

Check of Records Establishes East Tawas' Boundary

After months of digging into old records, the City of East Tawas finally has determined it "owns" only one-half of the old river bridge on Bridge Street.

Since June 1970, Supt. Paul Ropert has been digging into old county and city records to determine the exact location of the city's boundary line. He found that the boundary line follows the thread of the river and splits the bridge in half.

When the question first came up in June 1970, Ropert declared that a "can of worms" had been dumped into his lap as both the city and Iosco County Road Commission disclaimed any ownership of the bridge. While the bridge apparently is still sound structurally, the narrow span was built in 1920 by the state to handle traffic of Model T Fords and horses and wagons over the then new M-10 highway.

Rather than replace the bridge, plans are now afoot to widen the structure.

Nearly two years ago, it was the opinion of the road commission that the city limit extended to a point beyond the west bank of Tawas River. When East Tawas was incorporated under Act 346 of 1895, the city limit actually extended to a point near Miner's Grove. The city collected taxes in that area as late as 1916, but a year later an election was held changing the boundary and placed that portion of the city west

of the river into Baldwin Township. The city boundary again came up for discussion when the road commission searched its files and found a 1951 letter from the state highway department which returned old M-10 to the county and that portion lying within its boundary to the City of East Tawas. According to the letter, the city limit extended to a point near the present day intersection of Nunn and Monument Roads, which would put the entire bridge in East Tawas.

Searching records in the county building, Ropert found where the boundary line was established in the center of the river. The matter apparently has been settled and plans are now going ahead on what can be done to modernize the structure for today's highway needs.

Monday was the last day for accepting credentials. The field is to be narrowed down to six or seven applicants for personal interviews.

Kiwanians Hear Hospital Report

The dire need for continuing to provide better medical care, as well as providing service of specialists to local patients, particularly the elderly, was stressed Tuesday by M. Jerry Norwood, director of Tawas Hospital.

Speaking at the noon luncheon of Tawas Kiwanis Club, Norwood briefed Kiwanians on a 10-year, long range program formulated by the board of directors and administrators of Tawas Hospital.

Paying tribute to what he termed "a hard working corps of local physicians," Norwood emphasized that additional physicians are needed to lighten the work load of local doctors.

He said that plans were now being studied to establish an out-patient clinic where patients would be able to utilize the service of specialists on a one-day-a-month basis.

Such specialists would include or-

thopedic, urology, neurology and surgical.

Norwood said that the out-patient clinic on a referral basis was being planned at this time, inasmuch as the hospital's five-year plan calls for such in-patient services.

"When it is realized that 49 percent of our patients are elderly, one can readily see the need of services from specialists. At the present time, patients must travel from 70 to 80 miles to obtain such services," said Norwood.

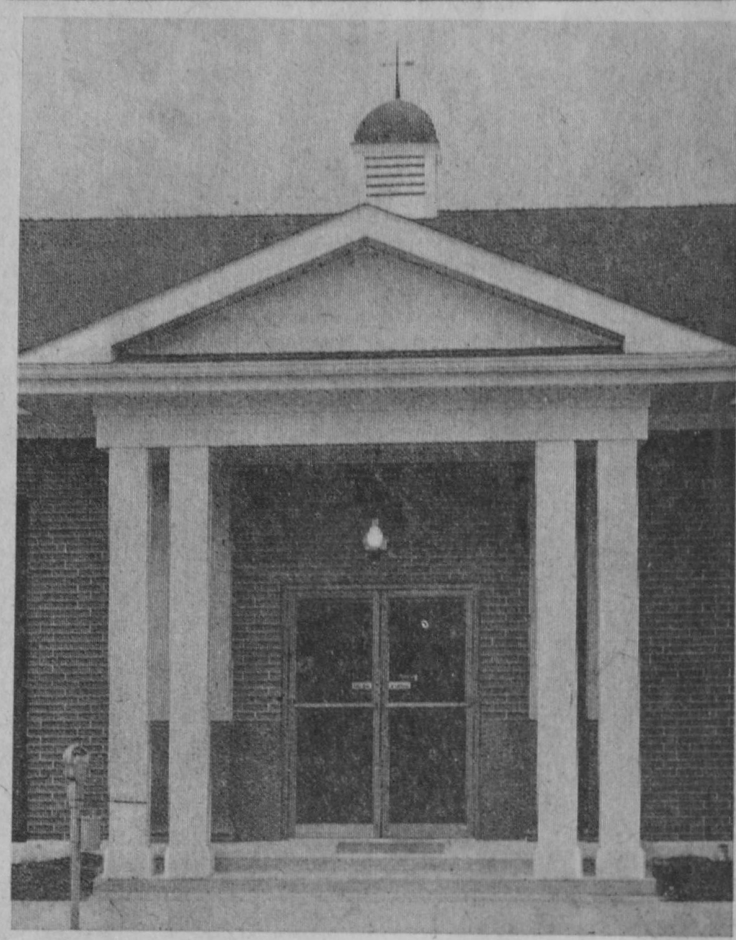
Norwood pointed out, too, that in order to keep pace with the growth of the community served by Tawas Hospital, the hospital would need 130 medical beds plus special surgical and orthopedic beds by 1981.

