

# Candidates Rush to File Petitions

Candidates for county offices had until Tuesday afternoon, 4 o'clock, to file nominating petitions with the county clerk for the August 8 primary election.

County Clerk Keith Papas said Tuesday morning that 20 persons had filed for office, five of them being received that morning. Included was his own petition for county clerk as well as one from Edward Niekie, county treasurer. No petition had been received as of 12 o'clock noon for prosecuting attorney.

The August primary election should be one of the most active in recent years with eight candidates filing for the office of sheriff—six Republicans and two Democrats—as well as a race for the register of deeds office and two races as of 12 o'clock noon yesterday for the new five-member county board of commissioners.

# Bids Opened on ET Federal Housing

Two bids were opened Friday night on construction of a 30-unit apartment building complex for elderly persons and 20 low-cost single unit family dwellings in East Tawas.

Opened by the East Tawas Housing Commission, a decision on awarding of contracts is to be made in about two weeks, according to John C. Elliott, housing commission chairman.

A bid of \$966,430 for the project was submitted by Gregory Construction Company of Bay City. A combined offer of \$1,047,842 was submitted by Consolidated Construction Company and DeShano Homes and Improvement, also of Bay City.

## Tawas Bay Harbor Plans Included in 1973 Budget

Cong. Elford A. Cederberg of Michigan's Tenth Congressional District announced today that the house of representatives committee on appropriations has placed \$40,000 for planning in the Tawas Bay Harbor Project in the 1973 appropriation bill. This federal assistance will be used for advanced planning and design, which must be completed before the actual construction begins. Authorization for construction is given by congress in the 1968 River and Harbor Act.

Ivan O'Farrell, who is retiring at the end of this year after serving since January 1, 1949, as sheriff, has the most competition.

Six Republican candidates filing, in alphabetical order, are Francis Block of Wilber Township, Keith Dobson of Oscoda, Donald Docking of East Tawas, John Koenig of Oscoda, Dale Snyder of Whittemore and George Westcott of Tawas City. Two Democratic candidates filing are James Finley of Grant Township and Louis Sokola of Tawas City.

There is a two-way race to name a successor to Albert H. Buch, who has served as register of deeds for 27 years. Republican candidates are Arlene Olsen, presently serving as deputy register of deeds, and Leon Putnam, who presently serves as under-sheriff.

The two races for county commission seats as of Tuesday noon were in District No. 1, comprising part of Oscoda Township, and District No. 4, comprising Tawas City, Tawas, Alabaster, Sherman, Burleigh and Reno Townships and Whittemore.

Three Republican candidates filing for District No. 1 are Robert Foster and Jack W. Allen, both presently representing Oscoda on the nine-man board, and Steve Paslaski. Voting for the District No. 4 seat are Clement Stephan, currently a member of the nine-man board, and Carl Libka. Both men are from Tawas City.

Others filing Republican petitions for county commission seats are Donald Griffin, District No. 2; F. B. Lomas, District No. 3; William Weryley, District No. 5. Both Lomas and Weryley are presently serving on the commission.

The lone Democrat to file for the county commission is Robert Pember, who will oppose Weryley in the November general election.

blasts from the diesel locomotive's warning signal, an emergency stop system was locked which set the wheels on all cars of the train and the locomotive.

The emergency stop system became operative near the intersection of Second Street and Second Avenue. The train passed over the trestle bridge and ground to a halt in the rear of the Village Inn, a distance of several hundred feet.

venture into public housing at East Tawas. Estimated cost of the project was 1.3 million dollars.

Gregory proposes to build the 30-unit, high rise apartment building for elderly on West Bay Street between Main and Tawas Streets. Location of the unit proposed by Consolidated-DeShano is at Church and West Bay Streets.

Eighteen of the apartments are designed for one occupant and the other 12 will have one bedroom. The single family dwellings are to be scattered throughout the city. They are to have brick veneer fronts.

The proposed housing is designed for low income families and low income elderly persons, who have been residents of East Tawas for at least two years.

Mr. Cederberg explained, "Upon completion of the harbor-of-refuge, there will be a public dock to service about 165 craft with full utilities, restrooms and showers. In addition to recreational crafts, the completed harbor will serve, it is anticipated, for considerable use of break water by pier fishermen."

This project is located between the harbors of Port Lookout and Ausable and will provide refuge for recreational craft in the heavily traveled area of Saginaw Bay.



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## Council OK's Bids on Wooden Bridges

Authorization to accept bids of Graham Brimhall Company for the much discussed wooden bridges over the Tawas River was given Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

At the same time, the council heard a report from George Myles, president of the Tawas City Businessmen's Association, who stated that the businessmen encouraged the council to consider a covered bridge at one of the two locations.

As its first action, the council authorized construction of a breakaway along Ninth Avenue at a cost of \$7,500. This wall would be 300 feet in length extending from the state highway right-of-way at the US-23 bridge. The city is presently negotiating with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources for participation in this project. It would provide river bank fishing facilities as well as offering protection to Ninth Avenue. Authorization was given to make application to the DNR for a grant to aid in financing construction of the retaining wall.

