

City to Enforce Car Ordinance

Following discussion at Monday night's council meeting, City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz is to send letters to property owners who are in violation of city ordinance by storing wrecked cars on private property or on city streets.

Members of the council expressed the opinion that it should not be necessary to send such violation notices, inasmuch as owners should be

concerned with the appearance of their own property.

Bublitz said that the notice would be followed by a visit from the city police chief to insure that violations are corrected.

In addition, adoption of an ordinance to control outside storage at the city's industrial park is to be investigated. It was stated that a similar ordinance is being planned for the industrial park in Baldwin Township. Councilmen commented that other industries along Industrial Avenue near the sewage disposal plant were neat in appearance, which added greatly to the over-all appearance of the community.

In other business, the city manager reported that the Michigan Department of Natural Resources had accepted permit applications for federal funding on catwalks for two new bridges and construction of a breakwall along Ninth Avenue to be used as a fishing site.

Bublitz said that additional information must be submitted before the projects are approved for federal funding. In addition, the state is to make a flood survey to determine if raising bridges would have any effect on the flow of Tawas River. The latter requirement will delay the project about 30 days.

The council approved transfer of a beer and wine takeout license from James W. and Bernadine Compo to John Alfano Jr. and Amelia Erhardt.

John McMurray was appointed to the Tawas City Park Board to succeed Clarence King, who resigned because of his service to the city planning commission.

The council is to accept bids for purchase of a new police patrol car on Monday, October 2. A maintenance survey indicated that repairs would require an expenditure of about \$300 on the present car, which has traveled 67,000 miles.

Election Fever Starts Friday With Opening

Campaigning for the November general election gets under way in full swing this week with opening of the Isosco County Republican headquarters, located at Verlaac's Real Estate, 835 North US-23, East Tawas.

United States Sen. Robert Griffin will be here Friday to officially open the headquarters starting at 1:00 p. m. Senator Griffin is scheduled to arrive here Friday noon. He is to meet employees of Tawas Industries, Incorporated, Tawas City, from 12:15 to 12:30 p. m., followed by a reception from 12:30 to 1:00 p. m. at the county building. The reception is being sponsored by the Isosco County Republican Women's Club. Coffee and doughnuts are to be served.

Two Auto Negligence Suits Seek \$225,000

Two auto negligence suits asking damages totaling \$225,000 have been filed in Isosco Circuit Court against Sears, Roebuck and Company by the administrators of the estates of two 1969 auto accident victims.

Robert J. Langlois of Nevada, administrator of the estate of his wife, Corrine A. Langlois, asks damages of \$125,000.

Gary S. Wood, administrator of the estate of Bernice H. Dietzel, asks damages totaling \$100,000.

The two women died November 5, 1969, in an accident on US-23 south of Tawas City involving a Sears, Roebuck and Company van truck operated by Dean R. Smith.

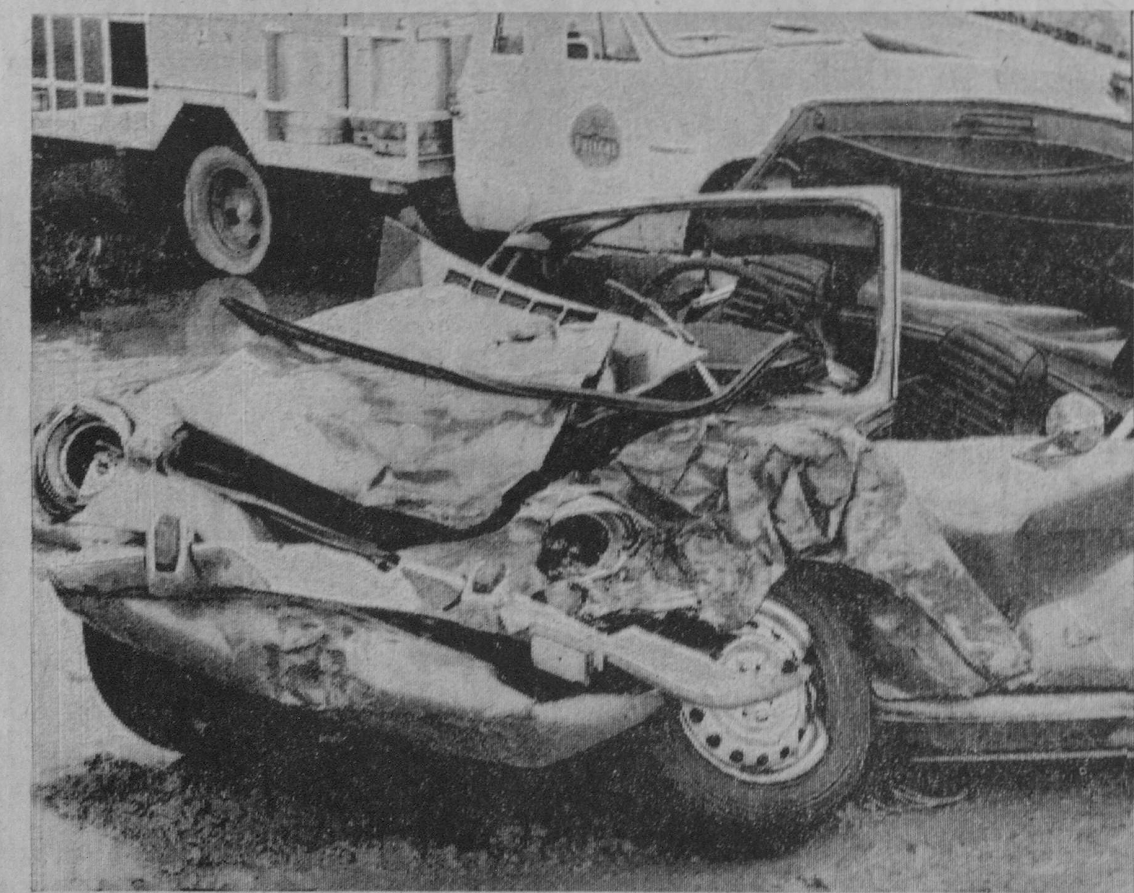
Petitions from both plaintiffs claim that the truck was being driven in a negligent manner.