Because of the large population increase during the summer months, arrangements have been made to have a physician in the hospital's emergency room on a 24-hour basis over week-ends during the summer months.

Examiners Call Peoples State a 'Strong Bank'

Following an examination concluded last week, members of the Michigan State Banking Department Friday gave assurances that Peoples State Bank of Tawas "was a strong bank."

"They gave us no figures on any possible loss and stated that none are available at this time," said L. G. McKay Jr., chairman of the bank's board of directors.

McKay said the bank's blanket bond is in force and is more than sufficient to cover any anticipated loss.

"It now appears that the bank itself will suffer no loss," said McKay. "We have retained a national accounting firm to assist us in documenting any claims which will be submitted to our bonding company," he stated Tuesday.

"Our customers and depositors have the benefit, in addition to our bonds, of the fact that each depositor is insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation of up to \$20,000 for each account," said McKay.

In addition, McKay said that, based on his review, Peoples State Bank "is in a very strong cash position" and encouraged customers and depositors to continue to have pride and confidence in the bank.

McKay became acting president of the bank last week when Richard Harwood, who had served in that position, was granted a leave of absence at his own request.

A possible loss was discovered during a normal visit by bank examiners and announced last week by

the bank's board of directors. At the time, McKay said there was a problem "and we are working it out."

Peoples State Bank, which serves the entire Tawas area with offices at East Tawas and Tawas City, has operated and paid dividends continuously since beginning business in 1927. The bank has grown steadily and has assets in excess of 21 million dollars.

New Uniforms Ordered for Hale School Concert Band

New uniforms for the Hale Concert Band have been ordered and should arrive in time for the Memorial Day parade. The band members were measured for their uniforms Tuesday, February 15. For several months, a uniform selection committee has been designating and evaluating the construction of sample uniforms from two companies. The committee was comprised of two high school band members, Lillian Helwig and Debra Grotte; two junior high school band students, David Dear and Tray Pearsall; band booster members, Laura Forshee, Joyce Saunders, Sue Johnson, Dorothy Mathews; booster officers, David Wells, president; Mary Lou Wilson, vice president; Rufine Nielsen, secretary; Margaret Shaw, treasurer, and Darrell Grosz, band director.

A sample uniform was pictured in The Tawas Herald two weeks ago. A few small changes in design are being made. The uniform will include a concert uniform of coat, trousers and tie. For marching, an overlay, hat, plume, gloves and spats are added to the basic concert uniform.

Monday, February 14, the boosters went before the Hale Board of Education to seek approval for this purchase. The board gave its approval and fulfilled its previous commitment to financially support this project. A bid of \$7,833.43 plus shipping costs for 71 uniforms was accepted from the Ostwald Band Uniform Company.

After giving its approval, the board of education expressed its appreciation to the Hale Band Boosters for their excellent preparations and community support of this project. The Hale band members are also pleased that they soon will have a new look due to the combined efforts of the band boosters, board of education and community.

TA Students Scored Excellent on MEAP

Tawas Area School students scored high in the recent Michigan Educational Assessment Program (MEAP) but, as one state educator said last week, there is a great deal more to providing education for children than merely measuring how well public school fourth and seventh graders do in the basic skills areas of reading, mechanics of writing and mathematics.

