# Harold L. Gould Retires From Post

Harold L. Gould, longtime Tawas area businessman and civic leader, has announced his retirement from the chairman and treasurer position on the board of directors of Gould Drug Company.

Since 1955, when he purchased the present Gould Rexall Drug store in East Tawas from Ernest Leaf, Gould's concern and appreciation for the future of the Tawas area, have been reflected in his efforts toward the attraction and retention of area tourism. His active leadership was instrumental in the creation of many community attraction projects such as Silver Valley Winter Sports Area, Perchville, the Tawas Area Chamber of Commerce, a central area school system and the building of Tawas Hospital. Gould has served as president of Tawas Kiwanis Club and the East Michigan Tourist Association.

For more than 37 years, Gould has been devoted in his business to ever increasing service to the community. The present Gould Drug Store is nearly five times its 1935 size. In 1957, when Gould Drug Company was formed as a Michigan Corporation incorporating the six Gould Drug Stores, Gould was named president and general manager of the corporation. He played an integral role in bringing the Gould Drug Company national recognition as a leader among small chain drug stores.

A dedicated outdoorsman and photographer, Gould's knowledge and concern for conservation and abilities with a camera have brought enjoyment to lovers of the outdoors for years. He will continue to maintain his home, locally known as "The Boondocks," and retain his civically active role as chairman of the Tawas Harbor Committee and membership of the Iosco County Parks and Recreation Committee.

Gould and his wife, June, (known for her early prominence as a practicing podiatrist in the Tawas area), have two children, both married, and two grandchildren. Their son, Charles, now lives in Florida and the former Kathy Gould resides in Ann Arbor with her husband.

