

Commissioners Say Halfway House Is State Responsibility

Indicating that it believed supervision of probation offenders was a state responsibility, Iosco County Board of Commissioners last week unanimously turned down a proposal to act as the applicant for establishment here of a halfway house.

During discussion, commissioners pointed out that an application for a \$54,150 federal grant would provide operational funds for only one year and commissioners believed that any future operational funding should be a state responsibility.

It had been proposed to establish a halfway house to serve probation offenders in Iosco, Alcona, Oscoda and Arenac Counties. The proposed halfway house was to provide residential facilities and supervision for probation offenders from the four counties in the 17 to 25-year age group.

Clement Stephan, Tawas City commissioner, pointed out, too, that citizens had circulated petitions opposing location of a halfway house in the community.

In other business, the commission adopted an \$892,802 county operational budget for the year. With a valuation of \$126,485,512 and allocation of 4.8 mills, this will raise property taxes to \$607,130. Estimated income tax to be received from the state is \$100,000 and fees from county de-

partments is estimated at \$185,672. It is anticipated that the county will receive approximately \$200,000 in new federal revenue sharing during the current year, but there has been no information received on the revenue sharing bill and local officials are not certain as to possible federal "strings" being attached to the money. A county delegation is to attend a meeting this week to learn more about this bonanza. In addition to the money going to the county, it has been reported that \$60,546 would go to cities and \$104,592 to townships.

The new budget is \$163,754 higher than a year ago and \$38,875 more than the tentative budget approved last April.

Department expenditures include \$30,350 for the prosecuting attorney's office; county treasurer's office, \$30,760; county clerk's office, \$34,125; register of deed's office, \$29,690; sheriff's department, \$194,780; probate court, \$23,900; circuit court, \$22,800; equalization department, \$58,100; district court, \$45,070; board of commissioners, \$32,000; social welfare, \$40,000; jury commission, \$7,000.

Other appropriations include: Co-operative extension, \$15,900; planning commission, \$8,700; courthouse and grounds, \$37,562; ECE development district, \$1,112; Iosco-Arenac Regional Library, \$13,685; civil defense, \$1,500; district health, \$45,000; airport, \$12,000; county advertising, \$4,500;

Elections, \$2,500; allocation board, \$600; state institutions, \$38,000; apary inspection, \$280; veteran counselor, \$800; mental health, \$6,500; social security, \$18,000;

Retirement and hospital insurance, \$40,000; soldiers burial, \$10,000; plat board, \$500; coroners, \$3,000; county nurse, \$400; child care, \$18,500; historical work, \$1,000; friend of the court, \$6,940;

Parks and recreation matching funds, \$10,000; bridges, \$2,500; airport garage lease, \$8,000; drain commissioner, \$2,900; county park operation, \$5,000; parks and recreation administration, \$2,500; county department of public works, \$1,200; public improvement, \$31,000.

The commission appropriated \$225 to the Iosco County Historical Society to purchase an official state historical marker to be placed on US-23 overlooking United States Gypsum Company's quarry. In continuous operation since 1865, the quarry is included in the registry of state and national historical sites.

Richard Pfahl of Hale was named to succeed himself for a three-year term on the social services board. Henry Conley was reappointed to the county road commission.

The board of commissioners adopted a resolution recognizing the Fraternal Order of Police as a professional organization representing sheriff's department deputies. It was the opinion of the board's safety committee that any negotiations with the FOP be handled by the sheriff or his agent. It was stated that if negotiations between the FOP and sheriff could not be reached, then the county board of commissioners would enter negotiations.

Ralph Terber received a permit to construct a 26 by 36-foot dwelling on North Tawas Lake Road at an estimated cost of \$8,870.

Included in building applications approved during the past two weeks by the East Tawas Department of Public Works was one permit for construction of a new dwelling.

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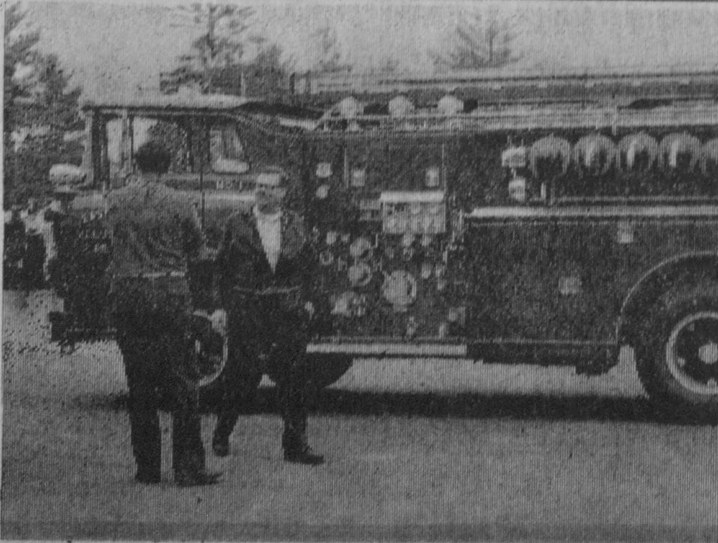
Three Larcenies Being Investigated

City Officials Meet Today With DNR on Launching Plan

Representatives of Tawas City and East Tawas are to meet today at Lansing with officials of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources in an effort to interest the state in establishment of a boat launching and parking site at the Tawas River mouth.

Mayor John Brugger told members of the Tawas City Council Mon-

day night that he met briefly with area legislators last Tuesday during discussion on improvements to the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock at East Tawas. In addition, he talked to representatives of the Michigan Waterways Commission and the United States Army Corps of Engineers.

The mayor said that those with whom he met were receptive to the proposal and that the DNR had been trying to establish a launching site on Tawas Bay for the past several years, but a suitable location had not been found. He emphasized, however, that he had received no affirmative action on his proposal and that the plan was still in the early stage of preliminary discussion.