Fourth graders (now members of the fifth grade) scored in the 88th percentile and the seventh grade (now eighth graders) scored in the 74th percentile of the more than 800 schools participating in the state.

Dr. John W. Porter has called the state's first public release of school district data from MEAP a step that will help local people and citizens find the strength and weaknesses of local schools.

"We know that MEAP does not provide all the information needed to assess the needs of our students and schools, but it does provide some valuable data," said Porter.

He said that it is important to emphasize and re-emphasize that the MEAP is not to be viewed as an evaluation or testing program of Michigan schools.

"The school districts can and should use this data, along with other information and evaluation tools which they may have or can develop locally, to determine the need for or extent of changes in educational programs and use of resources.

Six Persons Hurt on Snowmobiles

Six snowmobile accidents were investigated during the past week by Michigan State Police from East Tawas. Six persons were injured in the crashes.

Police said that the most seriously injured was Virginia J. Schaefer, 45, Port Huron. Injured Saturday, February 26, in Grant Township, she was given first aid at Tawas Hospital and then transferred to Port Huron Mercy Hospital.

Four other accidents Saturday were as follows:

Howard B. Day, 42, Mt. Clemens, sustained a broken ankle when he swerved his machine to avoid hitting another snowmobile at the Oasis parking lot, Oscoda Township. Day's ankle was pinned between his snowmobile and a snow bank.

Gerald C. Braham, 29, Flint, sustained a fractured leg in a crash in Section 6, Wilber Township. Braham and a passenger, John Gleason, were thrown off the machine when the victim swerved to avoid another machine. The passenger was unhurt but Braham struck a tree.

John J. Schrenk, 41, Orchard Lake, received bruises and was treated at Tawas Hospital after he fell off his machine on a private trail in Baldwin Township.

Sandra Daniels, eight years old and a passenger on a snowmobile operated by her father, William N. Daniels, 46, Taylor, received minor injuries in a crash on River Road, Oscoda Township, and was treated at Tawas Hospital. The machine hit

a bump and the girl fell off, hurting her back.

Dorothy C. Kusey, 870 Monument Road, Baldwin Township, received a bruise to her head Thursday, February 24, when she was thrown from the machine which she was operating in Section 11, Plainfield Township. Officers said that Mrs. Kusey was adjusting her goggles when the machine hit a bump in the trail.

\$50,000 Suit Filed Against Oscoda School

A \$50,000 damage suit has been commenced in Iosco Circuit Court charging Oscoda Area High School with negligence in the operation of its woodshop instructional class.

Donald R. Ward, a student who severely injured his hand while operating a wood lathe on February 20, 1969, claims the school was negligent in failing to provide adequate instruction for the safe operation of the machine.

In addition, Ward claims the school failed to provide a reasonably safe machine to operate in that no guards or shields were provided to prevent injury to the operator.

Couple Bound Over to Iosco Circuit Court

Edward London and his wife, Shirley, both 22 years of age, were bound over to circuit court Friday on charges of possession of marijuana. In addition, London is charged with the sale of marijuana.

The Londons were arrested February 20 by the Iosco Sheriff's Department. The arrest was made at a cabin rented by the Londons at a Baldwin Township resort.

London, formerly of Glennie, is unemployed. His wife is the former Shirley Cecil of East Tawas.

Cottage Burglary Checked Monday

Iosco Sheriff's Department is investigating a breaking and entering of a cabin owned by Paul Woolhiser, Standish, located in Wilber Township. The cottage was ransacked after entry was made by breaking a front window.

Libka Heads Reorganized Water Bd.

Tawas City Water Board named one of its three new members as chairman during its reorganizational meeting held Monday night.

Carl Libka, who recently retired as a rural mail carrier, was named chairman to replace the mayor. Under terms of the new city charter, the mayor and members of the council were declared ineligible to serve on the water board.

Other new members attending their first session of the water board were Paul Sullivan and Del Myles. Members retained from the old board were Carl Schaff and Harold Bublitz. Reginald Bublitz, city manager, serves as clerk of the board. As fire chief, James Lansky is a voting member of the board.

A report on activities of the water department and sewer department for 1971 was given by Bublitz.

