Clarence Everett, Former Supervisor

Clarence E. Everett, 76, one-time chairman of the Iosco Board of Supervisors and a Tawas City resort owner since 1948, died Sunday, March 5, at Alpena General Hospital.

Funeral services are to be conducted Wednesday, March 8 (today), 10:00 a. m., from Christ Episcopal Church, East Tawas, with the Rev. Alfred W. Saulsbury officiating. A Masonic service is to be held at 2:30 p. m. at the Ross B. Northrop and Son Funeral Home, Detroit. Burial is to be in Grand Lawn Cemetery, Detroit.

Born October 19, 1885, Mr. Everett was in business at Redford and Farmington prior to his retirement in 1943, when he and Mrs. Everett moved to Tawas City, where they established a resort business on Bay Drive.

Active in community affairs, he served as Tawas City's Third Ward supervisor for 18 years. Through his leadership as chairman of the board of supervisors' welfare committee, the Iosco Medical Care Facility was constructed in 1966 at a cost of \$600,000 in federal and local funds.

Bids Opened For Addition To Hospital

Work on the medical care facility building project was but one undertaking in the Tawas which saw completion under Mr. Everett's guidance. Earlier, he had headed building committees for the Iosco County Jail and Iosco County Airport, as well as for construction of the clubhouse and harbor of Tawas Bay Yacht Club and addition to Christ Episcopal Church.

He was past commodore of Tawas Bay Yacht Club, a present member of Tawas Hospital's advisory committee, a member of Tawas Kiwanis Club, a member of East Tawas Men's Club and was senior warden of the vestry of Christ Episcopal Church.

He was past president and long time secretary of the Huron Hunt and Fish Club of Farmington, a member of the Low Twelve Club, a member of the Redford Exchange Club and past president of McGinnis Land Company.

He was a past high priest of Royal Arch Masons at Detroit and a past patron of the Order of the Eastern Star.

He is survived by his wife of 55 years, Sarah Jane Everett; one son, Gordon G., Gaylord; six grandchildren; two sisters, Mrs. Harriet Bingham of Hubbard Lake and Mrs. Geraldine Gohn of Lake City; two

Bids for the construction alterations and additions for Tawas Hospital's medical laboratory and radiology departments, administrative offices and in-service training classroom were opened by the board of trustees Thursday, March 2.

R. D. Hendrick and Son, Saginaw, was selected as general contractor with a low bid of \$87,700. Five general trades bids were submitted.

Out of two mechanical trades bids, Wermer, Incorporated, Cheboygan, was selected with a low bid of \$74,634.

Low bidder out of three bids submitted in electrical trades was Normsmith Electrical, Cheboygan, for \$33,367.

Total cost of the project will be \$195,721. Work will commence around the middle of May this year and is to be completed by August 15.

School Begins Planning For 72-73 Budget

Preparation of an operational budget for the 1972-73 school year is now being prepared by administrators of Tawas Area Schools. The budget is to be submitted to the county allocation board in April.

At Monday night's meeting of the board of education, Supt. Reynolds Mick said that a five percent increase in supplies could be expected, with adjustments for known changes.

The superintendent said that a state aid act had not been adopted as yet by the legislature and there has been no indication as to when one could be expected. The revenue portion of the new budget is to be based on the existing state aid formula and the same allocation of local taxes.

In other business, the low bid of Inglis Ford was accepted for purchase of one bus chassis. Low bidder on furnishing the bus body was Bluebird Manufacturing Company.

Hurt Sunday When Snowmobile Went Into Creek

John Quarters, 31, Townline Road, injured Sunday in a snowmobile accident at Silver Valley, has been transferred to Saginaw General Hospital following initial treatment at Tawas Hospital.

Investigating sheriff's department officers said that Quarters drove his machine down a hill at the former winter sports park and it plunged into Silver Creek. Officers said he sustained fractures of both legs.

Three Whittemore residents were hospitalized at West Branch Saturday night following a mishap on M-65. Officers said a pickup truck driven by Donald Armstrong, 46, swerved in a gust of wind on the slippery highway and flipped over. Passengers injured were Michael Dorsey, 15, and James Gawne, 24.

City Council Adopts Interim Financing

An interim budget to finance city operations from March 11 to June 30 was adopted Monday night by the Tawas City Council. This action was necessary as a three-month gap resulted from adoption of the new city charter which changed the last day of the city's fiscal year from March 10 to June 30.

The budget includes disbursements of \$39,672 and receipts of \$26,710. It is expected that there will be a balance of approximately \$20,000 in the general fund to start the period.

In other business Monday night, the council authorized a public hearing on Monday, April 3, to hear objections to the proposed closing of Pine Street between Oak and Beech Streets, which has been requested by Roy Stewart.

This street is platted but has never been opened. It is approximately 50 feet wide and includes an easement for Consumers Power Company of an undetermined width. The power company's easement would remain in effect.

Earl N. Authier, Tawas City insurance agent, along with a representative of a Detroit firm, presented information to the council on an employee retirement plan. No action was taken.

Michigan Nurse Week has been officially designated for March 12-18 by the city council and mayor. A proclamation to be published next week calls upon citizens of the community to recognize the contribution of nurses to the health and welfare of all citizens of Michigan.

