Seek Community Involvement

Committees to Study TA School Needs

Community involvement in a comprehensive study of educational needs and advice on direction to meet those needs was commenced Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education and Supt. Edward J. Barry.

As the result of discussion during the regular monthly meeting, each board member is to name at least five persons to act on various committees. Membership on committees is not limited to selection by board members and all citizens are welcome to volunteer their services.

In addition, Tawas Area Education Association has been asked to submit

a list of members and citizens who would be willing to work on committees. Membership on each committee would include at least one teacher.

Barry stressed that a good cross section of the community should be involved in this study. He said that committees should include concerned citizens "both for and against schools." He said that housewives, in particular, should be active in the study.

The superintendent said there was no magic number concerning membership on committees as "we cannot anticipate the contribution by anyone. We need a deep, broad spec-

trum of involvement to get the answers," he stated.

Barry, who is to act as coordinator for the study, said that each person named would be interviewed individually to determine if he desired to serve in this study. "I am asking for a lot of work by the citizens, but this is necessary. We can uncover a lot of rocks through individual involvement and there is no better time than the present to kick this off," said Barry.

In addition to involvement by the community, Barry said that the program would require input by the board of education to determine if

the community and the board of education has the same priorities. Any final decision would still be the responsibility of the board of education, which would be guided by a written report compiled by the committees.

Committees would study classrooms available, enrollment projections, financial considerations, short term and long term goals in curricu-

lum and age group structures. In addition, committees would investigate the year around school concept and its implications from this school district.

While Barry felt that a site committee should not be appointed at this time, he believed that the board of education should name other areas where community committees can be used.

He said that particular appointments should include people from the county equalization office; county, township and city planning and zoning members; members of industrial development groups, as well as persons representing social services, service clubs, extension clubs, senior citizens, booster clubs, cooperative extension personnel, Farm Bureau members and all concerned citizens.

TA Board-Teachers Ratify New Contract

Opening of school was delayed two days last week as tentative agreement on a new contract was reached Wednesday night between Tawas Area Board of Education and Tawas Area Education Association.

Following Tuesday's strike by teachers, the fall term officially opened Thursday morning and normal school schedules were conducted Friday.

Formal ratification of the new master contract was given Monday night by the board of education and teachers approved the new contract Tuesday afternoon.

Settlement was reached after a six-hour bargaining session Wednesday between the board of education and TAEA negotiators, with the aid of a state mediator, Robert Rombouts of Traverse City.

All unresolved issues were settled when a recommendation by Rombouts was accepted at the bargaining table and later favorably received informally by board members and teachers.

The 78 teachers in the association had voted last week to strike the system, the first time in history, because four non-salary issues were still unresolved. The teachers had struck for inclusion of binding arbitration in the grievance procedure, but dropped that demand in the settlement. A joint board of education and teacher committee has been established to study the class size problem.

Compromises were worked out on extra duty pay and preparation time issues which had been unresolved.

A salary schedule, which had been worked out previously, is as follows: Starting pay for a teacher with a bachelor degree is \$7,900, as compared to \$7,700 last year. The schedule is in 10 steps and a teacher at the top of the schedule with 10 years experience would receive \$12,000.

A teacher with a bachelor degree with 18 hours of study toward a master degree in his area of teaching would have a starting salary of \$8,100 and a top of \$12,300.

A teacher with a master degree or with a bachelor degree plus 35 hours would have a starting salary of \$8,350 and a top of \$13,005.

A teacher with a master degree plus 15 hours, or one with a bachelor degree plus 50 hours would have a starting salary of \$8,550 and a top of \$13,311.

Salary schedule for the second year is as follows: Starting pay for a bachelor degree would be \$8,100 with a top of \$12,450; a teacher with a bachelor degree plus 18 hours would receive \$8,300 with a top of \$12,750; a teacher with a master degree or a bachelor degree plus 35 hours would receive \$8,550 with a top of \$13,464; a teacher with a master degree plus 15 hours or a teacher with a bachelor degree plus 50 hours would start at \$8,750 with a top of \$13,770.

Teachers qualifying would receive \$44 a month for full family insurance, as compared to a monthly payment of \$38 last year. Pay under the extra duty schedule is to remain the same as last year and is to be reopened next year.

Pipe Wrappers Stop Work on Hale School With Strike

Work has been stopped on construction of Hale Area School District's new junior and senior high school since last Friday when pipe wrappers threw up a picket line. Workmen of other trades have honored the picket line and work on the building, about 70 percent of which is completed, has stalled.

The pipe wrappers, who have been on strike around the state for the past six weeks, threw up the picket line when it was found that some of the pipes being used in construction had been wrapped by others.

