School

Public relations interest of the board, neighborhood development interest of local residents and the varied interests of many others is sufficient to both complicate the program and challenge the abilities of all concerned with school planning.

"The school construction program must represent the cooperative endeavors of many people. Its success is a measure of the ability of many functionaries to cooperate. No single person or group isolating itself from the over-all educational process can satisfactorily design a school building that is intended to enhance the instructional program of others. Organization and communication in planning school facilities is tantamount to success," said Barry.

To insure that the school construction program proceeds as smoothly and rapidly as possible, the following step by step process for the planning and building would be utilized. Generally speaking, a school construction program involves these four broad phases: 1. Identifying school building needs; 2. Planning the school plant; 3. Constructing the buildings; 4. Accepting and using the plant.

School staff members would be involved in the planning as well as public committees appointed by the board of education.

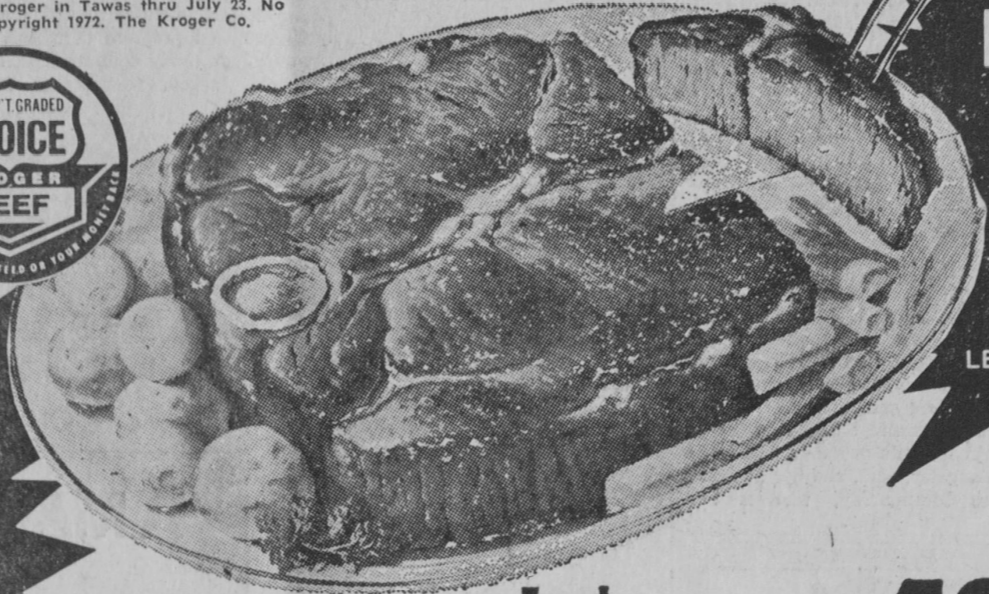

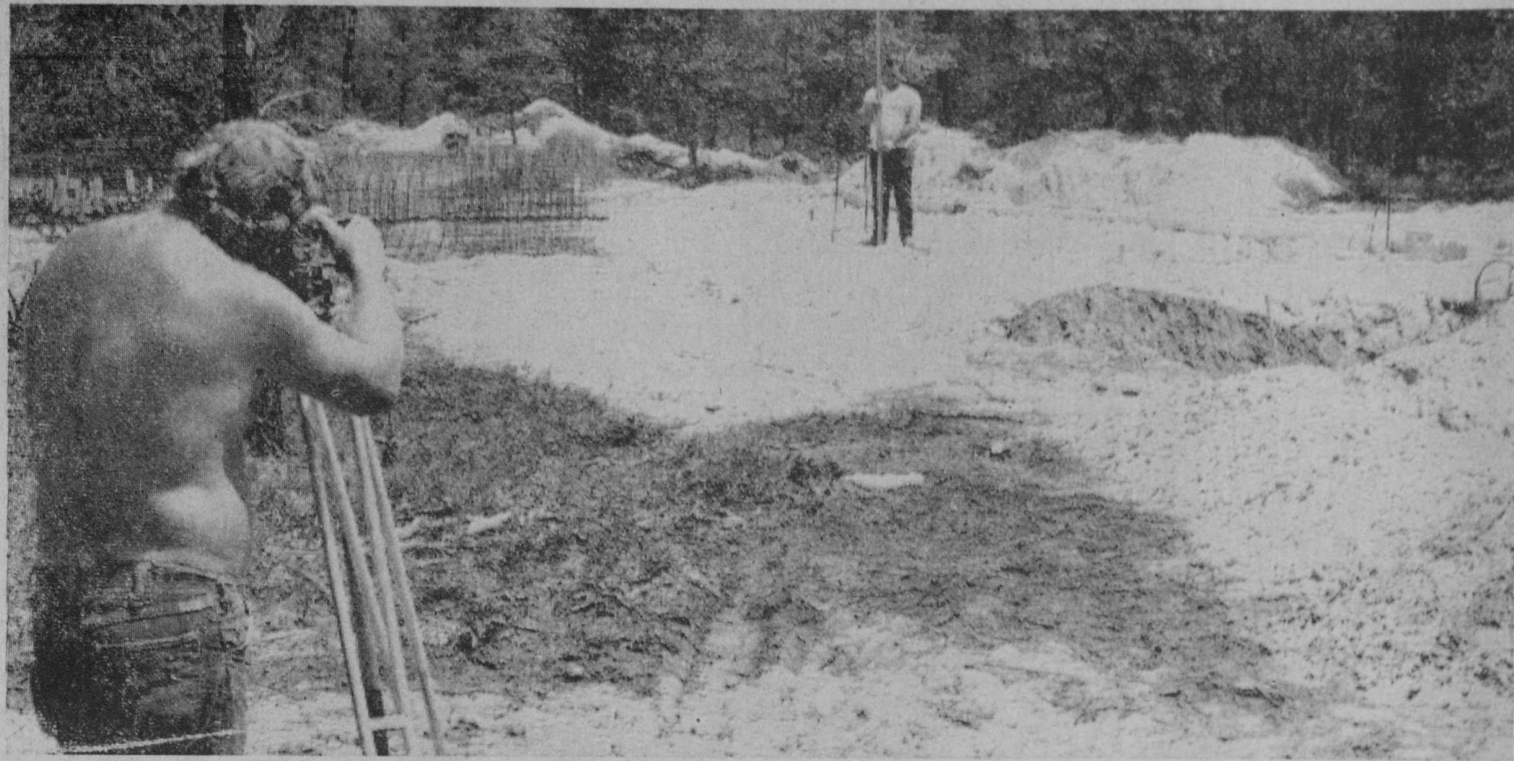

