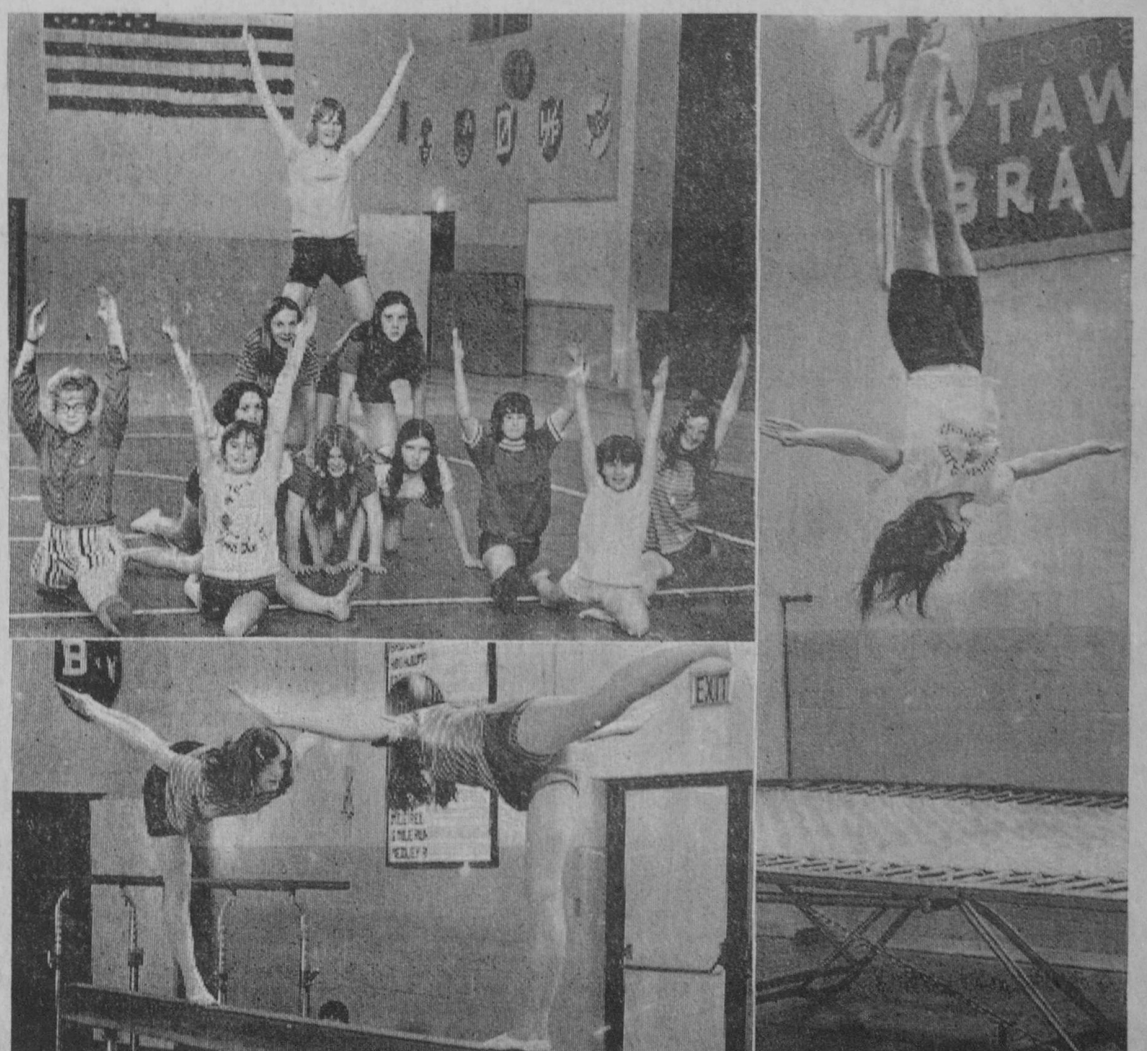

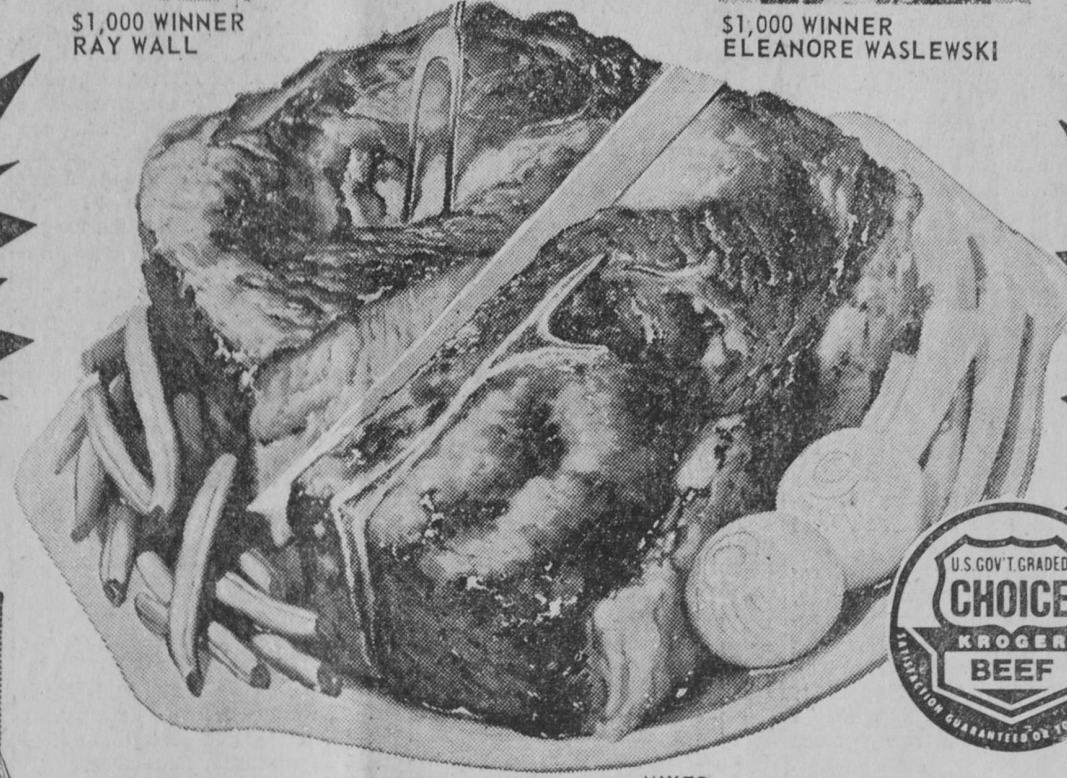

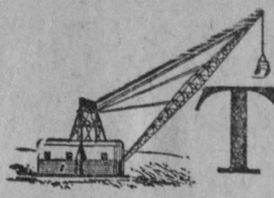

AFTER READING that President Nixon had shaken an estimated one million hands during his political career, third grade students of Whittemore-Prescott Area School in 1970 just could not conceive of a number that large. Their teacher, Mrs. Margaret Bellor, had an idea—"Why not collect a million bottle caps so that the children could have a practical application of numbers?" The children began collecting bottle caps from stores and, two years and two different classes later, third graders had collected one-quarter million caps. The collection project ended last week as the 250,000 caps filled 39 large boxes, weighed about 800 pounds and utilized a much-needed storage area. Now, kids that age understand what

"That's a lot of bottle caps—and a lot of handshakes," said one third-grader. Albert "Jim" Gulligan, elementary principal, commented that if anyone knows of someone who needs some used bottle caps, "please call us." All this work had some compensation for, besides receiving a practical application in numbers, the kids sorted out enough special soft drink caps to receive \$40 in a contest. The New Building Block

Your next house may arrive like a birthday present, wrapped, tied and literally dropped on your doorstep. Of course, we are talking about a modular house or "the new building block" of today's housing industry. A truck bed hauling half a house down the highway is now a familiar sight to most of us. But what else do we know about modular houses? The