ANNUAL FIREWORKS DISPLAY sponsored by the Cities of Tawas City and East Tawas, in cooperation with Tawas Chamber of Commerce, will be held Tuesday, July 4, at the Michigan Waterways Commission dock, East Tawas. The program, starting at 9:00 p. m., is to be preceded earlier with a few daylight rockets, according to Jerry Reiter, program chairman for the chamber of commerce.

Recommend Water Rate Increase in TC

Tawas City Water Board Monday night adopted a resolution recommending to the city council that water and sewer rates be increased slightly to insure solvency of its operation.

The rate increase proposed would add about \$2 each quarter to the average household's water bill. With 664 customers, this would provide additional revenue of about \$1,328 per quarter or about \$5,312 per year.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz reports that if the program is adopted, it would be the first rate increase for water customers since 1958.

"Cost of operation and maintenance has reached the saturation point as far as existing financing is concerned and additional operational capital is needed just to keep us solvent," said Bublitz.

At the present time, the ready to serve charge for water customers is \$4 per quarter. This would be increased to \$6 per quarter and the minimum billing would be raised from \$8 to \$10. The rate for water is 40 cents per thousand for the first 10,000 gallons, 35 cents per thousand for the second 10,000 gallons, 30 cents per thousand for the next 80,000 gallons and 29 cents per thousand for all over 100,000 gallons.

The rate for sewer service is one-half the water bill and the proposed \$2 average increase per quarter for water would provide an additional \$1 for the sewer department. The minimum billing for combined water and sewer service is raised from \$12 to \$15 per quarter.

In other business, the water board endorsed action of the city council in its cooperative program with Baldwin Township and East Tawas for an application of 80 percent federal funding to provide water and sewer expansion under a regional concept.



Commission Gives Green Light to Area Water-Sewer Plan

Iosco Board of Commissioners gave its initial approval to the scope of a water and sewer project submitted by three local units of government and directed the county department of public works to cooperate in any way necessary in submitting an application for federal funds.

The \$2,067,000 project, presented by Baldwin Township, East Tawas and Tawas City, is to be submitted through the East Central Michigan Development District for a possible federal grant which would finance 80 percent of the total project cost.

Appearing before the commission last Wednesday was Daniel Alstott of Edmonds Engineering Company, Bay City, which developed the original phase of the project for Baldwin Township and East Tawas, then added a Tawas City project to the overall plan earlier last week.

While the preliminary plan is only speculative at this point, the key to possible federal financing is in the plan's proposal to serve the Tawas Area Industrial Development Corporation's industrial park in Baldwin Township and the Tawas City Industrial Park on Ninth Avenue.

Prospects appear excellent for eventual approval of this project, which would result in a great tax saving locally.

Preliminary discussion was held by the commission on the county-wide water supply system.

In other business Wednesday, the commission directed the prosecuting attorney to start proceedings to establish the legal level of Big Dipper Lake south of Whittemore. The Iosco drain commissioner is to establish a special assessment district to maintain any and all dams used to create the lake.

Construction of a dam on Johnson Creek had been requested by Pike engineering and representatives of two-thirds of the owners of the proposed lake.

A commission resolution accepted an agreement between the sheriff's department and the Huron National Forest to aid in enforcement of local and state criminal laws in the national forest. The federal government authorized payment of \$420 to the county for the period June 23 to 30 and a payment not to exceed \$6,050 during the period July 1, 1972, to June 30, 1973. This program was approved last year by congress to aid local law enforcement which has a limited level of financing.

The commission approved a new budget of \$11,064 for marine enforcement in this county. A \$15,000 budget previously submitted had been rejected by the state.

A proposal from the prosecuting attorney to hire a research assistant for his office from July 3 to September 1 at a cost of \$100 per week was not accepted by the commission. The commission approved payment of \$2 per hour for the position.

Transfer of \$5,000 from the general fund to the park fund to assist in completing AuSable Park was authorized. The money is to be returned on receipt of a federal grant.