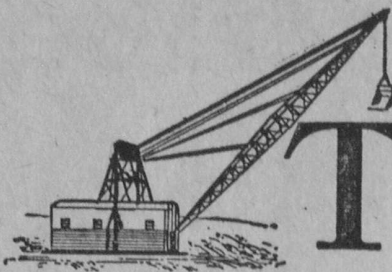
The Township of Wilber asked for the restraining order because of an alleged zoning ordinance violation.

Going Up in 1970

NETS Folds; Era of Computer Brief

Tawas' entry into the electronic computer era, which had such brilliant prospects only two years ago but has been tottering in recent months, collapsed Monday as workmen began removing delicate and costly computer equipment from the third floor of the old Holland House at East Tawas.

Peoples State Bank officially announced Tuesday that it had taken over control of National Electronics Transmission Service and was in the process of liquidating the remaining assets of that business. Remaining accounts have been transferred to a Saginaw firm.

Computers located on the third floor of the hotel building have been repossessed by National Cash Register Corporation and removal of the equipment began Monday.

Peoples State Bank had been the prime customer of NETS, but in August transferred all bank data processing records and procedures to Peoples National Bank and Trust Company of Bay City.

Through normal banking channels, Peoples State Bank recently took possession of the hotel, which has been a fixture on Newman Street since 1891. The business has been closed and the doors have been locked until such time as a new owner takes over.

"We are diligently looking for

someone to own and operate the old Holland Hotel in such a manner that it will be a credit to the community," bank officials stated Tuesday.

National Electronics Transmission Service was established here in 1970 and articles for incorporating the firm received state approval on February 5 of that year. Original officers of the firm included Richard L. Harwood, board chairman, who was president of Peoples State Bank.

Delivery was made in June 1970 on the first segment of NCR computers, which was said to represent about one-third of the eventual \$1,000,000 installation. When fully operational, NETS was to offer full service bank processing service in a four-state area through use of microwave equipment. Peoples State was the firm's first and only banking customer.

Six months ago, Harwood resigned his position with Peoples State Bank after a 22-year association. Last month, he waived preliminary hearing in Bay City Federal Court on a charge of misuse or embezzlement of funds from the local bank.

Last month, the bank disclosed that its total shortage is around \$1,100,000 and that the greatest percentage is covered by insurance. Bank officials pointed out that depositors are protected for up to \$20,000 on each account by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

New Salaries Get ET Council OK

A new wage and salary schedule for city employees was adopted Monday night by the East Tawas Council.

New salaries to be paid city employees are as follows: City clerk, \$2,400; city treasurer, \$4,144; librarian, \$260 per month; chief of police, \$340 per month; patrolmen, \$655 per month;

In other business, Performance Fuel was low bidder on furnishing petroleum products to the city. Bids accepted were 16.5 cents per gallon for regular gasoline, 15.8 cents for diesel fuel and 14.5 cents for heating oil.

An agreement with Baldwin Township for furnishing fire protection was accepted.

Dismiss Charges on Net Violation

Lack of a penalty clause to prosecute violators of a 1969 natural resources commission regulation has resulted in another setback for DNR efforts to protect yellow perch stocks of Saginaw and Tawas Bays.

Charges against a Tawas City commercial fisherman over violation of the DNR's zone management plan were dismissed Wednesday by Dist. Court Judge J. Richard Ernst.

Judge Ernst ruled that the commission's commercial fishing regulations, under which Sam Aikens was arrested Sunday, August 13, made no provision for a penalty in such a violation. This is the second such case to be dismissed locally.

Aikens was charged with having in his possession 14 boxes of perch caught illegally with gill nets and other counts including failure to allow conservation officers to inspect a licensed fishing operation and assault.

Three weeks ago, a DNR biologist warned that the continued pressure

by commercial netters would cause a severe setback to gains in perch stocks which have been enjoyed this season by sports fishermen in the Tawas area.