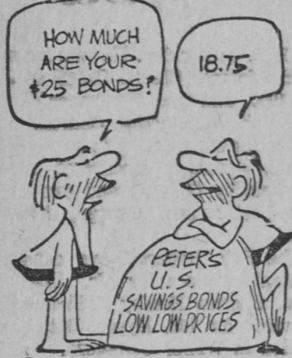

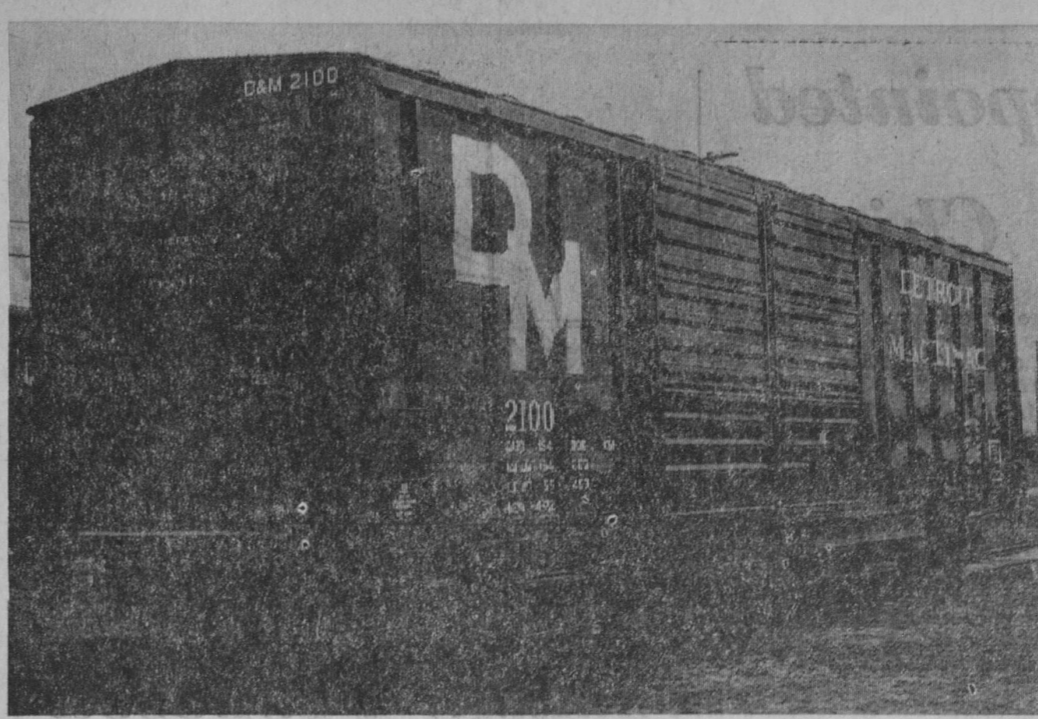

The car pictured above is one of 100 new cars manufactured for the D&M by Pullman Standard at Besemer, Alabama, and completed in April. The remaining 99 cars were turned over to the Southern Railroad at Besemer to start their freight hauling life on the way north. The cars are of the latest design with roller bearings, double doors and low maintenance features. Each car cost \$17,000 and the \$1,700,000 total purchase was the first by the D&M since 1964, when new hopper cars went into service. During the interim years, the railroad conducted a massive repair and renovation program at the Tawas shop for its rolling stock. 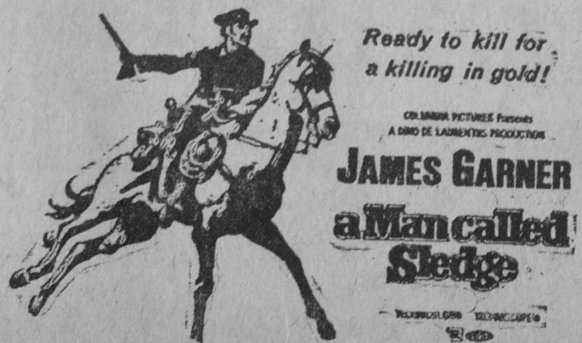

## Reapportionment Change

# Prescott Candidate in 105th District

A veteran Republican member of the house of representatives, George A. Prescott from the 102nd District, will be a candidate for re-election in the new 105th District created last week by court adoption of the Hatcher-Kleiner reapportionment plan.

The new 105th District established by the court is 108 miles long and 72 miles wide encompassing nearly 8,000 square miles. Six full counties, Iosco, Arenac, Ogemaw, Gladwin, Alcona and Oscoda, will be in the new district plus some portions of Montmorency, Midland, Roscommon and Bay. The new district adds about 2,000 square miles to the old 102nd.

Prescott, 59, a Michigan State University graduate, is a former township supervisor and was Iosco County clerk for 17 years before election to the house of representatives in the fall of 1966. He has represented the Counties of Iosco, Arenac, Ogemaw and a major portion of Bay since taking office on January 1, 1967.

"I made many friends over the years in the southern part of Bay County which has been taken away from the old district and I will miss them," Prescott said. "The new district presents a challenge but I look forward to making new friends."

A third generation member of his family to represent Northeastern Michigan in the state legislature, Prescott is a ranking member of both the house elections and agriculture committees.

Representative Prescott, a long time farmer, married his wife, Margaret, in 1938, and they have five sons and one daughter. Their home is in Tawas City.

# New Reading Center Utilized for Two Months at Tawas A.

Tawas Area School now has a reading center at the high school. It has been in operation for about two months with marked success in most cases.

At the present time, the center is in operation for three hours each day, with funds for operation coming from both Title One federal money and the school's general fund.

Harry Crawford, federal programs director, said the philosophy of operation is student oriented. "The center provides an opportunity to students to master or overlearn the sequential series of subskills that in-

corporate the process of reading," he stated. Students will be able, if properly motivated, to manipulate the content of reading. It recognizes that a student's development into a successful reader is dependent upon the skills of reading perception and conception.

The equipment in the center consists of a tacomatic machine, which is used for visual training by flashing at varying speeds, words, phrases and sentences on the screen to teach proper eye movements and to force the reader to read phrases rather than get bogged down with

words.

In addition, there are two tachistoscopes for visual perception and visual memory training. These machines flash words on a screen at speeds from four seconds to 1/100th of a second. It forces the student to concentrate, which is the basis of all reading.