The commission authorized use of the lobby and west corridor of the county building for the Tawas Bay Arts and Crafts Show, but directed that the sponsoring unit is to clean the building immediately after use. Concern over problems with the

Four candidates filed petitions before the deadline June 20, 4:00 p. m., which brings the total to 24 local candidates in the August 8 primary election.

Filing late Tuesday afternoon were George E. Smith, Democrat, registrar of deeds; Kenneth J. Myles, Republican, prosecuting attorney; J. Berkeley Smith, Republican, county commissioner, District No. 2; James P. Mielock, Republican, county commissioner, District No. 5.

Myles, County Clerk Keith Pappas and County Treas. Edward Nelkie, all Republicans, are unopposed for renomination and no candidates filed for those offices on the Democratic Ticket.

Seeking the Republican nomination as registrar of deeds are Arlene Olsen and Leon Putnam.

Six Republican candidates for sheriff are Francis Block, Keith Dobson, Donald Docking, John Koenig, Dale Snyder, George Westcott. Two Democratic candidates for sheriff are James Finley and Louis Sokola.

There are now four races for county commission seats. Smith opposes Donald Griffin, who filed earlier for District No. 2, which comprises the northern tier of sections of AuSable Township and the Capehart Housing Unit of Wurtsmith Air Force Base. Mielock will oppose William Woreley in District No. 5, which includes Plainfield Township, Reno Township and part of Osceola Township.

Races for commission seats noted last week included District No. 1, Osceola Township, where the three Republican candidates are Robert Foster, Jack W. Allen and Steve Paslanski. Competing for the District No. 4 seat, which includes Tawas City, western half of Baldwin, Tawas, Alabaster, Sherman, Burleigh Townships and Whittemore, are Clement Stephan and Carl Libka, both of Tawas City.

F. B. Lomas, Republican, District No. 3, which includes part of AuSable Township, Wilber Township, eastern half of Baldwin Township and East Tawas, is unopposed. Robert Pember is unopposed on the Democratic Ticket as candidate for District No. 5.

The election, held by the Michigan Department of Labor's employment relations commission, is to determine if staff members are to be represented by Michigan Council 55, American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, AFL-CIO.

Employees eligible to vote include bus drivers, crossing guards, cafeteria workers, custodians, clerical staff and teacher aides.

The election is to be held in the general purpose room of the East Tawas Elementary Unit.

New Huron Forest Medical Center to Open During July

A medical clinic unique to Michigan, designed to serve an area from Twining in Arenac County to Curran in Alcona County, is scheduled to open before the end of July.

Representing the culmination of about a year of study and the dreams of a much longer time, Huron Forest Medical Center, Incorporated, is to be staffed by two physicians and a dentist, who have been assigned there by the National Health Service Corps.

In addition, support personnel from the area will be hired locally. Mrs. Betty Shedenheim of East Tawas has been retained as administrator for the clinic and Mrs. Olive Maas, R. N., Hale, will serve as office nurse.

Assigned to the clinic by NHSC are Dr. Laura Funkhouser, 29, a specialist in internal medicine, and Dr. Charles Whitaker, a general practitioner with some training in pediatrics. Assigned, also, has been Dr. Alfred W. Reader, 28, a dentist, Curtis Bay, Maryland.

Application for placement of health personnel here was made earlier this year through NHSC. The three must serve at least one year in the program at Hale, and hopefully, will remain as residents of the community to continue their practice.

Administration of the clinic is to be handled by an executive committee of the Huron Forest Medical Center, Incorporated, which was recently formed following announcement that the local area's application had been approved by NHSC.

Executive members include Hershel Compton of South Branch, Karl Bowlsby of Whittemore, Thomas Clark, Richard Parkinson and Robert Hunt of Hale.

The NHSC health personnel will practice in the clinic being provided at Hale and are to be paid salaries by the corporation. Fees are to be determined by the committee and will be charged to patients.