Gill netting has been banned in Saginaw Bay under the DNR's zone management rule of 1969 but, as an administrative rule of a state department rather than a legislative act, there apparently is no means to prosecute violators.

Kenneth Myles, Isosco County prosecuting attorney, said that the outcome of a civil suit pending in Ingham County Circuit Court against a Lake Michigan commercial fisherman could have great significance on enforcement of the DNR's zone management plan.

The prosecuting attorney said he was to contact officials at Lansing to determine the possibility of instituting similar court action here.

Hearing Set in Circuit Court on Net Confiscation

A hearing is scheduled for Monday, September 25, before Isosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller on a complaint brought by Leonard McDonald, conservation officer for the State of Michigan, vs. Avis McGahan Seaman and Duane L. Seaman of Osceola.

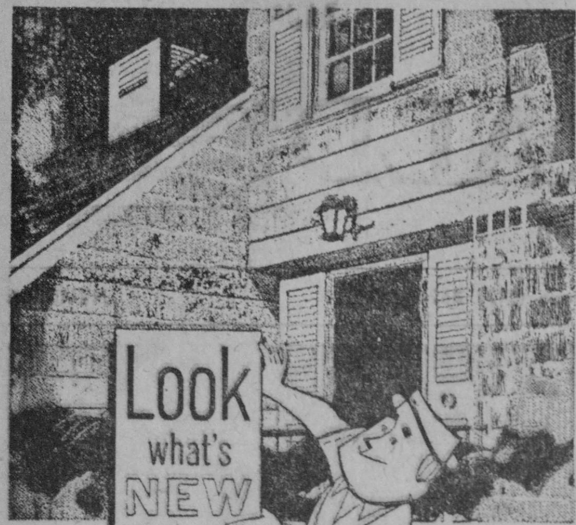
The conservation officer seeks an order condemning and confiscating 10 boxes (approximately 15,000 feet) of small mesh gill nets owned by the Seamans and held by the state.

McDonald claims that the Seamans were fishing in closed waters, that they had in their possession eight boxes of chubs taken from Lake Huron, that buoy markers on nets did not have proper license numbers and that the defendants did not allow an inspection of fishing operations.



WORK has resumed on construction of the new Hale Area School following "picketing" of pickets last Wednesday by school students. 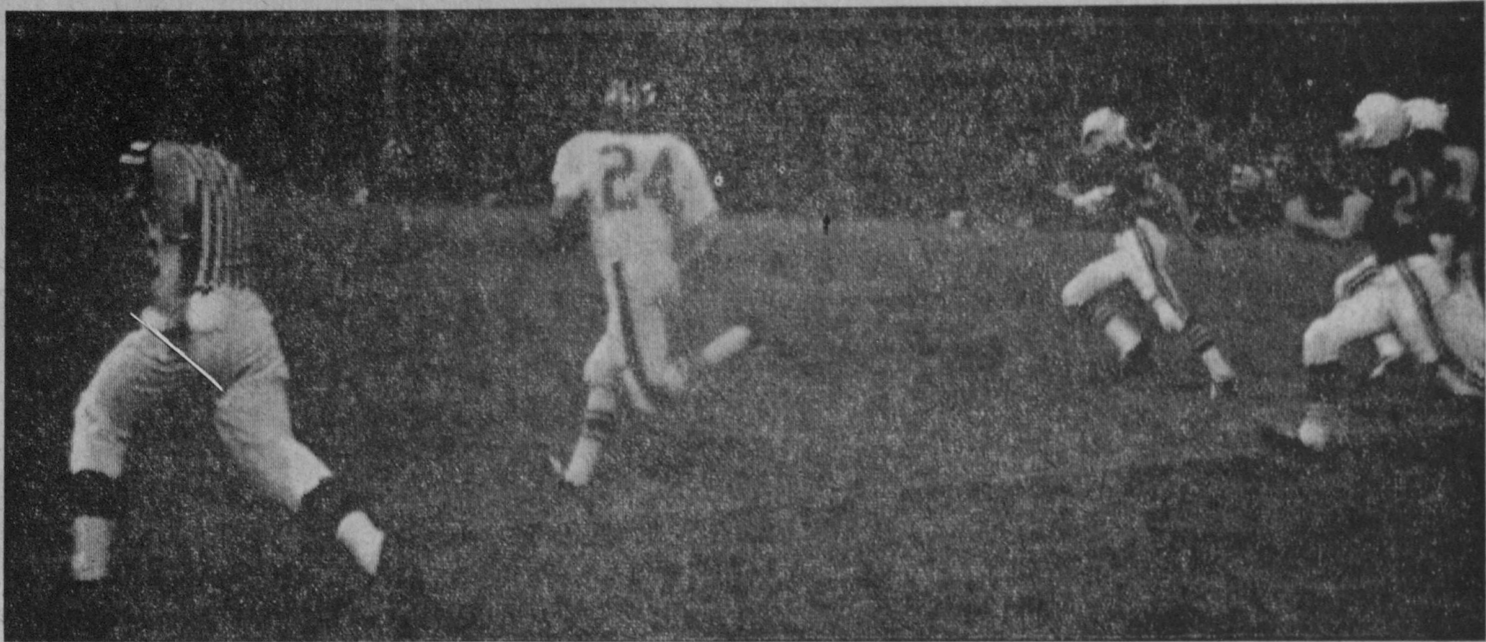

Tawas Area High School football squads won a pair of season opening games Saturday at Harrison. The Junior Braves won the afternoon contest, 14-0, while the Braves won over the Hornets, 20-0, in play under the lights.