The city manager said that DPW crewmen repaired four water main breaks during the year as well as constructing or extending the following water mains: Third Avenue from First Street to North Street, Fourth Street from Tenth Avenue to Twelfth Avenue, 256 feet on Twelfth

Avenue and a main on Sixth Street to serve the Carney warehouse.

There were 28 water connections made during the year which required 1,200 feet of copper pipe and fittings.

In addition, fire hydrants were checked and thawed where necessary every two weeks during the winter months, water meters were read each quarter and repaired where necessary, fire hydrants were painted, daily checks were made on the booster pump station and the First Avenue well was maintained.

There were 28 sewer connections ranging to a depth of 11 feet constructed during the year. Sewer main was constructed on Third Avenue from First Street to North Street, on Fourth Street from Eleventh to Twelfth Avenues, Sixth Street to Carney's warehouse, along with mains on Tenth and Twelfth Avenues.

Considerable maintenance is required on a regular basis at the disposal plant. Bublitz said that a sewer rodding machine purchased several years ago has proven to be a big timesaver in removing plugs from sewer mains. Five lift stations are checked daily in order to main-

tain 10 pumps and motors. In business transacted by the board, petitions requesting water service on First Street on the way to the cemetery were accepted and then tabled for consideration later in the spring. Engineering has been received on two other projects ap-

proved last year and engineering on the latest project is to be authorized in May if financing is available.

Bublitz said that approximately \$5,000 is budgeted annually for new construction. He estimated that the proposed project on First Street will serve four new customers who re-

quire an expenditure of \$4,000. The city manager said that about 90 percent of the city is now served with municipal water mains. He pointed out, however, that water rates have not changed since 1958 and annual construction of new mains is limited.