Supt. Paul Keene said Tuesday that he had contacted the school's attorney, the building contractor and architect in order to get some agreement with the union's business manager. No success was reported as of yesterday.

The stoppage affects approximately 35 workmen.

"All the students and the entire community are anxious to get into this new building. Our present facilities are overcrowded and it is just a shame that something cannot be done," said Keene.

The school construction was delayed about six weeks earlier in the year because of the lack of structural steel.

"Taking everything into consideration, the building could be completed in about two months," said Keene.

Keene said that the two pickets at the school, who had been "imported" to stop work on the school, would be picketed Wednesday afternoon by elementary school youngsters. The children will be carrying signs protesting the work stoppage and asking

that work resume in order that the buildings may be utilized.

Board Checks Ownership Of Old School

Tawas Area Board of Education, which announced at its last meeting that it intended to sell the old Anshuetz School property, is to investigate further into ownership of the property.

Since its announcement, school officials learned that title of the property may not be in the hands of the school district and once use of the old school for storage purposes terminates, the property may revert to the deed holder.

In any event, the school is planning to hold an auction sale of surplus desks and equipment stored in the building. Investigation is to be made into the possibility of contributing one desk to Joseph Barkman for his display of historical articles and a request for one desk has been received from the City of East Tawas for historical purposes.

In other business, the board of education is to decide September 25 on hiring a firm to appraise all equipment in school buildings. This would provide an inventory which presently is not available and would be invaluable in case of any loss. Initial cost of the appraisal would be \$2,400 with an annual cost of 10 percent of that figure.

The board of education went on record as supporting establishment of a head start center in this area by the Alpena Office of Economic Opportunity. It was stated that the head start program is important and the school would cooperate with this agency in any way possible.

Concern over transportation problems involving the vocational training shared time program is to be studied by the administration and board of education. Some of the schools involved are working out arrangements with individual students to drive private cars to the four schools, while one school transports all students by school bus. The opinion was expressed that school buses should be utilized to avoid lawsuit or possible community censure in the event of an accident involving private cars driven by students.

Transportation directors named were Norma Worsham, who has charge of clerical work, and Robert King, who is to be responsible for coordinating maintenance.

Due to overcrowded conditions on some buses, the school is to investigate the purchase of two buses. It was stated that several buses were exceeding load restrictions and were to be stopped Wednesday. Until additional buses are acquired, some will be making two trips to pick up students.

Roger Spencer was appointed to the new position of faculty manager for the ensuing year.

The junior high school is to name its own student council this year. Robert McDonald, assistant principal, said that students and teachers were enthusiastic about this change as junior high school members of the high school student council are usually ignored.

Many New Students, but Gain Is Slight

Although many new students have been enrolled in Tawas Area School for the first time this fall, the net gain in the total school enrollment has only been 10 students.

Reports at Monday night's meeting of the board of education indicated that there are 62 new students in junior and senior high school and 45 new pupils in the elementary grades. This increase has nearly been offset by other families moving out of the area.

Principals of both secondary and elementary schools said that enrollment fluctuations could be expected during the next few days as some students in the upper grades will drop out of school and others, who have not registered as yet, will be returning. The fourth Friday count on September 22 will be the official enrollment figure for state reimbursement purposes.

As of Monday, total enrollment in the junior and senior high school was 1,109, as compared to 1,103 on the fourth Friday last year. Total enrollment for elementary grades was 933, as compared to 929 last year.

Last year's sixth grade showed its usual increase as it moved into the seventh grade, from 132 students last year to 161 students this year. This

is caused by the fact that local parochial schools do not have seventh grades. Last year's seventh grade picked up nine students as it moved into the eighth grade with 199, last year's eighth grade jumped from 185 to 196 as it moved into the ninth grade.

Last year's ninth grade enrollment of 202 students remained the same as it moved into the 10th grade. "Drop outs" begin showing up in the next class as last year's 10th grade dropped from 186 students to 180 students in this year's 11th grade. Last year's 11th grade dropped from 173 to 157 students in this year's 12th grade.

Enrollment by grades show a minus 29 students in the seventh grade, an increase of 14 students in the eighth grade, and minus six students in the ninth grade, an increase of 16 students in the 10th grade, an increase of seven students in the 11th grade and an increase of three students in the 12th grade.

Enrollment in elementary grades showed a total of 112 kindergarten pupils (53 at East Tawas and 59 at Tawas City), as compared to 115 last year; the first grade numbers 102 students (76 at East Tawas and 26 at Tawas City), as compared to 115 last year; the second grade numbers 124 pupils (96 at East Tawas and 28 at Tawas City), as compared to 120 last year; the third grade has 121 students (92 at East Tawas and 29 at Tawas City), as compared to 119 last year; the fourth grade numbers 136 pupils (103 at East Tawas and 33 at Tawas City), as compared to 160 last year.

