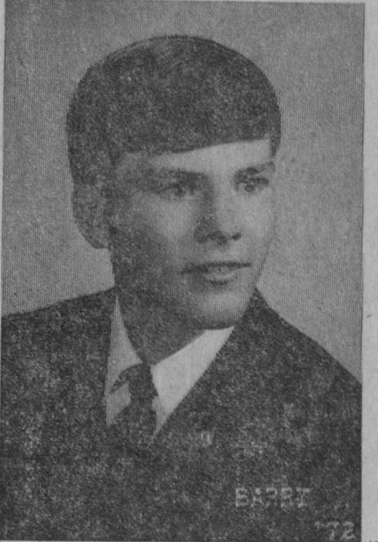


Hale Area Lists Honor Students for Class of 1972

Meeting Tuesday, April 4 DNR to Discuss Fish Plans for Area

Following several letters between Tawas City and Lansing, announcement was made Friday that a representative of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources would be here Tuesday, April 4, to explain DNR plans for planting fish in area streams during 1972.

Coming for the meeting, to be held during the noon luncheon of Tawas Kiwanis Club at the Village Inn under joint sponsorship with the Tawas City Businessmen's Association, will be John Scott, second in command to Dr. Wayne Tody, chief of the DNR's fishery division.

All persons interested in hearing the report and to participate in a question and answer period are invited to attend this important meeting.

Leading the way in arranging this meeting was the businessmen's association, which made the original contact with the DNR. Assisting the TCBA has been State Rep. George A. Prescott of Tawas City, who has personal knowledge of the importance of the DNR's fish program in this area by virtue of his residential property bordering the Tawas River.

A letter from Prescott read at last Thursday's meeting of the businessmen's association stated he had received a commitment from the DNR that the state would plant some steelhead trout this spring in the Tawas River.

This was welcome news to officials of the businessmen's group, who have been encouraging such planting in correspondence with the DNR.

Two weeks ago, it was reported that the DNR had no plans this year for the planting of steelhead in the Tawas River, although it was stated that plans were to plant 150,000 coho salmon in the river.

Prescott, along with businessmen and sport fishermen, have advocated continued planting of steelhead because of the success of the program last fall.

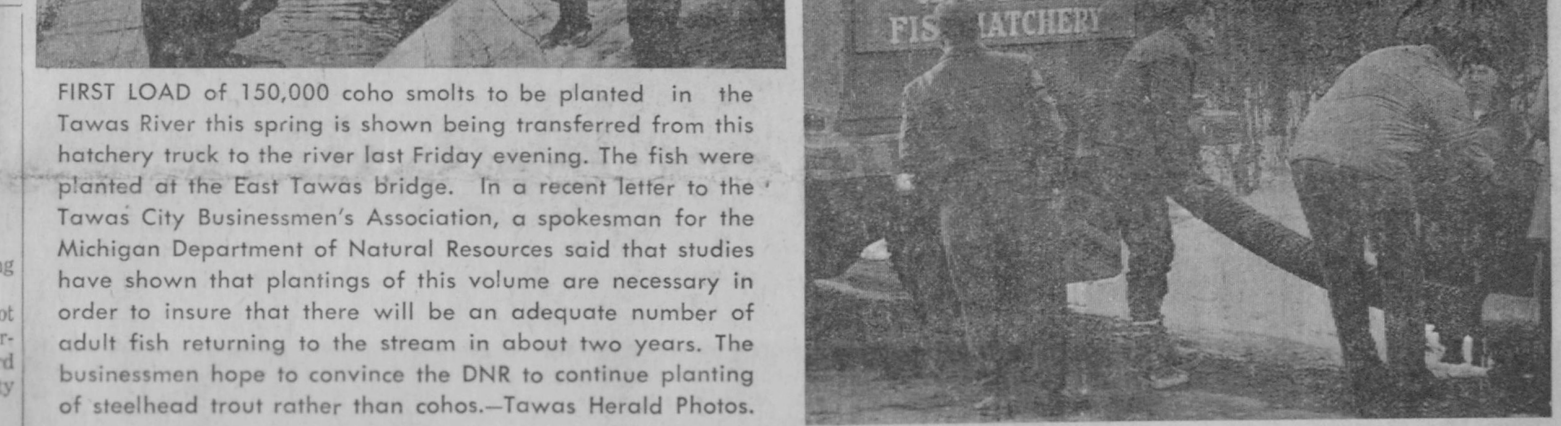
Minor plants of steelhead were made in Tawas Bay during 1969 and 1970 on an experimental basis and the fish which returned to the bay and river last year provided the most exciting fishing here since the days of the big perch runs.

