## Funeral Tuesday for Retired Banker

Lloyd G. McKay, 91, whose name was associated with Iosco County banking for nearly 70 years, died Sunday, November 19, at his home at East Tawas.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, November 21, 3:00 p. m., at Christ Episcopal Church, East Tawas, with the Rev. Alfred W. Sautsbury officiating. Burial was in Greenwood Cemetery.

Born August 14, 1881, at Caro, his father, William McKay, served the Tuscola County district as state representative and later as state senator.

Upon graduation from Caro High School, Lloyd worked with his brother, Robert, at the Akron bank and then followed him to a bank at West Branch. After working at West Branch for 1 1/2 years, he decided to further his education and studied business law at the University of Michigan.

The Carson, Ealy and Company Bank of Caro organized a bank at East Tawas in 1902 and a new cashier was needed. Mr. McKay accepted the position in the spring of 1903 while still a student at the university and came to East Tawas.

On the death of W. H. Carson, the bank was reorganized and Mr. McKay was taken into partnership. He became vice president and cashier of the new Ealy, McKay and Company Bank.

The new banking institution expanded its operations in Iosco County, establishing a Tawas City branch bank in 1906, along with a branch at Hale in 1911.

Following failure of the Ealy banks in the Thumb area, the Iosco County banks were closed under terms of the partnership. McKay assumed responsibility of paying the \$650,000 obligation of the Ealy, McKay and Company Bank and, when local friends rallied behind him, organized the Peoples State Bank of East Tawas, which was chartered June 14, 1927.

Over the years, Peoples State Bank has flourished with the community, establishing a branch in Tawas City in 1961, and McKay served as chairman of the board of directors until suffering a heart attack in 1965. He continued on as a member

of the board of directors until 1971 and, until two years ago, walked daily from his home to the bank on Newman Street.

Mr. McKay and the former Rose McDonald of Tawas City were married April 29, 1912, at Houston, Texas, and spent their entire married life at 405 West Bay Street, East Tawas. She passed away September 19, 1970.

In addition to banking, Mr. McKay had many other important business interests. Early in his career, he recognized the possibility of future development of lake frontage and saw prospects for a growing resort area. With this in mind, he acquired considerable acreage around Indian Lake and other inland waters in Iosco County, along with frontage on Tawas Bay and Lake Huron.

In January 1916, he obtained the Chevrolet dealership which had just been marketed and, until his retirement, was the oldest living Chevy dealer in the nation. This business has been managed by his son, L. G. (Ladd) McKay Jr., who has served since 1965 as chairman of the board of directors of Peoples State Bank.

One of McKay's principal efforts toward bringing industry to this county came in 1905, when he commenced test drilling operations for gypsum in Sherman Township. A large deposit was discovered there and options were taken on the property. The land was purchased by the then new National Gypsum Company of Buffalo, New York, and the firm's second plant was established here in 1926.

Active in many civic organizations over the years, he was a charter member of the Iosco Chapter of the American Red Cross, organized in 1914, and was its treasurer for more than 20 years. He was one of the first sponsors of the Tawas Hospital and served until 1957 as treasurer. He was a member of Christ Episcopal Church.

Besides his son, Ladd, he is survived by two sons, Neil McKay of Geneva, Ohio, and William McKay of Grosse Pointe; two daughters, Mrs. Rose Mary Smith of East Lansing and Mrs. Jean Kennott of Lexington, Tennessee; 15 grandchildren, and three great grandchildren.

Anderson, well known to the Tawas community, joined the bank in August of 1970 as an appraiser. He has since taken over the complete mortgage department operation. Prior to his association with Peoples State Bank, Anderson owned and operated a real estate and insurance business in East Tawas.

He first came to the area as a for-ester after graduating from Michigan State University. Anderson's background in all phases of real estate covers many years.

John D. Lippert, the bank's chief executive officer, stated, "We are extremely pleased with the bank's mortgage department under Anderson's direction. The department experienced unprecedented growth this past summer." The mortgage department has moved into new larger quarters at the bank's East Tawas location that are accessible from the State Street entrance.

Anderson has been active in Tawas area affairs, holding many positions of responsibility over the past years. He and his wife, Delta, make their home west of East Tawas off old US-23.

## Regional Library Gets Extra Money

Following the lead of Iosco County two weeks ago, Arenac County Board of Commissioners authorized a 20-cent increase in per capita appropriation for library use at its November 13 meeting.

Officials of Iosco-Arenac Regional Library had presented evidence of a depleted budget and warned officials of both counties that services would have to be curtailed in order to remain in operation if the per capita appropriation was not increased.

Library board members had asked both counties to increase the per capita appropriation from the present level of 55 cents to 85 cents. The library received 75 cents per person from each board of commissioners during the November sessions.

