DEPARTMENTAL POLICY

Success of any organization is closely related to the manner in which the administrator deals with his personnel and its organization. Regardless of the size of the department, the attitude of the sheriff towards his staff is the keynote of successful unit operation.

R. L. Holcomb, professor of police administration. University of Iowa, says, "Good law enforcement depends upon the quality of the men and women who perform the duties. Selection of the right type of personnel adds to the law enforcement officer's recognition as an important asset to his community. With good selection and a high level of efficiency, law enforcement takes on the status of a profession."

ALL personnel hired under my administration will be required to pass a definite set of qualifications based on age, education, physical fitness, intelligence, adaptability, personality, character and reputation. Emotional and ethical qualities will also be considered. Each newly appointed officer will be hired on a probationary basis until he has proved that he is a valuable and efficient officer. This, not only for my own protection but to give the people of losco County the most efficient law enforcement team possible.

Rumors have reached me to the effect that if I am elected sheriff, the present department will be purged and all new personnel hired—Nothing could be further from the truth. Basically we have a good department. With a few minor changes it will become a better department and the ultimate goal is to assemble an excellent department.

I am committed to enforce the law with fairness, being impartial and unbiased, without fear or favor, always mindful of tolerance and compassion and my obligation to the people of losco County. "Service to the Public" was the keynote of my business success, and I intend to continue that policy in the sheriff's department. ALL complaints will be answered with dispatch and courtesy.

I am also committed to promote interdepartmental harmony. The duties and responsibilities of the sheriff are sufficiently difficult without engendering antagonism between other officers and the sheriff's office. There is no room in police work for petty jealousy, interdepartmental quarreling, and doubts and suspicions. When differences do exist, their solution should be strictly a top level problem and not to be haggled by patrolmen, deputies or troopers.

Humane treatment of the animal would be the primary concern. All animals picked up would be separated according to species and sex. The Animal Shelter would be staffed by qualified personnel and would be under complete direction and control by one or more local veterinarians. Animals requiring quarantine would be kept strictly in isolation having no contact whatsoever with other animals.

Held for a normal period of time, if no one then claimed these animals they would be sold at a reasonable price to interested people, the money covering the cost of license fees and vaccines required by law.

ciety approach to this growing animal problem can do. One very important function is that an area Humane Society would have the full legal powers to prosecute persons involved in the inhumane treatment of any animal. Too, animals would be boarded at reasonable rates and a concerted effort would be made to find masters for homeless dogs and cats as but one example.

There is a pressing and serious need for a program to solve the animal problem. I sincerely believe that if we cannot show compassion and understanding and act to solve the serious problems confronting the lesser creatures sharing this earth with us, we will not be able to solve our own problems. Our problems