whole modular idea has a lot to do with interchangeable components. You can throw away a replaceable part and still keep the whole intact. For modular houses, these parts are put together to make big "boxes," usually called modules. Modular housing is an outgrowth of the prefabrication process. Prefabricated homes gave you the house's shell—walls, floors, ceilings, roof. Modular construction fills in this shell with plumbing, heating, wiring, finishing and cabinetwork.

Current Affairs Meeting At Detroit May 18

A distinguished team of editors and correspondents from The Christian Science Monitor will hold a current affairs meeting called "Outlook '72" in Cobo Arena, Detroit, Thursday, May 18, 8:00 p. m. Penetrating analysis of the crucial topics of the day is expected at the meeting, which will be addressed by John Hughes, the Monitor's dynamic, Pulitzer prize-winning editor.

The news "behind the news" will be discussed by Godfrey "Budge" Sperling, national political correspondent of the Monitor; Geoffrey Godsell, the Monitor's overseas news editor, and Guy Halverson, prize-winning chief of the Monitor's mid-western bureau.

"Outlook '72—The Christian Science Monitor looks at where we are and where we are going" is the topic of the meeting which will include talks, a panel discussion and a question and answer period. The meeting is open to the public without charge.

National and international trends will be assessed by Mr. Hughes, the paper's new editor, who won the Pulitzer prize for international reporting in 1967 and has served as editor of the Monitor since October 1970.