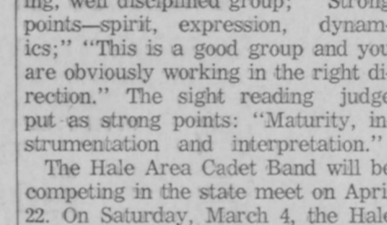

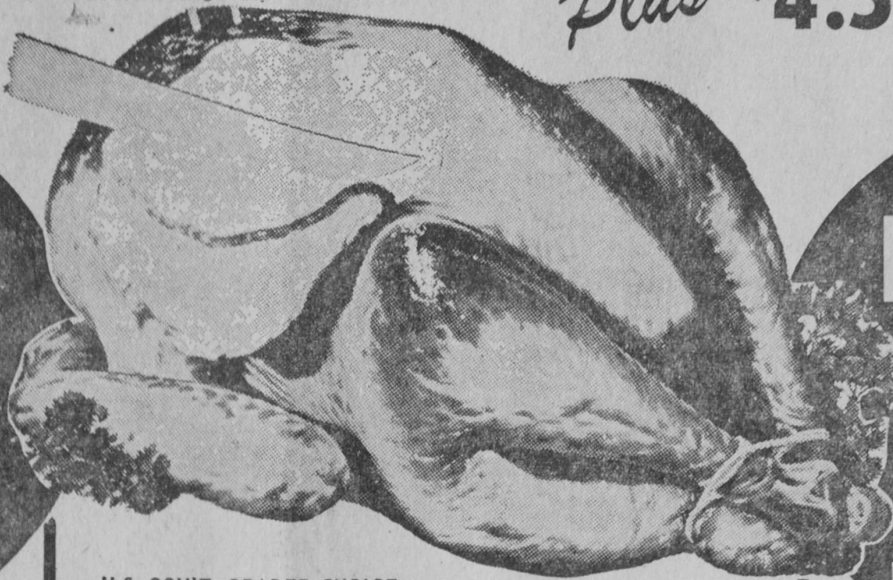

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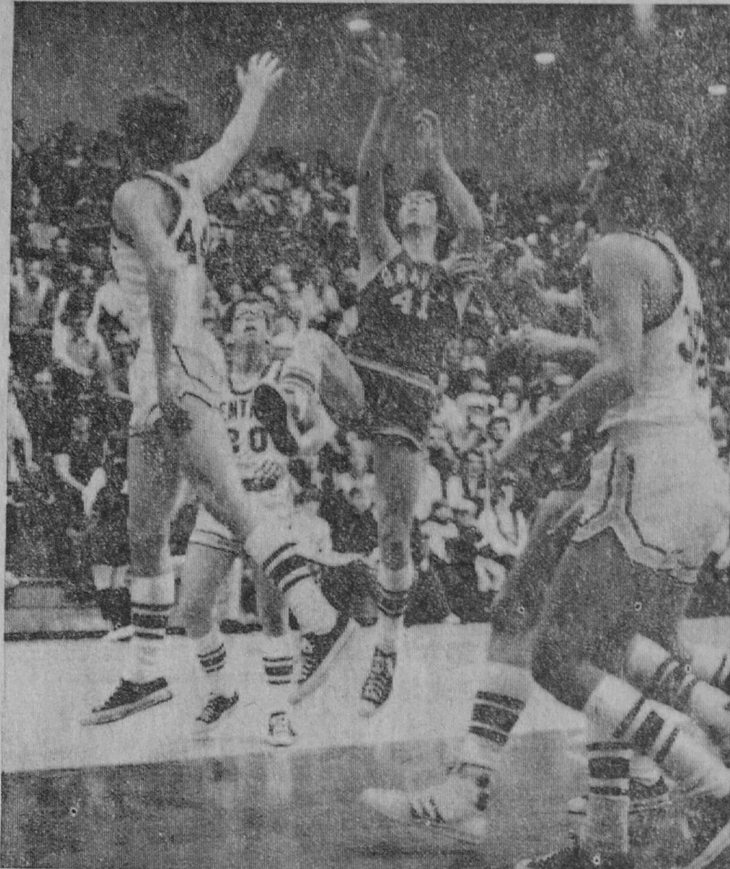

Proposed District Called Too Large

Ernest W. Jordan, superintendent of Iosco Intermediate School District, is among intermediate school officials from 12 counties opposing a plan by the state board of education to establish the region into one district.

Claiming it is "too big" for one region, intermediate school superintendents are asking that the 12 counties be grouped into four regions, under an A, B, C, D structure.

Iosco would be included in the present Bay-Arenac district under the proposal. This county had been included in another grouping of counties, but the Iosco Intermediate Board passed a resolution to be set into area seven to work with Bay-Arenac, feeling it is more closely oriented to that area. This is the third year it is using the Bay-Arenac media center.

The state board of education has proposed grouping the 59 intermediate districts into 17 regions. Superintendents of this area proposed that the state plan be expanded to 20 regions.

The new regional planning is being developed to distribute federal funds for educational media centers and to plan programs for special education, vocational-technical and manpower training, as well as basic adult and high school education.

The state board is to decide March 8 on whether to adopt the 17-region plan, or make changes. Hearings are being conducted throughout the state.

Jack C. McConkey, Bay-Arenac intermediate superintendent, has protested the Iosco Intermediate Board's area seven, stating it would be the largest planning region in Michigan, covering 7,028 square miles with an enrollment of 197,218 students.

Under the A, B, C, D arrangement proposed by superintendents, the Bay-Arenac-Iosco region would cover 1,650 square miles with 46,051

students; Saginaw, 807 square miles with 65,613 students; Clare, Gladwin, Gratiot, Isabella and Midland Counties, 2,427 square miles and 48,415 students; Tuscola, Sanilac and Huron Counties, 2,951 square miles with 37,139 students.

Only Huron Intermediate District officials have not endorsed the A, B, C, D plan.