Although Coach Dick Look believes that his Braves have potential, he admits that competition in the Northern B Conference will be much tougher than that provided Saturday. The Braves are slated to open the NBC schedule Friday night when they play host to Pinconning.

Saturday's game saw Tail Back Steve Janego picking up 250 yards in 25 carries. Janego scored Tawas Area's first touchdown on the third play from scrimmage on a 25-yard run. He scored again in the fourth quarter on a 20-yard run.

Tawas Area's second touchdown came on a quarterback sneak by Steve Sventko. This touchdown was set up by Defensive Back Wayne Etue, who intercepted a pass and ran 57 yards to Harrison's three-yard line, where he tripped.

Tawas Area's defense was convincing enough in that it did not allow

Harrison to penetrate beyond the 40-yard line. Defensive standouts were

John Pfeiffer and Sventko. Mike Hughes, junior fullback, turned in an outstanding offensive game by averaging four yards per carry and was never dropped for a loss.

In Friday's game with Pinconning, the Braves will be meeting a team with an outstanding defensive line. The Spartans lost last week, 16-6, to Saginaw Eisenhower.

The Junior Braves scored in the fourth quarter on a 13-yard pass from Haglund. The PAT attempt was no good.

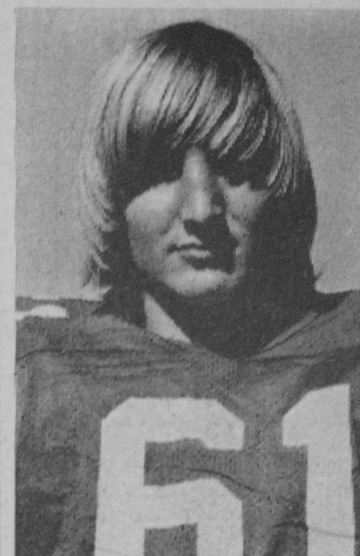

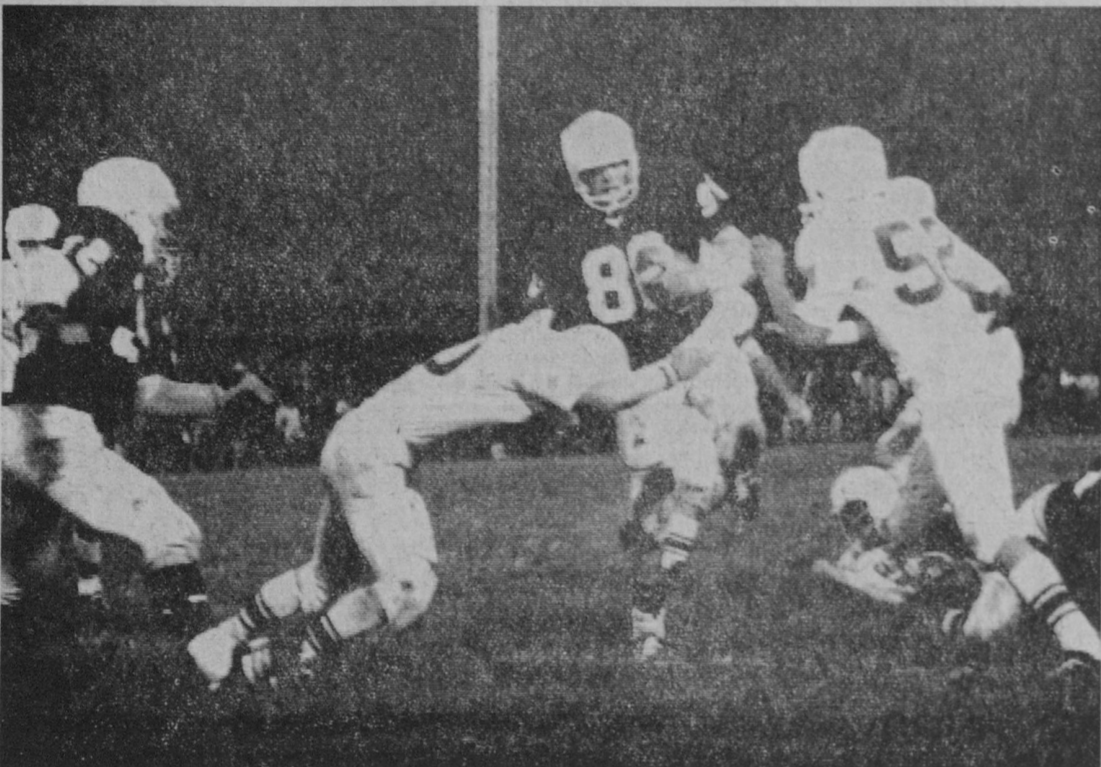

Hale Eagles Defeated W-P Cards on Pass Play

"The Cards were the toughest team, bar none, that we've met in my two years at Hale Area," was the way Coach Dale Purkey of the Eagles described Friday night's football opener in which the Eagles won on a fourth down quarter intercepted pass.