Insights about the upcoming presidential race will be shared by Mr. Sperling. Over his years in Washington, an institution has developed around Mr. Sperling. Early in the morning, he gathers for breakfast a dozen or so top Washington reporters and a leading political figure in the news. At "Breakfast with Budge" (a childhood nickname that stuck), there is plenty of opportunity for background information and floating trial balloons.

The crisis in the Middle East will be discussed by Mr. Godsell, who speaks Arabic, French, Italian and German fluently, and is also well versed in racial affairs.


Political and economic trends at the grass roots level will be analyzed by Mr. Halverson, who received the 1971 Alfred P. Sloane award for distinguished public service in highway safety.

Miss Pineda is a Yale undergraduate from Tucson, Arizona. She gets monthly checks from social security because her father died in 1970. Social security benefits are payable to students if they are children of deceased, disabled or retired workers insured under social security. Miss Pineda was an honor student in high school and plans to be a teacher. She attends Yale on a scholarship, supplemented by social security. "The social security payments really make the difference between a real struggle to make ends meet and peace of mind," she says. Over 500,000 students in colleges, high schools and trade schools get 53-million dollars a month from social security. Checks to young people normally stop at age 18, but they can be paid from age 18 through 22 if they are full-time students in school and remain unmarried.

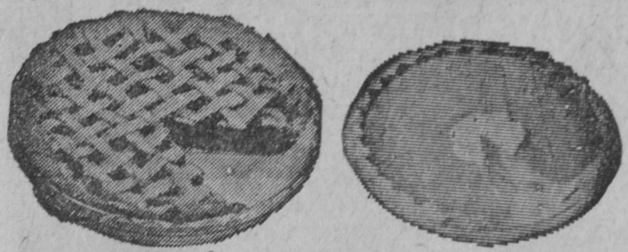

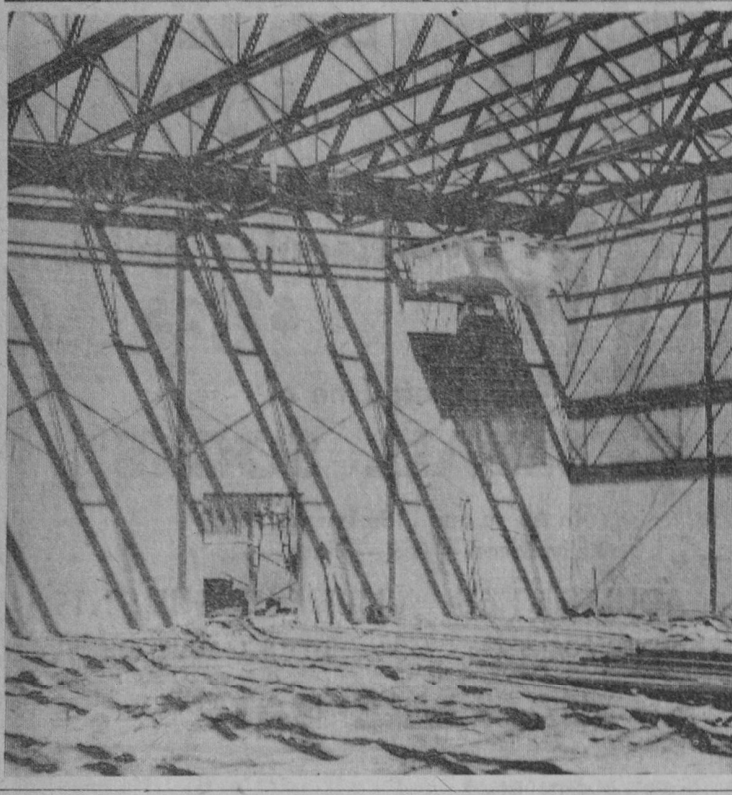
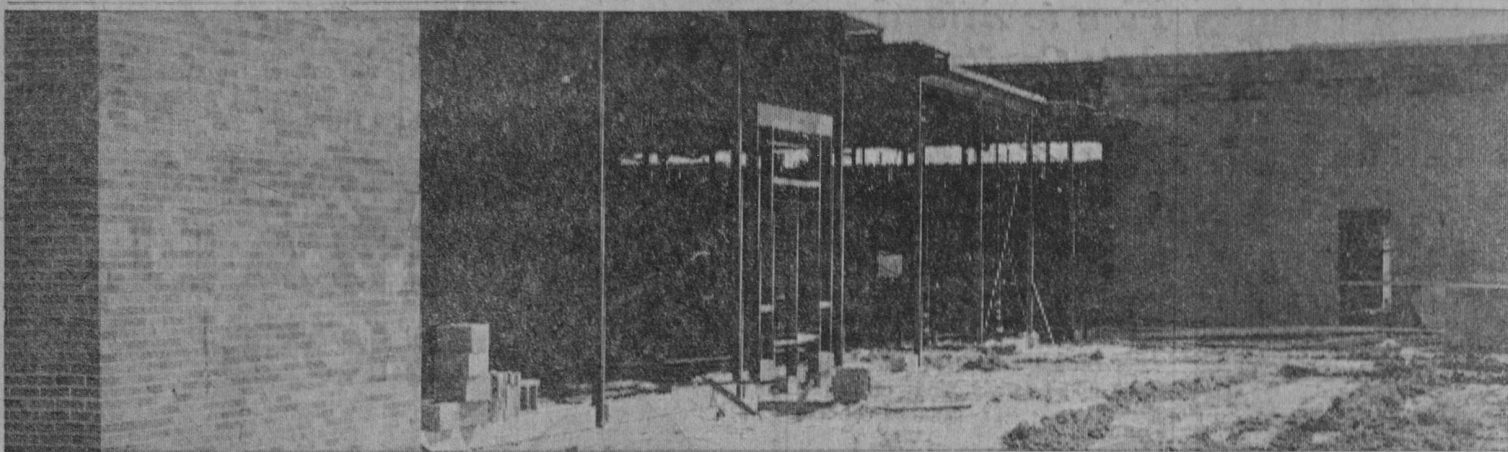