The center also utilizes both model tachistoscopes and shadow scopes for individual use. The latter is a machine utilizing a beam of light passing down a page at a controlled rate of speed to force the student to read for ideas, cut out re-

versals and to increase his reading speed.

Last week, the board of education approved a plan to open the reading center during the summer months. The program will utilize the balance remaining from federal Title One funds received during the current year.

The center will be available for use by students for five days a week from June 19 to July 28. Plans now call for students to attend a class one hour each day.

Enrollment will be limited to 10 to 15 students per hour. The program will accept students from grades three through seven and, if there is room, students in the second grade will be accepted.

Operation of the center is funded through Title One money and students must meet the guidelines established by the Michigan Department of Public Instruction. Any parent who would like more information or would like to have his child considered for this program should contact Mr. Crawford at the high school.

In addition to the above corrective program, the center will be utilized, also, in a developmental program of speed reading.

Some rather amazing results have been obtained during an experimental program conducted during the past two months by Crawford. Utilizing equipment in the reading center, a number of students with average or below average reading habits have greatly increased their rate of words per minute, comprehension and vocabulary.

"The reading center is new and the novelty of utilizing such equipment has not worn off yet, so we will have to wait and see what happens after a few months of operation," said Crawford. "Students have been enthused over the dramatic results obtained in increasing word comprehension and speed—they have been most attentive."

## Home Debris Burning Is Cause of Many Forest Fires

According to the United States Forest Service officials, debris burning around homes and cottages during spring cleanup is one of the major causes of forest fires on lands protected by this agency.

Cliff Reedy, fire control officer for the Huron-Manistee National Forests, stated that nearly one-third of

all wildfires in the months of April and May are caused by someone burning trash and debris.

"These are several reasons why these fires escape easily into nearby fields and woods, at this time of year," commented Reedy. "Aside from the fact that someone was careless in letting the fire escape,

the critical factor is the weather at this time of the year. Because hardwood trees are bare and fine fuels such as grass is dead and cured, low transpiration rates and exposure of surface fuels to the sun causes the fuels to dry out extensively.

In addition to low humidities and dry fuels," Reedy went on, "other weather conditions, such as erratic winds that are unpredictable in the spring months, can be the cause of fire escaping. A person may start to burn during a calm period of the day, but without warning a gust of wind can carry burning embers into adjacent dry grass and other fine fuels. Because the fuels are very dry, the fire spreads fast and can be difficult to control if allowed to burn too long before suppression action is taken."

Some points to consider before and during the time burning is being done were suggested. Michigan State law requires that a person have a burning permit to burn material, unless the burning is done in containers with proper covers. Specifications for containers can be obtained at any forest service or DNR office.

The best time to burn is after 5:00 p. m.; if you plan to visit that second home on a week-end to get things in shape, burn on Friday or Saturday so that you can be sure the fire is out before you leave; always have a shovel, rake and water available as precautionary measures; do not burn when it is windy.

These few, simple considerations, if followed, could save your home or cabin, and the surrounding environment from unwanted damage resulting from careless burning.

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# Many Billing Errors Says Social Security

A clerical error in doctors' billing procedures may be costing medicare beneficiaries additional fees, John Carr, manager of the Bay City social security office, reports.

There has been a recent increase in the number of complaints from elderly citizens that doctors are billing for more than the allowed medicare charges for medical services. These complaints are valid when the physician has accepted "assignment" under medicare.

Billing by assignment is one of the two basic ways of submitting medical bills to medicare and provides that the medicare payments go directly to the physician. The other method requires the patient to submit his own medicare claim based on an itemized bill which describes the services rendered. "With this method, the patient is responsible for the physician's full fee," stated Carr, "but by accepting assignment, the doctor agrees to accept as full payment the amount the carrier (social security's paying agency) allows for the services performed."

Sometimes the carrier reduces the amount of the doctor's actual charge to conform with medicare payment principles. When this happens, through a lack of understanding of the proper medicare procedures, the beneficiary may receive a bill for the physician for the amount of the re-

duction made by the carrier. This may be an incorrect charge, Carr states, if the physician has accepted assignment.