Businessmen and Tawas City officials have pointed out that planting of steelhead was far more beneficial to this area than the planting of coho salmon. Few coho returned to the river last fall, but the steelhead returned in force. Businessmen said that the problem of snagging and trespassing on private property was just not encountered last year, which was in direct contrast to the coho runs of the two previous years.

At Thursday's meeting, it was suggested that the state be encouraged to improve and develop public fishing sites on the river to relieve

any problem of trespassing of fishermen on private property. It was felt that such improvement would not be expensive, inasmuch as the DNR owns property along the Tawas River at the foot of First Avenue and a number of streets ending at the river could be brushed out.

It was also suggested that the DNR might contact the Detroit and Mackinac Railway in an effort to would benefit the railroad as well as open railroad property to fishing the public, in that heavy foot traffic east of the Mathews Street bridge of fisherman might be lessened near the site of the old city hall. It along some sections of the railroad right-of-way.

Two-Way Race for East Tawas Mayor

Monday, April 3, is election day at East Tawas and two races feature the balloting for city offices.

Featuring the non-partisan election will be the race for mayor between James Campbell, incumbent, and Robert C. Bolen, veteran councilman.

In the February 21 primary election, Bolen was top vote-getter among three candidates for the city's top office. Bolen received 212 of the 331 votes cast in the election while Campbell received 123 votes.

The other race listed on the ballot is for Second Ward alderman, Edward Higgins, incumbent, is being opposed by Robert Johnson.

Unopposed candidates on the ballot are Richard Moss, First Ward alderman; Ralph Western, Third Ward alderman; Mrs. Grace Pelton, city treasurer; Clyde Soper, city clerk.

Depending on the outcome of a charter amendment being submitted to voters later this year, this may be the last time that voters will vote for a clerk or treasurer. Last week, the city council decided it would place a proposition before voters asking the charter to be amended allowing appointment of these two officers.

Baldwin Couple Files Suit Against East Tawas Firm

A Baldwin Township woman, who claims she was seriously injured in a fall October 14, 1970, at Schreck Lumber Company, has filed suit against the East Tawas firm.

Asking damages of \$80,000 is Mrs. Olive Buchanan. Her husband, Leonard, seeks damages of \$20,000.

Attorney for the plaintiffs claim that Mrs. Buchanan tripped and fell on a doorstep during remodeling at the firm's place of business on US-23. It is claimed she sustained injury to her spine as well as suffering nervous and emotional difficulties as the result of the fall.

Iosco Property Owners Had 1971 Tax Bill of \$2,614,999

Following final settlement with township and city treasurers, Edward Nelkie, Iosco County treasurer, reported Monday that 1971 taxes collected and distributed by his office totaled \$2,614,999.

Although the 1971 collection was \$346,282 higher than the previous year, Nelkie said that assessments returned to his office as delinquent amounted to \$570,282, an increase of \$53,507 over the previous year. Nelkie said that the combined delinquent taxes of \$887,057 for the past two years has resulted in considerable additional work for his office.

Collections for the 14 units in the county averaged 87.53 percent. This compared to 87.75 percent for the previous year and 88.93 percent for 1969.

Nelkie's report indicated that \$463,276 was collected for county operation, \$19,301 for the medical care facility, \$19,301 for the intermediate school district and \$72,306 for special education.

A total of \$1,611,533 was distributed in school taxes, including \$684,384 for Tawas Area School District, \$473,016 for Osceola Area School District, \$348,448 for Hale Area School District and \$105,704 for Whittemore-Prescott Area School District.

Township taxes collected amounted to \$260,497, plus special assessments of townships totaling \$73,828. Operational taxes for Whittemore and special assessments of other cities had a collection of \$94,854.