Graham Brimhall Company's bid for construction of a wooden bridge at Mathews Street, was approved. The roadway of this bridge is to be 30 feet in width rather than 32 feet. Accepting the alternate width saves approximately \$1,800 on the original bid of \$27,632.44. Authorization was given to provide for the additional expense of driving piling to a greater depth in order to handle the greater load should the bridge be covered at some future date. It is estimated that constructing a roof over the bridge would cost an additional \$14,200.

The second bridge approved was at First Street. This bridge is to be 32 feet in width and the cost is to be \$27,632.44.

One walkway is to be provided on the First Street bridge for the bene-

fit of fishermen. The council is considering installation of two walkways on the Mathews Street bridge. Application is to be made with the DNR for possible financial assistance for construction of the catwalks.

In other business, the council authorized an expenditure of \$214.15 for the purchase of riot equipment by the police department. Included would be a riot shotgun, three riot helmets and three chemical Mace dispensers.

Permission was granted to Tawas Chamber of Commerce for an ox roast in the city park on August 12 as part of the Michigan Tourist Festival. The council gave its approval for the chamber to make application to the state liquor control commission for a one-day beer license.

Approval was given to the 1972-73 highway maintenance contract with the Michigan Department of State Highways, which designated City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz as the highway administrator. The new contract has been increased by about \$1,200.

The council is to receive bids July 17 for construction of a new roof on the city hall.

## Parking Expansion Discussed

Expansion of parking to serve the Newman Street business district at East Tawas, along with acquisition of the present parking lot owned privately between West Westover and West Bay Streets, is being actively considered by the East Tawas Council.

At Monday night's regular meeting, authorization was given to contact Christ Episcopal Church to start negotiations with the church for the purchase of 3 1/2 lots owned by the church on West Westover Street.

If negotiations are successful, a parking lot would be located there for employees of stores along Newman Street.

It was announced, also, that approval had been received from all but one property owner for the city's purchase of the parking lot at the rear of the A&P Store. It was stated that cost of the purchase would be \$2.75 per square foot.

If the purchase is completed, and the council is of the opinion that negotiations can be completed with the final property owner, the city would assume responsibility for snow removal during the winter. No parking meters would be installed in the lot and, if purchased by the city, meters would be then removed from the parking lot behind Mooney's Ben Franklin Store.

Purchase of the property would be financed through an assessment district established in the business district.

In other business Monday night, the council heard a request from William Look Jr., fire chief, concerning purchase of a communications system for the fire department. Look said that communications between trucks was difficult because of the large area covered by the department.

The council turned the matter over to its finance committee and an immediate application is to be made for a radio license.

**Suspect Freed Under \$5,000 Personal Bond**  
 Chester Lee Miller, who is charged with attempted murder in allegedly firing a .22 caliber rifle at an Isosco County sheriff's deputy on June 1, was released Friday from his confinement in the county jail after posting a bond required by the district court.  
 Originally held under a \$50,000 cash bond, Dist. Judge J. Richard Ernst Friday lowered the bond to \$5,000, which was immediately posted. No date has been set as yet for the next court appearance of the defendant, a resident of Sanford.  
 Miller, 17, had been held at the county jail after his arrest at the Gordon Creek campground, several hours after the shooting incident on Monument Road.  
 Dep. Sheriff Robert VanCamp, 24, narrowly escaped being wounded when the driver of a car which he was chasing stopped and fired a rifle at him, the slug penetrating the door of the patrol car. The deputy had answered a call from Whispering Pines Tavern, where a customer reportedly had taken a rifle from the trunk of his car, loaded it and then drove off.  
 The deputy spotted a car answering to the description and gave chase. He returned four shots with his service revolver after the original shooting, but with no effect. VanCamp identified Miller as his alleged assailant after the latter's capture.

# Tawas and Baldwin to Seek Federal Water - Sewer Grant

Three local units of government have joined forces to submit an application for federal funds to aid in financing a \$2,097,000 water and sewer project.

Initiated originally by Baldwin Township to serve the Tawas Area Industrial Development Corporation's industrial park near the Isosco County Airport, city councils of East Tawas and Tawas City Monday night each gave approval to adding local water and sewer projects—for a regional plan.

Appearing before the city councils was Daniel Alstott of Edmonds Engineering Company, Bay City, hired by Baldwin Township to develop that phase of the project. Edmonds serves as Tawas City's engineering consultant and is to cooperate with Spicer Engineering Company, East Tawas, consulting, in developing the final plan.

Total estimated cost of Baldwin Township's project to serve the industrial park is \$929,000. East Tawas' share of the \$2,097,000 total is \$700,000, while Tawas City's share amounts to \$468,000. All of the above totals are based on preliminary estimates by the engineer.

Alstott explained to the councils that an application was to be made through the Isosco County Board of Commissioners and Isosco Board of Public Works through the East Central Michigan Development District for a federal grant which would finance 80 percent of the total project cost.