Beneficiaries may become aware of this overcharge from the actual doctor bill or from the Explanation of Medicare Benefits form received in the mail from social security.

Each case of such an overcharge should be reported to the nearest social security office. This can be done anonymously, if desired. Social security will arrange for an

educational contact with the doctor and obtain a refund for the medicare patient if an overpayment was made, Carr said. Of course, the refund is not possible if the patient prefers to remain nameless.

If the doctor continues the incorrect practice after this consultation with social security representative, the carrier will be advised to discontinue honoring assignment claims submitted by the doctor.

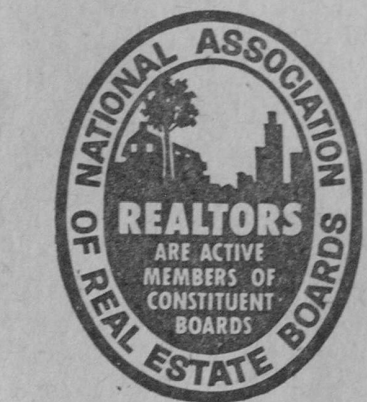

### Family Living Education

#### Communicate

Let us play word association. When I say "communications," what is the first word that pops into your mind? If it's "gap," read on. Even if a communications gap does not concern you now, you can always make your communications better than they are.

A communications gap usually means an understanding gap. We listen to the words that the other person says, but we do not recognize the feelings—the real meaning—behind those words. When that happens, real communications have not taken place.

How do you close that gap? One way is to use a technique called effective or active listening. Active listening means listening for what the other person really MEANS and how he is FEELING. Then you put your understanding into your own words and send it back for the other person to confirm or deny.

This feedback is the vital part (and the "active" part) of active listening. Without it, you cannot really tell whether you caught what the person really means, what he is really experiencing and feeling as he is talking to you.

You may say, "I always try to understand the other person and I do respond to him." Most of us, though, send back our own messages rather than what we think the other person said.

Take a look at these typical 12 roadblocks to effective communications. They are not necessarily bad, but they do carry risks. When you use one of these responses, you may cut off further communications. Do you recognize some of them?

- (1) Giving an order or command. "I do not care what Ann's mother says, you have to do the dishes."
- (2) Warning or threatening. "One more word out of you and you will go to your room."
- (3) Preaching, pleading or moralizing. "You should not say things like that."
- (4) Advising, giving solutions or suggestions. "If I were you, I would tell him what is going on."
- (5) Teaching, lecturing, giving logical arguments. "Look, high school

graduates earn more money than dropouts."

(6) Judging, criticizing. "Wait a minute. You are not thinking straight."

(7) Praising, agreeing. "You have all kinds of ability." (We often use praise, but see how it can ignore the other person's feelings.)

(8) Ridiculing. "You are stupid."

(9) Analyzing or interpreting. "You are just jealous of her." (Analyzing may imply that you are smarter than the other person and have him "psyched out.")

(10) Trying to make the person feel better. "You do not have to worry about that."

(11) Questioning. "What is the matter with you?"

(12) Distracting or avoiding. "Let us forget about it."

When you answer with one of the typical 12, you are sending your own message. Maybe you did not understand the other person. Maybe your message is carrying a double meaning for the other person. Maybe you are enraging the gap.

East Tawas High School baseball team was defeated at Lansing Friday, 7-2. Accompanying the team were Howard Braden and Coach Emerick.

Isoco Board of Supervisors set the salary of the county school commissioner at \$2,400 annually.

Receiving building applications for construction of new homes in Tawas City were Clyde M. Evert, A. R. Kendall, Harold Grise, Roy Clark and Arthur Wendt.

Mayor John D. LeClair will throw the opening pitch to start Sunday's game between Tawas City and Alabaster in the Northeastern Michigan League.

Mrs. T. M. O'Loughlin was installed as president of Tawas Young Women's League.

Miss Marian Clark of East Tawas High School was awarded a scholarship to Central State Teacher's College, Mt. Pleasant.