With a 96.35 percent collection, Leona Benson, Alabaster Township treasurer, was high for the county. Taxes collected in Alabaster Township amounted to \$150,472 and \$5,732 was returned as delinquent. The township led collections in 1970 with a percentage of 96.50 and was high in 1969 with a percentage of 96.54.

Collections and percentages of other treasurers were as follows:

State Moves to Minimize Possible Road Salt Damage

The Department of State Highways is moving on several fronts to minimize any environmental effects of salt used in winter highway maintenance.

The department is: 1. Using a \$977,000 appropriation by the legislature to build 48 covered sheds for storage and protection of salt supplies.

2. Preparing to make wide use of new automatic control devices on maintenance trucks which spread salt efficiently and only in amounts

necessary to melt the ice and snow on highway pavements. 3. Conducting a study to determine the effects of de-icing chemicals on the quality of ground and surface waters adjacent to state highways.

"Ice and snow must be removed from highways as quickly as possible, not only to protect the lives and safety of motorists but also to permit our social and economic life to function without interruption," said Henrik E. Stafseth, state highway director.

"Salt, by far, is the most effective, efficient and economical means of keeping streets and highways clear and dry in winter," Stafseth said. "It helps to save lives and it prevents countless accidents every year."

"Recognizing the necessity of this program," he added, "we are determined to do all we can to minimize or prevent any damage that road salt could do to roadside vegetation or water supplies."

The salt sheds are being built in counties whose road commissions contract with the highway department to maintain state highways in their respective counties.

Half of them are up, each with a capacity of 600 to 1,000 tons, and all 48 will be finished before next winter.

"This is only the first phase of a program that we hope to complete in about four years," said Paul J. Marek, the department's engineer of maintenance. "When it is done, all chemicals used in winter maintenance of state highways in every part of Michigan will be under cover."

On another front, Marek said the department has successfully tested two experimental maintenance trucks whose features include an improved device for automatic control and direction in the spread of salt. It is expected that the device will become standard equipment on maintenance trucks, he said.

Floyd Hall Retires From Forest Service

Floyd Hall, 51, a member of the United States Forest Service for nearly 27 years, was honored at a retirement party Saturday, March 25, at the Knights of Columbus Hall, East Tawas.

Joining the forest service on July 16, 1945, following military duty with the Third Army in Europe from May 8, 1942, to June 23, 1945, he was assigned as a towerman for 16 years at various locations in the Huron National Forest.

For the past 10 years, he has been in charge of recreational areas for the Tawas Ranger District.

There were 65 persons in attendance at the retirement party and Stuart Bailey, forester, East Tawas, served as toastmaster.

Hall and his wife, Ann, observed their 25th wedding anniversary on Monday, March 27.

Yes, There Really Is A Podunk, Mich.

Don't look for London, Lulu, Magoon Corners, Tokio or Finkton among the 1,166 cities, towns and incorporated villages on the 1972 official state highway map.

London and Lulu in Monroe County, Magoon Corners in Jackson County, Tokio in Calhoun County and Finkton in Antrim County are among more than 2,600 names of places not shown on the map because of population, governmental status and space considerations.

Out of necessity of finding their way around—and love of names—early Michigan settlers put strange handles on places that stuck. On viewing the falls and rapids at the Sault for the first time, an awe-struck Jesuit priest-explorer was said to have exclaimed the Sault (falls) worthy of Saint Mary herself. The name, Sault Ste. Marie, has endured 300 years.

Ontonagon, Negaunee, Pontiac, Menominee and Saginaw were conveniently named by Indians before European settlers arrived.

The majority of the state's nearly 3,800 names were given by explorers and settlers. Famous Frankentmuth—on the state highway map—was named by German immigrants. They also named Frankentrost in Saginaw County and Frankentrust in Bay County, neither of which is on the map.

Zeeland, Plymouth, Milan, Lisbon, Moscow, Sparta, Warsaw, Dublin, Wales, Florence, Bombay and Johannesburg also are obvious imports.