Increased costs of social security, books, office supplies, postal rates, insurance and vehicle-building maintenance have already affected book purchases by the regional library.

Book purchase prices have increased nearly 60 percent over the

past few years and book purchases were cut back in order to remain in operation. Postal rates jumped 33 percent.

Major reason for requesting an increase in the per capita allocation from each county is that court penal fines have dipped to their lowest point since 1966. Since 1970, penal fine totals from the district courts have dropped from better than \$58,000 to just over \$35,000. While library earmarked fines have been reduced, court costs returned to the county's general funds have been increased.

Without the per capita increase, the regional library would have been forced to drop its bookmobile service to several rural area schools and eliminate several library positions.

Circulation has increased by almost 8,000 books so far this year over last year's total of 56,000 books. It is estimated that the total will surpass last year's total circulation by approximately 10,000 books.

## Misses Court Date, Officers Pack Bags

Iosco Sheriff's Department deputies are again getting their bags packed in readiness to pick up a prisoner, the second such trip in a little more than three months to pick up and return the same fugitive to this county.

A bench warrant has been sent to Florida to apprehend James E. Ellis, who entered a guilty plea in Iosco Circuit Court to a charge of burglary and car theft. Ellis failed to make an appearance here for his sentencing.

In early August, two sheriff's department deputies were sent to Lake Tahoe, California, to pick up Ellis after he was apprehended there by authorities and held on a warrant from Michigan. Ellis had skipped this state after his district court appearance on the two felony charges.

After accepting his plea of guilty on August 15, Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller reduced Ellis' bond from \$5,000, set in district court, to a \$100 cash bond. He posted the bond and was set free while awaiting presentence report from the Michigan Department of Corrections.

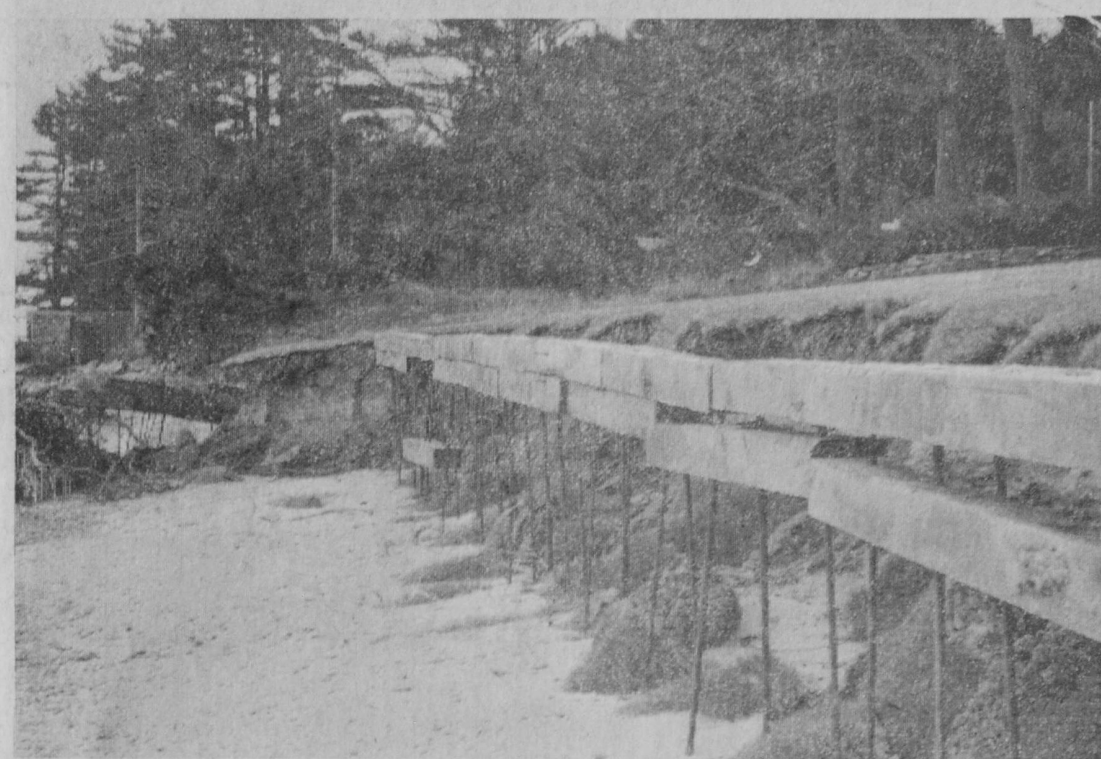
After Ellis failed to make his court appearance here for the second time, the sheriff's department has reason to believe that he has traveled to Florida.