While emphasizing that the preliminary project was only speculative at this point, Alstott was of the opinion that this combined regional plan had an excellent opportunity for success because the Tawas area had been designated by the state as a secondary growth center.

Being stressed in the application is the fact that the project is designed to serve two industrial parks, the Tawas Area Industrial Development Corporation's industrial park in Baldwin Township as well as the Tawas City Industrial Park on Ninth Avenue. The City of East Tawas is to provide water and sewer facilities to the Baldwin Township industrial

## Seeks Injunction Against Pine River Property Owner

A show cause hearing is to be held Friday, June 23, before Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller to determine if an injunction should be issued restraining a Pine River property owner from hindering a cleanup campaign being conducted in that river.

Asking for a temporary restraining order against Fred Heller Friday was Hamilton McNichol of Oscoda, president of the AuSable River Valley Rotary Club.

The Rotary Club, AuSable-Oscoda Sportsmen's Club and Michigan Department of Natural Resources had conducted a campaign on June 3, 4, 10 and 11 to clean the Pine River of submerged trees so as to improve canoeing and use for other recreational purposes.

McNichol's petition claimed that Heller, who owns property on the Pine River in Oscoda Township, prevented lawful use of the river by the plaintiff and those participating in the cleanup campaign.

The petition claimed that Heller used physical threat in ordering the plaintiff to leave the confines of his property and McNichol said he was "fearful for the persons so participating in the exercise of their rights."

The judge is to determine if a permanent injunction is to be issued enjoining Heller from using the alleged threats.

The above plan includes the long-talked-of 12-inch main connecting Tawas City with East Tawas' water supply system and water main has been expanded by about 5,300 lineal feet under the new plan.

East Tawas' portion includes 15,600 feet of water main at \$148,000, a 500,000-gallon underground water storage at \$100,000, 6,450 feet of sanitary sewer at \$129,000, 800 feet of force main at \$6,000, a \$40,000 pumping station and an addition to the sewage treatment plant to handle the Baldwin Township industrial park at \$210,000.

Baldwin Township's portion of the contract includes 13,700 lineal feet of water main, 13,450 lineal feet of sanitary sewer, 3,700 lineal feet of force main, three pumping stations and a 500,000-gallon elevated water

storage tank. An additional \$86,000 is being allowed for contingencies, engineering, legal and administrative expenses.

Proposed projects have been reviewed by City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz of East Tawas and City Sup. Paul Roper of East Tawas. Approval of the plans has been received from the health department.

Letters of intent have been authorized by both city councils and the Baldwin Township Board and the engineer is to appear Wednesday (today) before the Isosco County Board of Commissioners for formal presentation of the preliminary plan.

The project would be handled through the county board of public works, inasmuch as the county is in a much more advantageous position to obtain bonds than the three individual units.

Alstott told the council Monday night that James L. Collison, executive director of the East Central Michigan Development District, had reviewed the proposed plan and "had given his blessing."

## Sheriff's Department Girds for Busy Holiday Week-End

Although stating that it was still too early to determine if there will be a repeat on the Fourth of July of the Memorial Day crowd at Gordon Creek, Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell announced Monday that the sheriff's department would be completely mobilized for the upcoming holiday week-end.

O'Farrell said that the department's three patrol cars would be manned with three deputies in each car and four unmarked cars would be used with four officers in each car. Members of the sheriff's posse and special deputies are to provide additional manpower and leaves of all regular deputies have been canceled for the holiday.

The sheriff said that one experienced deputy would ride in each car carrying the special officers.

"It is rather difficult to determine if there will be as large a crowd at Gordon Creek as anticipated earlier, especially since the shooting incident two weeks ago. In the past, such crowds have materialized when it was least expected," said O'Farrell.

The sheriff visited the campground in Huron National Forest Sunday and found only 16 motorcycleists. He noted, however, that one large Norway tree had been cut down for firewood.

O'Farrell said he was writing a letter to Governor Milliken suggesting that about 1,000 national guardsmen be mobilized for the holiday. O'Farrell believes that 500 guardsmen should be stationed at some point in Southern Michigan and the remaining 500 be quartered at Grayling. He believes that the force at Grayling could be sent to any point in Northern Michigan to help quell any possible disturbance.

Petitions signed by more than 500 Isosco residents were presented to the representative of Cong. Elford A. Cederberg last Tuesday. The petitions asked the federal government to close Gordon Creek.