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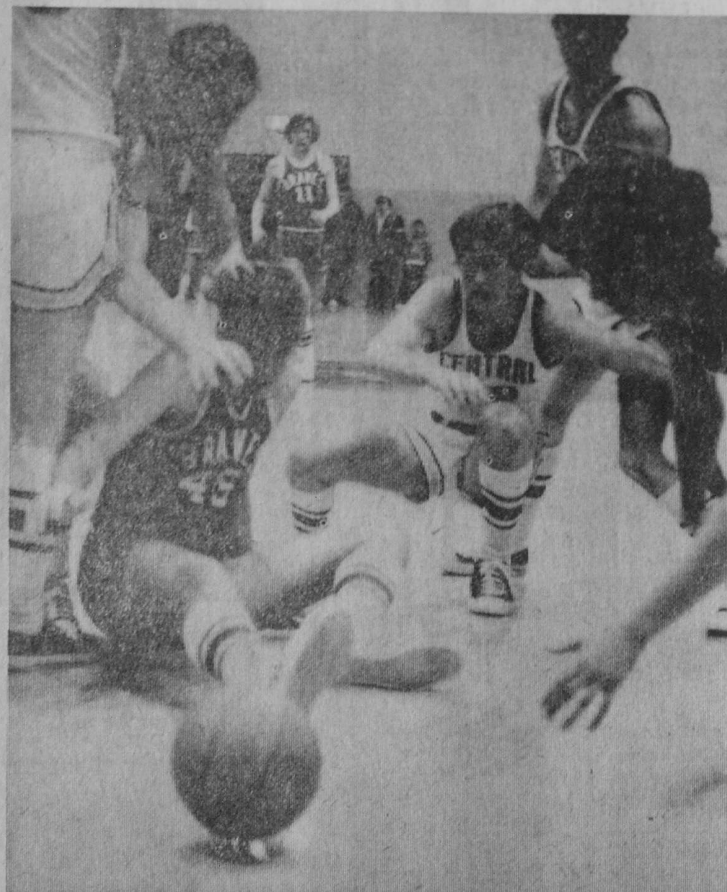
Men's Basketball League Action

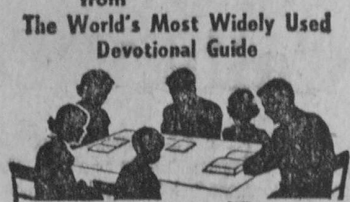

TODAYS Meditation



(Read James 5:13-20)

May God be gracious to us and bless us and make his face to shine upon us, that thy way may be known upon earth... —Psalm 67:1-2

When we speak of World Day of Prayer, our tendency has been to emphasize the last word in the title to the neglect of the first. It is hard to think of the world, of God's love for it, and our responsibility to it. For this reason prayer is more likely to be an escape into self-concern than a commitment to our brothers around the world.

Many persons, by training and habit, close their eyes when they pray. In our praying, we might be more honest and effective if we had our eyes wide open to the pain, the perplexity, the poverty of the world; and our hearts open to God's direction for the healing ministry of the gospel.

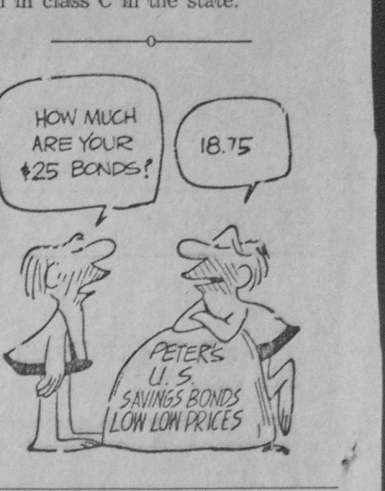

Old Orchard Park Contributes to Economy of Iosco County

According to a report last week from Robert Allen, manager of the county-operated Old Orchard Park on the AuSable River west of Osceola, the park generates \$540,000 annual expenditures in this county.

Basing his report on park records and information from the Cooperative Extension Service, Allen said that 3,779 families utilized camping facilities there last year.

Using \$29.25 as the average daily expenditure per family and the average stay of 3 1/2 days for the short vacationer, this would amount to \$386,975 as the total tourist dollars brought into the county by short vacationers.

There were 130 seasonal campers during the year, which represents 21,420 days. Assuming that these seasonal people spent one-quarter of their time here and spent one-half the average amount of money of vacationers (\$14.50), this total would be \$77,647.50. This, coupled with the total spent by the short vacationer, is \$464,522.63.

If consideration of over \$400,000 paid to local merchants for goods and services, as well as a payroll of \$37,672.97 (for all park employees' wages and salaries), the money directly spent in Iosco County is in excess of \$540,000.

Allen said that 17,589 visitors brought with them more than 1,450 boats and 1,003 pets.

"If the short vacationer could have stayed in our area for only one-half day longer, the economic impact would have been \$55,267.87 for that one-half day," said Allen.

"One of the things that we can and are doing is to provide facilities that the vacationer wants and not what we think he should have," said Allen. "Most requested facilities are in the following order: Modern toilets, electricity, dumping station for self-contained units and water. Our plans for improvements are definitely in this direction."