The sheriff's department reported Friday that it cost the county \$1,100 to send two officers to California to pick up Ellis and return him to Iosco last August. The next trip is not expected to be as costly, but it still will be substantial.

Neil Price, 17, Oscoda, who was implicated with Ellis in the burglary and auto theft and was returned with him from California, received concurrent sentences of two to five years and two to 10 years when arraigned earlier this month before Judge Miller.

He is survived by his wife, Wilma J.; three sons, Steven, Greg and Michael; one daughter, Brenda, all at home; his parents, the Rev. and Mrs. Henry C. Gotcher of Canyonville, Oregon; one sister, Mrs. Marlene Cleary, Provo, Utah.

The body is at E. D. Jacques and Son Funeral Home, Tawas City. Funeral services are to be held Wednesday, 2:00 p. m., at the Church of the Nazarene, East Tawas. Burial will be in Memory Gardens Cemetery, Tawas City.

## Oscoda Park Project Moving

A \$5,214 improvement project at the Oscoda Beach Park is expected to get under way shortly.

The initial work will be placement of about 250 feet of chain link fence across the sound end of the park running from the water's edge near the present location on Canada Street.

The project is a joint effort of Oscoda Township and the Oscoda Kiwanis Club. Kiwanians will provide \$1,023 of the total cost, with the balance coming from the state recreational building program.

George Landis, project chairman for Kiwanis and designing engineer, said that placement of the fence would probably be the only work completed this fall.

Other projects call for Canada Street to be widened to provide parking facilities. Within the park, a 22 by 38-foot pavilion is to be constructed.

Playground equipment along with grills and tables now scattered throughout the area are to be relocated and the gravel road dividing the park will be removed and the entire area landscaped and seeded.

## State Snowmobile Accidents Claimed 30 Lives in 1971-72

Michigan snowmobiling activity in the winter season of 1971-72 resulted in 2,028 accidents which claimed 30 lives and injured 1,969 other persons, according to state police traffic division data.

Compared with figures for the 1970-71 season, the totals were increases of five deaths, 132 in injured and 93 in accidents.

Department of state registrations of snowmobiles in Michigan as of this fall approximate 300,000 vehicles. Unknown is an accurate number of the machines operated on private property and requiring no registration. This number may range up to 40,000 or higher.

Of the 30 persons killed, 20 were in the 15-34 age group. Another three were younger and the remaining seven were older.

The injured breakdown included 223 in the 10-14 age group, 317 in 15-19, 261 in 20-24, 468 in 25-34, 331 in 35-44 and 182 in the 45-54 range. Seventy-five injured were older than 54 while 88 were younger than 10. Age was not stated in six injuries.

The breakdown of major categories of accidents involving snowmobiles included: Overturning, 385; other noncollision, 466; pedestrian, 30; motor vehicle in transport, 319; parked motor vehicle, 79; animal, five; fixed objects, 665; other objects, 79.

Of the accidents, the majority or 1,762 occurred in off-roadway areas while 266 happened on roadways.

The light factor in the accident total included: Daylight, 995; darkness-no lights, 893; darkness with lights, 24; dawn-dusk, 78, and condition not stated, 38.

## Charles Kurtzrock Dies of Heart Attack

Charles Kurtzrock, retired Tawas City businessman and former deputy sheriff of Iosco County, died of a heart attack Sunday, November 19, at Manatee Memorial Hospital, Bradenton, Florida.

Funeral arrangements, to be handled by Moffatt Funeral Home, East Tawas, are incomplete. Burial is to be in Saints Cemetery, Whittemore. Born April 19, 1898, at Flint, he served in France during World War I and was employed for many years by General Motors Corporation. He operated a tavern at Oscoda during the 1940s.

He married the former Maori Bronson on January 30, 1952. They operated Sally's Dress Shop in Tawas City and, upon her death April 17, 1970, he continued operation of the business until earlier this year.

He was a member of the Masonic Order, the Bay City Consistory, Ta-

was Kiwanis Club, Methodist Church and was associated with Iosco Sheriff's Department as a part time and full time deputy for 24 years.