**Public Meeting to Air Halfway House Proposal**  
 A meeting to discuss a proposed halfway house, providing residential facilities for selected adult offenders in a four-county area, is to be held Thursday, June 29, 8:00 p. m., at the multipurpose room of the East Tawas Elementary Unit.  
 Robert R. Jensen, probation and parole officer for this county, said that such a facility would provide facilities for adult offenders not requiring traditional secure confinement, but who require closer supervision than can be afforded through probation alone.  
 Attempts are being made to develop a halfway house to serve Alcona, Arenac, Isosco and Oscoda Counties. Emphasis would be on short term residential and treatment programs for offenders who do not represent a serious threat to the community, focusing primarily on probationers, as opposed to parolees, who have just been released from prison.  
 The program would accept referrals from law enforcement agencies, courts, community agencies, parents and those actually in need of either direct or referral services. Objective of the program would be to reduce institutional commitments and provide effective rehabilitation within the community.  
 Jensen said an important part of obtaining federal funds for this type of project is community support and the public is invited to attend the June 29 meeting.  
 Gerald Martz, counselor for the division of vocational rehabilitation working with inmates of Jackson Prison, has been asked to act as director of the proposed halfway house. He has a master degree in psychology and his work experience has been as a minister, marriage counselor, director of Good Will Industries at Jackson.  
 It is felt that the halfway house would cost approximately \$60,000 to operate the first year. A federal grant would cover 75 percent of this cost with the other 25 percent coming from the community. Jensen noted that the local contribution would be on an in-kind basis through utilization of local facilities or personnel.

**Ballinger Trial Stated July 25**  
 Federal trial for Gene C. Ballinger, charged with mail fraud in a check kiting operation between two Isosco County banks, is to be held at Bay City starting July 25.  
 Ballinger is charged with 26 counts of check kiting which allegedly resulted in a loss of \$753,922 to Farmers and Merchants State Bank at Hale between January 1967 and March 1971.  
 Ballinger had operated a metal detector business at Oscoda, which was later signed over to the Hale bank, along with other property. In August of last year, the bank took over operation of the business and has since closed it. A multi-million-dollar damage suit has been filed against the bank and others by Ballinger and a suit is currently pending in Isosco Circuit Court concerning liquidation of the business.  
 In the federal court trial at Bay City, the government charges that Ballinger kited checks between the Hale bank and Peoples State Bank of East Tawas.

## Answers to SS Questions

Question: I recently applied for monthly social security disability benefits. Do I need to have a new special medical examination before my application is processed?

Answer: Not usually. In most cases, a disability determination is based on reports from your attending physician and hospitals where you have received treatment. However, additional medical evidence sometimes may be necessary before a decision can be made. Then, a person may be requested to have an additional medical examination, at no cost to him.

Question: I am getting disability payments from another government agency, but my application for disability benefits from social security was denied. Can you tell me why?

Answer: You can get payments under social security only if you are so disabled that you cannot do any kind of gainful work. This definition of disability is usually different from that of other federal agencies or private companies. Therefore, entitlement to disability benefits under some other agency or company would not necessarily mean that you would also qualify for disability under social security.

Question: My 20-year-old son, who has been getting social security payments since his father died, was recently awarded a full scholarship. Since the scholarship pays all his school expenses, will he still receive social security payments?

Answer: Yes, your son will continue to receive student's benefits. His scholarship does not in any way affect his monthly social security payments.

Question: I am a college student getting monthly social security checks. Since I have already told social security I would be in college until 1973, why do I have to fill out and send in a student reporting card?

Answer: Students sometimes have to change their plans. The end of the school year report verifies a student's current enrollment status and his continuing intent to attend school full time.

## DNR Chief Objects to AuGres Watershed Cost

At least a temporary setback to the AuGres watershed project has resulted through refusal of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources to contribute financially to the program.

A letter from Ralph A. McMullan, director, stated that an assessment against the DNR for purchase of land needed for a wildlife impoundment area was excessive. Watershed planners had requested \$131,400 from the DNR to purchase land.

This portion of the project consists of a 185-acre shallow water impoundment on the east channel of the AuGres River. This was to serve as a wildlife habitat, required by the DNR for loss of flood area through improved drainage of the river basin.

McMullan pointed out that cleaning out and channelizing of 20 miles

of streams and drains, plus construction of five miles of new channel, would cause significant damage to fish and wildlife habitat and considered a \$35,100 federal payment for construction as only a token amount in mitigation for potential damages.

Members of the watershed planning committee were surprised with McMullan's announcement, believing it is not the responsibility of farmers to allow their fields to flood out in the spring so that a migrating duck can land during that flood.

Earlier this year, the DNR spent \$130,000 to purchase land for a parking lot at the Singing Bridge. AuGres area farmers are said to be furious, saying that smelt fishermen destroy the county's landscape over a single week-end, while the DNR insists farm fields be retained as flooded landing fields for ducks.

This was the second setback for

the project in recent weeks. Governmental representatives of both Iosco and Ogemaw Counties decided that the watershed plan offered no benefits to either of those counties. When representatives of those counties boycotted a meeting, Arenac representatives on the committee had the necessary support to petition for federal and state assistance.

## AuSable Twp. Gets Water System Grant Alpena CC Offers Opportunity to Vets

Outreach representatives are versed in scholarships, grants, national defense loans, college work

study programs, employment assistance, educational opportunity grants and tutorial assistance.