A week ago, the Cardinals wasted no time snapping a nine-game losing streak which spanned two football seasons as they whipped Hillman in the season opener, 12-0. Last year, the Hale Eagles were undefeated league champions and are expected to be tough for North Star League opponents again this year.

Playing before a large opening night crowd on the loser's home field, the two teams battled to a standoff for four quarters, with the exception of that one game-deciding mistake.

The play which proved the scoring difference was set up early in the fourth quarter when Jeff Blust of the Eagles intercepted a Cardinal pass and moved the ball to the W-P 23. Hale Area picked up a first down in three plays to the W-P 17, then moved the ball three more yards in two plays. A fake pass was diagnosed perfectly by the Cardinal defense, resulting in the loss of seven yards, and Hale Area gave up the ball on fourth down.

The Cardinals, with a good ground game up to this point, finally took to the air when their halfbacks could not penetrate the Hale line in two plays. On third down, Whittemore-Prescott Area tried a pass and Tom Emery, Eagle senior end, gobbled up the ball and ran 20 yards for the only score of the night. The try for extra point was no good.

Most of the first half was played in Cardinal territory as the Eagles knocked on the scoring door three times, but were turned back each time by a hard-charging Cardinal line. Hale Area's best opportunity to score came in the first quarter when Joe Kimmerer, Keyno Shellenbarger and Ron Cooper combined running talents to move the ball to the Cardinal five-yard line in nine plays. A hard Cardinal tackle on the next play jarred the ball loose and Whittemore-Prescott's squad took over on its own five.

The Cardinals had the ball for 12 plays and hard running by Steve Chapman, Dean Connors and Brian Zimmerman picked up three first downs, but 20 yards in penalties stopped the drive.

The same Cardinal trio again joined forces in the second quarter to jolt the Hale defense by picking up three first downs to move the ball to Hale's 25. There, the drive finally stalled as Hale's linemen began to contain the Cardinal offense.

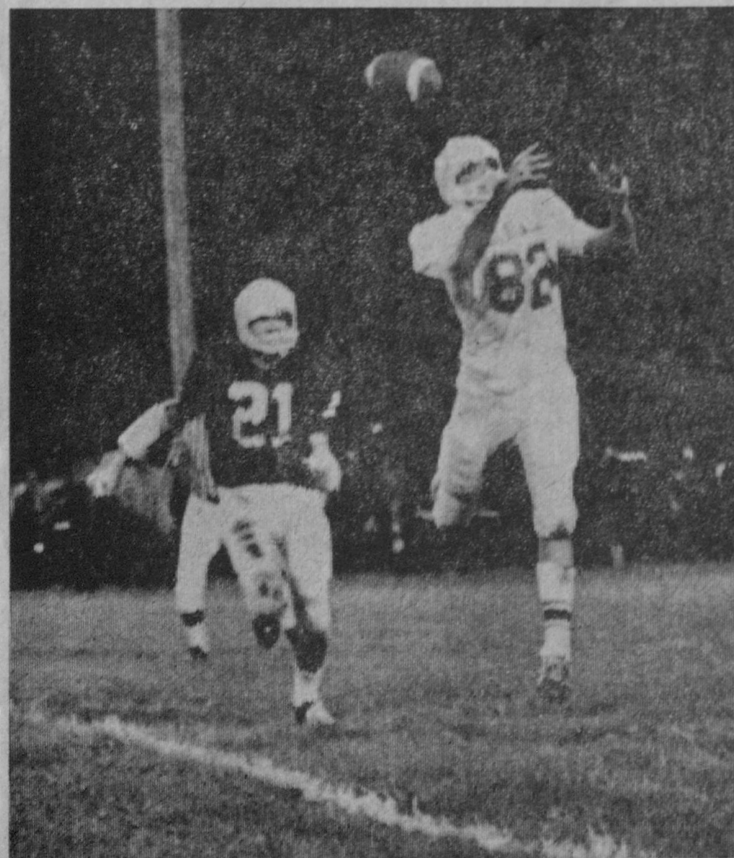
The Eagles had the ball for two plays, then lost the pigskin when an alert Cardinal defender picked off a pitchout and returned it to Hale's 20. With this break, Cardinal halfbacks bulldozed their way to the seven-yard line before giving up on downs.

Hale Area had the ball for eight plays, including a 51-yard end around play by Emery, but the drive ran out of time shortly before the half.

