Michigan's 1972 take of antlerless deer will be held to 9,830 animals, about only one-half of last year's quota, during the Nov. 15-30 firearm deer season. In line with that, only about 43,000 antlerless deer hunting permits are available for the season, covering the 37 shaded areas shown here. Michigan's remaining 61 permanent deer management areas will be limited to bucks-only hunting during the firearm period. Hunters have until October I to mail their antlerless permit applications to the Department of Natural Resources. They may pick up application forms when they buy their 1972 firearm deer licenses from local dealers. At the same time, hunters may obtain free copies of Michigan's 1972 Deer and Bear Hunting that harvest.

Guide, which carry instructions for filling out the forms. The only antlerless area that applicants will find on the Upper Peninsula's map for this season is the southern part of Menominee County. Its antlerless quota stands conservatively at 640 animals, with 800 party permits available to groups of 4 hunters. Some 23,000 permits are offered for the northern Lower Peninsula, where the antlerless quota has been cut in half from last season, down to less than 5,000 animals. Sights are set upon taking about 4,200 antlerless deer in southern Michigan this firearm season to minimize that region's toll of car-deer accidents. Some 19,000 permits are being offered in hopes of reaching

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

people in your social security office. They may be able to explain to your satisfaction why your monthly payment is the amount it is. If not, they can help you request a review, the first step in any appeals process that is open to you if you do not think the decision is correct.

Question: A couple months ago, had my third heart attack and my doctor is not sure I will ever be able Individual High Series: P. Beau-parland, 623; J. McMurray, 591; H. monthly social security payments, how will social security determine if my condition is severe enough to keep me from working?

Answer: The medical report from your doctor will show the severity of your condition-to what degree you are unable to do such things as move about, handle things, hear, speak, etc. The medical evidence, together with other information about youthe kind of work you have done in the past, your education, your training and other abilities-is the basis on which a decision can be made as to whether your condition prevents you from doing any "substantial gainful" work.

Question: When I start college this fall, I will be working in the college cafeteria part time. Since I paid social security on my part time job this summer, will I also have social security withheld on my college

Answer: No. A student's work for a college where he is enrolled and regularly attending classes is excluded from social security coverage.
