



AFTER READING that President Nixon had shaken an estimated one million hands during his political career, third grade students of Whittemore-Prescott Area School in 1970 just could not conceive a number that large. Their teacher, Mrs. Margaret Bellor, had an idea—"Why not collect a million bottle caps so that the children could have a practical application of numbers?" The children began collecting bottle caps from stores and, two years and two different classes later, third graders had collected one-quarter mil-lion caps. The collection project ended last week as the 250,000 caps filled 39 large boxes, weighed about 800 pounds and utilized a much-needed storage area. Now, kids that age understand what one-quarter of a dollar looks like and they could get some idea of what a million would be when the bottle caps were dumped on the ground near their school. "That's a lot of bottle caps-and a lot of handshakes," said one third-grader. Albert "Jim" Gulligan, elementary principal, commented that if anyone knows of som one who needs some used bottle caps, "please call us." All this work had some compensation for, besides receiving a practical application in numbers, the kids sorted out enough special soft drink caps to receive \$40 in a contest. 

ABOUT 25 acres of brush land in Huron National Forest near the East Tawas-Tawas City sani-tary land fill burned Thursday afternoon before being brought under control by volunteer fire departments of East Tawas and Tawas City. 