The fifth and sixth grades, both at Tawas City, showed substantial increases. The fifth grade jumped from 146 students to 168 and the sixth grade jumped from 132 to 153.

John Alexander, high school principal, said that delivery of three used portable classrooms had been delayed because of weather conditions. Alexander said that the mover had been unable to get on the site where the portables are located because of wet weather. He said that the school had been told that delivery would be made this week, depending on weather conditions.


Two of the 24 by 40-foot portable classrooms are to be used at the school on M-55 for junior high school use and one portable is to be located at the Tawas City Elementary Unit.

2 TA Seniors Are NMSPT Semifinalists

Prin. John Alexander has announced that two students at Tawas Area High School have been named semifinalists in the 1973 National Merit Scholarship Program.

The students are Paul M. Killey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Merton F. Killey of East Tawas, and Richard A. Lemmon, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Lemmon, Wilber Road, East Tawas.

The approximately 15,000 semifinalists appointed Wednesday (today) are among the nation's most academically talented high school seniors. They will compete for some 3,000 Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1973.

The semifinalists received the highest qualifying scores in their states on the preliminary scholastic aptitude test-National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, which was given last October to over one million students in about 16,000 schools nationwide. They constitute less than one percent of the graduating secondary school seniors in the United States.

Semifinalists must advance to finalist standing to be considered for the Merit Scholarships to be awarded next spring. Semifinalists become finalists by receiving the endorsement of their schools, confirming their high PSAT-NMSQT performance on a second examination and providing information about their accomplishments and interests.

About 96 percent of the semifinalists are expected to become finalists and each will be considered for one of the 1,000 National Merit \$1,000 Scholarships which are allocated on a state basis.

For the past 25 years, LeMert has been closely associated with marching percussion, primarily concerned with the instruction of drum and bugle corps. Over the past five years, LeMert was percussion director for the following corps: 1965-1967 DesPlaines "Vanguards," 1967 United States World Open Champions; 1968-1969 Racine Kilties, 1968-1969 Veterans of Foreign Wars National Champions and numerous other national and international titles; 1970-1971 "Casper Troopers" of Casper, Wyoming; 1970 VFW, United States World Open, CYO National Champions.

With the Racine Kilties in 1968, LeMert was instrumental in the introduction of the timp-tom trio and, in 1969, the bass timp-tom trios and timpani. OK Building Permit For Dr. Phillips

Following a review of council and planning commission minutes over the past several years, Tawas City Council adopted a recommendation of City Atty. Kenneth Myles that a building application sought by Dr. E. W. Phillips be approved.

Phillips had applied for a building application to construct a professional building on M-55 west of the Joseph Barkman Lumber Company. The property had been rezoned a number of years ago from residential to commercial, but confusing records did not indicate the type of business to be allowed. The property has been officially rezoned to B-1 Business, which includes professional buildings compatible to a residential area.


Luncheon will be available on the grounds.

LETTER to the EDITOR:

To the People who are concerned with the Halfway House:

I have read the article written in the local paper by the probation officer, acting as a private citizen. I am also a private citizen who would like to state my views.

The article read that the halfway house would provide residential facilities for offenders ranging in age from 17 to 25 years or older. At the age of 18, young men have the right to drink and vote. Most men at the age of 21 have set their pattern of life. The 18 to 25-year-olds are supposed to be adults and responsible people. Let them stand on their own two feet.

Residential area is being considered. The zoning ordinance of Tawas City is, and I quote: (I do not know how the City of East Tawas Zoning Ordinance stands on this)

1. Family Dwelling on a Residential Area: Is a building designed exclusively for and occupied exclusively by one (1) family.

2. Family: Is one (1) or two (2) persons or parents with direct lineal descendants and adopted or foster children (and including the domestic employees thereof) together with not more than two (2) persons not so related, living together in the whole or part of a dwelling unit comprising a single housekeeping unit.

This above statement does not mean six or 12 young men coming or going every three or six or nine months, with two or three people as adult supervisors.

It was stated that attempts would

be made to find employment for each person in his own community. I do not know about the other three counties, but this county has all it can do to employ those who live here year around. Just check your local unemployment offices and welfare lines.

Are you people aware that this federal grant is a two-year grant, and after two years the full responsibility will fall on these four counties involved?

Every person living in a residential area is a potential neighbor to the halfway house.

MYS Program Gets \$54,075 State Grant

A grant of \$54,075 was approved last week by the Michigan Commission on Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice providing funds for the second year of operation of Michigan Youth Services (MYS) program.

The grant represents approximately 70 percent of the cost of the 1972-73 summer encampment at Wurtsmith Air Force Base and is part of federal grants to Michigan totaling more than 8½-million dollars.