City Mgr. Reginald Bubltz was designated as the street administrator to handle Act 51 money with the Michigan Department of State Highways.

A letter from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources stated that 150,000 coho would be planted in the Tawas River during 1972, about the same number as planted in 1970. The DNR's letter said that plants of domestic rainbow trout and steelhead were to be increased this year in Lake Huron and that many of these fish would enter the Tawas River, even though no direct planting of trout is to be made in the stream.

A letter from State Sen. Robert Richardson revealed that the state highway commission has no future plans for widening or altering the US-23 bridge over the Tawas River. The council hopes to enlist support from area governmental units to show that a traffic bottleneck exists, as the highway is wider than the bridge. Three other US-23 bridges are being replaced and the AuSable River bridge is to be replaced later this year.

Richardson reported, also, that there are no state funds presently available to assist with replacement of local street bridges over the Tawas River, although such legislation is presently under consideration.

An inoperable air compressor, 34 years old and declared surplus by the DFW following replacement by a unit purchased from Michigan Consolidated Gas Company, is to be sold to the local chapter of the Model A Restorers Club. Bubltz said that it would cost the city between

Tawas' Mary Nagy is Honduras Bound

Mary E. Nagy, registered nurse, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Nagy of Tawas City, has begun a two-year tour of duty with MEDICO, a service of CARE. For the past year, she had been employed at Lockwood-MacDonald General Hospital at Petoskey.

Miss Nagy, 29, will spend the next four weeks in Mexico learning Spanish as an aid to her work in Honduras, the country to which she has been assigned. On April 1, she will join a MEDICO team being transferred from Santa Rosa, where they established a highly successful auxiliary nurse training school, to Choluteca, where they will inaugurate a similar program.

In addition to the nursing staff, MEDICO will add a general practitioner and a medical technologist, the eventual goal being to bring to the Choluteca area total community health care.

After graduation from Tawas Area High School, Miss Nagy studied for a year at Eastern Michigan University, Ypsilanti. She took her nurse's training at Saginaw General Hospital, followed by a year of nursing at Edward W. Sparrow Hospital in Lansing. She then joined the Peace Corps and served 2 1/2 years in Afghanistan before returning to Michigan.

When asked why she joined MEDICO, Miss Nagy said that she had met some of the organization's nurses while working in Afghanistan and was impressed with the job they were doing. "Also, I think helping the medically underprivileged is very worthwhile work," she added.

Co. Airport Equipped for Instrument Flying

Utilization of the Iosco County Airport has been improved to include aircraft on instrument flight rules, it was announced this week by Wilbur C. Roach, manager.

The procedures, which were put into effect at no cost to the county, were installed by the Federal Aviation Agency with cooperation of Wurtsmith Air Force Base radio facilities.

The instrument approach system will assist business and private planes landing at the airport under instrument flying conditions. At present, the only time the airport

can be used is under good flight conditions.

Going into effect March 31, airplanes on instruments will "home in" on the radio beacon at Wurtsmith. Planes will be under the control of Wurtsmith Approach Control, the same group handling air force planes in bad weather. After passing over Wurtsmith, planes are to pick up a heading of 191 degrees and let down to an altitude of 500 feet over the ground until reaching the county airport.

With the approval of Clement Stephan, chairman of the Iosco

Board of Commissioners' aeronautics committee, work on this project began one year ago. With assistance of Robert Schmidt, who operates a flying business at the airport, applications were made to federal agencies.

Plans now under consideration include lengthening and widening of a runway to include jet aircraft, now being used more extensively for business. A new plant presently being constructed at the industrial site next to the airport uses such aircraft at its other installations.

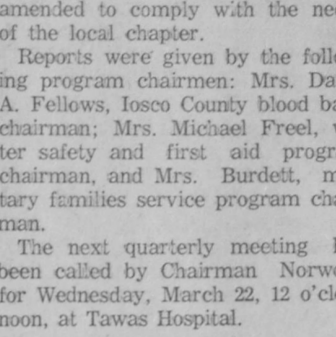

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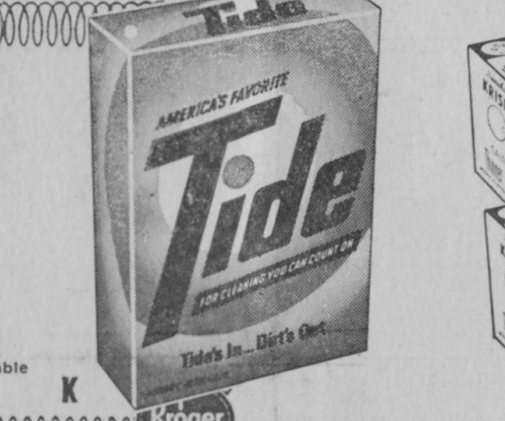

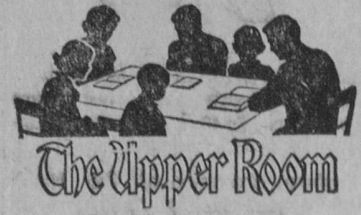