TA Board Adopts Five-Year Bond Plan for New Library

A five-year bonding program to construct a library-resource center at Tawas Area High School was authorized Monday night by the board of education.

According to information received from the school's bonding attorney, a levy of .34 of a mill would be required for five years to finance the \$80,000 bond issue and interest charge.

This action followed the regular school election June 12 in which voters did not approve of a two-year millage levy to finance the proposition. Prior to the election, the board of education had indicated that,

should the millage proposal fail, it would exercise its option allowing bonding of the district to finance this addition, deemed necessary to the educational program.

In other business, Supt. Reynold Mick, attending his final meeting before retirement, reported that the school's lunch program was in satisfactory financial condition following a number of changes during the year. He said the fund ended the year with a balance of \$9,000, including inventory.

Mick recommended that the district continue its plan to utilize one kitchen as a central location for preparing meals and handling baked goods. He recommended use of the East Tawas unit's kitchen because of its excellent facilities.

Approximately 800 lunches are prepared daily during the school year. Mick recommended that a new oven and mixer be purchased and believed the board of education should appoint one person to supervise the entire operation.

The board of education adopted a \$9,000 athletic budget submitted by Robert McDonald, athletic director.

Following adoption of interscholastic sports activities for girls by other members of the Northern B Conference, the board of education authorized participation by girls from this school in a program of basketball, softball, volleyball and track.

Aftermath of Agnes Caused Shore Damage

Hurricane Agnes, which caused devastation in other parts of the country, has been blamed for severe damage for several miles of Lake Huron shoreline last week near AuSable Point.

As an aftermath of the hurricane, a northeast wind and resulting high waves undercut the ground below a summer home at 2884 North US-23, leaving it standing precariously over the water.

Owned by Charles W. Meeker of Detroit, only prompt action in shoring the structure with timbers and steel cables prevented the cottage from toppling over into the lake. Assisting with the work was a crew of men from Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

A second cottage endangered was protected with a temporary wall and sandfill.

Much of the shoreline in that area, which is shallow in depth and dips closely to US-23, is lined with wooden

plank seawalls. However, in the case of the Meeker cottage, the adjacent lot to the north is undeveloped and unprotected by a seawall.

High waves undermined or battered away wooden protective structures and then washed away about 20 feet of shoreline in the immediate vicinity of the Meeker cottage.

Winds started kicking up Wednesday night and the lake rolled severely on Thursday and Friday. Most of the homes in the 10-mile stretch of endangered shoreline were unoccupied during the week.

This stretch of Lake Huron is a sand bluff ranging from 10 to 15 feet in height. Much of the shoreline has been developed in recent years through construction of summer homes.

Record high water in 1951-52 caused extreme erosion along the entire length of the Lake Huron shoreline, followed by another new high water level record about 10 years later. This new high level has remained constant for a number of years.

Girl Pinned by Motorcycle



Parents Know the Drug Threat
 THE CHILD YOU SAVE MAY
 BE YOUR OWN

Those of you who have followed my series on drug abuse have been with me now for the past several weeks, and it is my sincere hope the information I have provided will benefit you in some way. The more you know about drugs, the more benefit you will be to your children on the subject, and the more you can do for our community to fight drug abuse, and I can assure you that we do have a problem in our community with drugs.

In the past several weeks I have been contacted by school officials from several of our elementary and high schools, requesting assistance with some of our youth who are having drug problems, either with the use of drugs, or the sale of drugs.

We have confiscated something like several hundred pills of different types, including Barbituates, Amphetamines, LSD, and Marijuana from the youth of this community and youth from other areas. We have had several cases of drug overdose in the schools and in the homes. We have children as young as seven and eight years old, selling Marijuana and using pills. We have children 10 years and up selling, using and giving away pills when they do not even know what they are. I have been given pills by our youth who have told me that it was Methadone, a drug used as a substitute for the treating of Heroin addicts.