Alpena Man Killed Friday in US-23 Crash

Steven John Schmanski, 18, Alpena, became Iosco County's seventh traffic fatality victim during a crash Friday afternoon, six miles south of River Road in AuSable Township.

Schmanski was a passenger in a vehicle driven by Arthur Zaska, Alpena, which was southbound and ran off the left side of the road, then crossed over to the opposite side of the road and rolled over several times.

Zaska was treated for injuries at Tawas Hospital.

The crash remains under investigation by Oscoda-AuSable Township Police Department.

Burglars Hit Keiser's Drug Store Again

A quantity of narcotics and cash was stolen sometime Monday night or early Tuesday morning in a burglary at Keiser's Drug Store, Tawas City. The burglars forced their way into the building through a skylight in the roof.

The burglary was discovered at 7:35 a. m. by Hugo J. Keiser, owner, when he opened the store. An immediate investigation was started by Iosco Sheriff's Department.

This is the second time within the past month that the store has been burglarized and narcotics stolen. A number of other pharmacies in Northeastern Michigan have been victimized during the same period.

During the past three weeks, the city utilized ideas contained in its master plan developed nearly 10 years ago by the city's planning consultant to outline a basic development plan at the river mouth.

The plan proposed that the state utilize recreational bond money to purchase 900 feet of lakefront property east from the river mouth and along US-23. The preliminary design would include a protected area on the bay as well as in the river in launching boats. In addition, there would be parking sites for 100 boats and trailers and 100 parking spots for river bank fishermen.

The mayor said that reception of this proposal by the DNR would depend greatly on the thinking of its submerged lands division, inasmuch as considerable fill would be required for the parking area. If the present plan was not acceptable, the mayor said that parking could be shifted closer to the river mouth.

The area being considered includes the old Graystone building and a commercial building owned by Grace Lubaway, as well as river mouth property still owned by the old Tawas Yacht Club. It is proposed that a tourist information center be located in the Lubaway building.

Brugger said that it was impossible to estimate the cost of this proposed project at the present time. He said that if the DNR would participate in the development, 95 percent matching funds would be available.

The city presently operates a boat launching area north of the river mouth along Ninth Avenue. The city manager reported that these facilities had been utilized for launching 314 boats during the past several week-ends. The area is limited because of the lack of adequate parking facilities.

Council Approves Liquor Change at Tawas Lanes

Addition of a concourse area to the liquor license at Tawas Lanes was given unanimous approval Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

This action followed a resolution two weeks ago which tabled an application from H. R. Hilbert, owner, to the Michigan Liquor Control Commission. The council requested Hil-

bert to appear at Monday night's meeting in order to further explain his proposed change in the tavern license.

Hilbert said that the proposed concourse area would be 14 feet in depth and 60 feet wide extending from the back of seats in the bowling alley to the wall of the lounge. Tables and chairs would be located in that area and, under terms of the state license, patrons would be allowed to consume alcoholic beverages in the concourse strip.

Hilbert told councilmen that he would use his judgment as to when alcoholic beverages would be served in the area. "We have church and children's groups patronizing our facilities, for instance, and I do not think it would be appropriate to allow serving of alcoholic beverages at that time," said Hilbert. "I would not jeopardize my business for booze and the proposed concourse area would be supervised."

The owner said that a temporary wall in the building was now being removed and lockers were to be moved to a new area, thus enlarging the seating capacity in the concourse area.

Councilman Edward Savage, who suggested the tabling action at the last meeting, said he was not particularly concerned about the change during league nights, but he did express concern that alcoholic beverages should not be served in the concourse area during periods of open bowling when children use the facilities or during children's leagues.

Several Cases of Ringworm Are Reported

A report from Tawas Area Elementary Schools Monday warns parents that several cases of ringworm have been noticed among elementary school children. Although prompt attention was given to the first few cases and the source identified and controlled, the condition is easily transferred and there are now new incidents.

School authorities ask parents to observe children carefully and be alert for the appearance of sores anywhere on the body or scalp. Dogs and cats are frequently the source of contamination.

For the protection of the general school population, it is necessary that those children having the condition not return to school until the sores have disappeared or a note from a physician states the child is approved to return to school.

It was stated that casual contacts of day to day living may cause the infection to spread to all members of a household.

Budget Hearing Set November 13

Tawas Area School announced Monday that a hearing on the 1972-73 operational budget would be held Monday, November 13, 7:00 p. m., at the administration office, East Tawas Elementary Unit.

Council Grants Wage Increases

An hourly increase of 20 cents paid to six employees and a five percent increase for four salaried employees was approved Monday night by the Tawas City Council. Tentative approval had been given at a special meeting last week.

Pay of one laborer would be increased from \$2.75 to \$2.95 per hour, a second laborer's pay would be increased from \$2.85 to \$3.05 per hour, wages of three truck drivers would be increased from \$2.95 to \$3.15 per hour and one equipment operator's wage would be increased from \$3.15 to \$3.35 per hour.

Increases for salaried employees were as follows: Foreman, from \$7,700 to \$8,085 per year; secretary, from \$4,000 to \$4,200 per year; librarian, from \$2,350 to \$2,467.50 per year; city manager, from \$10,000 to \$10,500 per year.

The city would pay the Blue Cross premium of 100 percent on employees.

The city manager was to have met yesterday (Tuesday) concerning specifications for submitting pro-

posals on a city retirement plan. Voting in favor of the increases were Alderman Chester Smyczynski, Clark Tanner, William Groff Jr., Edward Savage and James Lansky. Alderman Robert N. Rollin opposed the schedule.

In other business, authorization was given to resubmit advertising for bids on a new police patrol car, following changes in specifications developed by the city manager.

A proposed city ordinance requested by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources which would be identical to state law which prohibits travel of boats in the Tawas River above a no wake speed was turned over to the ordinance committee for consideration. Named to the special committee were Lansky, Groff and Smyczynski.

It was reported that the city still awaits approval on three permits for construction of two bridges across the Tawas River. A special meeting is to be held next Monday night to receive bids on tax anticipation bonds for construction of the bridges.