Johnson's Station in Huron County, Kelloggville in Kent County, Kelly's Corners in Muskegon County, McGregor in Sanilac County, Stevensville in Berrien County and Prattville in Hillsdale County appear to be named for first settlers.

The towns of Napoleon, Pulaski, Roosevelt, Roscoe, Ralph, Rousseau, Ypsilanti, Lincoln, Brutus, Sheridan, Grant and Jackson were named for heroes—or villains—of history, depending on your point of view.

Hell in Livingston County and Paradise in Chippewa County offer clues as to what some Michigan pioneers thought of the place where they settled. Mt. Bliss, Utopia Beach, Devil's Lake, Temperance, Dreamland, Witch Lake, Hope, Good Hart, Golden, Wise, Misery Bay, Prosper and Payment also suggest good and bad reactions of the founding fathers.

White Cane Week Project of Lions Clubs

Over 25,000 members of 490 Lions Clubs of Michigan will march the highways and byways April 23-29 to carry on a program dedicated to the visually handicapped.

Actually, the White Cane program is executed 52 weeks a year but the public hopefully becomes aware of this important work during the concentrated seven-day period.

Michiganans responding to the White Cane appeal will help support the Leader Dog School for the Blind, a Welcome Home for the Blind built to fill the needs of the aged sightless and the Michigan Lions Eye Bank which assists in the restoration of sight to the unsighted.

Any handicapped person can receive help and, throughout the year, the Lions Clubs provide aid through leader dogs, white canes, braille watches, glasses, eye examinations and transplants.

Thousands of white canes have been furnished free of charge to blind people throughout Michigan since 1936.

City, county, state governments and churches are cooperating in the massive state-wide drive. Elementary schools, drivers license bureaus and police departments assist in this education effort by distributing leaflets. The governor and a host of mayors make it official by issuing inspiring proclamations heralding White Cane Week.

State legislation in 1936 included an ordinance granting the right-of-way to a person carrying a white cane. The purpose of White Cane Week is primarily an educational one—working toward the day when all citizens will know and recognize the white cane as a symbol of blindness and will give understanding and courteous assistance to bearers of the white cane whenever such opportunities present themselves.

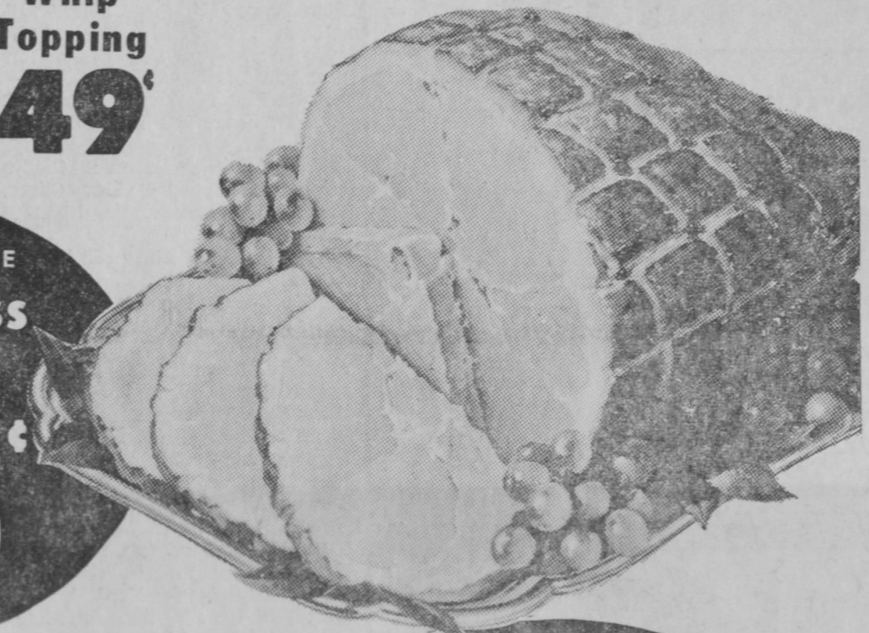

 A "country-style" ham is cured dry, smoked slowly and dried for a long time. About 85 percent of the original moisture is lost during the process. This gives you meat with a firm texture and a real ham flavor. Be sure you cook your country-style ham before you eat it.
 Your Easter ham might be labeled "smoked" or "fully-cooked." If it is smoked, your ham stayed in the smokehouse long enough and got hot enough to protect you from the