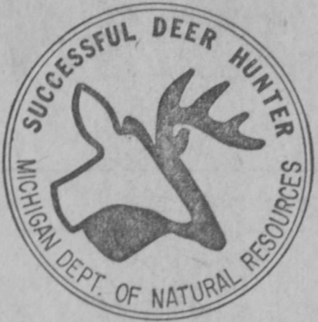

New Patch to Boost Deer Studies



Successful Michigan deer hunters who stop to have their animals examined at the Department of Natural Resources' roadside checking stations this season will receive free, four-color shoulder patches (see insert). It's the DNR's way of saying "thanks" for helping provide the latest biological information on deer. In offering the handsome new patches exclusively to cooperating sportsmen, the DNR hopes to route more deer through these checkpoints to boost its studies for improved deer management. The patch incentive plan is also designed to build higher hunter interest in the DNR's deer programs. The roadside stations will be operated at the Straits of Mackinac (Nov. 17-20); south of Bay City on I-75 (Nov. 15-20 and Nov. 25-26); and near Alma on US-27, White Cloud on M-37, and Paris on US-131 (Nov. 15-20). Another checking station will be open Nov. 15-19 at the ferry docks on Drummond Island. Successful sportsmen may also obtain the free patches by having their deer examined at DNR district headquarters statewide during regular 8:00 to 5:00 working hours. -Michigan Department of Natural Resources

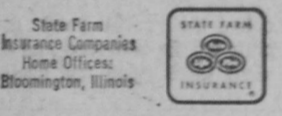

Slate Pay Increases for State Employees

Pay increases next July for the state's 50,000 classified employees on a sliding scale from 6.6 percent for the lowest job grades to 3.8 percent at the top, costing \$28,400,000, have been recommended to the Michigan Civil Service Commission by its compensation advisory board.

Additional fringe benefits costing \$13,300,000, which would primarily go for increasing retirement benefits, would bring the total recommendation to \$41,600,000, which the CAB report says is within federal pay board guidelines.

The nine-member board submitted the report to the civil service commission after a six month's study that included extensive hearings, subcommittee studies involving almost 100 people, detailed pay comparisons in the public and private sector and extended discussions and negotiations. The board has four members representing departmental management, four from recognized employee organizations and a civil service staff member who serves as chairman without a vote except in cases of a tie.

The Michigan Civil Service Commission held a final public hearing November 21 at Lansing, at which time the chairman of the CAB made the formal presentation of the report.

After review of all recommendations, the four-member civil service

commission is expected to make its final determination on pay at Lansing December 8, which automatically becomes effective the following July 1, unless reduced or rejected by two-thirds vote of the legislature.

The pay package recommended included an across-the-board \$210 annually plus an increase of 3.29 percent for all classified employees and special adjustments for a few classes, primarily state police troopers (classes 07-10), who would get an extra one percent.

The principal retirement improvement would involve an increase in the factor applied to years of service and total salary to determine retirement benefits (from one to 1.2 percent for income below \$4,200 and 1.5 to 1.7 percent for income above \$4,200) ranging from 20 percent for income below \$4,200 to 13 percent for income above \$4,200. CAB actuarial projections indicate the costs for funding are estimated at \$9,408,000.

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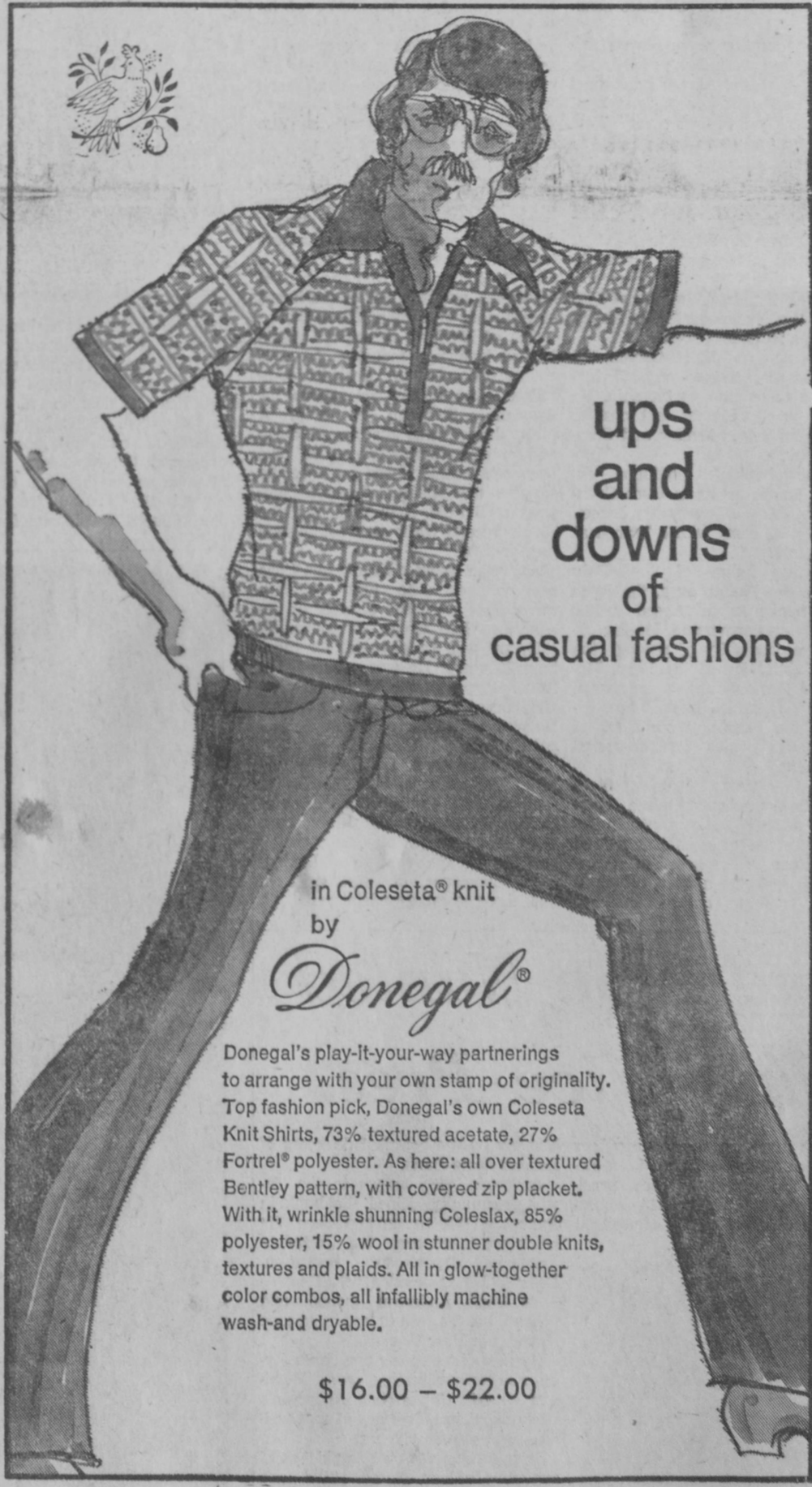