Selective Service Boards Changed

Selective service local boards in Northern and Central Michigan were consolidated at sites at Cheboygan, Alpena, Midland and Muskegon, effective May 1, as announced by state selective service headquarters.

The consolidation of individual county draft boards into intercounty local boards marks the initial step in the reorganization of the local board system in planning for active standby operation by 1973.

Local Board No. 4 at Alpena will be composed of representatives from Alpena, Alcona, Iosco, Montmorency and Oscoda Counties.

Local board offices in the individual counties will be maintained through June 23 to provide information and registration service. Registrars and advisors to registrants will continue to be available to serve the public in all counties after the local board offices are consolidated. Young men reaching their 18th birthdays will be able to register at any high school in their home county.

Consolidation of local board office operations in all Northern and Central Michigan counties is being initiated to prepare for the move toward a standby draft operation as soon as the armed forces can meet manpower requirements with volunteers. The consolidated operation will enable selective service to resume any level of military manpower requirements which may be triggered by national emergency whenever ordered by the president.

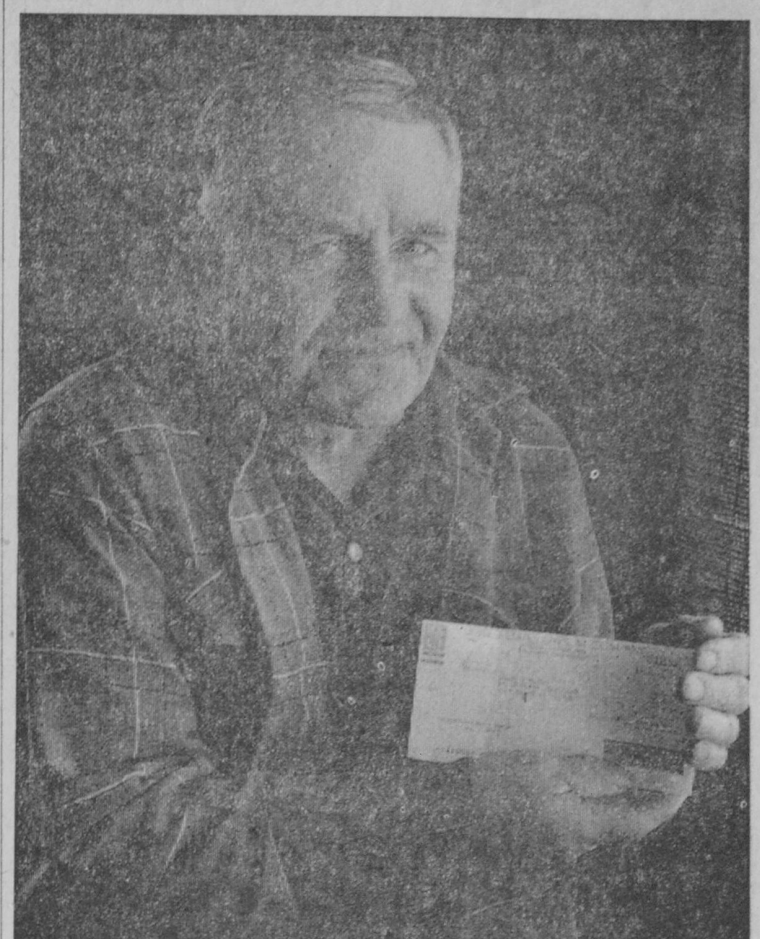