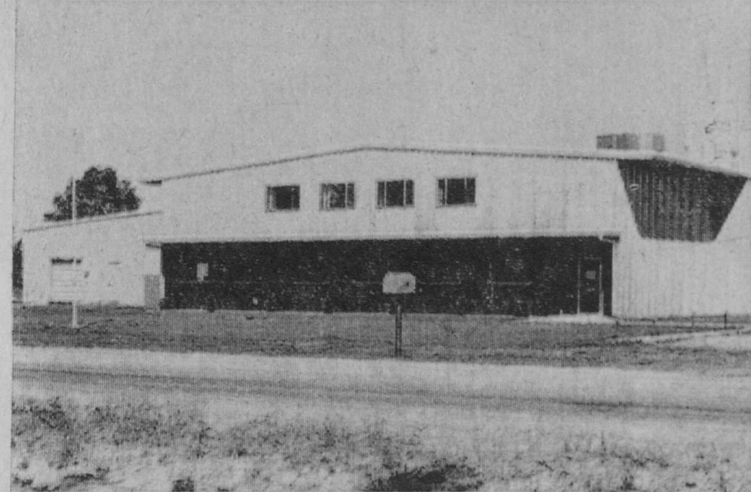

Peoples State Bank Aids Community in Development of Industrial Park

Cooperation between the Tawas Area Industrial Development Corporation and Peoples State Bank of East Tawas has resulted in the erection of two factory buildings in the area's embryo industrial park.

According to J. E. Hosbach, vice president and trust officer of the bank, the 90 acres of land that comprise the industrial area were purchased by the industrial development corporation with the help of a \$6,000 mortgage from the bank.

"provided enough money to buy 99 acres of land four miles from East Tawas, with a primary county road bisecting it, one mile from US-23, one-half mile from the county airport, with the railroad being the north boundary line."

During the past 18 months, the

bank has provided over \$300,000 in mortgage money for two factory buildings erected by the development corporation. The first was Starboard Industries, Incorporated, a plastics manufacturing concern which employs over 140 persons. The second was Valeron Corporation, a tool

finishing concern with 500 employees.

A third investment by the bank will aid the industrial development corporation to provide facilities for Starcutter Corporation, a tooling concern which will employ approximately 40 persons.