Veterans having 181 days of consecutive service, commencing January 31, 1955, are entitled to veterans educational benefits.

Parents Know the Drug Threat THE CHILD YOU SAVE MAY BE YOUR OWN

Today's Subject: Heroin - Another Depressant

While discussing Heroin it is immediately alarming to parents to learn that most city, county and state arrests for Heroin, across the country, have increased from 100% to 250% in the past two years!

What is Heroin? Heroin is diacetylmorphine, an alkaloid derived from morphine. It does not occur in opium. It is most usually a white, off-white or brown crystalline powder. It has for many years been first choice among addicts of opiates. In slang terms it is referred to as "H," "Big H," "Smack," "Junk," "Dope." It is an injected, potent, highly addictive narcotic. Its possession is illegal.

Heroin has a generally sedative and analgesic effect. The first reaction to introducing it into the system is unpleasant to most people, but a calming effect follows and, depending on how much is taken at a time, may very well progress to coma and death from respiratory failure.

A Heroin user will have "needle tracks," small needle marks on his body, most often on the arms over a vein. It can also be given in the legs. Abscesses (boils) often become apparent at the site of injections. Dirty needle diseases are common among users, such as hepatitis and nationally approach epidemic levels.

Most abusers, using Heroin, actually seem to have a dream-like disposition, but when in need of a "fix," (another dose), they become capable of aggressive and even violent behavior. Signs of use of Heroin, among others, are pinpoint pupils and a pale complexion. The body builds a tolerance for the drug and the user needs an increased dose regularly in order to achieve the same desired effect. Withdrawal pains occur when drug is not available. The psychological dependence on the drug makes the user THINK he needs the drug to function and he is extremely uncomfortable without it, once "hooked." Ex-addicts often return to the habit and the history of complete recoveries is disheartening to say the least.

Infection of the user's blood stream, lungs and heart, can and often do result from Heroin injections. The lungs can have blood clots. When this type of infection occurs it is usually caused by bacteria that can be very resistant to treatment and therefore the death rate is very high.

Source for Heroin is the illegal "street market" and the cost is usually \$3. to \$5. per capsule. Physical dependence can cost from \$20.00 to \$200.00 per day.

What could possibly be appealing about the use of such a horrifying drug? To the user, the great appeal is that these drugs induce a sense of good feeling, depress or overcome emotional pain for a while and minimize feelings of fear, anxiety and tension. But, when it is so unmistakably evident that narcotics can become a way of life, consuming complete attention, energy and income, it is the duty of everyone, with any contact or influence with young people to educate them whenever possible about the FACTS surrounding drug misuse.

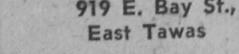

'Can We Find Fulfillment Now?' Was Title of Lecture

Many people feel that a hostile economic or social system prevents them from finding and fulfilling their true identity. In spite of all our technological progress, many people today are still experiencing heart-break, suffering and lack.

In anger, many people are rebelling. But violent rebellion against the system, withdrawal from society or conformity to injustice cannot bring the fulfillment we all want, said Miss Patricia Tuttle, C. S., of San Francisco, California. To find true identity we must "find the higher manhood that derives its abilities and power from God. This identity belongs to everyone."

Miss Tuttle's lecture titled "Can We Find Fulfillment Now?" was given in the East Tawas Community Building. It was sponsored by First Church of Christ, Scientist, East Tawas.

"Although Moses, the Hebrew leader, lived thousands of years ago, his problems seem contemporary. He, too, was a member of a minority group that was locked into poverty and oppression. At one point, Moses even killed another man in a burst of anger.

"After this crime, he fled from Egypt," Miss Tuttle continued. "But in the following years, in his quest for a better understanding of God, Moses discovered a better self or higher identity. This enabled him to return to Egypt and lead the Israelites out of bondage."

Moses successfully rebelled against human injustice on the basis of a higher understanding of God and not out of fear and anger, Miss Tuttle observed. He found the power to help himself as well as others.

"In discerning something of God's true nature, Moses gained a better concept of himself," Miss Tuttle said. Among the many things Moses learned about God was that His power is always present and that it holds only good for man. "Everyone," Miss Tuttle continued, "has the right to be the highest style man, to have all that is good and essential for human fulfillment."

Throughout history, the lecturer said, men have wanted to expand human capacities and vision. They have succeeded, she continued, in proportion as they have modified their view of matter so as to escape its limitations. As men continue to alter their concept of matter, tremendous changes in our way of living are occurring. But "to gain complete mastery over material limitations, we need to understand still more about the nature of matter."

Mary Baker Eddy later wrote this definition in "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures": "Man.

an accident which occurred while he was delivering fuel oil approximately 15 years ago.