The two teams had trouble holding onto the ball during the game, the Cardinals fumbling four times and Hale Area fumbling three times. The Cards recovered two of their own fumbles, but Hale recovered only once.

Early in the second half, Hale moved the ball to the Cardinal 29, but lost the ball on a fumble. The Cardinals moved to the Hale 35-yard line in five plays, then lost 15 yards when Chapman attempted to pass and was dropped back on the 50-yard line. The Cards tried another pass, but Hale recovered a fumble on the W-P 35-yard line.

The Eagles had the ball for five plays, but fumbled on the Cardinal 27. This set the stage for Blust's interception, which set up the only scoring play of the game.

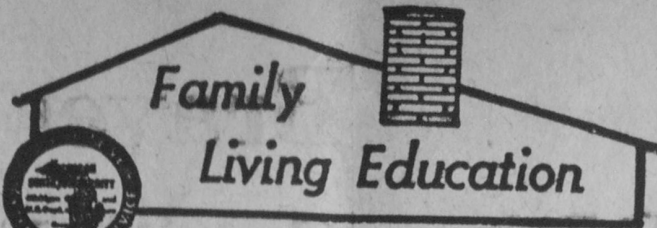

It is pretty hard to save string these days. Fifty different kinds of sticky tape have replaced it. No longer are there many things that need to be wrapped up in paper and tied with a string when we go shopping.

Back in the string-saving days, packaging was precious. The pickle barrel and herring keg were re-used as long as they hung together; beer came home in a bucket, milk in a lard pail. Beans, salt, sugar and flour were packed in cloth bags which were transformed into pillow cases, table covers and aprons.

Today's packaging has been described as being like a butterfly—artfully fashioned and colorful, but destined for a brief life of usefulness.

The "string savers" among us are hard to put to store all the pretty bottles, the plastics and boxes that seem to be too precious to throw away. Just how many "things" can we create from egg cartons or plastic wrappers? Eventually, we have to dispose of the stuff to open traffic lanes through the house.

The fact that packaging grows by about five percent a year makes some of us yearn for the simple old days of string saving. To put all the consumer goods into packages

amounts to an annual 23-billion-dollar industry. The 55-million tons of materials used are divided into 56 percent paper, 18 percent glass, 7.5 percent wood and 3.5 percent plastics.

Packaging is important to us. As consumers, we seem to be willing to pay for more packages like the bottle of perfume in an oversized push-lined box. We are willing to pay for convenience, sanitation plus more and more information on labels.

The three main complaints about packaging are that it contributes to litter, it increases the burden on already overloaded refuse collection and disposal systems and it bites into the already limited material and energy resources of our country.

We consumers seem to insist on more of everything rather than less. Could it ever be that we will bury ourselves in our own litter or use up our material resources? Are we close to the day when we pay as much for disposal of the package as we do for the package itself? That could be too much!

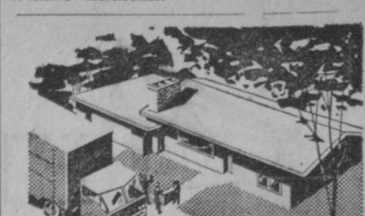

Kroger Notes Food Prices Are Lower

Average retail beef prices at Kroger Food Stores have been reduced during the last six weeks. The lower cost for beef cited by Donald Rumsfeld, director of the Post of Living Council, has been reflected through the use of an intensified and accelerated program of weekly specials. Since 60 to 70 percent of beef sold is through the weekly special features, we believe this has been the quickest way to allow consumers to benefit.

To give an example, in Detroit, U. S. choice round steak at Kroger was featured for three consecutive weeks at 98 cents per pound—a reduction of 61 cents per pound under regular price. This 98-cent price was in effect from August 21 through September 10.

Another current example is U. S. choice center cut chuck roast featured at 59 cents per pound this week. This is 29 cents per pound less than regular retail and is four cents per pound less than the sale price of 63 cents per pound in effect four weeks ago, August 14-20. These examples indicate clearly our reduction of beef prices.

The figures used in the paragraph above were derived at as follows: The regular price of center cut chuck roast in Detroit is 88 cents. This week, it is on special at 59 cents or a 29-cent savings for customers. This special of 59 cents is at a lower price than the 63 cents, which was the special price in August or a drop of four cents per pound.

Further, our margins today are 20 percent lower than they were in April and considerably below the maximum allowed by the price commission.

The Guest School and coal shed were moved into Hale this week. The school will be used for a library.