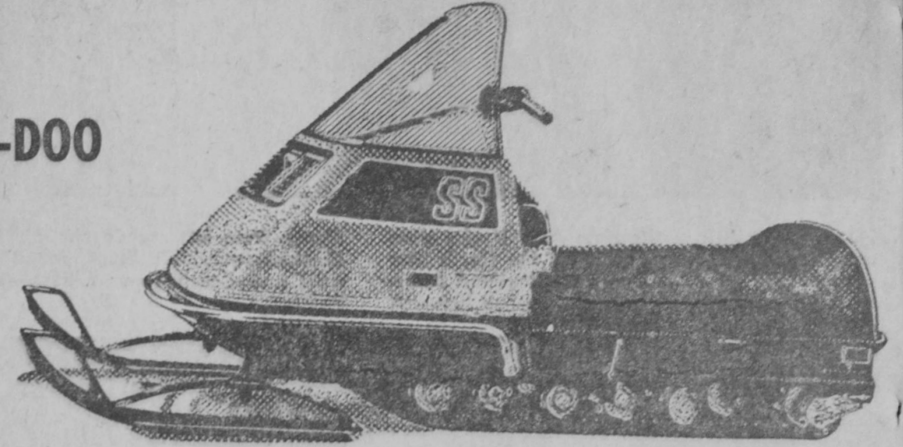

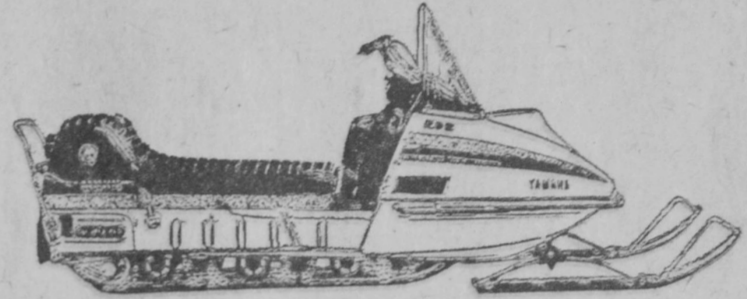

An Ordinance to regulate the speed of vessels and to provide for the safe use of the waters in Tawas City; enacted under the authority of Act 303, Public Acts of 1967 (M. S. A. 18.1287 (17)), being identical to State Administrative Rules filed in the Office of Secretary of State.

**THE CITY OF TAWAS CITY ORDINANCES:**

**SECTION I**  
All words and phrases used in this ordinance shall be construed and have the same meanings as those words and phrases defined in Act 303, P. A. 1967, M. S. A. 18.1287. (8).

**SECTION II**  
Regulation No. 35, Isoco County. R. 281.735.4. Tawas River in Tawas City and area adjacent to its mouth; slow-no wake speed.