AS PART of the observance of National Fire Prevention Week, an unrehearsed fire drill was held Friday at Tawas Area High School. Members of Tawas City and East Tawas volunteer fire departments were unaware that an alarm called in at 9:52 a. m. was a test of the capabilities of

those two departments. The first truck arrived at the scene within eight minutes and 20 seconds. Supt. Edward J. Barry said that students completely cleared the building within 34 seconds. Participating in the drill was an ambulance from Tawas Hospital.—Tawas Herald Photos.

Many gifts were received including a three-tier wedding cake made by their niece, Sharon Koehler of Oscoda.

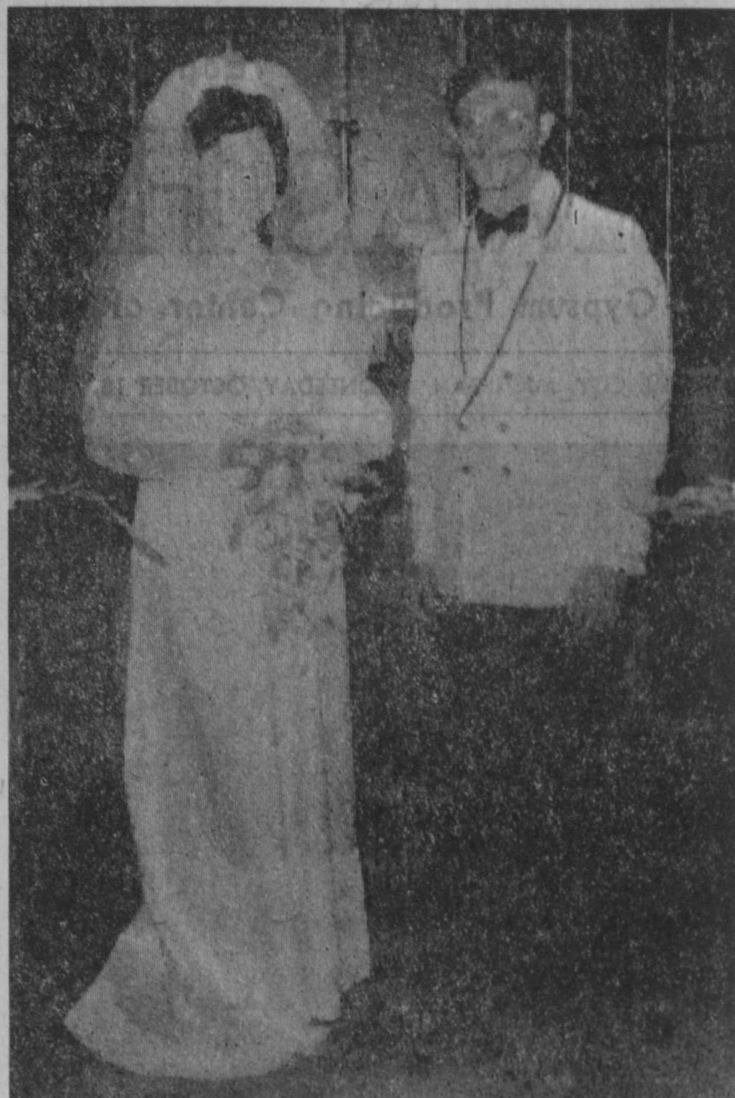
Now Certified As Internist

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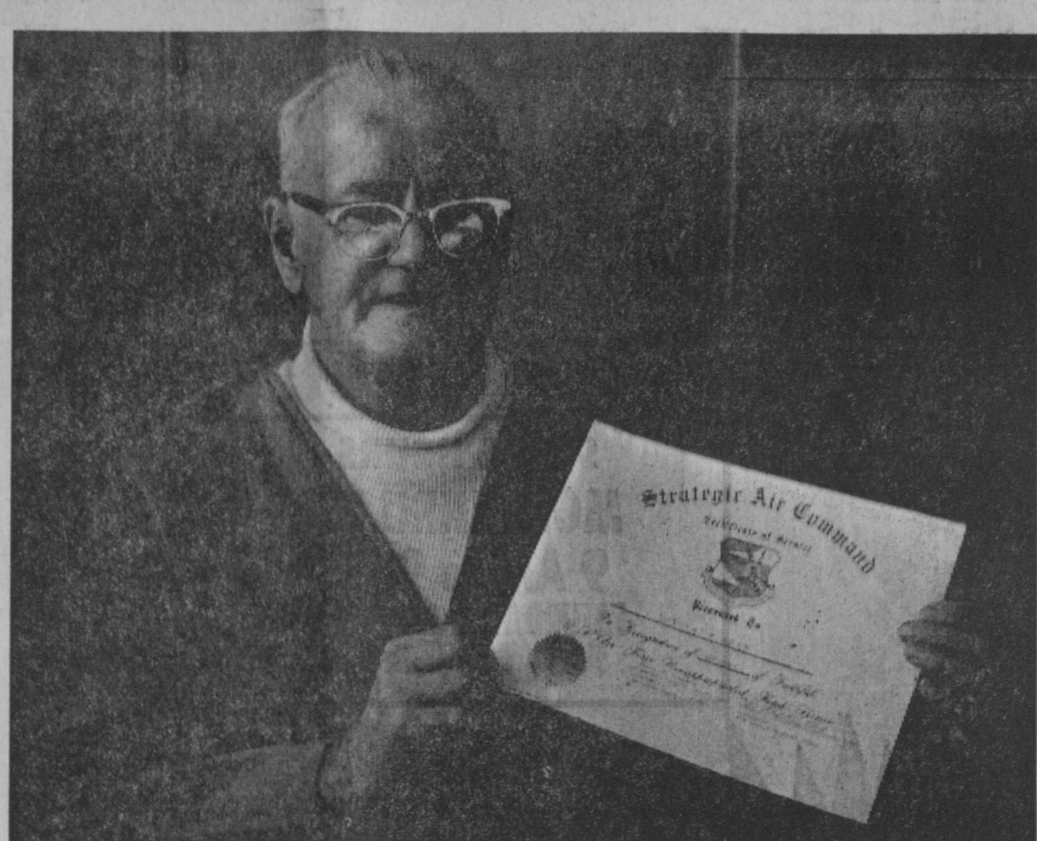

Born September 13, 1893, in Ashland, Wisconsin, she moved to Saginaw as a child and resided in Whittemore for over 50 years.

