

The culvert washed out during a storm two weeks ago and was not discovered until trainmen aboard a freight had passed over it. One rail was bent out of shape but there were no injuries and there was no damage to equipment. A contractor for the Arenac County Drain Commission reportedly cleaned out a drain running under the tracks. It was reported that the ditch was lower than the culvert, originally constructed in 1911, and a heavy rain storm eroded the culvert to a point where it collapsed.