4. On the waters of the Tawas River, sections 25, 30 and 36 town 22 north, range 7 east, Tawas City, Isoco County, from the north City Limits downstream and 300 feet in any direction from the mouth of the river in Tawas Bay, it is unlawful for the operator of a vessel to exceed a slow no wake speed.

**SECTION III**  
All other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

**SECTION IV**  
Violations of this ordinance are a misdemeanor and may be punished by a fine not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100) together with costs of prosecution or imprisonment in the county jail or other place of detention as the court may prescribe, for a period not to exceed ninety (90) days, or said fine, costs of prosecution, and imprisonment, at the discretion of the court.

**SECTION V**  
This ordinance and the various parts, sections, subsections, provisions, sentences and clauses are severable. If any part of this ordinance is found to be unconstitutional or invalid it is declared the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected hereby.

**SECTION VI**  
This ordinance shall take effect 30 days after its publication in the Tawas Herald newspaper. We, the undersigned, Mayor and Clerk of the City of Tawas City, do hereby certify that the above ordinance was passed by the City of Tawas City on the 20 day of November 1972, and that it was published in the Tawas Herald newspaper on the 22 day of November 1972.

## Ice on Bridges Dangerous Warns Highway Dept.

To help warn motorists, the highway department has erected diamond-shaped yellow and black signs in advance of all bridges on the state highway system.

## Michigan Sheriffs to Start Study of Mutual Aid Pacts

Michigan has been selected as one of four states to participate in a special federal study of mutual aid pacts between law enforcement agencies.

The study, which will be coordinated locally by the Michigan Sheriffs Association, will lead to the publication of a national handbook, or guide, designed to facilitate the planning and implementation of law enforcement mutual aid agreements.

Mutual support agreements are beneficial between any law enforcement agencies with adjoining or overlapping jurisdictions, and especially during instances of civil disorders and natural disasters.

A leader in the application of mutual aid pacts among its law enforcement agencies, Michigan will be participating in the federal study with California, Iowa and Louisiana.

announced Lester Almstadt, president of the Michigan Sheriffs Association and sheriff of Macomb County.

"There is widespread recognition that mutual aid legislation and operational planning must be undertaken for the benefit of all citizens," Almstadt said. "Michigan's selection to be a part of this important study is a reflection of the close mutual support that all law enforcement agencies in our state traditionally have extended to one another."

The executive board of the Michigan Sheriffs Association will serve as the nucleus of a mutual aid "advisory council" which will monitor the progress of the study in Michigan, Almstadt said. The advisory council will include other law enforcement officers and government officials concerned with mutual aid.

The study, Almstadt explained, will examine existing mutual aid agreements in the state, any legislation affecting the formulation of such pacts and the legal and operational jurisdictions of law enforcement agencies within the state. It also will determine the extent of mutual aid planning efforts currently under way in Michigan and will analyze any local problems that may face mutual aid planning and implementation in the state. Case studies of successful mutual aid pacts in Michigan also will be prepared as part of the study.

The study is being funded through the National Sheriffs Association which has been awarded a grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) of the United States Department of Justice. Almstadt explained that the National Sheriffs Association ultimately will publish a model law enforcement mutual aid handbook which will assist law enforcement agencies in every state. Purpose of the handbook will be to help these agencies achieve a higher degree of cooperation and coordination in day-to-day operations and in a variety of emergency situations.

The handbook will include model legislation and guides for operational planning, Almstadt explained. In addition to the four state-wide surveys, the project also will draw upon the results of a questionnaire that has been distributed nationally

to 1,600 law enforcement officers, including sheriffs, chiefs of police, commanders of highway patrol units and public safety directors.

The Michigan phase of the study will be under way before the end of November, with the field inquiry work completed by February, Alm-

stadt said. The state's report to the National Sheriffs Association will be submitted immediately following the conclusion of the field inquiry work.

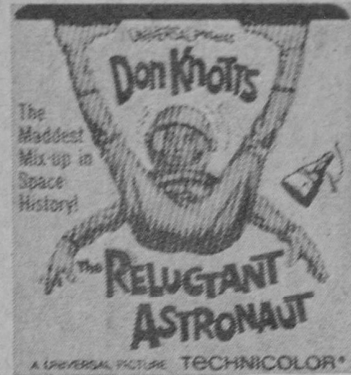

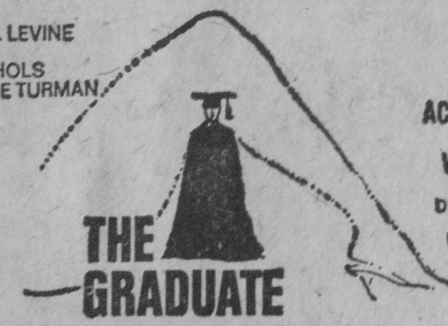

## State Motor Vehicle Money Distributed

Third quarter motor vehicle highway fund collections are now being distributed to Michigan counties, cities and villages, the state highway commission reports.