There has been no Methadone, that has been tested and found to be Methadone in this community. We also receive pills from the youth who claim they are buying and using a drug known as Mescaline, which is an alkaloid extracted from the Mexican Peyote Cactus. It is about four thousand times weaker than LSD, but if enough is taken, it will produce an effect similar to LSD.

The problem here is that the supposed or alleged Mescaline is, in reality, a dose of LSD or some other drug. Tested Mescaline, or pills believed to be Mescaline by the youths, are often found to be other drugs. We have not found or tested any Mescaline in our department in the last year.

Some of our children will take any kind of pill if the right person tells them that it is not harmful and that it is not LSD. It could have poison in it and our kids could be taking it under the pretense of taking Mescaline or some other drug.

A 13-year-old girl told me she had a \$3.00 a day barbituate habit. When I asked where she got the three dollars a day, she told me she stole from her family, stole from her friends and their parents, shop lifted and traded goods for the pills and sometimes resorted to sex in order to supply the habit.


Of course this is only one girl, but this is the only one who would talk to me about a drug habit or admitted to a habit. But I know of a number of other young people who are drug users. I also know of a number of persons and places in our areas where drugs can be purchased, providing you are a member of that group or you have a friend who is a member of that group.

Most of our discussions have been on the prevention through knowledge approach to the drug problem, but here I want to state things to watch for that might indicate a person is already using some type of drugs. Ten frequent signs of drug abuse are:

1. Moral ill health. Normal value changes and unusual ideas taking their place.
2. Mental ill health. Emotional extremes with a marked loss of interest in usual goals. Unusually bad grades in school, signs of a change in personality.
3. Physical ill health. Loss of weight, changes in skin color, loss of body tone, unnatural careless stance and posture.
4. Development of a fear complex. Usually convinced that someone is "after them." Suspicion about everyone around them, even family members.
5. Marked appetite extremes. No appetite at all and when this changes and they do eat, the amounts of food intake are huge, particularly in the line of sweets and liquids.
6. Extremes in disposition. Either highly stimulated and overly talkative or very sleepy.
7. Extremes in emotions. Frequent spells of crying or hysterical laughter. Very frequently showing feelings against any authority.
8. Needle marks, skin boils, sores. Scars from use of needles many times become very infected.
9. Body and breath odor very unpleasant.
10. Eyes usually very bloodshot and watery. Pupils very small, eyes often wide.

I want the people of this community to be aware that we have a drug problem and that it is not going to get any better until all of us accept some of the responsibility. We have to get involved. Parents who suspect their children are using drugs must notify the authorities. This doesn't mean that they will be arrested and jailed. We as police officers want to know and help your kids. If there is anyone who would like more information or help on this subject, please feel free to contact me at any time.

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

Tawas Area School's first and only superintendent in the 19-year history of the district was honored Monday, June 19, at a retirement banquet held at the Village Inn.

"It just doesn't seem possible that those 19 years have flown by so quickly," commented Supt. Reynold E. Mick to the more than 40 persons attending the banquet.

Looking around at faces once familiar to the board of education, Mick took note of the fact that the board of education had held 461 meetings over the past 19 years. This total did not include the many spe-

cial meetings, particularly in 1953, his first year as superintendent, when numerous sessions were held to iron out the district's transportation difficulties.

"Our students in the days prior to building the high school must have been the most traveled kids in the state," stated Mick. Until construction of the high school in 1957, high school students were shuttled back and forth between schools for various classes.

"When I think of the problems that we had to face in those days, this school district really entered into something. There were no established guidelines for reorganizing a school district and the answers did not come out of a book—the questions had to be faced as they came before us."

Each member of the board of education made his contribution to solving problems over the years said Mick. "There are problems facing the district now, but in other times there were questions which seemed insurmountable. With the continued help from the people of the Tawas area, you will go on to be successful and I know the man who will follow me will continue to have that element of cooperation I enjoyed," said Mick.