danger of trichinosis, but it still needs more cooking before you serve it. A fully-cooked ham hung around that smokehouse even longer, so it does not need further cooking before you eat it. Most people, though, enjoy their ham served hot.
 What is the difference between the butt and shank halves of ham? The butt half is the upper, meatier part; the lower shank half has more bone. If your ham is called an "end" or "portion," the butcher has cut out a few of the choice center slices.
 Ham in a can is fully-cooked, but some require cold storage temperatures, even before opening. Follow the directions on your can. Once opened, you must refrigerate all canned hams, and all hams of any kind.

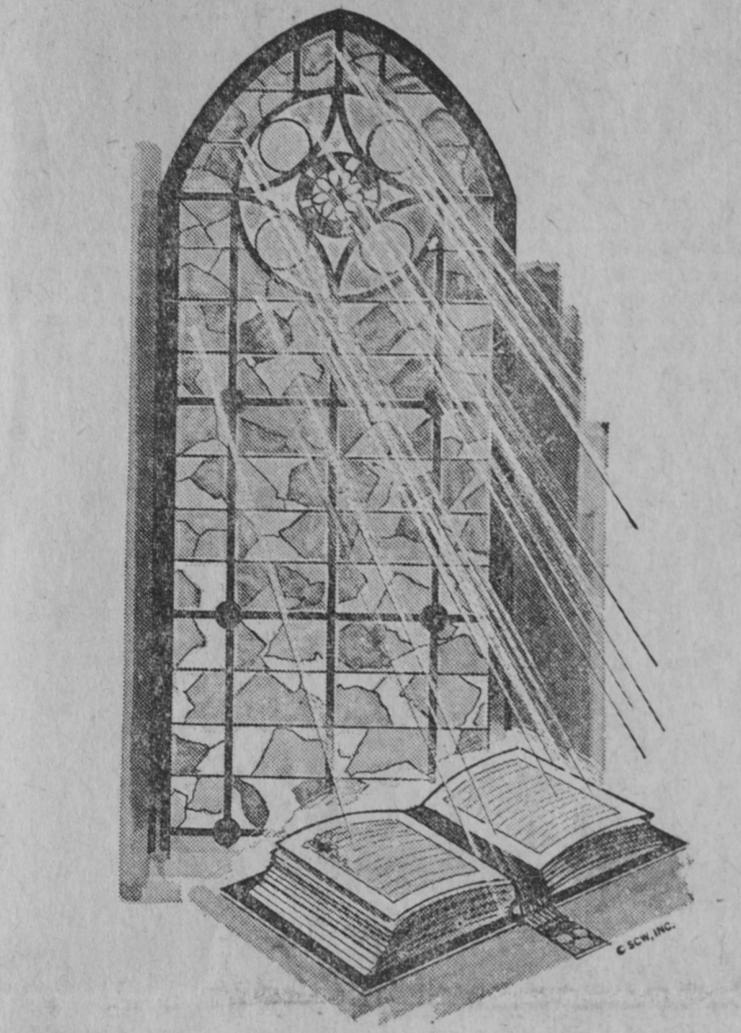

 Singleknits offer two-way give (some people question whether this is necessary), minimum shrinkage, freedom from pilling and a natural "hand" or feel.
 It is likely that both types will receive a good share of the dress shirt market. But a relatively high price and competition from new woven stretch fabrics will probably cut into their sales. If you are interested in comfort, appearance and easy care, though, try it—you may like it.

List Answers to Important SS Questions

Question: My sister's 17-year-old daughter died last January following a car accident. She had a social security number and had worked part time at a drive-in for nearly two years. Could her mother get a social security death benefit toward her daughter's funeral expenses?

Answer: It is possible. A person who dies in his teens or early 20s needs only six quarters of coverage, about 1½ years of work under social security, for a death benefit to be payable. Your sister should call any social security office for more information.