"Experts in the parks and recreation field are unanimous in the opinion that very few park systems are, or should be, self-sustaining."

"With the physical makeup of Old Orchard Park, mainly size, we are able to operate at a profit. While this is an admirable trait, this should not be our main goal. At no time, should a sizeable year-end balance be the only indication of a successful park operation. Granted, it is one; however, increased attendance and longer stays are by far the better guidelines."

Allen said there is always the possibility that in the future, due to increasing operating costs and the diminishing amount that could feasibly be charged for camping, "we may have to look to the county for financial aid in some form. This is mentioned only to remind us that we are a service organization designed to provide a service to the vacationing public and not a profit-making one."

"When modern facilities are installed and if the park goes to a year-around operation for snowmobilers, the cost of maintenance will probably exceed the amount of revenue derived during the winter op-

eration. This is not an absolute certainty, but any operation usually costs more money during any type of transition period.

Last year, all park employees were required to wear uniforms and to adhere to a dress code. Improvements were made in the hourly wage and the same will be true this year. "Your employee who is with the va-

cationer somewhere every hour of every day is the backbone of a park system," said Allen.

Two areas where a definite result of a courteous and well-informed crew are evident is: People stayed an average of one full day longer than in any year for which records are available; 1,099 families extended their stays, which is a vast im-

provement.

"Our lines of communication between the park commission and the county commissioners were improved, but we have much work to do in the area of disseminating information of our contribution to the county residents. These are the people who should be aware of what is going on," said Allen.

Case Load Increase in 23rd Judicial Circuit

Judge Allan C. Miller reported last week that in a little over one decade in which he has served the 23rd Judicial Circuit, the case load has increased from 228 in 1960 to 366 in 1971. Criminal cases have increased from 65 to 104, while civil cases have increased from 163 to 262.

"Probably equally significant is that the total work load increased even more," said Miller, in a report February 22 to Tawas Kiwanis Club. "Requirements of the appellate courts have made each step in the process more time-consuming. Pleas of guilty must be accepted only with the utmost caution if they are to stand the test of appeal. Nearly all long sentences will be appealed and we have three now pending."

In addition to the increase of work which has paralleled the population increase of Isosco, requirements for helping in other circuits has also increased. In the early 1960s, Judge Miller followed the established pattern of spending about 30 days per year out of the circuit. In the last two years, he has averaged 75 days out of the circuit and 120 total days outside of Isosco County.

"If you wonder why my phone is not answered, you now have some idea. The 1962 constitution created

'one court of justice' and we are subject to assignment anywhere by the court administrator, who acts for the supreme court."

Budgets have also increased with the work load. The largest item is the now near-mandatory appointment of attorneys for all criminal cases. When he had discretion, Miller saved money on his \$500 budget item; now he has great difficulty with \$3,500. Isosco's over-all budget for the circuit court was \$10,500 in 1960 and it was \$21,600 in 1971.

Looking at criminal statistics because of the general view that courts are soft on crime, Judge Miller sent 19 to prison in 1971, whereas this court averaged under 10 in the early 1960s. About 65 percent convicted receive probation but, generally, some jail time is connected with probation—either pending sentence or to begin the probationary term.

"We also use the curfew if the person is young and frequently invoke a rule that there shall be no entering places where liquor is sold by the glass. This latter is far

more enforceable than a general statement—'do not drink!'"

State-wide criminal statistics are about the same in trend, said Miller. During the early 1960s, there was a move to close Southern Michigan Prison at Jackson. By 1965, it held 3,624 of the total inmate population in state institutions of 7,345. In 1970, the total had risen to 9,079 and Jackson was over its capacity of 4,000, having 4,139.

"We really have spent very little of our tax dollar on prisons. While I agree that rehabilitation is not the sole criteria for sending a person to prison, we must admit that nothing in the way of rehabilitation is being done at Jackson. It is strictly punishment and protection of society. Dope, alcohol, homosexuality run rampant within the walls," he stated.

The judge said that the 23rd circuit can be thankful that it is not plagued with the problem of court backlogs. "Any case that is ready to be tried can be set down for trial within three months," he concluded.