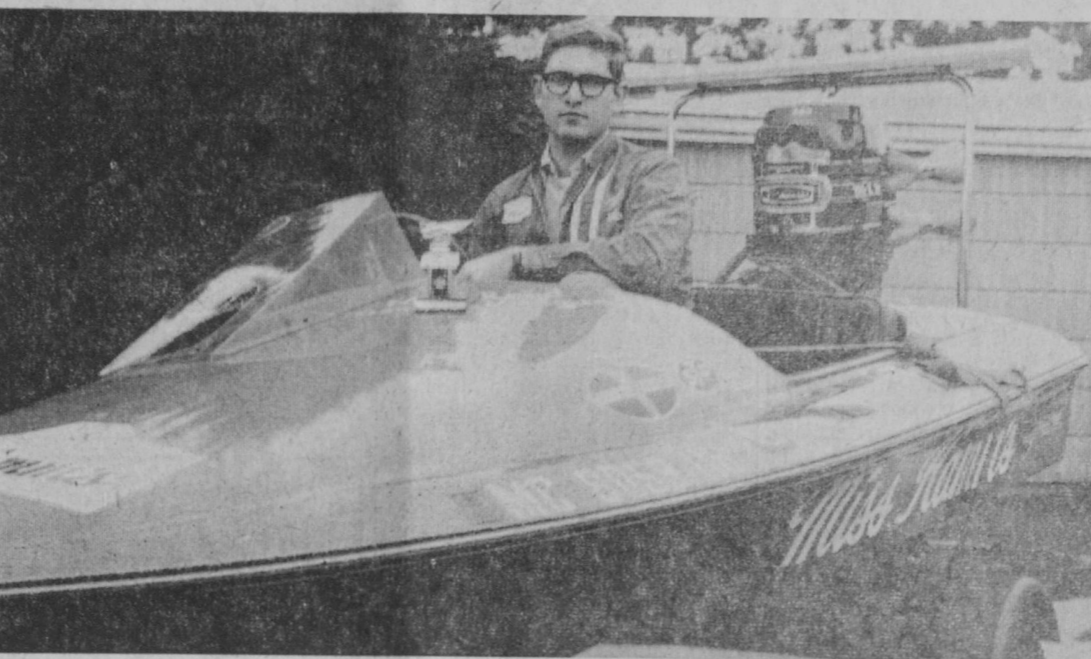

Answer: Yes, there is a time limit. It is December 31, 1972, for services received from October 1, 1970, through September 30, 1971.

Question: When I went to the hospital earlier this year, I had to pay \$88. They told me this was my deductible.

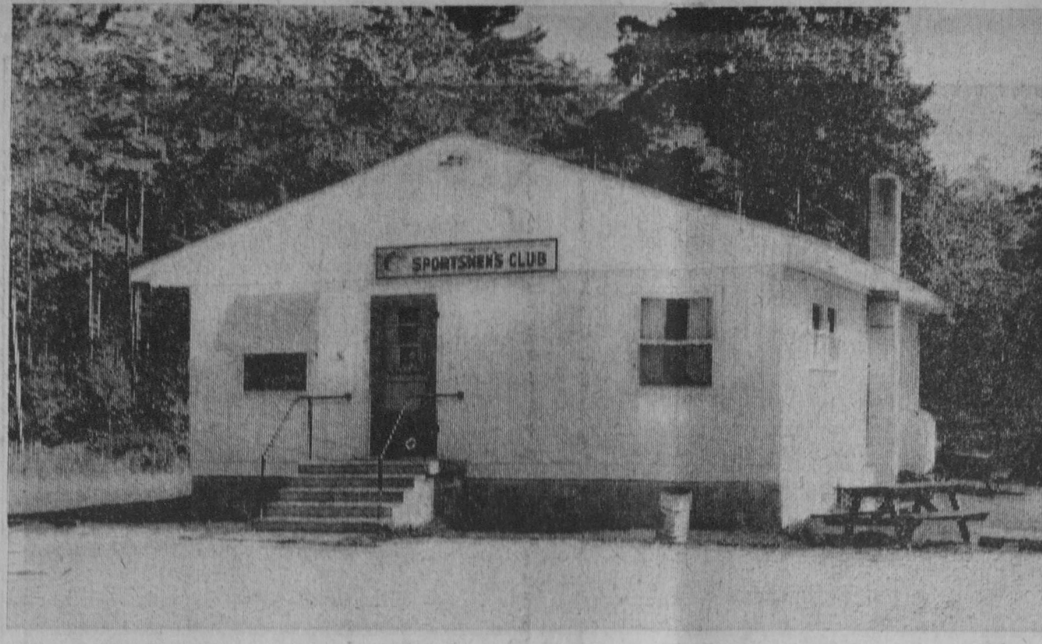
Answer: You did not pay the same deductible twice. There is a deductible under each of the two parts of medicare.

Question: I became disabled a couple months ago and want to apply for monthly disability benefits from social security.

Answer: You apply at your social security office, but doctors and vocational specialists in a state agency (usually the Vocational Rehabilitation Agency) which has had experience in seeing the effect of disability upon peoples' abilities to work make this decision.

Area Mechanics Aid Training Program

Five area auto mechanics met recently at Tawas Area High School to assist in planning instruction for vocational training being offered in a shared time program coordinated by Isoco Intermediate School District.

Classes started last week. Members of the citizens advisory committee for automotive services attending were Harold Sprigg of Tawas City, Richard Haglund of East Tawas, Karel Weisl of Oscoda, Charles Millard of Hale and William Philpot of Tawas City.