Question: I was hurt recently in an accident and I have been told that I will be off work for more than a year. I heard about disability payments from social security and also something about a six-month waiting period. Should I wait six months before applying?

Answer: No. Although social security cannot pay disability benefits until the seventh month after the month in which a worker became disabled, you should not wait six months to apply. Apply immediately, so your claim can be processed. Then, if you are found eligible for benefits, your first monthly check will not be delayed.

Question: After applying for social security retirement payments at 65, I returned to work. Will the wages from this work increase my monthly cash payments when I decide to finally retire?

Answer: Possibly. If you earn enough to increase the average earnings used to figure your retirement payment, your cash payments could increase. Any increase would be figured automatically in the year following the year of additional earnings, and the increase would be retroactive to the first of the year following the year in which the earnings occurred.

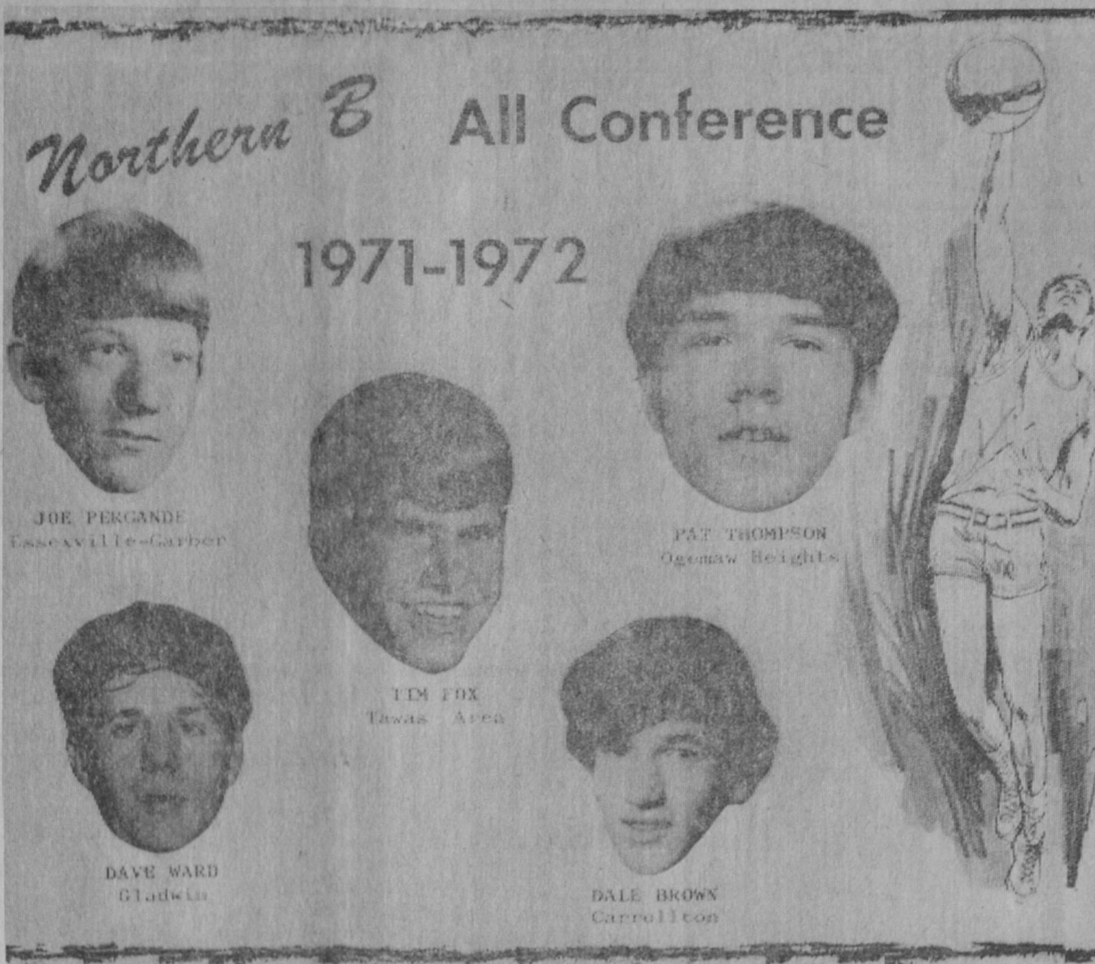

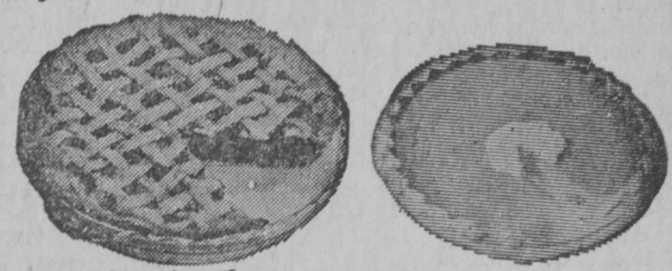

New Point 10 Law Called Tougher on Drinking Drivers

It's the new "point 10 law" and things will be tougher on drinking drivers.

This was the warning issued today by Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell to all Iosco County drivers and it had to do with changes in Michigan's implied consent law.

"After 12:01 a. m., March 30, the presumptive blood alcohol level for driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor will be reduced from .15 percent to .10 percent—one third less than at present. That is why it is called the 'point 10 law' and why it will be easier to be considered a drunk driver," stated Sheriff O'Farrell.

"Traffic safety authorities point out that the drinking driver is acknowledged to be the greatest hazard on highways today. Alcohol is believed to be involved in at least one-half of our fatal traffic crashes.

"To combat the alcohol-driving problem, Michigan passed an implied consent law in 1967. Under the law, drivers using Michigan highways are presumed to have given their consent to a chemical test if arrested for driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor (DUIL). Refusal to take a test can result in loss of the driver's license.

"Blood alcohol levels measured by the tests are established by law and have been verified as reliable measures of a drinker's reaction to alcohol. In addition to lowering the 'under the influence' level from .15 percent to .10 percent, the new amendment, effective Thursday, March 30, also lowers the 'impaired driving' level from .10 percent to levels in excess of .07 percent, but less than .10 percent. When the blood level (alcohol) is .07 percent or less, a defendant will be presumed not to be under the influence of intoxicating liquor.