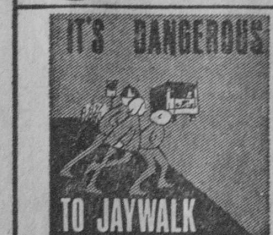

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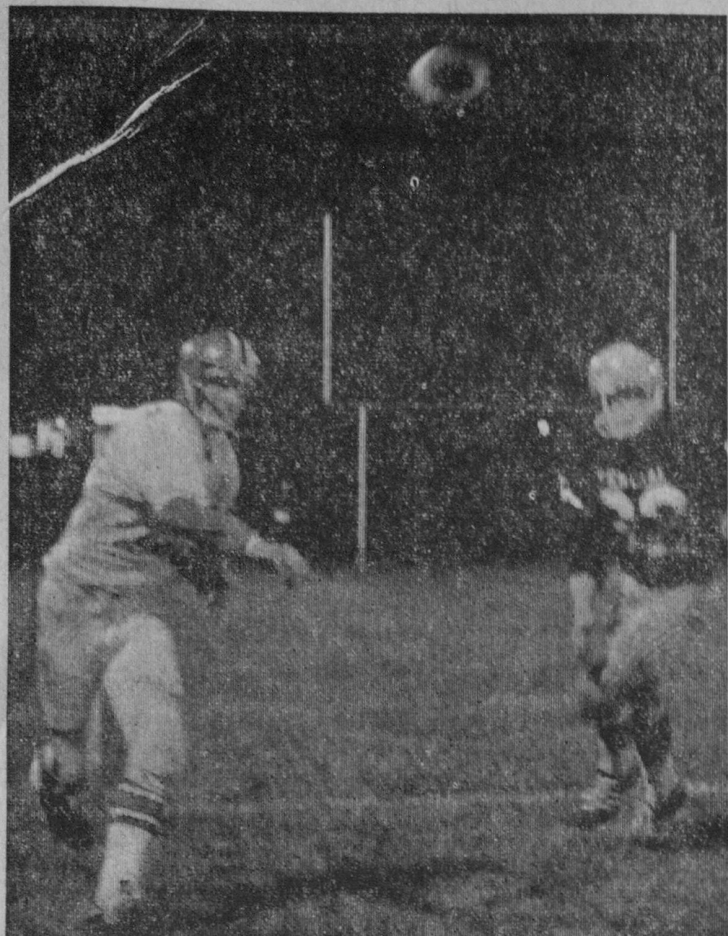

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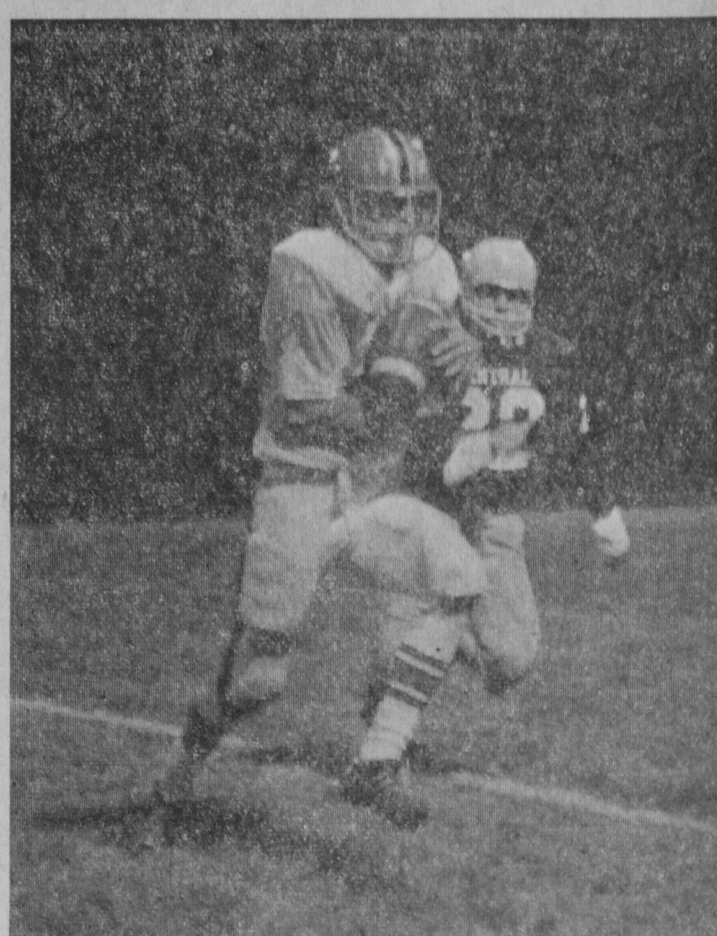

Tawas Area Braves Downed Standish-Sterling Panthers

Playing with nearly an entirely new backfield Friday night, Tawas Area Braves put the damper on Standish-Sterling Central's homecoming festivities with a 20-6 victory.

Junior fullback Mike Hughes, the only holdover from the starting backfield at the opening of the season, turned in a brilliant running performance and two touchdowns before being sidelined with an injury in the second quarter.

Hughes joined Steve Janego, hard running halfback and co-captain, along with Tackle John Pfeiffer, who did not dress for the game because of injuries. Tawas' coaching staff is hoping to see these three players return to action, along with Greg Hackborn, who has been out with an injury.