Mick and his wife, Helen, who also retired this year after 12 years as





Quite a lot of Americans have begun to do some worrying about the safety of the food they eat.

From insect parts in the peanut butter to "staf toxin" in the custard cream pie, food hazards can be a scary business.

How real are the risks? Are things getting worse? Where do the greatest hazards lie? What can we reasonably do about them? Knowledge can help to control.

The most common of all food poisoning organisms is not deadly, but it has a deadly sounding name,

summer time problem. It causes trouble when food is left out of the refrigerator.

"Staph toxin is so heat-resistant, you can boil it several hours and it will still make you sick, but storing food below 50 degrees will keep the staph in check," says Dr. Ray E. Morse, food scientist.

Most frightening of all food microorganisms is Clostridium Botulinum, the cause of botulism. Extremely minute amounts of this toxin can be fatal, attacking the nervous system.

Botulism bacteria live without air so they can survive in canned foods. They are soil-borne organisms and are more common in California soils than in New Jersey. So California has advanced legislation to ensure canning safety in that state.

One modern development that may help food safety is the quick-serve, limited-menu restaurant. With quick frozen hamburgers tossed on the grill or with pizza made on the spot, there is less chance for food poisoning.

With more people come more food risks. New developments to cope

with them are a part of a continuing story.

For more information, write or call the county extension office. Ask your home economist for Extension Bulletin 411, "Prevent Food Poisoning." It contains four pages of questions and answers; detailed information on staph, strep and botulism, plus the food preservation tips.

Available equipment for student use includes a speed reader, transcription equipment, typewriters, mimeograph equipment, spirit duplicator, calculators, recorders, computer and copy machines. Areas of instruction include advanced typing, bookkeeping, shorthand, general business and consumer education, pertaining to accounting and computing, business data processing systems, filing, communications and personnel training.

Interested high school seniors in Iosco may still enroll in the program which starts this fall. For information, interested persons may contact high school principals or Vickey, whose telephone number is 362-2461.

Other vocational education programs available to Iosco County high school seniors this fall will be in automotive services, building construction, nurse's aide training and metal working. These programs are designed to give students entry level job skills which will permit them to seek gainful employment upon high school graduation.



If there's anything better than one angel food cake, it's two angel food cakes, each with a different "icing" and both bedecked with glowing fresh nectarine slices. In addition to the delicious flavor the fruit imparts to the cakes, there is also the appetizing eye-appeal that red-and-gold-skinned nectarines lend to any recipe in which they are an ingredient. This sunny fruit from California will be plentiful in local markets throughout the summer to bring glamor and eating pleasure to warm-weather meals.

Twin Nectarine Angel Cakes

- 1 package (14 1/2 to 16 oz.) angel food cake mix
 - 1/2 cup sugar
 - 3 tablespoons cornstarch
 - Dash salt
 - 1 cup water
 - 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
 - 1/2 cup lemon juice
 - Few drops yellow food color (optional)
 - 6 fresh nectarines
 - 1 cup whipping cream, whipped
- Prepare cake mix as package directs; turn into 18 x 4 1/2 x 4-inch angel food loaf pan. Bake in 375 degree (moderately hot) oven 30 minutes. Invert pan and cool cake thoroughly. (Raise pan by resting corners on inverted custard cups if it has no legs to lift it up from table surface.) To remove from pan, loosen edges of cold cake with thin spatula. Mix sugar, cornstarch and salt in saucepan; blend in water. Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened and clear. Remove from heat; stir in butter, lemon juice and food color. Slice nectarines. Split cake lengthwise into 2 layers. Arrange half of nectarine slices on bottom layer; spoon half the lemon glaze over slices. Cover with top layer. Cut into 2 loaf cakes, each 8 inches long. Spoon remaining glaze over 1 loaf; arrange half of remaining nectarine slices on top. Frost top and sides other loaf with whipped cream; arrange remaining nectarine slices on top. Chill until served. Makes 12 to 14 servings.