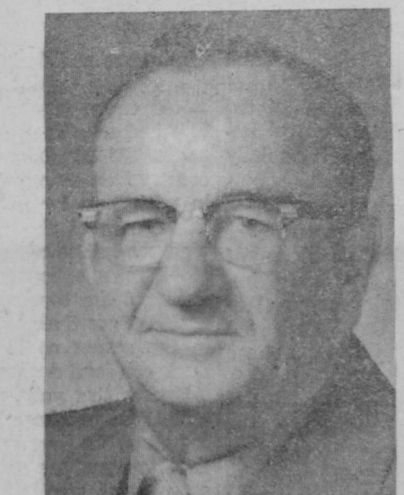
Besides his wife, he is survived by a son, William J. of East Tawas; three grandchildren; two brothers, Wallace R. of Capac and William R. of Reed City.

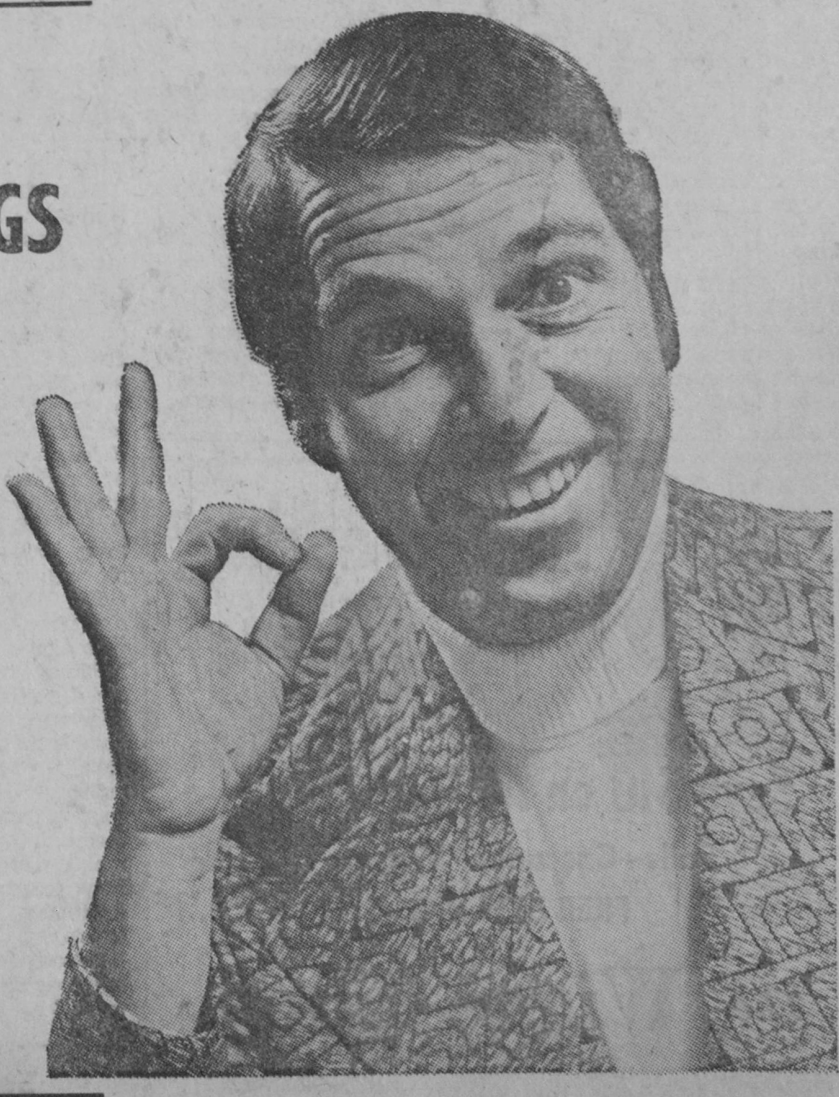

## Be Careful— Give Correct SS Number

Do not try to memorize your social security number. Do not, especially, try to repeat your social security number from memory when an employer asks you for the number for his records when you start a new job.

That advice comes from the Bay City social security district manager.

"Your social security number has nine digits," John Carr noted. "If you try to memorize it, you can easily give a wrong number when you try to repeat it. If you furnish a wrong social security number to an employer, it may cause difficulty in crediting your earnings to your social security record. That may eventually affect your social security benefits."

An employee's earnings are credited to his social security number when they are reported by his employer. The employee's earnings determine the amount of monthly social security benefits he may collect when he retires or becomes severely disabled; also the amount of benefits his family may get if he dies prematurely.

"If all of your earnings are not credited to your social security number, your benefits may amount to less than they should," Carr said.

Carr's advice is to always carry your social security card in your purse or wallet. When starting a new job, always show your social security card to your employer and make sure he copies the number and name from the card.

"Remember," Carr said, "do not try to memorize your social security number. It could cost you money."