Turning in an outstanding performance in his first starting role as quarterback was Mickey Haglund, a sophomore moved up from the junior varsity earlier in the week. Although inexperienced in varsity play, Haglund showed some good moves and turned in some good passes during the night.

After Hughes was sidelined about midway in the second quarter, the Braves had to do some scrambling to keep an offense rolling as players filling unfamiliar roles just have not learned their play assignments as yet. The Tawas defense, too, took its knocks because of inexperience, but should improve as the season progresses.

Playing against a weak Central team, whose fortunes are expected to improve next season on the strength of some great undefeated junior varsity talent, Tawas Area scored a touchdown the first time the Braves got their hands on the ball.

Hughes took the opening kickoff for four yards and the ball wound up on the Tawas 40 because of a Central penalty. On the next play, Hughes found running room and scampered to the Central two-yard line. He punched over for a touchdown on the next play and the Braves had their first touchdown with 11 minutes, 15 seconds remaining in the first quarter. The run for point after touchdown was stopped and Tawas Area held a 6-0 lead.

Paul Brinkman's kickoff was returned to Central's 31, but the Panthers' running game was stopped on third down with a good tackle by Pete Sutton. Tawas Area took over on its own 45 after a Central punt. The Braves could get nowhere in three plays and a Standish-Sterling defender blocked Al LaBlanc's punt, the ball being recovered on Tawas' 31.

From that point, Standish-Sterling tied the game on some hard running by Schuetzler and a 13-yard pass from Franklin to Whitum. Franklin went the final six yards to score with five minutes, 13 seconds remaining in the first quarter. The try for PAT was stopped by the Tawas Area defense.

Chris O'Driscoll returned the kickoff to Tawas' 40 and the Braves were on their way to another touchdown. Rob Elliott picked up three yards on the first play, followed by four yards by Hughes on the second play. Hughes picked up a first down to Central's 46 and Haglund moved all the way to the 10-yard line on a keeper. Tawas' backfield battered the Central line as Hughes went for two yards. Rick Burris carried the ball to the five and Haglund sneaked to the two. On fourth down, Hughes cracked over for the touchdown with 56 seconds remaining in the quarter. The PAT attempt was stopped and Tawas Area had a 12-6 lead.

Central had the ball for three plays after the kickoff, but Stephenson intercepted a Ward pass at midfield and returned the ball to the 39 just as the quarter ended. On the first play from scrimmage, Haglund zeroed in on Elliott with a good pass and Elliott carried to Central's 10. Hughes cracked through for three yards and Elliott scored his first touchdown on a reverse, the clock reading 10 minutes, 59 seconds remaining in the half. Haglund posted the PAT on a quarterback sneak and that ended the scoring for the night.

Haglund was to hit Elliott with another good pass for a 15-yard gain, but that ended any scoring threat for the Braves in the first half.

Central penetrated to Tawas Area's 30 in the third quarter, but the drive ended there when the Braves recovered a fumble. Don Backus intercepted a pass for the Braves in the fourth quarter, but the Braves just could not get an offense rolling again because of mix-ups on plays.

Good defensive performances were turned in by LaBlanc, Steve Anschuetz, Neil Robelli and O'Driscoll.

Tawas Area will play host to a tough Gladwin squad during the annual homecoming this Friday night.

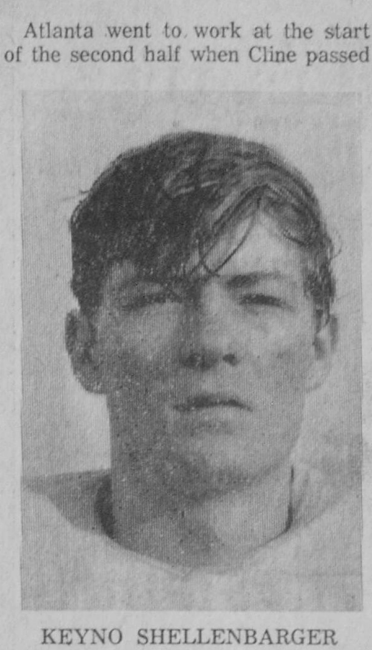
Atlanta Surprised Hale A. Eagles With 30-0 Shutout

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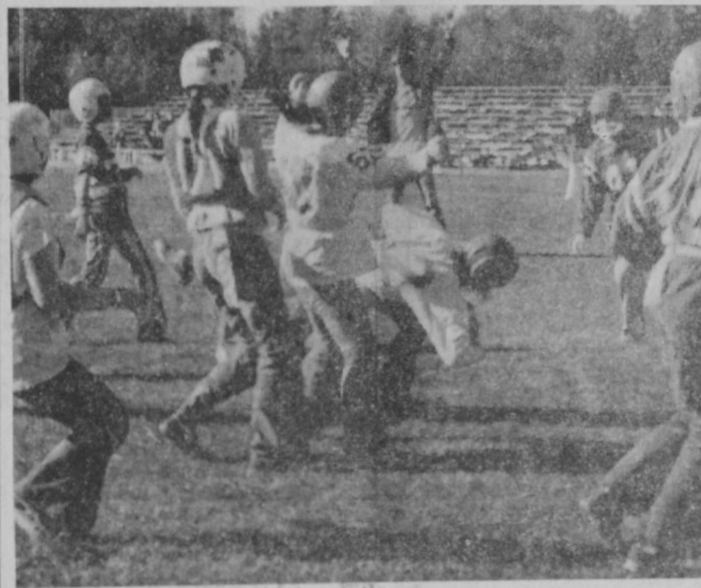
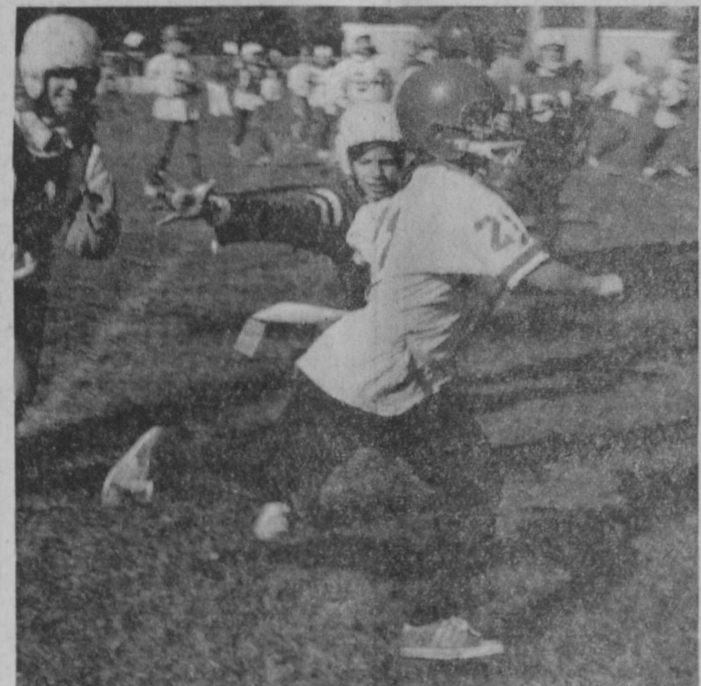