Gladwin Man is Democratic House Candidate in 105th

Earl Schuster of Gladwin has announced that he has filed his petition with the secretary of state's office seeking candidacy in the Michigan House of Representatives for the 105th District as a Democrat. Schuster has lived in Northeastern Michigan his entire life. He is a graduate of Bay City Junior College and Central Michigan University, with a major in political science. He has taught government at Glad-

win High School for the past nine years and was on the Gladwin City Council for 4½ years. He is currently on the housing commission, which recently was able to secure 50 units for senior citizen housing. He is twice past president of the Gladwin Education Association.

Schuster is married and has three children. He and his wife manage the Gladwin County Federal Credit Union.

Hosbach noted, "The bank is pleased to work along with the industrial development corporation to help our area grow economically by providing necessary funds for sound, healthy employment with a watchful eye on ecological problems. We are always ready to cooperate with our locally concerned people, who are seeking a better community for their neighbors and attracting new people to share our destiny."

Hale Area School 'Down to the Wire' on Aug. 29 Millage Vote

Voters of Hale Area School District will decide August 29, one day before doors open for another year, if they want their school to operate for more than 47 days during the 1972-73 term.

"We are right down to the wire insofar as school financing is concerned. Time for another vote will run out after this election and we have just enough money to operate

until November 1—it is now up to the people to make the decision," states Supt. Paul Keene.

Tuesday, August 29, is the date established by the board of education for resubmitting an operational tax package which was defeated at the annual school election held June 12. There were 1,021 voters going to the polls and the proposal was defeated, 575-439.

The proposal being resubmitted asks for a renewal of nine mills and an additional 3½ mills, making a total voted operational tax package of 12½ mills.

The nine mills had been approved for one year in August 1971 by an eight-vote margin. The 3½ mills are needed to cover additional operational expenses when the new school, now under construction, is utilized for the first time this fall.

"I really felt the millage proposal would be approved by voters at the annual election. We had a good year and we are trying to do something, but the millage defeat has resulted in considerable delay in making plans for the next school year and it is very discouraging. I have had to work on four different millage elections since taking over as superintendent and it is taking time that I should be spending on our educational program."

Keene said he really did not know what would happen if the millage proposal is defeated for a second time. "If we are forced to close our doors November 1, I am sure the state would step in, but I am sure the people would not like the consequences," said Keene.

He said that possible action by the state at this point would only be conjecture, but he believed that in such an event the district could be divided between existing school districts of the area, "or the state could come in and assess the necessary money to operate the school—I really don't know."

He said that in any event, the people would still have to pay taxes to operate some school, if not Hale Area, and local control would be lost.

Keene said he was hopeful that none of the above alternatives would ever take place for, regardless of state action, the district is committed to retiring its bonds for construction of the new school building.

I. O'Farrell Tree Farm is Site of Tour

A forest tour has been planned by the Cooperative Extension Service Friday, August 4, for Ivan O'Farrell's tree farm in Burleigh Township.

"Trees are becoming a most important commodity," states Marvin Davenport, county extension director. "But they do require care and management if one expects to realize maximum profit."

This tour will demonstrate tree pruning, insect control, disease control, tree selection, site selection and preparation, financial assistance available for reforestation.

David Olson, Osoda County extension director, is a registered forester and has been extension forestry program leader in 12 counties of the region. He will conduct the tour and will answer questions on forestry.

June Scott, county executive director for the ASCS office, will be on hand to explain the REAP practices available to land owners for reforestation practices.

Charles Lightfoot, district soil conservationist, Iosco County Soil Conservation District, will be in attendance to answer questions on soils for reforestation.

There will be a complimentary luncheon furnished through Mr. O'Farrell, the Iosco County Tree Grower's Association and the Cooperative Extension Service.

For convenience of those attending, tractors and wagons will provide transportation on the tour of the O'Farrell plantation.

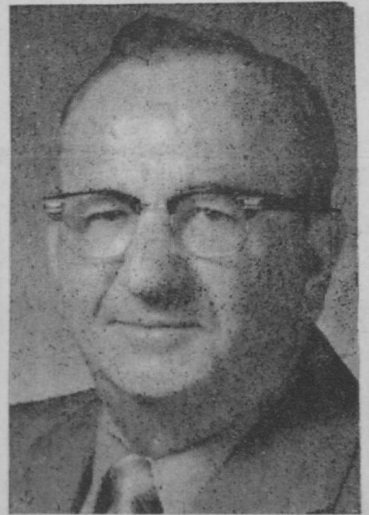
He attended extension courses for sales executives at the Chevrolet Academy, conducted by Wayne State University.