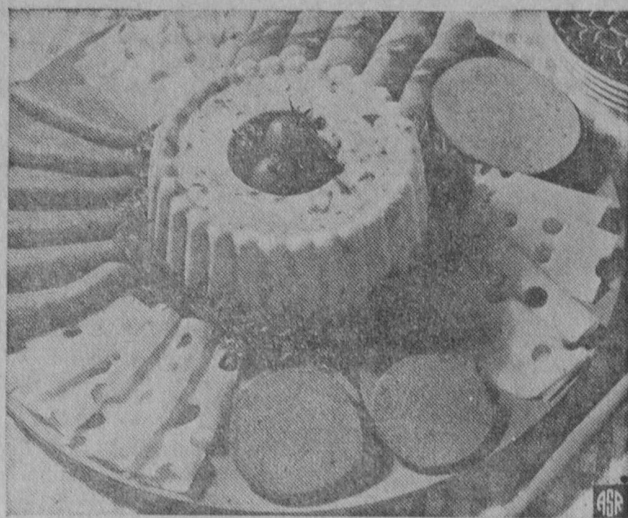

## Perfect Patio Platter



A molded salad, made with unflavored gelatine to allow the full flavor of fresh raw vegetables to come through, is a cool and colorful summer entree. When ready to serve, dip the mold in warm (not hot) water to the depth of the gelatine. Loosen the edge with the tip of a paring knife. Place a serving dish on top of the mold and turn upside down. Shake, holding the serving dish tightly to the mold.

### Vegetable Patio Platter

3 envelopes unflavored gelatine	1 1/2 cups finely shredded cabbage
2 1/2 cups cold water, divided	1 1/2 cups chopped celery
1 cup sugar	1 cup grated carrot
1 teaspoon salt	1/2 cup chopped green pepper
1/2 cup vinegar	2 pinches, diced
2 tablespoons lemon juice	Sliced Swiss cheese
1 cup mayonnaise	Sliced liverwurst, bologna, ham and spiced ham

Sprinkle gelatine over 1 1/2 cups of the water in medium saucepan. Place over low heat; stir constantly until gelatine dissolves, 4 or 5 minutes. Remove from heat; stir in sugar and salt. Add remaining 1 cup water. Gradually stir vinegar and lemon juice into mayonnaise; blend into gelatine mixture. Chill, stirring occasionally, until slightly thickened. Stir in vegetables. Turn into a 6-cup mold; chill until firm. When ready to serve, unmold onto large serving platter. Fill the center with cherry tomatoes, and arrange salad greens, Swiss cheese slices and cold cuts around mold.

YIELD: 6 servings.

**AMENDMENT TO ZONING ORDINANCE NO. 101, BURLEIGH TOWNSHIP, LOSCO COUNTY, MICHIGAN**

**ARTICLE III RESIDENTIAL DISTRICTS, R-1**

**Section 3.02 Uses**

B. Uses by Special Permit, as provided by Section 7.08 10. (delete) Section 3.07 Extraction Areas

**A. Purpose**

To regulate and control all form of extraction operations and to endure proper land reclamation in areas of extraction or extraction-related manufacturing or processing operations.

**B. Uses 1. Permitted Uses**

a. Sand, gypsum, gravel, marl, clay, limestone, salt, coal, extraction and related crushing processes.  
b. Oil and gas extraction.  
2. Special Uses  
a. Cement concrete or asphaltic concrete mixing plants.

**C. Special Regulations**

1. All applications for an Extraction Area must be applied for in writing to the Burleigh Township Board through the office of the zoning administrator as provided in Section 3.01. Said application must be reviewed and approved by the zoning administrator and the Burleigh Township Board.

2. All applications for an Extraction Area shall be accompanied by a map or plat showing the area proposed to be included in the extraction or removal operation; an estimate of the time required for the removal of the material; and a final grading plan which shows the existing found elevations of the site and the land immediately adjacent thereto; the location and elevation of all bounding streets or roads; and the final elevation of the site at the termination of the operation with respect to the elevation of the immediately adjacent land and bounding streets or highways. The applicant shall furnish the necessary fees to provide for the Townships inspection and administrative costs, and the necessary sureties which will enable the township to perform the planned restoration of the site in the event of default by the applicant.

3. The setback and sideyard requirements of all extractions activated shall comply with the provisions established for buildings in Section 5.03 A.

4. Where required by the Township Board, suitable plant material shall be placed and maintained to screen extraction areas from public view.

5. There shall be no open storage of discarded machinery, trash or junk which could present an unsightly appearance or pose potential health hazards to the area.

6. Explosives shall be used only from sunup to sundown, except in the case of emergency.

7. All buildings, structures, or equipment shall be entirely removed from the property within one (1) year after the cessation of the operation unless just cause is shown to the contrary. The termination date shall be established by the Township Board through the issuance of a written notice.

8. Dikes or other barriers and drainage structures shall be provided to prevent silting of natural drainage channels or storm drains in the area surrounding said uses.

9. Quarry or sand and gravel excavations which may penetrate near or into a usable water bearing stratum shall be conducted in such a manner that any such stratum so approaching or encountered will not be subject to pollution or contamination either during quarrying operations or the excavation of a sand and gravel pit, or subsequent to the abandonment of said quarry or sand and gravel pit.