Lt. Gov. James H. Brickley made the announcement of the grant, which was among 65 community and 17 state-wide crime-fighting projects recommended for approval by the committee which he chairs.

Larry Thompson, director of the MYS program, said that the grant will allow for the follow-up program through the spring of 1973. Thompson was delighted with the approval of the funds, citing the recent attack on the program as the reason for concern about the funding.

Don P. LeDuc, administrator for the office of criminal justice programs for the state, has admitted that he confused the MYS program with a different project in the state when he was quoted in the Detroit Free Press as saying that the program was a total failure. LeDuc said that he had been quoted correctly, but has since written to the Free Press stating that he had been in complete error.

Local financing will be needed to continue the program after the completion of this second grant period. Contact is being made with the United Fund and other service agencies in the 28 northern counties of Lower Michigan served by MYS in hopes of raising the approximately \$100,000 it takes to run the project for a full year.

Michigan Youth Services is a program directed to youth motivation and vocational guidance. Young men, 14-17 years of age, are served. It is a program for the average boy, not the exceptionally good nor the exceptionally bad. Most boys are referred to the program by schools, social agencies and a few by juvenile officers. Many have had deteriorating grades, social problems, expulsions from school or "danger sign" contacts with law enforcement agencies. Some merely need masculine or camp exposure.

Since its beginning, over 600 boys have spent a week at Wurtsmith Air Force Base where they have watched and learned from young men much older than themselves. Skilled counselors worked with them to develop vocational interests and to stress teamwork, cooperation and healthy self esteem. Iosco County

has had 95 boys attend the program. Referring agencies have reported that over 67 percent of these boys benefited measurably from their experience in the program.

The real key to the program, however, has been in the follow-up in which staff members work through volunteer community workers to guide and encourage the youth vocationally. From this follow-up, it has been possible to gear the program for the varied needs to the type of youth who take part.

But, following the pattern of many federal projects in past years, the federal government will fund projects for a year or two, after which those which have proven their worth have gained enough support in the areas served to pick up the gap in funding locally.

It will now be up to the areas served to provide funding.

Social Security Benefit Hike Is 'Automatic'

Question: I hear that monthly social security benefits will be increased. I got the last raise automatically. Must I do anything to get this one?

Answer: You do not have to do anything to get the new 20 percent increase. You will see the increase for the first time in the social security check you get in early October.

Question: I recently received my medicare card, but it has my husband's social security number on it. Since I have my own social security number, should it not be on my card?

Answer: Not necessarily. The number on your card is determined by the work record under which you have your social security coverage. If you are drawing benefits as a wife, your card will have your husband's social security number on it with a "B" after the number. If you are drawing benefits as a widow, your card will show his number with a "D" after it.

Question: I have been offered part-time work by my employer when I retire next month. Since I have already applied for monthly social security retirement benefits, will my employer still have to withhold social security contributions from my wages?


Answer: Yes. The fact that you draw monthly social security benefits has no bearing on the requirement that your employer withhold and report social security contributions on your wages.

Question: When my husband retired, he was earning \$1,000 a month. Some of his friends, who made less, are collecting as much as he is. How come? I thought social security cash benefit amounts are figured on earnings before retirement?

Answer: You are right. Social security retirement benefits are computed on average earnings over a period of years. But this average is based on earnings actually covered by social security contributions. For instance, the most earnings anyone could have credited last year was \$7,800—the maximum amount on which social security contributions were based. This yearly maximum was as low as \$3,000 before 1951, and it was increased over the years as earnings levels increased throughout the United States. So, no matter how high your husband's pre-retirement income was, his average earnings for social security purposes is based on the amount actually covered by social security contributions.

State Warns Many Docks Are Illegal

15 Years Ago—

September 12, 1957—Nicholas V. Olds, assistant attorney general, stated at a hearing before the United States Army Corps of Engineers that every specifically unauthorized dock along Tawas Bay was unlawful. Olds said that property owners could not erect any structure over the bed of the Great Lakes without the consent and approval of the state, granted him through expressed legislative enactment.

Until recently, you may have had a hard time answering these questions. But now, because of a new Food and Drug Administration regulation, you will soon find information on the labels of food, drugs and cosmetics to help you determine your actual savings.

Any product involved in a "cents off" promotion must state on the package the actual number of "cents off" and the new price. The original price must be displayed on a placard nearby.


In the past, a coupon that promised 25 cents back if you mail it in has not covered the eight-cent stamp necessary for mailing; so you have actually been getting 17 cents out of the deal.

Now sponsors of this kind of promotion must either cover the cost of mailing (for example, by returning the eight-cent stamp to you), or must make it clear that the 25 cents does not include postage.

Next time you go food shopping, look on the labels for this new information. This is just one way to wise-up on "best food buys."


