

GUN LAWS

I am firmly opposed to stricter regulation of handguns-Michigan already has a strong gun law that provides up to five years in prison for illegally carrying a concealed weapon; (CL 1948-750.227 M. S. A. 28.424).

Numerous arrests have been made for illegally carrying a concealed weapon in losco County, yet I cannot recall when a defendant was given such a penalty by the court. I believe by this time it should be plain to everyone that if there is to be any decrease in crime it will have to come from the courts.

I am of the opinion that 'disarmament' and registration of all firearms are not the answers to the problem, our aim remains to alleviate the abuses caused by the

A gun is an inanimate object. It is the user that makes it a force for good or evil, for sport or grief. So long as society includes criminals—crime will occur. The problem, therefore, is not the restriction or registration of guns, but the registration of criminals, narcotics addicts and mental cases and the application of such identification to the purchase of guns. After all, we have had to obtain a prescription to purchase narcotics for as long as anyone can remember, yet today there are more illegal drugs available than ever before in our history.

Anti-gun preachers make much of the fact that after the Watts Riots and riots elsewhere, guns sold like hotcakes not only in riot areas but everywhere in the various cities. Why not? Is it criminal for a home owner, the head of a family, to prepare as best he can to defend his family, himself and his property? When recent and frightening common events have proved that the police of our great cities, plus state troopers and the National Guard in many cases—can't protect them?

I don't think so, but then I'm "over forty" (and hence not to be trusted). I'm also basically "establishment minded." At least I'm minded to support the ancient verities of a belief in God, patriotism, respect for constituted authority and do unto your neighbor as you would have him do unto you.

I think to curtail this rise in crime, involving the use of firearms, there is only one method that would be effective, and that is a firm, fair law enforcement policy. I don't think we need new laws. We have too many laws on the books now. ALL we have to do is ENFORCE the laws we have now, with FIRM BACKING FROM THE COURTS.

There is plenty of work for all Law Enforcement agencies in our County. I feel the Taxpayers will be much happier if they see all Law Enforcement agencies using their best efforts and cooperating with each other at preserving law and order in our County.

As an alternative to hiring additional election board workers and as a means of speeding up the counting process following an election, the township purchased four AVM automatic voting machines.

Through the use of these new machines, results of each election can be available within 30 seconds after closing the polls. (In actual use, however, counting will take a few minutes longer as absent voters' ballots are to be run on the machines as soon as polls close. But results will be available in a matter of minutes, rather than the 14 hours of counting time required for the last presi dential election.)

The names and totals received by each candidate are automatically printed on sheets of paper which are turned into the county clerk and additional copies are available for the press and candidates.

Voting machines have been in use for a good many years and Oscoda Township was the first unit of Ioseo County to utilize such equipment Plainfield Township now becomes the second unit to adopt voting ma-

Use of the machines by voters has been simplified to such an extent that there are no "spoiled ballots" in elections—the machine does not allow a voter to split his ticket when prohibited.

There are provisions for writing in the name of the candidate not listed on the machine. Each "ballot" cast on the machine is secret (a curtain closes when the voter activates the machine) and there are provisions to prevent a person from voting more

Each of the machines cost \$2,122 and township officials believe that they will be paid for in a matter of years through the saving in salaries paid to election board workers-10 members on the board instead of 50 Representatives of the company furnishing the machines are to hold