John P. Woodford, deputy director-chief engineer of the department of state highways, said net receipts of the highway fund during July, August and September of 1972 amounted to \$85,984,252, an increase of \$4,522,846 or 5.6 percent compared to the same period of 1971.

Inoco County's share was \$168,325, a \$9,793 increase over the same period last year. Shares to area cities included: East Tawas, \$9,650; Tawas City, \$6,453; Whittemore, \$1,775.

All state gasoline and diesel fuel taxes and license plate fees go to the motor vehicle highway fund.

After deduction of collection costs by the department of state and the share of 1.5 percent for the state waterways commission, the funds are distributed under the formula of 46 percent to the highway department, 34 percent to the 83 counties and 20 percent to the 530 incorporated cities and villages.

Under this formula, the highway department received \$39,552,756 as its share of the third quarter collections. Counties received \$29,234,645 and the cities and villages, \$17,196,850.

### SS Uses Many Ways to Certify Proof of Birth

Question: I have received notice that I do not have a birth certificate. I can apply to have a birth certificate established. Is a birth certificate required to prove my age with social security?

Answer: No. The Social Security Administration can use other proof of age if your birth was not recorded. Some of these are church records, school records, work records, census records, marriage records, children's birth certificates, etc. These are usually adequate to establish your date of birth.

Question: I am retiring on December 31, 1972, and wish to start receiving my benefits in January 1973. I am self-employed and will not be able to file my 1972 tax return until the first of April. Can I apply for social security benefits before I file my 1972 tax return? If I do file for benefits now, when will I get credit for my 1972 earnings?

Answer: You do not have to file your 1972 tax return before filing for benefits. Your benefit will be figured using your earnings through 1971. Your 1972 earnings will be credited later. Your benefit will be refigured automatically and any back benefits due you will be paid. The time required for this action varies from six to 18 months.

Question: I am planning to retire and file for social security benefits. What proofs do I need for my wife and two minor children?

Answer: Your children's birth certificates will definitely be required. They show both date of birth and the child's relationship to you. The social security numbers of your wife and children will also be needed. Be prepared to submit your marriage certificate and evidence of termination of any prior marriages if requested.

He now serves as vice commander of the United States Air Force School of Aviation Medicine.

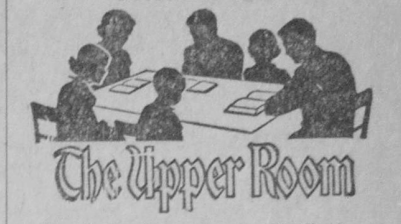
The colonel served during World War II and the Korean War.

### Family Living Education

Spills on the Thanksgiving tablecloth!

Do not despair—all is not lost if fast action is taken to remove the stains before they are set.

Here are some suggestions for treating the most common holiday-type stains.

For fruit stains, including cranberries, soak the area in warm water and enzyme pre-soak, then launder. If necessary and colors permit, launder again using chlorine bleach.

For gravy or milk stains, use an enzyme pre-soak with cool water or make a paste of detergent and wa-

ter and work that into the stain. Then launder. Should the stain remain, use a dry-cleaning solvent.

With stains from wine or soft drinks, soak with an oxygen bleach in the hottest water safe for the fabric, then launder. If necessary, launder again with a chlorine bleach if the color and fabric of the tablecloth permit.

Candle wax is difficult. Scrape off as much as possible, then press the stain between paper towels and press with a warm iron. Next, place the stain face downward on paper

towels and sponge the back with dry-cleaning solvent. Let dry, then launder. If the stain remains, launder again with an oxygen bleach after reading the box label. If the spot is still not removed and color and fabric type permit, launder finally with a chlorine bleach.

A few general hints are (1) test any stain remover on a corner of fabric first, (2) do not add chlorine bleach to any enzyme pre-soak product and (3) treat spots from the back of the fabric. Place the spot downward on some paper towels so that the stain will come off the fabric instead of going through it.