**35 Years Ago—**  
May 14, 1937—Andrew D. Lindgren, 43, who was in charge of 400

CCC fire fighters, perished in a fast-traveling crown fire which swept through 1,200 acres of Huron National Forest Sunday. A CCC member suffered second degree burns and was taken to Glenn for treatment.

Believed to have been caused by a careless smoker in the tinder-dry wooded area, the flames ran through tree tops at a rapid pace. Lindgren's body was found beside a fire lane in the Welcome Lake area near Hale.

At a special election held Monday, taxpayers of Tawas City voted to purchase the Tawas City park from the C. H. Prescott and Sons estate. No excitement was manifested and the vote was small—77 yes and 27 no. When the land deal is consummated, the city will own an excellent site for a park which can eventually be made into a beauty spot and a place of great value to the residents here.

Thirty-six persons were killed and many injured as a series of explosions shattered and burned the German dirigible air liner, Hindenburg, when she attempted to moor at Lakehurst, New Jersey, at the end of her first trans-Atlantic crossing of the season. The catastrophe began with an explosion of the highly inflammable hydrogen gas with which the ship was filled.

#### Disabled Persons Should Obtain SS Filing Info

Question: I am confused about when to file for social security disability benefits. I have heard about both a six-month waiting period and a 12-month waiting period. Can you explain which is correct?

Answer: You should file an application for benefits as soon as it is determined that you are likely to be disabled for a year or longer.

The six-month period is the waiting period. You can file your application during this period but no monthly payments can be made for the first six full calendar months of a disability.

The 12-month period refers to the expected duration of the disability. Social security can pay benefits only if the disability is expected to last for at least 12 months or longer, and is serious enough to rule out any substantial gainful work.

Question: Before her recent death, my wife worked under social security for nearly 11 years. Even though I plan to continue working and supporting our two children, ages nine and 12, could they get monthly social security benefits on my wife's work record?

Answer: Yes. The children may be eligible for social security benefits on their mother's record regardless of the surviving father's work situation. You should file an application for the children.

Question: I get monthly retirement

benefits from social security and my wife also draws benefits on my work record. My wife is planning to start work at a part-time job. Will her earnings affect my monthly benefits?

Answer: No. If she earns enough, your wife may have part or all of her own monthly cash benefits withheld, but this will not affect your retirement payments.

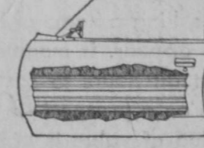

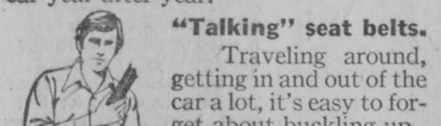

## Forest Welcomes Mushroom Pickers

With mushroom season at hand, Forest Supervisor John von Barga today extended a welcome to visitors to the Huron-Manistee National Forest for this favorite pastime enjoyed by so many people.

"The National Forests belong to the people," stated von Barga. "Naturally, we wish to make their visit a memorable experience so that they will leave with the thought that they would like to make a return visit."

"The one thing we ask in return is that everyone respect the intolerance of the natural resources to abuses that some individuals inflict upon them," von Barga said. "For instance, leaving bottles and cans scattered throughout each acre of land may not be considered abuse by some people, but it must be recognized that there is a terrible distraction to the beauty of the forest if littering is present. If a forest fire results from an unattended campfire or carelessly tossed cigarette or match, there could be serious damage to all the resources."

Visitors were also cautioned about use of all-terrain vehicles in the Na-

tional Forest. Serious damages to the soil can result from use of all-wheel drive vehicles, motor bikes, etc.; especially on the steeper slopes where potential erosion conditions could be created.

"Mushrooming is a pleasant experience for everybody," von Barga concluded, "unless it is interrupted or detracted by a situation that turns the visit into a 'sour' event. These few simple points can make the difference—carry your litter back to your car; make sure your campfire is attended at all times and that it is 'dead out' when you leave; avoid smoking while moving about in the woods and always smoke in a safe area; do not expose the fragile soil to the ravages of spinning wheels on the steeper slopes."