10. Where required by the Township Board, final cut slopes shall be treated to prevent erosion; top soil shall be replaced on such slopes to support vegetation; ground cover shall be planted within twelve (12) months after a cut slope is excavated to its final position; and such ground cover shall be maintained for a period of time sufficient to provide vegetation of a density that will prevent erosion.

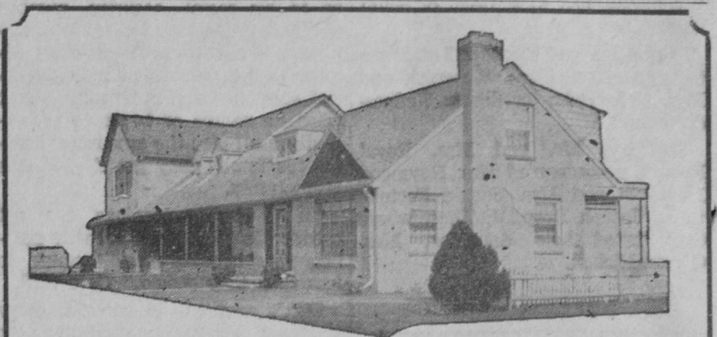

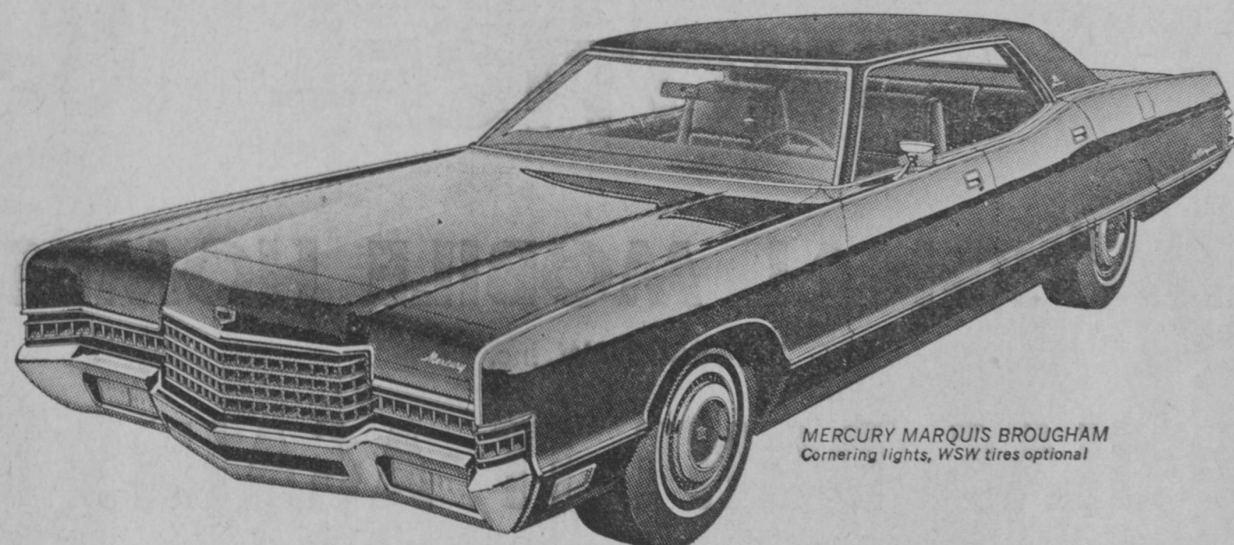

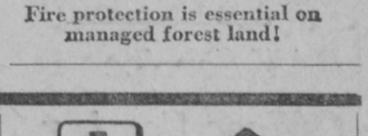

**Basic Premium Rate for Medicare Insurance Hiked**

The basic premium rate for the medical insurance part of medicare will go up from \$5.60 to \$5.80 a month beginning July 1, according to John Carr, social security district manager in Bay City.

The medical insurance part of medicare helps pay for doctor bills and a variety of other medical expenses for people 65 or over. The program is funded by individual premiums matched by the federal government.

"The 20-cent increase in the premium in July compares to a 30-cent increase in 1971 and a \$1.30 in 1970," Carr said.

"The low increase this year reflects savings in the administration of medicare as well as lower anticipated medical costs because of the price commission's guidelines limiting physician's fee increases to an average 2 1/2 percent a year," he said.

The medical insurance supplement medicare hospital insurance, which is funded by social security contributions and helps pay for hospital bills and certain follow-up care of people 65 and over.

Medicare is administered by the Social Security Administration of the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

The medicare law requires an annual review of the cost of the medical insurance program. The premium rate is adjusted to cover the estimated medical expenses of medicare patients during the 12 months beginning July 1.

"The cost of the program was 35 million dollars under estimates made last year," Carr said. "Yet without the price commission limit on physicians' fees, it would have been necessary to increase the premium to at least six dollars a month."

The medical insurance part of medicare paid two billion dollars in benefits on behalf of 9 1/2 million people in fiscal 1971. Almost everyone 65 and over is enrolled—about 20 million people, according to Carr.

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