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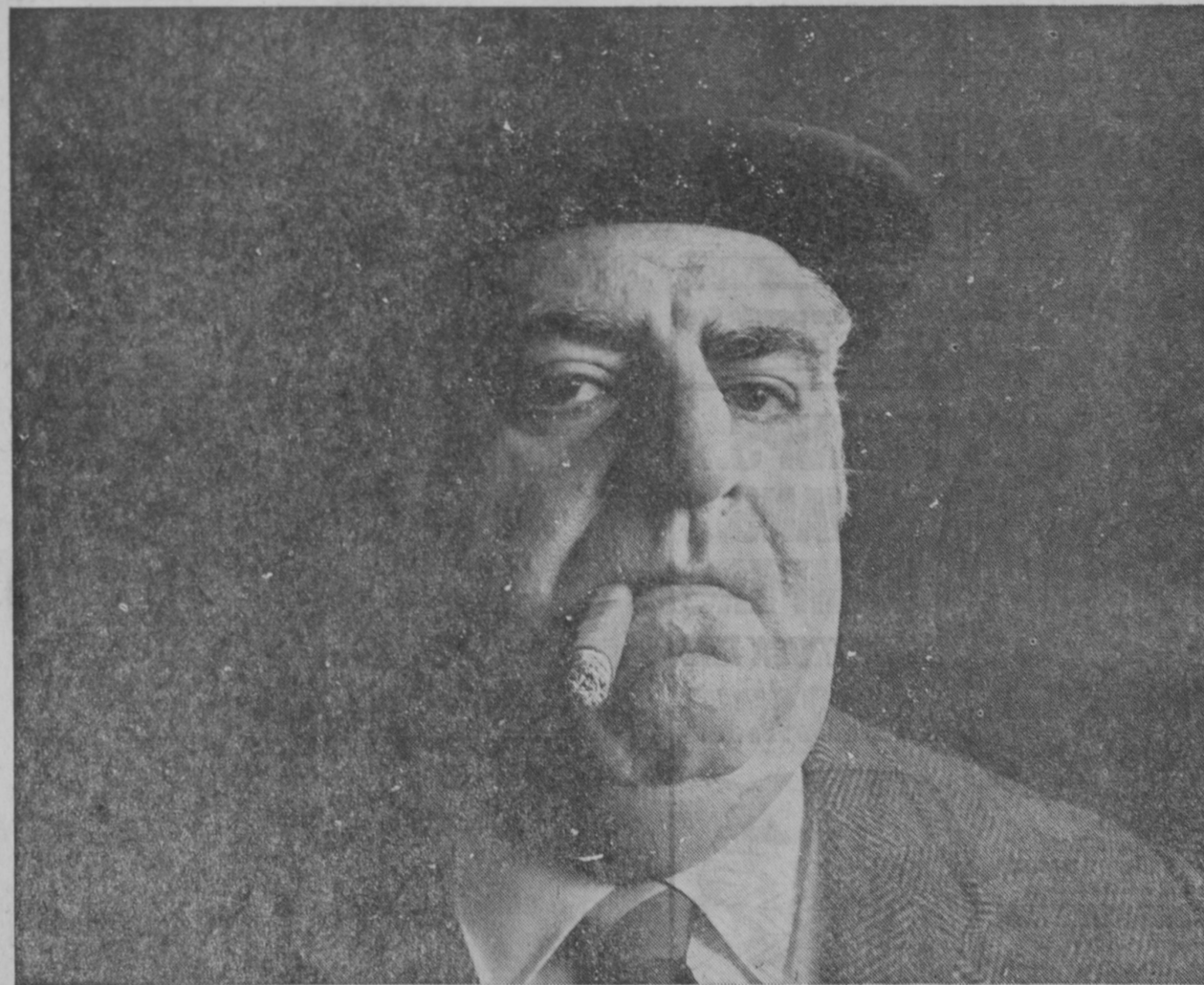

Area School Children Learn About Conservation During Recent Tour

More than 700 Isosco County youngsters participated in the recent conservation tour at the Rifle River Recreation Area, sponsored by Isosco Soil Conservation Service and county 4-H Clubs.

During the two-day tour, school children had the opportunity to study nature and speakers provided specific knowledge in four different areas.

Schools represented were as follows: Tawas Area School, fifth and sixth grades; Emanuel Lutheran School, fifth grade; St. Joseph School, fifth and sixth grades; Hale Area School, fifth and sixth grades; Oscoda Area School, fifth and sixth grades.

Speakers included Donald Peters, Department of Natural Resources fire officer; Mio, Keith Finnerty, DNR law officer, West Branch; Jerry Weinrich, DNR wildlife habitat biologist, West Branch; and Willard Bosserman, county extension director, Roscommon; Carl Slosser, supervisor of the DNR's Rifle River Recreation Area; David Diltz, DNR regional naturalist, Roscommon.

