element as it proceeds up the food web."

This is essentially true of all elements in the study which may be re-

leased in liquids by nuclear power plants. Next phase of the on-going study is

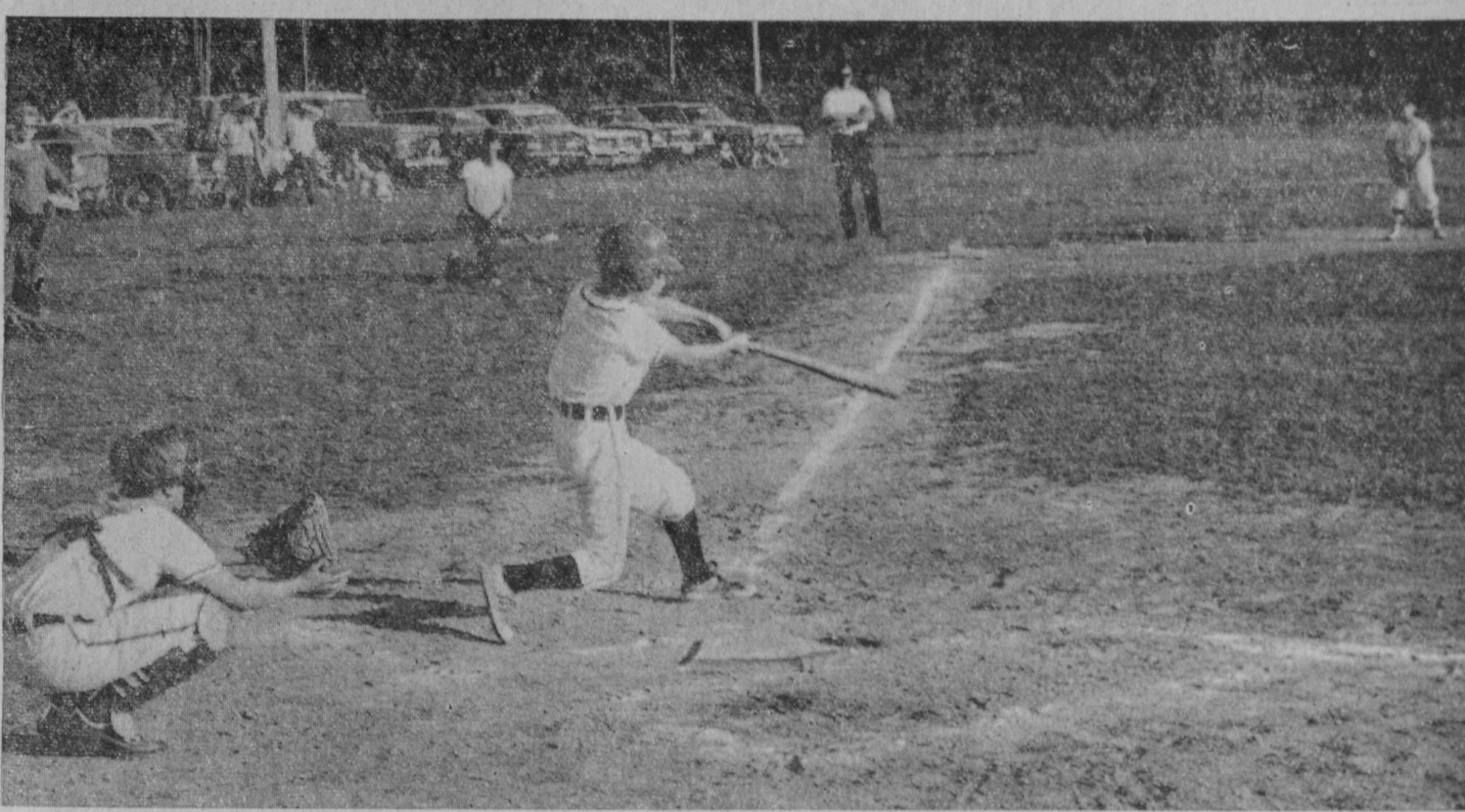

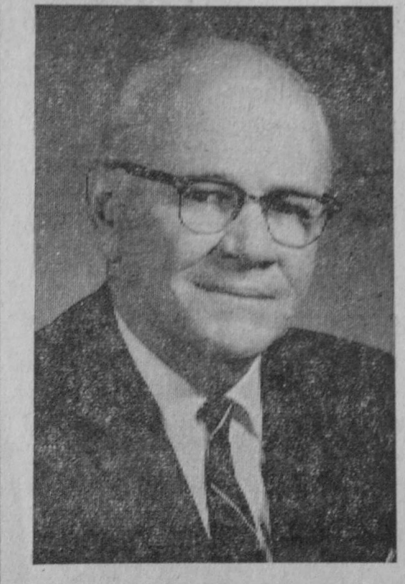
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