LAW AND ORDER

It is my opinion that the courts of this nation are going to have to bear the major responsibility for the lack of respect for law and order that prevails throughout our country today.

History has shown that the more lenient the courts become, the more crime increases. In England, in the early Eighteenth Century, hundreds of persons made the three-mile trip from Newgate to Tyburn to be 'drawn hanged and quartered' for stealing as little as five shillings. If that circumstance could, by any stretch of the imagination, be considered the sublime; then our modern criminal justice system, in my opinion, is certainly the ridiculous.

The police of the various agencies throughout this country are doing an excellent job of apprehending criminals, but we are going to have to take a long, hard look at its court systems that continually turn repeaters back to prey on society.

In New York City in the year 1971, there were 94,000 felony arrests, and the further statistics on what happened to those arrested will suggest, I think, where our major anti-crime energies ought to be spent. Listen to New York's police commissioner, Patrick V. Murphy, talking to the New York Bar Association a few months ago: "You ask what happened to last year's 94,000 felony arrests? Exactly 552 of them went to trial—552 out of 94,000—the rest of them were 'disposed of.' Disposed of means dismissed outright, reduced to misdemeanor via plea bargaining, reduced to much lesser penalties via plea bargaining. The court system," Murphy said, "is simply not dealing with these criminals."

The ratio of felony arrests to those actually going to trial could be compared on a local level.

Consider this reprint from the St. Louis Dispatch, St. Louis, Missouri: Two men approached Myer Walk, 64, of St. Louis, Missouri, as he was walking his dog late at night and threatened to kill him if he didn't halt. Walk drew a .32 caliber pistol and mortally wounded one assailant. The other fled. Police identified the dead man as a former convict who had been arrested 56 times since 1964.

Everyone realizes that the courts have problems, that the system was not designed to cope with modern violence and modern crime and the criminal sub-culture in drugs. I am sure that some progress has been made toward court reform in some of the crime ridden big cities, but not enough.

Statistics show that 80% of all felons are committed by repeaters; that four-fifths of our major crimes are committed by people already known to our criminal justice system.

The courts have "had their way" at attempts to "rehabilitate" the criminal element. I think by now it should be obvious that this system simply does not work. It is high time to try another approach to the problem.

If elected sheriff of Iosco County, I promise to do everything within my power to encourage more, longer and more meaningful prison sentences for felons, and to continue the fight for court reform within our various sheriff's associations.

**Social Security
Maximum is
Explained**

Question: My husband, who was disabled over a year ago, collects monthly social security disability benefits. We also get a monthly check for our five children. A friend of ours, who is also disabled, gets almost the same amount of money a month as we do and he and his wife have only two children. Why does our friend get the same amount for two children that we get for five?

Answer: Although the monthly benefit amount is based on a worker's average earnings, there is a maximum amount in monthly benefits that can be paid to a family. Both your family and your friend's family are probably getting the maximum monthly family amounts payable in these cases.

Question: I am enrolled in the medical insurance program under medicare. A friend told me that I should ask the doctor to accept "assignment" on my medical bills. Can you tell me what "assignment" is?

Answer: "Assignment" means that the medical insurance payment will be made directly to the doctor by medicare. The "assignment" method can be used only if both the doctor and the patient agree to it. One advantage for the patient is that a doctor, in accepting "assignment," agrees that his fees for medical services will be no more than the "reasonable charges" set by medicare. Another is that he does not have to pay medicare's share of the bill and wait to be paid back.

Question: Since my husband died last year, I have been receiving monthly social security benefits for my 18-year-old son, who will be attending junior college next year. Do his benefits stop at the end of the school year while he is on summer vacation?

Answer: No, monthly benefit checks continue for up to four months of vacation if your son was a full-time student before the vacation period started and intends to return to full-time attendance when the vacation ends.