Peters talked about forest fires and their damage, demonstrating equipment used by DNR fire fighters. Finnerty had many traps to show youngsters and how trapping of

various animals is done and why. He had pellets of Michigan animals for display.

Weinrich and Bosserman discussed the forest, its history and value to man. Youngsters had the opportunity to ask many questions. The use of state parks and their value was the subject of Slosser's talk.

Diltz conducted nature hikes throughout the two days where

youngsters learned tree and plant identification and basic ecology.

Each year, 4-H Clubs and the Soil Conservation Service coordinate efforts to plan this tour. Each group feels that conservation education is extremely important today. A follow up program with educational materials, technical assistance and an Earth Week fair is held during the year.

weeks ago, no where in that letter did it state that I was for or against a half-way house in Isosco County, but only where it was to be located (in a residential area). It is to my understanding that Tawas City or East Tawas was the location to be selected. Just what street this half-way house is to be on, has not as yet been brought to light.

In your letter, Mrs. Snyder, twice you mention young people. This half-way house is not for young people. As it was stated by Mr. Jansen in the paper, the 17 to 25 years of age

and older would be in the half-way house. The 18 to 25 year age group are adults, not young people.

As our young people reach adulthood, it would seem that they would take on the responsibility that goes with being adults, but in this day and age (and I am not just speaking about our county), some do not want responsibility, they want freedom to do their thing. When it comes to accept their responsibility, they want no part of it. If our adults would accept their responsibility in life, we would not need a half-way house in Isosco County, would we?

Furthermore, if the Isosco Board of Commissioners in Isosco County feels that a half-way house is a must, I say buy a piece of land out in the country, let these adults learn to work the land, thus learning responsibility.

We can hope if this half-way house ever becomes a reality, that there is expert supervision, as the first gentleman that was chosen for the job had spent 17 years in Jackson Prison, and while waiting for the half-way house to progress, allegedly robbed one of your fine stores in Whittemore, and has since no longer been seen or heard from.

As you mention, Mrs. Snyder, about new born children: First they crawl and then they walk. I feel this half-way house is neither crawling or walking, but leaping on a dead

run. It should be studied, planned and carefully looked into before dropping it into the midst of our community, and to my knowledge, has been only talked about for the past six months. So why invest in this type of program until every stone has been returned?

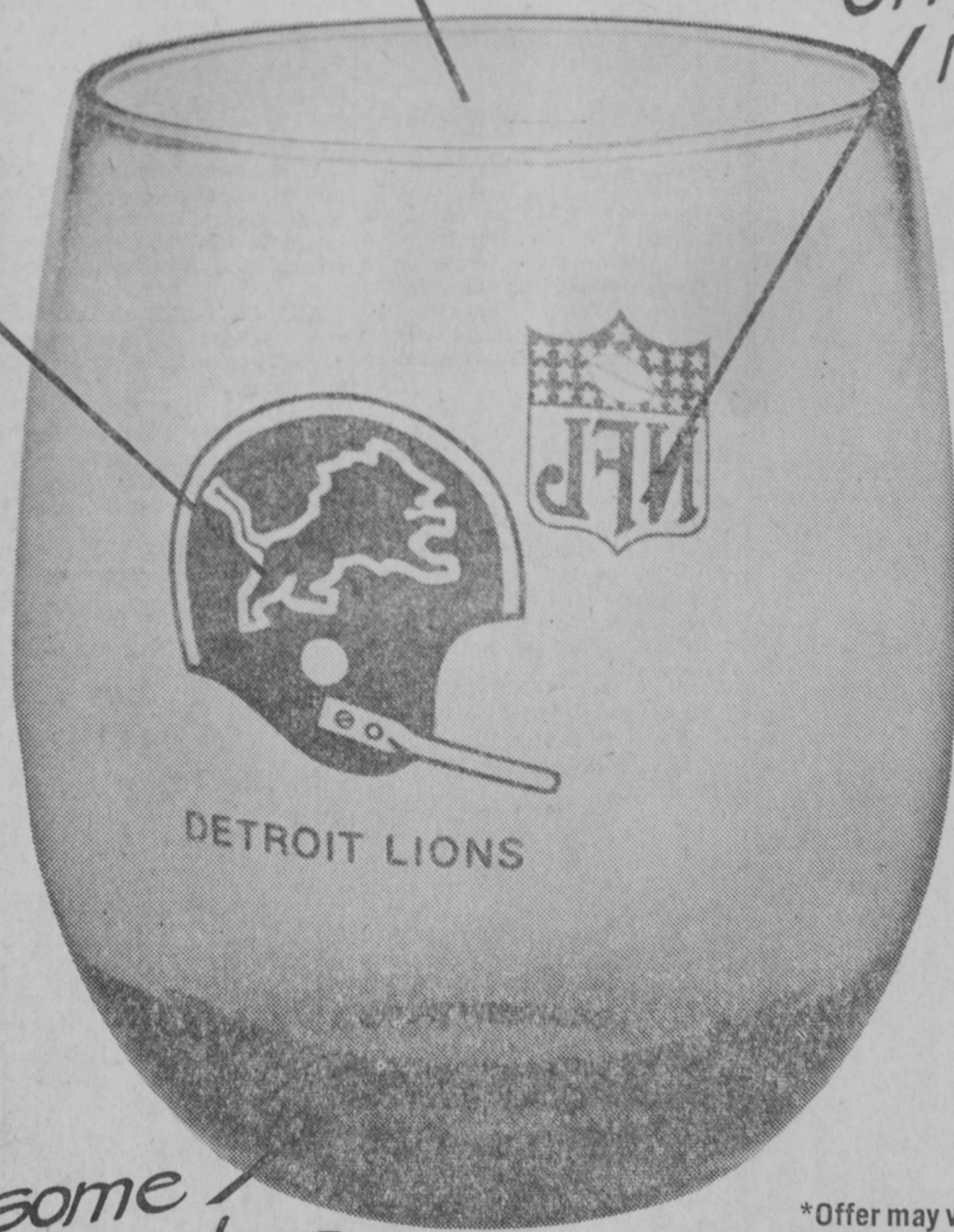

Marriage Does Not Cancel SS Benefit Checks

Question: I'm 64 and for several years I've been getting monthly social security payments based on my late husband's work record. Now I'm planning to remarry and the man I'm marrying is getting monthly retirement checks. After I'm married, will I continue to get payments?