"This means that a 150-pound individual, who previously could drink

eight highballs or eight glasses of beer before reaching the .15 percent level, can now take on only five highballs within one hour before reaching the new legal level of .10 percent. Under the new blood alcohol limits, the .10 percent driver will now be a 'drunk driver.'

"My officers are all aware of the provisions of the new 'point 10 law' and so are the officers of other police departments in this area.

"Let me urge all who drink and drive to make sure you are in good enough condition to drive and to make sure you can pass the breath test levels of the new 'point 10 law' before you slide behind the wheel of an automobile," he concluded.

If a group of students at Michigan State University had their way, the nation's newest convenience food—one with a projected sales of five-million units a month in a seven-state test area—would be "Coco-Easy," an instant drink packaged in a collapsible metal tube.

The students, including a graduate of Tawas Area High School, are enrolled in MSU's school of packaging, the largest school of packaging in the country.

"Coco-Easy," the object of their labors and affections, is a product

that exists only in the school's course No. 428. However, as far as the students are concerned, "Coco-Easy" is a very real product. They not only created it, they spent an entire semester researching and developing it.

And R&D included the product formula, its nutritional values, quality control, manufacturing, engineering specifications, packaging, marketing, advertising, legal requirements, transportation and distribution and even a projection of its sales and profits over a period of time.

"There may never be a 'Coco-Easy,'" says Dr. James Groff, director of the school of packaging, "but the experience these students had in creating it and in packaging and marketing it will stand them in good

stead for as long as they remain in this field."

Members of the winning team that produced "Coco-Easy" included Terry Grabow, M-55, Tawas City, who handled transportation and distribution, as well as advertising procedures.

Robert Braun, president of the Metal Tube Packaging Council of North America, predicts that some of the new ideas and techniques advanced by students taking the course may some day be used by them in actual situations.

"These students were not bound by convention or by old, comfortable ways of doing things," said Braun. "They were innovative and visionary. They showed that imagination and ingenuity can bring the abstract close to reality."