Bruce Vickey, vocational education director for the intermediate school district, said the committee discussed what it felt were major topics that should be included in the automotive service program.

Major subject units included in the program are lubrication rack operation, brake service, suspension and steering, engine service, tune up,

charging systems, starting systems, tire service, professional attitudes, tool and equipment care, fuel systems.

The automotive services course is being offered as a shared time vocational education program for the first time this fall. The instructor is Stephen Hitch.

The committee recommended that certificates of completion be issued to graduates of the program. The certificate would reflect instructional areas successfully completed by the student.

The committee felt a great deal of importance and stress should be incorporated throughout the program dealing with attitudes toward work, tool and equipment care and house-keeping in the work area.

Another unique feature of the program is that students will be working on customers' cars. Once the program gets under way and students have successfully completed classroom and manipulative units of instruction, they will be permitted to work on customer vehicles under the direction of Hitch. It will be necessary for anyone desiring to have his car serviced to make an appointment with the instructor.

As an example, after students have completed the unit on brake service they will work on the cars of people in the county who need brake service. When the auto enters the shop, it would become a practical educational experience for the students.

Under the supervision of the instructor, students would perform a complete brake job. In this case, work would include new or re-lined brake shoes, new or rebuilt wheel cylinders, a new or rebuilt master cylinder, turning of brake drums and a complete inspection of brake lines and connections.

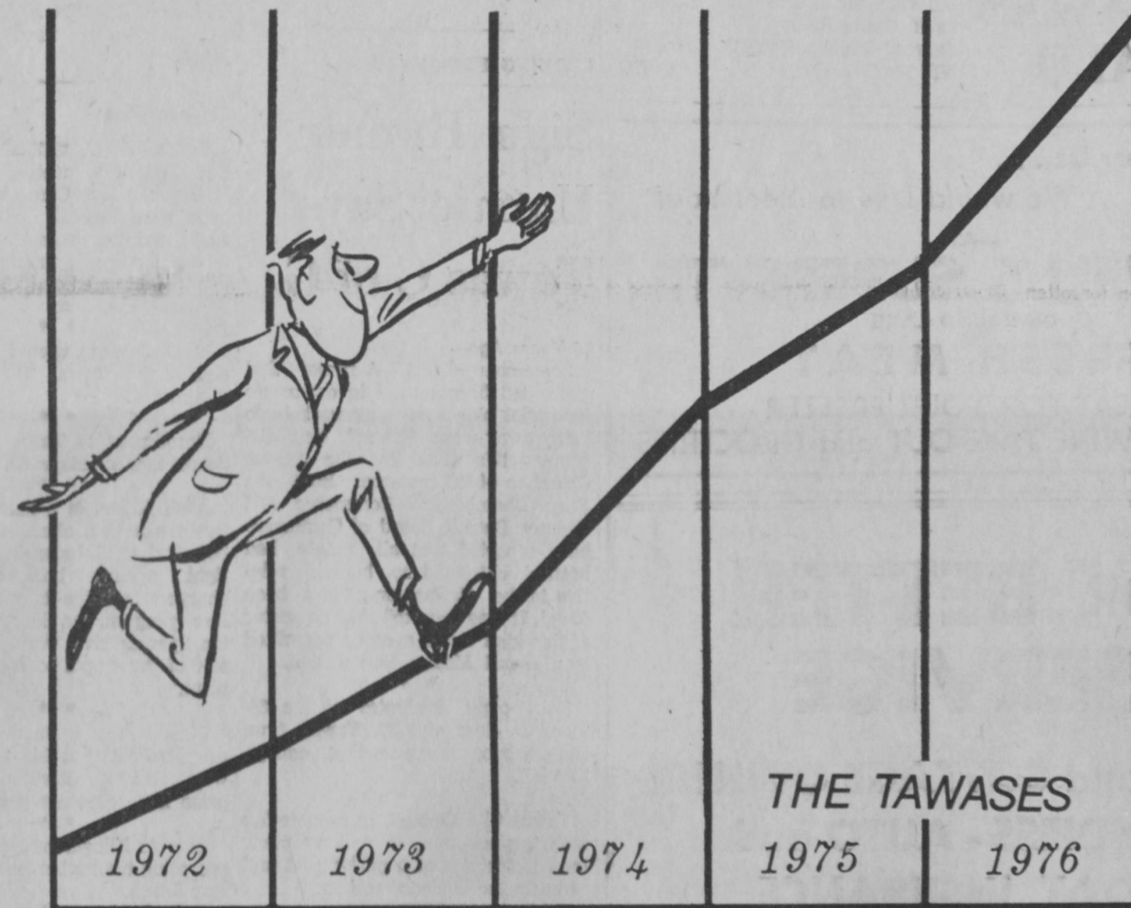

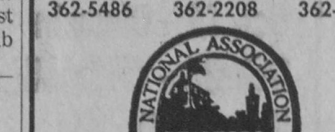

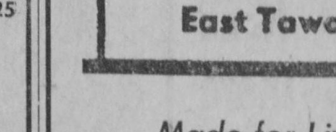