Answer: Yes, you will continue to get monthly checks after you remarry, and the amount of your monthly checks may increase. Call, write or visit your social security office to notify them as soon as you remarry.

Question: My wife recently had a stroke that left her with a severe speech problem. She is 66 now. If she gets speech therapy at home through home health visits, will our medicare coverage pay for it?

Answer: Yes, Medicare will pay for up to 100 home health visits each calendar year—if your wife needs speech therapy, if she is confined to her home, and if her doctor has determined she needs home health care and sets up and periodically reviews a plan for the care. Also, the home health agency must be one that participates in medicare.

Question: I'm 19 and a college sophomore. My mother who worked under social security was paying almost all my college expenses before she died a couple weeks ago. Is there any way I could get some financial help for my education from social security?

Answer: You may be eligible for monthly students payments if your mother worked long enough in employment or self-employment covered by social security. If you are single and a full-time student, you should call, write or visit any social security office immediately to apply for student benefits.

Question: I'm 36 and get monthly social security disability payments. I got married last week. My wife has children by a previous marriage. Will they be able to get monthly payments too?

Answer: After you've been married for one year, your wife and stepchildren can get benefits until the children reach 18. Your stepchildren can get benefits until they are 22 if they are unmarried and attend school full time. Any child born after the marriage is eligible from the time the child is born. In this case, your wife would also be entitled beginning with the month of the child's birth.



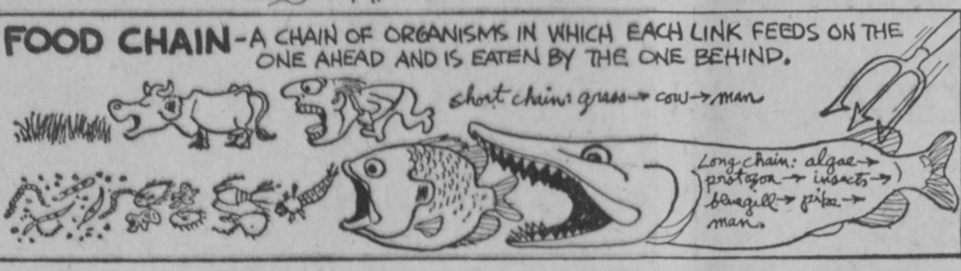
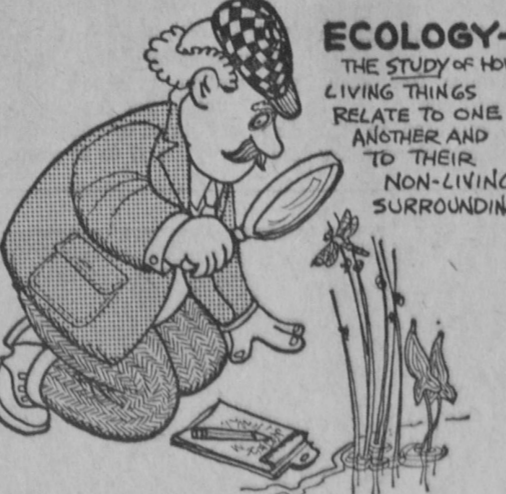

Iosco Reduces Millage; State Ups Valuation

15 Years Ago—

October 17, 1957—A preliminary budget of \$172,998 was adopted by the Iosco County Board of Supervisors. The county's state equalized valuation is \$42,197,200, following a 10 percent increase added by the state. The board of supervisors and allocation board have held the line on taxation by reducing millage in line with the state's increase.

Approximately 200 high school students were absent from classrooms and the same number in the elementary department Monday morning at Tawas Area School because of the "flu bug." The junior varsity football game has been canceled in order that members of the Junior Braves may fill vacancies on the varsity squad caused by illness.

A service of institution will be conducted for the Rev. Paul Sutton, new rector of Christ Episcopal Church.

Chief of Police George Ruth warns residents that a Tawas City ordinance prohibits the use of firearms within the city. The chief said the ordinance was established for the protection of life, limb and property and would be strictly enforced.

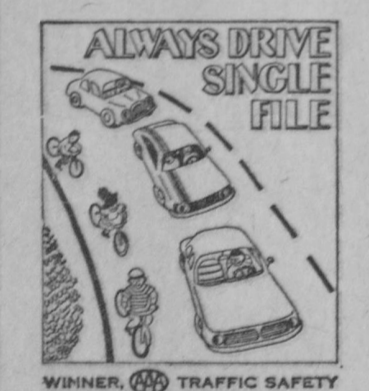

Michigan's 1972 duck season runs statewide from October 6 through November 24 under a daily 100-point system of regulating hunter take. In a change from last season, canvasbacks and redhead ducks aren't on this year's shooting list because of their seriously scant populations. In 1971, both species were Michigan's top value birds, each carrying a point rating of 100 per day which reflected their low numbers. Except for the cease fire on canvasbacks and redhead ducks, this fall's point system in Michigan will work as it did last season, giving the highest rating—and greatest protection—to those birds in shortest supply. The daily point value for each bird is shown above. Under the point system, Michigan duck hunters will have to stop shooting each day when the last bird they take gives them a point total adding up to or exceeding 100 points.

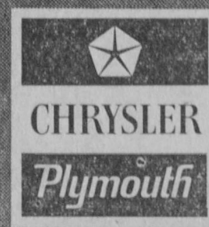