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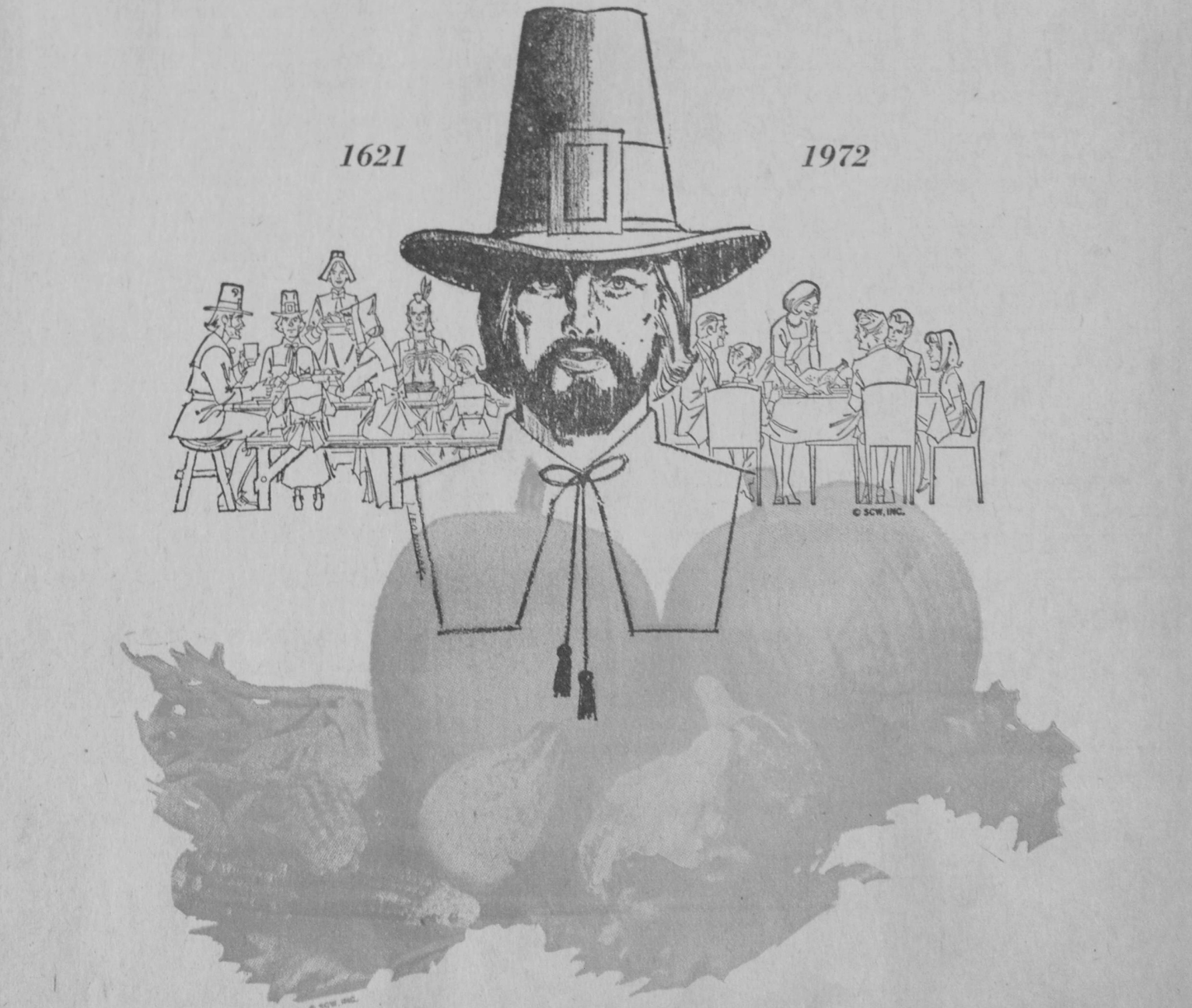

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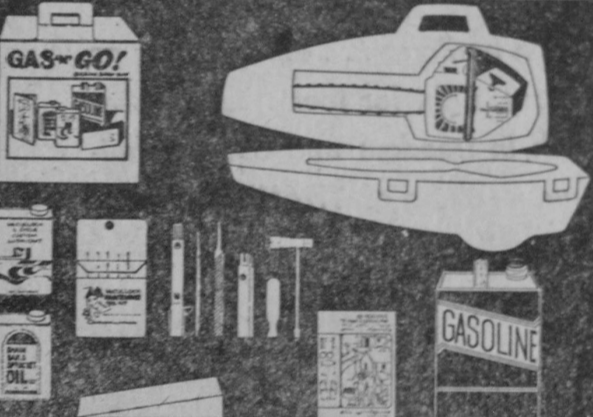

The law is now prefaced by "I will do my best," and follows with "to be honest, to be fair, to help where I am needed, to be cheerful, to be friendly and considerate, to be a sister to every girl scout, to respect authority, to use resources wisely, to protect and improve the world around me and to show respect for myself and others through my words and actions."

Active members who are 14 years of age or older are allowed to be members of the National Council. This will increase youth member participation in planning and decision-making. Prior to this, only active adults were eligible to be delegates of the National Council.

These new changes are effective immediately.
